

INTRODUCTION

This book is the second in a series under the general title MEET YOUR ANCESTORS. The first book dealt with the ancestors of the compiler's mother who was the daughter of Jacob Sours who married Susan Gray. That book was issued in 1981 as MEET YOUR ANCESTORS: Siers, Sowers, Sours and allied families 1740-1980.

While collecting facts for the first book I also began gathering data concerning my father's family. He was John Mitchell Hubbard. Starting with the full name of my grandfather, John Fuller Hubbard, whom I never saw, and the full name of his wife, Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard, whom I saw only once, I have prepared this second book.

My grandmother Hubbard's visit lasted one week when I was six years old. She won my heart and that visit made a lasting impression. The day after my grandmother went home, I was alone out in the swing under a beautiful oak tree. My mother came out and found me crying. "Why are you crying?". "Grandma's gone!" was my reply.

I was interested, years later, in trying to learn about my father's parents. As a school girl studying history, I found that my father did not know the name of his first ancestor who came to America. "They said he lived in Westmoreland County, Virginia." No one could tell me more. Years later, Elnora Louise (Hubbard) Robinson, one of my first cousins, recalled that her father, Montezuma Hubbard, said that the first Hubbard ancestor came to America and had three sons, but she could not remember the names. No one living then knew their names.

In 1985 and 1986 while one of the first co-eds at Richmond College (now Richmond University) in Richmond, Va. I studied history under Professor S. C. Mitchell who said "Consult Court Records to be certain of accurate facts." I have followed this advice so far as records have been available. This study does not claim to have consulted all the records that exist. Time did not always permit me to follow through. Many records exist which I have not had an opportunity to examine.

Beginning with the known ancestors and working through Court Records and Census Records the compiler has been able to reconstruct the main Hubbard family line back to the Hubbard, an immigrant in Westmoreland County, Va., recalled by John Mitchell Hubbard (1849-1914). The immigrant's name proved to be Robert Hubbard (cal600-1663). Through Robert Hubbard's son, Mathew Hubbard, who was one of the three sons recalled by Montezuma Hubbard (1851-1914) research proved his brothers' names were John and Robert. Thus, Robert Hubbard (cal600-1663), immigrant, settled in Westmoreland County, Va., and his three sons were named Mathew, John and Robert.

This study proved that Mathew was the son through whom John Mitchell Hubbard's family descended, and this study has been limited to that line. The documentation included in the text would assist descendants of Robert, Jr. or John to trace their lines.

Through Bible Records, other family records, census records and court records this line of Hubbards is documented back to Joseph Hubbard (cal717-1799) who is verified by court records to be a brother of Sarah (Hubbard) Echols, Edward Hubbard and Benjamin Hubbard. Benjamin deeded

land to his brother Joseph in Amelia Co., Va. and Benjamin's patent proves he is from King William County, Va. and no one except Benjamin (cal680/86--) can be found in the records of that county who could be his father. In 1704 John Hubbard (cal661-1726) was on the Quit Rent Roll; he had inherited the land there from his father, the Mathew Hubbard (1627-1667) who had two brothers, John and Robert Hubbard. Mathew, John and Robert were the sons of Robert Hubbard (cal600-1663) who immigrated to Westmoreland County, Va. before the mid-seventeenth century.

This study follows through to the 13th generation in which there are several male children with the surname Hubbard.

The compiler hopes that some of those who read and study the facts given here will be inspired to build opon this foundation and to do further research.

In so far as time and facts permitted, the allied families have been included. The compiler has endeavored to give credit to each one who furnished information. Such credits are mentioned in the text where the information appears.

The compiler wishes to explain here why her son is named Robert Hubbard Bowling, because those who do not know might surmise that he was named for his immigrant ancestor, Robert Hubbard. That was not the case. He was named many years before this family research was undertaken. He was named Robert for his father Robert Bowling. We wished to give him a middle name and his father suggested "Hubbard" so as to identify him with his mother's family,—thus Robert Hubbard Bowling.









This picture shows the original Vandola Church was a building consisting of a sanctuary with a pulpit area. The ladies entered the door on the right and were seated on that side; the men entered the door on the left and sat on that side.

Those who were interested in establishing this Baptist Church held meetings in homes for eighteen months to worship, pray and plan a church. Among those were John M. and Mollie E. Hubbard and also W. H. (Henry) Sledge, a young man who felt called to preach the G ospel. Henry often prepared a short inspirational message for the group and after the church was dedicated he continued to prepare a message for one Sunday each month until a pastor accepted the call to serve Vandola Baptist Church.

J. M. and M. E. Hubbard encouraged all efforts to establish the church. He contributed financially, shared in various duties during construction and donated the parcel of land upon which the church was built.


J. M. Hubbard was a tither and he knew that W. H. (Henry) Sledge would have to finance his own education for the ministry. Some time before college would open, J. M. Hubbard met Henry one day and invited him to come by his home before leaving for college—saying that he would give him the money he needed. Henry thanked him. That year, on the way to catch a train to enter Wake Forest College in North Carolina, Henry came walking, carrying his satchel to say "Goodbye" and accepted the gift promised by J. M. Hubbard. Years later Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Sledge were guests in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hubbard. He said, then, that the gift by Mr. Hubbard 'secured' him for the ministry.

Therefore, the first ministerial student was W. H. Sledge. Before the year 1976, P. O. Soyars, H. N. Soyars, L. W. Gammon, G. L. Warren and B. E. Bennett also have been ordained by Vandola Baptist Church.







James Archer Muse was the son of Thomas Chatin Muse who married Susan Ann Mitchell, daughter of James Allen Mitchell and his wife Sarah Hill (Vaden) Mitchell. His grandfather, James Allen Mitchell, was the youngest son of Lieut. James Mitchell who married the widow, Mrs. Sarah Warren (Philpott) Hubbard—(therefore they were the great grandparents of James Archer Muse.)

Thomas Chattin Muse's sister, Angelina H. Muse, married John Coleman Mitchell, the son of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. John Mitchell was the oldest son of Lieut. James and Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hubbard) Mitchell. This means that James Archer Muse's mother, Susan Ann (Mitchell) Muse was a first cousin to John Coleman Mitchell, the husband of James Archer Muse's aunt, Angelina H. Muse.

James Archer Muse's mother died early. He was six years, six months and four days old when his father dated his Will and only six years and eight months old on the day he became heir to his father's entire estate (if he lived to become 21 years of age, according to the wording of the Will.)

HUBBARD HISTORY

Hubbard family History cannot be written in Virginia with full names, all activities and accurate dates. There are no family records, church registers or court records to support a perfect record in each generation. There are a few records that have escaped the ravages of time and fit into the tradition stated by two brothers born around 1850. Around 1895 one told his inquiring children that he was told his early Hubbard ancestor lived in Westmoreland Co. Va. His brother told his children there were three brothers who came over together with their father and he named those brothers. No one today can recall those given names.

Tradition is truly often an oral transmission of something to be learned. It cannot be stated as a fact but it may lead to that which is true. Many times the result is truly rewarding. In this study the result is based upon the few available records which, so to speak, are truly only scattered "foot prints on the sands of time". For many reasons an exhaustive study has been impossible in Virginia. Accuracy, however, has been the goal. This means there must be included details which may be tedious to many people.

First, the name Hubbard has many strange spellings in the records in America and in England. The same is true of Hobart, and the name Hobart has positively been changed in Va. to Hubbard in the court records of Pittsylvania Co. by the scribe employed at the time. The One Thousand Years of Hubbard History proves the ancient ancestor of Hubbards and Hobarts was the same man. It will be seen that many Hubbards and Hobarts came to settle in the American Colonies. In the early 1600's many came to Virginia but they cannot be traced. Did they return to England; die in an epidemic; or go to Maryland where they were offered 100 acres instead of 50 acres to become a citizen of Maryland? No one knows today.

It is recorded that when the plans for the Colony in Virginia were developing, Sir Henry Hobart was one of the Council for the Company of Adventurers and Planters of Virginia in the Company of Virginia under their Second Charter (Vol II Statutes at Large William Waller Henning).

So far as the records reveal the first Hubbard recorded in Virginia was found in a patent dated Sept. 1, 1639 for Nicholas Comeings when Benj. Hubbard, Tho. Rogers and Robert Grinfield were listed as 3 persons for whom he paid transportation. What became of Benjamin Hubbard? The records do not reveal.

Ten years later in the records in 1649, July 12, is found a transfer of land "witnessed by Robert Huberd and Matt Huberd". (p. 186 Nugent) and again "Test: R. Huberd on 18 Oct. 1648 & 28 Nov. 1649. (p. 186 ibid). Who is R. Huberd? The following reveals he was Robert Hubbard. William Waller Henning assembled many facts into several Volumes entitled "Statutes at Large". Therein are bits of information on a Robert Huberd.

In the Patents for land there are other details; along with a few scattered court records there are a few facts that allow for estimations. Assembling all these, one finds Robert Huberd (Hubbard) was a man who was well enough educated and responsible enough, also appreciated sufficiently to be secured as Clerk of the Virginia Council. According to Patent Records he was also a man of sufficient wealth to pay the transportation of at least 72 persons who came to the Virginia Colony. This is verified in four of the patents he received for land. In searching court records and published information, interest was provoked when Westmoreland Co., Va. data included any facts on Hubbards. Special interest arose when enough facts proved Robert Hubard Clk of the Council had three sons, Mathew, John and Robert Hubbard. No conclusions were jumped upon, but efforts to follow their lives, their activities and to determine who were their posterity became the goal. This was not done by the compiler alone.

Mrs. John F. Lynch, now deceased, was as interested and through the years, she and many others shared their labors on this project. Finally she placed all her known facts into the hands of Mr. Herbert A. Elliott, now deceased, and his wife, Katherine B. Elliott, of South Boston, Va. They traced her lineage to John Hubbard (____, d. 1745), son of John Hubbard, son of Mathew, son of Robert Hubbard of Westmoreland Co., Va. The results of this research have been published and every one can find historical facts there. (See Vol. XIII Historical Southern Families, Pub. 1969 by Mrs. Miller Boddie). Since then this Hubbard family has been published by Mrs. Lynch in The Hubbard Family News Letter in 1973, starting in issue # 3. Before its first publication Mrs. Lynch sent the compiler a copy requesting comments and corrections. were no errors observed.

This present study will deal with the descendants of Robert Hubbard of Westmoreland, according to details found in the court records. Mr. Elliott claimed the King William, Co. Hubbards were descendants of John Hubbard, the heir of the Skimico lands in New Kent Co., Va. There was no other Hubbard living in that area. This John Hubbard had sons: John, Samuel, Charles and Benjamin, was his declaration. He declared only Benjamin could be the father of Benjamin Edward, Joseph and Sarah Hubbard, who married Abraham Echolls. In that case the lineage has to be Robert1, Mathew2, John3, Benjamin4 Hubbard for every line this record covers, viz: Benjamin⁵; Edward⁵; Joseph⁵ for surname Hubbard and Sarah Hubbard Echolls, who is also briefly studied. No one in Westmoreland Co., Va. covers the above stated traditions except Robert Huberd and sons. No other Hubbard records in Virginia suggest any details that can be connected with the above three brothers and their sister, Sarah (Hubbard) Echolls. They have all been studied so far as records were found and no evidence was found. The records for James City, New Kent, King and Queen, King William and Caroline Counties have been so badly mutilated or destroyed that all facts are lost. What is known will be documented as well as it can be.

Mr. Elliott's data on Mathew, John and Robert is sufficient to eliminate John and Robert as the ancestor of the Hubbards in this study. Mathew Huberd did have a will. This study will tell first the facts for his father Robert. Then his son, Mathew Hubbard, will be covered so far as known. Mathew's will proves he had a son, John Hubbard, who inherited land from his father, Mathew Hubbard's estate, that enables one today to know he was the heir of Mathew Hubbard of York Co., Va. and later resided in the area of New Kent Co., Va. in SKIMICO which those inherited lands in 1667 were designated to rest on Skimico and the above Mr. Charles Edmond's land. On this possibility rests the following study.

In the early days of the Virginia Colony on an unknown date Robert Huberd arrived in Virginia. There seem to be no records extant today of his arrival. It is assumed his family accompanied him and their children were perhaps near adulthood. They arrived sometime in the 1640's and not later than 1648 according to facts recorded. The earliest dates his name was found among patent records was several times in Pat. Bk. No. 2, pp. 165, 190, 192 & 207, but in each of those cases he was a witness. On page 180 Cavaliers and Pioneers he signed "R. Huberd Teste; 18 Oct, 1650", and the same on Nov. 14, 1649 (p. 186 ibid). In another record Robert Huberd and Matt Huberd were recorded as witnesses to a patent on July 12, 1649. On the same date they signed another patent as Robert Huberd and Mathew Huberd, p. 360 Pat. Bk. No. 2, see 224 ibid. He witnessed also one patent as "Robert Huberd Clk Councill on 8 Dec. 1652". Pat. Bk. 226 (see p. 194 ibid).

Robert Huberd acquired over 6,400 acres of land that are mentioned in the Patent Books and he assigned land to others. It is not possible to determine now much land he may have owned. some so many early records were lost. Likewise if he had a will it was among lost records.

The early patents that have been found were recorded by Nell Marion Nugent in the abstracts in Cavaliers and Pioneers. This valuable work proves many of the early patents were lost, since those abstracts which are recorded, have references to many patents not included.

An example that some of those patents were lost is verified since no patent was found for Robert Hubard for his land on Elizabeth River and Clerkes Creek, York Co., Va. which he assigned to Richard Starnell on Jan. 11, 1652, Pat. 8k. No. 3, p. 149. (See Cavaliers and Pioneers, Nugent, p. __). This was for 350 acres surveyed for Mr. Ro. Hubberd (Hubbard). The date of that survey would be interesting for this study and most significant if members of his family were named among his headrights. He assigned on that same date another 100 acres on Clerkes Creek to the same man. This land in York Co., Va. may have been his first place of residence. It can easily be accepted that these two tracts of land were surveyed prior to Jan. 11, 1652. On Feb. 6, 1653 Mr. Robert Hubberd and Major Wm. Lewis were given a patent for 2,000 acres in Westmoreland Co., Va. on Pattemmacke (Potomac) River for transportation of 40 persons. Pat. 8k. No 4, p. 68 (99). (See Cavaliers & Pioneers, Nugent, p. 340).

On June 10, 1654 one survey was made for 500 acres in Westmoreland Co., Va. at the head of Chappawney Creek for Mr. Robert Hubard for transportation of 10 persons. Pat. Bk. No. 4, p. 71 (103). On the same date another 500 acres were surveyed for him on S. side of the Peetomake (Potomac) River by the name of Sandy Point for transportation of 10 persons. Pat. Bk. No. 4, p. 70 (103). (See Cavaliers & Pioneers by Nugent, p. 340; Pat. Bk. No. 4, p. 68 (99).

On Dec. 12, 1654 on S. side of Petomacke River in Westmoreland Co., Va. a patent for 1,600 acres was made for Robert Hubbard for transportation of 32 persons. Pat. Bk. No. 3, p. 313. (See Cavaliers & Pioneers by Nugent, p. 300). This patent was assigned by Robert Hubbard on July 20, 1662 to Col. Valentine Peyton. Pat. Bk. No. 4, p. 310 (426). (See Cavaliers & Pioneers, Nugent, p. 400).

This patent proves Mr. Robert Hubberd was living on the 20th of July, 1662. On Feb. 9, 1663 John Lord and William Horton patented 2,500 acres in Westmoreland Co., Va. adjoining the southmost corner of land formerly owned by Major William Lewis and Mr. Robt. Hubberd, deceased. Pat. 8k. No. 5, p. 277, Virginia State Library. Therefore, Robert Hubbard died before Feb. 9, 1663.

Around ten years later, on May 13, 1673, there was recorded evidence that Robert Huberd acquired a patent for land in James City Co., Va. since his boundary line was mentioned when John Duke received a patent for land on the east side of Chickahominy River in that county. Pat. 8k. 6, p. 452. (See Colonial Abstracts James City Co. Duvall). This is the same land, 1,500 acres of which was deeded to Mathew Hubbard on April 28, 1691. It was on the north side of Chickahominy River in James City Co., Va. It was declared to be, formerly, a part of 2,400 acres in a patent granted to Mr. Robert Huberd on June 2, 1657. This deed explains also that Mathew Hubbard is the heir of Robert Hubbard, deceased, who was the son and heir of Robert Huberd who received this patent in 1657. (See pp. 72 & 73 Virginia Colonial Abstracts, James City Co., Va. (1634–1904) by Rev. Lindsey O. Duvall (1957). This may have been the place of residence of Robert Hubbard when he died. In that case his Will, if he made a Will was among James City County's lost records.

The following facts have been found regarding Robert Hubbard in the Colony of Virginia. In the Journals of the House of Burgesses of Virginia (1619–1658/9) his name is found on p. 78, March 1651 as Ro. Huberd Clerk of the Council. On p. 86, July 5, 1653 it is "Robert Huberd Cl: Consilii". On July 12, 1653 he was present at the Assembly. (p. 127 ibid).

A few years later, in 1656, he was given license "to take the originall

booke of records home to his owne house to copie the review of the laws that had been made by this General Assembly" and the same was to be presented to Wood and Capt. Francis Willis to compare the Lt. Cole Walker, Coll. same with the original by March Court and upon their signing it, publication was to follow. It was also ordered that Robt. Hubbard for the care in attendance on the Committee for reviewing of the Acts to have 2,500 pounds of tobacco out of the levies of James City or York County if he accomplished this by the first of next March (p. 100 ibid). In Virginia Colonial Abstracts Series 2, Vol. 3, York Co., Va. (1657-1659) by L.O. Duvall 5, p. 19, there is found a statement that Mr. Robt. Huberd received from the parish levy (see p. 16 A) whatever is due concerning tobacco when the 1657 Feb. Court for York Co., Va. met, on Feb. 24, 1657. This proves his work was accepted. Also there is evidence that in Dec. 1656 Robert Hubbard had also as one of his duties, the endeavor to have the Commissioners of the militia in every County provide 4 barrels of powder with shot sufficient for each regiment. (Statutes at Large by W.W. Henning, Vol. 1, p. 425). In Northumberland Co., Va. Vol. 2 (1652-1655) he signed as Ro. Huberd Cl. Cor. on Nov. 22, 1653, p. 39. On May 20, 1654 he signed a recorded order "Teste, Ro Huberd Cl. Couc.". (p. 123 ibid).

ROBERT HUBBARD

(b. ca. 1600 d. ca. 1663)

All that can be recorded for Robert Huberd is that he was born in England on an unknown date but by estimate around 1600. He received an education that enabled him to serve as clerk of the Virginia Council for many years. He married in England by estimate around 1625. The name of his wife is unknown. He came to Virginia by estimate in the 1640's. It is assumed that his family accompanied him. He died before Feb. 9, 1663. They were the parents of 3 known children, viz:

- i. Mathew Hubbard, see later.
- ii. John Hubbard, see the data Mrs. Lynch published.
- iii. Robert Hubbard, served as a Burgess in Warwick Co., Va. See Mrs. Lynch's published data.

MATHEW HUBBARD

Mathew Hubbard, the son of Robert Huberd, the Clerk of the Council in Virginia, was born in England, by estimate around 1627, since he witnessed in Virginia a deed on July 12, 1649 and was at least 21 years of age (Pat. 8k. 2, p. 360). He died in York Co., Va. in 1667 since his will was probated on April 9, 1667.

One evidence, dated Jan. 25, 1660, proves that Mathew Hubbard served as a Justice of the York County Court. (York Co. Deeds Orders Wills Etc. (1657-1662) p. 263). On p. 431 (ibid) is found the statement that a "Certificate is granted to Mr. Mathew Huberd for 650 acres of Land for the Importation of 13 persons". He also owned land that was divided between him and his brother, John Hubbard. They resided in York Co., Va. near Middle Plantation. (p. 254, ibid). Mathew Hubbard married Mrs. Sibella Ham, the widow of Jerome Ham. She was also the mother of their two children, viz: Elizabeth Ham and Jerome Ham. She was Sibella Caynehoe, the daughter of Rev. William and Dorothy Caynehoe of York Co., Va. This is verified by records of Court at James City. (See York Co., Va. Records, Vol. 24 & 25 by Fleet). Jerome Ham died around 1660 or earlier. The Jan. 24, 1661 records show that due to bad weather the orders

for May 23rd and June 24th Courts were not performed in the division of Mr. Jerome Ham's Estate and that Mr. Mathew Hubbard, who intermarried with the deceased's relict, requested those orders to be fully accomplished with as much convenient speed as possible. (p. 372 ibid). This indicates their marriage was sometime after June 24, 1660 and before Jan. 24, 1661.

The few available records prove that Mathew Hubbard was depended upon to serve the people of York County. Even his brother, Jehn Hubbard, requested his care in Court if the need came. (p. 379 York Co. Book 4, (1665-1672). In the York County Deed Book 4 (1665-1672) there are recorded Orders, Wills, etc. On page 136 there is recorded the Will of Mathew Hubbard as follows, quoting: "In the name of God, Amen, the last Will and testament of Mr. Mathew Huberd.

Impress. I bequeath my Soule to God who gave it & my body to the earth from whence it came. Item. I give my sonne John Huberd my devid^t of Land at Skimico, only the two hundred acres excepted that is sold to Abraham Venckled and John Scott, and my devid^t that is above Charles Edmonds also to Jno. Item. I give my daughter Rebecca Huberd & my sonne Mathew Huberd my half of my land that is between my Brother and mee & my devidt that is upon black Creek in the narrows of York River to be equally devided between them. Item My desire is that Mr. Ballard and Mr. Bray be the overseers of this my will.

Signed, Sealed and delivered in the presence of us Pat Napied
James Besouth

Mathew Huberd /5/

Probat^d in Cur Court Ebonas vicisi**ni**o quarto die mensis Aprilis Ann^o 1667 po Sacremento James Besouth et Pat Napied & Record^r P John Baskerryle C1 Cur ebor"

On the evidence of this Will the children of Mathew and Sibella (Caynahoe) (Ham) Huberd in the order named in their father's Will were:

- i. John Huberd, see later.
- ii. Rebecca Huberd) See Vol. XIII Historical Southern
- iii. Mathew Huberd) Femilies published by Mrs. Boddie.

Sibella Hubbard married the third time William Aylett.

JOHN HUBERD (b. ca. 1661 d. ca. 1726)

John Huberd, the son of Mathew Hubbard of York Co., Va. was born around 1661 according to assumed year of his parents marriage. In the following details it is assumed also that John died prior to 1726. The 1704 Quit Rent Roll proves he was a citizen of New Kent County, Va. and that he owned 827 acres of land. His inheritance of land at Skimico and more land above Charles Edmonds! land has enabled the researchers to locate the situation of John Hubbard's real estate that was in New Kent Co. in 1704. New Kent Co. in 1654 was formed from "York County (Pt James City)". In 1691 King and Queen was taken from New Kent and King William was taken from King and Queen in 1701/2. Originally Caroline Co. was a part of Essex, King and Queen and King William Counties. Therefore the destroyed records of those counties close all access to information that verifies many facts desired. When King and Queen was cut off this still left the lands of John Hubbard in New Kent according to the Quit Rent Roll. This Roll proves he was the only Hubbard owning land in New Kent in those days. The Quit Rent Roll in no other county had a John Hubbard listed. Today those interested normally ask "Where were those lands?".

No records to prove where they were. No facts for Charles Edmonds' either. The Patent Books prove that when Mathew Huberd made his Will, Charles Edmonds' land, which was near Mathew Hubbard's land, was in the New Kent County, which had been formed in 1654. Edmonds had owned land in York Co., but had sold it in 1662. (Pat. Bk. 4, p. 83). It can be assumed they knew each other since Charles Edmonds patented in New Kent Co. 730 acres on June 29, 1654 (Pat. Bk. 4, p. 101), and 2,750 acres on March 18, 1662 (Pat. Bk. 5, p. 235) that was adjacent to his first patent in New Kent County. Mathew's Will stated the land devised to his son John Huberd was above Charles Edmonds' land. Therefore these details verify that John Hubbard's land in New Kent was in King William Co. at a later date.

With not even court records it is hard to compile facts for his activities and his family. The following is based on bits of information found.

There were no facts found for his marriage by the compiler. Various opinions have been expressed. He did marry since in the St. Peter's Parish Register are found the name of John Jr. and his sister Elizabeth who were the children of John Hubbard. In the same Parish record are found the records of Samuel Hubbard's family. Other records prove Charles Hubbard a member of his family. See Mrs. John F. Lynch's study for details.

The fourth son thus far observed is Benjamin Hubbard. The details follow. The children of John Hubbard and his wife, whose name the compiler cannot state, but some say was Elizabeth, were:

- i. John Hubberd Jr., 21 or more years old in 1719, therefore b. in the 1690's.
- ii. Samuel Hubbard, see known facts in St. Peter's Parish Reg.
- iii. Charles Hubbard, witnessed his brother John's Will and had a patent in Brunswick Co., Va. in 1745 near his nephew Peter Hubbard.
- iv. Benjamin Hubbard, b. ?, d. ? See below.
- v. Elizabeth.

BENJAMIN HUBBARD (b. 1680s)

One compiler stated that John Hubbard was the father of Benjamin Hubbard. This called for real study. John Hubbard Sr., who was living in 1719 when his son John Hubbard Jr. received land on the north side of South River in King William Co. adjacent to Daniel Coleman, which land came to be in Caroline Co., Va. in 1727, was deceased before 1726 when this same son received 234 acres in South side of White's Swamp. His father's death is assumed since he was no longer called John Hubbard Jr. John Hubbard Jr. in 1719 was at least 21 years old and born ca. 1698 or prior to that date and was perhaps his youngest son. If John Hubbard Sr. died ca. 1726, it was his son, John Hubbard Jr. who in 1739 with John Cheadle and others, purchased lands from William Terrell for the Quaker Settlement which remained in Va. 114 years before they moved to N.C. in 1853. From the details already published, John Hubbard Jr. evidently married the first time before he received his first patent in 1719, since his sons, viz: Richard patented land in 1735, George in 1743 and Peter in 1745. All were born early and had to be at least 21 years old before a patent was granted:

Benjamin Hubbard, said to be the son of John Hubbard Sr., was born much earlier and married earlier than his brother, John Hubbard Jr. He resided, it is assumed, on the lands that his father John Hubbard Sr. inherited in New Kent Co., Va. which were situated in the portion that came to be, in later days, King William Co., Va. One evidence is found in the Bible record of the Camm family of King & Queen County, Va. that proves that Benjamin Hubbard with Francis Hill Gossips witnessed as sponsors on May ___, 1732 the baptism of son of John Camm who married Mary Bullock on May 22, 1722. See W. & M. Vol. 14, p. 131.

To sponsor a child's baptism, the State Established Church required the person to be a relative, or at least a very close intimate friend who was their neighbor. Therefore, this Benjamin Hubbard was a citizen of that section of Virginia. Out of this habitual practice in the State Established Church of Virginia, sponsore became known as that child's god-father or god-mother whose baptism they witnessed as a sponsor. This service included also the ideal that the sponsor was a Christian of like faith. Furthermore, to the person baptized, the sponsor was guaranteeing his or her concern for the future religious developement of the one baptized as well as assuring to that one a spirituel relationship. The church required that two men must always sponsor a boy's baptism. Today it is not known if the sponsors of John Camm in 1732 were relatives or just Christian friendly neighbors. This record classifies Benjamin Hubbard a member of the Episcopal Church in Va. It assures also that he was a mature, responsible man. One can assume that his own children were the same generation as John Camm, the father of the child baptized. So far the records of Parish of St. Johns and Parish of St. David, if extant, have not been found by the compiler.

Another evidence that Benjamin Hubbard Sr. was a citizen of King William Co., Va. is recorded on p. 391 in Executive Journals of Council of Colonial Virginia, edited by H. R. McIlwaine (1925). At a Council held April 7, 1737 it was "ordered a Commission of Peace to be issued for the County of King William" that included nine more men whose names were chosen to be added as Justices. Benjamin Hubbard was one of those named.

The above facts indicate that Benjamin Hubbard was still residing in King William County in the 1730's and assuming the responsibilities of a normal Christian citizen and was partaking in the duties of county citizenship. These facts identify him positively with King William Co., Va. and prove he was not his son, Benjamin Hubbard, residing in Amelia Co., Va. in 1737 on land he had chosen in early 1730's, prior to its survey, which was patented to him in two patents 1734 & 1736. It also separates him from Benjamin Hubbard of Caroline Co., Va. who married in King William Co. on

1736 Elizabeth Todd. See Purse and Person ed. by Annie Lash Jester, p. 95. In fact, the family record of that family states Benjamin Hubbard of Caroline Co., Va. was born in England in 1812. Therefore he was a native of England. All other Benjamin Hubbards, living in Va. in the early 1700's can be verified as citizens of other counties of the Virginia colony. And since only John Hubbard owned land in that area in 1704, he has been declared the father of Benjamin Hubbard of King William Co., Va.

Due to the facts stated below, John's son, Benjamin Hubbard, has been declared the father of viz:

- i. Benjamin Hubbard, (ca. 1713-1771) See later. P.10, 15.0tc
- ii. Edward Hubbard, (ca. 1715-1780) See later.
 iii. Joseph Hubbard, (ca. 1717-1799) See later. Own Ancestor P.42
- iv. Sarah Hubbard, no dates. See later.

There are court records in other counties that prove the above men are all brothers and Sarah (Hubbard) Echolls is their sister. No court record regarding any other Hubbard family includes their names as children or relatives of Benjamin Hubbard. This statement cannot be documented by county records because they are lost. Since his daughter, Sarah Hubbard, married Abraham Echolls, it is well to observe that a John Echols on April 23, 1688 had a patent for 321 acres of land in New Kent County. Therefore, the Hubbard and Echolls children grew up on the lands that were originally in New Kent Co., Va., when it was cut off from York Co./(Pt James City) in 1654. York and James City were two of the nine original shires of Colonial Virginia. Under New Kent County, Book 3 Surveys, p. 436, there is a survey for a

Mr. John Eckholls and William Morris dated April 24, 1685 for 350 acres. (p. 146, Vol. 25). However, on page 635 John Eckholls on April 23, 1688 had a patent for 321 acres on the north side of Mattapony River. It was stated also that it was at the head of a branch by Capt. William Smyth's landing path. Therefore, the place to cross the Mattapony River was near Mr. Echolls by way of the path to that "Landing". On top of this information it is found that the son of John Hubbard, (Quit Rent Roll 1704 in New Kent Co.) viz: John Hubbard Jun., on Feb. 2, 1719 had a patent for 250 acres on the south side of Mattapony River. This is an evidence that they were all citizens who were residing in the same vicinity. It also verifies that the children of John Hubbard (1661-1726) and of John Eckholls (Echolls) who patented land in New Kent in 1685 were the same generation. This means John Echolls who married Mary Cave and John Hubbard, said to have married Elizabeth, but her name is unknown, reared their families in the same area of Colonial Virginia. See Echolls section for more details. In due time, Sarah Hubbard, the daughter of Benjamin, married Abraham Echols, son of John and Mary (Cave) Echolls.

Benjamin Hubbard seems to be the eldest son of John Hubbard (1704 Quit Rent Roll). If he was an heir-at-law he would reside on his father's lands and no land patents were made to this Benjamin Hubbard. His marriage came early, perhaps around 1710. This statement is based on the fact that two of his sons acquired a patent for land in 1734 and 1736.

Benjamin Hubbard, born in 1680's by estimate and married prior to or around 1710, may have had other children. Only the above four have been identified as brothers and sister in other county court records. The lost records of King William and King and Queen Counties seem to hold this information forever. On the basis of the facts known the following Hubbard family records are compiled.

BENJAMIN HUBBARD ca. 1713-1771

A FOREWORD

Writing a record of the Hubbard family in Americs is beyond the power of any living historian. Many from English Hubbard families came to the North American continent in the early days of the Colonies. It would be an interesting study in itself were it possible to know the background of each one and to learn his reason for a home in this new land. Today one has to rely upon written records concerning that era, which pertain to the economic, the social and religious status of their homeland, in order to understand the impact of each upon the lives of individuals in the 16th, 17th and 18th centuries.

When a student has done this there is still a need to understand the willingness of anyone to undertake the voyage to the eastern coast of America in those small sailing vessels. The crowded conditions, the simple food, the limited water supply, plus the long weeks and sometimes months, on those boats, would today intimidate countless numbers of their descendants.

The voyage accomplished, one may be able to visualize the beauty of the shoreline, its virgin forest and the delight each one experienced upon their approach to the landing. Yet it must be quite beyond anyone today, to know the awe that gripped one's soul to see that forest, dense with centuries of botanical growth, full of wild animals and only bewildered Indians to greet them. They were courageous men and women. These brave people gave us this

wonderful America. What a heritage.

Among those people were Hubbards. It is not possible to tell of all of them. There is a study called One Thousand Years of Hubbard History that should challenge every Hubbard descendant to be a better, nobler person. Out of the ages of the past, through the Dark Ages, the Reformation, the Christian era and into this enlightened scientific period the Hubbard family has come. Among them are found worthy men and women in every field of service.

This study will include only a few Hubbard families in Virginia. To get an idea of the early Hubbards in Virginia, turn to the list of those who acquired patents for land. One positive thing can be stated. The early Virginia Hubbards were land owners. To a large extent they have continued to be land owners and lovers of the soil. One underlying reason has been the individual liberty enjoyed by the farmers in America for the first three hundred years. During that period of time the farmer's lands, his houses, his home and his church nearby, when he was a christian, were each his own. He reared his family, governed his farm and his own affairs, "voted his ticket" and served God and his fellowman according to the dictates of his own conscience.

There have been claims that Hubbards did not arrive in Virginia very early. The petent books give the dates and show the acreage of lands owned by Hubbards. Hubbards are found in many of the Colonies. Prior to 1765 land patents to Hubbards in Virginia totaled more than 38 thousand acres. The court records prove they also bought many other hundreds of acres. After 1765 many more Hubbards continued to patent lands so long as there were unowned lands. Among those late Hubbards was the compiler's great great grandfather, John Hubbard (1738-1793), who held 750 acres he owned at the time of his death.

Due to lost and destroyed records, this study begins only with meager facts regarding earliest ancestors in Virginia. The information that follows is from a different section of the state in which the Hubbards decided to reside. One has to review also the changes time wrought in two of the original nine Shires of Colonial Virginia to understand the importance of the settlement that came to be Amelia Co., Va. First in the early days the great Charles City Shire was made up of Plantations. Even today there are no cities in that County The cities and towns are in the nearby counties that were cut off from it. There are Hubbard families found in that section of Virginia but each detail found proves the following three brothers and their sister, were from a family in that section of Virginia that came to be New Kent Co., the mother of King and Queen, also King William counties.

The Great Charles City Shire was the mother of Prince George Co., Va. The records today show no Hubbard inhabitants are in their early records. Therefore the following facts explain the deluge of new settlers who had the many patents surveyed in Prince George Co. in 1734 and later, and who obtained the formation of Amelia Co., Va. in 1735, were natives of other counties.

Information regarding the fertile lands on Deep Creek and West Creek (later in Amelia Co.) had spread to the more industrious and substantial element of the Virginia planters. They flocked into that area in great numbers. The final result was, they developed the resources of that area to the fullest extent. (Va. Mag. of History and Biog. Vol. XIII, No. 1. Jan. 1914, pp. 94-96).

Among those planters was Benjamin Hubbard of King William County. A study of his first and final patents proves he was evidently there and satisfied before the survey could be made for his first or in 1734. No other man's boundary lines touch his first patent so he was said to be in Prince George Co.

This explains that statement in his patent. One can assume that his experience and his satisfaction evidently influenced the Hubbard brothers and their Echols friends to secure lands in Amelia on the same dates. See later. Benjamin Hubbard (1713-1771) was truly a pioneer settler of Amelia Co.

Prince George Co. and Brunswick Co. shared their territory to form Amelia Co., Va. Prince George Co. was named for Prince George of England. When Amelia Co. was formed in 1735 they named it Amelia for the youngest daughter of Prince George of England. (Va. Hist. Records Survey Project Feb. 1940).

Before each County was formed there were enough inhabitants who needed the services that County officials give to their county citizens. This is mentioned at this point because this was true in the case of Amelia County, formed in 1735. This is seen in the following two patents because details had to be observed to hold ownership. The first one states that Benjamin Hubbard is in Prince George Co., Va. in 1734 and in Amelia Co., Va. in 1736. Yet the second patent includes the land he was living on in 1734 and shows Benjamin Hubbard, as was true of many other citizens, was just a settler in Prince George Co. and not a native of that county. Since the early records of Prince George Co. in the years prior to 1734 are minus any Hubbard family records, there is nothing to sustain that the Hubbard brothers were natives of Prince George Co., Va. before the formation of Amelia Co., Va. in 1735. On the other hand, King William Co. was their native home.

BENJAMIN HUBBARD (1713-1771)

Benjamin Hubbard was among the many men from the older counties who came into that part of Prince George Co., Va. around the years prior to 1734 before Amelia Co., Va. became a county. He evidently was among the tobacco growers all over the state whose attention had been called to the value of those lands for the cultivation of tobacco.

Benjamin Hubbard was the pioneer in his family in going to Amelia Co. according to land records. Patent Book # 15 1732-1735, p. 247 records the following patent.

"George the second &c To all &c Know ye that for divers good Causes and Considerations but most especially for and in Consideration of the sum of forty shillings of good and lawful money for our use paid to our Receiver General of our Revenues in this our Colony and Dominion of Virginia We have Given Granted & Confirmed and by these Presents bound our Heirs and Successors Do Give Grant and Confirm unto Benjamin Hubbard of Prince George County One Certain tract or Parcel of Land Containing Four Hundred acres lying and being on the upor side of Flatt Creek and on both sides of the Haw Branch in the County aforesaid and bounded as followeth (to wit) Beginning at a Corner on the upper side of the Haw Branch thence West twenty Degrees North three hundred and twenty poles to a corner thence North twenty degrees East two hundred Poles Crossin Haw Branch to a corner thence East twenty Degrees South three hundred and twenty Poles Crossing Haw Branch several times to a Corner Thence South twenty Degrees West two hundred poles Crossing Haw Branch to the Beginning With All To have & hold &c yielding and Paying &c Provided &c In witness &c Witness our trusty and well beloved William Gooch Esq^r and Lieut Governor and Commander-in-Chief of our said Colony and Dominion at Williamsburg under the Seal of our said Colony this First Day of August one thousand seven hundred and thirty four In the Eight year of our Reign

It is fitting to observe this was the first patent in that area to be surveyed since no other citizen's lands touch his patent. He had chosen location and it was surveyed for him on Aug. 1, 1734. This does not reveal the early date he occupied thie land. His second patent is recorded in Patent Book # 17 1735-1738, pp. 208, 209 as follows:

"George the Second by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, France, Ireland, King Defender of the Faith &c To all to whom these presents shall come Greetings. Know ye that for divers good Causes and Considerations but more especially for & in Consideration of the Sum of Fifty Shillings of good and lawful money for our Use paid to our Receiver General of our Revenues in this our Colony and Dominion of Virginia We have Given Granted and Confirmed and by these Presents for us our Heirs and Successors do Give Grant and Confirm unto Benjamin Hubbard of the County of Amelia one certain tract or Parcel of Land containing eight hundred and ninety acres lying and being in the County aforesaid on the upper Side of Flatt Creek and bounded as followeth (to wit) Beginning at Richard Kennon's upper Corner upon Flatt Creek Thence by his and Daniel Hamlin's Lines North eleven Degrees West three hundred and twelve Poles to the Haw Branch Thence up the same as it meanders to the lower end Line of his the said Hubbard's old land Thence along his old Lines North twenty Degrees East twenty six Poles to his old lower Corner Thence West twenty Degrees North three hundred & twenty Poles to one other Corner of his old land Thence South twenty Degrees West two hundred Poles to one other of his old Corner. Thence East twenty Degrees South three hundred and twenty Poles to one other of his old Corners Thence South thirty five Degrees West one hundred and eighteen Poles to John Fergusons Line Thence along the same South East two hundred and ninety four Poles to his lower Corner Line Oak and Hiccory upon Flatt Creek and thence down the said Creek as it meanders to the beginning: Four hundred Acres Part of the said Tract being formerly granted to the said Benjamin Hubbard by our Letter Patent bearing Date the First day of August one thousand and seven hundred and thirty four and the residue thereof never before granted Will All Woods Underwoods, Swamps, Marshes, Lowgrounds, Meadows, Feedings and his due Share of all mines and Quarries as well discovered as not discovered within the bounds aforesaid and being Part of the Quantity of eight hundred and ninety acres of Land and Rivers, Waters and water Courses therein contained together with the Privileges of Hunting Hawking Fishing Fowling and all other Profits Commodities and Hereditaments whatsoever to the Same or any Part thereof belonging or in any wise appertaining To Have Hold Possess and Enjoy the said Tract or Parcel of Land and all other the before granted Premises and every part thereof with their land and every of their appurtenances unto the said Benjamin Hubbard and to his Heirs and Assignes forever. To the only Use and Behoof of him the said Benjamin Hubbard his Heirs and Assigns forever. To be Held of us our Heirs and Successor as of our Mannor of East Greenwich in the County of Kent in free and Common Soccage and not in Capile or by Knights Service Yielding and Paying unto us our Heirs and Successors for every fifty acres of Land and so proportionably for a lesseror greater Quantity than fifty acres the Fee Rent of one shilling yearly to be paid upon the Feast of St. Michael the Arch Angel and also Cultivating and Improving three acres Part of every fifty of the Tract above mentioned within three years after the Date of these Presents Excepting for so much of the said Land as hath been already cultivated and improved according to the Condition of the said former Patent Provided always that if three years of the said Fee Rent shall at any Time be in Arrears and unpaid or if the said Benjamin Hubbard his Heirs or Assigns donot within the Space of three years next coming after the Date of these Presents Cultivate

and Improve three acres Part of every fifty of the Tract above mentioned except as before excepted. Then the Estate hereby granted shall Cease, and be utterly Determined and there after it shall and may be lawfully to us and for us our Heirs and Successors to grant the same lands and Premises with the Appurtenances unto such other Person or Persons as we our Heirs and Successors shall think fit In Witness whereof we have caused these our Letters Patent to be made Witness our Trusty and Well beloved William Gooch Esqr our Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief of our said Colony & Dominion at Williamsburg Under the Seal of our said Colony the thirteenth Oay of October one thousand seven hundred and thirty six. In the Tenth Year of our Reign.

William Gooch."

The above recorded patents are the earliest records found concerning Benjamin Hubbard. There was granted a patent in 1736 to Edward Hubbard who was stated to be the brother of Benjamin when Abraham Echols made his Will in 1749 in Eunenburg Co., Va. He declared also they were the brothers of Sarah Echols, his wife. There is also a deed in Amelia Co., Va. made by Benjamin Hubbard to Joseph Hubbard, whom he calls brother. This study concerns Benjamin, Edward, Joseph and Sarah (Hubbard) Echols and what has been learned concerning their descendants. An effort was made to secure facts so far as descendants were found and they responded. The result was far from 100 per cent.

Benjamin Hubbard led his brothers to Amelia Co., Va. He was at least 21 years of age to be granted a patent in 1734, therefore, born around or prior to 1713. With this beginning his dates are assumed to be, b. ca. 1713, d. ca. 1771.

In studying the details recorded in the final patent to Benjamin Hubbard which included his first patent it is learned he was an aggressive, industrious man. He had already imporved acreage enough on the first four hundred to be excused from part of improving the total of around 18 acres in the next 3 years as required of everyone who received a patent, if they held the ownership. The details regarding other land he owned in Amelia were not learned.

It will be seen that these Hubbard Brothers and the Echols Brothers were men of like minds. They acquired lands in Amelia by patent. Later they are found in Lunenburg Co., Va. in that area that came to be Halifax and Pittsylvania counties of Virginia. Therefore, the land recordings assist in following both families and it is known their sister, Sarah Hubbard, married Abraham Echols, the brother of John, William, Joseph, and Richard Echols. The first land sold by Benjamin Hubbard was to his brother Joseph Hubbard. It is assumed there was no land left to be acquired by patent and he settled this younger brother near to himself and brother Edward by this gift of 140 acres. See Joseph Hubbard section and D.B. II 1734-1743 Amelia Co., Va., p. 271.

This deed proves that Benjamin Hubbard had married, because his wife Alee (?) relinquished her right of Dower. Her given name was misspelled by the clerk. This will be seen below. On May 17, 1743 Benjamin Hubberd sold Thomas Tabb 350 acres and Alees (?) relinquished her right of Dower. (See D.B. 1, p. 468, Amelia Co., Va.) D.B. 2, p. 213 states that on May 13, 1743 he sold Joseph Collins 3D acres South side Haw Branch. Other deeds show the purchase of land and sale of land through the years. In the meantime he acquired a patent for 80D acres of land in Lunenburg Co., Va., Land Book # 34 1750-1752, and according to the information that follows he moved his family to the new lands he had acquired, and after 1752 his land was in Halifax Co., Va.

In D.B. 6, p. 289, Amelia Co., Va., there is an Indenture dated in Nov. 1758 in which Benjamin Hubbard of Halifax Co., Va. sold Thomas Atkinson of Amelia Co., Va. for 250 Ls. 470 acres adjacent to Thomas Tabb and others.

At some time Benjamin Hubbard became affiliated with the Quaker denomination. This is not strange because the Echols family were members of this Faith. In the Hinshaw Records under South River Monthly Meeting is recorded the name of Benjamin Hubbard on June 17, 1758. He was received upon his request and his name was then found on their roll for the first time. He was listed to serve on a Committee. This means he was a member prior to that responsibility. On Feb. 17, 1759 he and William Echols represented Halifax at the South River Monthly Meeting. Alice Hubbard's name is also on the records when she served on a Committee on Dec. 11, 1759. This was Mrs. Benjamin Hubbard whose name in the court records in Amelia Co. was incorrectly spelled "Alee" and "Alees".

Alice Hubbard died soon after her service on this committee and Benjamin Hubbard married again prior to May 21, 1763. In the Hinshaw Records on that date he was reported for marrying out of unity in the Quaker Church and was ordered to be disewned. On Nov. 26, 1763 he made his peace with them and he was accepted again into full fellowship. The details were not recorded. Alice Hubbard was the mother of his older children and her dates may be estimated as b. ca. 1718 and d. ca. 1761. Her surname before marriage may never be known because of destruction of court records in several counties.

The above data establishes that late in 1762 or early in 1763 Benjamin Hubbard married Hannah Martin. Her surname has been verified by the Will of Isaac Martin. In Halifax Co., Va. Isaac Martin dated his Will May 4, 1769. This Will was probated Feb. 17, 1771. Among his legatees was his daughter Hannah Hubbard, the wife of Benjamin Hubbard. Benjamin Hubbard was living when this Will was written. (See W.B. 0, p. 58 (1753-1772) Halifax Co., Va.)

The General Index of Halifax Co., Va. shows that Benjamin Hubbard acquired after that county was formed in 1752 the following property. On Feb. 17, 1764, 285 acres that he bought from Benj. Dickson & wife, that was situated on Yellow Bank Branch. (See Book 5, p. 13). On Feb. 21, 1768, 892 acres on Banister River from Benj. Dickson. (See Book 2, p. 114) On Sept. 20, 1770, 200 acres on Banister River from Elizah Mery Bayley. This land was on North side of Bannister. Surveyed Sept. 14, 1770, according to Robert Wooding, Surveyor's Records, Halifax Co., Va., p. 90. It was recorded Sept. 20, 1770. (See Book 8 1770-1772, p. 90, Halifax Co.) On March 21, 1771 the same Surveyor recorded 22 acres on Yellow Bank Creek and on p. 159, Book 8 1770-1772 refers to this. Again it is seen that Benjamin Hubbard was an extensive land owner in Halifax Co., Va. when he died and the above data is interesting when his Will is read.

THE WILL OF BENJAMIN HUBBARD ca. 1713-1771

"In the name of God Amen.

I, Beniamen Hubbard of the County of Halifax being sick, weak tho of perfect mind and memory do make this my last Will and Testament in the manner and

mind and memory do make this my Last Will and Testament in the manner and form as following to-wit: I give and bequeath to my loving son Joel Hubbard and to his Heirs and Assigns forever all the four Hundred Acres of Land where on I now live except what lies above the Edge of the old mill pond and ______ Chopt line also my Copper Kittle.

I give my Loving Daughter Judith Hubbard and to her Heirs and Assigns forever

all that piece and parcel of Land that lies above the edge of the old mill pond and from thence following the Branch up to the line between me and Beniamin Dickson and thence along the line to the River and thence down to the mill. I also leave her one bed and furniture.

I give to my loving Daughter Sary the lower part of my back survey to her and her Heirs forever already divided by a line.

I give to my Daughter Drusylla Hubbard the upper half of the said Survey and also a bead and furniture to her and her Heirs forever.

And to my son Beniamin Hubbard I give part of the Land that I first bought of Biniaman Dickson to him and his Heirs forever beginning at the new rode where it Crosses the yellow bank Creek and from thence Down new Rode to my line and from thence along my line to Fountain's line and thence along my line until it strikes Fountain's line again and from thence along fountain's line to his corner and from thence along my line to a Corner hickbery and thence along my line to the great Rode and thence down the yellow bank Creek to the said Rode.

I give to my wife Hannah a privuledge without any interruption on the said place during the time of her widohood where she will and I also give her one bed and furniture and also to my son Beniam I give one Bed and furniture and to my love Daughter Hannah I give the Land that I last Purchast of Beniaman Dickson excepting what lies over the yellow Bank Creek to her and her and her heirs forever and to my daughter Rebecca I give the Remainder part of the Land that I last bought of Beniamen Dickson to her and her heirs forever and to my son Nathaniel I give the land lying on banister River that I bought of Eliza Mary Baly to him and his heirs forever.

I lend to my wife Hannah my negro Sam during the space of ten years except she marreys and at the end of ten years my will is that he shall be sold if he Chooses it - and if he chooses not to be sold I give him to my son Beniamen and I also lend to my wife hannah my horse prince and ten hed of Cattle which she may choose, and one sow and shotes during the time of her widohood and no more and all my household goods except my working tools and them I leave to the use of my family the Rest to be Equally divided amongst my six children and my Land Lying on Childry creek and my waggon I Leave to be sold and my money due me to be Collected and what I have by me all to be Divided Eaqually Divided amongst my seven youngest Children only my son Nathaniel to have twenty pounds more than the rest of them and my Copper Kittle which I have purchased I lend to my wife Hannah during the time of her widowhood and if any of my children should dy without heirs let their part be sold and Equally Divided amongst the rest it is also my desire I do Accordingly Constitute and appoint Moses Hendrick and Joel Hubbard to be the Executors of this my Last will and Testament Revokeing all others heretofore by me made in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and assigned my seal this 13 day of October 1770 Seal and Dilive in presence of

At a Court held for Halifax County the 21st day of March 1771 this Will was Exhibited into Court by the Executors herein named who made oath hereto According to Law and the same being proved by the Dathes of his winesses thereto was ordered to be recorded and on the motion of the said Executors Certificate was Granted them for obtaining a probate of said Will in due form they having first with Benjamin Dixon and William Echols Jun. their securities first entered into and acknowledged Bond According to Law.

In the absence of a Bible Record the above will proves the following children are his sons and daughters. The older ones are the children of Benjamin and (Alee), (Alees) or Alice Hubbard. The younger ones whose dates of birth are found to be after or around 1763 are the children of Benjamin and Hannah (Martin) Hubbard. They are recorded here in the order they were named in Benjamin Hubbard's Will.

- i. Joel Hubbard, see later.
- ii. Judith Hubbard
- iii. Sarah Hubbard, called Sary.
 - iv. Drusilla Hubbard
 - v. Benjamin Hubbard, see later.
- vi. Hannah Hubbard
- vii. Rebecca Hubbard

He gave each of his children land. Hannah Hubbard was made guardian of Benjamin, Hannah and Rebecca Hubbard, their three children. Four reports were found recorded in which their mother itemized what she needed from the estate for their care. They were well kept records. Pages 6, 237 and 279. At that time, in 1779, the oldest was perhaps around 17 years old. This information is an indication that the other five older children were the children of Benjamin and Alice Hubbard, and they were mature men and women, as will be seen in the data included for his son Joel Hubbard.

BENJAMIN HUBBARD II (cal763-cal824)

Benjamin Hubbard II was the son of Benjamin and Hannah (Martin) Hubbard. He was born in Halifax Co., Va. by estimate around the year 1763. He married in Wilkes Co., N.C. The marriage bond for Benjamin Hubbard and Rosanna Dyer on Jan. 26, 1784 was witnessed by Josiah Dyer and W.G. Wheatley. C. C. Wheatley was Bondsman. (Marriage Bond Abstracts Book II, p. 125, Wilkes Co. Court House, N.C.). Rosanna Dyer is the daughter of John Dyer who married Elizabeth Martin on May 4, 1769. Elizabeth Martin was the daughter of Isaac Martin. This means Rosanna Dyer and Benjamin Hubbard's mothers were sisters, Therefore they were first cousins. (See W.B. O, p. 58, Halifax Co., Va. (1752-1772)). Benjamin Hubbard paid taxes in Wilkes Co., N.C. 1785 to 1822. Their children: From family records.

- i. Nathaniel Hubbard, b. March 30, 1785.
- ii. Elizabeth Hubbard, b. Jan. 1, 1788.
- iii. Elisha Hubbard, b. Oct. 12, 1789.

Benjamin Hubbard I willed his son Benjamin Hubbard land in Halifax Co., Va. in 1770. In a deed dated Aug. 30, 1796 Benjamin Hubbard of Wilkes Co., N.C. sold for 50 Ls. this land to Jacob Abbott of Halifax Co., Va. (D.B. 16 1793-1796, Halifax Co., Va., p. 692) Reel 7, Va. State Archives. This land proves they were father and son since it is the Land bequeathed to him.

Benjamin Hubbard II made his Will as follows: "State of North Caroline, Wilkes County. In the name of God Amen. I, Benjamin Hubbard of the County

and State aforesaid, being very sick and weak in body, but of a perfect mind and memory, thanks be to God, calling into mind the mortality of my body knowing that it was appointed for all men once to die, and as touching such worldly estate as has been pleased God to bless me with, I give, devise and dispose of in the following manner and form.

First, I give unto my beloved wife, Rosanna, two feather beds and furniture, one horse creature, two pots and one oven and one skillet, one chest, a half dozen pewter plates, and two pewter basons and one cupboard during her life or widowhood and for her to have her widowhood on the place where I now live, and also one cow and one flat iron and one pewter dish and one woman's saddle.

Second, I give unto my son, Joel, all my lands stock and farming utensils, together with my property of all descriptions to be his at my decease - except what I've left to my wife, and at her death or intermarriage all to be his.

Item 2. I nominate and appoint my son, Joel Hubbard and Henry Gilreath my sole executors to this my last will and testament. I do hereby disallow, revoke and disannul all and every other will and testament In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 9th day of August A.D. 1823.

The Inventory of the Estate of Benjamin Hubbard Deceased was returned to Court Wilkes Co., N.C. Feb. term 1824, on the oath of Joel Hubbard, Executor. It was a long list of many possessions and included 570 acres of land in the state of North Carolina. Information regarding this family includes only three of the above children.

CHARLES CALVIN HUBBARD

Charlos Calvin Hubbard, born Jan. 14, 1868 at Moravian Falls, N.C., died July 20, 1943, was the son of William Henry and Jane Elizabeth (Saner) Hubbard. It has been learned when he was 16 years old he was interested in medicine. In that era medical students studied under their local doctors and often accompanied them on their visits to patients. Charles Calvin Hubbard began to read medical books under the direction of Dr. Lawrence Stokes (Larry). The doctor was in poor health, so this young boy did not recite to him more

than a dozen times. Therefore he mastered the work alone. He paid 25 dollars for this course. Some of his text-books were: Gray's Anatomy; The Human Body by Martin and Materia Medica by Biddle. Alone he endeavored to master this information. One of his unique efforts was on pleasant days to go up the hill near his home, enter the church, and there try to reproduce the material he had read. In this manner he took his examinations, and satisfied himself when he was prepared to enter the Medical College. Two weeks after the major Earthquake at Charleston, S.C., covering 2,000 square miles. which began on Aug. 31, 1886 (see list of Earthquakes, pp. 22, 23. 24. Earthquake History of the U.S., Part I by N.H. Heck, Revised by R.A. Eppley, 1958), he went to Philadelphia, Pa. and enrolled in the Jefferson Medical College. He graduated there in May, 1888. He returned home and began to practice medicine at Moravian Falls, N.C. He rode horseback and used the saddle bage for carrying his medicine and supplies. This was not an easy life. A doctor in those days responded to a call for his help at every hour in the twenty four, regardless of the warmth or coldness, in sunshine, rain, sleet or snow. He had dedicated his life to medical service and gave 55 years to this.

On June 21, 1893 Charles Calvin Hubbard married Frances Walker Porter, the daughter of David Worth Porter who married Frances Ann Walker. They were married at Ashboro, N.C. and resided at Worthville, N.C. until 1908. For sake of a better school they moved to Farmer, N.C. Frances Walker (Porter) Hubbard was born at Ashboro, N.C. on March 31, 1868 and died Nov. 16, 1943 at Farmer, N.C. and he passed away a few months earlier on July 20, 1943. Their children:

During the lifetime of Dr. Charles Calvin Hubbard, he gave to many people a small composition. He felt that its message gave comfort. He requested his daughter, Hope Hubbard, to continue to share with others "The Solitary Way". She published it as a memorial to her father. She shared a copy with the compiler, whose reaction was "A physician found this message healed his friends and patients, and if he longed for it to continually be told to all people, then let it be included in this record as his message to everyone and also as a memorial to Dr. Charles Calvin Hubbard".

This memorial follows.

A SOLITARY WAY

"There is a mystery in human hearts, And though we be enriched by a host Of those who love us well, and are beloved, To every one of us, from time to time, There comes a sense of utter loneliness.

Our dearest friend is "stranger" to our joy And cannot realize our bitterness; "There is not one who really understands, No one to enter into all I feel".

Such is the cry of each of us in turn, We wander in a "solitary way", No matter what or where our lot may be, Each heart, mysterious even to itself, Must live its inner life in solitude.

AND would you know the reason why this is? It is because the Lord desires our love. In every heart He wishes to be first.

He therefore keeps the secret key himself, To open all its chambers, and to bless With perfect sympathy and holy peace, Each solitary soul which comes to Him.

So when we feel this loneliness it is
The voice of Jesus saying "Come unto Me",
And every time we are "not understood",
It is a call to us to come again;
For CHRIST alone can satisfy the soul.
And those who walk with Him from day to day
Can never have a "solitary way".

And when beneath some heavy cross you feint, And say, "I cannot bear this load alone", You say the truth, Christ made it purposely So heavy that you must return to Him.

The bitter grief, which "no one understandeth" Conveys a secret message from the King, Entreating you to come to Him again.

The Man of Sorrows understands it well.

In all points tempted He can feel with you,
You cannot come too often, or too near,
The Son of God is infinite in grace.
His presence satisfies the longing soul,
And those who walk with Him from day to day
Can never have a "solitary way".

MISS HOPE HUBBARD (1894-1977)

The interest and assistance of Miss Hope Hubbard in securing accurate facts for the descendants of Benjamin Hubbard (1713-1771) was very valuable for those who were citizens of North Carolina. Her interest was shared by others to the extent that they had an annual Hubbard Family Reunion. Mrs. Lucy (Hubbard) Critcher, her cousin, had compiled data for the family and Hope requested that she send it to your compiler (see above). Hope Hubbard sent some data found in court records and Quaker records. She invited your compiler to the Hubbard Family Reunion, but distance prohibited such a trip. Hope Hubbard was an inspiration through many years. Then she had to live in a nursing home, and eventually was called to her Reward in Heaven.

Your compiler had desired many times to record the facts about Hope's life, but Hope was always interested in others and her letters always contained information about the relatives. Hope's home was in the vicinity of Asheboro, N.C., and your compiler had cousins from a different family line who resided at Asheboro, N.C. These cousins—Dorothy Lewellen who married Lawrence Sours—graciously secured the following information for Hope Hubbard and her sister Dorothy Hubbard Kearns, and Dorothy's husband, Colier Elbert Kearns.

HOPE HUBBARD (1894-1977)

Hope Hubbard, born May 12, 1894, lived until July 10, 1977, a life valuable to others for 83 years, one month and 29 days.

The following items concerning Hope Hubbard were taken from a "Memorial" written by Mrs. Edna Owens, President of the Farmer Homemakers Club, and adopted by the Science Hill Meeting on Sept. 22, 1977 and published by the Editor of the Courier-Tribune as "Hope Hubbard Memorial."

First of all the writer compared her life in that area of North Carolina in which Hope lived unto the life of Dorcas who in Acts of the Apostles 9:36 was declared a "woman of good works and alms deeds which she did."

After attending Guilford College, Hope Hubbard was a teacher at Farmer, N.C. and Piney Grove, also at Clark Community near Oxford, N.C. A co-worker declared Hope Hubbard's service as a teacher, quoting, "She counseled her students in a Christian attitude."

For 25 years she was Clerk of Southern Quarter, and for 23 years of that time she served also as Clerk of Science Hill Meeting of Friends. It was declared that no one could recall the history of the Science Hill Meeting and not remember Hope Hubbard.

Also she served as Leader for Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts. She was a charter member of Farmer Grange, Farmer, N.C., and her influence was a major factor in the organization of the Extension Homemakers Association in Randolph County, N.C. She was an honorary member there as long as she lived.

Hope Hubbard's activities in life were at all times an evidence that she loved people, the Lord, and the Meeting. She gave to each all she had to give, knowing that giving to one was giving to all three. She was called to her Reward July 10, 1977, and interment was in City Cemetery, Asheboro, N.C.

DOROTHY HUBBARD (1897-1977)

Dorothy Hubbard, born June 25, 1897, was the daughter of Dr. Charles Calvin Hubbard who married on June 21, 1893 Frances Walker Porter. She attended Guilford College and taught school at Snow Camp, N.C. She worked for the U.S. Government in Washington, D.C. and later was an employee of the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company, Greensboro, North Carolina.

Colier Elbert Kearns and Dorothy Hubbard were married April 6, 1921 in Farmer, N.C. He was born Nov. 4, 1896 in Farmer, N.C., the son of J. Harris and Myrtle (Fuller) Kearns. Elbert Kearns attended North Carolina State University. He was a veteran of WW I and a member of the Band. He worked for Odell Hardware Company on South Elm St, Greensboro, N.C. until that company closed. Then he was the founder and president of Kearns Paint Company, which he owned and operated until his retirement.

When Elbert Kearns went to Greensboro, N.C. in 1921 he built a home at 406 Hillside Drive, and it was the permanent residence of his family.

On April 26, 1921, after her marriage, Mrs. Dorothy (Hubbard) Kearns joined the Asheboro Street Friends (now First Friends). On August 13, 1924 Elbert Kearns moved his membership from the Methodist Church and joined with Dorothy. Years later, Dorothy was interested in missions and Sunday School, and in 1959 she joined the First Baptist Church. She remained a member there until her death.

Dorothy and Elbert Kearns had a wide range of interests, namely their church, current events, music, clubs, neighbors and garden. After retirement, Elbert's enjoyable hobby was gardening, and their neighbors, as recipients, enjoyed their love and generosity.

Elbert Kearns was a 32nd degree Mason, member of White Shrine, Order of the Eastern Star, and Exchange Club. He was a loyal member of First Friends Meeting. He served as Treasurer and attended faithfully the McLennan Bible Class. They both gave liberally of time and money.

Dorothy Kearns was a member of the Eastern Star, the Exchange Club, and the Greensboro Woman's Club where at one time she served as Chaplain.

On Friday, May 20, 1977 in a fatal car accident the lives of Colier Elbert Kearns and Dorothy (Hubbard) Kearns were taken. A dual funeral service was held in the First Baptist Church of Greensburo, N.C. The three ministers officiating were Rev. Claud Bower, Rev. Alton H. McEachern and Rev. William P. H. Stevens, Jr. Interment was in Forest Lawn Cemetery, Greensboro, N.C.

Nathaniel Hubbard, the son of Benjamin and Rosanna (Dyer) Hubbard, was born in Wilkes Co., N.C. on March 30, 1785. He was their oldest child. He married when he was around 20 years of age. According to the Wilkes Co., N.C. Marriage Register, a marriage bond was made for Nath(anie)1 Hubbard and Sinthy Williams on July 18, 1805. W(illia)m Brown was witness and Jno Jones D.C.C. Nathaniel Hubbard died prior to July 1816 when his will was exhibited in Wilkes Co., N.C. Court.

NATHANIEL HUBBARD'S WILL

In the name of God Amen.

I. Nathanial Hubbard, of the State of North Carolina and County of Wilkes, being low in body, but sound in mind, do make my last will and testament. I first give my soul up To God, and request my body to be decently buried. Second. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife, Sintha, a negro woman named Presila and a sorrel mare and horse during her widowhood and after that the said negro and Increase to be equally divided among my children and I give my wife, Sintha Hubbard all my cattle for her use during her widowhood. Item, I give and bequeath unto my wife Sintha all my hogs for her use. I also give my still and still tube to my wife, Sintha during her widowhood and after that to be sold and equally divided among my children and I give all my sheep unto my wife, Sintha, to her use during her widowhood. My wish is that my rifle gun shall be sold and the money divided between my son Benjamin Lewis Hubbard and James. I give and bequeath unto my wife, Sintha, all my land and with the saw mill and grist mill until my youngest son arrived at the age of twenty one years and then the above mentioned land and mills to be sold and equally divided between my sons. My will is that my wife shall have all my working tools to her use during her widowhood.

I give and bequeath unto my step-son, Alfred Davidson, my sadle.

I give and bequeath unto my wife, Sintha Hubbard, all the household and kitchen furniture during her widowhood, excepting four volumes of the History of Tom Jones to be sold and the money put on interest. I, also give unto my wife, Sintha Hubbard, five bushels of salt to her use and family and the balance of my salt I now have on hand to be sold and the money to be put out

My will is that all my just debts be paid and my will and desire is that all the outstanding debts due me or is owing to me shall be collected and the money put out on interest and my will and desire is that all the money that I now have on hand shall be put out on interest with the above mentioned monies until my children arrive at twenty-one years of age and I appoint my father, Benjamin Hubbard, and William W. Martin, exectrs, to execute this last will and testament and do hereby revoke all other wills heretofore made by me. Whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 24th day of May 1816.

Nathaniel Hubbard was only 31 years of age when he died. He had been married only 11 years and his two sons were small boys when he died. This will shows he was a very busy man and he was active in many fields. He owned land. He had a saw mill and a grist mill. He was making salt and the still and still tubes may have been equipment for his salt manufacture. After 150 years his descendants, if any are living, were not contacted.

End of Benjamin Hubbard I, (cal763-cal824) chapter.

JOEL HUBBARD

Joel Hubbard, the son of Benjamin Hubbard I and his first wife (Alee, Alees), Alice Hubbard, was born in Amelia Co., Va., and perhaps around 1740. There is evidence in his will, dated Sept. 7, 1780, that he was not an old man. His children were minors and his neighbor, Azariah Bailey, was made his only Executor. This gentleman, and it seems, with his father and brother, were witnesses to Joel Hubbard's father, Benjamin Hubbard's will, dated about 10 years earlier. At that time Joel Hubbard, who is regarded the oldest son of Benjamin Hubbard, was appointed executor of the estate. This means he was old enough to be, and it seems he was oldest of all their children.

JOEL HUBBARD'S WILL

Will Book I (1773-1782) Halifax Co., Va., p. 335. Dated Sept. 7, 1780. Prob. May 7, 1781.

In the Name of God Amen.

I, Joel Hubbard of Halifax County being in a Low State of Health but in my right mind and memory do this 7th day of September one thousand seven hundred and eighty Ordain this my last will and Testament Disannulling all former ones. I leave to my loving wife Sarah free Privilege on the place where I now live. During her widowhood and Likewise I lend her all my personal Estate During her widowhood to dispose of at her Will and if she should marry I leave all my Personal Estate then remaining to be sold and Divided among all my children so as the Girls to have twice as much as the Boys and my Land I leave to be equally divided and my son David to have the place where I now live Moses his next choice, James the next and Joel the remainder and if any of my boys should die without Heir their part of the Land to divide among the Rest of the Boys and if any of my Girls should die without an Heir the other to have her part And I desire my Estate not to be brought to an appraisement & I likewise ordain that Azariah Bailey to be my sole Executor of this my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal the day and date first above written.

The above Will proves that Joel Hubbard married Sarah _ ? . At present their

marriage bond, nor other data, has been found that reveals her maiden surname, but sources have not been exhausted. The will proves the following is true regarding the children of Joel and Sarah Hubbard. They had four sons and at least two daughters and perhaps only two daughters since he states "if any of my Girls should die ... the other to have her part". These children were minors. Their children, all of whom were born in Halifax Co., Va.:

- ii. Moses Hubbard
- iii. James Hubbard
 - iv. Joel Hubbard
 - v. ___ Hubbard, a dau. living 1780.
- vi. ____ Hubbard, a dau. living 1780.

Sarah Hubbard was head of the house on tax list 1780.

The Revolutionary War was in progress during the life of Joel Hubbard. There may be recorded evidence of his participation. No effort has been made to learn this, but the following was found for his wife Sarah Hubbard. In Court Booklet, Halifax Co., Va. Public Service Claims, p. 57, quoting: "At a Court of Publik Claims Continued & held for Halifax at the Courthouse thereof on the Eighteenth day of April one thousand seven hundred and eighty three for the purpose heretofore mentioned where upon the Court proceeded to adjust and allow the following claims to-wit: The Public is Made To James McCraw late Deputy Sheriff

The above classifies her as a loyal patriot during that era. Any one of her descendants may wear with pride her name on an ancestor bar, if a member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

All of Joel and Sarah Hubbard's heirs were grown young men and women before 1800 if they lived to be adults. A study of Halifax Co. records may reveal this. The will of their father provided land for each of his sons. David's land was designated and Moses was to choose second. In the court records was found an interesting proceedure of these two brothers regarding their inheritance. Evidently they exchanged land several times after their father's estate was settled. The two older sons seemed dissatisfied and sold to each other the same lands, handling the matter in an amiable manner. D.8. 23, p. 23, 24 shows that on April 7, 1801 David sells to Moses 230 acres on Banister River. "Duly recorded July 27, 1801." D.B. 23, p. 24 shows that on the same date Moses sells to David 231 acres on Yellow Branch Creek. "Duly recorded on July 27, 1801." D.8. 23, p. 307. On June 8, Moses sells David 231 acres. "Duly recorded 28 June 1802." And on p. 308 David sells Moses 231 acres that was duly recorded June 28, 1802. Once again in D.8. 27, p. 90, on March 13, 1811, David sells to Moses 200 acres more or

less which was duly recorded June 24, 1811. Same D.B., p. 89 a deed dated March 22, 1811 shows that Moses sells David 200 acres more or less which was June 24, 1811. These two sons were pesiding in Halifax Co. in 1811. No other facts learned for Joel and Sarah Hubbard's family.

DRUSILLA HUBBARD

Orusilla Hubbard, the daughter of Benjamin Hubbard/and his first wife, died unmarried prior to April 18, in 1776 when her brother Joel Hubbard and Moses Hendricks, the executors of her father, Benjamin Hubbard's Will, sold to Wm. Younger 200 acres on Banister River, Halifax Co., Ve., at auction in obedience to the will of her father. (D.B. 10, p. 67, Halifax Co., Va.).

Data regards that the other daughter was not found. Since all received land by their father's Will, deed regarding the land they received may reveal interesting facts if the Halifax County records were carefully studied.

EDWARD HUBBARD (1715-1788) (Son of Benjamin, p. 7)

Edward Hubbard, the brother of Benjamin Hubbard, was by estimate born around 1715, since his patent for land in Amelia was in 1736. He died in 1780, the year his will was presented in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Court. The following facts are presented as found in this study.

A patent, similar to the one included under Benjamin Hubbard's section, was issued to Edward Hubbard in Amelia Co., Va. He was a brother of Benjamin Hubbard and evidently too young to be granted a patent when his brother secured a patent in 1734, but on the same date, Oct. 13, 1736, that Benjamin's survey for 890 acres was made, a survey for 400 acres of land, adjacent to Benjamin Hubbard, according to Edward Hubbard's patent, was made for him. He paid 40 shillings and the land was situated on Lower side of Haw Branch on Flatt Creek in Amelia Co., Va. Reel 17 (Patents Book 17 (1735-1738), p. 207, Va. State Land Office.

Edward Hubbard remained in Amelia Co., Va. around 14 years, according to land transactions, it will be seen. According to one deed, a reference is made to a greater quantity of land granted to Edward Hubbard in 1748. This land in the year 1748 was in Lunenburg Co., Va. The details of this grant has not been covered by this study, but in 1748 Edward Hubbard secured land in Lunenburg Co., Va.

On Nov. 12, 1750 Edward Hubbard dated a deed and sold to Thomas Tabb for 180 Ls. the 400 acres on lower side of Haw Branch of Flatt Creek, according to the Patent granted to Edward Hubbard on Oct. 13, 1736. The details include, it began at Daniel Hamlin's lines touching Benj. Hubbard's line etc. This deed was signed Edward (his E mark) Hubbard. It was recorded Nov. 16, 1750. Elizabeth Hubbard, the wife of Edward Hubbard, relinquished her Right of Dower. Reel II shows this is recorded in D.B. No. 3 (1747-1750) Amelia Co., Va., p. 520. It is assumed that they resided there until this land was sold and then moved to their new lands in Lunenburg Co., Va. This land was in Halifax Co., Va. when that county was formed in 1752.

The records prove that the first Hubbard name recorded in Halifax Co., Va. records was Edward Hubbard on March 4, 1754 when he bought 200 acres of land from Robert Handcock that is located on Straightstone Creek for 20 L. (See D.B. I, p. 84). This land in 1767 was in Pittsylvania Co., Va. The witnesses to the above deed are William Echols, Isaac Echols, Welcome Hodges and Benjamin Hubbard.

Other land transfers in Halifax are as follows. D.8. I, p. 195, or 159,

Halifax Co., Va. On Feb. 19, 1756 Edward Hubbard sold James Dillard 30 acres on Straightstone Creek. D.B. 1, p. 176, Halifax Co., Va. On May 20, 1756 Edward Hubbard of Halifax Co., Va. sold to John Bollenger 167 acres on both sides of Childer's Creek, being part of a greater quantity granted to Edward Hubbard, bearing the date Aug. 20, 1748. There is also a record in Land Book No. 34 (1756-1792), p. 577 of a patent for 290 acres in Halifax Co., Va. in the name of Edward Hubbard. Book I, p. 191, Halifax Co., Va. shows a second deed dated May 20, 1756 for 176 acres on Childer's Creek. So it seems he sold 343 in Halifax Co., Va.

In Halifax Co., Va. Pleas No. 1 & No. 2, p. 367, the following item is found that reveals a bit of interest in the life of Edward Hubbard and family regarding their land on Straightstone Creek. Quoting "Thomas Dillard and James Doss pursuant to a former order of the Court reported that they had marked and vued a way from Banister Road to Nixes Town on Staunton River crossing Straightstone Creek at Edward Hubbard's foard" etc. This was at a court held in Halifax Co., Va. in 1754. This means his land was on one of the main roads in that section. This land was in Halifax Co., Va. until 1767 when it was cut off into the new county named Pittsylvania. They lived in Halifax Co. around 15 years and without moving anywhere he lived in Pittsylvania Co. the remainder of his life. In Virginia Historical Magazine Vol 23, p. 376, Edward Hubbard is listed as follows among the titheables in the first record made in 1767. He had 1 tithe and 550 acres of land. After his death in the Pittsylvania Co., Va. tax report in 1785, his wife Elizabeth Hubbard, as head of their household, stated there were 8 white people in her home. They owned their dwelling house and there were three other houses on their land.

The will of Edward Hubbard is recorded in D. & W. Book Vol. II, p. 116, Pittsylvania Co., Va.

EDWARD HUBBARD'S WILL

Dated April 29, 1779

Proved June 20, 1780

In the name of God Amen. The twenty ninth day of April one thousand seven hundred and seventy nine. I, Edward Hubbard of Pittsylvania County being sick in body but of good and sound memory I do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following revoking and annulling by these presents all other wills heretofore by me made and this is to be taken only for my last Will and Testament and none other. As for my worldly Estate which it hath pleased God to give me I do leave and bequeath in manner following: And first I do give and bequeath unto my sons Nathaniel and John my tract of land whereon I live to be equally devided between them John to have plantation to them and their heirs forever. I do give unto my Daughter Tabitha one feather bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever. I do give unto my son Edward one sorrel mair with a blaze in her face and if the mair should have Colt the said Colt my desire is should go to my son Joseph to him and his heirs forever. I do give my son Reuben one Dun Collored Horse Colt with a stair in her forehead but not to have him in possession till he comes of age unless my wife is willing And the remaining part of my Estate I leave to my wife during her life or widowhood and then to be equally divided among my children. My desire further is that my survey of land lying on the branches of Straitstone joining Joseph Collins and William Chuks land may be sold and I do appoint Joseph Collins my Executor of this last Will and Testament in Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the date and year above written.

Signed & acknowledged in the presence of Ben Shankford Wm Collins Benjamin West

At a Court held for Pittsylvania County the 20th day of June 1780 the last Will and Testament of Edward Hubbard deceased was proved by Oaths of the two witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded. A Certificate for obtaining letters of Administration of the Estate of the said Edward Hubbard, deceased with the will annexed is granted to Elizabeth Hubbard who made oath according to Law and with John, George, and William Collins her securities entered into Bond as the Law directs and acknowledged the same.

The will of Edward Hubbard names the following as the children of Edward and Elizabeth Hubbard:

No descendant of this family has ever been contacted. The following marriage licenses are included here because they cannot be connected with any other family of Hubbards in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and their given names are those of the children of Edward Hubbard.

The following marriage licenses are found in Campbell Co., Va. Marriage Register in Clerks Office, p. 200. Dec. 20, 1785 Marriage license issued to John Hubbard and Hannah Reid. In the same Register, p. 201. Sept. 5, 1796 marriage license issued to Nathaniel Hubbard and Sarah Hix the daughter of John Hix. In Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage Register, p. 9. On Sept. 12, 1787 a marriage license was issued to Reubin Hubbard and Sarah Morgan. John Templeton was bondsman. On p. 33, Jan. 25, 1800 Reubin Hubbard and Elizabeth Cockran were issued a marriage license. Regarded as his second marriage. On Dec. 19, 1808 Wm. Johnson and Rebecca Hubbard, daughter of Reubin Hubbard, were issued a marriage license. It is normal to regard she is the daughter of above Reubin and Sarah (Morgan) Hubbard.

The data herein included for Edward Hubbard and family is based on court records. There may be errors found in assuming the marriage records were for his sons.

In D.B. 12 (1799-1802) Pittsylvania Co., Va., p. 135 a deed dated June 1, 1799, Nathaniel Hubbard and Sarah his wife of Campbell Co., Va., sold to Cornelius McHaney 106 acres on both sides of Straightstone Creek for 100 Ls. Both signed the deed. Witnesses were; David T. Patrick, William Hix and John McHaney. Deed was recorded April 21, 1800.

In D.B. 13, (1802-1804) Pittsylvania Co., Va., p. 456, a deed dated March 7, 1803 from John Hubbard sells Daniel Slaydon 180 acres on Birches Creek for L. 85. Deed was presented in Court July 18, 1803 and recorded Oct. 17, 1803. It has been assumed that some of the Hubbard families in Campbell Co., Va. are Edward Hubbard's descendants. No research has been made.

SARAH HUBBARD (Daughter of Senjamin Hubbard p. 7)

There are no dates for Sarah Hubbard. The Will of Abraham Echols in Lunenhuro Co. in 1749 tells that Benjamin and Edward Hubbard are her brothers and they were the brothers of Joseph Hubbard. By estimate, they were born around the years 1713, 1715 and 1718 and early 1700's was her birthdate. Abraham Echols was the son of John Echols who married Mary Cave. His brothers were John, Abraham, William, Joseph and Richard Echols. The above 3 Hubbard brothers and Abraham, William, Richard and Joseph settled in Amelia Co., Va. around the years 1734 and 1736. Later these same young men went to Lunenburg Co., Va. and as the new counties were formed they came to live in Halifax and Pittsylvania counties, except Abraham Echols, who died in Lunenburg Co., Va. He stated positively that his wife was Sarah Hubbard, the sister of Benjamin and Edward. Others claim she was named Sarah Tamer. If they are correct, was she Sarah Hubbard Tamar, a widow, when she married Abraham Echols? This question may never be answered since county records have been destroyed in several counties and especially marriage records. From other deeds it is seen that the patent to land in Lunenburg Co., Va. made to Abraham Echols was dated in the year 1748. He may have been the first of these 7 young men to go to Lunenburg Co. See p. 30.

For the make of the Echols descendants of Sarah (Hubbard) Echols, the compiler includes the following facts about the early Echols who came to the Virginia Colony, and may belong to their Echols family.

Since the Echolls Family records are not known by the compiler, the following information is included here in case it could be valuable to the descendants of Sarah Hubbard. In studying the early court records, so many names are incorrectly spelled. Therefore the following are considered members of the Echols family of Europe, since the given names of some of these earliest settlers are the same as some of the given names of the children of John and Mary Cave Echols of King and Queen Co., Va. No time has been found for research, yet if they are kindred of that family prior to their advent in the Virginia colonies, it may prove interesting. Those who are listed es headrights may have returned to England. Some did aquire land. They are listed here according to the date their name was found in the patent records abstracted by Nell Marion Nugent in Cavaliers and Pioneers. First Joyce Escholl (Echoll) was named as a headright in a Patent dated Dec. 6, 1652, p. 135, Pat. Bk. #3 (See p. 267, Nugent). Then Anne Exall (Exell) was one of the headrights for a patent for 400 acres that was granted on Oct. 21, 1653, p. 7, Pat. Bk. 163 (See p. 230 Nugent). That same year Richard Eccles was a headright for a patent for 960 acres in Lancaster Co., Va. This patent was dated Dec. 26, 1653, p. 73, Pat. Bk. #3 (See p. 254 Nugent). The most interesting, however, pertains to Jno Exoll who owned land in New Kent Co., Va. prior to Oct. 14, 1658. On that date a patent granted another man for 500 acres of land was on the north side of Mattapony River which began at the land of John Exoll on the N. side of a branch of Peanpetank. Page 187 (276) Pat. Bk. #4 (See p. 370 Nugent). This proves a John Echolls was already residing in New Kent Co., Va. Many patents were lost since no record has been found. Yet evidence of a lost patent is found, when another man's recorded patent, has a boundary line touching the other man's patent. On p. 520 in Cavaliers and Pioneers, N. M. Nugent records, another patent was abstracted for Richard Harrison for 400 acres in New Kent Co. on the N. side of Mattapony River. This patent was parallel with John Exoll. The date was July 6, 1664, p. 588 (438) Pat. Bk. #5, and a Wm Exoll was named as one of the headrights for Richard Harrison. Page 563 Nugent, records a patent for Jno Exolls for 1,000 acres granted on March 31, 1664/5,

p. 526 (644) Pat. Bk. #5. A Sylvester Ecles (or Eccles) was named a head-right for a patent for 7,221 acres which was dated Aug. 24, 1664, p. 106 (603) Pat. Bk. #4. (See p. 431 Nugent). This last patent was designated in Rappa. This has reference to Old Rappahanock Co. which came to be Essex and Richmond Counties, Va. in 1692. The above proves positively that prior to 1658 a John Echolls had settled in New Kent Co., Va. and in 1664 acquired one thousand more acres of land. It is quite normal to feel that this John Echolls is the father of John Eckholls who with William Morris was granted a patent for 350 acres on April 24, 1685 in New Kent Co., Va. See New Kent Co., Va. Book #3, p. 436. Later John Eckholls had a grant for 321 acres on the north side of Mattapony River dated April 23, 1688. If he was the son of John Echolls who settled in Virginia prior to 1653 and if he was born around 1661, he was 24 years of age in 1685 and 27 in 1688. He may have gone to Europe for his education and then may have returned as a Quaker preacher. All of this could be true but this compiler has no proof.

Years later John Echolls and John Cave were granted a patent on Oct. 23, 1703 for 600 acres back in the forest in the freshes of Mattapony River. Pat. 8k. 9 Vol. 16, p. 205 (554) King & Queen Co., Va. This patent was acquired many years after John Echolls married Mary Cave. Date of marriage seems unknown. Many other dates seem to be unknown. The following has been sent to the compiler.

first, a John Exoll came to the Virginia Colony perhaps in 1650's, since the land he owned in New Kent Co., Va. prior to Oct. 14, 1658 is thus dated. And he acquired more land in 1664. Second, John Eckholls may be a son of the above John Exoll. No evidence of this is found. He did buy land in New Kent Co., Va. in 1685, 1688 and also in 1703. Place of his birth seems unknown. If he was born in the Virginia Colony he may have returned to England for an education and came back to the Colony a Quaker minister, according to the tradition. In regard to dates for the Echols family, all are assumed. No patents were issued to anyone until they were of age. John Eckholls in 1685 was at least 21 years of age and was born in 1664 or earlier. This compiler has no accurate dates for John Eckholls and born ca. 1661 seems fair. It also seems fair to assume his marriage was around the time he first acquired land in New Kent Co., Va. in 1685. But no exact date has been given or found. He married Mary Cave. No dates are given for Mary Cave. Their children have been declared to be:

ABRAHAM ECHOLS

This study will give only the few facts learned regarding Abraham Echols and the descendants of his wife, Sarah Hubbard Echols. He was born the second son of John and Mary (Cave) Echols on an unknown date. His birthplace was King and Queen Co., Va. He died in 1749 in Lunenburg Co., Va.

Around the year 1727 or 1728, eight young men were petitioning the

Virginia Council for 6,000 acres of land in the Spottsylvania Co., Va. This county was formed in 1720/1 from Essex, King and Queen and King William counties. The final reading of their petition was read and granted on Dec. 11, 1728, according to the record on p. 390, Virginia Council Journals. These eight men were, quoting: "To Paulin Anderson, Richard Anderson Jr., Roger Anderson, Pierce Butler, William Eccles, Joseph Eccles, Abraham Eccles & Richard Eccles, six thousand acres of land beginning about half a mile below Stack's Creek in Spottsylvania County". There are two notes; one says they were from King and Queen Co., and another note says the name Eccles was probably thus spelled by the clerk, according to the sound of the real name Echols. It was also stated that John Echols owned 220 acres in King and Queen in 1704. See Vol. 23 Va. Mag. Hist. and Biog., p. 398. There is no information regarding their use or disposal of this land. No effort was made to find out. Each owned 750 acres in Spottsylvania Co.

In 1734 the Echols brothers had new plans. The declaration regarding the fertilization of the area that came to be Amelia County in 1735 was heard by each of them. Those fertile lands on Deep Creek and other places was receiving the attention of the most industrious and substantial element of the aggressive Virginia Planters. The Echols brothers certainly knew of Benjamin Hubbard's efforts and success. This can be understood when his two patents are read and evaluated. His first patent reveals that no one had land nearby when his patent was surveyed. When the surveyor began surveying in the spring of 1734, the records show that Richard Echols' survey for 397 acres was dated April 6, 1734. Abraham Echols, William Echols, Joseph Echols and Benjamin Hubbard's surveys are all dated Aug. 1, 1734 and each had 400 acres except Joseph Echols who had 200 acres.

All four of the Echols brothers came to Amelia. They were satisfied. On Sept. 12, 1738 Abraham acquired a patent for more land in Amelia. William Echols had 2 more patents. One was dated Dec. 1, 1740 and the other Jan. 12, 1747.

At a later date the Echols brothers and the Hubbard brothers moved from Amelia Co., Va. to Lunenburg Co., Va. and the records prove they were also citizens of Halifax and Pittsylvania as time passed and these new counties were cut off from Lunenburg County.

The surnames of the brides of the above Echols and Hubbard brothers are unknown, excepting Abraham Echols. His will proves he married a sister of Benjamin and Edward Hubbard who had a brother Joseph Hubbard. Her name was Sarah Hubbard. Abraham Echols. son of John and Mary (Cave) Echols, was born in King and Queen Co., Va. on an unknown date. He died in 1749 in Lunenburg Co., Va. He dated his Will April 2, 1749. It was probated Oct. 3, 1749. He married Sarah Hubbard, by estimate, around 1730, if his son, Joseph Echols, was their second son.

THE WILL OF ABRAHAM ECHOLS

In the name of God Amen the Second Day of April in the year of our Lord Christ one thousand seven hundred and forty-nine, I, Abraham Echols of Lunenburg County being very sick and weak in body of perfect mind and memory and now calling to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say, my worldly estate wherewith I am possessed I give and dispose of in manner and form following:

First of all, I give Sarah Echols my wife all my household stuff, ready money together with other moveables during the term of her life, my plantations

and house and tract of land on which they stand. I lend Sarah my said wife also during the term of her life and give and bequeath the said plantation and the tract of land aforesaid to Issac Echols my eldest son to him and his heirs forever, my land joining the aforesaid tract being held of me by bond I give and bequeath to Joshua Echols my youngest son to him and his heirs forever. I desire it may be acknowledged to him in court according to the tenor of the bond my land on Stinking River I give and bequeath to Joseph Echols my son, to him and his heirs forever my land on Stanton River against the Long Island, I give and bequeath to my two daughters Sarah Echols and Rebackah Echols to them and their heirs forever equally divided, my eighty on Stinking River I give and bequeath to Elizabeth Echols my daughter to her and her heirs forever, my land and mill ____ Creek I give and bequeath to Joseph Echols my brother to him and his heirs forever my land on the same creek at fork and therabout I give and (Bequeath to Benjamin Hubard my wife's brother) to him and his heirs forever my land on the same creek aforesaid above the land I bequeath the said Benjamin I give and bequeath to (Edward Hubard my wife's) to him and his heirs forever. Lastly, I constitute and appoint and ordain Joseph Echols and Richard Echols and Sarah Echols my wife my only and sole executors and executrix of my last Will and Testament and I do utterly disallow revoke and annull all and every testament and ___ which has been at any time named, willed or bequeathed, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be only last will and testament, In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this day and year above written.

The written last will and testament of Abraham Echols, Deceased, was exhibited in Court by Joseph and Richard Echols Executors and Sarah Echols Executrix who respective made oath thereto according to law and the same was proved by the oaths of Joseph Collins and George Marshbanks witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded and on the motion of the said executors and executrix. (Lunenburg Co., Va. Records. The Vol. and page were not given).

This will proves the following facts. First, Sarah Hubbard Echols was living in Lunenburg Co., Va. on Oct. 3, 1749. Second, their children were:

The compiler hasn't access to court and family records that can assure accuracy in recording the descendants of these six children. Choice bits of information found, also some sent upon request, cannot be accurately connected. For fear of incorrectly linking a family to the wrong ancestor, only the following will be included.

SARAH ECHOLS

Sarah Echols, the daughter of Abraham and Sarah Hubbard Echols, was found recorded in the Bible of W.D. Rowden in his handwriting. He recorded also Abraham Rowden. The encestor born in Va. in 1750 named a son Abram Echols Rowden, known as Ake. By estimate she married in Halifax Co., Va. around 1754 or 5 John Rowden, born ca. 1730 in Va., the son of John and Elizabeth Rowden. By estimate Sarah Echols was born around 1734 and perhaps in Amelia Co., Va. No proof furnished. John Rowden died in 1816 in Roane Co., Tenn. and Sarah (Echols) Rowden died in Tenn. Date not given. They were the parents of the following known children:

JOHN ROWDEN JR.

John Rowden Jr., the son of John and Sarah (Echols) Rowden, was born around 1758. He married Mary Brewer. Dec. 27, 1785 was said to be the date, but no source was given. So this needs verification.

LABAN ROWDEN

Laban Rowden, the son of Jbhn and Sarah (Echols) Rowden, was born ca. 1760. He married in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on Dec. 27, 1785 Milley Adams, dau. of Mourning Adams, who gave her consent. Surety was William Short. Rev. Samuel Harris performed their ceremony. (See Minister's Returns Pitts. Co., Va., p. 7). This much is correct. No more verified facts.

JOSEPH ROWDEN

Joseph Rowden, son of John and Sarah (Echols) Rowden, was born ca. 1765.

On Jan. 6, 1790, Joseph Rowden married Susanna Adams. Rev. Richard Elliott performed their ceremony. (Pitts. Co., Va. Minister's Ret., p. 13).

TARITHA ROWDEN

Tabitha Rowden, born ca. 1767, was the daughter of John and Sarah (Echols) Rowden. On Sept. 17, 1787, Glover Crain and Tabitha Rowden were married by Rev. James Hinton. John Rowden was listed as Surety. (See Minister's Ret. Pitts. Co., Va., p. 9). He died in 1799. One note stated that John Rowden was administrator of Glover Crane's Will in 1799 in Wilkes Co., Georgia. If Correct this can be verified. Their children were said to be; (a) Tabitha Crane; (b) Sarah Crane; (c) Joshua Crane; (d) Patsy Crane; (e) Polly Crane.

It is said that Mrs. Tabitha (Rowden) Crane married the second time Hopkins Daniel in 1800. Sources not included.

ABRAHAM ROWDEN

Abraham Rowden, said to be born ca. 1756 in Halifax Co., Va., was the son of John Rowden, born ca. 1730 in Va., who married Sarah Echols, born Ca. 1734, perhaps in Amelia Co., Va., the daughter of Abraham and Sarah Hubbard Tamer Echols. Abraham Rowden married a Miss Lucy Chick perhaps in Henry Co., Va. or in Halifax Co., Va. No marriage license secured by Compiler. Abraham Rowden died in De Kalb Co., Ala. in 1840. It is said he was a teacher, a farmer and served in Rev. War. No list of their children was sent. They had a son, Asa Rowden, born ca. 1792 in N.C. and died ca. 1867 in Boone Co., Mo.

ASA ROWDEN

Asa Rowden, born ca. 1792 in N.C., the son of Abraham and ___? (Chick) Rowden is said to have married Margaret Hannah of Tenn. She was born in 1794. Asa Rowden died ca. 1867 in Boone Twp., Mo. The 1850 and 1860 census for that area of Missouri will have some information for his family. The compiler cannot do this. The name of one son was sent. He was Rufus Rowden, born 1826.

RUFUS ROWDEN

Rufus Rowden, born 1826 in N.C., the son of Asa Rowden, died in Dec. 1888, place not named. He married in 1846 Polly Massie, born in E. Tennessee. They were the parents of:

Abraham Rowden's residence was in Henry Co., Va. He was born in Virginia 1750/6. He died after 1840 in DeKalb Co., Alabama. He enlisted Feb. 14, 1776 and served from May 1776 to 1778 in Virginia. He was in the Fifth Virginia Regiment and served as Corporal of Foot Soldiers. Today they are called Infantry. Abraham Rowden's name is in the Revolutionary War records in Washington, D.C.

(Refer back to pages 6 and 7. John Hubbard, Jr. son of John Hubbard, who was the son of Robert Hubbard (1600 1663) had three sons, Richard, George and Peter. It is possible that he had other children but no attempt has been made to determine the names of others, if any. One statement is of significance, however: "John Hubbard, Jr. evidently married first" Nothing was added to indicate that he married a second time. It is possible that he married Mary Harrison and after her death he married Sarah Taylor. Interested descendants need to do more research.

SARAH HUBBARD TAMER

(Refer back to p. 34) Through information sent by Mrs. Fred Andrew Rowden we find the statement that Abraham Echols married Sarah Hubbard Tamer. The compiler of this book made an effort to determine how the name Tamer fit in but was not able to finish the search. No exhaustive search was possible. In 1967 she was corresponding with Mr. M. H. Tardy of Norfolk, VA, He was collecting material and planned to publish a book containing information about the Echols Families. Unknown to the compiler of this volume Mr. Tardy died and the correspondence was broken. In 1975 she wrote again to Mr. Tardy and received a reply from his widow, Mrs. Margaret McDuffie Tardy who explained that her husband had died. She had looked through his notes and found, "SarahTamer who married Abraham Echols was a widow Tamer when she married Abraham Echols. Her name was Sarah Hubbard." Your compiler includes this statement from Mrs. Tardy to encourage readers to follow through and secure documentation if possible.

JOSEPH HUBBARD 1717 (?)-1799

Joseph Hubbard, the youngest brother of Benjamin, Edward Hubbard and their sister, Sarah Hubbard Echols, (Mrs. Abraham), settled in Amelia Co., Va. prior to, or around 1740. It is reasonable to think he was not of age when Benjamin and Edward had their patents surveyed in 1734, else he would have acquired a patent. Since his oldest child, a son, was born in 1738, it is normal to think he married in 1737 or early in 1738, and was around 21 years of age and therefore born around 1717. There are no marriage records to reveal where this marriage was performed. If in Amelia, his brother Benjamin almost certainly let him settle on a part of his 890 acre patent dated Oct. 13, 1736. In fact, the deed below indicates there were improvements on the land before the date of the deed, Nov. 21, 1740. If true, these were perhaps the result of the labor of Joseph Hubbard's own hands. Since Joseph had done well, was succeeding and was satisfied, Benjamin Hubbard, his brother, as a gift of brotherly love, made the following deed which is recorded in Deed Book II (1734-1743) Amelia County, Va., p. 271, as follows.

Benjamin Hubbard presented and acknowledged this his Deed to say and seized to Jos. Hubbard and ordered to be recorded Alee (?) the wife of the sd Benjamin being first privately examined, relinquished her Dower in the land conveyed by the said Deed.

In this deed and her relinquishment of her right of Dower proves Benjamin Hubbard was married prior to 1840. His wife's given name was Alee and else where it is seen was an incorrect spelling of Alice.

According to this deed Joseph Hubbard was a citizen of Amelia Co., Va. before the date of this deed and may have lived all of his married life on the above land near his older brothers, Benjamin and Edward. Details of their lives as citizens of Amelia Co., Va. in those days was that of the farmers in that new county. It will be seen that Joseph Hubbard resided in Amelia Co., Va. longer than his brothers, his sister and the Echols brothers. Before his brothers moved away, Richard Echols, the first one of those seven young men to have land surveyed in Amelia Co. while it was still Prince George, sold to Joseph Hubbard 200 acres of land. In the abstract of this deed one sees that Richard Echols at that date was a citizen of Lunenburg Co., Va. and this was already true of all except Joseph Hubbard. Deed Book #3 Amelia Co., Va., p. 465 shows Richard Echols of Lunenburg Co., Va. sold Joseph Hubbard 200 acres on Furguson's Horsepen Branch of Flatt Creek. This deed also shows the land was part of a patent to William Austin dated June 5, 1736 and by him conveyed to Richard Eckholds who sold it to Joseph Hubbard on Feb. 27, 1749 and was

It is not known how long Joseph Hubbard was a citizen of Amelia County, Virginia, but it is reasonable to believe around fifty years may be true, and can be so ascertained by the following known facts. Thus far no marriage record has been found. If he married an Amelia County citizen, those early bonds for marriages are not available. It is fortunate the deed, a gift of brotherly love, reveals that Joseph and family were almost positively living on that land prior to 1740. Furthermore it is still available and does have John Hubbard's birth date recorded as Oct. 24, 1738. This means that Joseph Hubbard was married around the year 1737 or earlier.

Joseph Hubbard reared his family on the land upon which he settled. His children had the lives of a farmer's children of that era and seemed to acquire some education, which in those days was privately secured when a teacher was available.

Joseph Hubbard owned 34D acres of land when he acquired the above farm from Richard Echols on Feb. 22, 1749. This same land 8 years later, on Oct. 27. 1757. three days after his son John Hubbard's nineteenth birthday, was recorded in the name of John Hubbard in Deed Book 6 (1757-1759) Amelia Co., Va., p. 121. Quoting: "This Indenture made the 27 Day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and fifty seven Between Joseph Hubbard of the County of Amelia of the one part and John Hubbard of the same County of the other part Witnesseth that the said Joseph Hubbard for and in Consideration of the Fatherly love and affaction that the said Joseph Hubbard bears to his well beloved son and for other good Causes and Considerations him there unto moving hath given granted aleined Released and Confirmed and by these Presents for himself his heirs and assigns doth give, grant alein Release & Confirm unto the said John Hubbard his heirs and assigns forever one Certain Tract or parcell of Land Containing Two hundred acres Situate lying and being in the County aforesaid and on Ferguson horsepen Branch of Flatt Creek being part of a Tract of Land granted by Patent to William Austin bearing Date the fifth Day of June one thousand seven hundred and thirty six and is the Westernmost End of the said Tract and was conveyed by the said William Austin to Richard Eckholes and conveyed by the said Richard Eckholes to the said Joseph Hubbard and the Reversion, Remainder and Remainders there of and all the Estate Right Title Interest Claim and Demand Whatsoever of him the said Joseph Hubbard of in or to the same or any part thereof To Have and To Hold the Tract or parcell of Land and promises together with their and Every of their appurtenances unto the said John Hubbard his heirs & assignes forever to the only use and behoof of him the said John Hubbard his heirs and assignes forever and the said Joseph Hubbard for himself and his heirs hath given granted alied & confirmed to and with the said John Hubbard his heirs and assigns forever that he the said Joseph Will Warrant and forever Defend from the Claime of any Person or Persons whatsoever In Witness where of he the said Joseph Hubbard hath here unto set his hand and Seal the Day and Year above written.

Joseph Hubbard deeded to his son the land he purchased 8 years earlier and this is an evidence that his family continued to reside on the original land. In this gift he truly secured for his enjoyment the settlement of John Hubbard near to his parents after his marriage. This will be seen as the details are related in this marrative.

At some time Joseph Hubbard's first wife passed away. At present no facts are known about her.

Joseph Hubbard married a second time prior to 1778. The loss of access to marriage bonds may mean the details may never be known. The evidence of his second marriage is recorded in the following Indenture. Reel 6, D.B. 15 Amelia Co., Va. (1778-1780).

"This Indenture made 23rd day of December one thousand seven hundred and seventy eight between Joseph Hubbard and Frances his wife, late widow and relict of John Cobb dec'd of the County of Amelia of the one part and William Eggleston of the same County of the other part Witnesseth that the said Joseph Hubbard & Frances his wife for and in the consideration of the Sum of sixty pounds one shilling Current money to them in hand paid by the sd William Eggleston the receipt whereof they the said Joseph Hubbard & Frances his wife doth hereby acknowledge have jointly bargained & sold unto the said William Eggleston his heirs & assigns forever all their right, title property claim or demand in her Dower in the land of her late husband John Cobb dec'd and every part there of and appurtenances there to belonging to him the said William Eggleston his heirs & assigns forever against the Claims of any person whatsoever and the said Tract or parcel of land to him the said William Eggleston his heirs & assigns forever shall and will Warrant and forever defend In Witness where of they the said Joseph Hubbard & Frances his wife hath here unto set their hands and affixed their seals the day and year above mentioned. his

Samuel Hubbard who signed this deed as a witness was Joseph Hubbard's youngest son by his first wife and is an evidence that he was 21 years old at the time.

The following evidence of Joseph Hubbard's patriotism during the American Revolutionary War has been found recorded in the Public Service Claims in Amelia Co., Va. on page 247. "N. 338. I hereby Certify I have received for publick use of Joseph Hubbard one Beef Judged to weigh one hundred and seventy five pounds for which payment shall be made at the rate of two pence

per pound specie According to an Act Assembly passed in the October session one Thousand seven hundred and eighty. Given under my hand this twentieth day of Sept. one thousand and eighty.

The above evidence has been used and accepted to classify Joseph Hubbard as the patriotic Revolutionary War ancestor of one of his descendants who is a member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. During this period at least one of his sons, Samuel Hubbard, served as a soldier, also his oldest grandson, Joseph Hubbard, was a soldier. The details will be recorded in their section to show their service in the Revolutionary War.

On the 1782 tax list Joseph Hubbard listed his son Samuel Hubbard by name as a titheable in his claim of 2 free men above the age of 21 years. He recorded 2 slaves by name, Dinah and Hannah, as his titheable slaves; 2 horses and 17 cattle. The above proves Samuel resided in his father's home after his Rev. War service. On the 1783 tax list Joseph Hubbard listed 3 white people and 5 slaves.

No Bible record has been preserved of Joseph Hubbard's family, but on another Bible record of a son, the birthdate of his daughter, Judith Hubbard is recorded as June 14, 1775. Therefore the above 3 white souls must be Joseph, Frances and daughter Judith.

From Court Records it seems that all of Joseph Hubbard's sons left Amelia County prior to and around 1785. His oldest son, John Hubbard, moved to Pittsylvania Co., Va. in 1785. Until that year, father Joseph and son John had lived on their farms near each other for many years. In that same year Joseph Hubbard began buying lands in Halifax Co., Va., is observed in the following deeds.

"This Indenture dated 16 Aug. 1785 Jacob Kelly & wife Ruth and Joseph Eckholds of Halifax Co. Va sold to Joseph Hubbard for 475L a certain tract of land on Bufferlow and Bull Creeks containing 335 acres more or less. This land was adjacent to lands of Joseph Eckhols and a Mr. Burnley & Mr Derjanetts.

Joseph Echols was a nephew of Joseph Hubbard and the son of his sister Sarah Hubbard Echols, the widow of Abraham Echols. This nephew Joseph Echols died around the year 1789, and in the Halifax County Records is

found the following Indenture. See Deed Book 16 (1793-1796) Halifax Co., Va., p. 278.

"This Indenture dated 13 May 1794 Joseph Hubbard of Halifax Co., Va. of first part to Hawkins Landrum and Leonard Baker the guardians to the orphans of Joseph Echols dec'd of the other part for 1 shilling paid by said guardians sold 10 acres on Buffalo Creek adjacent to the Hubbard and Echols lands for the use of the said orphans of Joseph Echols dec'd. The witnesses were Joseph & Isaac Kelly and Will^m Cooper.

This deed was recorded at a court for Halifax Co. Va. on 27 Oct. 1794." (Reel 7 Halifax Co., Va., Va. State Archives).

On Nov. 16, 1793 Henry Howard of Halifax Co., Va. sold to Joseph Hubbard of same county for 50L current money 80 acres of land on Childress Creek adjacent to lands of Jacob Garrett, John Garrett, Wm. Martin and Robert Martin. Witnesses were John Martin, James Wheeler and James Dejarnett. This deed was: Signed - Henry Howard /S/ This deed was recorded 20 Dec. 1793.

The above deeds show that Joseph Hubbard purchased 415 acres of land in Halifax Co., Va. and that Halifax Co., Va. was his place of residence. It is also of interest that in the late years of his life he made a second deed "for love and affection" for benefit of orphan children as he had given land to his teenage son 37 years earlier. From its location those 10 acres without a doubt were valuable rich lands near the River that assured beautiful crops for the benefit of the young orphans.

Joseph Hubbard was growing old. Years before, he had lost his brothers, Benjamin and Edward. He had lost also his wives and at least 2 sons. All of his children were married and scattered. These statements are based upon the trend of his will. Marriage records were not found and research for other details was hampered. Joseph Hubbard's Will is included here and upon this is based what has been found regarding his sons and daughters. Will Book #6 (1768-1804) Halifax Co., Va., p. 113, Reel 37 Archives Division Virginia State Archives.

WILL OF JOSEPH HUBBARD Dated 13 June 1799 - Prob. 28 Oct. 1799

In the name of God Amen. I Joseph Hubbard of County of Halifax being in a low state of health but in perfect memory and of a sound mind do order constitute and ordain this my last Will and Testament that is to say first of all I give my Soul into the hands of Almighty God my Creator and I yeal my body to the grave in full expectation of its resurrection and as touching such worldly estate where with it hath pleased God to bless me I do give order and dispose of in the following manner and form viz:

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Moses Hubbard one Negro Girl named Charity to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath to my daughter Nancy Osborne one Negro Girl named Lucy to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Joseph Hubbard twenty seven pounds 18 shillings which together with seventeen pounds two shillings I have sent him by Samuel Hubbard amounts to fourty five pounds to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Rebecca Holloway thirty pounds which together with fiftsen pounds sent her by Samuel Hubbard amounts to fourty five pounds to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Judith Borum one Negro Girl named Nanny to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah Meadows fourty five pounds to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto the children of my son John Hubbard dec'd fourty five pounds to be equally divided among them to them and their heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto the children of my son Benjamin Hubbard dec'd the sum of ten pounds to be equally divided between them to them and their heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Samuel Hubbard after paying off the several legacies devised to Sundry legatees all the rest and remainder of my estate both real and personal that is to say the tract of land where on he now lives together with the small tract purchased of Howard and the nine Negroes namely Luke, Matt, James, Kitt, Peter, Edey, Salley, Dick and Phill together with the children, the increase of the said Negro Edey as also my stock of all kinds, household furniture &c and lastly I do appoint my friend James Hurt, William Smith and my son Saml Hubbard Executors of this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all other Will or Wills by me here to fore made, declaring this and this only to be my last Will and Testament In testimony where of I have here unto set my hand and affixed my Seal this the thirteenth day of June one thousand seven hundred and ninety nine.

The Last Will and Testament of Joseph Hubbard dec'd was presented in Court and proved by oath of one of the subscribing witnesses and ordered to be certified and James Hurt one of the executors named in the said Will came into Court and refused to take upon himself the burthen of the execution there of where upon the said James Hurt being sworn deposeth that he saw the said Joseph Hubbard sign and acknowledge the said writing as his last Will and Testament calling upon other witnesses to the said Will and desiring them at the same time to take notice it was his last Will and the deponent saith the said Hubbard was at the time of so doing in his perfect senses and memory and there in (?) the said Will is ordered to be recorded and on the motion of Samuel Hubbard one of the executors named in the said Will who made oath as the law directs together with Philemon and James Hurt his securities entered into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of ten thousand dollars conditioned according to law, Certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate of these in due form liberty being reserved to William Smith the other executor to join in the execution there of when he is ... (too dim to read).

The last Will and Testament of Joseph Hubbard dec'd here to fore proven and admitted to record in the County Court was this day again presented in Court and further proved by the cath of Henry Barnes a subscribing witness there to which is ordered to be Certified.

Upon a study of the herein recorded facts regarding the life of Joseph Hubbard, the following summary can be made. Joseph Hubbard was married when a young man and settled in Amelia Co., Va. on land presented to him by a brother, Benjamin Hubbard, and was a landowner the rest of his life. He owned during his life, so far as records were found, 755 acres of land in the counties of Amelia and Halifax, Va. Of this land he gave away 210 acres as a token of his interest and devotion to others. This indicates an unusual spirit of generosity.

He was married twice. There are no marriage bonds available to state the details. His first wife was the mother, it seems, of most of his children. His second marriage was to Mrs. Frances Cobb, the widow of John Cobb, deceased, some time in the 1770's. This is verified in the sale of land in a deed recorded above. It is also learned through a recording in his son's Bible, still extant, that his daughter Judith Hubbard was born June 14, 1775 and was the child of his second wife. Not knowing the birthdates, no more is positive. He was the father of 5 sons and 4 daughters who lived to maturity is verified by his will. His wives were also deceased prior to 1799.

It has been seen that he was a loyal American citizen when the Revolutionary War period came. Since his youngest son was an active soldier, no one can ever know all of Joseph Hubbard's true contributions to this Cause.

Certainly in his late life he was a slave owner as has been learned by tax lists and his will. His will records the names of twelve slaves and refers to the children of one slave. In this gesture there is evidence of his appreciation of each of them.

When his will was dated he was an old man at least 80 years of age and perhaps around 82 years of age, if he was 21 years old when his oldest son was born on Oct. 24, 1738. This will proves he was a man who had experienced at least four great sorrows in his immediate family. Yet one feels he was a contented man ready to share what he owned of earthly things and yet first of all surrendering his soul to his Heavenly Father he expressed his assurance of the resurrection when the Lord comes. He had lived a good life. He had been a prosperous man on well kept farms, according to his will. He had around him many well contented servants, men women and children, whom he could call by name.

It is not known what religious Faith he followed. It is known he was not a Quaker because he owned slaves and supported the Revolutionary Cause.

The following can be recorded as the children of Joseph Hubbard. They are recorded here as named in his will and not according to order of birth since the oldest son is named 7th in this list from the will.

- i. Moses Hubbard, data follows.
- ii. Nancy Hubbard, called Nancy Osborne.
- iii. Joseph Hubbard, data follows.
- iv. Rebecca Hubbard, called Rebecca Holloway.
- v. Judith Hubbard, called Judith Borum.
- vi. Sarah Hubbard, called Sarah Meadows.
- vii. John Hubbard, Deceased, data follows.
- viii. Benjamin Hubbard, Deceased, minor facts found.
 - ix. Samuel Hubbard, data follows.

It has been impossible to follow the lives of the above children. Living descendants could not be found who could trace their lineage back

to so many of them. Brief details are given for each so far as known.

NANCY HUBBARD

Nancy Hubbard, a daughter of Joseph Hubbard was born in Amelia Co., Va. She was living in 1799. She had married a Mr. Osborne. No more learned.

REBECCA HUBBARD

Rebecca Hubbard, the daughter of Joseph Hubbard was born in Amelia Co., Va. She was living in 1799 when her fatehr made his will. Her home was not so far away, since her brother Samuel Hubbard had visited her and taken her a gift from her father, according to her father's will, which also verifies Rebecca Hubbard had married a Mr. Holloway. No other facts learned.

SARAH HUBBARD

Sarah Hubbard, the daughter of Joseph Hubbard, was born in Amelia Co., Va. She was living in 1799. She had married a Mr. Meadows. No other facts.

JUDITH HUBBARD

Judith Hubbard is regarded the youngest child of Joseph Hubbard and his second wife, Frances (?) (Cobb) Hubbard. If so, her mother's maiden surname is unknown and she was the widow of John Cobb, deceased, who resided in Amelia Co., Va., when she became Joseph Hubbard's second wife.

Judith Hubbard was only 6 days older than her niece, Judith Hubbard, the daughter of her half brother, John Hubbard. They were both born in Amelia Co., Va. on the farms of their fathers, very near each other. For some reason both were named Judith Hubbard. They knew each other and played together until they were 10 years old. At that time John Hubbard, in 1785, moved his family to Pittsylvania Co., Va. and Joseph Hubbard settled around the same time in Halifax Co., Va.

At some time prior to 1799 Judith Hubbard married John Borum. And at some time they evidently visited the home of her Uncle John Hubbard in Pittsylvania Co., Va. after her marriage. She was around 18 years of age when her brother John Hubbard passed away. Whenever they made that visit she recorded on one page in her brother John Hubbard's Bible, quoting:

"John Borum Born March 30, 1773

Judith Borum Born June 14th 1775"

Around 130 years later the compiler was asking questions and was told the following about Judith Hubbard Borum by one of her brother John Hubbard's great granddaughters, who was Tina Hubbard Gilbert. She said "Aunt Theenie" often talked about Judith Borum. She loved her and she often spoke of her beautiful auburn hair. It was so long and so abundant. Theenie was a young girl when Judith Borum came to visit and when she was old, she watched the color of the Hubbard girls' hair, when they were children, to see whose hair was the color of "Miss Judy's hair". Only one did. Her adoring talks about "Miss Judy" Borum always ended "But Mars John Borum was a lazy man". Of course poor old "Aunt Theenie" saw him when he was on a visit and under those circumstances she would not see him busy about the affairs of others, and certainly this would be true when he was visiting his wife's people, which indicates a man of wisdom. No facts have been learned about them and their life together.

BENJAMIN HUBBARD

Benjamin Hubbard, the son of Joseph Hubbard, was born in Amelia Co., Va. He was evidently around the age of his brother John Hubbard and it was he who recorded in his brother John's Bible the following data concerning his three wives. There is no knowledge of his children but it is assumed he had two since his father's legacy states it must be divided "between" them. See his will. Quoting from the Bible Record:

"Mary Hubbard, wife of Benjamin Hubbard was born Jan 9th 1745 and Died May 27th 1781. My second wife Born Aug. 7th 1739 and Died Nov. 13th 1783. My third wife Born 1746 - Died 1790 Feby 4th day."

The above data proves these ladies were around the age of John's wife who was born May 20, 1745. It is seen that Benjamin Hubbard married very soon after his first wife's death. This indicates his first wife was the mother of his two children and they needed her care. Her life was over very quickly and within $9\frac{1}{2}$ years he had lost his 3 wives. At some unknown date prior to 1799 Benjamin Hubbard passed away according to his father's will.

There are many questions that arise concerning Benjamin, the son of Joseph. No evidence of his residence in Amelia or Halifax counties was found. A Benjamin Hubbard was on the lists of tithables in 1767 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. (p. 279 Pitts. Co., Va. by Clement). Other matters may pertain to him since there were two children and since no parents for Candace and Samuel Hubbard, two children in that county, can be declared, the question arises "Is the answer here?". No proof found for either question. If there were access enough to Court records, the information may yet be found.

JOSEPH HUBBARD

Joseph Hubbard, the son of Joseph Hubbard, was born in Amelia Co., Va. and was residing in Cumberland Co. Va. in 1799. His dates of birth, marriage and death have never been learned. Due to shortage of clues and time for research, little has been found. In D.B. 11 Amelia Co., Va. 1769-1772, p. 335, there is a deed dated Nov. 14, 1771 in which Batholomew Zachary and wife Judith of Amelia Co., Va. sold Joseph Hubbard Jr. 123 acres for 70 Ls. This was recorded the same day. In 1782 he was in Cumberland Co., Va. on a tax report with 8 white people, a dwelling house and 3 other houses. No other facts learned.

MOSES HUBBARD

Moses Hubbard, the son of Joseph Hubbard was living on June 13, 1799 when his father dated his will in Halifax Co., Va. Moses Hubbard was born in Amelia Co., Va. on an unknown date. His will was probated at a Court held for Cumberland Co., Va. in July 1816. It can perhaps be assumed he was not a very old man. For instance, one item in his will shows that Charity, the slave given him by his father, Joseph Hubbard, wes still in his possession.

In face of information found, it is not easy to state positive facts for his family record. The date of his marriage and the name of his bride has never been found. According to Reel 3 Archives Division Virginia State Library, there is recorded a deed in D.8. 6 (1779-1790) Cumberland Co., Va., p. 44, which proves there is recorded in Cumberland Co., Va. a deed dated Oct. 25, 1779 and recorded same date, between James Holloway and his wife Anne, of Cumberland Co., Va., as grantors to Moses Hubbard of same county, for 200 acres of land, in Cumberland Co., Va. This indicates that Moses moved to Cumberland Co., Va. prior to 1779.

The 1782 tax list for Cumberland Co., Va. shows Moses Hubbard as head of a household of 14 white people and he owned 27 slaves. In 1809 he had only 6 children. Turning to his will a few facts are learned. See W.B. 5 Cumberland Co., Va., p. 183.

WILL OF MOSES HUBBARD

In the Name of God Amen. I, Moses Hubbard of Cumberland County being through the Mercy and goodness of God of a sound mind and perfect understanding and memory do constitute this my last Will and Testament. I desire it to be received as such by all.

Imprimis, I most humbly bequeath my Soul to god my maker beseathing his most gracious acceptance of it.

Imprimis, I give my body to the earth from whence it was taken in full assurance of its resurrection from thence at the last day. As for my burial I desire it may be decent at the discretion of my dear wife and Executor here after mentioned.

As to my worldly Estate I will and positively order that all my just debts be paid. If my wife should be the longest liver, I give or lend to her this house where in I now dwell with all the furniture, lands and tenements that lay about it.

Item, I give to my son Joseph, his hairs and assigns forever ten shillings. Item, I give to my daughters Judith Holland, Ann Anderson, and Molly Holloway and to their heirs and assignes forever ten shillings each.

Item, I give to my Daughter Sally Baugham and to her heirs and assigns forever, Randolph, Patty and hannah and their increase. I give to my son Asa & to his heirs forever Charity, Dick and David and their increase. After the decease of my Dear wife I desire my son Asa shall have all my land and the improvements there on and all the personal Estate then remaining. My good friends Richard Anderson and Clement Brown I do appoint and do constitute them Executors of this my last Will and Testament and trustee for my wife and children. In Witness whereof I have here unto set my hand and seal this twenty minth day of April one thousand eight hundred and nine.

Cumberland Co., Va. July Court, 1816. The last Will and Testament of Moses Hubbard was exhibited in Court and proved by Valentine Boatwright and John Brown, two witnesses there to and ordered to be recorded.

In the same W.B. on page 326 is found the Inventory of Estate of Moses Hubbard. Briefly stated:

"Cattle \$ 68Ls
Plantation utensils \$ 18Ls 25
Household furniture 9Ls 80
Slaves Dick 17, David 15 \$1,000L 80
Total \$1,895Ls 25

Recorded at Sept. Court 1817"

This proves that Moses died before July 16, 1816. His wife was deceased also since Dick and David were sold unless they were younger slaves of same name.

MARRIAGES

ASA HUBBARD

Asa Hubbard, the son of Moses Hubbard, was perhaps under age when his father made his will in 1809, since he was not made executor. He may have been 21 years old around 1812. The Gen. Index of Cumberland Co., Va. shows D.B. 12 p. 143 that Joseph Hubbard deeded 50 acres of land to Asa Hubbard in Oct. of 1812. (Reel 16, Va. State Arch.). The Administration of Asa Hubbard's estate with James M. Hubbard as Administrator was recorded Dec. 26, 1843. Will Book 10, p. 444. Those interested may follow the above clues to ascertain their value. Due to access to these records being impossible, no more facts were found.

In 1975 the following information was secured. Joseph Hubbard, son of Moses, was named in his father's will with a legacy of 10 shillings. This meant his father had made him a gift at an earlier date. This had taken place before June 29, 1808, the date of his will. This was perhaps when his son left Virginia and went West. According to the date of his marriage in Madison Co., Ky. in 1789 he went West as soon as he was of age. The dates given prove that his father, Moses Hubbard, married early in Virginia. The following data was compiled by Ruth Marie Hubbard Shrake (Mrs. Richard A.), Bloomington, Ind.

JOSEPH HUBBARD

Joseph Hubbard, the son of Moses Hubbard and wife, of Amelia Co., Va., was born in Amelia Co., Va. ca. 1767. He married in Madison Co., Ky. on July 16, 1789 Elizabeth Holland. She died April 9, 1841 near Cloverdale, Ind., age 64 years. He died Oct. 9, 1853, Cloverdale, Ind. Both were interred in Cloverdale Cemetery, Putnam Co., Ind. Their children were all born in Gerrard Co., Ky.

In the vicinity of Cloverdale were other Hubbards who have not been identified as sons of Joseph and Elizabeth (Holland) Hubbard who may be their sons. They are Moses Hubbard, Asa Hubbard and ? Hubbard.

WILLIAM H. HUBBARD

William H. Hubbard, son of Joseph and Elizabeth (Holland) Hubbard, was born May 20, 1793, Gerrard Co., Ky. He married on Oct. 15, 1814, Gerrard Co., Ky. Henrietta Baker, born in Ky., the daughter of James Baker. She died March 31, 1839 in Owen Co., Ind. He died May 25, 1871 in Putnam Co., Ind. at Cloverdale. Their children were:

She died Jan. 28, 1903 at Spencer, Ind. and was buried in the Cloverdale Cemetery. He died Jan. 1, 1850 at Owen Co., Ind. Their children were:

SAMUEL HUBBARD b. ca. 1757 - d. 1820

Samuel Hubbard the son of Joseph Hubbard and his first wife. This record will be in 2 sections.

Section I, First Marriage and known facts. Section II. Second Marriage and closing data.

SECTION I

Samuel Hubbard, the son of Joseph Hubbard and his first wife, was born in Amelia Co., Va. around 1757. He died in Halifax Co., Va. prior to Sept. 20, 1820. He is said to be the youngest son of Joseph Hubbard (cal717-1799). He grew up on his father's farm on the North side of Flatt Creek in Amelia Co., Va.

Samuel Hubbard was still a teenage young man when the Revolutionary War was approaching. He was evidently well grown for his years and quite alert to the situation and needs of his Country in that era. He proved his patriotism and concern by enlisting for service in the war. One of Samuel Hubbard's descendants, Mr. William C. Hubbard of Appomatox, Va., appreciated his ancestor enough to secure all the facts he could regarding his service in the Rev. War. He has supplied for this study the evidence he has in his possession. This evidence is filed in the Archives Bivision of the Virginia State Library. Quoting:

Bounty Warrant 1790-96
"This is to Certify that Samuel Hubbard enlisted under William Sewer,
Second Lietenant under Captain John Fleming of the first Virginia Regiment
in the year 1775 for one year and Re-enlisted in 1776 for three years and
again Re-enlisted in 1777 for during the War and did serve that period.

Given under my hand this 20th day of March 1795.

George Wily"

City of Richmond j

The aforegoing Certificate was sworn to be George Wily before me this 20th March 1795.

A. W. Dunscomb.

"I do hereby certify that I well knew Samuel Hubbard while he acted in the 1st Virginia Regiment as a Sergeant; the above state-ment of his services I believe to be just.

John Rousy late Lieut. of 3rd Virginia Regt.

p. 21st May 1795"

"I Certify that I personally knew Samuel Hubbard in the first Virginia regiment from the early part of the fall 1775 till the fall of 1780. That he was free-quently under my command in the interval before mentioned and that in the fall of 1780 I sent him forward to General Green's army and knew nothing respecting his services after that period, excepting from hear-say, which announced his being taken prisoner in South Carolina. Given under my hand this 5th day of September 1795.

William Davies formerly Col. of 10th and for sometime Commanding the 1st & 10th Virginia Regiments."

Photoprints were made by Virginia State Library Oct. 30, 1948.

The above proves positively that in 1775 Samuel Hubbard was enlisted in the service of his Country. If born in 1757 he was only 18 years of age. Of his imprisonment no facts have been secured.

In the application papers for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Mrs. Annie Lee Cosby states that Samuel Hubbard served as a private in Capt. Callohill Minnis' Company 1st Va. Regt., commanded by Lt. Col. Ball. Her documentation for this statement is not available.

The above documents prove that Samuel Hubbard was in the 1st Virginia Regiment, that he was active for 5 years, from the fall of 1775 to the fall of 1780, and that he had the rank of Sergeant in the 1st Virginia Regiment. In the fall of 1780 he was transferred by Col. William Davies to General Green's Army. He heard that Samuel Hubbard was taken a prisoner in South Carolina. So far the verification of this has not been located nor his release from prison and the date. Very few soldiers have a record of as many years of constant service as is true of Samuel Hubbard.

Samuel Hubbard, born in 1757 in Amelia Co., Va., the son of Joseph Hubbard, married on Oct. 31, 1791 Patience Hurt, the daughter of William Hurt of Halifax Co., Va. (Halifax Co., Va. Mar. Reg.). No Bible record of Samuel Hubbard's family has been located. A partial record, however, has been found in the Bible of his brother John Hubbard, which is extant today. Quoting:

"Patience Hubbard, wife of Samuel Hubbard was born ye 30th Day of March

Chil) Joel Hubbard was born September ye 8th 1792.

drens)- Sarah Hubberd was born October ye 29th 1794

A son, John Hubbard, was born ca. 1796 but never recorded in that Bible. See later.

JOEL HUBBARD

Joel Hubbard, the son of Samuel and Patience (Hurt) Hubbard, was born in Halifax Co., Va. on Sept. 8, 1792 and died in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on Oct. 4, 1880. Joel Hubbard was issued on Feb. 8, 1812 in Halifax Co., Va. a marriage license to marry Elizabeth Stone, the daughter of John Stone. William Collins was his bondsman. The bond for this marriage states that Joel is the son of Samuel and Patience Hubbard. They were married on Feb. 18, 1812 in the home of her parents. (Halifax Co., Va. Mar. Bonds). See Stone Section. Elizabeth Stone was born Jan. 15, 1791 and died May 19, 1840.

Joel Hubbard grew up on the farm of his father, Samuel Hubbard, in Halifax Co., Va. It will be seen that he had many and varied experiences during his life in that he was a farmer, a soldier, a Baptist minister and a wealthy man. He was also a family man and reared sons and daughters of whom he was proud.

When he was a young man Joel Hubbard enlisted for service in the War of 1812. Evidence of this is as follows, quoting: "A report from Third Auditor's Office, Treasury Department show in the War of 1812 Joel Hubbard served as a Private in Capt. John B. Royall's Company of Virginia Militia from August 3D, 1814 to Sept. 21, 1814 including 8 days allowed for travel". Then the Pension records show, quoting: "Joel Hubbard was pensioned on Certificate 24-487 which was issued under the Act of March 9, 1878. Pension was paid at the Knoxville, Tennessee Agency. Margaret H. Hubbard, widow of Joel Hubbard, was pensioneded on Cartificate 31,421 which was issued under the Act of March 9, 1878. Pension was paid at the Knoxville, Tennessee Agency."

Margaret Hubbard, his widow, was his second wife.

Joel Hubbard was a land owner. He accumulated lands in Halifax and Pittsylvania counties and he built a substantial dwelling house which stands until the present day. It is an interesting home of the past which today is an attraction for many visitors. No attempt is made here to follow this effort of his life with the exception of mentioning his first purchase of real estate. The year he married his first wife, Elizabeth Stone, on Oct. 12, 1812, Thomas Smith of Halifax Co., Va. sold Joseph Hubbard of same county 275 acras of land on the north side of Banister River on both sides of Runaway Creek. His witnesses were John Stone, Peter Reves, Joel Neal. It is

interesting that his seems to be the land his father mentions in his will, on which he had "paid considerable" for Joel. (See will). This evidently was his beginning purchase. He succeeded and remained aggressive in this field.

Joel Hubbard became a Baptist minister but the date of his ordination to the ministry hes not been found. The Minute Book 6A, p. 164 however, reveals at the December Court 1835, quoting: "Joel Hubbard produced credentials of his ordination and also of his being in regular Communion with the United Baptist, took the oath of allegiance to this Commonwealth and with George M. Tucker his security for \$1500000 was granted the right to celebrate the rite of matrimony."

The work of Joel Hubbard covered at least 45 years after the above date and today it would be impossible truly to summarize the great work he did in the old Roanoke Association, known today as Pittsylvania Baptist Association. He was pastor of several of the old early churches and the History of the Association shows he served as Moderator of the Association in 1845 when it met at Shoeckoe Baptist Church while he was pastor of that church. He served again as moderator in 1864.

A summary concerning Joel Hubbard's pension record in the National Archives file gives the following details that are of a personal nature. Rev. Joel Hubbard Sr. married Mrs. Margaret H. Cobbs on Sept. 13, 1854 in Halifax Co., Va., who had been married previously to John Cobbs who died in 1850. The Veteran, Rev. Joel Hubbard had been married previously to Elizabeth Stone who died May 19, 1840. In 1881 Mrs. Margaret H. Hubbard was 76 years old and living in Pitts. Co., Va. It has been said her grandson, J.T. Jones, Postmaster at Riceville, Va., who was a Cobbs descendant, stated she died on Jan. 6, 1883, age 77, therefore born 1806. Joel and Margaret H. Hubbard have no descendants.

The above record shows the Veteran Rev. Joel Hubbard Sr. for the War of 1812, entered the Service in Halifax Co., Va., and after the War he resided in Halifax near Banister River for 24 years and in Pitts. Co., Va. 40 years. His last post office was Riceville, Va. This information from the above file in Archives was signed by A.H. Leavitt, Chief of Veterans Records on Dec. 20, 1948 and sent to the Compiler by Mr. William C. Hubbard, Appomatox, Va.

The Marriage Register, Halifax Co., Va., records a marriage license issued on Sept. 14, 1854 to Joel Hubbard, widower, born Halifax Co. and Margaret H. Cobbs, widow, born in Henry Co., Va. Samuel and Patience Hubbard, his children, consented and James and Polly Waller, relationship not stated, signed for Mrs. Cobbs. Rev. J.T. McLaughlin, pastor, performed their ceremony. They had 26 years of companionship.

Rev. Joel Hubbard, it will be seen, reared a large family of children, whose mother was his first wife, Elizabeth (Stone) Hubbard. All of these children were grown before his second marriage. More than a quarter of a century later, Rev. Joel Hubbard Sr. died on Oct. 14, 1880. In The Religious Herald, Richmond, Va., published Nov. 4, 1880, was found, quoting: "Resolutions adopted by the Mulberry Baptist Church Halifax Va. Resolved: That in the death of our greatly esteemed and venerable father in the ministry Rev. Joel Mubbard, in the 80th year which occured on the 14th of October 1880 this church has lost a devoted friend and co-laborer, one who has ever felt a deep interest in its prosperity and success, being the instrument of its organization. He was the spiritual father of its present pastor and has ever been ready to aid him by his council and co-operation. Resolved: That while our hearts are stricken by this severe loss we bow with humble submission in view of his ripeness for death and his anxiety to depart and be with Christ. We shall ever fondly cheerish his memory and endeavor to emulate his worthy example. We tender our sympethy to the bereaved widow and his numerous surviving friends and relatives.

Resolved: That a copy of these resolutions be entered on the church book, one sent to The Religioue Herald for publication and one forwarded to the family of the deceased.

Whitehead, the daughter of Richard and Elizabeth Whitehead. From an obituary in the Religious Herald, Richmond, Va., Aug. 17, 1916, p. 22, written by Rev. Elbert Y. Pool at Danville. Va. on July 11, 1916, the following facts can be recorded. Emily R. (Whitehead) Hubbard died Sept. 6, 1872 after less than two years of married life. Therefore they were married perhaps early in 1871.

Rawley T. Hubbard, born in Pittaylvania Co., Va. on April 28, 1845, married the second time on Dec. 1, 1885 Emily W. Stone. He died July 18, 1916 after a few weeks of illness. He realized the end of life was near and to his friends he spoke of his departure.

When he was 15 years of age the Civil War was approaching. During that war he served the Confederate States Army three years.

In 1874 he joined the Riceville Baptist Church and was baptized by Dr. A.B. Brown. He was a useful and efficient member of this church for 42 years. In closing, Rev. Pool said: "We appreciate the rememberance of his service and help to the kingdom of God and pray that a double portion of His spirit may rest upon his wife, sons and daughter." Rev. Elbert Y. Pool was his pastor for 8 years preceeding his death in 1916. He stated in this obituary notice that Rawley Thompson and Emily W. (Stone) Hubbard were the parents of five children. He named four who were living. The oldest he never knew. They were, according to information found:

The following Resolutions of the Riceville Baptist Church express an appreciation of the life of Joshua Stone Hubbard, quoting: "The Riceville Church has been called to mourn the loss of one of its most useful and influential members; Brother Joshua S. Hubbard having given his heart to Jesus in early life, had for nearly 28 years been an active member of Riceville Church in which church he filled for many years the office of deacon. He was once heard to say "I have been a member of the church 26 years and haven't missed but one church meeting on account of business". Having many earthly ties, it was hard for him to think of leaving, but the burden of his conversation was the Lord's will be done, not mine. And now, since it has been the will of the Great Head of the church to take him from labor to rest: Resolved, 1. This church has lost a useful member and faithful officer; and that while with deep regret we mourn our loss and look on his vacant seat with tearful eyes, yet with cheerful hope, and living faith we look to that house not made with hands, where we believe our brother is now seated with the faithful who have gone before. Yes he has reached that haven where the winds cease to blow and the waters are still and the weary are at rest. He is not dead but sleepeth.

Resolved 2. That not only our church has sustained a great loss but our entire community will miss a worthy citizen, a safe counsellor, and a tried friend.

Resolved 3. That a copy of these resolutions be read at our next meeting and a copy be sent to the family of the deceased and a copy sent to the Religious Herald for publication.

The following obituary reveals the value of the life of Edgar Overton Sr. to others when he was on Earth, quoting: "Died at his home, Leda, Va. on March 13, 1916, Edgar Overton Hubbard, 56 years of age. He was a graduate of Richmond College and one of the best-loved and biggest-hearted men I ever knew. He was a loyal friend, a loving father and a devoted husband.

The poor and needy found in him a friend who was ever ready to render aid. He was always kind, thoughtful and considerate of others, and was a consistent member of the Mulberry Baptist Church, where he will be greatly missed. He was a zealous Mason and was buried with Masonic honors by the Hubbard Lodge A.F. and A.M., which was named in his honor. For several years he was D.D.G.M. of his district.

The largest crowd I ever saw at a burial assembled to pay their last respects to him. He married twice, and leaves a widow and four children. The surviving children by his first marriage are Stephen, Overton and George Hubbard and by his second marriage one little boy Edgar Overton Hubbard Jr. May the God of all grace bless and comfort the bereaved ones.

To this should be added he was an active busy man. Besides farming he was in the mercantile business and with modesty he declared he had been successful.

JOEL HUBBARD JR.

Joel Hubbard Jr., born 1833 in Pittsylvania Co., Va., is the son of Rev. Joel Hubbard and his first wife, Elizabeth (Stone) Hubbard, the daughter of John Stone, the son of Joshua Stone. He married in Halifax Co., Va. on Apr. 18, 1855 Ann Rebecca Jordan, the daughter of James and Dolly Jordan of Campbell Co., Va. He was 22 years old and she was 17 years of age. Rev. Elijah W. Roach was the minister who performed their wedding ceremony. (See Halifax

Co., Va. Mar Reg.). Ann Rebecca Jordan was born 1828 in Campbell Co., Va. Very little information can be recorded today regarding their activities. It is known that Joel Hubbard Jr. is a Veteran of the Confederate States Army. The following Certificate from the Virginia State Library, Richmond, Va., dated May 21, 1942, was signed by Wilmer L. Hall, State Librarian /R/.

"This Certifies that on page 293 of Vol. 8 of the manuscript Confederate records in the Archives Division of the Virginia State Library the information is given that Joel Hubbard Jr. was a private in Troop H., 3rd Virginia Cavalry, known as the "Catawba Troop" of Halifax County commanded by Captain William Collins that he enlisted (blank) and served (blank) Remarks (blank)."

The following is a quotation from the office of the Adjutant General, War Department, Washington, D.C. dated Oct. 8, 1942 and was a reply to an inquiry of Mr. William C. Hubbard in regard to his grandfather Joel Hubbard Jr.'s Service to the Confederate States of America, quoting:

"The records show that Joel Hubbard Jr. a private of Captain William Collins Company (Catawba Troops) which subsequently became Company H, 3rd Regiment Virginia Cavalry Confederate States Army enlisted May 25, 1861 at Barksdale's Store age 28, occupation farmer.

He was elected 2nd Lieutenant of the Company August 13, 1862 and the Company Muster roll for July and August 1864, last on file does not show him absent. Other records show that he was paid Nov. 20, 1864 for service from July 1, 1864 to Oct. 31, 1864. His name appears on an inspection report dated February 27, 1865 which shows him absent, sick, by authority of the Brigade Surgeon, January 12, 1865. No later record of him has been found.

The collection of Confederate States Army records on file in this
Department is incomplete and the failure to find the complete or any record
of any person thereon is by no means conclusive proof that such person did
not serve at some period not covered by the records."

The abova information proves that Joel Hubbard Jr. enlisted in Service of the Confederate States as soon as his fellow citizens in Halifax Co., Va. were mobilized and that he was in the "Catawba Troop" of Cavalry. His known dates include May 25, 1861 to Feb. 27, 1865 which covers 3 years and 9 months. The last date was 41 days before the Surrender of General Robert E. Lee at Appomatox, Va. on April 9, 1865. His long continued service, interrupted only by illness, assures his descendants that if he was not at Appomatox on April 9, 1865, or at some other post of duty, he was unavoidably absent. He did survive his illness and lived through the drastic days of the Reconstruction, and reared a large family of excellent young people. The children of Joel and Ann Rebecca (Jordan) Hubbard were:

JOEL HUBBARD III

Joel Hubbard III, born June 13, 1869, died Jan. 1918 at Appomatox, Virginia, was the son of Joel and Ann Rebecca (Jordan) Hubbard. On Oct. 24, 1897 he married Mattie Eula Farris in Mulberry Baptist Church. Rev. J.W. Downey, the pastor, performed their wedding ceremony. (Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg.). She was born Oct. 24, 1874 in Halifax Co., Va. and was the daughter of James Coleman Farris who married Martha Ann Pentecost, the daughter of Robert Pentecost and wife, who was, before her marriage, a Miss Davidson. Mattie Eula (Farris) Hubbard outlived her husband more than thirty three years. She was left a widow with five children whose ages were 2 years to 15 years. Donna Jean Hubbard grew up in Appomatox, Va. and attended the public schools there and on June 10, 1970 she graduated from Appomatox County High School. While a student there she not only succeeded in her class work but was very popular among the students and was selected for many responsibilities in their extra curricular activities. She had membership in Pep Club, Future Homemakers of America, Torch Club, Latin Club, Beta Club. She was Reporter in her Junior year and President in her Senior year of Tri-Hi-Y organization. For the school newspaper she served as assistant co-editor and later as co-editor. For three successive years she was the delegate to the Model General Assembly in Richmond, Va. in the capacity of service of a Page, then Senator and finally as Staff Assistant. In the year 1968-1969 she served as Secretary of the Central District of Tri-Hi-Y.

When she was a young girl she was associated with the Girl Scouts for six years. She joined the Liberty Baptist Church and was a member of the Girls Auxiliary. JOEL HUBBARD IV 1903-1967

Joel Hubbard IV, the son of Joel III and Mattie Eula (Farris) Hubbard, married around 1927 Betty Hand of Atlanta, Ga. Their son died at birth in 1929. They adopted a son born around 1948 and named him Joel Hubbard V.

Joel Hubbard IV resided in Tifton, Ga. from 1932 until his death on April 29, 1967. His widow still lives there.

JOHN HUBBARD 1796-1843

John Hubbard, the son of Samuel Hubbard and his wife Patience Hurt of Halifax Co., Va., was born in Halifax Co., Va. in 1796 and died at his residence in Kentucky on May 11, 1843. John Hubbard and Diana C. Williams were issued a marriage license on June 20, 1829 in Halifax Co., Va. Elisha Barksdale was bondsman. (See Mar. Reg. Halifax Co., Va.). She was born in 1811 in Va. (1850 census). She died in 1852 in Ky. according to her granddaughter's DAR application.

John Hubbard (1796-1843) was a Baptist minister. At what time he entered the ministry is not known to the author, but as early as 1827. pp. 65, 66, 67, Va. Bapt. Min. by James B. Taylor). At the November Court 1831, for Halifax Co., Va., there was recorded that the credentials of John Hubbard's ordination, as a minister, were presented and he was granted the right to celebrate the Rites of Matrimony. (Minute Book 4, p. 469, Halifax Co., Va.). The above proves that John Hubbard was an ordained minister prior to 1831. Since there was no other John Hubbard in that area of Virginia who was a minister, it is assumed that he was the John Hubbard present when the First Baptist Church of Danville, Va. was constituted in 1834. (Page 124, The History of Pittsylvania Baptist Association 1788-1963 by Charles F. Leek, 1963). Those present at the formal organization were: Elders William Blair; Griffeth Dickerson; J.G. Mills; John Hubbard and Rev. Mr. Leigh who came from the Association. Luther Rice was also on the presbytery and acted as clerk"and was designated to preach the opening sermon and pray the consecrating praysr".

Just when John Hubbard moved to Christian Co., Ky. is not known but can be estimated as year 1836. He and his family worshiped in the First Baptist Church of Hopkinsville, Ky. Information regarding him reveals he prefered, as a minister of the Gospel, to exhort rather than to preach sermons or to serve as a pastor. The foregoing information enables one to understand John Hubbard's 1840 Census Record in Christian Co., Ky. This census shows his occupation listed as Professional and engineer. This census shows that in 1840 his wife was living and they had 2 daughters and a son. It shows also

that he owned 13 slaves, of whom 6 were in agriculture. These interests permitted him freedom to perform the religious service he gave when he was called upon. The 1840 census proves he was not 50 years of age. This assures the compiler that his year of birth was 1796 and John Hubbard was about 47 years old when he died. This also assures one that he was the son of Patience Hurt, his father's first wife.

The following information are excerpts from articles published in 1843, quoting: "John Hubbard was a native of Halifax County, Virginia. In early manhood he bacame a disciple of Christ, and no one could fail to recognize in him the ardent conscientious devotion, which such a relationship ought ever to inspire". He was associated with Abner W. Clopton and engaged in his work "with all his characteristic ardor as a co-worker in commending Christ to the people. His gift was of the hortatory character, and in its exercise. as well as on account of his eminent piety, a large influence was acquired in the Roanoke Association." Today this is the Pittsylvania Baptist Association of Virginia. In Virginia Baptist Ministers by James E. Taylor with an introduction by Rev. J.B. Jeter D.D., Series II, pp. 65, 66 & 67, the following is found. Rev. T.G. Keen has stated "Mr. Hubbard removed to Kv. about 1836 and settled in Christian Co. He joined the church in Hopkinsville, Ky. Although solicited to preach to that church and also to neighboring churches, he persistently declined feeling that his mission was to exhort and not formaly to preach. He possessed pre-eminent qualifications for that kind of service and scarcely a protracted meeting was held within a convenient distance which he was not invited to attend. His exhortations or addresses, after a sermon had been preached, were most powerful and effective. The expressiveness of his eye, the clear and solemn tones of his voice, his whole manner indicated the deep earnestness and solicitude of his soul for the conversion of men.

"Every one, even the most hardened in sin, accorded to him an unusual anxiety and affectionate zeal in urging the claims of the gospel. Always kind and courteous in his manners, cheerful in his conversation, affable in his intercourse with all, he had access to the confidence and often to the hearts of men, which could be had by few ministers around him. Far and near he was solicited to engage in the labor to which he felt himself called, and in which he found his greatest enjoyment ... simply exhorting men to accept the offers of mercy. Many a redeemed one is now in heaven, and many an humble and happy believer in Christ still lives on earth remembering with delight and gratitude the stirring appeals which he uttered, and which awakened within them a desire to be saved", declared the writer. He said, "The name of John Hubbard, throughout that portion of the State where he lived, is held in sacred remembrance by thousands of persons who listened to his exhortations and witnessed the display of Divine grace as it rendered effectual the Word as he uttered it.

"He thus lived and labored until the year 1843."..."In the spring of that year he was violently attacked with a disease which soon closed his earthly career."..."Everything which kind attention, medical skill and sympathizing friends could do to stay the hand of death, was done."..."While enduring the severest pain and rapidly approaching his end, his wife, Hannah*, frequently came into his chamber and repeated appropriate passages of Scripture, with which to console and comfort him in his suffering and he, in turn, would attempt to comfort her, in view of her terrible bereavement. He directed her to the widow's God, and reminded her of the sweet and precious promises which He had vouchsafed to one thus left alone and desolate. This mutual endeavor to soothe and comfort each other was kept up, at different times, throughout the last day of his sickness.

* Dr. Pendleton by mistake called her Hannah. Her name was Dianna. This may mean she was called "Anna".

"At length the hour came which should close his earthly course. Conscious of this he requested his servants should recieve his final farewell. As one after another came to his bedside, he took each by the hand, giving an appropriate word of counsel, and then exhorting them to meet him in Heaven. As a favorite servant, in whose piety he had great confidence approached him, calling him by name he said 'My old friend, I am on the banks of the river, but I stand as firm as a rock, be faithful, meet me in Heaven'. 2 It was then around midnight and to his family gave the most affectionate council as he bade them farewell. His strength was fast failing, he said to the minister holding his hand 'Tell Diannah to cheer up; it grieves me to see her so sorrowful'. In a few minutes his spirit ascended to Heaven. Clasping his hand Dianna said 'Farewell, my dear husband until the morning of the resurrection'.

"Thus lived and died one of the purest and loveliest of men.

"His funeral was attended by a large number of people. The Sermon was preached by the venerable Reuben Ross, the moderator of the Bethel Baptist Association of Kentucky." 1

Dr. J.M. Pendleton, writing from Bowling Green, Ky. on May 21, 1843, refering to John Hubbard's method of exhortation, said "I have some times almost imagined for a moment that an angel was entreating sinners to embrace the Saviour. Brother Hubbard enjoyed the consolation of religion in his affliction. By way of expressing his resignation to the pleasure of God, he said that 'If God were to give his own will in writing, he would hand it back to Him'. 3 He was never known to murmur.2 John Hubbard's property, talents and time were consecrated to the service of God."2 Rev. T.G. Keen called to see him two days before his death and remained with him until he expired. He said, quoting: "History does not record a death more tranquill and triumphant".2

The Bethel Baptist Associational Minutes of Kentucky, p. 8, recorded resolutions regarding John Hubbard's death, signed by Reuben Ross, moderator and P.T. Anderson, Clerk. This Association met at the First Baptist Church in Hopkinsville on the 4th Saturday in Sept. 1843. In 1842 John Hubbard was a messenger to the Bethel Baptist Association from the First Baptist Church of Hopkinsville, Ky. In "History of Christian County, Ky." by Charles Mayfield Meacham, p. 304, is given an appreciative article on John Hubbard.

Diana C. (Williams) Hubbard died in 1852 at the age of 41 years. Data regarding their sons has not been found.

The compiler, when searching for facts regarding Rev. John Hubbard and his family after they left Virginia to reside in Hopkinsville, Ky., secured the interest of no one until a letter was sent to Mr. George Raleigh Jewell, who is the Secretary and Treasurer of the Kentucky Baptist Historical Society. The response was the most outstanding help the compiler has ever received from an inquiry. The relatives can thank Mr. Jewell for this information. So far if there are any of Rev. John Hubbard's descendants living, the above data is a rich heritage. They can be proud of their ancestor.

Since John Hubbard, son of Samuel and Patience (Hurt) Hubbard, has had his birthdata stated as in the year 1776, the compiler has striven to learn the truth. No Bible record was found with his birthdate in it but his brother Joel Hubbard was found born Sept. 8, 1792. The Pension Record stated he was 86 in 1878, therefore born 1792. Joel was the son of Samuel and Patience. John Hubbard, his brother, was born around 1796. sometime after the death of their sister, Sarah Hubbard (b. 1794, d. 1795). A search for his exact age was fruitless. Knowing that he settled in Kentucky and died in 1843, Mr. Theodore Merrill made a search for the 1840 Census record in Christian Co., Ky. Sure enough, his age was in the 1840 Census and was listand hetween the years 40-50. Therefore, if born in 1796, he was 44 years of age in 1840 and around 47 years old when he died in 1843. Another mistake was the statement that John's mother was Elizabeth Stone. His brother, Joel Hubbard, married Elizabeth Stone (1791-1840). Her father, John Stone and Capt. Joshua Stone III, his brother, had no sister of any name, according to their father's will, probated Nov. 8, 1774. On the basis of this, mistakes were made by someone who got traditions mixed up. Therefore, Samuel Hubbard, born 1757, and 18 years old in 1775, did not marry an Elizabeth Stone and have a son John, born in 1776. Furthermore, the Bounty Warrant Records (1790-1796), (see above), prove he enlisted in 1775 for one year and in 1776 for three years and again in 1777 for the War period of the Revolution.

No Bible Record has been found. It is normal to feel that John and Diana C. (Williams) Hubbard recorded in their family Bible the facts regarding their family. Those who should be interested in what is being recorded in this record, could never find their living descendants today. The compiler requested Theodore Merrill, of Arlington, Va., to search the Census Records for 1850 for Mrs. Diana C. Hubbard, and the 1860 and 1870 Census for Thomas Petree of Christian Co., Ky. The reason for the request was based on a statement that Diana Hubbard died in 1852 and her daughter Mary, called "Willie", married Thomas Petree. Mr. Merrill gladly co-operated and he found the following for the 1850 Census.

Two 16 year old girls, Marion Lanier and Almyra Jones were in her home. They were not related, so far as known.

The 1850 census of Christian Co., Ky. reveals the following regarding the family of John Hubbard. The census record lists Diana C. Hubbard as head of the household. Their children were:

- i. Betty S. Hubbard, age 16. Her family records show her full name was Bettie Stokes Hubbard, born Oct. 15, 1832, in Va.
- ii. Mary W. Hubbard, age 15. She was called Willie. Her full name may have been Mary Williams since her mother was a Miss Williams.
- iii. Luther R. Hubbard, age 12, One feels his full name was Luther Rice since his father knew and was a friend of Luther Rice, the missionary.
 - iv. John Hubbard, age 10. He was named for his father. He was born in 1840 after the 1840 census was taken.

MARY W. HUBBARD

Mary W. Hubbard (Willie), born in Virginia around 1835, was the daughter of John and Dianna C. (Williams) Hubbard. She married early in the 1850's Thomas Petree of Hopkinsville, Ky. Exact date was not learned. The 1860 census records shows he was a lawyer born in Kentucky around 1824 and his full name was Robert Thomas Petree. Their children were:

- i. Betty H. Petree, b. in Ky. ca. 1855. (1860 census).
- ii. Mary D. Petree, b. in Ky. ca. 1858. (1860 census).
- iii. Thomas Petree, b. in Ky. ca. 1864. (187D census).
- iv. Luther Petree, b. in Ky. ca. 1866. (1870 census).

They resided in Hopkinsville, Ky. It is assumed they attended the First Baptist Church since it was stated that descendants of John Hubbard were affiliated with this church as late as 1948.

Thus far no information has been secured regarding Luther R. Hubbard and John Hubbard. If in Kentucky, they were not found on the Christian Co. Census Record in 1860 and 1870. This source was not exhausted. Mary "Willie" (Hubbard) Petree may have named her son Luther for her brother, Luther R. Hubbard. Efforts to contact this family were not successful.

BETTIE STOKES HUBBARD

Bettie Stokes Hubbard, born Oct. 15, 1832 in Virginia, married in 1852 in Kentucky Washington Lee Faulkner and they went to Texas to live. She died May 17, 1861 in Texas. They had several children but the names of only two of them are known for this recording. They are:

- i. Helen Lee Faulkner, b. Apr. 22, 1856.
- ii. John Faulkner, was their youngest child and was b. when his mother died May 17, 1861. He was living in 1910.

HELEN LEE FAULKNER

Helen Lee Faulkner, born April 22, 1856, was the daughter of Washington Lee and Bettie Stokes (Hubbard) Faulkner. She married in 1880 in Texas Columbus A. Cosby, born 1852. She died March 28, 1942. They resided at Austin, Tex. and the Cosby family was active in the organizations of the University Church at Austin, Texas. They had at least one daughter. If there were other children, it is not known.

i. Annie Lee Cosby, NSDAR Nat. No. 81,105, Vol. 82.

In her DAR application papers, Annie Lee Coaby was misinformed about the name of the wife of her Revolutionary War ancestor. It should be stated

here that due to the early deaths of her ancestors and no accurate records in the family, she was misinformed. The above data proves that her great grandfather John Hubbard's brother, Joel Hubbard, married Elizabeth Stone and that John Hubbard was the son of Samuel and Patience (Hurt) Hubbard. Her lineage is truly Annie Lee Cosby, daughter of Helen Lee Faulkner and Columbus A. Cosby; granddaughter of Bettie Stokes Hubbard and Washington Lee Faulkner; great granddaughter of John Hubbard and Diana C. Williams; and great great granddaughter of Samuel Hubbard the Rev. War soldier who served over 5 years and married in 1791 Patience Hurt in Halifax Co., Va. The only error is the statement that Elizabeth Stone was a wife of Samuel Hubbard. Elizabeth Stone was Samuel's daughter-in-law, the wife of his son, Joel Hubbard.

SECTION II for SAMUEL HUBBARD

Samuel Hubbard, born in 1757, the son of Joseph Hubbard and his first wife, was born in Amelia Co., Va. His second marriage was on an unknown date, since the marriage record has not been found. The will of Samuel Hubbard, dated Dec. 7, 1819 and recorded at September Court, 1820 in Will Book 30 A, p. 14, Halifax Co., Va., reveals he married Mary McHaney (Polly). She was the daughter of Cornelius W. McHaney, since he devised lands to Mary Hubbard, according to Samuel Hubbard's will. It is seen also that the given names of Samuel and Mary Hubbard's children are the same given names found in the McHaney family. From the will which is recorded below, the children of Samuel and Mary (McHaney) Hubbard were:

- i. Samuel Hubbard, under 2 years old in 1819.
- ii. Cornelius Hubbard, will probated May 22, 1866 in Pitts. Co., Va.
- iii. Polly Hubbard, perhaps named Mary.
- iv. William Hubbard, d. 1837.
- v. McHaney Hubbard. See also p. 469, Robert M. Hubbard.

The will mentions "all my seven children or their representatives". He names his son John and his son Joel besides the above named five children, who are the children of Samuel and Polly Hubbard.

THE WILL OF SAMUEL HUBBARD Dated Dec. 7, 1819 Prob. Sept. 20, 1820

In the name of God Amen. I Samuel Hubbard of the County of Halifax and State of Va. being of Sound mind and memory do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament and hereby revoking all former Wills.

In the first place I recommend my Soul to God and my body to the earth. Item, I lend my loving wife Polly the third of all my personal estate during her life after my debts are paid, the 4 following negroes excepted: To wit: Dinah, Fanny, Nelly and Chaney and their increase.

Item: I also lend to my said wife Polly one third of the whole tract of land where on I now live to be laid off by a line beginning on Staunton River and running to my back line to include the lower end of my tract of land and the dwelling house 100 yards at least and then a straight line till it strikes the back line. This I lend to her during her life provided she should die before my son Samuel arrives at the age of 21 years, but should she live til that time my said son Samuel is then to have one half of the said third to be

laid off at the lower end, reserving to my said wife Polly the upper part with the dwelling house which said half is to be laid off agreeable to

quantity and quality.

Item, I give to my son Samuel the half of the third of land laid off for his mother, my said wife Polly, as within expresses, which he is to have possession of when twenty one years unless my said wife Polly should sconer die. I also give to him, my said son Samuel the whole of said third of my land at the death of my wife Polly, to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give to my son Cornelius my tract of land on Straightstone Creek in the County of Pittsylvania which I got in the division of the estate of Cornelius W. McHaney to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give to my daughter Polly the four following negroes and their increase viz: Dinnah, Fanny, Nelly and Chaney.

Item, It is my will that all the balance of my lands be divided between my sons John William, W. Haney (McHaney) and daughter Polly, my sons Joel, Cornelius and Samuel to have no part in this balance, they having been otherwise provided for, Cornelius and Samuel as within mentioned and Joel by my having paid considerable part for the land where on he now lives in said County of Halifax on Banister River.

Item, It is my wish that all and every part of my estate not within bequeathed be equally divided between all my seven children or ther seven representatives.

Lastly, I appointed my friends Armistead Barksdale and Elisha Barksdale my ears to this my last Will and Testament and guardian for my infant children. In Witness whereof I have here unto by my hand and seal this seventh day of December eighteen hundred and nineteen.

Codicil

I Have heretofore given my son Joel Hubbard a negro boy Phil about 15 or 16 years old at the time given. I have also here to fore given to my son Joel and to my son John to each of them a horse, bridle and saddle of the worth of about \$100 which they are to account for the two negroes as witness my hand and seal the 8th Day of December 1819.

At a Superior Court held for Halifax County Sept. 20.

The within last Will and Testament of Samuel Hubbard deceased was proved by the oaths of three witnesses there to subscribed and ordered to be recorded. Where in on the Motion of Armistead Barksdale the Executor there in named who made oath therto according to said Certificate is granted him for obtaining probate there of in due form, he giving security where upon he together with John H. Wimbish and Samuel Williams his securities entered into and acknowledged bond in the penalty of \$20,000/00 conditioned according to law. Sam Elisha Barksdale one of the executors there in named refused to qualify.

Teste: Samuel Williams C.H.S.C.

Samuel Hubbard was a farmer. He inherited the lands of his father, Joseph Hubbard. He bought other tracts of land according to the record and his will. He owned also a grist mill on Bull Creek. He had minor children when he made his will and his estate was presented in Court many times.

His son, Samuel Hubbard Jr., was a minor and may have attained the age of 21 years around Aug. 28, 1823, when the purpose of the record may have been a division of the estate of Samuel Hubbard, deceased. (Minutes Book 2, p. 38, Halifax Co., Va.).

It is said that Mary Hubbard, the widow of Samuel Hubbard, deceased, married on Nov. 20, 1826 Robert G. Tucker. (Reference cannot be given). She died in 1852 while the Hubbard children were selling her dower rights.

WILLIAM HUBBARD

William Hubbard, the son of Samuel and Mary (McHaney) Hubbard, was issued a marriage license on June 20, 1829 in Halifax Co., Va. to marry Letcey Frances. He died prior to April 29, 1837. D.B. 44, p. 229 reveals his half brother Joel sold at that time to McHaney Hubbard the land he inherited from William. It is also interesting that this land was part of the land Samuel, their father, inherited from their grandfather, Joseph Hubbard. A statement found in the Nov. 7, ____ issue of The Religious Herald states that William and his brother Samuel Hubbard died on the same day.

SAMUEL HUBBARD JR.

If Samuel Hubbard, the son of Samuel and Mary (McHaney) Hubbard, married, no information was found. In 1852 he had passed away. (D.8. 54, p. 537, Halifax Co., Va.). At this time his half brother, Joel Hubbard, sold to McHaney Hubbard a tract of land, his portion of his half brother, Samuel's estate. This land had the same history as the above land. This indicates that he had no heirs except his brothers and sister. The Nov. 7, 1828 issue of The Religious Herald states that Mr. Samuel Hubbard of Halifax died the same day his brother William Hubbard died.

MARY HUBBARD

Mary Hubbard (Polly), the daughter of Samuel and Mary (McHaney) Hubbard, married Richard G. Davenport.

CORNELIUS HUBBARD

Cornelius Hubbard, son of Samuel and Mary (McHaney) Hubbard, was issued a marriage license on Dec. 15, 1826 to marry Mary Dupuy. (See Mar. Reg. Halifax Co., Va.). His will was probated in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on May 22, 1866. His wife, Mary G. Hubbard, was living. Their children were:

- i. Robert 5. Hubbard
- ii. Mary C. Hubbard

Correct reference to this will is lost. On August 9, 1866, The Religious Herald, Richmond, Va., published an appreciation of Cornelius Hubbard, signed, "His admiring friend E.W.B.". This shows that Cornelius Hubbard died June 12, 1866 after an illness of 12 months and left his wife and children, Robert S. and Mary C. Hubbard. Quoting this article:

"Cornelius was a highly respected gentleman. He was a Magistrate in Campbell Co., Va. and of an affable and benevolent character. He was a friend to the poor. He was a wealthy man and was zealous in his efforts to

provide his family with all comforts and the best in education.

He was not a member of any church yet was interested and requested prayer. He was faithful in seeing his wife and family attend church and his prayers and those of others were answered, was declared."

MCHANEY HUBBARD

McHaney Hubbard, the son of Samuel and Mary (McHaney) Hubbard, was born, reared and died on the lands his father inherited from Joseph Hubbard in Halifax Co., Va. in 1799. A marriage license was issued to McHaney Hubbard and Mary Jane _____, whose surname is unknown at present since it has been impossible to search all the marriage registers. At least it is known that they resided in Halifax Co., Va. and reared their family there. There are several deeds in the Halifax Co. records showing that, through the years, McHaney Hubbard purchased the lands of his father, Samuel, when the heirs who owned them died or the land was being sold by heirs. If he did not buy all, it seems that he bought most of it.

McHaney and Mary Jane Hubbard had at least two sons. If he left a will, the compiler has not had access to it, and this could show their children positively. So far as known, they are:

- i. Samuel C. Hubbard
- ii. James C. Hubbard

MARRIAGES

SAMUEL C. HUBBARD

A marriage license was issued to Samuel C. Hubbard and Annie M. Carrington on Oct. 20, 1867. She is recorded as the daughter of Edward M. (and) E.S. Carrington of Halifax Co., Va. and he as the son of McHaney and Mary J. Hubbard. Rev. John T. Clark united them in marriage. (Halifax Co., Va. Mar. Reg.). For descendants see: Robert M. Hubbard, p. 469.

JAMES C. HUBBARD

James C. Hubbard and Harriet D. Ragland were issued a license to marry on May 21, 1867. She is listed as the daughter of Dabney and Harriet Ragland, and his parents are listed as McHaney and Mary J. Hubbard. (See Mar. Reg. Halifax Co., Va. Court House).

THE FARRIS FAMILY

Mattie Eula Farris, who married Joel Hubbard III in 1897, was born Oct. 24, 1874. She was the daughter of James Coleman Farris who married Martha Ann Pentecost, the daughter of Robert Pentecost, who married a Miss Davidson. Their children were:

LULA M. FARRIS

Lula M. Farris, 21 years old, married on Aug. 26, 1897 John W. Price, age 24 years, the son of N.C. and Phobe Price. Rev. W.E. Warren, pastor, united them in marriage.

The above are the sisters and brothers of Mattie Eula (Farris) Hubbard, the wife of Joel III.

THE STONE RELATIVES OF REV. JOEL HUBBARD'S DESCENDANTS

Rev. Joel Hubbard married first Elizabeth Stone. Her ancestor, Joshua Stone I, born before 1675 in Richmond Co., Va. and died there Dec. 15, 1717, married Mary (Coleman perhaps ?). Their children were:

Joshua Stone II, b. Oct. 20, 1716, d. 1774, mar. Nov. 22, 1738
 Wilmoth Bryant from Old North Farmham Parish Register, Old Richmond Co., Va.

The children of Joshua and Wilmoth (Bryant) Stone were:

- ii. Joshua Stone III, b. Oct. 13, 1744, d. 1822. He was a Rev. War soldier and had the rank of Captain. He mar. Mary Haskins on July 15, 1769. She was the daw. of William Haskins.
- iii. Benjamin Stone, b. Sept. 23, 1747. Mar. 1st Bettie Dobyns; 2nd Sarah Anderson.
- iv. Thomas Stone, b. Dec. 31, 1750, d. 1813. Mar. Sarah Alderson on June 20, 1780.
- v. John Stone, b. Nov. 25, 1754 in Old Richmond Co., Va. and d. July 10, 1824 in Halifax Co., Va. He was a private in Rev. War. He mar. Dolly Haskins 1st; 2nd time Lucy Haskins.
- vi. Moses Stone, b. May 12, 1758.

The will of Joshua Stone II or Jr. in Richmond Co., Va. which was exhibited at their Court was dated Feb. 15, 1774 and was probated Nov. 8, 1774. This will is recorded in a Richmond County Will Book on p. 202. He named no daughters in his will. The children of John Stone, born Nov. 25, 1754 in Old Richmond Co., Va. and died July 10, 1824 in Halifax Co., Va. and his first wife, who was Dolly Haskins, born Nov. 10, 1761 and died April 4, 1802, the daughter of William Haskins of Halifax Co., Va., were:

- i. James Haskins Stone, b. Oct. 17, 1778, d. Oct. 13, 1854. Mar. in 1803 Elizabeth Fitzgerald.
- ii. Benjamin Stone, b. Sept. 30, 1780, d. Aug. 19, 1839.
- iii. Nancy Stone, b. Nov. 6, 1783, mar. Rev. Robert Easley.
- iv. Mary Stone, b. Jan. 6, 1786, d. Jan. 10, 1810. Mar. a Mr. Matthews.
- v. Dolly C. Stone, b. May 6, 1788, d. Jan. 17, 1836. Mar. a Mr. William Collins.
- vi. Elizabeth Stone, b. Jan. 15, 1791, d. May 18, 1840. Mar. a Rev. Joel Hubbard. Data included elsewhere.

vii. Wilmoth Stone, b. Aug. 30, 1792, d. Apr. 7, 1818. viii. Sallie Stone, b. Sept. 6, 1794. Mar. a Mr. Prewett.

The above names, birth and death dates and entries, are from the John Stone Bible. They were verified before they were lost.

The Rev. War Service Record of Patriotic Service of John Stone, Halifax Co., Va. Records Class 10-188, quoting: "John Stone is appointed to furnish the wife of John Walden, a poor soldier, with as much corn as is by law allowed". The above data was in data accepted in the application of Mrs. Elizabeth (Bettie) Stone Perrows for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Her Nat. No. is 142,256.

Joshua Stone I and Joshua Stone II lived and died in Old Richmond Co., Va. John Stone, a private in the Rev. War and Capt. Joshua Stone in the same war were brothers and sons of Joshua Stone II. The children of Joshua Stone II moved to Halifax Co., Va. Captain Joshua Stone was interred in the cemetery at Mullberry Baptist Church. His grave has been marked by a NSDAR Chapter. His brother, John Stone, lived near the same church and may be interred there.

SECOND MARRIAGE

John Stone, born 1754 in Richmond Co., Va. and died 1824 in Halifax Co., Va., married the second time on Dec. 2, 1802 Lucy Hawkins, born in April, 1769 and died May 4, 1810. Their children were:

- i. John H. Stone, b. Oct. 4, 1803, mar. Elizabeth J. Hannah (it seems) in 1824.
- ii. Tabitha Stone, b. Apr. 5, 1805, mar. a Mr. Easley.
- iii. Page Finney Stone, b. Mar. 1807, d. Nov., 1807.
- iv. Mary Page Finney Stone, b. Jan. 11, 1809.

The above names, birth and death dates were from the John Stone family Bible. Attested. The will of John Stone is recorded in Halifax Co., Va. W.B. 13, p. 245. It was dated Jan. 30, 1824 and probated July 26, 1824. Bettie (Stone) Perrow, (Mrs. F.K. Sr.), Locust Hill Farm, Hurt, Va., sent the compiler the above copy of John Stone's Bible Record. Since this record was copied, which was verified years ago, that Bible has been lost. Mr. William C. Hubbard secured the same information and shared it in 1950 with this compiler.

Mrs. Perrow, in a letter written on Jan. 21, 1950 to Mr. William C. Hubbard, Appomatox, Va., stated that her father was John B. Stone. Yet her lineage has not been given to the present date. As the compiler understands her letter, her ancestors were: (1) Joshua Stone I (b. prior to 1675, d. 1717); (2) Joshua Stone II (1716-1764); (3) John Stone, (b. 1754- d. 1824) a younger brother of Capt. Joshua Stone III (b. 1744- d. 1822).

THE FAMILY AND DESCENDANTS

OF

JOHN HUBBARD

1738-1793

John Hubbard, born Oct. 24, 1738, perhaps in Amelia Co., Va., was the son of Joseph Hubbard and his first wife, who were residents of Amelia Co., Va. in 1740. He died in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on July 31, 1793. He grew up in Amelia Co., Va. on his father, Joseph Hubbard's, farm, situated on Northside of Flatt Creek. It is known that he resided there until his father deeded to

him 200 acres of land on Oct. 27, 1757. This land was situated on Ferguson's Horsepen Branch of Flatt Creek and near his parents' home. It is assumed that John Hubbard resided with his parents until his marriage, but this date is not known due to Amelia Co., Va. losing marriage bonds. It will be seen that they did not record this date in their Bible Record. He married Keziah Pigg, the daughter of John and Ann (Clement) Pigg. She was born May 20, 1745 and was only 12 years old when the above deed to John Hubbard was dated in 1787. He was only 19 years old at that time. It is reasonable to state that they were not married until after she was 15 years of age in 1760 and he was already 21 years of age. They settled on his farm and lived there in Amelia Co., Va. until 1785. This deed is recorded in Joseph Hubbard's section. This gift of 200 acres of land came when he was 19 years old, and on this land, all of their children were born except their youngest child, Sarah Hubbard.

Soon after their marriage, John and Keziah, on Oct. 20, 1763, dated a deed to Christopher Ford for 14 acres of their land. This deed was signed by John Hubbard and Kezziah Hubbard. (D.B. 8, p. 215, Amelia Co., Va.). Ten years later they sold 14 acres to Moses Seay. Deed dated July 21, 1773 and recorded Aug. 27, 1773. John Hubbard and Kezia Hubbard signed. They held the rest of their land until they were planning to move to Pittsylvania Co., Va. Her parents moved to Pittsylvania Co., Va. many years earlier and his father moved to Halifax Co., Va. around 1785. There is evidence that John and Keziah had been thinking of moving to Pittsylvania Co. some years before they did move there to settle near her mother. This is found in Old Surveys Vol. I, Pittsylvania County, Virginia. On page 352 is found this record, quoting: "Jan. 31, 1781 Surveyed for John Hubbard by Virtue of an old Entry 200 A. of land in the fork of Polecat Creek and Bounded as follows To wit: Beginning at Hezekiah Pigg's Cr Poplar on one fork of the said Cr and thence to a new line N 88 E 162 ps to a Gum on the other fork of the said Cr and down the same N 63 W 44 p^{S} Crossing the fork of the said C^{r} to a hickory of R.O. S 13 W 94 p^S to the pointers in Piqq's Line aforsd & thence the same S 3D W 46 p^S to a W.O. S 19 W 10 p^S to a W.O. S 50 W 34 p^S to a W.O. S 30 W 40 pS to a W.O. S 21 E 70 pS to the Beginning".

Hezekiah Pigg was the brother-in-law of John Hubbard and this survey was along his lines.

Besides this survey in 1781 it will be seen that he sold his son John in 1884 121 acres of his Amelia Co., Va. lands and in 1785 the remainder of his Amelia Co. lands. This was in October, 1785, after the birth of his son Davis Hubbard on May 16, 1785. They evidently moved to Pitts. Co., Va. around that Oct. Keziah Hubbard's father, John Pigg, died in 1785. His will was dated Oct. 10, 1782 and was probated Reb. 21, 1785. This will is included under his section. Keziah inherited land from her father which was a part of his own plantation. This meant they could reside near her parents. This was another reason for moving to Pittsylvania Co. Furthermore, the above survey made in 1781, according to the records in the Virginia State Library, Grants K 1783-1784, Part 2, pp. 499 & 500, was recorded in March, 1784 for John Hubbard, as follows:

"Benjamin Harrison Esquire, Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia. To all to whom these presents shall come Greetings. Know ye that in Consideration of the Ancient Com ... of one pound Sterling paid by John Hubbard into the Treasury of this Commonwealth there is granted by the said Commonwealth unto the said John Hubbard a Certain Tract or parcel of Land, Containing Two hundred Acres by Survey bearing date the third day of January one

thousand seven hundred and Eighty one, lying and being in the County of Pittsylvania in the fork of Pole Cat Ereek and bounded as followeth to Wit: Beginning at Hezekiah Piggs Corner poplar on one fork of the said Creek and thence a new line North Eighty eight degrees East one hundred and Sixty-two poles to a Gum on the other fork of the said Creek and down the same and meander to Christopher Hutchings :::line and thence the same North Sixty three degrees West forty four poles Crossing the fork of the Said Creek to a hickory and Red oak South thirteen degrees West ninety four poles to a pointer in Piggs line aforesaid and thence the same South thirty degrees West forty six poles to a white oak South Fifty degrees West Fifty four poles to a White oak South Twenty one degrees East Seventy poles to the Beginning, with appurtenances To Have and to hold the said Tract or parcel of Land with its appurtenances to the said John Hubbard and his Heirs forever. In Witness whereof the said Benjamin Harrison Esquire, Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia hath hereunto set his hand and caused the lesser seal of the said Commonwealth to be affixed at Richmond on the Eighteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Eighty four and of the Commonwealth the Eighth.

John Hubbard had possession of his lands on Pole Cat Creek before they moved to Pitt. Co. The next spring after their arrival, Kezziah and her husband, John Hubbard, sold the lands she had inherited from her father. This deed is recorded here to reveal the reason. (See D.B. 7 (1783-1786) Pitts. Co., Va., pp. 623-624).

This Indenture dated 17 April 1786 between John Hubbard and Kezziah his wife of Pittsylvania County Virginia and Joseph Echols of Halifax, Witnesseth that whereas John Pigo Dec'd late of the County of Pittsylvania did by his last Will and Testament dully recorded in the Court of the sd County reference there unto had more fully appear did give unto his Daughter Keziah Hubbard one tract or Parcel of Land being Part of Land where on he Lived in Pittsylvania County and bounded as his said Will Describes. Now for and in consideration of the sum of Two hundred and fifty pounds Current Money in hand paid by the said Joseph Eckhols to the said John Hubbard the Receit where of is hereby acknowledged they the sd John Hubbard and Kezziah, his wife have granted bargained and sold aliened and confirmed unto the said Joseph Eckholds and by their presents do grant barqain alien sell and confirm to the ed Joseph Eckhols his Heirs & Assigns all the right tittle Clame and Demand that they the said John Hubbard & Kezziah wife have or ought to have to all and any part of the afore mentioned Land According the aforesaid Will expresses it with all the woods, houses and orchards and all the other Appurtenances to the only proper use of the said Joseph Eckhols his heirs and assigns forever and the said John Hubbard & Kezziah his wife doth Covenant and grant for themselves and their Heirs to and with to and with the said Joseph Eckhols his heirs and assigns against the Clames Demand of themselves and their heirs forever In witness where of the partie here unto have set their hands and fixed their seals the day & year above written.

The within Indenture was acknowledged by the within named John Hubbard to be his Act and Deed and Keziah hie wife being privily examined as the Law Directs Relinquished her right of Dower right to the within granted Land and premises Conveyed by her said Husband all which was ordered to be recorded

by the Court.

At the same time John Hubbard was acquiring other lands. A Deed dated April 3, 1786 in which Jesse Robertson sold John Hubbard 400 acres of land for 200 L Current Money was recorded on April 17, 1786. This was witnessed by Hezekiah Pigg, Edy Owen and Thomas Dickerson. Signed by Jesse Robertson. (D.B. 7 (1783-1786) Pitts. Co., Va. pp. 633, 634.) On May 16, 1786, John Hubbard requested another Survey for land in Pitts. Co. The survey having been made, there was a period of waiting before the grant.

In the meantime, an Indenture dated Jun 25, 1788, was made by Samuel Emerson, a citizen of Lincoln Co., (perhaps N.C.), sold to John Hubbard 400 acres of land on Little Bearskin Creek for 110 L Current Money. This deed was witnessed by Joel Short and William Short. Signed by Samuel Emerson. This deed was recorded on Aug. 18, 1788. (D.B. 8 (1787-1780) Pitts. Co., Va., p. 290). John Hubbard also bought 50 acres on which was a grist mill from George Robertson on Nov. 19, 1792. Recorded in D.B. 9, p. 287. This last purchase of land was made only a few months before his will was dated on June 23, 1793 and his last grant of land was dated on July 26, 1793, around a month after he made his will and only 5 days before his death on July 31. 1793. This grant is recorded in Grants 28, 1792-1793, quoting:

"Henry Lee Esquire, Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia to all to whom these presents shall come Greetings. Know ye that by Virtue and in consideration of the Ancient Composition of two pounds fifteen shillings sterling paid by John Hubbard into the treasury of this Commonwealth there is granted by the said Commonwealth unto the said John Hubbard a certain tract or parcel of Land containing five hundred and fifty acres by an inclusive Survey bearing date the sixteenth day of May one thousand seven hundred and sighty six, lying and being in the County of Pittsylvania on the Branches of Bearskin Creek and bounded as followeth to wit: Beginning at Thomas Hodges corner whiteoak in Samuel Emerson's line and thence along Emersons lines South seventy nine degrees West ninety two poles to a red oak sapling across the East fork of Bearskin South twenty five degrees West eighty eight poles, crossing the said fork to a white oak, South thirty five degrees West two hundred and ten poles crossing a branch to pointers on John Pigg's Road North forty two degrees West one hundred and sixteen poles to a Black Jack North twenty five degrees East one hundred and sixty five poles to pointers. North forty nine degrees East one hundred and fourteen poles to a chestnut tree North twenty seven degrees West thirty six poles crossing over all branch to a gum sapling, North eight and a half degrees East ninety six poles to a spanish oak South eighty nine degrees West fifty four poles to two chestnats thence new lines North ten degrees West eighty four poles to a red oak North seventy seven degrees East one hundred and thirty four poles to a white oak, South eighty six degrees East eighty poles to a chestnut South thirteen degrees East forty one poles to a red oak South forty seven degrees West thirty six poles to pointers South thirty degrees East sixty six poles to two red oaks in Thomas Hodges line aforesaid and thence along his lines South seventy degrees West fourteen poles to a red oak and South twenty degrees East one hundred and thirty four poles to the beginning with its appurtenances. To have and to hold the said tract or parcel of Land with its appurtenances to the said John Hubbard and his Heirs forever. In Witness where of the said Henry Lee Esquire Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia hath here unto set his hand and caused the lesser seal of the commonwealth to be affixed at Richmond on the twenty sixth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety three

and of the Commonwealth the Eighteenth.

John Hubbard died five days after this was signed by Gov. Henry Lee. It is doubtful that he ever saw this grant. He had confidence, of course, in its delivery, since he made his son, Isham Hubbard, heir to this land, as will be seen in the body of a deed that will be mentioned in his section of this study.

It is seen that in Amelia County, he owned 200 acres of land when he was 19 years old. His land grants amounted to 750 acres. He purchased in four transactions in Pittsylvania Co., Va. 1,050 acres. With the land Kezziah inherited, they owned over 2,000 acres of land during his life of less than 55 years.

He was a farmer all of his life. His will proves he also owned a grist mill and had great plans for this.

During the Revolutionary War period, he was living in Amelia Co., Va. He had a large family. One son was a private in the army, and the other sons may have been too young. There is a record of their father's contribution as a loyal patriot of the American Cause in Amelia Co., Va. Public Service Claims Certificates Amelia, p. 246, quoting: "Amelia County:

By appointment of his Excellⁿ the Gov^r and pursuant to an Act of Assembly for procuring supply of provisions and other necessaries for the use of the army I have examined into the State and quantity of provisions &c in the possession of John Hubbard and find that he can spear ten and one quarter gallons of Brandy which I have purchased for the use of the army at twenty five pounds P^{Γ} gallon as by the said Act is Directed. Certified under my hand this the 9th day of Sep^r 1780.

For those who may question the reason for this item, the answer is before the discovery of an agent that produces anesthesia as used by surgeons today, a patient was put to sleep by giving enough Brandy when it was necessary to perform an operation of any nature. The evidence that John Hubbard complied with this request is found on p. 3 in "Index to Court Booklet Public Service Claims of Amelia Co., Va.", Vol. 2, p. 3, quoting: "Sir:

Agreeable to your request of the 5th of last month I herewith send you a return of my proceedings as Commissioner for procuring provisions for the Army. You have here a list of the Certificates by me given the persons name and the sum due him and the date of the Certificate which are as followeth: "Among these was "date 1780 Sep. 9 John Hubbard L 236 s 5 paid."

JOHN HUBBARD*S WILL Dated June 23, 1793 Prob. Dec. 16, 1793

In the name of God Amen John Hubbard of Pittsylvania County being very sick in body, but in perfect sense and memory and calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain this to be my last Will and Testament in the following manner

and form. Item, I leave to my beloved wife Kezziah Hubbard the plantation where on I now live with two hundred acres of land also my Gris Mill with all my Estate both royal and personal to her for fifteen years. I also appoint my son Isham Hubbard to have the sole management of the said Estate for the said term and to be paid out of the said Estate for his trouble. And after fifteen years my hole and sole Estate to be equally divided between my living children and my Wife, except my Land.

Item, I give to my son Joseph Hubbard after the said fifteen years the Plantation where on I now live, his mother keeping possession her life, the said tn (two) hundred that I lent to my wife

Item I give to my son Isham Hubbard after the term of fifteen years my Mill and land she stands on with one hundred acres of land on the North side of my Survey.

Item, I give to my son Samuel Hubbard to (two) hundred acres laid of (off) one Pole cat Creek of Canester River.

Item, I give to my son Hezekiah Hubbard the remaining part of my land pattant to Samuel Emerson.

Item, I give to my grandson John League the plantation his father made at the head of the Creek I live on with one hundred acres of land.

Item, I give to my son Davis Hubbard the remainder of my land lieing on the north side of the tract I now live on containing three hundred and fifty acres.

Item, I give to my son John Hubbard's children 5 shillings to them forever I also appoint my loving wife Kezziah Hubbard and my son Isham Hubbard to be my hole and sole Executors of this my last Will and Testament in Witness where of I have here unto set my hand and seal this twenty third day of June one thousand seven hundred and ninety three.

At a Court held for Pittsylvania County the 16th day of Dec 1793 this last Will and Testament of John Hubbard deceased was exhibited into Court and proved by the Oaths of two of the Witnesses there to and ordered to be recovered.

The above Will was that of a very sick man seems true. In 15 years his youngest son would be 23 years old and the youngest daughter 19 years old and regarded to be of age at 18 years. He set that date for the settling of his estate. The result will be seen as each one is covered in the pages ahead.

This will names the living sons, the living son of a deceased son. His beloved wife Keziah Hubbard is secured for 15 years, yet after Joeeph Hubbard becomes the owner, she still has possession. Herein lies an interesting result of this plan. The will does not name any of his daughters except as among all "my living children". Fortunately there is still extant their Bible record that helps and his wife, Keziah Hubbard's, will. See this later.

The following Bible record is in a very old Bible in the possession of one of their great, great granddaughters, Mae Lawrence Reynolds (Mrs. C.L.).

A description of that Hubbard Bible was recently published, quoting: "Biblical scholars know the Books of Maccabees are part of what has been designated as the Apocrypha. The Apocrypha was an integral part of the King

James version of the Bible until 1827 when the British and Foreign Bible Society, followed by the American Bible Society and other publishers, decided to omit it in their editions. All 12 apocryphal books are included in the Hubbard Bible's Old Testament.

The Old Testament is preceeded in this Bible by such rites as "The Ministration of Public Baptism of Infants to be used in the Church"; "The Order for the Visitation of the Sick" and "The Thanksgiving of Women after

Childbirth" commonly called the Churching of Women.

In addition, this Bible, which is published in the colonial style with "f" replacing "s", contains a special version of the Psalms of David. The page preceding these Psalms in English meter reads, *A New Version of the Psalms of David fitted to the Tunes used in Churches by N. Brady D.D. Chaplain in Ordinary and N. Tate, Esq., Poet Laureat to His Majesty."

For the sake of every one living who cares, and for those in future years who will desire to know the truth, an exact copy of those records is herein recorded. The first page has also been secured to assure the reader of the age of this Bible which is today regarded one of the oldest in the county.

On another page is recorded John Borum Born Mch. 30 1773. Judith Borum Born June 14th 1775.

On another page is recorded Mary Hubbard, wife of Benjamin Hubbard was born <u>Jan. 9th, 1745</u> & Died May 27, 1781. My second wife Born Aug. 7th 1739 & Died Nov^r 13, 1783. Third wife Born 1746. Died 1790 Feby 4th day.

Patience Hubbard wife of Samuel Hubbard was born March 30th 1771. Joel Hubbard was born Sept 8th 1792. Sarah Hubbard was Born Oct. 29, 1794 Died April 13th 1795.

On another page the following is recorded: Isham Hubbard was married Oct. 23, 1794. My wife Sarah Hubbard was born July 12, 1776. Lucy Hubbard was born Feby 28, 1795. Lavonia Hubbard was born Oct. 6th 1797. John Hubbard was born Oct. 1st 1799.

The above completes the data for the family of John Hubbard (1738-1793) as included in this specific Bible.

There is on another page in this Bible, records that cannot be the records of John Hubbard's relatives. The top line is illegible that may tell the surname of the children recorded. After 200 years no one can place them. Under an illegible sentence:

- 1. Barnet (?) or Harriet (?) born April 18, 1768.
- 2. Patty born August 12, 1771.
- 3. Jones (?) born Feb. 29th 1772.
- 4. Quincy born 5th 1774.
- 5. Polly born Feb. 4th, 1776.

This next record is connected with the family of Benjamin League in some way. His family lived in Amelia Co., Va. at one time. The birthdates of Judith League's children;

- 1. Mary Ann Sept. 15, 1765.
- 2. Betsy Aug. 8, 1772.
- 3. Fanny May 28, 1774.
- 4. Lucy Oct. 18, 1776.
- 5. William League was born Feb. 21, 1783.

There is still another record in this Bible. After the death of Keziah Hubbard, her son, Joseph Hubbard, in his late years, lived in the home of his nephew, Franklin Clement Hubbard. Before Joseph died he deeded all of his possessions to his nephew. Among them was this Bible of his father and mother, John and Keziah Hubbard. The dates prove this record was made years after their deaths. Evidently Suse was a slave in the family of Franklin Clement Hubbard, quoting:

"Harriet of Suse was born July 31st 1857.

Andrew of Suse was born May 7th 1859.

Lewis of Suse was born Feb 14, 18 ?.

Isabel of Suse was born Oct. 26, 1862."

After many years of study, through marriage records, wills, deeds etc. found in Courthouses and the facts recalled accurately by those contacted years ago, the names torn off or marred by the torn away portion on the margin of the birth records, the correct name of each of John and Keziah Hubbard's children has been verified.

"eth" proved to be Edith Hubbard.

"Hezh" was Hezekiah.

"sekiah" was Hezekiah.

" Hubbard was Davis Hubbard.

"h" Hubbard was Sarah Hubbard, their youngest child.

The Bible record in John and Keziah Hubbard's Bible shows a closeness

in this Hubbard Family. Two brothers, Benjamin and Samuel record some facts dear to them; so did John's sister, Judith (Hubbard) Borum. See the section for each of these for real facts. Each has been recorded under Joseph Hubbard's family.

Franklin C. Hubbard's family found in this Bible is included in his section of the Hubbard History.

THE DATA FOLLOWING WILL COVER ONLY THE FAMILY AND DESCENDANTS

OF JOHN AND KEZIAH (PIGG) HUBBARD.

JOSEPH HUBBARD 1762-1851

Joseph Hubbard, the oldest child of John and Keziah (Pigg) Hubbard, was named for his grandfather, Joseph Hubbard. He was born in Amelia County, Virginia on Feb. 13, 1762. He lived to be 89 years, 5 months and 15 days old and spent most of his life in Pittsylvania Co., Va. where he died on July 28, 1857. He grew up on his father's land on the banks of Ferguson's Horsepen Branch in Amelia Co., Va. No doubt he went wading, swimming and fishing in those waters. The name of the branch suggests that it may have been there that he learned to love horses, that came to be the great sport of his life, years later.

His grandparents, John and Ann (Clement) Pigg, resided in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and he may have made frequent visits with them. He was in that County in 1780 when he was around 18 years old. He found an opportunity to enter the service of his Country in the Rev. War as a substitute for a Mr. William Harrison. He accepted a six months tour as will be seen in his Declaration of Service. He was under Capt. Isaac Clement, who was his mother's first cousin. After this tour of duty he volunteered again and served a month. After his return he may have spent the most of his life in Pittsylvania County. He certainly lived there after 1785 when his parents came to live there.

It is true that after his father's death and his brothers and sisters were married and lived elsewhere, he came to be the heir to the 200 acres on which his mother resided. So long as she lived he made his home with her. He did his own farming and she carried on her own affairs as she had always done after his father's death.

Joseph Hubbard never married. He acquired more land and was a slave holder. He also was interested in horses and owned fine horses and enjoyed horse racing. Tradition claims he had a race track and this sport netted him a great deal of money which he enjoyed spending.

After his mother's death in 1838, he lived in the home of his favorite nephew, Franklin Clement Hubbard, son of his brother, Hezekiah Hubbard. Prior to his death he deeded all of his lands and slaves to his hephew in whose home he had lived for 13 years. During those years he had maintained his own affairs separately from his nephew. Thus the 1850 census report shows he has no occupation and only 850 dollars worth of personal property. He had given his wealth to his nephew. This was a deed by Joseph Hubbard "for natural love and affection and divers other good causes" to his nephew Franklin C. Hubbard, granting him all his the said Joseph Hubbards lands, negroes and all other property he pssessed. The wdeed was dated Sept. 17, 1850. His witnesses were James A. Mitchell, Absolom Fuller and Willis G. Cousins. (See D.B. 52 (1849-1850) Pitts. Co., Va., p. 366).

THE REVOLUTIONAREY WAR DECLARATION

nF.

JOSEPH HUBBARD

1762-1851

State of Virginia Pittsylvania County to wit:

On this 18 day of March in the year One thousand Eight hundred and thirty three personally appeared in Open Court before the Court of the County aforesaid now sitting Joseph Hubbard a resident of the County and State aforesaid aged Seventy One years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his Oath make the following Declaration in Order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832. That he entered the Service of the United States in the State Troops of Virginia under the following Officers and served as herein Stated. Early in the Spring in the year 1780 he substituted himself in place of William Harrison (usually called Carpenter William Harrison as there were in the County at that time several William Harrisons) for a six months tour of duty. This was in Pittsylvania County Virginia. He entered the service under Capt. Isaac Clement of said County. He marched first to Colo Peter Perkins 8 On Dan River in the said County from thence to Hillsborough in North Carolina, thence to Deep River in North Carolina, thence to Mass^r Ferry on Peedee River, thence to Col^o Rangley's Mills, sometimes called Rougley's dwelling where he joined the main army the Night before Gates^S defeat. In the march he was with four regiments of Virginia Militia commanded by Genl Stephens. He himself was attached to the third Virginia Regiment which was commanded by Col^o Faulkner. The Col^o Rougley above named was a Tory and had deserted his home. After joining the main Army at that place which was commanded by Genl Gates the next morning before day the Army was put in Motion avowedly at attack the British Army by surprise which was them at Camden in South Carolina as well as the applicant remembers about twelve miles off. The American Army had marched four or five Miles when the advanced guard of the two armies met and had a smart engagement after being Considerably reinforced on each side. After some time each side withdrew and there was no more fighting until day. As soon as the engagement of the advanced guards ceased the American Army formed line. Regular troops in the Centre - North Carolina Militia on the right - Virginia Militia on the left. On the approach of day the British Army under Cornwallis advanced and formed quite leisurely by platoons.

In the American Army there was a positive Order that there should be no firing without Orders, which orders were never given even to this day that this applicant ever knew or heard of. When the British Army had formed they cheered huzzard for King George fired and charged bayonet. The Virginia Militia immediately broke and fled and no doubt the North Carolina Militia done the same. The Regulars stood their ground and were mostly cut off. It would be as vain as useless to attempt a description of the fight of the Militia. At this day it is laughable to reflect on it. Of the four Virginia Regiments which fled from the Enemy four Companies were collected and this applicant amongst them at New Garden near Guilford C.H. North Carolina, the balance he never knew what became of them, some he supposes ran clear home & some went on by home no doubt and hid in the Mountains. In a short time they moved to Guilford C.H. Capt Walthall then commanded the Company this applicant was attached to. Majr Henry Conway from Pittsylvania County Va commanded the whole. At Guilford C.H. he remained until the last day of Oct. of

that year 1780 when he was discharged from the Six Months tour by Capt. Walthal. He states further that he was so short a time in the main Army that he did not learn the names of any of the Regular Officers or the numher of their Regiments. The Troops that were left at Guilford C.H. North Carolina were for the purpose of keeping the Tories in check and once or twice they were marched short distances against bodies of Tories. He states that he served a full six Months tour and his discharge was burned together with most of his other papers when his home was burned in 1807. He further states that he had no documentary evidence of his Service and knows of no other person by whom he can prove his service except John Harris of this County whose affidavit is herewith annexed and that he is so aged and infirm & now in the Poor House of said County, that he cannot without great trouble be brought to Court. He further states as additional Service that in the Winter 1781 Genl Green was then flying before Cornwallis in North Carolina and there was a Call for volunteers. He went forward as a volunteer under the Command of Capt. Gabriel Shelton of Pittsylvania County Virginia. They marched into Halifax County Virginia Crossed Dan River at Boyd's Ferry, in North Carolina. Capt. Shelton was taken sick and I was enrolled in Capt. Thomas Smith's Company. We were continually on the alert watching the movements of the Enemy and had frequent skirmishes. We had severe skirmish at Whitesides Mill on Dan River where a number were killed and wounded. He got leave of Capt. Smith to return home for some clothing as I had left home in great haste unprepared and on returning to the army he met the balance of the troops coming home discharged & came home with them. Of course he got no discharge at that time of Service. He served at that time One Month. To the Interrogationes directed to be propounded by the War Department he answered as follows.

To the first he says that he was born in the County of Amelia in the State of Virginia on the 13th day of February 1762.

To the second He says that there is a record of his age in a large family Bible in the possession of his Mother (who is still living) in Pittsylvania County Virginia.

To the third. He answers in the County of Pittsylvania Va. where he has resided ever since and still resides.

To the fourth. He has answered in the Body of the Declaration.

To the fifth. He has answered in the body of this Declaration as far as he can.

To the sixth. He has answered in the body of this Declaration.

To the eeventh. He states the names of Richard B. Beck, John Mitchell and James Cobbs.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or Annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the Agency of any State.

Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid.

Joseph Hubbard

This day John Harris a resident of Pittsylvania County in the State of Virginia personally appeared before mera Justice of the Peace for the County of Pittsylvania in the State aforesaid and made Oath that Joseph Hubbard, who is an applicant for a pension was a revolutionary soldier, that he served a tour of duty as a soldier with me in the year 1780 in Captain Isaac Clement's Company of Militia from Pittsylvania County, that we were stationed at Hillsborough in the State of North Carolina and marched from there to Mass^S Ferry on Peedee River, that I was left at that place as a guard and the said Joseph Hubbard marched on to the South, that after Genl Gates was defeated I met with

the said Hubbard at New Garden in the County of Guilford in the State of North Carolina. I was marched from that place to Guilford Court House where I was discharged in the Month of September 1780 and left the said Joseph Hubbard still in the Service as a Soldier and believe he was honorably discharged. Given under my hand this 17th day December 1832.

We, Richard B. Beck, a Clergyman residing in Pittsylvania County Virginia and John Mitchell and James Cobbs residing in the same County hereby certify that we are well acquainted with Joseph Hubbard who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration that we believe him to be 71 years of age that he is reported in the Neighborhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the Revolution and that we concur in that opinion. Sworn and subscribed the day and year aforesaid.

And the said Court do hereby declare their opinion after the investigation of the Matter and after putting the interrogations prescribed by the War Department that the above named applicant was a Revolutionary soldier and served as he states. And the Court further certifies that it appears to them that Richard B. Beck who has signed the preceding Certificate is a clergyman resident in the County of Pittsylvania and that John Mitchell and James Cobbs who have also signed the same are residents in the County of Pittsylvania and are credible persons and that their statement is entitled to credit. I William Tunstall Clerk of the Court of Pittsylvania in the State of Virginia do hereby certify that the foregoing contains the original proceedings of the said Court in the Matter of the application of Joseph Hubbard for a pension.

JOHN HUBBARD

John Hubbard, the second child of John and Keziah Hubbard, was born in Amelia Co., Va. on Sept. 3, 1764. He was born, lived his entire life and died on the farm that was his father's home. His life was very short, he died on Aug. 20, 1788, 17 days after he was 24 years of age.

He married while quite young a girl named Rachel, whose surname has not been learned due to Amelia Co., Va. not preserving marriage bonds data. Their marriage may have been prior to 1782 since he was listed on his own tax list and separate from his father, John Hubbard Sr. This tax list shows John Hubbard Jr. has 2 titheables and he names his extra tithe as Sam his slave. John Jr., at the age of 18, was independent and managing his own affairs. John Hubbard Jr. was without a doubt farming on his father's land and was happy in his activities since his father made the following deed to John Jr. that is recorded in D.B. 17 (1784-1786) Amelia Co., Va., p. 120.

John Hubbard /LS/

This Indenture made the 23 day of December in the year of our Lord one. thousand seven hundred and Eighty four Between John Hubbard the Elder of the One part and John Hubbard, the younger of the other part Both of the County of Amelia Witnesseth that for and in consideration of the natural love and Effection that he the said John Hubbard bears to his son John Hubbard hath granted Bargained Aliened and Confirmed unto his said son one hundred and Twenty Acres be the same more or less and is part of the Tract of Land whereon the said John Hubbard now lives and is Bounded as follows Recinning pointers in Moses Seays line thence along a new line South thirty five degrees West One Hundred and ninety poles to pointers and a Stone in Henry Harper's Line thence North three and a half degrees West one hundred and Three poles to a poplar in Hughes and Jones's Line thence North thirty Seven degrees East 200 poles to pointers in Seav's line, thence South One decree West 102 poles to the Beginning To Have and to Hold all and Singulars the said Land with the appurtenances to the said John Hubbard Jun I during the natural life of his said father but not to sell it or any part of it during his Father's life and at his decease to hold occupy and Enjoy the same to him and his heirs forever. In witness where of the said John Hubbard Sen^r has set his hand and affixed his seal the day and year above written.

In the presence of Jacob Seay Reuben Seay William Barding

Recorded at a Court 24 Feb. 1785.
Teste: John Wilv D.C.

This deed is recorded here to record the love of John Hubbard for his son and also to show that John Hubbard Senior was one who loved the lands his father Joseph had given to him. He did not wish to know these acres were not still owned by the son so long as he was still living.

In less than a year John Hubbard Sr. deeded the rest of this farm he had owned since he was 19 years old, to John Jr. This deed however, exacted of the son some remuneration. Dated Oct. 31, 1785, it was recorded Dec. 22, 1785, (D.B. No. 17, p. 304). Two years and 8 months later, John Hubbard Jr. passed away on Aug. 20, 1788. Evidently he had not complied with his part for securing the land in the last deed before he passed away. John Hubbard Jr. and his wife, Rachel Hubbard, had a son and a daughter, when he passed away: they were:

- i. Lewis Hubbard
- ii. Nancy Hubbard

On July 5, 1791 Robert Sadler and Rachel Hubbard were married. It seems he may have been a minister and she a widow with two children. That same year John Hubbard Sr. of Pittaylvania Co. dated a deed on Dec. 29, 1791 to sell to Richard Wilson of Amelia Co., Va. the 100 acres that John Hubbard Jr. had not settled for prior to his death. (See D.B. 19 (1789-1794) Amelia Co., Va., p. 176). This left the gift of 120 acres a home for Robert and Rachel Saddler and his grandson, Lewis Hubbard and granddaughter, Nancy Hubbard. Whether they lived on the land or not cannot be stated.

In 1782 John Hubbard Jr. listed Sam, his slave, as one of his tithes. He listed 3 horses and 7 cattle that year. John Hubbard paid his taxes every year until his death. In 1787, his tax census shows 2 slaves, 1 above 21 years of age and 1 under 16, 1 horse and 2 cattle. After his death 1 slave and 1 horse continued to be reported along with 121 acres of land for

the John Hubbard Estate until 1817. This slave was Sam. He lived on that farm until he was an old man, is verified by a record found, quoting: "Sam an old negro belonging to the estate of John Hubbard exempted from paying further taxes". Sam evidently loved his master John Hubbard Jr.

Finally, the children were grown. Lewis Hubbard, the son, was 21 years old some time before he sold his portion of the John Hubbard Estate. In D.B. 23 (1808-1814) Amelia Co., Va., p. 209, is recorded a deed dated Sept. 28, 1910, in which Lewis Hubbard sold John Jeter for 64 L Va. currency, 53 1/3 acres that adjoined the dower lands of Mrs. Rachel Sadler. This is the last information for Lewis Hubbard.

The remaining part of the John Hubbard estate was sold by a deed dated Sept. 25, 1813 when Robert Sadler and his wife Rachel sold to John Chappell for the sum of 159 dollars 53 1/3 acres by survey which was, quoting: "the one half of the said land being held in right of dower by the said Rachel, she formerly having been the wife of John Hubbard dec'd, the other half having been conveyed by Lewis Hubbard to the said Rachel in fee semple". Recorded Jan. 27, 1814. See D.B. # 24 (1814-1817), p. 2. This seems to close Hubbard ownership of lands in Amelia Co., Va. They came in 1734 and were all gone, perhaps, 80 years later in 1814. In those years, four generations had lived in Amelia Co., Va.

NANCY HUBBARD

Nancy Hubbard, born in Amelia Co., Va. before 1788, was the daughter of John and Rachel Hubbard. She grew up in the home of her stepfather, Robert Sadler, who married her mother in July, 1791.

In May, 1809, Nancy Hubbard married John Sadler in Amelia Co., Va. See Amelia Co., Va. Mar. 8 onds on p. 34, W. & M. Quar., Vol. 17, Series 1. In the above transcriptions in selling the John Hubbard estate, no land was alotted to Nancy Hubbard Sadler. If she was included, the recording was not found. According to the two deeds the 121 acres, when surveyed, was 106 2/3 unless Nancy did receive a share. The question arises, Why? Did she die? If not deceased in 1810, there are no known facts.

BARNET HUBBARD

Barnet Hubbard, the third child and third son of John and Keziah (Pigg) Hubbard, was born in Amelia Co., Va. on Sept. 11, 1766 and died there Nov. 15, but the year of death was not written. Tradition claimed he was a young man when he died. Since his father did not include him in his will, he died before 1793. Since his mother did not leave the heirs of her son Barnet a legacy, there were no heirs. Therefore this son died young.

ANNA HUBBARD

Anna Hubbard was the fourth child and the oldest daughter of John and Keziah Hubbard. She was born in Amelia Co., Va. on Jan. 9, 1768. She married about 3 weeks before she was 15 years old. Benjamin League and Anna Hubbard, daughter of John Hubbard, were granted a marriage license on Dec. 17, 1782 (W&M Quar., Vol. 16, p. 82, Mar. License Amelia Co., Va.). They moved to Pittsylvania Co., Va. when John Hubbard and family went to reside there around 1785. Benjamin League died before 1793. According to the will of his father-in-law, John Hubbard, he developed a plantation on his land and he willed that land to Benjamin's son, John League, whom he called grandson. It may be an error, but John League seems to be the only

child of Benjamin and Anna (Hubbard) League.

i. John League, no facts are known beyond the knowledge that he lived to be of age 21 or more years.

Deed Book 15 (1806-1808) Pitts. Co., Va., shows a deed, dated Nov. 18, 1805 between John Leg of Halifax and Davis Hubbard of Pittsylvania, sold 100 acres on Little Bearskin Creek, quoting: "being the Land John Hubbard Dec'd gave his grand-son John Leg included in a survey of 250 acres of sd John Hubbard". This deed was recorded Feb. 17, 1806. It was signed John League. The surname League is found spelled Leg and Legg. This may be one reason for difficulty in research today. This deed positively identifies John Leg as John League, son of Benjamin League and grandson of John Hubbard. John League, however, seems to have resided in Pittsylvania Co., Va. There is a marriage bond in the Courthouse dated June 6, 1808 to John League and Polly Butterton, daughter of William Butterton Sr., and William Butterton Jr. was Bondsman. Rev. Griffith Dickinson married them. (Mar. Reg. Pitts. Co., Va., p. 45). No research attempted. The Davis Hubbard who bought the above land was the Uncle of John League. The above deed dated in 1805 proves that John League was at least 21 years of age and was born around 1784 in Amelia Co., Va.

Anna Hubbard League was a widow while a very young person. They were living near her parents when Banjamin League died and perhaps continued to reside there. It is resonable to believe she visited her grandfather, Joseph Hubbard and her Uncle Samuel Hubbard's family in Halifax Co., Va. One evidence of this is her second marriage in Halifax Co., Va. After the death of her husband, she remained a widow several years. The year she was 28 years old she married again. On July 28, 1796, William Chesser and Annie League were granted a marriage license. She signed her own consent and Vincent Wyatt was Security. Mar. Req. of Halifax Co., Va. (1753-1800) by C.L. Knorr, p. 34. Here the name is spelled Chesser. His surname is spelled differently many times. In the History of Halifax County, Virginia by Johnson Carrington under marriage licenses included is found William Chessher and Annie League on July 28, 1796 were issued a license. Wherever this name has been found there seems to be a new spelling. Even tradition no longer has been helpful for giving any clues for Anna's family. It is not known where they resided after marriage.

William and Anna Chessher settled in Pittsylvania Co., Va. at some time. How early has not been ascertained. Twelve years after their marriage in Halifax Co., Anna (Hubbard) Chessher's brother, Samuel Hubbard, on Feb. 6, 1808, sold 200 acres of land on the West Fork of Pole Cat Creek to William Chishier. This sale was recorded on Feb. 15, 1808 (D.8. 15, p. 500, Pitts. Co., Va.). This land was the land John Hubbard had willed to his son Sam-Wel Hubbard in 1793. The Bible record of John Hubbard proves that Anna Chisther died July 22, 1809 and was only 41 years old that year. It is known that she had children. The facts are unknown. Her mother's will in 1835 states "heirs of my daughter Ann Chessher Dec'd one dollar cash". They were all 26 or more years old in 1835. Anna lived 13 years and 1 day after her second marriage. William Chessher died prior to the 1850 census in Pittsylvania Co., Va. or moved away. If there are descendants living today, it is still possible to trace back to the above ancestors if they have that desire. There is a statement in the Muse family records that "Louisa Muse b. cir. 1805 m. Mr. Chesher, emigrated to Tenn". (See V, (16) P. ?, Hopkins of Va. and Related Families. This emigration was prior to 1850.

ELIZABETH HU8BARD

Elizabeth Hubbard was the second daughter and fifth child of John and Keziah Hubbard. She was born in Amelia Co., Va. on Jan. 18, 1771 and lived there until 1785 when her parents moved to Pittsylvania Co., Va. A marriage license was issued on Dec. 12, 1795 to David Hodges and Elizabeth Hubbard. She was deceased when her mother dated her will in 1835 but her death was not recorded in the old Hubbard Bible. In her mother's will she gave to the "heirs of her daughter Elizabeth one dollar in Cash". Her Hodges grand-children contested their grandmother Keziah Hubbard's will. They did not succeed in their effort. (W.B. #1, p. 351, Pitts. Co., Va.). This reveals the names of the children of David and Elizabeth (Hubbard) Hodges' children. The same names are found on the census records. They were those living in 1838 and 1850 census. If there were others, no record has been found of them contesting the will. Those who contested were:

- i. Walker Hodges, b. 1798 (1860 census).
- ii. Permelia Hodges, b. 1800 (1850 census)., d. Nov. 12, 1853 (Pitts. Co., Va. Death Reg., p. 17). Never mar.
- iii. Mariah Hodges, b. 1803 and d. on Jan. 6, 1859. Her brother, Walker Hodges, reported her death was caused by accidental burns. Her age was 55 years, therefore she was b. some time in 1803. She lived in her brother Walker's home and she never mar.
 - iv. Tabitha Hodges, b. 1805.
 - v. Lucy Hodges
 - vi. Hodges was perhaps a day.

LUCY HODGES

Lucy Hodges may be a daughter of David and Elizabeth Hodges, since the signature of David Hodges is assumed to be that of David Hodges, the father of the above named children. The Indenture dated Nov. 28, 1832 concerning 268 acres of land was signed by Lucy Hodges Price. She married James Price. She did not enter the contest about her grandmother's will, six years after the above deed was signed. (D.B. 34, p. 289, Pitts. Co., Va.). If she was living she accepted the will. Griffith Dickerson Jr. also signed the above Indenture. This indicates that even another daughter was perhaps deceased.

WALKER HODGES

Walker Hodges, the son of David and Elizabeth (Hubbard) Hodges, born in 1798, seems to be their oldest child. He never married. His sister Mariah kept house until her unfortunate death from catching on fire. In 1850 he was a farmer with 2,000 dollars in real estate and 2,500 in personal estate. He made his will in 1881 and it was probated March 21, 1881 (W.B. 3, p. 281, Pitts. Co., Va.). His heirs were his sister Tabitha Payne's children and some others. He was 73 years old when he died. The Payne children were his chief interest. In 1860 Remus M. Payne, age 19, was employed by his Uncle Walker Hodges.

TABITHA HODGES

Tabitha Hodges, the daughter of David and Elizabeth (Hubbard) Hodges, was born around 1805. She married date unknown, Reuben Payne who died before 1850. According to the 1850 census their children were:

i. John D. Payne, age 17. The 1860 census lists him as a cripple.

- Thomas W. Payne, age 15. In 1860 he was still in his mother's ii. home and a carpenter.
- William F. Payne, age 13. iii.
- iv.
- Sarah E. Payne, age 12)
 Benjamin F. Payne, age 12) twins V.
- Madison M. Payne, age 10) Man M. Payne, age 10) twins & called Romulus & Remus. vi. vii.
- Verna C. Payne, age 8. viii.
 - Reuben C. Payne, age 6. ix.

Tabitha (Hodges) Payne was 45 years old in 1850 and her sister, Permelia Hodges, was 50 years old and was in her home. She died Nov. 12, 1855. (Index Death Reg. Pitts. Co., Va., p. 12, Reel 68, Va. Archives). Tabitha reared her children and in 186D her real estate was evaluated at 3,000 dollars and personal estate at 10,000 dollars. Their home was near Whitmell, Va. In 1860 "Romulus" was at home assisting with the farming and "Remus" was employed by his Uncle Walker Hodges.

ISHAM HUBBARD

Isham Hubbard, born May 19, 1773 in Amelia Co , Va., was the son of John and Keziah (Pigg) Hubbard. He was 12 years old when his parents moved to Pitts. Co., Va. He was old enough to understand all his father had accomplished the eight years they had been residing in that County before his father's final illness and the time he made his last Will and Testament. Reading this Will, one feels that Isham Hubbard, during those years, had commanded his father's confidence in his ability to assume responsibility. Realizing that he should make his Will he did this five days before his death. In his dilemma he planned the welfare of all as wisely as he could foresee. this plan he turned to his son Isham Hubbard. Tradition claims that Joseph, the oldest son, was away from home. The other two older sons were deceased. Isham was the next son and in his 21st year. At 21 years of age he should be on his own in life. Thereupon he set him up in business for the next 15 years as the manager of his estate and stated he must be paid out of the estate for his services. He gave him also at the end of those 15 years, the mill and the land on which it was built and 100 acres more. In reading this it is not seen that this was truly a gift of 550 acres of land including the gristmill. This Will set his son Isham up in a remunerative business for the next 15 years and in ownership of the land and mill at the close of that time.

This is covered here to show Isham Hubbard had the confidence of his father. This care included not only business but the welfare of his mother, his sisters and brothers, which was a household of 9 people.

His mother, it will be seen, was a woman of unusual business ability. She without a doubt spared Isham of many responsibilities and the 15 years of real business took a different course.

Isham Hubbard arrived at manhood a capable young man but one who had dreams of his own. Five months after his 21st birthday and fifteen months after his father's death on Oct. 20, 1794, a marriage license was issued to Isham Hubbard and Sarah Brown. Security was Jas. Akin. (Mar. Reg. Pitts. Co., Va.). Rev. Richard Elliot performed their marriage ceremony on Oct. 23, 1794.

Two years later, Isham Hubbard, in a deed dated March 3, 1796, sold 50 acres of his inheritance on Bearskin Creek to Thomas Hodges. This deed was recorded July 19, 1796. (D.B. 10 (1794-1797), p. 484, Pitts. Co., Va.).

The sale of land in 1796 may have been his first step toward settling in N.C. The will outlined 15 years of employment for the Estate of John Hubbard, which covered the years 1793 to 1808. It is not known when he moved to Wilkes Co., N.C., but sometime before 1810.

At some time Isham seems personally to have made his family record in his mother's Bible, since he uses the pronoun "my", quoting:

"Isham Hubbard was married Oct. 23, 1794

My wife Sarah Hubbard was born July 12, 1776

Lucy Hubbard was born Feby 28, 1795

Lavonia Hubbard was born Oct. 6, 1797

John Hubbard was born Oct. 1, 1799."

The 1810 census readings for Wilkes Co., N.C. records for Isham Hubbard the following facts:

Under 10 years 3 females

10-16 years 1 male and 2 females 26-45 years 1 male and 1 female

45- up years 2 females

One slave was recorded. Evaluating the above, Lucy, Lavonia and son John were living and they had three more daughters under 10 years of age. Bible birthdates prove that Isham was 37 years old in 1810 and Sarah, his wife, was 34 years old. This means that in 1810 they were established citizens in that county and were the parents of 6 children.

In the 1820 census of Wilkes Co., N.C. Isham Hubbard's household consisted of 8 males and 5 females of whom only one was over 45 years old. This was Isham Hubbard, age 47 that year. He owned 2 slaves. In 1830 the census shows Isham Hubbard Esquire and his wife were alone in their home and over 50 years old. They were 57 and 54 that year.

All of this information does not reveal the names of all of their children, yet very valuable.

After Isham Hubbard settled in North Carolina, he then sold all the lands he owned in Virginia. On Jan. 29, 1811 Isham Hubbard of Wilkes Co., N.C. sold to his brother Hezekiah Hubbard of Pittsylvania Co., Va. for one hundred and seventy dollars, 150 acres of land on the waters of Bearskin Creek, "it being part of a tract granted to John Hubbard Dec'd". This adjoined Hezekiah Hubbard's inheritance on the south side. This deed declares also that it is part "of the tract I, Isham Hubbard owns, of 550 acres". This deed was recorded on Feb. 18, 1811.

D.B. 17 (1810-1812) Pitts. Co., Va., p. 246.

Then on Nov. 23, 1812 Isham Hubbard deeded to James Hamlett 400 acres for 200 dollars. This land was the rest of his inheritance and adjacent his brother Hezekiah Hubbard's lands. This deed was recorded Dec. 21, 1812. See D.B. 18 (1812-1814) Pitts. Co., Va., p. 148. The above three deeds prove that Isham Hubbard inherited 600 acres of his father's lands. In 19 years he had sold his entire inheritance in Virginia. Due to no opportunity to do the essential research, there is no knowledge of the property he acquired in North Carolina, nor of the life they lived there as citizens of North Carolina.

Sarah (Brown) Hubbard died some time after 1830 and prior to 1834.

There is no knowledge of their family except the above Bible and census records. There was found no information regarding Lucy and Lavonia Hubbard. The Bible records their son John Hubbard was born Oct. 1, 1799. The following marriage may be his since "I" or Isham Hubbard was his bondsman. A marriage license was issued to John Hubbard and Hannah Easps on July 10, 1817. I Hubbard was bondsman and W.Y. Martin was the witness. If he was Isham Hubbard's son, he was around 18 years of age.

On Nov. 18, 1856 a marriage license was issued to John Hubbard and Elizabeth Williams. Isham Hubbard witnessed this marriage bond. They were married on Nov. 20, 1856 by W.W. Wright, J.P. Witness was Isaac S. Call, O.C. (See Mar. License for Wilkes Co., N.C., Raleigh, N.C.). However, this John Hubbard was a grandson of Isham Hubbard Sr. and his brother, Isham Hubbard, was the witness. It is known that they were the sons of Henderson Hubbard.

It is known that Isham Hubbard Sr. and Mrs. Elizabeth Grayson were granted a marriage license on July 3, 1834. John B. Crysol was bondsman. William Martin C.C.C. was witness. Mrs. Elizabeth Grayson was formerly the widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Kilby, and before her marriage she was by birth Elizabeth Hubbard, sister-in-law of Sarah Gilreath, who married Joel Hubbard in North Carolina on Feb. 18, 1803. Joel Hubbard was the son of Benjamin Jr., the son of Benjamin Hubbard Sr. of Halifax Co., Va. Isham Hubbard Sr. was the son of John Hubbard, son of Joseph Hubbard of Virginia, who was a brother of Benjamin Hubbard Sr. of Halifax Co., Va. It is not known how long Mrs. Elizabeth Hubbard lived but perhaps a number of years. Isham Hubbard was at the time of his second marriage, 61 years old. The date of his death is not known. These marriages were secured by Miss Hope Hubbard from the Mar. Reg. of Wilkes Co., N.C. on file in Raleigh, N.C. Isham Hubbard was living in 1838 when his mother's will was probated and received one fourth of her personal estate. He was 68 years old that year. Date of death not known.

Due to never contacting the descendants of Isham Hubbard, son of John and Keziah Hubbard, details of his family are not included except for his son Henderson Hubbard. Henderson Hubbard was a native of Wilkes Co., N.C. and resided in Brushy Mountain Township. He was not a descendant of the Benjamin Hubbard line in N.C. Through the interest, courtesy and endeavor of Mrs. Kenneth Louis Hubbard of Arlington, Texas, the following lineage was sent for son Henderson of the family of Isham Hubbard Sr.

HENDERSON HUBBARD

Henderson Hubbard, born 1805, Wilkes County, N.C. was the son of Isham Hubbard and Sarah Brown of Pittsylvania County, Va. (Unproven, but two different sources lead this way). He married Delphy Eastridge, December 6, 1827, in Wilkes Co., N.C. She was the daughter of Bettie Tedder and ____ Eastridge. Children:

- 2. John, born 1834, Wilkes Co., N.C. John Married Elizabeth Williams, November 18, 1856 in Wilkes County.

ISHAM HUBBARD

Isham Hubbard, born 1830, Wilkes County, N.C. was the son of Henderson Hubbard and Delphy Eastridge of Wilkes County, N.C. He married Matilda Moore, March 16, 1852 in Wilkes Co. She was the daughter of Sophia Anderson and Robert (Robin) Moore. The Moores lived in Lovelace Township in Wilkes County. Children:

They lived in the Brushy Mountain Township and were farmers.

JAMES ROBERT HUBBARD

James Robert Hubbard, born January 6, 1859 in Wilkes County, N.C., was the son of Matilda Moore and Isham Hubbard of Wilkes Co. He married Sarah Elizabeth Lewis, February 15, 1881 in Wilkes County. Her parents were Sarah Souther and Benjamin Franklin Lewis. He died July 1, 1863 at Gettysburg and is on the role of honor. Children:

- Minnie Lee, born November 11, 1881, N.C. Minnie Lee died February 20, 1964 and is buried in Honey Grove Texas, Fannin County. She married James Robert Burke, had two sons and grandchildren.
- 2. Joseph Walter, born February 14, 1884, N.C. See later.
- 3. Noah Franklin, born January 17, 1885, N.C. Noah Franklin died August 11, 1933? in a train wreck on his way to the fair in Chicago.
- 4. Ruel Edward, born March 18, 1887, N.C. Ruel Edward, last heard from in Harrah, Washington in 1945.
- 5. Lela Adaline, born September 8, 1889, N.C. Lela Adaline, died June 1959, Ft. Worth, Texas. She married Charles Wallace Hoffman and had 3 daughters and three sons. One son, Charles Wayne was on Ft. Worth Police Dept. in Motorcycle unit and was killed while on duty in 1952. There were numerous grandchildren.
- 6. William Harrison, born December 8, 1891, N.C. William Harrison, died January 26, 1970 and is buried in Honey Grove Cemetery, Fannin County. He married Verna Avery and had one child, June Hubbard Morrison. She died July 4, 1969 along with the youngest of her three children in an auto accident in Fannin Co.
- 7. Commie Sanford, born December 25, 1894, N.C. Commie Sanford, died June 12, 1919 from gas in lungs in WW I. He is buried in Honey Grove, Texas.
- 8. Ida Mae, born February 2, 1896, N.C. Ida Mae, died January, 1962. She married Burt Williamson and there were no children.
- 9. Carrie Lavinia, born May 31, 1898, N.C. Carrie Lavinia died in November 1962, Vernon, Texas. She married Christopher Columbus (Babe) Yoakum. They had four children and grandchildren.
- 10. Ethel Roxie, born November 9, 1900, N.C. Ethel Roxie is the only living child as of this date (Jan. 1974). She has a Bible of James Robert, her father. She married Robert Augusta Slack of

- Commanche County, Texas. They have one daughter and two sons. There are grandchildren. She lives at Joshua, Texas in Johnson Co.
- 11. Blanche Ellen, born May 19, 1904, N.C. Blanche Ellen died March 30, 1967 in Fall City, Oregon married Arthur Smith. Had one son and grandchildren.

JOSEPH WALTER HUBBARD

Joseph Walter Hubbard, born Feb. 14, 1884, N.C. died March 13, 1944 Cleburne, Texas, Johnson County. Buried in Rosehill Cemetery. Married Ellen Mae Ridinger in Fannin County on December 17, 1911. She was born May 31, 1894 in Tennessee (Coffée or Cannon Co.). Her parents were Lewis Michael Ridinger and Elizabeth Watson. Children:

- i. Bloyce Wilford, born April 26, 1913 in Honey Grove, Texas. Married Ruby Vee Tucker of Johnson Co., Texas. Have one son, Gayland Winford, and one adopted daughter, Kolona Geraldine. Both are married. There are two grandchildren. They all reside in Cleburne, Texas.
- 2. Walter Farrell, born August 28, 1915, Cleburne, Texas. Married Johnnie Ruth Harrell of Ft. Worth, Tex. They have one son, married, and they all live in Ft. Worth. John Walter and wife are expecting their first child.
- 3. Frances Faye, born February 18, 1919 in Cleburne, Tex. Married R.C. McMullin of Johnson County. Have one son, Robert Dwain, and one daughter, Donna Faye. Both married. Robert lives in San Antonio, Texas and has one daughter. Donna lives in Ft. Worth, has one daughter living, one infant daughter deceased, and one adopted son. R.C. McMullin deceased and Frances married twice to same man, Warren Averitt. Resides in Hurst, Texas, suburb of Ft. Worth.
- 4. Velma Ruth, born August 22, 1922 in Honey Grove, Texas. Married Roy Preston Wicker. Has one son and one daughter. Both married and three grandchildren. They all live in Joshua, Texas, Johnson County.

- 6. Dorothy Jean, born November 30, 1931, Cleburne, Texas. Married first Warnell David Hinkle, Cleburne. Had one daughter, Sherry Lynn. Sherry is married. Has two living children and one deceased infant son. Married second time---Jack Cooper---no children. All live Ft. Worth.
- James Robert, born June 10, 1934, Cleburne, Texas, unmarried---lives Ft. Worth, Texas.

KENNETH LOUIS HUBBARD

Kenneth Louis Hubbard, born May 22, 1925, Cleburne, Texas, married March 3, 1946, Italy, Texas, (License in Tarrent County, Tex.) Novelène Brown, born March 25, 1926, Cleburne, Tex. Daughter of Susan Elizabeth Temple and Eliga (Lige) Lancaster Brown of Hall County, Georgia. Susan E. Temple born Johnson County, Texas. Children:

- Michael Kenneth Hubbard, born February 22, 1947 in Ft. Worth, Texas. Is unmarried and resides in Ft. Worth at present.
- 2. Lisa Ellen Hubbard, born September 14, 1955 in Ft. Worth, Texas. Married James Wesley Eatman, born May 6, 1953 in Ft. Worth, Texas.

Married in Arlington, Texas on March 2, 1973. Resides in Arlington at present.

JUDITH HUBBARD

Judith Hubbard, the third daughter and seventh child of John and Keziah Hubbard, was born on June 20, 1775 in Amelia Co., Va. She was ten years old when she came with her parents to Pittsylvania Co., Va. to live. She died in Pittsylvania Co., Va. prior to June 13, 1835, the date of her mother's will, in which she left to "the heirs of my daughter Judith Price Dec'd one dollar in Cash". She married on Oct. 24, 1807 Fontaine Price. Thomas H. Harding was bondsman. Adin Gray was signer of the Certificate. If Fontaine and Judith (Hubbard) Price's children were ever recorded, that record has not been located. According to her mother's will they did have "heirs".

Fontaine Price was among those who contested Keziah Hubbard's will on April 18, 1838. (See W.B. #1, Pitts. Co., Va., p. 351). He may have been Judith's husband acting in behalf of their children who were not of age; on the other hand, did Judith have a son named Fontaine Price? No opportunity came to study this point of view. This family evidently resided on the land Fontaine Price purchased on Oct. 22, 1816. This was a plantation of 224 acres on Bearskin Creek and recorded the day the deed was dated. See D.B. 20 p. 195, Pitts. Co., Va. He owned other land. (D.B. 21, p. 228). No one contacted recalled any facts regarding Fontaine and Judith (Hubbard) Price's family.

SAMUEL HUBBARD

Samuel Hubbard, the fifth son and eighth child of John and Keziah Hubbard was born on Aug. 4, 1777 in Amelia Co., Va. on his father's farm on Furgerson's Horsepen Branch of Flatt Creek. At the age of 8 years he came with his father's family to live in Pittsylvania Co., Va. He was around 16 years old when his father passed away. His father, a few days before his death, willed Samuel 200 acres of land on Pole Cat Creek of Banister River.

On August 7, 1802 a marriage license was granted to Samuel Hubbard and Obediance Alexander, who was also Security. (Mar. Reg. Pitts. Co., Va., p. 33). It is normal to think that Samuel Hubbard resided on his own land, but this is not known. Six years after their marriage, on Feb. 6, 18D8, Samuel Hubbard dated a deed for the above said 200 acres, more or less, to William Chessher and the deed was recorded on Feb. 15, 1808. (D.B. 17, p. 276, Pitts. Co., Va.). On page 277 is recorded the request of Moses Hutchings and Robert Devin, Justices of the Peace, that Obedience Hubbard, wife of Samuel Hubbard who sold the above land to William Chessher relinquish her right of Dower. It is quoted as follows; "Angreeable to the within Commission we have proceeded to take the privy examination of Pachance Hubbard respecting her right of Dower to the inclosed Deed to which indenture she so freely admit, give up that the same shall be entered of Record. Given under our hands and seals this 5th April 1810.

The above established the tradition that Samuel's wife was named Patience. According to the above she was called Pachance (Patience) in preferance to Obediance. Until this was found, the above statement blocked research efforts. And there may be descendants who should know this. Another tradition was that Samuel and Patience died the same Spring. Upon finding John Hubbard's Bible record there was recorded "Samuel Hubbard and his wife died in the spring of 1823". The importance of recording this here, is that Samuel Hubbard (1777-1823) had an Uncle Samuel Hubbard (1757-1820) who married Patience Hurt. In case their heirs have living descendants the above information is essential.

Samuel Hubbard bought 85 acres of land on Pudding Creek in 1812 from Shadrack Corder. This was recorded on April 20, 1812. (D.B. 17, p. 512, Pitts. Co., Va.). They sold this land on Nov. 17, 1817. (D.8. 21, p. 237). It was signed by Samuel and Obedience Hubbard. According to his mother's will, they did have children since she gave to the "heirs of my son Samuel Hubbard Dec'd one dollar cash". This will was dated 12 years after their departure and their children were mature people in 1835. Today they cannot be named. Their parents had been married less than 21 years when they died in 1823. So all of their heirs were minors when their parents passed away.

EDITH HUBBARD

Edith Hubbard was the fourth daughter and ninth child of John and Keziah (Pigg) Hubbard. She was born Jan. 9, 1780 in Amelia Co., Va. on her father's farm and came to live in Pittsylvania Co., Va. when her parents moved there in 1785. The margin of the leaf of the Bible on which her birth was recorded was torn and only "eth" of her given name is there. This meant a search for her correct name was necessary. It was learned they had a daughter called "Edy". It was assumed Edy was named for her mother's sister. Even the marriage records of Pittsylvania Co., Va. recorded a marriage license issued on Nov. 4, 1799 to Reuben Stephens and Edy Hubbard. Consent for marriage was given by her brother, Hezekiah Hubbard. There was no other information until the will of her mother, dated June 13, 1835, was read. She bequeathed her daughter Edith Stephens, who was living, one fourth of the money realized from the sale of her slaves after her death. Since there were only 4 of her children alive, she gave them the money realized from the sale of her slaves. Edith Stephens was her only living daughter in 1835. She had been married almost 36 years when her mother's will was written when her mother passed away in 1838. Edith Stephens, if living, was 58 years old that year. Her children, if any, were perhaps all grown. Concerning them, there was found no information. No one 100 years later recalled any relatives named Stephens.

DAVIS HU8BARD

Davis Hubbard, born May 16, 1785 in Amelia County, Va., is the son of John and Keziah (Pigg) Hubbard. He was born in the spring of the year that his parents moved to Pittsylvania Co., Va. So he grew up in that County. He was a boy only 8 years old when his father passed away.

In his father's Bible record the name Davis is completely torn out where the margin was torn and only ____ "Hubbard, Born May 16, 1785" is there. Fortunately his father's will told he had a son Devis Hubbard. There was no one else to fill this place. Davis was bequeathed a tract of land on the north side of his father's own plantation, containing 350 acres of land. (See the will). From age 8 years he grew up under his mother's guidance. It seems that he was interested in farming and in acquiring more land. An Indenture dated Nov. 18, 1805 from John League, his nephew, who lived in Halifax Co., Va., proves that he sold his 100 acres in Pittsylvania to his Uncle, Davis Hubbard. This has been recorded in John League's mother's section. (D.B. 15, p. 8, Pitts. Co., Va.). This deed for the 100 acres was sold to Davis Hubbard and his wife Sarah. So far the record of their marriage license has not been found. Davis Hubbard was 21 years old in May 1806. His deed for 100 acres was recorded Feb. 17, 1806. It is not known where he was residing but evidently he was away and did not pay his taxes in 1807. Seven years later the General Assembly of Virginia passed on Feb. 9, 1814 an Act demanding sale of land for unpaid taxes. The official discovered that Davis Hubbard forgot to pay his taxes in 1807. As a result there is found in the Court records of Pittsylvania County an interesting item in regard to this failure and an example of an older brother's watchful care and love for his younger brother who was not even in Virginia, it seems, in 1814. Quoting from D.B. 20, p. 25, Pitts. Co., Va. Clerk's Office: "26 day of April 1816. Received of Hezekiah Hubbard 2 dollars & 80 cents for redemption of two tracts of land one containing 450 acres & the other 100 acres charged on the books of the Commissioners of the Revenue of said County to Davis Hubbard and returned by the Sheriff of said County for the non-payment of the taxes for the year 1807 which land was vested in the president and directors----of the Literary Fund for the want of a bidder when offered for sale by the Sheriff of said County persuant to the Act to amend & explain the Act entitled an Act concerning taxes on Lands passed the 9th day of February 1814.

> Wm Hall Dep. for Will Tunstall Clerk of Pittsylvania Court"

It is assumed that Davis Hubbard was the owner of this land and paid his taxes through those years. It also shows he was not at home when this occurred. When he purchased the 100 acres he was married to Sarah. Evidently they moved away from the County. No information has been secured but the following is regarded to be the facts for this same Davis Hubbard. There has not been found another Davis Hubbard, is one reason. If correct then Sarah Hubbard, Davis Hubbard's first wife, died very early. The following shows that Davis Hubbard was in Wilkes Co., N.C. and it is known his brother, Isham Hubbard, was residing in North Carolina, at the same time. On Sept. 22, 1808 a marriage license was issued to Davis Hubbard and Mary Stafford. Isham Hubbard was bondsman. John M. Jones was a witness. (Wilkes Co., N.C. Mar. Reg.). This means that Davis Hubbard was married a second time in 1808. He was not Isham's son because at that time Isham's oldest son, John Hubbard, was around 9 years of age.

The only other fact known of Davis Hubbard is that he was one of his mother's four living children in 1835 when his mother made her will and bequeathed to him one fourth of the money received upon the sale of her slaves after her death.

SARAH HUBBARD

Sarah Hubbard, the youngest child of John and Keziah (Pigg) Hubbard, was born on July 20, 1789 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. She was only 4 years old the month her father passed away. All except "h" of her given name was torn from the Bible record of her birth. There was no trouble to learn her given name when the recording of her marriage was found with the statement that she was the youngest child.

On Nov. 12, 1810 Abel Price and Sarah Hubbard were granted a marriage license. Her brother Hezekiah Hubbard gave his consent. Rev. William Blair performed their ceremony on Nov. 14, 1810. (Mar. Returns, Pitts. Co., Va.). See the Bible record for her birth and marriage recordings, her children and death. She died in the 26th year of her life. The record omits the month but it was in 1815 on the first day of the month. The children of Abel and Sarah Price as recorded in that Bible, were:

- i. Harriet Price, born Nov. 4, 1811.
- ii. Lewis Price

Evidently they lived since her mother gave the heirs of her daughter Sarah Price "1 dollar in Cash".

Old "Aunt Theenie", the old colored servant who grew up in the Hubbard family regarded "Mars Abel" a good man. To gain her praise, he had to be a good man. The 1830 census proves Abel Price married a second time a lady about his own age; both were between 40 and 50 years old. The daughter between 15 & 20 may have been Harriet Price, born in 1811 and the son not 15 may have been Lewis. There were other younger children in the home. This family was not traced.

Before including information regarding the son Hezekiah Hubbard, it seems wise to include first the following facts for Keziah Hubbard, the mother of their 12 children, and her will.

KEZIAH (PIGG) HUBBARD Soe also p. 84 +

Keziah Pigg, born in Amelia Co., Va. on May 5, 1745, was the daughter of John Pigg who married in Amelia Co., Va. Anne Clement. She grew up in that County and married John Hubbard as has been recorded. She lived in Amelia Co. 40 years. Eleven of their 12 children were born in Amelia Co. and the youngest, Sarah Hubbard, was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. where Keziah Hubbard resided 53 years, and 48 of those 53 years she was a widow. In 1793, a widow with 10 living children, ages 4 years to 31 years, she went forward. It has been seen her 2D year old son, Isham Hubbard, was directed to be manager of all of his father's estate for 15 years. Without a doubt, this meant a great deal to his mother during those years. Keziah Hubbard, however, was a very capable woman. She no doubt gave her advice when needed and guided her children with efficiency, since they came to maturity, and each soon married and had homes of their own. The real estate was in the hands of their sons, and the daughters were all married by the end of the 17 years. Then Keziah Hubbard was still in the home that she and John Hubbard had settled. She had her home on that land so long as she lived as was intended by her husband. Her son, Joseph Hubbard, was heir to the land and he remained unmarried. She kept the home for him as usual. He managed his own affairs and she seems to have entered into a regular routine of farming. She was a slave owner. There is no reference to slaves in John Hubbard's will or estate in any way. It is assumed that the maintaining and the ownership of slaves was practiced after his death. In Keziah Hubbard's plans for farming,

the home land was necessary. She knew what was necessary and all she had to do was to direct the faithful slaves. So she was a very active person and the 28 years after her last daughter married she was busy, unless she was not well when her will was made. Since she signed deeds through the years yet had to make her mark to sign her will, there was a reason. It is seen by her will that she used Joseph's land, but used her own farm equipment and slaves. To sustain so many men and women, large crops were necessary. She gave Joseph everything on the farm except her slaves, according to her will. Her personal property was her slaves. She decided to sell them. This was wise. When she was gone they would have had no one to take care of them. Each needed someone. A new master or mistress was best for them. She could not set them free. She did not own 650 acres of land required of an owner when freeing slaves, since she owned 13 and of these, two had children. To sustain so many people means she also had loyalty and cooperation from each of them. She was old but she was loved by them and she was successful. Keziah Hubbard in her 93 years on earth had experienced many great sorrows. She reared all of her children to maturity but lived to see 8 pass away. She also lost her husband and several of her children lost their companions while she was living. Through the sorrows of life she never faltered in her duties.

After she was ninety years old she made her will. It can be felt in some way she was not well; she had to make her mark. Tradition has not helped to know why. She lived almost 3 years longer. Her will named all of the heirs found in their Bible record except Barnet, deceased without heirs.

THE WILL OF KEZIAH HU8BARD

Dated June 15, 1835 - Proved April 15, 1838

Will Book I (1814-1845) Pitts. Co., Va., p. 351.

I, Keziah Hubbard of Pittsylvania County do hereby make my last Will and Testament in manner & form following: That is to say:

1st I desire that all my Just debts be paid.

2ndly I give to the lawful heirs of my son John Hubbard Dec'd one dollar in cash.

3dly I give to the lawful heirs of my daughter Ann Chessher Dec'd one dollar in cash.

 $4"\mbox{ly I}$ give to the lawful heirs of my daughter Elizabeth Hodges, Dec'd one dollar in cash.

5"ly I give to the lawful heirs of my daughter Judith Price Dec'd one dollar in cash.

 $6"ly\ I$ give to the lawful heirs of my son Samuel Hubbard Dec'd one dollar in cash.

 $7"ly\ I$ give to the lawful heirs of my son Hezekiah Hubbard Dec'd one dollar in cash.

8"ly I give to the lawful heirs of my daughter Sarah Price Dec'd one dollar in cash.

9"ly I give to my son Joseph Hubbard all of my stocks of Horses, cattle, sheep, hogs, all of my household and kitchen furniture, all of my plantation utensils and all the grain that I may be possessed of, and crops either of grain, fodder or anything else that may be growing on the place whereon I now reside all of which said property I give to my said son, Joseph Hubbard for compensation of his plantation on which I now reside and have resided there for years past.

10" It is my will and desire that all of my slaves that I now have on hand to wit: Rose, Weshington, Henry, Oba, Haley and her children Bob and Mary, Pat and her child Sam, Lewis, Milton, Jane, Templemon, together with their future increase be immediately sold after my decease by my Executor and the monies arising therefrom I desire may be equally divided among my four living children to-wit: Joseph Hubbard, Isham Hubbard, Davis Hubbard and Edith Stephens which I give to them their heirs, executors &c forever.

And Lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint James A. Mitchell Executor of this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all or former Wills or Testaments by me heretofore made. In witness where of I have here unto set my hand and affixed my seal this 15 day of June 1835.

This writing proporting to be the last Will and Testament of Keziah Hubbard Dec'd was presented in Court and having been opposed & contested by Walker Hodges, Fontaine Price, Reuben Payne and Tabitha his wife, Mariah Hodges, Pamelia Hodges, was fully proven by Jabez Smith, James M. Reynolds & Willis G. Cousins, three subscribing witnesses to be the last act and deed of said Decedant and ordered to be recorded and on the Motion of James A. Mitchell, the Executor in said Will named, who made oath according to Law and with Jabez Smith & Joseph Hubbard his securities entered into bond in the penalty of twelve thousend dollars conditioned as the law requires, Certificate was granted him for obtaining probat of said Will in due form.

THE PIGG FAMILY IN AMERICA A Preface

Note: This has been written in 1982, six years after pages 112-128 were compiled. Your compiler apologizes for a certain amount of repetition, but she feels that this preface will clarify and support the information on pages 112-128 as well as pose questions to be answered by those who undertake to do further research concerning the Pigg family in Virginia.

First, the name Pigg. Did the family leave France at the time the Huguenots fled from France to England in order to escape persecution? Was the name formerly Pique? These questions are prompted by a statement found in Virginia Colonial Abstracts, vol. 33: King and Queen County abstracted by Beverley Fleet, p. 64 in which he said "were a Huguenot family named Pique". Your compiler has not found any evidence to support the theory that the name was Pique, however since that idea has been suggested, more research needs to be done.

Second, Your compiler has been fortunate enough to have access to a book that is rich in facts concerning the Pigg family in England as well as those who immigrated to Massachusetts in 1634 and John Pigg and his wife Jane who came to Virginia. There are some contradictions in the book (at one place she said John and Jane came to Virginia in 1644; at another place she said the year was 1654— there is no way to determine which date was a typographical error except to go to the original records and she did not state the source). In spite of typographical errors your compiler recommends additional study through the clues contained in The Trail Blazers, by Alice (Turnidge) Hamot, Portland Oregon, 1935. Pages 382-411 deal with the Piggs in Virginia.

According to Mrs. Hamot, Robert and Thomas Pigge (whom she records as the first Pigge family to come to America) arrived at Denham, Mass. in 1634. She said that they were brothers of John Pigge who came with Jane, his wife, to Virginia in 1644. John Pigg with John Madison entered 1050 acres of land that year (see Trail Blazers, p. 390). It is significant that Mrs. Hamot found that Patent. The first Patents found by your compiler are recorded on pages 127 and 128 -- see later. The date for 2 Patents for John Pigg was July 10, 1658. On June 6, 1658 Carrett Pigg received a Patent for 350 acres in New Kent County, Va. (see later on p. 127 of this study). It is not known whether Carrett was a son of John Pigg or some other relationship. Your compiler has not come across any further references to Garrett Pigg. He either died young or returned to England, or migrated to some other County or State.

Two additional patents were recorded on July 10, 1658. (see Patent Book No. 4 (1658-1664) Coincidentally in Rapahannock County Patent Book no. 5 (1661-1666) date omitted, page 132-John Pigg and John Madisch were granted 1050 acres for the Transportation of 21 people (probably John Pigg and John Madison continued to be business associates.)

Genealogists have. to accept the fact that many early Court Records were destroyed or are very badly mutilated and it is not likely that anyone can compile a complete record for John Pigge and his wife Jane who came to Virginia in 1644 (1654?). The earliest family record secured by your compiler for this present book is the Bible record of Keziah (Pigg) Hubbard (1745-1793).

Generation V. Keziah was the daughter of John and Ann (Clement) Pigg. She was the wife of John Hubbard (1738-1793). Keziah was born 101 years after her first ancestors arrived in Virginia in 1644.

Generation IV. Keziah Pigg's parents, John and Ann (Clement) Pigg were generation IV. John Pigg's dates have been approximated as (cal720-1785).

Generation III. Keziah Pigg's grandfather, Paul Pigg, Sr. is Generation III. He was also the ancestor of the Pittsylvania County, Va. Pigg families and said to be a son of John Pigg, Jr. (or) Henry Pigg, the brother of John Pigg, Jr. (see page 115 of this study). The birth date for Paul Pigg, Sr. has been estimated cal698 because his first Patent was dated 1719 (probably when he reached the age of 21 years). A better estimate of his birth would be in the 1690's. He died in 1787. He married first Elizabeth, who has been declared to have been his first cousin (Elizabeth Pigg, whose father was a brother of Paul Pigg, Sr.'s father.) Date of their marriage was perhaps prior to 1719. Their children:

- 1. John Pigg, born before 1720 to have received a land grant in 1741 and have Pigg River named for him in Pittsylvania Co., Va. John married, by estimate, around 1742, Ann Clement and bought land from his father, Paul Pigg, Sr. in 1742.
- 2. Paul Pigg, Jr. (see page 115 following--no information found)
- 3. Elizabeth Pigg. In her father's Will called Elizabeth Osborne. Her husband was William Ed. Osborne.

Elizabeth the wife of Paul Pigg, Sr. died in the early 1740's by estimate.

Paul Pigg Sr. married the second time sometime before 1745. His second wife was named Sarah, but her surname and the date of the marriage have not been determined. The marriage probably took place before the year 1745 because on Feb. 15, 1745 Sarah Pigg signed away her right of dower. The Will of Paul Pigg, Sr. proves they were the parents of 7 children who were named in the following order in that Will:

- 1. James Pigg. On tithable list in 1767. Estimated birth 1744
 2. William Pigg. Over 21 years of age in 1767, born before 1746.
- 3. Richard Pigg 16 or older in 1767 (see his Mother's list of tithables)
- 4. Patsy Pigg and 3 more daughters (see text of Paul Pigg's Will on page 117 following.)

Generation II. The second generation of our Pigg family in America would be the three sons of John and Jane Pigg (immigrants).. They were John, Henry and Edward.

Court Records for Edward Pigg prove he had no daughter named Elizabeth and no son named Paul. This left John and Henry to be the parents of the first cousins, Paul Pigg, Sr. and Elizabeth Pigg who married each other and are Generation III above. One of their great grand daughters dechared: "My great grand fathers were John and Henry Pigg." however, this great grand daughter did not recall the names of her great grand mothers. The Court Records have been lost except for Patent Records. John

had a Patent on July 18, 1673. Then Henry and John received jointly 790 acres of land in New Kent County, Va. on April 17, 1685. This makes it possible for them to have been born early enough to be the sons of John and Jane Pigg (immigrants) and perhaps mature men before the Patent was granted in 1685 (when they paid the transportation of 16 people to Virginia and secured 790 acres in New Kent County).

Generation I. As for John Pigge and his wife, Jane, we only know they were from England. Mrs. Hamot's book The Trail Blazers does not give the names of their parents and does not include the records in England for a Pigge family which had three sons named Robert, Thomas and John.

Of interest to every member of the Pigg families in America and their descendants are facts concerning the families named Pigge in England (The Trail Blazers pages 382-387) and Pigg in America (Ibid. p. 390 ff.) In early Court Records in America the name is spelled Pigg, Pigge and Pike. Your compiler has found John's name spelled John Pigge in only two Land Patents.

The Pigge family was found in records in England as far back as 1460 A.D. which was the 38th. year of the Reign of Henry VI. This tells us that the Pigg family in Virginia had ancestors named Pigge in England 184 years before any record exists for John Pigg in Virginia.

The Trail Blazers, p. 382 contains a description of the Coat of Arms for the Pigge family in England and also gives Lineages of two branches of the Pigge family.

NOTE: At this point we conclude the Preface to the Pigg Family in America and return to the version compiled in 1976.

THE ANCESTORS OF KEZIAH (PIGG) HUBBARD

Born May 22, 1746
Married in Amelia County, Virginia
Lived in Amelia County 40 years

Died prior to April 15, 1838
Widow in Pittsylvania Co., Va.
Lived in Pitts. Co. 53 years.

She was born Keziah Pigg, the daughter of John Pigg (1720-1785), who married Ann Clement, daughter of William Clement.

Up to the present time, 1976, the Bicentennial year of the United States of America, the history of the ancestors of the courageous Keziah Pigg (1745-1838) have never been found compiled. Her Pigg ancestor came from England to the Virginia Colony around 50 years after the first settlers arrived in 1607.

Her ancestors have been declared Huguenots whose real name in France was Pique. At present it is not known when they escaped from France. Harassment and persecution continued from time to time for many years. Without real research in France and England, no statement can be made regarding the birthplace of John Pigg, her colonial ancestor. If he was born in France, he was a child when those persecutions developed there in 1628. This statement is based upon patents for land in Virginia being granted to men of age. In 1658 he was perhaps an older man than 21 years due to evidence of his wealth. If he was born in England, his parents may have escaped from France some time in the early 1600's.

The evidence of the wealth of John Pigg, the earliest ancestor, is verified in his ability to pay the transportation of so many immigrants when he came to the Virginia Colony. This will be seen later. The land he acquired in less than 2 months in 1658, proves that he had already paid the transportation of not less than 39 people to the Colony of Virginia.

Two settlers recorded by the surname Pigg seem to have arrived in the Virginia Colony around the year 1657, since their first patents to land were dated in June and July, 1658. The date of arrival is based on the time required for a request for surveys, the surveys and the time needed to prepare the patents.

The years from 1657 to 1976 cover around 320 years. With only a few records in 1658 and in the 60 years that follow, the following is here presented. This effort is also minus the information that was destroyed when the early records in James City, New Kent, King and Queen and King William counties were burned or mutilated.

The above two settlers were Garrett Pigg and John Pigg. It is not known if they were father and son, two brothers, or of a different relationship. Each, in New Kent Co., Va., was granted a patent within 4 weeks. One can assume that Garrett was older since his patent for 350 acres was dated June 12, 1658. (Pat. B. #4. p. 212 (308). This was granted to Wm. Hall on Oct. 6, ? and by him assigned. (C. & P., p. 376). No more is known of Garrett Pigg. He may have died or returned to England. Records are lost.

John Pigg, however, was more aggressive and was granted on July 10, 1658, 300 acres for transportation of 6 people. (See P.B. #4, p. 182)(271). He was also granted 300 acres in New Kent on the same date. (See P.B. #4, p. 84) (560). (Cavalier & Pioneers, pp. 368 & 422). The name John Pigg was spelled also John Pigge. On the same date, July 10, 1658, Lt. Col. Robert Abrails and John Pigg received a patent for 1,280 acres in New Kent for the transportation of 26 persons. Pat. B. #4, p. 174. (250) (Cav. & Pion. Nugent, p. 366). This means that John Pigg paid the transportation of at least 13 of those new settlers. Since a headright was exacted for each 50 acres granted, John Pigg had paid the transportation of 25 people and had ownership of 1,240 acres of land on the same date. That same year he transported 14 more people and on Sept. 5, 1658, less than 2 months after the above 3 patents, a new patent to him for 700 acres was dated. Pat. B. #4, p. 187 (275). (Cavl.& Pion. Nugent, p. 370).

It is seen that in 1660, 1662 and 1664 and 1667 he had 4 land grants of which 2 had a co-owner and added to his acreage 1,990 acres.

It seems that he brought over with him his own family since in the same county, 15 years later, new land grants were made to an Edward, a John and a Henry Pigg in the New Kent County original area, in the years 1673 through the years until the year 1719. This covers 46 years. This indicates they are the sons of John Pigg, the immigrant. There were no other patents to the family name Pigg, Pigge, Pike. They seem to be three brothers since Henry and John bought land together on April 17, 1785. Edward Pigg and Henry Pigg

and others bought land together in King William on April 1, 1727. In Edward's will, dated Aug. 13, 1739 and probated in 1741, Edward included his brother Henry. (See later). Their relationship as brothers and as three sons of John Pigg Sr. is based upon these records and the Quit Rent Roll in 1704. On this Roll is found the names of John, Edward and Henry Pigg, as owners of land in King William Co., Va. Therefore prior to 1704 John Pigg Sr. had passed away, since his name is not on that Roll. (See p 617, Jane Pigg his wife)

Due to lost records, no details on the family of John Pigg and Henry Pigg can be found. A letter* sent to the compiler in 1932 written by a lady born in 1852, claimed that her great great great great great grandfathers were brothers. That means her great great great grandfather, Paul Pigg, married his first cousin, Elizabeth Pigg. The first step was to learn who was the father of Paul Pigg; also, who was Elizabeth Pigg's father. Since no records have been found for Henry or John's family who resided in King and Queen Co., Va., only Edward Pigg who was cut off into Spottsylvania Co., Va. in 1720 could be studied. Patent records were found. The Spottsylvania records were found also as abstracted in Virginia County Records, (1721-1800) by William Armstrong Crozier. From those abstracts the following brief report for Edward Pigg, born by estimate around 1652, perhaps in England, since he had a patent dated Jan. 18, 1683/4 and died in Spottsylvania Co., Va. before April 7, 1741 where his will was probated. *(from Mrs. Bettie (Pigg) Carter, mother of Mrs. Maude (Carter) Clements)

EDWARD PIGG B. ca. 1652 - D. 1741

The recorded patents prove Edward Pigg, with others, was granted land on Feb. 18, 1673/4 in New Kent County, Va. (Pat. B. #6, p. 501); on June 14, 1714 with others (Pat. B. #1D, p. 162); and last on April 1, 1717 in King William (Pat. B. #1D, p. 319). In 1720 his lands were in Spottsylvania Co., Va. as will be seen in the following study and on Aug. 5, 1740 a deed stated that part of these lands were in Cardline Co. and part in Spottsylvania. (D.8. "B" (1734-1742) Spotts. Co., Va., p. 151, Crozier). Another deed dated Nov. 1, 1742 regarding land formerly sold by Edward Pigg, records that he was deceased. (D.B. "D" (1741-1751) Spotts. Co., Va., p. 161, Crozier). Still other evidence is found that proves that Edward Pigg of Spottsylvania Co., Va. is the same man who acquired the first patent on Feb. 18, 1673 in New Kent Co., Va.

From the Spottsylvania records, the will of Edward Pigg Jr. is found and Edward Pigg Sr. is executor and later Edward Pigg Sr.'s will is found. from these two wills there is learned some valuable details that prove some facts about this family.

Edward Pigg Jr.'s will was a Nuncupative will and was dated Feb. 18, 1725. It was probated April 3, 1725. The facts this will proves are that Edward Pigg Jr. left a legacy to:

- 1. Brother John Pigg
- 2. Brother Henry Pigg
- 3. His mother was living but not named.
- 4. His father was living but not named.
- 5. Brother Charles Pigg
- 6. Sister Ann Pigg

Edward Pigg Sr. was administrator. (See W.B. "A", p. 178, Spotsylvania Co., Va.).

Years later, the will of Edward Pigg Sr. proves that Edward Pigg Jr. was his son, since the legacies in his will are to the same people named in his son's will.

Edward Pigg Sr.'s will was written in St. George's Parish. It was dated Aug. 13, 1739 and probated April 7, 1741. His son, Charles Fickes Pigg was his executor. The witnesses were William Waller, Samuel Brockman and William Brockman. His wife was deceased who was living when Edward Pigg Jr. made his will in 1725. The legatees were:

- 1. Daughter Ann Pigg, the wife of John Clarke:
- 2. Charles Fickes Pigg
- 3. His son John Pigg
- 4. His granddaughter Anne Payne the wife of Barnet Payne Junr. This does not reveal which of his children was one of her parents.
- 5. (a) Jane Haskew) two of his grandchildren (b) Mary Haskew)

This will also reveals that the land Edward Pigg Sr. bequeathed to his son Charles Fickes Pigg was 200 acres of land he had bought from his brother Henry Pigg and the land was lying in King and Queen Co., Va. (See W.8. "A" (1722-1749), Spots. Co., Va.; p. 218). This verifies that Edward and Henry Pigg were brothers. They had a patent together. John and Henry had land together. This signifies these three young men were brothers and the sons of the older John Pigg, the colonial settler in 1658 in New Kent Co., Va.

The above two wills also prove that Edward Pigg Jr. did not name a brother Paul nor a sister Elizabeth. His father did not name in his will a son Paul nor a daughter Elizabeth, the wife of Paul Pigg. This verifies that Paul Pigg and Elizabeth Pigg were not his children, but children of his brothers. As yet we cannot declare who was the father of Paul nor who was the father of Elizabeth.

The records prove that Charles Fickes Pigg's wife was named Sarah and they had a daughter named Jane Pigg. (D.B. "D" (1742-1751) Spots. Co., Va.). The records prove that Edward Pigg Sr. deeded his son John Pigg of Spotsylvania Co., Va. 150 acres of land or 1/4 of 600 acres. (D.B. "B" (1729-1734). This deed was dated Aug. 4, 1732 and on the same date John Pigg and his wife Elizabeth deeded the same land to William Johnson. D.B. "B" (1729-1734). In the will of Edward Pigg Sr. there was found no reference to Henry, the brother of Edward Pigg Jr. Therefore he evidently was deceased before 1739 since he was left no legacy.

Upon the foregoing facts, the other ancestors of Keziah (Pigg) Hubbard and her kindred are compiled so far as evidence is known, as follows.

THE PIQUE FAMILY IN AMERICA

John Pigg and Garrett received patents for land in 1658 in New Kent Co., Va. They came together. Garrett soon assigned his land away. No more evidence was found.

John Pigg was aggressive and continued to acquire lands in New Kent Coarea. His place of birth is not known. It may have been France and he escaped to England during the persecution of the Huguenots. He may have been born in England. If England was his birthplace, he was born perhaps around 1620 and married there some years before he came to the Virginia Colony. Evidently his family came with him. The facts are not known. Garrett may have been a son, but there is no proof. John, Henry and Edward were his sons and they acquired land in the order their names are herein recorded. No daughters were found.

- Edward Pigg, b. ca. 1652 in England since his first patent was dated Feb. 16, 1673/4 (Pat. B. #6, p. 561).
- ii. John Pigg, b. ca. 1654 in England since his first patent was dated June 10, 1675 (Pat. B. #6, p. 554).
- iii. Henry Pigg, b. perhaps in America if he acquired land as soon as he was of age. He was b. not later than 1664 since he bought with his brother John 790 acres on April 17, 1685 (Pat. B. #7, p. 434).

THEIR MARRIAGES

There are no records for evidence.

EDWARD PIGG

Edward Pigg married name unknown and date unknown. Facts have been recorded in the Foreword.

JOHN PIGG

John Pigg married name unknown and date unknown. Tradition claims that he had either a son Paul or a daughter Elizabeth. No other facts.

HENRY PIGG

Henry Pigg married name unknown and date unknown. Tradition claims that he had either a son named Paul or a daughter named Elizabeth. This ends all the family information for these two generations.

FACTS FOR THE THIRD GENERATION

PAUL PIGG

Paul Pigg, born ca. 1698 or earlier in New Kent Co., Va., was granted his first patent for 200 acres of land in King William Co., Va. on Feb. 20, 1719. (Pat. 8. #11, p. 7). It is assumed that he married around that time or earlier. Tradition claims that he married his first cousin Elizabeth Pigg. See above. If they named their first son for Paul's father, his father was John Pigg, the son of John Pigg, the Colonial settler. Then Elizabeth Pigg was the daughter of Henry Pigg. However, there is no proof.

Paul Pigg purchased 243 acres in King William on July 9, 1724. (Pat. 8. #12, p. 58). Ten years later on Aug. 1, 1734 he was in Prince George Co. with a patent for 400 acres: (Pat. 8. #15, p. 270); and at once the new county Amelia was their home. Elizabeth did not live a great many years. Her birth and death dates are unknown. Tradition claims, and according to Paul Pigg's will, dated Sept. 15, 1766, their children were:

- i. John Pigg, b. ca. 1720 in King William Co., Va. since he had a survey in 1741 for 400 acres of land. (Hist. of Pitts. Co., Va. M.C. Clement, p. 41). More later, p. 118.
- ii. Paul Pigg Jr., dates are unknown. He was a mature man when his father moved to Halifax Co., Va. The effort to contact his living descendants met with no response.
- iii. Elizabeth Pigg, the daughter of Paul and Elizabeth Pigg, mar. William Ed Osborne and they resided in Henrico Co., Va.

If there were any other children, they were deceased in 1766 when their

father, Paul Pigg, made his will. Their mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Pigg, died on an unknown date in Amelia Co., Va.

Paul Pigg, their father, married the second time, it is assumed some time in the early 1740's, since two sons, James and William, were on their own tax list in 1767. (Hist. Pitts. Co., Va. by M.C. Clement, p. 280). He married Sarah, whose surname is unknown, and the date is also unknown. It was some time before Feb. 21, 1745 when she relinquished in Amelia Co., Va. her right of dower.

They moved to Halifax Co., Va. in 1756 and settled on land that today is near Chatham, Pittsylvania Co., Va. Tradition stated he was a very old man in 1756. He was certainly still an aggressive man. He acquired many acres of land in Halifax Co., Va., according to his will in 1766. He also built a grist mill that was an excellent business project in his life time. It expanded and continued to be a prosperous business for around 200 years until it burned down one night.

On Sept. 15, 1766 Paul Pigg made his will. He was a citizen of Halifax Co., Va. on that date. On June 1, 1767 his home was in the county called Pittsylvania. The date of his death is not known, but perhaps it was around Nov. 1767, since his will was presented to the Court on Nov. 27, 1767 and is the first will to be recorded in that county. (D.B. 1, p. 77–79).

THE WILL OF PAUL PIGG

In the Name of God Amen. I, Paul Pigg, of the Parish of Antram and County of Halifax being very sick and weak in Body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be to All Mighty God for it and calling to mind the Mortality of my Body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain this my Last Will and Testament in the Manner & form following. Imprima I give my Soul into the hands of God that gave it and my Body to the Earth to be Buried in a Christian like and dessent manner at the Decression of my Executors hereafter named and ---- such Worldly Estate --- hath Pleased God to bless me with I give and dispose of in the form and manner as followeth. Item I give and bequeath to my well beloved wife Sarah Pigg one negro woman named Phillis to her and her heirs forever. Item, I give and bequeath to my son James Pigg two hundred acres of land on the south side of Banister River to him and his heirs forever One hundred acres to be the same more or less which I give and bequeath to Robert Addams it being the place whereon he now lives to him forever. Item I give and bequeath to my son William Pigg two hundred acres of Land on the upper part of my Land on great Cherrystone Creek. Also one negro woman named D $_$ Also one negro girl named Josey (?) all to him and his heirs forever. Item, I give and Bequeath to my son Richard Pigg the Remainder part of my Land with the Plantation whereon I live after the death of his Mother to him and his heirs forever also that my negro Man named James shall be sold to discharge my Just Debts and all the rest of my negroes with all my moveable Estate to be Kept together on the Plantation whereon I now live during my wife Sarah Pigg's life, and she shall be suficiently maintained during her life and of the said estate as her own and after her death all the negroes and moveable estate with all the there of shall be Equally Divided among my Last wife's children namely James Pigg, William Pigg; Richard Pigg; Pattie Pigg; Sarah Pigg; Ann Pigg; Mary Pigg. Item, I cut off my son John Pigg and my son Paul Pigg with one shilling Sterling -----also my Daughter Elizabeth Osborne with one shilling, and therefore I do ordain this to be my Last Will and testament. In witness whereof I do hereunto set my hand and fix my seal the Fifteenth Day of September one thousand seventeen hundred and sixty six.

Pall P Pigg L.S.

Item, I give and bequeath in a Present to my three daughters Pattie Pigg, Sarah Pigg and Mary Pigg the Remainder of my Land on the south side of Banister River ---- and the money to be Equally divided (?) therefore --- above mentioned ---- of all which I submit to the Discression of my Executors which I appoint Reubin Pain Henry McDaniel and John Addams. Signed in the Presence of William Griffith, Robert R Addams George X Parsons.

At a Court held for Pittsylvania County on the 27th Day of November 1767 The Last Will and Testament of Paul Pigg deceased was Presented in Court by Henry McDaniel one of the Executors therein named and proved by the Daths of the witnesses therto and ---- to be --- and on the motion of the said Executor who made Dath according to Law Certificate was granted him for obtaining a Probate thereof in due form ---- security whereupon he together with John ---- Gent his security entered into and acknowledged their Bond according to Law and Liberty is reserved to the other Executors named in the said Will to join in the Probate thereof when they shall think fit.

Teste Will Tunstall C P Court

The above will is recorded in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Deed Book 1 (1767-177D), pp. 77, 78, 79.

This will proves the children of Paul and Sarah Pigg were:

- i. James Pigg, first named son and perhaps oldest son. He was of age and on the list of tithables in 1767.
- ii. William Pigg, the second son named in this will. He was of age and was on the 1767 list of tithables in Pittsylvania Co., Va.
- iii. Richard Pigg, the third son named in his father's will was not of age in 1767 but he was old enough to be on his mother, Sarah Pigg's, list of tithables.
- iv. Pattie Pigg (called Patsy), married Allen Adams. Observing the list of tithables, on p. 280 Pittsylvania History, it is observed that this young man was of age and on that list. It is also seen that Robert Adams on that list was next door to Mrs. Sarah Pigg. Robert Adams was a legatee of Paul Pigg for 100 acres of land on which he resided and Paul Pigg had for him a great gratitude, is apparent. Did this assure him that Patsy would live near her mother? This seems similar to his deed to John Pigg in Amelia Co., Va. when he married Anne Clement. (See this later).
- v. Sarah Pigg, no facts.
- vi. Ann Pigg, no facts.
- vii. Mary Pigg, no facts.

Sarah Pigg, the widow of Paul Pigg is listed on John Wimbish Gents List of Tithable people. (p. 28D Hist. of Pitts. Co., Va., by M.C. Clement). They were as follows: Richard Pigg; this means he was at least 16 years old but not 21 years old. Her slaves 16 or more years old were: Phillis, Jim, Lucas, Dorcas and Peter.

Paul Pigg was also a Planter. In the settlement of his estate (Book 1766-69, D.B. 1) that proves the tobacco was packed in casks, as the law required, and 5 were rolled to the various places to be shipped overseas, according to that entree. (p. 112, Hist. Pittsylvania Co., Va. by M.C. Clement).

The family of Paul and Sarah Pigg has not been traced.

JOHN PIGG

John Pigg, the son of Paul and Elizabeth Pigg, was born in King William Co., Va. around the year 1720. This date is based first on the statement that in 1741, John Pigg of Amelia Co., Va. entered for "400 acres on the north side of the south fork of Staunton River, beginning opposite the mouth of Snow Creek". Snow Creek previously had been named but the south fork of Staunton had not been named. It was named for John Pigg, becoming Pigg River. Snow Creek is a tributary of Pigg River. (History of Pittsylvania Co., Va. by M.C. Clement, p. 41). This land in 1741 was in Lunenburg Co., in 1752 in Halifax Co. and in 1767 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Second, the evidence of his birth place is assured because his father, Paul Pigg, acquired his first two grants for land in King William Co., Va. The dates were, first, Feb. 20, 1719, second, July 9, 1724. (Pat. B. #12, p. 58). His parents moved to the area of Prince George Co. around 1734 when it came to be Amelia Co., Va. The date of that patent was Aug. 1, 1734. (Pat. B. #15, p. 239) His father's family came to Amelia in 1734 when their son John was a teenage boy, but the exact age cannot be stated.

On some date in the 1740 s, John Pigg married Ann Clement, the daughter of William and Anne Clement of Amelia Co., Va. Early marriage licenses in that county are not available. The date was around 1742 since in Deed Book 1 Amelia Co., Va., p. 420, there is a deed recorded that was dated Sept. 17, 1742 in which Paul Pigg sold to John Pigg 100 acres of land on the south side of Appomatox River that adjoins William Clement, the river bank and the great Bent Creek, former lines of Paul Pigg's original patent in 1734 in Amelia Co., Va. The witnesses to John's deed were viz: William Clement Jr.; William Coleman Senr; and James Ferguson. William Clement Jr. was a brother of Ann (Clement) Pigg. This deed, signed by his father, Paul P Pigg, was recorded on the date it was written.

For the following reasons it is assumed that John and Anne Clement Pigg resided in Amelia Co., Va. as long as her parents were living. Her father's will was probated Feb. 20, 1760. See above. The administration details indicate that his wife, Ann Clement, was also deceased, if his will was obeyed. After the death of William Clement Sr. John and Anne (Clement) Pigg sold land 3 times in Amelia Co., Va. No attempt was made to see if they bought other lands in Amelia.

John Pigg's father, in 1756, had moved to Halifax Co., Va., has been stated and John Pigg secured 2 patents for land in Halifax Co., Va. on Aug. 7, 1761. See Pat. 8. #34 (1756-1762), pp. 910, 911. The 2 patents amounted to 496 acres. On March 23, 1762 he acquired 390 acres in Halifax. (ibid, p. 962)

After the above was accomplished, a deed is found in D.B. 8, p. 104 Amelia Co., Va. dated March 20, 1763 in which John Pigg sold to Henry Cox of Cumberland Co., Va., the 100 acres of land he bought from his father, Paul Pigg, in 1742 and which land was formerly adjacent to the land of his father-in-law, William Clement Sr.

It is assumed that around the time of these four land transactions, John and Anne (Clement) Pigg moved to their lands in Halifax Co., Va. and they were once more near his father, Paul Pigg. In 1767 they were in Pittsylvania Co.

The following information shows that John Pigg, in that area of Halifax Co., was prominent and well known before Pittsylvania Co. was formed in 1767. This area became the new county on June 1, 1767. Ten days later on June 10, the list of tithables that was taken by Theop'l Lacy includes John Pigg. He had 5 slaves of age to be listed also as tithable, and this proves he was a slave holder.

This new county was a vast territory that included, at that date, all of

Patrick and Henry Counties and also Franklin County, south of Blackwater River. Military arrangements were ordered at once. A colonel, Lieut-colonel, major and 17 captains were appointed at once to serve from 1767 to 1770. Among those appointed Captain, one was John Pigg. This meant he was already trained and able to serve in this capacity.

The formation of the new county was accompanied by organization of Camden Parish. At the first meeting of the vestry held on June 21, 1767 at the courthouse there were eleven vestrymen present, one of whom was John Pigg. "They subscribed in Vestry to be comfortable to the Ooctrine and Discipline of the Church of England as by Law Established." (Hist. Pitts. Co.. Va. by M.C. Clement, p. 116). This proves that John Pigg was an outstanding Episcopalian. In those earliest days he was also a member of the committee to let to the lowest Bidder the building of one of the six churches the Camden Parish had authorized. (ibid, p. 119). These six churches were all completed before Jan., 1770. The new Parish had no property for the home of the minister of the Camden Parish. In 1771 Rev. Lewis Guilliam, a new minister, came and he boarded in the home of John Pigg. Two years later, the Camden Parish secured property for a Glebe. It is interesting that John Pigg, born in King William Co., Va., who was the attorney of a New Kent Co. citizen, Mr. Richard Chamberlayne, was instrumental in securing 588 acres of his land for the Camden Parish Glebe. The building of the Glebe dwelling house and necessary out buildings were begun at once. (ibid, pp. 119, 121).

Everything continued progressing in Camden Parish until 1776 when the Rev. War came. The vestry book proves the truth of this statement, quoting: "The Church of England and the English government were so closely associated in men's minds that the people of the county with patriotic fervor turned from the Established Church and embraced the new faiths of the Baptist and the Methodist Churches. This is evidenced in the minutes of the vestry by the resignation of the vestrymen which now began to appear". This is stated by Mrs. Clement in the History of Pittsylvania Co., Va., p. 121.

At the time of the Revolution, John Pigg was a member of the Vestry and a Captain of the local militia. A Committee of Safety organized the county of Pittsylvania for military defense. On Sept. 27, 1775 they nominated officers for military defense. Captain John Pigg was not one of those Captains appointed that day.

On account of the tax England placed on tea and America's banning the use of tea in the Colonies, to drink tea came to be regarded a virtual act of treason. Some time very early in 1775 some one reported to the Safety Committee that Captain John Pigg, a vestryman and Captain of the local militia, had violated the desire against tea of the Non-Importation Association "by drinking and making use of in his family the detestable East India Tea". The Committee summoned him to appear before the Committee in May, 1775. Captain Pigg boldy refused, declaring it an impertinent interference in his family affairs and replied "he would do as he pleased". As their retaliation they advertised him as "inimical to the Cause". They demanded that The Virginia Gazette publish their accusation. The compiler found this article in The Virginia Gazette No. 118 by Dixon Hunter Publishers. See p. 3, Column 2 Issue of July 8, 1775 as follows, quoting:

"Pittsylvania June 1, 1775

At a committee held at Pittsylvania Court House on Wednesday the 22nd of May 1775, a complaint being made to this committee that a certain John Pigg had violated the allocation by drinking and making use of in his family, the detestable East India TEA, and also that the said Pigg had taken uncommon pains to defeat the intention of the said allocation by exclaiming much against the measures adopted by the General Congress, upon which the said

Pigg was summoned to appear before the committee to answer the said charge, which he absolutely refused to do, declaring to the person who gave him notice to attend, that his intentions were to do as he pleased and that he would not pay any regard to the summons of the committee; where upon it is the opinion of the committee, that the said Pigg ought to be looked upon as a traitor to the county and inimical to American liberty. And its recommended to all people to break off its intercourse and connection with the said Pigg, until such times as he reinstates himself in the good will and affections of all the good people of the county.

Ordered that the Clerk of the committee do transmit the above proceedings to the different printers in Williamsburg, and beg they will publish the same in their papers.

William P. Martin Clk"

This identical article was published also on July 7, 1775 in Virginia Gazette.

This is included here to be sure to clear Captain John Pigg of this accusation of being "inimical to the Cause". There are interesting references to the above publication in the issue on July 8, 1775 of the Virginia Gazette found in Volume 33, p. 64, Virginia Colonial Abstracts King and Queen by Beverly Fleet, quoting: "The Horrid Behavior of John Pigg Esq." Then he quotes the publication in "The Virginia Gazette", which is included above. Then he makes the following comment, quoting: "Note. This name of an aristocratic and rich old King and Queen family (later of the Western Counties) always galled and mortified me. We are now told they were a Hugenot family named Pique. We can be right vulgar in Virginia when we put our minds to it, so we reduce a chip on the shoulder to the pig-sty - Oich - Oinch: King and Queen was altogether too Elizabethan. However did a Pigg escape marrying my relatives the Garlicks? B.F."

Also on same page, quoting: "Memo of no importance: Upon coming upon this Pigg note in my papers I immediately took it over to my distinguished neighbors Mr. and Mrs. John Powell who I caught in the act of having their awftahnoon tea. They were much amused at the repeated words 'the said Pigg'. B.F." The above not only proves he was 100 percent loyal, but also remained loyal to American Liberty. His service was both active participation as well as patriotic service.

History shows the Committee did not nominate him again as a Captain on Sept. 27, 1775. They were antagonistic, according to the above.

When a request was made for the War Record of John Pigg's service in the Revolutionary War, the reply was to ask for the State Library Report in 1911 Rev. War Soldiers - John Pigg War 5 p. 152. This was done. It was as follows:

Because there is no proof that he was from Pittsylvania Co., Va. this record was not declared the service of John Pigg of Pittsylvania Co., Va. Mrs. Maude Carter Clement, the historian of the county was questioned; her reply was, this was his record. Later, Mrs. Clement's mother, Mrs. Carter, said she knew it was the record of her ancestor, John Pigg. The date of Mrs. Carter's letter was March 12, 1932. The patriotism of John Pigg has been amply preserved. He was a generous supporter of the Revolutionary Cause. The following proves this In Commissioner's Book V Pittsylvania Co., Va. is found, quoting:

There may be more but this proves he was a loyal patriot who gave service and supplies to the Cause. And it is true there was no other citizen in that County named John Pigg in those days.

The will of Paul Pigg, seen above, proves that John Pigg was a son of his first wife, Elizabeth. Her maiden surname was declared to be Pigg. From this study it is seen that Paul Pigg was a citizen of King William Co. and his son, John Pigg, was born there ca. 1720 and died in Pittsylvania Co., Va. in 1785, according to his will. The evidence already given proves that John Pigg (1720 ?- 1785) was a member of the fourth generation in Virginia. His will gives, for his lineage, the names of the fifth generation. Due to the dimness, some of the words are omitted.

JOHN PIGG'S WILL Dated Oct. 10, 1782 - Prob. Feb. 21, 1785

In the name of God Amen the tenth day of October one thousand seven hundred and eighty two I John Pigg of the County of Pittsylvania being sick in body but of good sound memory, thanks be to Almighty God and calling to rememberance the uncertain Estate of this transitory life and that all flesh must yield to death when it shall please God to call, do make, constitute, ordain and declare this my last Will and Testament ... manner and form following, revoking and annulling by these presents all and ev.... Testament or Testaments, Will and Wills heretofore by me mede and declare ... by word or

Writing and this is to be taken only for my last Will and Test.... none other and first being penitant and sorry from the bottom of my Sins past most humbly desiring forgiveness for the sam.... my Soul unto Almighty God my Saviour and redeemer in whom and by the Merits of Jesus Christ I trust and assuredly to be sav'd and have full remition and forgiveness of all my Sins and that my Soul with my body at a general day of the resurrection shall rise again with joy and through merits of Christs death and passion possess and inherit the Kingdom of heaven prepared for his elect and Chosen and my body to be buried in such a place where it shall please my Executors hereafter named to appoint. And now for the setling of my temporal Estate and such Goods Chattles and debts as it hath pleased God far above my deserts to bestow upon me, I do order give and dispose the same in manner and form following That is to say, first I Will that all these debts and dues I owe in right or conscience to any manner of person or persons whatsoever shall be well and truly contented and paid or ordained to be paid within convenient time after my decease by my Executors hereafter named.

Item, I lend to my beloved Wife Anne Pigg all my real and Personal Estate during her life or widowhood Except half the Mill I lend to my Son Hezekiah Pigg during my widow's life each to atend with their hands to keep the Mill in good repair. I give and bequeath to my Son Hezekiah Pigg to-wit, two Negroes named Joe and Ned, also two Guns, one Rifle and one smooth boar also one set of Silver Buckels Shoes Nee and Stock.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Keziah Hubbard two Negroes named Simon and Rose to her and the heirs of her body lawfully begotten also all the Land I hold on the North side of Barskin Creek I give to the same heir to be disposed on as before directed.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Eady Owen two Negroes named Sam and Nell to her and the heirs of her body lawfully begotten also all the Land I hold on the Southside of Barskin Creek Except a peace I give to my Son Hezekiah Pigg agreeable to Contract between him and me for a peace against the Mill. I give and bequeath to my Grand Son Field Robertson one Negore named Jack and if he dies without heir lawfully begotten then to return to the heirs of my body.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Robertson two Negroes named Fisher and Ned to her and to the heirs of her body lawfully begotten And in case any of the should die Negroe harry shall supply the place or places if not to be equally divided.

I give and bequeath my Watch to Jessy Robertson after my Wife's decease, and all the Estate after my Wife's decease not bequeathed to be equally divided amongst my children and I do constitute and ordain Anne Pigg and Hezekiah Pigg sole Executors of this my last Will and Testament. Given under my hand and Seal the date above written

- i. Hezekiah Pigg, see later.
- ii. Keziah Pigg, who was the wife of John Hubbard. See pp. 85, 109.
- iii. Eady Pigg, who was the wife of William Owen.
- iv. Elizabeth Pigg, who was the wife of Jesse Robertson.

He named one grandson, Field Robertson.

This study has attempted to uncover as many facts as possible for ancestors and descendants of the family of John Hubbard and his wife, Keziah Pigg, the daughter of John and Anne Clement Pigg. No effort to contact Hezekiah, Eady and Elizabeth's people met with response. Marriages, however, are recorded here for the sake of those who care.

MARRIAGES

EADY PIGG

Eady Pigg, the daughter of John and Anne (Clement) Pigg, was born in Amelia Co., Va. She was named for her ancestor, Eady Clements, the wife of Jeremiah Clements, is the present day assumption.

A marriage license was issued on Feb. 24, 1769 to William Owen and Eady Pigg, the daughter of John Pigg. John Owen was bondsman. (See p. 86 W & M Quar. Vol. 6, ser. 1 (1897) and Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg.). They were residing in Pittsylvania Co. when her father died in 1785 and inherited from his estate land on southside of Bearskin Creek and two slaves, Sam and Nell. They had land transactions in the county but no further facts are known. If they had children there are no known facts for this record. It is assumed that William Owen was the son of John Owen who had sons William and John listed in 1767 on the list of tithables in Pittsylvania Co., Va. (See p. 277)

History of Pitts. Co., Va. by M.C. Clement). John Owen was his bondsman on his marriage license.

ELIZABETH PIGG

Elizabeth Pigg, daughter of John and Anne (Clement) Pigg, was born in Amelia Co., Va. She was named, perhaps, for her Aunt Elizabeth (Clement) Ford, since her brother, Hezekiah Ford Pigg, was named for Elizabeth's husband, Hezekiah Ford. On March 28, 1771 Jesse Robertson and Betsey Pigg, daughter of John Pigg, were issued a marriage license. John Cox was his bondsman. See W & M Quar. Vol. 6, Ser. 1, p. 86 and Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg. They resided in Pittsylvania Co., Va. She was living when her father made his will and bequeathed to his daughter, Elizabeth Robertson, two of his negroes, to Jesse Robertson, his watch and to his grandson, Field Robertson, he bequeathed his servant Jack. This grandson was only a teenage boy at that time. This will proves Jesse and Elizabeth (Pigg) Robertson had at least one child. No other facts sent.

HEZEKIAH FORD PIGG 174-?-1785

Hezekiah Ford Pigg, the son of John and Anne (Clement) Pigg, was born in Amelia Co., Va. He was perhaps their oldest living child when his father, John Pigg, made his will in 1785. If he was the oldest, he was born around 1744, since Keziah, his oldest sister, was born May 20, 1745. He was certainly above age in 1767 when he was on the list of Land owners and tithes in Pittsylvania Co., Va. (Pitts. Co., Va. Hist. by M.C. Clement, p. 286). His life was very short. Tradition says he was active in the management of his father's Mill and he inherited this business, also the land. He was a man who owned books, which in those days, meant appreciation of them. He was a loyal patriotic citizen in the Rev. War days. He signed the Oath of Allegiance in the district of Herebin Pain, who canvassed and dated the list Aug. 26, 1777. (See p. 288, Pitts. Co. Chatham, Va. War Records). He was among early citizens whose inventories listed books in an era when many citizens never owned books and when books were not plentiful.

THE WILL OF HEZEKIAH PIGG

In the Name of God Amen. I, Hezekiah Pigg of Pittsylvania County tho weak in body yet thro the abundant mercy and goodness of god of a sound and perfect memory do constatute this my last Will and testament and desire it to be received as such by all - I give my body to the Earth from whence it was taken to be buried in a christian like manner I most humbly bequeath my Soul to God who gave it begging his gracious acceptance of the same. Item I land unto _ _ _ beloved wife Elizabeth the Plantation with four hundred acres of Land adjoining the same whereon I now live during her widowhood, Also Jane, Sarah, bigg Bell, little Beth, also one black Mare and bay colt and a paceing bay Horse, Also all the Stock of Cattle, Sheep and Hoggs, Also the household furniture. Item I give and bequeath unto my Eldest Son Hezekiah Pigg a horse called the long bay and a new Saddle for him to receive at present to dispose of as he pleases. Also when he comes of age one Negroe boy named Morrice and his equal part of all the Land I possess and a bed and furniture Item I give and bequeath unto my son John Pigg when he comes of age one horse and saddle and one bed and furniture Also one Negro boy named Jo, also his equal part of all the Land I possess. Item I give and bequeath unto my

daughter Ann Pigg one good horse and Saddle, a Bed and furniture, Also one Neoro girl named Patt Item I give and bequeat unto my Son Clemment Pigg one Horse & saddle, one Bed and furniture, Also one Negro Boy name Abraham and his equal of all the Land I possess, including the Plantation I live on after his Mother's death. Item I devise that if any of the Legates given should die ___ other Negroes or Horses that the Legatees should be made equal to the rest of my Children before the Sail of my Estate Item, I desire that Easther and Ruth should be sold to the highest bidder for a _ _ at which Sail the byer shall be _ _ with a dispute there is in the right and to by at his or her one risk Also four geldings and a _ _ Horse to be sold at the same time and at the same Terms Also all the nu Store Goods I have by me at the same Terms. Item I desire that after paying all my just debts to lay out what money remains in Negroes Item if one of the children should die their part of the Estate to be equily divided among the rest of the children. Item I desire that after the Widowhood of my wife that all Estate not given should be equaly divided among all my Children Item I appoin for my Executor my well beloved wife Niclos Pick and Silvanus Stok - Item I do constitute this my last Will and Testament this and no other as with my hand and seal this 2nd day of July 1784.

Test Jno Bailey, William Pigg Catrum Tui ?

At a Court held for Pittsylvania County the 21^t day of Nov^r 1785. This last Will and Testament of Hezekiah Pigg deceased was presented into Court by Elizabeth Pigg his Executrix therein named and proved by the Daths of two of the witnesses thereto and Ordered to be recorded and on the motion of the said Executrix who made Dath according to Law Certificate is granted her for obtaining a probate thereof in due form of Law giving Security. Where upon she together with William Pigg and John Chattin her securities entered into and acknowledged their Bond according to Law and liberty is reserved to the other Executors named in the sd Will to join in the probate there of when they shall think fit.

Teste Will Tunstall Cl.

(See pp. 147, 148 D. & W. No. 11, Pitts. Co., Va. (1780-1781) Reel 31, Va. State Archives).

The above will proves that the children of Hezekiah Ford and Elizabeth Pigg were:

- i. Hezekiah Pigg, who mar. Agnes Owen, Oct. 12, 1785.
- ii. John Pigg, who mar. Lucretia Payne, Oct. 28, 1787.
- iii. Ann Pigg, who mar. Jesse Duncan, May 1, 1784.
- iv. Clement Pigg, who mar. Nancy Elliott.

It is interesting to notice that the son Hezekiah was not of age on July 2, 1784, when his father made his will and on Oct. 12, 1785, his mother had to give her consent when his marriage license was issued. This proves that he was born after 1764. It indicates also that his father was deceased or too ill to do this, when the license was granted. Agnes Owen was the daughter of John Owen.

Mrs. Elizabeth Pigg, the widow of Hezekiah Ford Pigg (1744-1785), married the second time Adin Gray. No other information.

The following information was sent to the compiler in a letter written by Elizabeth (Bettie) (Pigg) Carter, (Mrs. James Carter Jr.). This letter

was dated March 12, 1932. At that time there were no plans for the present compilation. Therefore, dates and other details were not included. This information is included now for the sake of those who may care. Due to lack of time, the compiler cannot do the essential research for each individual.

CLEMENT PIGG

Clement Pigg, named in his father's will on July 2, 1784, was the son of Hezekiah Ford and Elizabeth (?) Pigg. His dates are not known. His marriage license, it is assumed, may be found in Pitts. Co., Va. He married Nancy Elliott. They were the parents of eleven children. They were named by Mrs. Carter in the following order.

HEZEKIAH FORD PIGG

Hezekiah Ford Pigg, the son of Clement and Nancy (Elliott) Pigg, married Martha Henry Rutledge. He served in the Confederate States Army as a Corporal in Joesph Terry's Co., 53rd Va. Regiment. His will was probated at Pittsylvania Co., Va. courthouse on Oct. 12, 1908. Their children were:

ELIZABETH PIGG

Elizabeth Pigg (Bettie), the daughter of Hezekiah Ford and Martha Henry (Rutledge) Pigg, married in Pittsylvania Co., Va. James Carter Jr., born April 9, 1842, died March 20, 1916, the son of James Carter Sr. who married Lucy Lanier. Their children were:

- i. Rutledge Carter, mar. Annie Pollock.
- ii. Lanier Carter, mar. May Bell Moon.
- iii. Maud Carter, mar. Nathaniel E. Clement.
- iv. James Shirley Carter, mar. Katherine Coles.

This last family is found recorded on p. 248 Pittsylvania County History By Maude Carter Clement (Mrs. Nathaniel E. Clement). In the Court records of this county, the desired details for all of the above descendants of John Pigg's son, Hezekiah Ford Pigg (1744-1785), may be found.

Maude Carter Clement, our historian of the County of Pittsylvania, has left to every native of this county a wonderful heritage. The compiler

regrets that this family record was not planned during her lifetime so that her family could be the climax of this record. An accurate researcher can do this. Maud Carter married her distant cousin, Nathaniel Elliott Clement. They are the descendants of William Clement (died 1760) of Amelia Co., Va. Benjamin Clement, son of William and Anne Clement, is an ancestor of Nathaniel Elliott Clement. See p. 267, note 19, Pitts. Co., Va. Hist. By M.C. Clement. Anne Clement, the daughter of William and Anne Clement of Amelia Co. is an ancestor of Maude Carter. See this study. They were, therefore, distant cousins who married.

Nathaniel Elliott Clement, the son of Harry C. Clement Jr., was a patriotic citizen. In W.W. I, as a lawyer, he gave service to the registrants in their work of registering the men for the W.W. I Army. He was also chairman of the Staunton District for the sale of War Stamps for W.W. I. He served as a member of the Virginia House of Delegates 1916-1922 and as a member of the Virginia Senate 1922-1927.

In their first ten years (1657-1667) they were instrumental in having surveyed 5,945 acres of original forest and paying the passage of 120 people from England to the Virginia Colony. Analyzing this information, the above was the work of John (Pique) Pigg Senior. The next 44 years, (1673-1717). his sons, John, Edward and Henry, were chiefly responsible for the survey of 15,504 acres. In those 14 surveys, five included one or more friends. Immigrant headrights were not stated for all of these. Yet 196 more immigrants had their passage paid for them. Therefore, father and sons and a few friends introduced 316 others to Virginia in 50 years. The third generation has not been reviewed. Court records have been destroyed. Only one son of the third generation is included. He is Paul Pigg of King William, Amelia, Halifax and Pittsylvania. His land transactions are incomplete in this study. The fourth generation covered in this study is only his son John.

THE THIRD GENERATION

THE THIRD GENERATION

In the third generation, only one son of this generation can be included. This is Paul Pigg, whose father may have been John Pigg II, since his oldest son was named John Pigg (1720–1785). Paul Pigg married his first cousin, Elizabeth Pigg, the daughter of his Uncle Henry, if his father was John.

Hezekiah Hubbard, born Sept. 12, 1782 in Amelia County, Virginia, is the son of John and Keziah (Pigg) Hubbard. He died in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on Feb. 13, 1822. On Dec. 5, 1817, Rev. James Beck performed the wedding ceremony of Hezekiah Hubbard and Susanna Fuller. She was the daughter of Zachariah and Letty Fuller. Her brother, Jesse Fuller, served as bondsman. (See Mar. Reg., Pitts. Co., Va., p. 63, and Min. Ret.). There is no known record of her birth. The 1850 census records her age as 58 years, therefore, she was born in 1792. She died April 1, 1876, age 84, according to the Pitts. Co., Va. Death Register, p. 119, line 42. These two records prove she was born in 1792. The Register records her as the daughter of Zachariah and Letty Fuller, and consort of Hezekiah Hubbard.

Hezekiah Hubbard was around 4 years old when his parents moved to Pitt-sylvania County and he was around 11 years old when his father willed him 200 acres of land on both sides of Little Bearskin Creek, which had been purchased from Samuel Emerson of Lincoln Co. State not included.

Hezekiah Hubbard grew up under his mother's guidance on his mother's part of his father's lands. As time passed he seems to be the one to whom the family turned for guidance. It is observed that he stood by when his sisters were married and by error has been recorded in the published Marriage Register as father instead of brother of his sisters. This relationship is verified in their father, John Hubbard's Will (D. & W. Book Vol. 9, p. 464) and his Bible record herein recorded.

When the War of 1812 came, Hezekiah was among the privates who served in the Company of Capt. Jesse Carter, 7th Virginia Regiment. (See History of Pittsylvania Co., Va., Maude C. Clement, p. 214).

On Jan. 29, 1811, Hezekiah Hubbard bought 150 acres of land adjacent to his inherited land. This was a part of the land his brother, Isham Hubbard, had inherited from their father. This land was also on Bearskin Creek. When he was 21 years of age he owned 350 acres of land. (See Isham's Chapter)

When he was married he settled on this land and a few years later was buried there in the first grave on that farm. His widow lived there in their home and held this land until their children were all grown and settled. Her son, Franklin C. Hubbard, bought his two brother's interest in their parents 350 acres. She retained her right of dower and her own personal property, according to the 1850 census. Her son Franklin built a new residence and she lived there until her death. Later her first home was burned, so cannot be observed today. As time passed, Hezekiah Hubbard's oldest brother, Joseph Hubbard, was old and feeble. He came to live with his nephew Franklin and was 88 years old and owner of 518 acres in 1850.

Susannah Fuller Hubbard made a home for her son Franklin until he was around 36 years of age. After his marriage, she lived 21 years a loved as well as a devoted mother.

When Hezekiah and Susanah were married, he was 35 years old and she was 35 years of age. With his maturity and experience, they could look forward to years of worthy living. This dream did not come true. In some way his health failed and he died before he was 40 years old. The details of their few happy years are unknown. She was destined to 54 years of widowhood. They had 3 sons to rear and she did this well and they loved her. They too, had children who loved her. Their 3 sons were all born on their father's land:

- i, John Fuller Hubbard, b. Aug. 18, 1818, d. Aug. 12, 1888 at. Callands, Va.
- ii. Franklin Clement Hubbard, b. Sept. 18, 1819, d. Sept. 18, 1897 at Callands, Va.

iii. Augustin F. Hubbard, b. July 3, 1821, d. Aug. 4, 1857 in North Carolina on a journey to see his beloved mother. He was interred at Fairmount, Georgia on Aug. 7, 1857. His name was sent in as Augustin F. His descendants in Georgia write his name Augustine Fuller Hubbard. The original Bible record was burned.

The 1820 census for Mezekiah Hubbard proves that he owned 350 acres of land and his vocation was agriculture. He owned 11 slaves and this was Susannah's asset in her new responsibility as a widow. The three little boys may have grown up with no remembrance of their father, since the oldest was only $3\frac{1}{2}$ years old. They grew up under their mother's guidance to be three noble sons of whom any parents could be proud and this will be acknowledged by those who read their records. They did know their mother and loved her. This fact has been supported in every tradition that has been recalled in this study. She was lovingly called "Suky Hubbard". All of her grand children knew her as grandmother "Suky Hubbard" and always spoke of her with a reverent devotion. In the 1850 census she is recorded as Suky Hubbard.

She assumed her responsibility, lived in her own home and managed her own affairs. No doubt she received advice from her parents, his mother and the brothers of both of them, who lived near her. And it can be assumed that the servants were loyal and did their part. The fact remains that she succeeded in rearing her sons and gave each an education that enabled them to succeed in life. From the information given by her Georgia descendants, Susannah Fuller Hubbard had a good education and may have been her sons! best teacher. They possessed letters written by her to her daughter-in-law, Julia Letitia (Fuller) Hubbard, after the death of her son Augustin F. Hubbard in 1857. They were declared to be well written, beautiful letters and never a misspelled word. A request was made to include at least one, in this record. It was granted, but when they went to get the letters, they had been discarded as worthless old letters by someone who did not know. The Virginia relatives did not have letters. They lived in the same place and visited instead of writing. The first son to die was Augusting Fuller Hubbard. Later, when the letters were never found, the compiler was told that they were written to Solomon Fuller, the father of Juliana Latitia (Fuller) Hubbard and to Juliana after the death of Augustin Fuller Hubbard in 1857. In one of the letters it was recalled that Augustin's mother told Juliana, who was her niece as well as her daughter-in-law, that she was happy to know she was doing so well with her stock, cows, hogs, mules etc. She told her she prayed for her and her little boys, that they might become great men. The Lord answered her prayer. It was an earnest prayer since she herself had been left a widow, to rear her own 3 sons alone. Those two little boys grew up to be worthy men, staunch Christians, highly respected by the one who had preserved those beautiful letters so many years. The following records will verify the above statements that were made in 1968, by Ethel Hubbard Newman of Ringgold, Georgia.

AUGUSTIN FULLER HUBBARD

Augustin Fuller Hubbard, born July 3, 1821, the son of Hezekiah and Susannah (Fuller) Hubbard, was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. When his cousin Samuel O. Fuller went to Georgia to try out making a crop of tobacco in that state, he went with him. Both were well satisfied and when the seventeen families went to Georgia, he went with them. The story of this adventure is recorded in the Fuller section. Maurice Solomon Fuller, the brother of Susannah Fuller Hubbard, moved his entire family there in 1849, and settled in Salacoa Valley, Georgia. There are no facts known about Augustin Hubbard's plans. He was in

love with Julia Letitia Fuller, his first cousin, born Dec. 11, 1832. She was the daughter of Solomon Fuller and only 17 years old on Dec. 11, 1849 after they arrived in Georgia. On Jan. 4, 1851 in Georgia, Augustine Fuller Hubbard married Julia Letitia Fuller, born Dec. 11, 1832. See Fuller section. She was 18 years old and he was nearly 30 years old. He died around $6\frac{1}{2}$ years later on Aug. 4, 1857. She lived a widow over 57 years and died in Fairmount, Georgia on Oct. 30, 1914.

Augustin Hubbard was an industrious young man. He knew the intricacies of tobacco growing, a business that demands knowledge and dedication to work, if there is success. He only owned one third of 350 acres of his father's estate in Virginia and he went out and bought 160 acres of land in Georgia and settled on it. Then he did full time farming and taught school during the intervals that farm work was not demanding his entire time. The community depended upon him as a teacher. Augustin Hubbard made a small pine table with a drawer to hold his papers used in teaching. This table was cherished by Juliana, his wife, as lovingly as if it had been made of valuable lumber. She selected her granddaughter, Ethel Overton Hubbard, as the heir to this treasured table. Today in 1976, it is over 120 years old.

During those years, he taught the children in the Jefferson family. Years later, one of those Jefferson girls taught the children of Augustin Hubbard. Then Augustin's son, John Franklin Hubbard, taught his teacher's children. Later, her daughter taught John Franklin Hubbard's children. In other words, for more than a century, this interchange of teacher and students continued in Augustin Hubbard's family and the Jefferson family descendants. This is one example of the close contact and friendship among the families of "Little Virginia Colony" in Georgia.

In the Fuller section, there is a statement that those Virginia settlers hastily built their homes and, as soon as possible, a building in which all denominations would worship was constructed, and it was to serve also as the school house. All denominations used it at first. In this church the Fair-view Methodist Church was organized in 1854 and still survives in 1976. It was in this building that Augustin Hubbard taught school. Augustin and Juliana Hubbard were members of the Methodist group worshiping there. They were consistent in their Christian living. His favorite hymn was "How Tedious and Tasteless the Hours When Jesus No Longer I See".

His oldest child, who was not 6 years old when his father died, lived to be 98 years, 7 months and 15 days of age, remembering many things his father did. He recalled that his father purchased a new Bible one day and gave it to his mother, saying that they must read it to the children. One of his granddaughters owns that Bible today. This son, John Franklin, was present when Augustin Hubbard discharged a man in his employment who took the name of the Lord in vain in the presence of his two small sons. The man assured him he would not do this again. Augustin told him he could not take that risk. This son appreciated all of his life, his father's daring not to take that risk.

In the spring of 1857 during the wheat harvest, Augustin Hubbard suffered heat exhaustion so severely that he was slow in recovery. He was scheduled to teach school that summer, but was so unwell, Juliana persuaded him to abandon the task. She planned instead for him to go to Virginia to visit his mother. He would not do this because she was not able to travel with him that distance that summer. When Juliana learned their neighbor, Abner Jefferson, had planned a trip to Va. driving a wagon, she insisted upon Augustin going with him to visit his beloved mother. He went with Mr. Jefferson. They traveled in a covered wagon

At noon on Aug. 4, 1857, they stopped at a spring near the roadside.

Mr. Jefferson prepared the meal, but Augustin rested, lying on the ground near the spring. When the food was prepared, they ate. Then Augustin suggested resting an hour or two longer, and they did this. When Mr. Jefferson awakened, he called Augustin, suggesting that they should be on their way. He received no response. Augustin Hubbard had died while asleep, on Aug. 4, 1857.

They were in North Carolina a days journey from the home of his mother, Susannah Hubbard. Mr. Jefferson secured help. A coffin was quickly prepared, and Mr. Jefferson alone returned to Georgia and arrived at the home of Solomon Fuller around 2 o'clock in the morning on Aug. 7, 1857. Juliana and the children were at her father's home, while Augustin was to be away. The family and slaves were awakened and his grave was made ready while others were informed, because it was necessary to bury him at once. At sunrise he was laid to rest in the Cedar Grove the Fuller family had agreed upon as a family resting place. His grave was the second one. Esther Fuller, the little 2 year old girl, was interred in 1852. Today there is a large cemetery there where the descendants of the Fuller and Taylor family are interred. Since 1906 no new graves have been made there.

Juliana Hubbard never ceased to grieve for Augustin and regretted all her life that she urged him to go. She bore her cross bravely. This was in August 1857 and her fourth child, Susanna Augustine Hubbard, was born five months later.

Juliana Hubbard had 160 acres of land and 4 children. Her father gave her 2 slaves, a man and his wife. The next year her father, Solomon Fuller, died. Then the War Between the States came and three of her dear brothers paid the supreme sacrifice in that war.

Juliana, however, was artistic and capable. She could do beautiful sewing. She not only made dresses but coats and pants for many people. She had learned to weave. The coverlets and counterpanes from her loom were in artistic patterns and very beautiful. She had also knowledge in dyeing cloth Much of this work was done at night. Her servants Henry and his wife, Marietta, stood by her during all of her sorrow. As long as they lived they never faltered in their loyalty. When the War Between the States was over and they were free to do and go where they pleased, there was no change, they were at home. They were Christians and lived on in their home adjoining the yard of the Hubbard home until they died. Both of them were ill at ease when there was an electric storm. Henry resorted to prayer but Marietta hastened to put on her best clothes just as soon as she heard the thunder. She desired to be dressed up if she were blown away. Juliana, her understanding mistress, humored her in this. She could leave her task and dress in her best clothes. These old colored people were regarded as good people as people can be. They will never be forgotten. They were loyal and capable, worthy people.

Her children received all the education she could secure for them. The quality can be judged by the life of their son John, as recorded later, also his brother James.

After all of her children were grown and married, in 1904 her son James Overton Hubbard bought the home of his parents and she then resided in their home until her death on Oct. 30, 1914. During those 10 years there was harmony between Juliana and her daughter—in—law. There was never a harsh word between them, was declared by Ethel Overton (Hubbard) Newman. The children of Augustin Fuller and Juliana Letitia (Fuller) Hubbard were:

- John Franklin Hubbard, b. Oct. 10, 1851 in Ga. & d. there May 25, 1950.
- ii. James Overton Hubbard, b. Oct. 16, 1853 in Ga. & d. there March 12, 1925.

- iii. Matilda Ann Hubbard, b. Nov. 28, 1855 in Georgia. d, there May 24, 1896.
- iv. Susannah Augustine Hubbard, b. Jan. 16, 1858 in Ga. d. age 75 in 1933.

MARRIAGES

JOHN FRANKLIN HUBBARD

John Franklin Hubbard, b. Oct. 10, 1851 in Georgia, d. May 25, 1950, was the son of Augustin and Juliana Letitia (Fuller) Hubbard, and their oldest child. His father named him John Franklin, the first given names of his own two brothers living in Virginia. He was not six years of age when he lost his father. He grew up under his Mother's guidance. He was 13 years old when Lee surrendered. His youth was shadowed by War and the Reconstruction era. He acquired a very exceptional education and learned farming. He was said to be also an exceptional carpenter.

In his young adult life he visited his uncles in Virginia and corresponded with his cousin John Mitchell Hubbard. A letter with his address was among John M. Hubbard's old letters that had been preserved. The compiler, in 1928, wrote him a letter hoping he was living asking for facts regarding Augustin Hubbard's family. He replied. He was around 78 years of age. The kindred of this family are greatly indebted to him for many dates and details herein recorded. He had kept full names and dates for the Fuller and Hubbard relatives. He and his niece, Ethel Overton (Hubbard) Newman sent all they knew.

The routine of his life has not been given in order and for a man of his ability and prominence these brief statements are inadequate. He was a student of A. H. Showalter and E. O. Excell when they came to Cartersville, Ga. and conducted classes. John Franklin and James Overton Hubbard were fond of music. John Franklin Hubbard became a great song leader. Years later, after their sojourn in life was over a relative recalled "How Firm A Foundation" was James' favorite hymn and that John's was "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" and added "...his life seemed to be to praise the Lord."

It is said that he taught school for many years at Fairview and when a very young man he was in the mercantile business and Postmaster at Greely, Cherokee Co., Ga. While there he met and married on March 27, 1892, Sallie Elizabeth Jones. She was b. March 1865 and died in March 1903. They had one adorable little girl. The Mother and little girl died.

He was interested in civic affairs and church activities. He was an active member os his church and he never missed a service. In God's kingdom he was faithful to the trust conferred upon him and regarded his efforts to be only his duty. At that time he had been teacher for 7 years of the Advanced Sunday School Class and had been absent only twice. He was then 78 years old. He assisted in the organization of the first Sunday School in that section where he lived. He was always ready to help his fellow man. At age 77 he was at Court serving as a juror, and he remained active until his death 21 years later at age 98 years, 7 months and 15 days.

John Franklin Hubbard married the second time, Lillian Olive Reese on December 8, 1907. She was born April 4, 1876 and died Sept. 2, 1950. They resided at Fairmount, Ga. At one time he was Postmaster there. He lived to be almost 99 years of age and hoped to see his 100th. birthday since he was so near it. However, he is the oldest person included in this study. He was rather active until his very last days and present at Sunday School and Church until a short time before his death. His faith in God and his delight in God's Word

never wavered. His funeral was held at Fairmount Methodist Church on May 28, 1950 by Rev. Dumas Shellnut. At the graveside the final rites were conducted by the Masonic Order. He had been a member of that order many years. A general comment has seemed to be "He lived to Praise the Lord". The children of John Franklin and Lillian Olive (Reese) Hubbard were:

James Overton Hubbard, born Oct. 16, 1953 in Georgia, died there on March 12, 1925. He was the second child of Augustin and Juliana Letitia (Fuller) Hubbard. He married on Oct. 6, 1881 Corrie Louise Wikel, born Jan. 10, 1861 and died Oct. 29, 1935. They resided at Fairmount, Ga. and owned his father's old home. He was a farmer and had a factory for manufacturing tobacco. He was a member of the Methodist Church. He loved the hymn "How Firm a Foundation". He died of cancer after a long illness of around two years.

When James Overton Hubbard became of age he went back to Virginia for a couple of years. This means he was there in the years 1874 to 1876. It seems that he was in the home of his Uncle John Fuller Hubbard. He was interested in the manufacturing of tobacco and went there to acquire accurate knowledge. The details are not known today. Tradition declares he had a satisfaction in his companionship with his Hubbard cousins that he enjoyed through correspondence for many years. He also succeeded in his study in manufacturing tobacco, to the extent that he built his own factory for this business and kept it up for years until that type of tobacco industry became too great.

Since the marriage certificate has been preserved and sent by Mrs. Ethel Overton (Hubbard) Newman, their daughter, the compiler includes it here for all of those who are interested. It will be recorded after their family record. They had eleven children:

Beula Alice Blackwell, born May 13, 1913, was the daughter of William Homer and Mary Eell (Elrod) Blackwell. She married on March 14, 1930 Ralph Richard Trippe, born Oct. 11, 1906. Children:

This completes the data sent by Mrs. William Merlin Elrod in 1931. After she was 75 years old in 1933, she passed away. Exact dates of her and her husband's deaths were never sent. See the Fuller section for the ancestors of Augustin Fuller Hubbard and his wife, Juliana Letitia Fuller Hubbard.

FRANKLIN CLEMENT HUBBARD

Franklin Clement Hubbard was born Sept. 18, 1819 in the home of his parents, Hezekiah and Susanna (Fuller) Hubbard, who lived on their farm on Bearskin Creek near Callands, Virginia. He was born there, he always lived there and after death, was buried there. He died on Sept. 18, 1897, age 78 years.

Franklin Clement Hubbard's brothers, John Fuller and Augustin Fuller Hubbard, married and left their mother's home. He did not marry until after he was 35 years old. Living at home with his mother, he was farming the land of his deceased father and was heir to one third of the land. He came to desire to own the entire farm and his brothers responded to his desire. A deed dated May 28, 1856 proves that John F. Hubbard and Stella C. Hubbard sold to Franklin C. Hubbard for 333 dollars and 30 cents their entire interest and claims to the lands of Hezekiah Hubbard dec'd which was 1/3 part bounded by lands of John Nuckols, Levi Nuckols, Thomas Harris, F.C. Hubbard and others etc.

Prior to this Augustin F. Hubbard had sold his interest in his father's estate to his brother, is seen by the following transaction. Evidently in some way Augustin's deed was not satisfactory and after his death his widow made the following deed. The following cleared the title of Hezekiah Hubbard's lands to his son, Franklin Clement Hubbard.

"This deed made this day January 23 1858 between Julina L. Hubbard widow of Augustin F. Hubbard of the first part and Franklin C. Hubbard of the second part witnesseth that whereas the said Augustin F. Hubbard in his life time Viz on the 24th day of April 1854 sold to the said Franklin C. Hubbard the premises herein after described for the sum of \$333 $^{\Omega\Omega}$ which sum was on said day paid by the said Franklin C. Hubbard to the said Augustin F. Hubbard and whereas by paper writing dated the 17th day of November 1854 & intended to be a deed the said Augustin F. Hubbard and the said Juliana his wife purported to convey said premises to the said Franklin C. Hubbard & intended thereby to convey the same and where as it appears that the said papers does not operate as a deed from the fact that it was not sealed and is void as to the said Juliana L. because it is not properly certified or acknowledged as to her now in consideration of the premises & for the further consideration of one dollar to her in hand paid by the Franklin C. Hubbard she the said Juliana L. Hubbard doth grant unto the said Franklin C. Hubbard all right title or claim of every nature or kind vested in her as widow of said Augustin F. Hubbard or arising from any other right title or claim in and to the real estate belonging to the estate of Hezekiah Hubbard dec'd the same consisting of a tract of land lying in the County of Pittsylvania & State of Virginia on the waters of bearskin and containing about three hundred and fifty acres the interest of the said Augustin F. Hubbard was one undivided third in the said land and said interest was sold as aforesaid to the said Franklin C. Hubbard and it is expressly understood that their deed is intended to convey & release all right of dower & damage for detention of dower in said land in addition to the interest here in before specified

The above shows that Franklin Clement Hubbard, the second son of Hezekiah and Susannah (Fuller) Hubbard, bought from their above sons, and his own brothers, all of the land owned by Hezekiah Hubbard (1782–1822). Franklin Clement Hubbard became the owner of this land 36 years after his father's death. D.8. # 57, p. 535, Pitts. Co., Va.

Prior to the above transaction there is another interesting deed made to Franklin C. Hubbard by his old, feeble Uncle Joseph Hubbard, who was 88 years old in 1850. He made a deed and dated it Sept. 17, 1850 for natural love and affection to his nephew Franklin C. Hubbard and divers other good causes and granted all his land, his negroes and other property he possessed to him and signed

Part of Joseph Hubbard's lands, he had inherited from his father, John Hubbard's will dated June 23, 1793 and recorded Dec. 16, 1793. D. & W. Bk. Vol. 9, p. 464, Pitts. Co., Va. This means that Franklin Clement Hubbard owned around 600 acres, at least, of the lands once owned by his grandfather, John Hubbard (1738–1793). No effort has been made to learn the acreage owned by Franklin Clement Hubbard during his life, but he owned other lands at various times in that section of the county.

He was also a farmer and was successful in that field. They owned many slaves. His mother had slaves, his Uncle Joseph owned slaves which were deeded to him on Sept. 17, 1850 and perhaps he owned others. This meant successful farming was essential to support so many people. Their slaves were a loyal, happy group of people. They were well cared for and contented through

the years. They were a loved and petted group. One young slave boy, Ned, brought sorrow to all. He did not like to work. When he was a teenage youth he ran away one summer. Everyone was sad and no effort to find him was successful. He was dead or stolen was believed. In the fall, however, he returned, ragged and not at all fine in appearance. He had been hiding out and subsisting on wild life. He was welcomed home, given good winter clothing and the former kindness. When summer returned, he disappeared. Then his companion slaves became very angry with him. He returned in the autumn season. He received the same kind treatment but his family regarded it unfair because he had not done his part to earn a living.

The third summer he was absent but returned earlier. One afternoon his old "mistriss", Franklin Hubbard's mother, went to see a sick neighbor. She walked alone. Part of the path was a half mile through woods. When she returned she was surprised to see Ned approaching her. They were in that body of woods. She said "Why Ned, how nice of you to come to meet me. You are so good to do this. It is getting late". He made no reply, but walked in the path behind her. She continued to talk cheerfully to him all the way home, but he said very little. She was puzzled by his sudden concern. Franklin Hubbard was away from home and his mother was alone that evening. Someone came up the steps and walked across the porch and knocked on the door. She recognized the footsteps of Ned. She was filled with fear yet was wise enough not to express it. She called to him "Ned is that you?" and opened the door. "What is the matter? Come in. Are you sick?" He came in and sat down. No, he was not sick. He came just to see her, was all she accomplished in the few remarks he did make. Finally he got up and went back to his home.

When her son returned and heard these two strange actions of Ned, he was alarmed. He declared that Ned must be sold. They had the annual "Corn shucking" that week. Franklin Hubbard remained at home and near the house in the meantime. When the "Corn Shucking" was over, Franklin Hubbard walked over to Ned; the county sheriff was with him. He said, "Ned, I am going to sell you. You run away and will not work and your people feel you do not do right". The officer arrested him. He was taken away and sold on the condition that he would be far enough away not to return.

When the War Between the States was over, Franklin Hubbard took a trip on horseback. He was in the state of South Carolina riding on the highway one day. His horse was trotting along. He saw a very bent old negro man walking on one side of the road and passed him. "Oh Mars Frank, Mars Frank." he called. He stopped his horse and the man came toward him. "Mars Frank I'se eo glad to see you." He replied, "But I do not know who you are; who are you?" "I'se Ned, Mars Frank." he said. It was unbelievable to see young Ned look so old. Ned told his story in his own words and thanked "Mars Frank" for selling him. He said he went to meet his dear old mistress in the woods to kill her but she was so sweet and kind he could not do it. He was so determined to kill her and he went to the house that night to kill her but she opened the door, invited him in and was anxious to help him if he was sick and he couldn't do it, so he went back to his home. Yet he was going to do it later. He was then so glad he was sold before he killed her. He loved her and was glad he did not kill her.

His former master then expressed his surprise and grief to see him so old and crippled up. Ned then told him what his story was. He explained that he did the way he was doing in Virginia and he said he got what he deserved. When he was beaten almost to death, they left him to die. He survived and he had repented of his wrong way, but most of all he was glad he was sent away from Virginia and was saved from killing his kind, good, old mistress. This

story has always been sad to those who heard it but saddest to Franklin Hubbard and his mother. They and no one else understood how a person can be influenced to harm the best friend they have.

Franklin Clement Hubbard was a prominent man in his community. He had the confidence of the citizens of his county, as confirmed when "Franklin C. Hubbard qualified for Constable on June 21, 1852". D.8. 41, p. 423. He served 2 years from July 1, 1852 for District Eleven. He and John H.S. Hubbard qualified as overseers of the Poor on Sept. 18, 1860. (D.8. 46, p. 12).

The U.S. 1860 census for Pittsylvania Co., Va. lists Franklin Clement Hubbard as a farmer with real estate valued at \$5,800.00 which indicates a vast acreage. His personal property was evaluated at \$6,148.00. Tobacco was the money crop. Wheat, corn and other grains were planted. He had cattle, horses, hogs, sheep and poultry in a plentiful supply. A garden and orchard added comfort. His family enjoyed the life of a prosperous farmer.

D.B. 6, p. 238 proves that F.C. Hubbard was Justice of the Peace in Pitts. Co., Va. Aug. 25, 1865, (ibid, p. 367) and he was still J.P. dated June 19, 1866 (ibid, p. 267). For lack of time the records have not been searched by the compiler for further details.

When he was around 35 years old, a marriage license was issued on June 4, 1855 to Frank C. Hubbard and Sarah Letitia Fuller. Rev. Joseph W. Eanes performed their ceremony on June 7, 1855 and reported it on July 8, 1855. (Mar. Reg. and Minister's Returns, Pitts. Co., Va., p. 160). She was born March 31, 1831 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. near Callands and died June 24, 1909. She was the daughter of Absalom and Nancy Preston (Robertson) Fuller. Her ancestors are recorded in the Fuller section. She was also his first cousin, the daughter of his mother's brother. She was called Sallie by everyone. All knew her to be a noble, sincere, cheerful, Christian woman. kind hearted and appreciative person. She was a member of the Christian Church. Franklin Clement Hubbard was of the Fundamental Baptist Faith, according to tradition and never united with any chruch. Franklin Clement and Sarah Letitia Hubbard were interred in the family graveyard near their first born son and his parents, Hezekiah and Susannah (Fuller) Hubbard. They had 10 children. All were born in the home of their parents near Callands, Va. Through the years various relatives have sent the data for their children as follows:

Later it was learned that Franklin Clement Hubbard's family record is in his grandfather John Hubbard's Bible. In 1976 the compiler was sent the following record from that John Hubbard (1738-1793) Bible. It is here included for its historical value. Recorded on the last page of II Maccabees, quoting:

EMMA BELLE HUBBARD

Emma Belle Hubbard, born Dec. 29, 1863 at Callands, Va., died July 26, 1944 at her home on Langhorne Lane, Lynchburg, Va. She was the daughter of Franklin Clement and Sarah Letitia (Fuller) Hubbard. She married on Oct. 26, 1884 Jefferson Davis Fuller, the son of Henry Brittain and Irena Jane (Fuller) Fuller. He was born Nov. 4, 1861. He died, 1944 in Lynchburg, Va. They were interred in Fort Hill Burial Park, Lynchburg, Va. Their family, with known details, is recorded in the Fuller section. See p. 432.

SUSAN ELIZA HUBBARD

A marriage license was issued on Oct. 15, 1893 to Benjamin Franklin Hubbard, born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and Minnie G. Rogers. His parents were named as Frank and Sally Hubbard. Her parents were recorded as Thomas T. and Lucy E. Rogers. (See Marriage Register in Clerks Office, Rocky Mount, Franklin Co., Va.), They resided in Roanoke, Va. His will is dated April 27, 1925. Recorded April 27, 1926 in W.B. # 3, p. 382, Roanoke Co., Va. Their children:

Annie Lillian Hubbard, born Aug. 30, 1899 is the daughter of Benjamin Franklin and Minnie Gertrude (Rogers) Hubbard. A marriage license was issued on Aug. 19, 1921 to Oscar A. Wall and Annie L. Hubbard. This record shows that she was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and is the daughter of B.F. and Minnie G. Hubbard, and he is the son of A.J. and Cora A. Wall. (See Mar. Reg., Roanoke Co., Va.).

After the death of Benjamin Franklin Hubbard, his widow married the second time. On Jan. 18, 1928, a marriage license was issued to Minor M. Pastel, born in Franklin Co., Va. and Minnie Gertrude Hubbard, born in Pitts. Co., Va. Her parents were recorded as T.T. and Lucy E. Rogers and his parents were Ben and Julia A. Pastel. They have no children.

After the death of Minor M. Pastel, his widow, Minnie Gertrude (Rogers) (Hubbard) Pastel married the third time. She married Lelia Ashby Arnn. This was the third marriage for each of them. They have no children. She passed away first and was interred by her first husband, the father of her children. When he died he was interred by his first wife, the mother of his children.

MAUDE HUNTER HUBBARD

Maude Hunter Hubbard, born Aug. 28, 1870, died Feb. 6, 1941, lived her entire life in Pittsylvania Co., Va. She was the daughter of Franklin Clement and Sarah Letitia (Fuller) Hubbard. On Dec. 3, 1898 she married William Meredith Lawrence, born July 26, 1872, died Dec. 26, 1949. PERCY ROSS HUBBARD

Percy Ross Hubbard, born Dec. 5, 1874, the son of Franklin Clement and Sarah Letitia (Fuller) Hubbard, married in 1906 Sarena Oakes. They have no descendants.

WILLIAM MEREDITH LAWRENCE DR.

William Meredith Lawrence Jr., born May B, 1910, the son of William Meredith and Maude Hunter (Hubbard) Lawrence, died on Feb. 2, 1975. He never married.

He resided all of his life on the lands of his Hubbard ancestors. The land was acquired by John Hubbard, a great, great, grandfather; inherited by Hezekiah Hubbard, his great grandfather and owned by his grandfather, Franklin Clement Hubbard. His father, William Meredith Lawrence Sr., married Maude Hunter Hubbard and they resided on this land so long as they lived. After their deaths, their son, William Meredith Lawrence Jr. continued to live there. He was a cattle farmer and a tobacco grader.

He died very suddenly. He was buried in the cemetery of County Line Christian Church near Callands, Virginia.

It is interesting that William Meredith Lawrence's death was 190 years after his great, great grandfather, John Hubbard, settled in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Through all those years, some of his descendants have lived on this same land.

Facts for the Franklin Clement Hubbard family were given in Feb. 1929 by Mrs. Emma Belle (Hubbard) Fuller, who gave the information from 1819 to 1929. Mabel Clare Fuller, her daughter, was very helpful also in this project. Mrs. Mae Lawrence Reynolds also assisted. The compiler did some research but never completed this effort.

End of Franklin Clement Hubbard Family

JOHN FULLER HUBBARD SECTION

JOHN FULLER HUBBARD 8-18-1818 - 8-12-1888.

John Fuller Hubbard, born Aug. 18, 1818 on the farm of his parents on Bearskin Creek near Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va., is the oldest child of Hezekiah and Susannah (Fuller) Hubbard. He was named John for his grandfather Hubbard and Fuller in honor of his mother's family. When he was around three and one half years old, his father, Hezekiah Hubbard, died. It is possible to believe that this small boy grew up without any remembrance of his father.

John Fuller Hubbard grew up on the farm of his father under the guidance of his mother, Sukey Hubbard. Sukey was her love name in the Fuller and Hubbard family, and came to be the same to her neighbors. Farming was their source of income and John learned farming. His father left many loyal slaves

who co-operated in the farming and with the counseling of his uncles, brothers of his father and mother, who were near neighbors, he learned the facts for successful farming. Tobacco was the most important crop because it was the source of money. Its cultivation needed care but the market for it was in Richmond, Va. To reach it meant a long journey in covered wagons by way of a country road. At this point, without doubt, his training fell upon his uncles. John, as a young boy, made these journeys with them many times. These experiences were important and of great value in his development. He arrived at young manhood with the ability to be an overseer of any farm.

The steps in his education, otherwise, are unknown today. He did receive education sufficient to carry on his work, and this was all accomplished through private teachers. There was no public education when he was young. It is known today that his mother did write excellent letters. She may have been his best teacher and if this is true, John was an appreciative and faithful scholar.

It has been seen that Susannah (Fuller) Hubbard was an able, successful woman and did a wonderful work in rearing capable sons. Just when John Fuller Hubbard left his mother's home and started out alone is not known. It is normal to believe that he probably remained in his mother's home until his marriage.

On Jan. 5, 1847 a marriage license was issued to John F. Hubbard and Stella C. Mitchell. Her mother, Ann Mitchell, gave her consent and John C. Mitchell, her brother, was surety. On Jan. 7, 1847 Rev. Arthur W. Eanes performed their wedding ceremony. (See Mar. Reg. & Min. Ret., Pitts. Co., Va.) They were married in the home of her mother.

At that time John Fuller Hubbard was past his 28th birthday. Stella was 23 years old. They perhaps lived in her mother's home, since the 1850 census shows Anna Mitchell head of her household. She was 63 years old. Her youngest child, who was 21 years old, was at home. John F. Hubbard, age 32, she listed as her Overseer. His wife, Stella Hubbard, age 26, and their children Susan, age 2 and John, age 1, completed her household. John Fuller Hubbard was in charge of her affairs through the years and she had utmost faith in him.

John Fuller Hubbard was devoted to his own mother, has come down through the years by tradition. Evidence of this is seen in naming his first child, a daughter, Mary Ann Susan Hubbard. Mary for Mary (Sullivant) Atkins, Anna Mitchell's mother; Ann for Anna Mitchell and Susan for Susan Hubbard, his mother. Then they called her Susan for awhile. Ten years later in the 1860 census she was recorded as Mary A.S. Hubbard. Some time later the name Susan was dropped. No one knew her except as Mary Ann Hubbard. This is recorded here, lest the 1850 census lead someone astray. Susan was the oldest child, and as Mary, she lived a long and useful life, beloved by all her kindred and friends. The census record, however, testifies that his first born child was his mother's namesake and she was her grandmother Hubbard's first grand child. They lived for awhile in Anna Mitchell's home.

The 1860 census proves that John Fuller Hubbard was head of his own household. He was a farmer with one thousand dollars in personal property. They had 7 children, viz: Mary A.S., age 13; John M., age 10; Montezuma, age 8; Elizabeth, age 7; Augustine C., age 5; Miriam D., age 3; and Christina, age 1. This record is dated July 20, 1860.

The War Between the States came and the family of John Fuller Hubbard did their full share in bearing the burden of that ordeal. The first thing was perhaps to move back to the home of Anna Mitchell. They lived near to her because John Hubbard had bought part of the Mitchell estate and lived in

the house on the hill across their spring branch from Anna Mitchell's home. They used water from the same vigorous spring. The young son, James Raymond Mitchell, and John Fuller Hubbard were entering the service of the Confederate States Army. Stella's mother was 73 years old so they moved back to her mother's home. All of the slaves were hired out except the family of Washington and Theenie Hubbard. Just how many they were cannot be stated. Together they owned slaves evaluated at \$6,000. Washington could control his own sons and John Fuller Hubbard felt secure in his decision. Washington had belonged to his father and mother all of his life and his character was above reproach. This was true also of Theenie.

John Mitchell Hubbard was the oldest son and was 12 years old. His brother Mont was 10 years old. These two young boys were told of their responsibility and John was declared oldest and to take the leadership. They had their mother and grandmother as directors and Washington was an excellent farmer. They understood they had to support all of the people on the farm, all the cattle and horses. They had to raise chickens and hogs, sustain the flock of geese and the sheep for wool. This meant planting enough of the proper crops to give food for 16 people and all the animals every day. On top of this responsibility, they understood that when the orain was all harvested and the pork was in the smoke house and cured for use, the assigned Commissioner would come to measure and weigh all of it and take for the use of the Confederate States Army, a specified percent of whatever they raised that year. To John and Mont this was very fair. Their father and uncles were in that army somewhere. This was one way they could do something to help. They received the Commissioner, treated him with respect and did not object to his activity. John, however, observed his injustice to them, as young boys. All the corn was measured. All the wheat was measured. Then every bit of the result was taken in wheat. All the meat was weighed and he took the army's part in hams. They raised enough wheat for all, butthis forced them to eat chiefly cornbread some years. His mother had to plan it so there would be chiefly corn bread, but always one biscuit for each one. John felt this very strongly because he did not enjoy corn bread. Corn bread was eaten first and the biscuit was served last. He often did not eat broad until time to serve the biscuit. always raised enough wheat every year because they managed to keep their horses. Washington hit upon a plan to hide their work horses. They were kept hidden in the woods, when not in use. The boys and Washington carried the corn and wheat to the mill to be ground and brought it home in bags, lest the horses be stolen on the road, for the Army. In this way they had horses to plow and they had wheat even in the spring of 1865, the year almost no one had any wheat. In the fall of 1864, few farmers had a horse to plow the ground to sow any wheat, was the reason for this.

Mrs. Tina Gilbert told the compiler that she was a small girl during those years, but she recalled seeing "Aunt Theenie" sowing in the morning enough wheat for those covering it to work all day to cover it. The boys did this. They, of course, were limited in the horses they had, for one thing. Theenie did this every morning until they sowed all their seed wheat. She also remembered seeing John and Mont, also "old Uncle Wash", starting to Mr. Grubb's mill carrying the wheat in bags on their backs. This verifies this part of this narration because a false statement was never known to be spoken by Tina (Hubbard) Gilbert.

During this era the clothing and weaving was taken care of as well as shoes on the home place. This means sheep and flax were needed and they took care of this need. If cotton was ever used, there has never been any mention of it and it was necessary to purchase it, if any was used. The *Refer to p. 618.

cultivation of tobacco during those years has never been referred to in any way. The marketing of it may have curtailed this crop.

One time John went to Ashland, Va. to see his father, who was in the army. At that time he was with some neighbors. It was the first year his father was in the service. It is assumed that they took tobacco to the Richmond Tobacco Market and included the visit to the soldiers who were stationed at Ashland. They took them food and other personal accessories.

One occasion recalled by Mont was the day some bare-footed, tattered soldiers or deserters invaded the place demanding food. The women and children fled to the house and barricaded the doors. John took his stand at the window with the gun in his hand. He was the oldest. The intruders centered their attention on the smoke house and were trying to break down the door.

At that exciting moment, to everyone's surprise, their father, John Fuller Hubbard, rode into the yard. He said very calmly to them "Go home, boys." They turned and walked away. Strangers, yet, if really hungry, they understood that there was one who understood, and in respect went away.

Tradition says he was the calmest of men and never raised his voice in anger and never spoke unkindly to anyone, in so far as anyone could recall. His daughter—in—law, who lived in his home the first year of her marriage and 7 years in her home on that farm, said she saw him every day during those 8 years and he was the kindest, calmest person she ever knew. He never was angry or outspoken to anyone.

During those war days there was no friction between Washington, Theenie and their 5 sons. The day they were informed about Lincoln's Proclamation of their freedom, they were in the presence of John and Mont Hubbard. Mont said in his late life that he could never forget that moment. Those 5 boys jumped high into the air, cracked their heels together and came down to the ground with great glee. He often laughed over the agility with which they jumped that day. They were well treated young boys. They remained until the surrender. They then left their aging parents and never returned. Even when they were old these boys would not for any remuneration return to do anything for their dying parents.

John and Mont Hubbard accepted their responsibility as small boys. Each from that day forward, until their lives were over, carried a man's responsibility. In boyhood and in manhood no one ever saw either of them falter or shirk a duty.

It is known that the War records were not preserved even if they were accurately kept in order. There are no accurate records of John Fuller Hubbard's service in the National War Department Archives, neither in Virginia Archives nor in Chatham, Va., that give his long years of service during that war. In a clipping found in a scrap book that had no date is found a statement that "Co. E. 6th Virginia Cavalry organized in the spring of 1861. They drilled at Ashland, Va. ...They went into winter quarters at the top of the Alleghaney Mountains. They re-enlisted in Feb. 1862 and were transferred to Jackson's Command". Upon this it can be stated that John Fuller Hubbard enlisted in the spring of 1861. And while they were at Ashland, Va. drilling, his son John went to see him. This confirms that his father enlisted in 1861.

At some time he had the measles while in service. He had a severe case and complications. In this connection a tooth abcessed. His lower jawbone was so involved and disfigured, he wore a beard the rest of his life. Note that the above clipping states that they re-enlisted in Feb. 1862. It is believed today, that it was at this time that John Fuller Hubbard suffered the above illness. The War Department at Washington, D.C. has only the

following record: "John F. Hubbard private 2nd Company E. 6 Virginia Cavalry Confederate States Army enlisted April 1, 1862 at Pittsylvania C.H. for the period of the War and was discharged because of disability. Description: Born in Pittsylvania Cty., Va. Age 43 yrs. Height 5 ft. 9 in. Complexion light. Eyes blue, Hair light. Occupation, farmer". They assert no other record of him has been found in the National Archives.

It is quite natural to assume that this discharge came as soon as he enlisted, yet this is not stated. The sons and daughters of John Fuller Hubbard knew he served through those years, had measles, was very ill, went hack to service, was on furlough from time to time and when not ill was on duty until the war was over. There is no recorded record in the War files, but the following facts are known. John Fuller Hubbard was at home on a furlough when he planted the pear trees at the garden gate. His little daughter, Christina Virginia, told the compiler "I stood by him while he planted the pear trees, one on each side of the garden gate". She described how the soil was opened, the roots carefully spread, water noured in and the roots covered with earth. The task was completed, he then asked her, "Will you water these little pear trees when it does not rain while Pa is gone to War?". She promised to do this. She personally told the compiler "Pa went away to war and every day it did not rain I went to the spring and got a bucket of water for each tree". She was 6 years old when the war was over. so those two pear trees were planted not later than 1864 and believe it or not, they are living today in 1976. Planted in love for the family he loved: watered by a child because she loved her father who was away at war. By the Providence of God they have lived more than 100 years, a memorial to enduring love.

From the Court Records there is proof that he served after 1862 discharge for disability. Court Record Book 47, p. 210, dated Sept. 19, 1864 at Pitt-sylvania County Court House, records "The Court doth recommend John F. Hubbard overseer of the Poor in District No. 11 in the County to the Executive of this Commonwealth as a proper person for exemption from Military Service. At Court 19 Sept. 1864".

It is known full well that this was not accepted by him because he was at Harper's Ferry on April 9, 1865 when Lee Surrendered as will be related later. In the Muster Roll 1861–1865 at Pittsylvania Court House, p. 8, Jno Hubbard is found recorded with those of Troop "E" 6th Va. Cavalry. This is sufficient record but his sons recalled their father served under Capt. Gabriel E. Flourney who was a Captain in the 6th Regiment of Virginia Cavalry.

John Fuller Hubbard was positively away at War when his son, John Mitchell Hubbard, approaching his 16th birthday on April 9th, 1865, was making every preparation to enter the service of the Confederate States Army in cooperation with the demands of each young boy arriving at the age of 16 years. His grandmother's sudden death on April 4, 1865 and the preparation for her funeral delayed his departure. He was the oldest male member of the family and all the plans fell upon her grandson. On April 9th Lee surrendered and before John Mitchell Hubbard could get away, neighbors at Appematox were arriving home and telling of the surrender on April 9, 1865.

John Fuller Hubbard was not among those who went home to Pittsylvania Co., Va. from Appomatox, Va. after the Surrender. His sons, John Mitchell and Mont Hubbard, went ahead with the plans for the crop that year, and with sad hearts over grandmother's death and a deep anxiety that became greater as each day passed as they hoped for the return of their father, John Fuller Hubbard. No one who came back had any knowledge of him.

One day a weak, feeble, lean horse came walking into the yard. On his

back, tied to the saddle so he could not fall off, was their father, too ill to sit up. Someone who knew him not, had assumed the horse knew the way home and would take him, living or dead, to the right place. This understanding soul was never known to anyone.

The story, when told later, is as follows. He had been sent with others to quard the bridge at Harper's Ferry. They did not know of Gen. Lee's surrender on the 9th day of April, so they remained on duty until an officer was sent to inform them they could go home and take their horses with them; the war was over. John Fuller Hubbard's horse was his own horse and in most cases the southern men in the Cavalry owned the horsesthey They were glad to go home because all of them were sick with dysentery. Yet all were a long way from home. Each needed to go to bed. The number of men is unknown. It seems in some way John Fuller Hubbard was in charge. Not one of those men had any money except Confederate money and it was of no value. He did have some U.S. coins. He went out and spent every cent of it for as many bottles of "Dr. James Carminative Balsam", as it would buy. He returned, shared this medicine with the sick men, told them good-bye and as they rode away he mounted his horse to go home. Penniless and sick, as were his comrades, he started home. This indicates that he was in command in some way, but there is no record of such rank and no one recalled any knowledge of it 75 years after that year.

In a short time after he left Harper's Ferry he knew if he ever got home with his weak hungry horse, both must walk home. He had to walk slowly himself as he led his horse. This was around the middle of April and a bit of new green vegetation was apparent. He sat down to rest frequently and did this for sure when the horse could eat the grass or weeds. Then when night came he asked for the hospitality of those he came near, at or around nightfall. No one was bountiful in supplies anywhere, but they fed the horse some food. They invited him into their homes and offered him the best food they had. He ate with wisdom, so he was able day by day to walk on toward home, but he slept in no one's home, lest he give them the disease. He feared if he used their beds someone could die. He slept on his blanket in an outhouse or on their porch. Finally they arrived at home. His son Mont saw him at that moment and never forgot this sight.

John Fuller Hubbard went to bed and the horse was put in the pasture. This was in early May but the date has been forgotten.

The next morning John Fuller Hubbard requested his sons, John and Mont, to come to his bedside. He told his 16 year old and 14 year old sons he was too weak and sick to lay any plans and assured them he would be satisfied with the plans they had made and to go ahead with the crop as planned.

He lingered in bed for a very long time and slowly gained his strength. He saw his son's crop of tobacco for the first time around curing tobacco time. When summer time was over the sidk soldier and the weak horse had recuperated. John Fuller Hubbard never knew the fate of the other men except one who wrote to him much later. He arrived home and was well. He would not answer that letter because he wanted no money for that bottle of medicine he gave him.

Around the Centennial of the War Between the States in Alabama, the compiler, a grandchild of John Fuller Hubbard, heard a man in Alabama talking about the Surrender at Appomatox. He called the name of a deceased soldier whom he had known and said "He was guarding the bridge at Harper's Ferry when Lee Surrendered. He walked all the way home. He was deceased; no one knew the facts and no records were found. It seems these two were on the same service. If so, two and it seems three, arrived home and got well.

There is on record in the Virginia State Archives in Virginia State

Library, Richmond, Va., the following record of which the compiler has a certified copy dated Feb. 26, 1931 and signed by H.R. McIlwaine M.H.R. State Librarian, quoting: "This certifies that on page 547 of Vol. 8 of the manuscript Confederate records of the Archives Department of the Virginia State Library the information is given that John Hubbard was 3rd Corporal in Co. K of the 5th Regiment of Virginia Cavalry commanded by Charles Pannell; that he enlisted __(blank) and served __(blank) ".

The compiler has no right to claim this John Hubbard was John Fuller Hubbard of Pittsylvania Co., Va. If he was, he saw service in the 5th and 6th Regiments of Cavalry.

It is not amiss to mention that John and Mont Hubbard had faithful Washington and Theenie, who, although freed from slavery, stood by them that sad summer and they made a good crop, although there was a drought. The wheat sowed in the 1864 autumn gave them wheat bread when many others had no wheat because they had no horses to prepare the land. They had hidden their farm horses, has been mentioned. The drought cut the corn crop short, yet they had enough. Washington and Theenie's sons left them that year and never returned. This was another sad day for them.

Not a great deal, beyond the routine life in a general way, is known of their family life in the days of the Reconstruction. Life was not easy, but each one was true to his and her duty. They were well diciplined children all of their lives. Their parents had ideals for their children. John Fuller Hubbard regarded card playing as something that led too many young men to gamble. His sons were pleasant young boys who were invited to play cards with their neighbors. He quietly bought cards and as soon as the evening meal was over he requested the boys to play with him. They grew tired of the game and this ended the danger he feared. They never played cards in later life.

It was the custom for everyone to distill the liquors they used and to make the wine they used. The decanter was on the side board and the men who called were offered a drink. He never drank a drop himself and his sons never drank any intoxicating beverages.

Education was secured only by private teachers when they could be secured. Although Virginia, in 1870, voted for public school education, the opportunity came later. The economic conditions forced his sons and daughters to give up their plans for any college work. When John was 21 he planned to prepare any way, but his health while he was in school discouraged his plans. James H. and Ida May did get to college for some study.

The daughters in their home during the war days and after were guided by their mother. The idea was, if there were to be no slaves, then girls must learn to keep a home. Her method was to divide the tasks into as many types as there was need. Each girl did for one week only one kind of work each day in the home. Their work was changed every week until they knew all types of tasks. When they married they would know how to make a home. This along with their school opportunities made them very capable adults.

Another insight into the type of man John Fuller Hubbard was is seen in his experience in business. He bought land and paid for it. In some way some one laid a claim upon it that challanged his title to this land. To his older sons he said "Boys, I bought and paid for my land and home. Now we must all get busy and pay for it again". They did this. Just as John Fuller Hubbard had persevered in his effort for States Rights, he did the same for his right to his own land.

John Fuller Hubbard was a prominent and respected citizen of his County. This is verified by his election as Supervisor of Callands District. This was in 1870. At that time B.S. Grubb and J.R. Cabell were his Securities. (D.B. 49,

p. 477, Pitts. Co., Va.). The next time he was elected Supervisor of Callands Township, his brother, F.C. Hubbard and Joseph M. Parrish were his securities. (O.B. Vol. 49, p. 671, ibid). This was repeated according to the records for several years. (O.B. 50, p. 154; O.B. 51, p. 17; O.B. 52, p. 6). When he took the oath the last time, this qualified him to be the Supervisor of Callands Township for 2 years, beginning July 1, 1875. This means he served the Callands Township around 7 years in this capacity. He was then elected Justice of Peace on May 24, 1877 for Callands Magisterial District. He took the oath in June (O.B. 53, p. 101), but resigned in Nov. 1877. (Vol. 53, p. 198). His reason is unknown today, yet it was accepted then. He served the Public when needed and able.

John Fuller Hubbard lived at all times a worthy and upright life. Today it is not known how early he became a Christian. The life he lived indicates he was a christian early in life, and a long time before his active life in the church. In the Hollywood Baptist Church History by Rev. Charles F. Leek is found the statement, John Fuller Hubbard, converted in 1881, was a member of Greenpond Baptist Church and transferred his membership to Hollywood Baptist Church in 1884, becoming one of her Charter members. The one who made this record based his statement of Converted upon his public confession in 1881. He was in the Confederate Army in 1863 when Rev. Mordicai Hagood became interested in the opportunity at the Greenpond community and in the summer of 1865, when this church was constituted on July 1, 1865, John Fuller Hubbard was in bed all that summer, a man too ill to even see the farm work his sons were accomplishing. This and the distance to Greenpond accounts for his non-affiliation at that time. Marshall W. Read became a leader in the work of the Lord in the Hollywood community, John Fuller Hubbard was a supporter. In 1881 when Rev. M.W. Read held a revival at Hollywood, then a Mission Stand, John Fuller Hubbard was received on experience and was baptized the same day. It was then that his name was entered upon the roll of the Greenpond Baptist Church with full fellowship. Experience means one has had a long enjoyment in fellowship with God prior to the moment of Confession. He entered into active duty at once and was among the first messengers sent to the Association to represent Hollywood.

On June 29, 1884 Hollywood was organized and dedicated in their first house of worship. John Fuller Hubbard was elected a deacon of this church at that time and he served as long as he lived.

The compiler, when a very small girl, heard a conversation between her mother and Rev. W.D. Barr, the pastor of Hollywood Baptist Church, several years after the decease of John Fuller Hubbard. They said many kind things. The last thing said was her mother's question, "On whom did Mr. Hubbard's mantle fall, at Hollywood?" and his solemn sad toned reply was "No one".

A puzzled little girl had no opportunity to get that explained that evening. The next day she heard the Bible story of Elijah's journey to Heaven and that Elisha received Elijah's mantle. Then her mother explained that her grandfather, John Fuller Hubbard, served God and was a great and good man who was a member of Hollywood, and the minister meant no one else had been as faithful as he was to the church. At the same time, her mother, the daughter-in-law of John Fuller Hubbard, told her again as she often, through the years that followed, told her children, how kind he was, that he was never heard to speak to anyone in angry words. He always corrected errors in calm understanding words and he was a wonderful man.

The lives of John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard are not complete without information of their loving care of Washington and Theenie Hubbard, their two faithful slaves. It is assumed that they were always owned

by the Hubbard family from their childhood, and their last home was with John Fuller Hubbard. When the war was over, they were free and their sons walked away and never returned. Washington was by estimate around 68 years old, because in the 1870 census he was recorded 73 years old and blind. Theenie was younger. Each grew more feeble as time passed, but they were at home and were cared for and they never suffered for the necessities of life.

Before the War Between the States, all slaves were tithable and the owner paid their taxes. When the Reconstruction laws were made, they demanded a poll tax of every free man. Washington Hubbard had to pay taxes. In Vol. 53, p. 452, Pitts. Court Orders, the following is recorded; "At a Court August 19, 1878 Court doth relieve Washington Hubbard from payment of Capitation Tax on account of his bodily infirmities". Eight years earlier, he was acknowledged as blind, yet the new officials, under their "after surrender laws", exacted of him this tax 8 years longer, until he was too infirm. He lived 10 years after this and died, according to the 1870 census, at the age of around 91 years. In the meantime Theenie was losing her mental alertness and was not responsible. In the letters of John Hubbard, one tells that Washington died in April 1888. He was interred where the family servants rest forever. These graves are near the family cemetery of the Mitchell Hubbards and the Gilberts.

John Fuller Hubbard, around 4 months later, was buried himself, not a great distance from Washington's grave. In his last illness, he was in bed many weeks. His suffering was intense. Today his treatment would be for infection of the sinuses. Then it was chiefly something to let him sleep. At the last he was unconscious most of the time. Those who watched by his bedside declare his spoken words were prayer to God. Each one said, they were the most beautiful prayers they ever heard. Prayers of Praise and Adoration of God.

He was born August 18, 1818 and died August 12, 1888, 6 days before he was 70 years old.

A few letters have been preserved that were written by John Fuller Hubbard to his son, John Mitchell Hubbard, quoting:

"Callands Pittsylvania County, Va. Oct. 27, 1886

Dear John,

I received your kind letter which was read with much pleasure and satisfaction. I was glad to hear you were all well through the loving kindness of the allwise God. This leaves us all well except Nettie. She has a fine boy and is nearly 4 weeks old, but Nettie has not got out yet and is suffering with her breast very much. They named the boy Walter DeLacy. We heard from Ida the other day. She was well except a sore jaw where she had a tooth extracted which was very sore.

You asked me how we succeeded with our tobacco, it is nothing extra but we done tolerably well for the tobacco. It is pretty badly bug sucked.

We are not done sowing wheat but I think we will finish now as we have had a fine rain. We are not quite done getting up corn yet. We have cribed 50 barrels and have 6 or 8 barrels to gather yet. We have just commenced sowing rye. We have had a hard time sowing wheat. We had to work with colters.

Well John you said you had a fine meeting and very successful by the grace of God and through his word ten were brought to the feet of Jesus and willing to take up the Cross and follow him who is able to save all that come unto him in faith and O that you were one of that ten I should rejoice from

the bottom of my heart and to know you had found Saviour whose blood cleanseth from all Sin.

I must tell you about ours that was going on when we were at your home. We had a glorious meeting 29 grounded the armes of their rebellion and came to Christ 27 baptized and reinstated. I will tell you some of them Callahill Edwards, his 3 sons & 1 daughter & her husband More; Joseph Parrishes wife & 3 children, 4 of Lovel Haden's children.

We were blessed bountifully and pray for a continuance of his blessings. I will close now by asking God's blessings rest upon you and may he give you grace to praise and serve him is my Prayer for Christ's sake. So goodbye.

John F. Hubbard

P.S. Excuse my writing with a pencil. I have a Cramp in my hand. Pearla Arnn is married to Henry Hundly."

Explanation about using the pencil. It was larger and easier to hold than a goose quill, which in those days was used as a pen and made from a goose feather from its wing or tail.

The following letter was written by Christina Virginia Gilbert, the daughter of John Fuller Hubbard, and he included his letter which he wrote the next morning, Feb. 28, 1887.

" Callands, Va. Feb. 28, 1887

Dear John and Mollie:

We were delighted with your letter and to hear all were well for which we ever feel grateful to our kind Father above. This leaves all well at home and Over on the Hill also. I guess you know that we are occupying your old home. I did not think I could possibly stay here. There were so many remembrances of the past, but since we have been here a while I like tolerably well. I set out some roses bought and boxwood on the border where you used to have your flowers. There are ever so many white and purple Lilacs, do you want some slips of them? if you do I will send them by Jimmie or I will bring them when we come over sometime.

Well I guess the baby can almost walk by this time. How I do want to see her, don't you think you will bring her over this Spring? it would be such a treat to have you come. We received a letter from Ida, she came out all right in her examinations so she will not be at home untill June. I miss her more since I moved than I did before.

You will have to look over this bad writing for this time for Charlie is by me and talks and pushes me he says tell you he is big, high boy. he is full of fun and mischief and never get tired of play out of doors.

I went to see Aunt Sallie last week. She was not very well neither was Tilda. Bev. goes to school and Hettie is down at Sycamore teaching a school. Beverly Gilbert went to see his Aunt Bettie Witcher today. She is very low with consumption, they do not think she will get well.

I will close this letter by asking you to come soon and if you don't come you must write to us all for we appreciate your letters.

As Tina has I will right a few lines to you this morning. We are well and hope this will find you all enjoying the same good blessing through the mercy of a kind providence for which we should feel thankfull. Well John how are you geting along with your work and burning plant land. We are getting slow. We have burnt but one and plowed one day and land too wet then. there has been very little plowing done yet and no oats sowed and them that was sowed last fall is nearly all died out and will have to be sowed again and think there is very little plant land burnt yet and there is vary little encouragement to make tobacco now, we sold a load about 2 weeks ago that did not bring an average of \$5 though I think we have some that will do better. Kip and Sam sold the last of their old tobacco last week for \$18 per hund. Nothing more but remain as

This post office was 3 miles from his home. In those days everyone went for his own mail. Another item of interest is that the postmark, with date, was hand written. The following two letters were the last letters he wrote to his son John.

Callands Pittsylvania County, Va. January 20, 1888

Dear John and Mollie

I will try to write you a few lines in answer to yours 16 of the present which was received in due time. The way the mails has been through the blessings of our Heavenly Father this leaves us all enjoying vary good health and hope these few lines may find you enjoying the same good blessings of health for which we ought to thank God with our whole heart mind & Soul. the connections are all well as far as I know. You spoke of Kip not coming over to see you. He was complaining all Xmas, he was here once and did not stay more than 3 hours and Miriam was sick in bed two days. it was the dullest Xmas I ever saw. I had a vary severe attack of New Ralgia in December. I kept my room for 10 days but hope I have gotten over it. Well John we have Winter regularly and about as cold as it gets. Sleet and Ice and as bad traveling as I think nearly can bee.

I have hired one hand, a boy for which I pay \$4 dollars per month. Sam and Kip work white hands. this year they have three men. they have bought more land about 100 Acres.

You asked if we're going to use Peruvian Guano (fertilizer) again. Sam told me the other day he was going to write to Holloway in a few days to see

if he could get it and if we can get it we will use it and if we can get it I will let you know in time. We use Peruvian guano and Pacific guano equal equal portions and the mixture does better than all guano but if you get it try for yourself. we will get the guano if we can. Sure.

I killed five hogs that weighed $227\frac{1}{2}$ each the lightest was 220 and the

heaviest 238 and so we have meat enough to do.

We received a letter from Ida last Monday she was well as usual. She said her Examinations would come off this week or next. She has to teach one day in a week and sometimes more. the head professor said he would not give a diploma unless they were proficient in teaching. I will now close this uninteresting letter by asking God's blessings to rest upon you all for Christ's Sake and as ever your loving Papa

John F. Hubbard.

P.S. Write soon."

"Callands Pittsylvania County, Va. April 2nd, 1888

Dear John

I received your kind letter in due time which was read with interest and much joy to hear that you were all enjoying good health and that you arrived home safe but a little wet. I am getting along vary well I think. I am up and about some and my leg is nearly healed up but my ancle keeps somewhat stiff yet the rest are all well at this time for which we ought to thank our Heavenly Father at all times and under all circumstances for Jesus Sake. We have been gardening some today for a start and it is nearly hot enough for June and the first weather we have had for planting this Season. This is Easter Monday and as nice a one as ever I saw I think we have Peaches plenty yet, and I was at one of our plant beds today and I saw plants coming up vary well but our oats looks the worst I ever saw and there aint more than half enough on the land I don't think. and clover, I could not find a sprig. but part of our wheat looks tolerably well and part bad but we can't tell yet what wheat will be.

Old Man Wash died last Thursday and was buried Friday. he was taken in that cold weather and did not know anything for a day or two and Theny was worse than Wash was. She would not own that it was Wash but she has come nearly right again but don't know haw long she will stay so. Enough of that.

Well John I am going to the Court House tomorrow to send for our guano (fertilizer) I understand they are about ready to send as nearly all have Paid in their money and when it comes I will send yours on to Danville and try and send you word. I have writen about all I can think of and recon you ...and so I will close by asking God's blessing to rest upon you for Christ's sake Your Papa

John F. Hubbard"

From this letter Washington died on Thursday, March 29, 1888. Theenie was mentally abnormal.

John F. Hubbard was far from well. In the summer he passed away. His wife, Stella Clement Hubbard, was then at home alone and her daughter Tina and family moved back into her mother's home. She was very anxious about Theeny, so her first duty every morning was to see about her because not one of her sons would care for her and all the colored people were afraid of "that crazy old woman". Even money could not secure some one to watch over her. Finally one morning when she went to check on Theeny she had a large

chair in the fire place. In the chair she had packed her very best clothes. Under the chair she had small dry pieces of wood and she was getting rich kindling pine wood to make a fire. They saved this situation and knew she must never be alone any more.

The overseer of the poor was contacted. He had a place for her and several women he could have take care of her. She could not live long, was well known because of her infirmities. Mrs. Hubbard exacted of the Overseer a promise if she should die, Theenie would be brought home and buried by Washington.

That winter there was severe weather. Mrs. Hubbard was sick in bed a few weeks. When she grew better she inquired about Theenie and sent for the Overseer to come by to tell her of Theenie. When he came he said she died. His reason for burying her at the House for the poor was due to the ice on the roads. When plans were discussed for her re-interment by her husband Washington, the man declared that several died around the same date and he did not know one grave from the other. Stella Hubbard grieved over the fate of Theenie as long as she lived, but she did not live but a few years after the death of John Fuller Hubbard.

Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard was the daughter of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. She was the first of their children born in the new home born built by her father in 1823 and she lived on that estate and most of her March 3, 1524 life in that home that stands there today. As a girl she learned to read and write and all the things a girl should know for the ability to be a homemaker. She learned also to spin and weave cloth and she could teach others. She wove many beautiful counterpanes in white and also in colors. At least one Susen Suff, of these is still in the family today. It was woven in linen and wool. The grand doe colors are red white and blue. The date was the winter of 1848 and 1849. It of holand was completed before April 1849; in 1976, one hundred and twenty seven years granting ago.

Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard died April 2, 1893, and thus she closed a wonderful life on this earth. She was a devout Christian woman. Just when she became an active Christian is not known today. She grew up in a home where the Bible was read and followed by prayer. She was a member of Greenpond Baptist Church when she became a Charter member of Hollywood Baptist Church. Her favorite hymn was "Blessed Assurancs".

believeth on me hath everlasting life". She heard and sang this hymn when it was set to the beautiful melody written by Mrs. Joseph F. Knapp.

This is a beautiful hymn, but when one places emphasis on the pronouns, one can feel how beautifully this hymn expressed Stella Mitchell Hubbard's assurance of her Salvation and one can understand she possessed a thrilling closeness to Jesus as her personal Saviour.

Her first daughter-in-law, John's wife, "Mollie", loved "Mrs. Hubbard" very tenderly and appreciated her Christian life. On the last visit she made in the home of John and "Mollie" which was after their marriage 20 years earlier, one day she said "Mollie" I love you just the same way I love my own girls, I know no difference". These two loved each other as should be true in all families. And "Mollie" always remembered how much she loved the above hymn.

Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard died on Sunday, April 2, 1893 and was interred by the side of her husband, John Fuller Hubbard, at their home near Callands, Va.

Her life can be best summerized by the data found in the obituary written by her pastor. He states "Sister Hubbard' was a consistent member of Hollywood Baptist Church, and in her death, the church has lost one of her ardent supporters. She was ever willing and ready to help forward every good Cause as far as her means would allow.

Our dear sister was a lovely Christian character, always at her post unless Providentially prevented. She was true to her pastor, kind and loving to her brothers and sisters in the church; gentle and agreeable to the stranger, and charitable to the poor. The unfortunate had her sympathy and prayers as a neighbor true and obliging.

Our dear sister was richly blessed, having four sons and five daughters. She lived to see them grown. Eight of them married and became faithful members of the Baptist church.

Sister Hubbard was no stranger to sorrow. In 1888 her husband, John F. Hubbard, who was one of our largest contributors to the building of Hollywood Baptist Church, died. One year later she lost a lovely daughter, who had been married ten months. For two months her health began to give away, yet in the midst of all her afflictions and sorrow she found in her Saviour a present help in all her times of trouble.

Her dear children will miss her smiles and soul cheering words and self-sacrificing devotion. She will be sorely missed by her pastor, for she always had a kind word and a ready hand to help and encourage him.

Sister Hubbard expressed herself as only waiting her Heavenly Father's call, which came on Sunday afternoon and found her ready to obey.

We too will go over the River to rest,
As the strong and the lovely before us have gone.
Our sun will go down in the beautiful West
To rise in the glory that circles the throne.
Until then we are bound by our love and our faith
To the saints who are walking in Paradise fair.
They have passed beyond signt, at the touch of death
But they live, like ourselves, in God's infinite care.

Rev. W.D. Barr was her pastor at the time of her death.

Her ancestors were recorded earlier in the Philpott and Mitchell and Atkins study. The following Bible record was given the compiler around 1928. Only death dates have been added since that year. The Bible was lost later when the home of Mrs. Beverley Preston Gilbert was burned. The children of

John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard were all born at the old Mitchell place near Callands, Va. All grew up there. They are:

Stella Clement Mitchell and all of her sisters, also each of the above daughters of John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard, were married in the living room of the house built by John Mitchell in 1823. This house still stands in 1976 near Rondo, Va. The marriages of the above nine children and their descendants, so far as are known, will follow in nine seperate sections.

IDA MAY HUBBARD

Ida May Hubbard, born in the old home near Callands, Va. on Oct. 10, 1863, was the daughter of John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard. She married in the same home on Aug. 20, 1888, James W. Giles, the son of Augustin L. Giles, who married Mrs. Nanny A. Wright, nee Nannie A. Witcher. She died on May 19, 1889 at Stuart Normal College, Stuart, Virginia and was interred in the cemetery at her birth place near Callands, Va.

That Ida May Hubbard was loved by everyone who know her is verified by the following memories of her brief life of less than 26 years on Earth. She grow up in the Reconstruction Days. Her early education was in private schools, when a teacher was available in those Reconstruction Days. There was also not only tutoring in the home but, along with her sisters, she learned to do beautifully many things that were essential in one's home life.

Ida May Hubbard was around 8 years old when her oldest brother, John Mitchell Hubbard was married and brought home his bride, Mary Elizabeth (Sours) Hubbard (Mollie). At once the devotion of real sisters developed between Ida May and Mollie. Due to that devotion, most of the following information can be told today.

The photographs in her album prove she was a beautiful, well dressed young lady. And her memories assure she was a devout Christian early in life. During her teen-age years, on an unknown date today, during a series of evangelistic services, Ida May Hubbard was deeply serious in her response. Her sister-in-law, Mollie, always cherished her memories of Ida May's response to the appeals that were made to the unsaved at that time. Today it is normal to assume it was at that time she joined the Greenpond Baptist Church. Dates however, are unknown today. It is known that her name is listed among the Charter members of Hollywood Baptist Church. Through some accident her name is listed as Mrs. Ida Hubbard. There was no one else named Ida Hubbard in that area. The record shows she was granted a letter from Greenpond on June 24, 1884. (Page 9, the History of Hollywood Baptist Church, by C.F. Leek).

One evidence of her neat handwork in sewing has been preserved. In the possession of one of her nieces in 1976 there is a hand made bib that Ida May Hubbard made in 1877 for her nephew Conrad Hubbard, born in 1877. She was 14 years old that year. It was embroidered and neatly finished. Conrad's mother

always appreciated this gift. Whatever she did was carefully done. This was true in everyday tasks and in her school work.

The ordeal of Reconstruction Days passed. Her father sent her to Milligan College in Tennessee in 1884 when her brother, James Hezekiah Hubbard, decided to attend that college. Milligan College was near Johnston City. This college was a co-educational institution. It was originally organized in 1866 and was called Buffalo Male and Female Institute. The name was changed to Milligan College in 1881 and in 1976 it is still active. Around 1875 Joseph Hopwood was in charge of this college. They enlarged their home and the boarding students lived in their home. It was in their home that Ida May Hubbard lived while a student there. The following letter was written in the Hopwood home while she was at Milligan College.

"Home Fireside Jan. 12/85

Dear Mollie and John:

Your very interesting letters were read in due time, and oh, how glad I was to receive such sweet letters from you, they were read with the greatest of pleasure.

The "Old Year" has flown and with it many joys and sorrows! There is a sweet thought in thinking of flight of the "Old Year"; that is that we are "one day" and "one year" "nearer home!" Oh it is a sweet thought that I'm nearer my home today, than I have been before. Then when we reach that brighter home we will rest forever in our father's love. There no sorrow can cast its shadow o'er us, no tears shall dim our eyes. But twill be sweet to see our Saviour as he is, and to meet dear loved ones gone before.

Xmas was dull here to me though every one said it was the best Xmas they had ever seen at Milligan; Mrs. Hopwood gave the girls two or three Sociables, which lasted only an hour or two each, but there is not much enjoyment in such Sociables as they were.

The New Year came in brightly and with it many new resolutions. So far all has been peace and harmony here. It has been raining for two or three days and is cloudy and threatening yet. It rained all day yesterday, and I was not very well. So I only went to Sunday School. Did not go to our Bible class, which I enjoy so much, but I'm nearly well this morning. I think it was cold that I had taken.

I must congratulate you on your moving into your new house; guess you are in it by this time. "May you be very, very happy in your new home, and may God's richest blessing ever rest upon you both, Live for Him and His glory dear Brother and Sister and then His blessing will rest upon you always and that peace that passeth all understanding will shed its soft influence around you forever." Life would be dark and dreary indeed if it was not for that light, "the light of the Gospel," sending its bright rays into our hearts, and making the pathway of life bright with its effulgence. And my longing desire is for the time to come when all people shall come to Christ and accept Him as their Saviour and obtain this light which will carry them through all the dark trials of life and prepare them for a brighter home in heaven.

Well since the beginning of the new term I have taken two new studies University Arithmetic & Philosophy. I wanted to take French but could not on account of another class which recited at the same hour. My time in music was out last Wednesday, and I have not decided whether I'll take any longer or not. I do not have anytime scarcely to practice, for I have seven hours in recitation and it takes me about all my spare time to get up my lessons. As I have written all the news I can think of I will close, wishing you a

The above letter in 1976 is still among the letters preserved by "Mollie", her brother John Mitchell Hubbard's wife. It gives an idea of the concern the Hopwood family gave to their students far from home and of the classes she was taking. It proves also the importance of Christ in her life. It is assumed that she was there for two sessions, but today the details are lost.

Later she attended Woman's College at Farmville, Va. This school has also continued through the years and is known today as Longwood College. An evidence of her excellent carefulness in her school work while a student there is extant today. This is a map of North America which she did in indelible ink on cloth. Her sister Mrs. Christina Virginia (Hubbard) Gilbert presented this map to the daughter of Mollie Hubbard. She was growing old and knew this niece of Ida May Hubbard would value it for years to come. It is not known today how long she was a student there but her last work there was in the spring of 1888. Thirty five years later, a niece was in conversation with Miss Mary Ellen Pamplin, who was speaking of her girl hood days at Longwood College. This niece asked Miss Pamplin, "Were you there when Ida May Hubbard was a student there?". "Yes.", she replied and paused. Then with grateful praise in her voice she continued. "It was my first time to leave home. I remember I arrived homesick and ill with a severe headache. They put me to bed and I fell asleep. When I opened my eyes later she was standing by my bed dressed in a white dress. To me she looked like an Angel". She said no more for a moment as she sat there with her memories. Then she added "And that is what she was — an Angel". She then laughed and said "She was the only girl in school who had a silk dress, a beautiful brown silk dress". Then she inquired the reason for the question. She was told that "She was my father's youngest sister".

It may be interesting to add that Miss Mary Ellen Pamplin, the school mate of Ida May Hubbard at Longwood College, lived to be 94 years old and passed away on March 6, 1961. She was another wonderful Christian teacher in Virginia schools for around 50 years. She was loved by all who knew her.

Ida May Hubbard completed her work at Woman's College in Farmville in June 1888 and returned home at once with plans for her wedding on Aug. 20, 1888.

Soon after her return, her father became ill and lingered for several weeks and passed away on Aug. 8, 1888. During those heart breaking weeks she saw her father every day. Fortunately she knew her father was a devout Christian. She heard his beautiful prayers uttered often times when he was even unconscious. When he passed away on Aug. 8, 1888 she knew he was in Heaven.

Her fiance, James W. Giles, was the President of the Stuart Normal College at Stuart, Patrick Co., Va. It was near time to open the College, so she did not postpone their wedding. They were married in her mother's home, according to plans, and in Stuart on time.

She was vitally interested in the College and entered into its activities and endeared herself to everyone connected with the College, faculty and students alike. In a letter to her brother John, dated Jan. 28, 1889, she said all of their students were doing good work and new students were entering.

In May her husband was on a business trip. She was well when he left. Suddenly she was very ill and her husband was called home, but she died

before he arrived. He was told she was unconscious 16 hours and never spoke to anyone. After she had been unconscious 6 hours, their anticipated son was born dead. She lived in her unconscious condition 10 hours longer, dying at 6 o'clock on May 19, 1889. Her husband, in his letter to her brother, said "I got here tonight but she is an Angel". She was taken to her mother's home with her prematurely born son in her arms, and buried near her father, who had preceeded her to Heaven.

Today in an old scrap book belonging to her sister-in-law, Mrs. John Mitchell Hubbard, who loved her, watched her grow up, and cherished her memories of "Dear Ida" so long as she lived, there is a letter sent to her

brother John. M. Hubbard in the spring of 1890. Quoting:

"Stuart Normal College Stuart Virginia "Hubbard Library" Room

Spring 1890

Dear Sir:

The Library was named in memory of Mrs. J.W. Giles (formerly Ida May Hubbard) because during her life she manifested so much devotion to Christian education. She was the wife of the president of the college."

Ida May Hubbard Giles had plans for sustaining Christian education for all interested young people. A beautiful life on Earth ended in Eternal Life in Heaven.

CHRISPIN AUGUSTIN HUBBARD

Chrispin Augustin Hubbard (Kip), was the son of John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard. He was born near Callands, Va. on his father's land on Jan. 25, 1855. He died at Toshes, Va. on Jan. 15, 1927. He was 10 years old when Gen. Lee surrendered at Appomatox. From age 5 years to 10 he had seen his father go to and come from the battlefields of War. He grew up on his father's farm during the Reconstruction days, going to school when a teacher was available, but chiefly learning how to farm. The chief interest was tobacco growing, etc.

His oldest brother, John Mitchell Hubbard, interested him in the cultivation of light yellow tobacco, which could not be produced on the soil where they resided near Callands. The correct soil was found near Danville, Va. He bought land with his brother John in 1879. He did not follow through to farm this land. It was too far from his parents and young friends. Later, John bought from "Kip" his portion of this farm.

Returning home before the first crop of yellow tobacco was even planted, he entered into a partnership with his brother-in-law, Stanhope Flourney Giles (Sam), who had married his sister, Miriam Hubbard, and made his home with them. Through the years Sam and Kip bought lands and farmed together extensively and were most prosperous. They trusted others, however, and upon going on their security they lost everything they possessed to pay the debts of others.

They started anew and prospered. They owned a farm and became, in later years, the owners of Mount View Milling Company at Toshes, Virginia, a very prosperous business. While Kip managed business at home, Sam went into the City of Danville, Va. 5 days each week as General Warehouse manager in the tobacco business.

Kip's sister Miriam died very early in life. Sam and Miriam had five

young children. Mother was gone and father away from home 5 days each week was the situation. Kip, the brother of Miriam, took care of the boys. The faithful old cook made this possible. Sam's sisters took the little girls home to their grandparents who lived on the adjoining farm. The grandparents died and one sister soon married. This left Miss Callie Giles to rear the 2 little girls, and Kip the counselor of the 3 young boys.

During these years, Aunt Callie continued the custom of all of brother Sam's family eating dinner at grandfather's on Sunday, after the death of her sister-in-law, Miriam. This continued through the years. They attended the same Sunday School and church services at Hollywood Baptist Church. Very often the minister was invited to go home with them for dinner, the mid-day meal. As the children grew older, there were invitations from other young friends that were accepted on Sunday. They had permission to accept an invitation unless the pastor would be their guest.

One Sunday, the 17th of Nov. 1908, all were informed the pastor was to be a guest for dinner. Everyone was at church and returned for dinner. After dinner "Uncle Kip" said "All of you go to the parlor, your "Aunt Callie" and I are going to be married". Completely surprised, they quietly made their way to the parlor and witnessed the wedding.

He was 53 years old and she was 51 years old. They had known each other all of their lives. Two of her brothers married two of his sisters. It seems they had admired each other but courtship came late and everyone was surprised and happy. "Aunt Callie" and "Uncle Kip" had 21 years of contented life together.

They were kind, good people all of their lives and all loved them. Chrispin Augustin Hubbard was not only kind and thoughtful of his sister's motherless children, but this was true of any child who was an orphan in need, was the declaration of one of his sisters. When his brother-in-law Sam passed away, these 5 children were blessed with the love of these two for many years.

No one can evaluate the life of "Kip" Hubbard. He enjoyed the respect of everyone. Honest, upright and a kind, good man. He never joined Hollywood Baptist Church but he was present at Sunday School and church services every Sunday. The children regarded him as a member. The pew he used, they did not use, until he came in and sat down by the window. Then others went to sit in the same pew near him.

He made his peace with God in his own way. When his final illness came, his nephew, Leslie Giles, was taking care of his "Uncle Kip". He was eligible to practice medicine but did not. He said to him, "Less, I cannot get well this time. Do not let that worry you. I am going Home to Heaven.". He had no anxiety. Less had nursed him through other illnesses during his late years of life. On the 15th of January, 1927, Chrispin Augustin Hubbard went Home to Heaven. His motto was, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you". He so lived.

In 1934 Callie (Giles) Hubbard followed her husband. She was a member of Hollywood Baptist Church many years. She lived for others.

They had no children but lived on in the hearts of the children of others. They were interred in Hollywood Church Cemetery. Their gravestones have been marked:

JAMES HEZEKIAH HU88ARĎ

1861-1929

James Hezekiah Hubbard, born July 25, 1861 at Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va., was the son of John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard. He was born on the old ancestral lands of John Mitchell, and died and is buried there. He died on April 24, 1929.

When the War Between the States closed, he was a boy almost four years old. This means he grew up on his father's farm during the Reconstruction Days. He learned the activities of farm life and was successful in farming.

During his young life he attended school whenever a teacher was aveilable. After he was of age he enrolled at Milligan College, Tennessee in the Fall of 1884, and attended that session. He and his sister Ida went there for that session. They took the train to Johnson City, Tennessee. In Johnson City, the students had to take the narrow guage train to the station, one and a half miles from Milligan College, and ride horseback or walk from the station to the college. This was a coeducational school, founded in 1866. It was first named Buffalo Male and Female Institute. In 1875 Joseph Hopwood wes president of the school. His home was enlarged, and boarding students lived in his home in the early days of the school. In 1881 the name of the school was changed to Milligan College. In those days, the students were treated as members of the Hopwood family if they were boarding there during the session. They paid one dollar and a half to one doller and seventy-five cents per week for their board. Another item of interest is that the students carried water from the college spring to the house. From a letter written by Ida, James Hubbard's sister, there is evidence of the efforts of Mr. and Mrs. Hopwood to make their students contented.

Before he went to Milligan College, James Hezekiah Hubbard accepted Christ as his Savior. According to the published History of Hollywood Baptist Church, Pittsylvania County, Virginia (1881–1961) James Hubbard was baptized Aug. 24, 1884 (p 9) and was listed as a Deacon in 1889 (p 30). On Aug. 13, 1914 in a letter, he wrote, "I only pass this way but once and I pray that the Heavenly Father will give me the deeds and the words to make some brother or sister feel that it was well for me to pass their way". His life and work was for the comfort of others.

According to their records, James H. Hubbard, Ida May Hubbard and Nettie D. Buchanan were all students at Milligan College, session of 1884-1885, and Ida May Hubbard was a student there in 1885. Upon inquiry it was learned that the Milligan College Administration Building was burned in 1918, and earlier records were lost. The catalog for 1884-1885 lists their names and residences. Nettie Davenport Buchanan's home was Gratton, Virginia. This was learned through the courtesy of Phyllis D. Fontaine, Registrar and Director of Admissions in 1979.

During that school year James H. Hubbard and Nettie D. Buchanan fell in love, and were engaged to be married. They were married on Dec. 29, 1885. According to information in the Hubbard family, she was born on Nov. 15, 1867. No relatives of James H. Hubbard were present at his marriage.

After their marriage they resided for several years in Pittsylvania Co., Va., near Callands. After leaving the Callands neighborhood, they settled at Red Cak, Va., where he was in the mercantile business for a number of years. Then suddenly, on April 1, 1905, Nettie D. Hubbard, without announcement, went away, taking with her the two smaller children. Her husband never knew the reason for her desertion, and never saw his wife or their two younger children again. His neighbors declared him to be a fine, good Christian man, and above reproach. They knew of no reason for his wife's leaving.

James H. Hubbard sold his business and returned to Callands, Va. On Jan. 1_{2} 1912 he sued for divorce, and that year, after completion of all legal requirements, they were divorced. (C.O.B. 16, p 242)

From the year 1905, with the exception of the year 1907 when living in Norfolk, Va., James H. Hubbard resided in the home of his sister Tina, Mrs. Beverley P. Gilbert, so long as he lived. He changed his occupation and became a carpenter, building houses as long as he was active. When his health began to fail, his nephew Charles Read Gilbert watched after his needs of hospitalization, surgery and transfusions. In those days, transfusions were possible only if a friend or relative with suitable blood could serve as donor. His nephew declared that, when he was called upon to secure a donor, his car was full of fine men who were not only his friends, but men who loved his "Uncle Jim". In those days no one knew his own blood type. God blessed their efforts, and each time, one was accepted. He grew better and came home once more.

The final day came, and he was interred in the family cemetery at the home where he was born. He rests near his sister, Ida May (Hubbard) Giles. His gravestone declares he was "Truly Beloved by All". The children of James Hezekiah and Nettie Davenport (Buchanan) Hubbard were:

- i. Walter DeLacy Hubbard, b. Sept. 30, 1886, d. Dec. 9, 1966.
- ii. Ida May Hubbard, b. Sept. 3, 1894.
- iii. James Edgar Hubbard, b. Aug. 6, 1896.

There is no further information for those two younger children. In their father's search for them, there was no reward.

The following documents are recorded here for any one who may be interested:

After James Hezekiah Hubbard's death in 1929, the information about his marriage was given as it was remembered. In April 1979, a request from the Clerk of Tazewell Co., Va. secured the following information as it is recorded.

Around seven months before his death James Hezekiah Hubbard made his last Will and Testament, as follows:

JAMES HEZEKIAH HUBBARD'S WILL

I, James H. Hubbard of Pittsylvania County, Virginia being of sound mind and memory doth hereby make this my last will and testament, hereby revoking any and all wills that I may have heretofore made.

Item #1. I wish all of my just debte and funeral expenses to be paid by my executor hereinafter named as soon after my death as possible.

Item #2. I give my sister Mrs. C. V. Gilbert a note for \$300.00 due me by 8. P. Gilbert.

Item #3. I give to my son, James Edgar Hubbard, and my daughter, Ida May Hubbard, all of my real estate wherever located. (At the present time I own 10 acres in Putnam County, Florida, and a lot in Kenilworth, Florida, and 2 lots in South Virginia Beach.)

Item #4. I give to my son Walter DeLacy Hubbard all the remainder of my personal property, consisting of money on hand, and/or in bank, and all notes, bonds and other evidence of debt that I may own at the time of my death. Also any and all tangible personal property. This bequest is subject to Item #1, and all debts and funeral expenses are to be paid out of this fund.

I hereby appoint the Chatham Savings Bank of Chatham, Virginia as executor of this Will.

Given under my hand and seal this the 6th day of October 1928.

WALTER DELACY HUBBARD

Walter DeLacy Hubbard, born Sept. 30, 1886 in Virginia, died in California Dec. 9, 1966, while asleep.

When he was young he enlisted in the United States Army for foreign service. Details of early service are unknown today, except that part of the time he was in the Philipines, and was also at Ft. Benjamin Harrison. Dates, places, and regiment are unknown, since his records were lost. It has been recalled that he went to the Panama Canal Zone in 1913 with the 10th U. S. Infantry, and was in Co. H, with rank of Sergeant. Mr. Nathan Walker Frisbie was Band Director in the same regiment.

While in the Canal Zone, Walter DeLacy Hubbard, born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on Sept. 30, 1886, married at Ancon, Canal Zone, Panama on July 7, 1914, Adah Cecelia Frisbie, born Rossville, Ohio, March 3, 1897, the daughter of Nathan Walker Frisbie, born Hilliard, Ohio on Sept. 19, 1875, died Nov. 5, 1953 at McMinnville, Ore., married Jan. 5, 1896 Ethel Leona Price, born in Rossville, Ohio May 3, 1879, died Feb. 18, 1973, McMinnville, Ore. Mr. Frisbie was a Master Mason and a member of Veterans of Foreign Wars. He was an Army Band Leader for 30 years. Mrs. Frisbie was a member of Eastern Star and of Auxiliary of V.F.W.

Walter D. Hubbard bought himself out of the Army after his marriage. He worked for the Canal Zone as a foreman in a cold storage plant. Later, he returned to the United States.

Military records revealed that Walter D. Hubbard enlisted in the United States Army on Oct. 7, 1913 at Fort Slocum, N.Y. and was honorably discharged on Aug. 29, 1914 by reason of purchase. He re-enlisted Jan. 28, 1918 at Danville, Va. He served overseas from July 9, 1918 to June 29, 1919, and was honorably discharged as a Sergeant July 12, 1919 by reason of demobilization. When Walter D. Hubbard went to France in World War I, he had all of his Army records with him. On the way back, his Army records, along with all of his personal effects, were lost. This much is positively known. When W.W. II involved the United States he volunteered as a mechanic. He was a Sergeant in 15th Co., A.S.M. in Construction Department, Aviation Corps.

Walter D. Hubbard had a good record in the Army. His record was investigated when he became a member of the Masonic Lodge in 1914. He was a loyal member of that organization. He took all of their 32 degrees and was a Shriner. His wife, Adah Cecèlia Hubbard, in 1975 had been a member of the Eastern Star for 59 years, and was still active. She is also a member of the V.F.W. Ausiliary.

Upon their return from Panama, they resided in Oregon. In 1939 they moved

to Central Valley, California. There, as citizens, they were active in the Methodist Church, the Masonic Order and other club work and Veteran of Foreign Wars activities.

James Nathan Hubbard graduated from public schools of Tillamook, @re. He entered the service of his country in 1934 just after his 19th birthday. He continued in this service for more than 30 years and was retired as a Chief Warrant Officer. It is of interest to many to include at this point the following from a newspaper clipping. No date, but is was around 1936. The following article was published when the Bronze Star had been awarded to Chief Warrant Officer James N. Hubbard. Quoting: "for meritorious achievement in connection with operations against the enemy in a position of great responsibility as assistant custodian and later as custodian of classified documents of Seventh A.A.F. headquarters". Maj. Gen. W. Douglas Jr. made the presentation at Hubbard's base on Saipan. A graduate of Tillamook schools, Tillamook, Ore., Hubbard had been in service 12 years, spending most of the period in the Pacific area.

THE SERVICES OF JAMES NATHAN HUBBARD

He enlisted in Military Service Aug. 13, 1934 at Vancouver Barracks, Washington. He first enlisted in 10th U.S. Horse Drawn Artillery. Two years later transferred to Field Artillery, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. Dn Jan. 1, 1940 transferred to Army Air Corps at Hickam Field Hawaii. He was there when the Japanese attacked that Air Field and Pearl Harbor. On July 21, 1943 he was discharged as Master Sergeant to accept appointment as Warrant Officer. The most important position held in the ensuing years was as Top Secret Central Officer at Headquarters Strategic Air Command under Gen. Curtis B. Lemay. There the highest Top Secrets, military and civilian, were in his custody and he was responsible for their safe keeping for a period of three years. During his many years of service other duties were many; Asst. Adj. General; Asst. Admin. Officer; Supply Officer; Personnel Officer; Base Adj. While stationed in Alaska he was Military Game Warden and Ranger, Clothing Sales Store Officer and was Chief Officer in various branches within a multitude

of organizations.

After more than 30 years of service in the U.S. Army and U.S. Air Force, James Nathan Hubbard, at Oklahoma City Air Force Station, home of the 32nd Air Division of the Air Defense Command, was retired with the rank of Chief Warrant Officer. He now resides in Nicoma Park, Oklahoma, a suburb of Oklahoma City, Okla.

MIRIAM DIANA HUBBARD

Miriam Diana Hubbard was the sixth child of John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard. She was born near Callands, Va. on the old ancestral estate on Jan. 31, 1857. She died on Dec. 2, 1896 in her home at Toshes, Va. She married Nov. 23, 1877 Stanhope Flournoy Giles (Sam). He was called Sam at all times. He was born 1853 and died very suddenly while a patient in Memorial Hospital in Danville, Virginia, on Sept. 26, 1919, from a heart attack.

Stanhope Flournoy Giles was the son of Augustin L. Giles of near Chatham, Va. who in 1852 married Mrs. Nannie A. Wright, nee Nannie A. Witcher Augustin L. Giles was born in 1823, according to 1860 census and Nannie (Witcher) (Wright) Giles was born in 1818. His father was Columbus Giles, known as "Lum" Giles, who married Callie Pruitt. The 1860 census proves Augustin L. Giles was a resident of Pittsylvania Co., Va. in the vicinity of Chatham, his Post Office. He was a farmer with real estate valued at \$1,200 and his personal property at \$3,000. He was only 37 years old, therefore, born in 1823. His wife was older, 42 years of age. She was a widow before their marriage and was born 1818. They had only 3 children in 1860.

- i. Nancy A., age 5, therefore b. in 1855. Her name was Nancy Ellen Giles who mar. on Nov. 17, 1897 Prentess Henry Swanson. They had no children.
- ii. Uletia C., age 3, therefore b. 1857. Her name was Uletia Callie Giles. Her record is elsewhere. She mar. Chrispin Augustin Hubbard. No children.
- iii. Stanhope F. Giles, age 7, b. Aug. 4, 1853, d. July 25, 1918. His data and descendants included elsewhere.
- iv. James W. Giles was b. after the 1860 census. His exact dates are unknown. He mar. first Ida May Hubbard and they left no descendants. Facts included elsewhere. His second mar. was made and there were children but they could never be located. Facts unknown.

Stanhope Flournoy and Miriam Diana (Hubbard) Giles, after their marriage, lived in their own home nearby his parents. This was near Toshes, Va. in Pittsylvania Co. Stanhope Flournoy was always called Sam and was known as Sam Giles.

He grow up on the farm and was always engaged in this work on his farm. At the same time he was employed as Warehous Manager of the tobacco business in Danville, Va. This meant he was away from home except on weekends. This was possible because his wife's brother was his partner in their business affairs. Even as they succeeded in business in early years of life in like manner, they developed in later years, the prosperous Mountain View Milling Company. He was a successful, prosperous man and at the same time a citizen interested in civic affairs and faithful to the church.

A glance at the history of Hollywood Baptist Church proves that Stanhope F. Giles and Miriam Giles, who were members of Greenpond Baptist Church, united with Hollywood the year it became an organized church in 1884. They were loyal as long as they lived, giving their co-operation both spiritually and financially. When this new church became active, Sam and Miriam were present for the first communion service on the fourth Sunday in October, 1884. In a letter that Miriam wrote to her brother John and her sister-in-law, she told of this service. To them it was a sacred occasion. Since the early records of the church were lost, this letter may be the only record of the first Lord's Supper held in the Hollywood Baptist Church on the fourth Sunday in October, 1884.

Miriam Diana Hubbard grew up on her father's farm. She attended private schools and learned the tasks taught in that era to the girls. She was only 8 years old when the War Between the States was over. This means she saw the bitterest days of the Reconstruction period and she was prevented from attending a school for higher learning away from home.

She grew up a gracious, gentle, Christian young lady. She was 15 years old when her brother John brought his bride to his father's home. She saw Miriam every day for a number of years before she was married. So long as she lived she declared, "Miriam was one of the purest, sweetest girls who ever lived". She knew her also as tender hearted. A suffering animal brought tears to her eyes and quick action for its relief.

Miriam Giles was a devoted mother. The members of her family adored her. It was difficult to give her up, when she was not yet 40 years of age. She had a cerebral hemorrhage and passed away. Someone said, "A flower too pure and fragile for Earth was transplanted in the Garden of God's Love".

When their mother passed away, Less was 18 years old, Lynn was 11, Ida May was 7, Stella was 5 and Kip was 15 months old. Their Uncle "Kip" Hubbard, a bachelor, had lived in his sister's home for 16 years. He took care of Less and Lynn when their father was away on business through the week. The faithful cook took care of their meals and the household duties of former years as

she had been trained to do while his sister, Miriam Giles, was living. Another sister of hers, after the funeral, took the baby home with her until he was a few years old. He too, then, went home to be with "Uncle Kip" and his father. The little girls, Ida May and Stella, went to the home of their grandparents, nearby, and were in the care of "Aunt Callie", their father's sister. They were in daily contact as brothers and sisters even though their mother was deceased.

THOMAS LESLIE GILES

Thomas Leslie Giles, called Less, was born Sept. 14, 1878. He died in Memorial Hospital, Lynchburg, Va. on May 5, 1945, after a heart attack. Interment was at Hollywood Baptist Church.

He grew up on his father's farm. His early education was in the local public schools. He attended in Lynchburg, Va. the Piedmont Business College, of which his uncle, James W. Giles, was president. Later he entered the Medical College in Louisville, Ky. and graduated in medicine. He passed the Virginia State Board of Medicine and was qualified to be a medical practitioner. He never practiced medicine. Remaining at home, he co-operated in the family interest day by day. For a while, at one time, he served as Post Master at Toshes, Va.

Less was a favorite in the family and among his kindred who knew him. He never married.

LEONARD STANHOPE GILES

Leonard Stanhope Giles (Lynn), was born July 6, 1885. He died at home on March 28, 1931 and was interred at Siloam Church near Toshes, Va.

He married Ethel Graves. They have no children.

Leonard Stanhope Giles was reared on his father's farm. When grown, his interest seems to have been in the milling business. He had full charge of The Mountain View Milling Company at the time of his death. He was very young, yet he was a successful man in his business career.

IDA MAY GILES

Ida May Giles, born Nov. 12, 1889. She married on Dec. 21, 1918 Noel Edward Reynolds of Chatham, Va. They resided in Chatham, Va. She died in Halifax, Va. on July 17, 1967.

Ida May Giles was 7 years old when her mother died. From that time her "Aunt Callie" was her adored counsellor, so long as she was living. This was a beautiful relationship, mother to the motherless, and child to the childless.

Ida May attended the local public schools. Then she enrolled at Roan-oke College, now Averette College, Danville, Va., and graduated with A.B. degree. It was, at that time, a 4 year woman's college. Later she attended Farmville State College, which is Longwood College today. She took courses also at Harrisonburg and Redford State Colleges for Women, in her preparation for teaching in the Virginia Public School System. As a teacher, she was employed many years as a member of the Climax High School faculty. This school was near her home.

Through many years Ida May Reynolds made her home in the home of her beloved "Aunt Callie", who needed her, after many years passed. As a teacher, mother, and one who looked after the interests of the family who needed this, she never faltered and she was greatly appreciated.

Ida May (Giles) Reynolds was a member of Hollywood Baptist Church and a consistent Christian from her early years and so long as she lived. She was the first President of the Woman's Missionary Society in this church. Their children:

Nancy Elizabeth Raynolds was born in Chatham, Va. on Feb. 16, 1922. She attended the public schools and graduated from Climax High School, Pitts. Co., Va. She registered at Madison State College for Women and graduated in June, 1944 with a Major in Home Economics.

Nancy Elizabeth Reynolds then entered the teaching profession. Her first experience was one session as teacher of Home Economics at Washington Henry High School in Hanover Co., Va. Returning home, she accepted the same work and was on the faculty at Callands High School, Pitts. Co., Va. for three sessions. She resigned to be married.

On Saturday, July 3, 1948, in the home of her mother at Toshes, Va., Nancy Elizabeth Reynolds and Stith Dudley Barksdale III were married. He is the son of Stith Dudley Barksdale II who married Pauline McPhail of Randolph, Charlotte Co., Va. Their family home is Mulberry Hill. The original grant was to Judge Paul Carrington. Noel Edwards Reynolds of Chatham, Va. died also on June 12, 1967 with a heart attack. He was a World War I veteran. He was active as an employee of the Greyhound Bus Company for many years. His interment was in the Grubb family cemetery.

STELLA ALLEN GILES

Stella Allen Giles, born Oct. 16, 1891 near Toshes, Virginia, died in Dallas, Texas on Nov. 3, 1956. She was interred in the family section of the Hollywood Church Cemetery. She was a member of that church all of her life.

Stella Giles was a beautiful girl with curly hair. She was a student at Roanoke College, now Averette College, Danville, Va. She graduated with the B.S. degree on May 30, 1911. She went to Dallas, Texas and lived there the rest of her life. She never married.

CHRISPIN AUGUSTIN GILES

Chrispin Augustin Giles (Kip), was born Oct. 8, 1895. When he was 15 months old, his mother died. After her funeral, his aunt, Mrs. A.M. Linthicum, took him to her home. After a few years, his father took Kip home to grow up with his sisters and brothers.

He was drafted for service in World War I and sent to Camp Lee, Hopewell, Va. in Sept. 1918. He arrived a short time before Armistice Day and was never sent overseas. He served his time and was honorably discharged. In the meantime, his father had passed away only a few days after his induction into the U.S. Army. Kip returned home to live with "Uncle Kip" and "Aunt Callie". Their home was his home so long as they lived.

He entered into the work of The Mountain View Milling Company of his Uncle "Kip" and deceased father, when his service in the Army was over. After many years of service as a miller, he retired and was living at Gretna, Va., a contented and well man, it was declared. Soon after this statement he was a patient in Southside Community Hospital in Farmville, Va. He died there on Sunday, Jan. 3, 1971. His funeral services were held on Tuesday, Jan. 5, 1971 at Hollywood Baptist Church where his parents are interred. He was a member of Gretna, Va. Christian Church. ELIZABETH FRANKLIN HUBBARD KNOWN AS BETTY FRANKLIN HUBBARD

In the household of John Fuller Hubbard, Betty Franklin Hubbard, in the 1860 census, was listed as Elizabeth F. Hubbard on July 25, 1860. It is assumed she was named Elizabeth, but was always called Betty. And her signature was always Betty. This is mentioned in case some future researcher becomes confused. Betty Franklin Hubbard was born at Callands, Va. on Feb. 8, 1853 and died Nov. 18, 1927. She married Dec. 10, 1873 in her father's home, Absalom Monroe Linthicum. He was born Feb. 25, 1847 and died Aug. 22, 1925. Absalom Monroe Linthicum was the son of William Edward Linthicum who married Mildred Robertson. (See below, 1860 census and Robertson ancestore). Monroe and Betty were both interred on a little knoll about 200 yarde south of their home. In 1976 they rest there alone. There is a chain link fence around their graves.

When they were married, they went to live on a farm near Greenpond Baptist Church where they were faithful members their entire lives. This farm was a part of his father's farm on which he was born. He built a home for himself a short distance from his birthplace. His parents were William and Mildred Linthicum, called Bill and Millie. Data follows. Monroe had a brother, George Linthicum, and it seems that his descendants are today the owners of the other part of William Linthicum's farm that he did not sell to his son, Monroe Linthicum. They seem also to own the cemetery land. Three daughters of the Absalom Monroe Linthicum family were interred there. Monroe Linthicum. acres were owned later by the widow of his only son, James Kelly Linthicum.

She was Luzena May (Bradner) Linthicum. (See later).

Monroe Linthicum was a farmer and resided on his farm around 54 years. Their home was 4 miles from Greenpond Baptist Church but it was never too far to attend Sunday School and church services on Sunday morning, when not providentially hindered. This was a lifelong joy. His childhood days were always a pleasure to recall.

Betty Franklin Hubbard added much satisfaction to his attitude toward life and was his contented companion. Their children were all born in their home on their farm. Their children were:

In the Autumn of 1882, the family of Monroe Linthicum were stricken with diphtheria. All four of the little girls and their father were desperately ill with this disease. Three were lost and the other two barely escaped death. The 3 little daughters were interred beneath the cedar trees on their grandparents farm not far from their parents residence.

Lula Estelle Linthicum, born in Pittsylvania Co., Virginia, Jan. 26, 1875, died in Roanoke, Va. on Dec. 23, 1941. She grew up on her father's farm a happy young girl. She loved books and did well in public schools. She aspired to be a teacher and taught private and public schools for a number of years. Her pupils loved her and children progressed in her school. She was a beautiful young woman.

She married on June 18, 1903 Charles Fletcher Jefferson. He was born March 22, 1872 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. He died Nov. 1, 1961. They resided in Danville, Va. for several years.

They adopted on April 20, 1908 a little girl they learned to love. She was the daughter of William Watson and Ida Louise (Edwards) Young and was motherless. Her original name was Louise Young and upon adoption was Louise Young Jefferson. She was born Jan. 17, 1903 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Ancestors of Absalom Monroe Linthicum and descendants follow. The following information may lead researchers to the Virginia family of Linthicum, who are the ancestors of his father, William Edward Linthicum.

In Vol. 2, History of Frederick County Biographical Records, pp. 1227 & 1228, there is information about Linthicum ancestors. Frederick Co. was in Maryland. While it gives no clue regarding the Virginia family, it does refer to the immigrant who went to Virginia.

The ancestors of the Linthicum families in America were natives of Wales. The name was spelled Lynthicume. They moved to Liverpool, England and the spelling was changed. They owned a line of ships that sailed from Liverpool to Baltimore, Md. They were 5 brothers. One remained in Liverpool. He was a wealthy man. Four came to America. One settled in Kentucky, one in Virginia and two in Maryland. There is, in this, only that the brother who settled in Virginia may be the ancestor of William Edward Linthicum, born 1810, according to the 1860 census record of Pitts. Co., Va. The Linthicum family may have this information. If not, tax records may give clues for researchers for the truth.

CHRISTINA VIRGINIA HUBBARD

Christina Virginia Hubbard (Tina), was never called by her true given name, but was lovingly known as "Tina". Christina Virginia Hubbard was born Feb. 21, 1859 in the old home near Callands, Virginia and lived her entire life on the lands her father owned. These lands were previously the property of her grandfather, John Mitchell. Later the same real estate was owned by her husband. Today the owners are children and grandchildren of her son Charles Read Gilbert, deceased. They are John Beverly Gilbert and son, Charles Gilbert and the children of his son, Jesse Eppler Gilbert, deceased.

Christina Virginia Hubbard married in her parents home on Dec. 23, 1883 Beverly Preston Gilbert. He was born Sept. 4, 1857 and died April 8, 1930 at his home on the above homestead. She was a widow around 10 years after 47 years of wedded life and she passed away in the eighty first year of life on Dec. 5, 1939. Both are interred in the family cemetery of her ancestors. Many are interred there but for her line, four generations are there interred and members of at least five generations were born on these ancestral acres, while six generations have resided there over a period of more than one hundred and sixty five years. Today "Aunt Tina's" descendants own these lands, but they are precious to everyone who is a descendant of John Mitchell, the first ancestor, who owned the land and the first to be buried there.

Christina Virginia Hubbard was 24 years old and Beverly, Preston Gilbert was 26 years old when they were married. He was around 8 years old when the War was over, but he saw all the vicissitudes that hampered children in Virginia during the Reconstruction Days. He took advantage of the worthwhile opportunities and emerged an able, competent young man of ability to progress in life. He proved his fine sense of judgement when he fell in love with Christina Virginia Hubbard and also that he possessed the characteristics of a gentleman in winning her heart. Years later she referred to those days of their courtship and said; "When I was a small girl I decided that when I married, I would marry a man just as nearly like my brother John aa I could find. Beverly, Gilbert was that man". This reference shows she exercised thought and evaluation in her decision for her marriage.

Beverly Preston Gilbert was a farmer and an able and progressive one. This means he was an energetic man all of his life. He was also Justice of the Peace. This was a demand on his time and exacted of him great under-

standing of law and people of all walks of life. When he was quite an old man, he was unfortunate in losing one leg, and he had to use crutches. He never failed in his duty as Justice of the Peace. He attended 3 to 4 trials every week. He drove his own car and no matter how rough the roads proved to be, he was present. On one occasion, there was no one to accompany him, when the call came. When asked why he traveled that difficult road alone, his reply was "Why, those people were in trouble. I had to go". This reply indicates he was a man who had the welfare of others on his heart more than concern for his physical safety. In this case, however, no one would have known where he was, if he had been unlucky on the rough road that day. Through the years, they were active members of Hollywood Baptist Church. She was a member of Greenpond Baptist Church a long time prior to the constitution of Hollywood. As a Charter member of Hollywood, her letter from the Greenpond Baptist Church was dated Oct. 24, 1884. Since the records for many years are lost, the compiler has no facts regarding Beverly P. Gilbert's joining Hollywood. He was, perhaps, received from another church into the membership of Hollywood at some early date. His faithful membership was also augmented by service as trustee, as Sunday School Supt. and it is known that he served also as the clerk of this church. They were faithful in attendance at Sunday School and all services. Furthermore, they had family prayers and reading of the Bible in their home every day.

Tina Gilbert's services in the church are not known. She was a consecrated Christian early in life. She loved sacred music and enjoyed singing hymns all her life. She kept informed on religious matters and read worthy books. One of her eisters-in-law who knew her when she was a girl only 13 years old said: "Tina scatters sunshine in so many other people's lives". This one sentence shows no one can tell her story of life; it will never be told because they no longer are on Earth.

CHARLES READ GILBERT

Charles Read Gilbert was born Oct. 25, 1884 near Callands, Virginia in the home that was the birthplace of his mother and one grandmother on the ancest-ral estate of his great grandfather, John Mitchell and his grandfather, John Fuller Hubbard. At the time of his birth, Rev. Mathew W. Read was the cherished pastor of Hollywood Baptist Church. Before this church was organized, as the Missionary of the Association, Rev. M.W. Read was well known by the citizens. One report to the association proves he visited the people in their homes. In the home of John F. Hubbard he was their faithful pastor who often visited. The same was true after Beverly and Christina (Tina) Hubbard Gilbert were married. When their first born child was named, they honored their pastor and named their oldest son Charles Read Gilbert. After living almost his entire life on this estate, which his father later owned, he died Dec. 18, 1949 at this same home, upon suffering a heart attack.

He grew up on the farm and attended the local public schools. When he

was grown, he decided to leave the farm work. Away from home, he became interested in the need of male medical assistants and was employed in a hospital for a while and became a very efficient man in knowing how to help a sick man. Upon his return home, many of his male friends and neighbors were blessed when he came by for an hour or two or came to sit by the bed to relieve someone else for a while. This neighborly kindness of Charles Read Gilbert was so cheerfully done and is beyond evaluation.

While he was connected with Cedar Grove Hospital, N.J., he met a young lady who was a nurse in the same hospital. They fell in love with each other.

After he left that type of work, he returned to his home and they made plans for their marriage. They were not going to live in the north and she agreed to come to Virginia to be married. He and his brother Clarence would meet her in Lynchburg, Va. The day had been set for the wedding. The train was delayed many hours. It arrived so late that their marriage ceremony was performed at midnight, Dec. 26, 1909. All of his cousins and friends of childhood days, were impressed with this unique hour and invoked God's blessings on them and especially on Katie, the bride, who was a German girl so far from her native land and her people.

Charles Read Gilbert, born Oct. 25, 1884 in Pittsylvania Co., Va., married Dec. 26, 1909 in Lynchburg, Va. Katharina Eppler, born Jan. 12, 1882 at Dormettenger, a town in the state of Wuerttemberg, Germany. She died on Dec. 13, 1969. Her family data follows. She was a trained nurse. She came to America in 1899 and was employed in Cedar Grove Hospital, New Jersey when she met Charles Read Gilbert. They eventually settled on the farm near his parents and spent the rest of their lives there. He farmed and he learned carpenter's work and was exceptionally expert in this field. Katie and Charlie were both very free to help their sick neighbors so long as they could be helpful. This service was a free service. Her mother-in-law said, "I never was blessed with a daughter, but if I had been she could never have pleased me any better than Katie has".

She won the love and admiration of all the neighbors even as she did of her husband's family. Her home and flowers were her chief interest. It seemed that every shrub and flower responded to her care. She had many and they were beautiful.

Katharina Eppler Gilbert, formerly a Catholic, united with Hollywood Baptist Church in 1926. Perhaps the Hollywood Woman's Missionary Union has evaluated for all who are interested, her life. When she was 73 years old, or in 1955, they gave her a party and stated it was in honor of her long record of service to others. She was declared "still active and healthy, she keeps herself busy doing, doing something for others".

In addition to receiving many lovely gifts on the occasion of this surprise party, a poem written by Mrs. Thomas Reynolds was read in her honor, to Katie Gilbert as follows: Quoting:

"A lady we know, in the years long ago Used to walk through the heat, cold, or the snow, To visit her neighbors, whom she know were in need Proving herself to be, a friend indeed.

She nursed the sick, and shrouded the dead And made lovely gifts for those about to wed. And My! how her knitting needles flew When she knew, in the community a baby was due.

Her flowers so lovely, that she tended with care Were not raised for herself alone, they were raised to share. She gave slips to this one, and that one until there's no doubt That about ell she had left, was just a sprout.

She cut pretty bouquets for the sick and the Lord And we know that some day she'll receive a reward. Amd now, at this time, while she's resting her eyes, We decided to give her this little surprise. We hope she'll like it, for our hearts are surely in it And may she have a good time every single minute.

Katie Gilbert was a Charter Member of Morgan Johnson Eastern Star Chapter of Chatham, Va.

The above tells a part of her story. Since then, in 1955 she had been blind due to glaucoma. Cut off from former activities, she remained cheerful and in good health. She kept her interest in everyone. She was intensely interested in this family record through the long years of preparation, as was true of Charles Read Gilbert and his mother. Many items included would never have been known except for their letters that included facts. After Katie was too blind to write, she had newspaper clippings which were read to her, clipped and mailed to the compiler. It is impossible to truly accredit her interest. For the sake of her children and grandchildren and future descendants, her Eppler ancestors, so far as she could recall, are herein recorded. (See below) She lived to be 87 years old.

Charles Read Gilbert was interested in, and was a member of Masonic Order. He was Past Master of Pittsylvania Lodge 24 A.F. & A.M. His funeral was conducted in Hollywood Baptist Church and his interment was at home in the family cemetery with Masonic Rites. He died very suddenly with a heart attack. He was a fine, good man.

Charles Read Gilbert had a sheltered, happy childhood. Perhaps one of his richest experiences was one he related just prior to his death. He and Clarence were permitted one night to go hear an old man, and nearby neighbor, Mr. Wilson Mitchell, play his violin. They were too small to go alone. An old colored man was hired to go with them. Charles said that was the sweetest music he ever heard in his life. The violin was a fine instrument. From that hour Charlie was a violinist he said, although he never had any professional training.

Thereupon, Charlie and Clarence made a violin and used horse-tail hair to have strings, and it had sound. Mother and father thereupon bought them a violin. Charlie always owned a violin and played as long as he lived.

Katie Eppler was only 3 years old when her father died. When she was only 17 she came to America. Her ship was Queen Luise and it left Bremen Harbor on Nov. 14, and arrived at Hoboken, N.J. on Nov. 26, 1899. Her mother passed away a few years later. She was only 20 years old at that time. She lived all the rest of her life in America and around 60 years as a member of the Gilbert family. The children of Charles Read and Katherina (Eppler) Gilbert were:

He grew up on the ancestral acres of his father's ancestors near Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va. He had the normal life of a boy on the farm. He attended the local public schools and graduated at Callands High School in 1929.

Soon after this, he went to New York and lived there for many years with steady employment. He married on Aug. 22, 1936 in New York City, Margaret DiLeo. She was born Nov. 20, 1912 at Waterberry, Mass. By faith she is a Catholic. She keeps the home and is also employed as Secretary at Hughes Memorial Orphanage. Her hobby is plain and fancy knitting and her work is beautiful.

John Beverly Gilbert looks after the ancestral farm. The old home is carefully preserved and other improvements are added. The ancestors' cemetery has constant care so that the government allotment for raising tobacco, corn, etc. is not lost. Yet he does not do any farming. He is a traveling salesman for industrial lubricants and is employed by Northridge Lubricants, Inc. of Rochester, N.Y. He is on duty four and a half days each week.

John Beverly Gilbert is a member of Hollywood Baptist Church. He sang in the choir for many years. He is chairman of the Building and Finance Board of the church and Secretary of his Sunday School Class. The care of the church property is also an item of care. The neatness of the church lawn and cemetery is due to his loving care. His church has first place in his life's interest. The next best interest is Masonry. He belongs to the Masonic Order and has served as Past High Priest of Chatham Royal Arch Chapter No. 56. He is a York Rite Mason and commander of the Commanding Dove #7, Danville, Va. He is also a member of the Loyal Order of the Moose, # 1581. He has all the degrees in York Rite Masonry. In 1973 he was serving as Secretary.

In World War II he saw service with the U.S. Engineering Division under the 1181 Air-borne division serving in Honolula, T.H. and Guam. He was discharged with the rank of Captain on December 26, 1945. His motto: "Live right and help others succeed". He is appreciated by all his cousins. John Beverl y and Margaret (DiLeo) Gilbert have only one child:

When John Charles Gilbert was a very small boy, his parents came to live at the old home in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Later, his grandfather, Charles Read Gilbert, built for his father, a new, modern home on the highway from Chatham to Callands, Va. He attended the public schools and graduated from Chatham High School. He is a member of Hollywood Baptist Church. Jay was the joy and pride not only of his parents, but of his grandparents. He was a courteous, fine young lad to enjoy. Upon finishing high school, he was eligible for service to his country.

His training for war service was in the field of Communications. When Basic Training was completed, his first tour of duty was one year in Germany. This gave him an opportunity to see the native land of his grandmother Gilbert. He was at one time near Frankfurt, Germany. He was P.F.C. in Co. "D", 16th Signal Battalion. This service in Germany delighted his grandmother.

He was given a month's visit home and ordered to Vietnam. He was in California on his journey and near his Uncle Truman Edward Gilbert's home. He had an interesting visit with this uncle. After a quick trip he was in Vietnam with Co. "B", 36th Signal Battalion. When his year of service was over, he returned home and received his honorable discharge with citations from Vietnam as Sp. # 4, which means an Army specialist in the field of Communications. He was employed by the Telephone Co. in Danville, Va. In 1976 he is serving in Pitteylvania Co., Va. as a deputy sheriff.

John Charles Gilbert, son of John Beverley ², Charles Read ³, Beverley Preston ⁴, Armistead Calvin ⁵, John ⁶, Preston ⁷, Michael ⁸, Samuel ⁹, Gervase ¹⁰, is one of the tenth generation of the Gilbert line thus far verified as citizens of America in Maryland and Virginia. Born in 1946; in service of his country in 1966; in Germany one year; in Vietnam one year; honorably discharged with rating Sp. # 4 in communications, is a worthy record to attend before a young man is 22 years of age. She is the daughter of Earle Lester Taylor, born April 18, 1922, who married on July 17, 1948 Virginia Frances Newcome, born Nov. 1, 1930, who were married in Halifax Co., Va. and now reside in Ringgold, Va.

Rev. Charles M. Shelton performed the double ring ceremony for John Charles Gilbert and Karen Ann Taylor. She is a member of Kentuck Baptist

Church. She was president of the YWA in 1969. The year before, she was vice president of her Sunday School Class. She is a graduate of Dan River High School, located near Ringgold, Va. Before her marriage, she was employed as secretary of a business company.

After his discharge from the Army, John Charles Gilbert was with the Electric Department of the City of Danville, Va. They resided in Arlington, Va. where he was employed, and later at Appomatox, Va. In 1976 he is serv-

ing in the capacity of deputy sheriff.

JESSE EPPLER GILBERT

Jesse Eppler Gilbert was the younger son of Charles Read and Katharina (Eppler) Gilbert. He was born on the ancestral acres near Rondo, Pitts. Co., Va. He was one of the fourth generation born there and one of the fifth generation to be heir and own part of the original estate. His possession is the home and possession of his family today. He was born March 22, 1912 and died Aug. 6, 1955 in Memorial Hospital, Danville, Va. He married Sept. 1, 1936 Floriene Elizabeth Towler, born Oct. 13, 1915 near Callands, Va., the daughter of Samuel Joseph Overton and Woodruth (Nuckols) Towler. (See data below).

Jesse Eppler Gilbert grew up on his father's lands, learning, while a boy, to love farming and the wonders of the farmer's life. He attended the public schools and graduated from Callands High School.

As a boy, he seemed always to be happy. He grew up to be a cheerful, prosperous young man. He had a beautiful, well planned farm and many fine cattle as well as the usual farming interests. On one occasion, to a visiting relative, he pointed out a beautiful \$10,000.00 thoroughbred animal. This special agricultural activity was the reason he was deferred from service in World War II.

When young, Jesse Gilbert joined Hollywood Baptist Church. He was an active member. He taught the men's Bible Class in Sunday School. On Dec. 19, 1954, he was ordained a Deacon of this church. In the same sanctuary, his funeral was conducted the next year. The church could not seat the people present. Everyone who knew him had lost someone whom they appreciated. Rev. Charles F. Leek conducted the service. His cousin, John Hubbard, read the Scripture, the church choir sang, the flowers were many. Enough could not be done to express appreciation. Interment was in the Hollywood Church Cemetery. Their children:

Note I. John Gilbert, son of Preston and Fannie (Law) Gilbert died intestate in Calloway Co., Mo. around 1840. Samuel D. Gilbert was his administrator. He signed an affidavit declaring the children as Elizabeth Gilbert, Nancy H. Gilbert, Armistead Gilbert, Frances M. Gilbert, Judith E. Gilbert and Mary V. Gilbert. (Recorded Probate Court Orders Box 109 Bundle 11, Calloway Co., Mo.). Samuel D. Gilbert is assumed to be Samuel Gilbert, brother of John Gilbert. The children may be named above in order of birth, but no proof.

Further study may prove the date Gervase Gilbert and John Webster Sr. came to the Province of Maryland. These men were both born in the 1600's and so was John Webster Jr. If not immigrants, then who were their parents, may easily be learned from the Privincial Records of Maryland.

It is timely to state the first four generations of this Chapter were compiled from records submitted by the family of the compiler. Credit for generation five to ten is due Mrs. Blandford (Towler) Anderson (Mrs. R.M.), who did the research on the Gilbert and Webster line for her nieces, Mrs. Patricia Ann (Gilbert) Hedrick and Katherine Eppler Gilbert, the daughter of Jesse Eppler Gilbert, deceased. This work is quite a fine heritage to every living descendant of Beverley Preston Gilbert, and the compiler congratulates each one that Mrs. Anderson has been so generous in her time, her ability and all that such a study involves. This study is valuable also for John Charles Gilbert, their cousin, the son of John Beverley Gilbert, the brother of Jesse Eppler Gilbert.

Isaac Clay Arnn, born Dec. 3, 1844 near Callands, Va. in the home of his grandfather, Timothy Fuller after the decease of his father in 1844. Isaac

Clay Arnn died in his own home near Callands, Va. on April 3, 1924. See Abraham Arnn Family for his father's ancestors and Arthur Fuller section for his mother's ancestors. Abraham Arnn, see p. 240. Arthur Fuller, p. 364.

Isaac Clay Arnn from up in the home of his grandfather, Timothy Fuller, a farmer. His mother promised his dying father she would not marry again and that their surname would be pronounced, and correctly spelled, Arnn. These promises she kept so long as she lived. Today only the descendants of his son, Isaac Clay Arnn, use the surname Arnn in Pittsylvania Co., Va. This is the correct surname and a memorial to a promise faithfully kept, by Mary Clay (Fuller) Arnn, his wife.

He was named Isaac Clay for his father and his mother. Growing up on his grandfather's farm, he learned to do the chores a farmer's son finds to do. His education was acquired in the private schools of the community. It seems he learned the role of a clerk in the county store, while a youth.

At the age of eleven he lost his grandmother, Elizabeth (Hundley) Fuller. In 1860 the War Between the States was developing. On Dec. 3, 1860, he was 16 years old. He volunteered at age of 16 for service. He enlisted on June 4, 1861 at Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va. as a private in Co. 8, 38th Regiment, Virginia Infantry, Confederate States Army. He was discharged on Nov. 14, 1861 or Nov. 8, 1861 (2 records) by Surgeon's Certificate of Disability. His wound was a shell shot under the arm. This wound healed and did not disable him. He was recorded as 16 years old, 5 feet, 3 inches high, fair complexion, grey eyes, light hair and occupation clerk.

The records show that he re-enlisted as a private of the (2nd) Company E. 6th Regiment Virginia Cavalry C.S.A. on Dec. 25, 1862 at Camp Ashby. His description is 18 years old, light hair, grey eyes, light complexion and occupation a farmer. He was with J.E.B. Stuart, Stonewall Jackson and Robert E. Lee during his service. The 6th Virginia Regiment was with Gen. Lee at Appomatox Court House and were paroled. History shows this Regiment participated in many important battles of this war. The Company's Muster Roll for January and February 1865, dated March 4, 1865, the last one on file, shows "I.C. Arnn present". He is found on the records as I.C. Arnn with three years Service Co. E. 6th Regiment Cavalry Brigade Pittsylvania Dragoons. Cabell E. Flournoy was Captain. For proof, see p. 599.

While he was in service, his grandfather, Timothy Fuller, died on Sept. 11, 1864, before Isaac Clay Arnn was 20 years of age. Eight months later, he saw his Commander, Gen. Lee surrender to Gen. Grant. He was not yet 21 years old when he returned with his weary horse, from Appomatox, Va. to his mother's home at Callands, Va. She was his only close relative on earth and she had only this dear son, returning alive, from a cruel war. Today it is not possible to tell to others of that sacred moment.

Just how this young man had his time occupied upon his arrival home has been lost. As a farmer, and the status of all who came home that spring in 1865, we know there was work to do and they did it.

Mary Ann Hubbard was named perhaps Mary Ann Susan Hubbard, since she was recorded in 1850 census as Susan. If this is a correct assumption, she was evidently named for each of her grandmothers, who were known as Susanna and Anna. If true, the Susanna was dropped very early in life and all knew her only as Mary Ann Hubbard and lovingly called Mary, "Sister Mary" and "Aunt Mary" by those who cherished her each year of her long life of over 81 years, and unto this day, years later in 1976.

Mary Ann Hubbard lived through the era of the War Between the States. She knew the sorrows of both father and lover in the service during that trying conflict. As the oldest child, she gave love and service that a girl in her early teens could render to her parents, brothers, sisters, aged

orandmother and uncles at home and away in Confederate States Army. She was there to help also when they came home on a furlough, sick. At this tender age she learned to care for and love deeply her loved ones. This was a characteristic she carried through life. Everyone was important and she could take time to be pleasant and to please even a child. An example of this was the pleasure she gave a little girl in 1895. This little girl, 9 years old, had to write a letter in school. This provoked the thought, "I have never received a letter in the mail". Going to her mother, she asked, "Mother, is there anyone to whom I may write, who will answer my letter? I wish to receive a letter in the mail". Her reply was "Write to your Aunt Mary. I feel sure she will answer your letter". The result was a letter was receiv→ ed by that little girl in a short time and it has been preserved unto this day. No one but that little girl can understand the joy that letter comveyed nor the true gratitude it planted in that child's heart. She had never seen "Aunt Mary", she had never heard her voice and "she answered my letter". Several years later, she had the pleasure of seeing her. Those who read this may wonder what she did. With a heart bursting with love, she sat on a chair watching her "Aunt Mary's" every movement as she sat there talking to others. This adoration grew as the years passed and the correspondence continued as long as "Aunt Mary" lived.

Mary Ann Hubbard was only 20 years old when she married a cousin, Isaac Clay Arnn, 23 years of age. It has been seen that this young man, at the age of 20, had only one near relative, his mother, who had been a widow before his birth.

These young people started life in the Reconstruction era in the South, the most difficult days ever recorded. This was a time when disappointments came more often than success. Such experiences did not defeat them. They lived on the farm, their own land. They were the parents of 10 children, one of whom lives today in 1976. It will be seen all were an honor to them and worthy citizens where ever each resided. Not one of their sons used alcoholic beverages or were known to enter into any unworthy activities. Their daughters were worthy, noble young ladies. All were Christian men and women. It is not possible to record what these young people accomplished in life, nor will it be possible to record the achievements of their many cousins who grew up with them in the same area.

Mary Ann (Hubbard) Arnn was a member of the County Line Christian Church. This church was so named because it was located on the boundary line of Henry and Pittsylvania Counties. She was a faithful Christian mother. If she could not take her children to Sunday School on Sunday morning, she would have Sunday School in her home. Among the favorite hymns used were "Amazing Grace", "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and "Nearer My God To Thee". It was recalled that her favorite hymn was "Jesus Lover of My Soul". While their father never united with any church, he was a believer in Christ and he made this confession before his death. "Jesus Lover of My Soul" was his favorite hymn. He, through many years, had heard the message in this hymn, conveyed to him by his beloved wife and children who loved to sing it in their home. One reading this hymn can grasp the adoration of this prayerful supplication of a consecrated soul.

Mary Ann Arnn's funeral services were conducted in her home by her pastor, the Rev. W.C. Clark. She was laid to rest by her husband, Isaac Clay Arnn. Her pall-bearers were her grandsons Hubert, John and William Hundley; Hassell Arnn; Belt Hundley; Carroll and Earl Allen. Six of her grand-daughters were flower bearers.

Her beautiful life on Earth was over. Her eternal life in Heaven was beginning.

She was educated at Fairview Graded School, Callands, Va. She then attended Piedmont Business College, Lynchburg, Va. When she finished this Business College, she was employed by the W.M. Retter Lumber Company at Panther, W. Va. as a Stenographer. This was in 1904. Their office was moved to Bluefield, W. Va., then to Devon, W. Va. and later to Hurley, Va. She was with this Company as Field Secretary to the General Superintendent and manager until her marriage in 1921. She was an able member of their staff and was efficient in all she undertook.

On January 15, 1921, she married at Danville, Va. Horace Benson Price, born Nov. 27, 1884 at Bent Mountain, Roanoke Co., Va. He was the son of Charles Warfield and Minnie Burroughs Price of that County, Va. He was educated in the Roanoke Co., Va. schools and Salem High School, Salem, Va.

Ashby Lela Arnn was born, reared and lived his entire life of 91 years at Callands, Va. He was a farmer all of his life. He was also a co-partner with his brother, John Isaac Arnn, in the Lumber business many years.

He was a worthy citizen in every phase of his life. He was a member of Liberty Baptist Church, attending services, unless providentially hindered. The last 16 months of his life, he was present every 5unday. On Dec. 9, 1960, he was present on his 91st birthday. He joyfully put 91 pennies in the Class Birthday Bank that morning. This is an insight into his interest in every detail of the projects in his church life.

He was in his normal state of health that birthday morning. Returning home, he became sick after a day, and continued sick for a few days, and passed away on Friday, Dec. 14, 1960. On Sunday afternoon, Dec. 16, after a service in Liberty Baptist Church, he was laid to rest forever, in the cemetery of that church, beside the mother of his 10 children, his first wife.

Ashby Lela Arnn lived a long life above reproach. He was loved and respected by everyone who knew him. His family in 1960 numbered 10 children, 29 grandchildren, 45 great grandchildren and 2 great, great grandchildren. Today they are more, and it is a regret that each name is not recorded here. It is a great heritage to have a worthy christian ancestor as is true of the descendants of Ashby Lela Arnn.

Then she returned to Va. and home. She loved the old home and she became the owner of it in the late years of her life.

In all, she was in the field of trained nursing for forty years. In the last days, she was in need of medical care, she felt, and her trouble was internal cancer. Thirty years ago there was less knowledge than there is today. Rosa Lee Arnn passed away in a very short time. She passed away in Feb. 1943.

A life well spent. A life that blessed her own loved ones first and then the lives of all others whom she served. Seventy years of obeying the Golden Rule. A wonderful life.

On p. 32 (ibid) a marriage license was issued on Dec. 24, 1802 to Isaac Aaron and Elizabeth Fuller, daughter of Zachariah Fuller who consents. Joseph Fuller Surety. Their family data in Fuller and Hubbard section. No other facts known. See pages 587-592 for additional data for Abraham Arnn and family. MONTEZUMA HUBBARD

Montezuma Hubbard is the third child of John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard. This was his real name, but he was always called Mont by everyone. He was born in the old ancestral home of his mother near Callands, Va. on March 2, 1851. He died in his own home near Chatham, Va. on July 31, 1921 at sunrise.

Mont Hubbard grew up on the farm where he was born. He attended school when a private school was in session. The year he was 10 years old was the beginning of the War Between the States. His father volunteered his services. Mont Hubbard, at this tender age, along with his brother, John, two years older, shouldered the burdens of their farm. He united in each activity and did his part as ably as there was strength to act. They were children united in a Cause. A 1D year old boy with a Cause for which to live. And he was true. Whatever the task was, it was done. No story of failure has come out of that struggle to do the work of each day. If it was to hide the work horses in the pine forest and carry the wheat or corn to the mill to be

ground, it was cheerfully done. This avoided the losing of a beloved old horse, should the enemy see it, on the road. Many of those experiences of more than one hundred years ago his descendants will never know. As a young boy, sacrificial living became a habit and a satisfaction, also a way of life. In those times education beyond that of the local level, was forgotten because selfishness was omitted. His father's physical weakness and the welfare of their dear ones set the goal of a worthy life for Mont Hubbard and only on July 31, 1921 at sunrise, did he relinquish this ideal, to answer God's summons to receive the reward of "Well done good and faithful servant; enter into the joys of thy Lord".

There is no information on the courtship of Mont and Mattie, called more often "Sissie". They were children of good neighbors and through intermarriage of distant relatives, there were family bonds and distant kinship. These two young people started life alone. Each had to take life as it came to each and this they did. One experience proves this young bride, at 20 years of age, had to learn how to cook. She decided to cook that winter day, some dried black-eyed peas. She measured out peas enough to fill her covered dish for the table. She put them in a proper sized kettle in cold water to boil. Pretty soon the kettle had too many peas in it. She was busy after that dipping the swollen peas out of that cooking vessel. Mont never forgot coming to dinner and every dish was full of peas and it was as much fun to recall it, as it was the day this happened. Each learned that a few peas will fill a big dish full of peas after they are properly prepared. They were great lovers and loved fun.

Mont and Martha were Christians. Just when they joined Greenpond Baptist Church is not known. They were members of that church and it is found that Mont Hubbard had a letter dated June 24, 1884 and Mrs. Martha M. Hubbard's letter, year 1884, to unite with Hollywood Baptist Church, when it was organized. They not only became members but workers. In less than 3 weeks later, the records show, he was treasurer and served in this capacity for 18 years. He was also a deacon. The records do not show he was present at Sunday School, church services and at prayer meeting on Wednesday nights as regularly as these services were held. If there wasn't a reason for absence, he was there, also every member of his family.

He and his family sang hymns together in the home. They also fostered singing schools in the churches in those early years. Mont Hubbard's family enjoyed such occasions so long as he lived.

Mont Hubbard went through a number of sad years. Mont and Martha lost Matthew, Cora and Bruce, then Martha and an infant died in June 1889 and he, with 4 young girls and a small son were alone. The children were age 14, 12, 10, 9 and 5 and needed a mother.

Mont Hubbard fell in love with another young girl, not yet 3 years older than his oldest daughter. She was also remotely a relative. She was a teacher and his children loved her. They were married and his home life was brightened. The family altar, with Bible reading, singing together and prayer, held this family close through the years ahead of them. Both mother and father could sing by notes any new song. This was, of course, enhanced by the use of the piano. All gathered around the piano in the parlor and sang sacred music, also the excellent selections of good music. These days were before the time of Jazz music. This home was a place everyone had kind words for each other as they came and went through the day. Everyone had his task and did it.

Mont Hubbard was interested in his family; each one was important. He was a quiet teacher of manners, morals, religion, politics or whatever was of value at the moment. His strength of character, his wisdom, his zeal for

nobler ideals were an inspiration to his children to look upward. He set the example personally and required of his family the same in personal apnearance and deportment.

He was a student of the Bible. He kept one in his desk in the store. It was marked throughout. His motto was "Be polite and be kind to everybody, but donot equalize your self with people beneath you". He did this and was loved by all. At his funeral there were present crowds of people who came to honor him.

He loved nature in all phases of its beauty. This meant he was always interested in farming. He also had a mercantile business in his later life for many years and it was a success.

Emma (Walker) Hubbard walked by his side for over 30 years and shouldered her share of the rearing of their twelve children and home was a glad place for her five step-children. She was very capable in her guidance in school home-work and their children were all progressive in school.

Perhaps the success of the lives of Mont and Emma Jones (Walker) Hubbard can be best seen in the 12 young people they reared to be worthy citizens of the nation. Today this influence has spread to bless not only 12 children, 34 grandchildren, but also at least 46 known great grandchildren. She also had a share in rearing 5 of Mont's first family, each one of whom loved her as a mother.

Through the years he had time to talk with his family. Many stories of Civil War days he often told an interested child, yet today these cannot be accurately recalled and cannot be included here. One item he often spoke of was that the first Hubbard's kin to him, to come to Virginia, were three brothers. To your compiler, this was most interesting when told about this. His brother had said the Hubbard ancestor first in Virginia was in Westmoreland County. Today no names can be recalled by either of their 8 living children. This study has led back to Robert Hubbard of Westmoreland and James City Counties of Virginia and his three sons, all of whom were adults when, or soon after, their arrival in Colonial Virginia.

Mont Hubbard married first Martha Matilda Parrish (Mattie) on Feb. 12, 1874. License was issued on Feb. 9, 1874 to Montezuma Hubbard and Mattie M. Parrish. He was 22 years old, son of Jno. F. and Stella C. Hubbard. She was 19 years old, daughter of J.M. and Lizzie Parrish. Both were single and he was a farmer. Rev. C.W. Wood performed the ceremony. (See Mar. Reg. No. 2, 1861-1900, Pitts. Co., Va.). The full names of her parents were Joseph Madison and Elizabeth (Stone) Parrish. Martha Matilda Parrish was born on Oct. 3, 1853 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and died in their home near Chatham, Va. June 2, 1889. (See Parrish Section). Their children were all born near Chatham, Va. 1880-1933

Luke Hubbard, born April 19, 1880 near Chatham, Va., was the son of Monte-zuma (Mont) and Martha Matilda (Parrish) Hubbard. He married Mae Lacy on Nov. 20, 1922 in Chicago, Ill.. She died May 3, 1928 in Los Angeles, California and is interred in that city. He died June 27, 1933 in the same city and was interred by his wife. Each had cancer. Their son:

Luke Hubbard grew up on his father's farm with his four sisters. They were very close to each other. When the half brothers and sisters joined, the same relationship included them. Everyone loved the other and all enjoyed each other. Luke was the brother all looked to for whatever plan was made. There was always a crowd where ever Luke and his sisters were on Sunday afternoons. They were all popular and usually all their friends were at their father's home. If not, they, and everyone else, were participating in some special occasion. All were members of Hollywood Baptist Church and the entire family attended the services. This meant that Luke looked after seeing his sisters to church because in those days this meant driving the horses.

Luke attended the local public school until he was around 17 years of age. He was a very alert, aggressive young man. He enrolled at Piedmont Business College in Lynchburg, Virginia. He excelled in his work and completed the business course.

He was employed at the Norfolk and Western Rail Road Office in Lynchburg, Va. His mathematics was without error. The Adding Machine had been put on the market in those early days, but all offices did not possess one. The manager in this office told the salesman he did not need an adding machine, that his assistant, Luke Hubbard, could add any set of figures quicker than his machine. The salesman said "Let us compete and then if he gets the answer first I will give you the machine". The numbers were celled and recorded and before the adjustment of the machine to give the answer, Luke gave the answer and the machine agreed. He never added one column of figures at the time if there were more to be added. His rule was to add by the hundreds, never by the units. It has been said that the manager called out many numbers all in hundreds and this made it easy for Luke to give the answer. The stunned salesman replied "You win!". The story says the manager bought the machine.

Later Luke Hubbard went to California. He made such a record that the Company raised his salary rather than lose him, more than one time. At last they gave him partnership in the Company and he remained in that business so long as he lived.

ANNIE SNOW HUBBARD

Annie Snow Hubbard, born Sept. 5, 1882 near Chatham, Va., was the fourth daughter and fifth child of Montezuma (Mont) and Martha Matilda (Parrish) Hubbard. In Lynchburg, Va., she married on Oct. 1, 1912 William Edward Moore. They resided at Rondo, Va. She died on Jan. 12, 1914 and was interred in the Moore family cemetery near Rondo, Va. Their only child was born and died on Jan. 11, 1914.

Annie Snow Hubbard was a beautiful young woman who possessed an amiable disposition. Early in life she accepted Christ as her Saviour and joined Hollywood Baptist Church. She was a consecrated Christian young lady.

She attended the public schools near home. Then she was in the private school in the home of her Uncle John Hubbard for three years. She was loved by all, as one loves a sister. She then attended high school in Chatham, Va. and resided in the home of her mother's brother, Dr. William Perkins Parrish. Here, too, she was adored because she was always our gentle, gracious Annie. She was popular in school and admired by everyone every where.

Her life was short and grief for her was great. A mature lady said "Do not be sad. She was too pure for this world, a flower too beautiful. She was transplanted in the Garden of Heaven".

It is sweet to recall pleasant hours with Annie. She loved music. She sang gospel hymns with a zeal and enthusiasm that gave the words wonderful meaning, whatever they were, of praise, love or worship of God.

Montezuma Hubbard (Mont), married the second time. On March 6, 1891 a marriage license was issued to Mont Hubbard, age 40 and Emma J. Walker, age 18, single daughter of Robert A. and Julia F. Walker. His parents were Jno. F. and Stella Hubbard. Rev. T.P. Duke performed the ceremony. (Mar. Reg. No. 2, (1861-1900) Pitts. Co., Va.). The marriage ceremony took place on March 22, 1891. (Bible record). Her parent's full names were Robert Armistead Walker who married Julia Frances Blair. See Fuller section. She was born Aug. 24, 1872 near Callands, Va. and died Feb. 2, 1951 in her home near Chatham, Va. She was a member of Hollywood Baptist Church many years. Charles Franklin Leek was a student at the present Hargrave Military Academy, Chatham, Va. and graduated in 1918. He served the Greenpond and Hollywood Baptist Churches as pastor 1916–1918. He enrolled at Richmond College in Sept. 1918. After their marriage, Zola (Hubbard) Leek enrolled at West Hampton College in Sept. 1919. They were graduated with A.B. degrees on June 7, 1922 at the same commencement. It has been said they were the first married couple to receive their degrees on the same date at Richmond University,

In Sept. 1922 he enrolled at the Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville, Ky. He accepted the call as pastor of the Pleasureville, Ky. Whereas, during his fifteen year ministry as our pastor the church experienced an unprecedented growth in spiritual life, giving and attendance; and Whereas, in addition to being remembered for his warm, friendly, always personal greetings he is also remembered as a successful preacher, a soul-winner supreme, a patron of youth, and a representative of his God and his church in the civic and religious life of the city, state and South; and Whereas, the church guided by principles and following examples set by him continues to flourish and expend;

Be it Resolved that we give thanks to God that we had the benefit of this "chief servant" to labor with us and that we had the privilege of laboring with him; that we express our deep loss at his homegoing and that we affirm our expectation of joyful reunion in our heavenly home. Be It Further Resolved that a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes of the meeting of the church in conference; that a copy be forwarded to the family of Chas. F. Leek and that a copy be furnished to The Alabama Baptist.

Charles Franklin Leek retired from service as a pastor of churches because of his health. They returned to Pittsylvania Co., Va. and owned the estate called "Cedargates", near Hollywood Baptist Church, the old home church of the Hubbard family. They resided there 9 years. Although he had retired from full time pastor's service, he continued in service as an interim pastor at intervals, to bhurches near their home, riding from home to the church.

During all these years, Zola Young (Hubbard) Leek was not only a home-maker, but an active helpmeet at all times in the church and community activities in many ways. While in Montgomery for 15 years, she was active in YWCA work. She served also as the Pres. of Montgomery Baptist WMU Association at one time. For five years she was Secording Secretary of the Alabama State WMU Conference. The Girl Scout work had her aid. She was a member of the Woman's Club and the home church duties were many for her.

After Mr. Leek's retirement and return to Pittsylvania Co., Va., Zola (Hubbard) Leek was affiliated with the William Pitt Chapter of NSDAR at Chatham, Va. for a number of years and served as Regent of that chapter at one time. At present she is a member of General William Lee Davidson Chapter of NSDAR at Nashville, Tenn. and served as Chaplain. For more that 25 years she has had membership in American Association of University Women.

Upon returning to Pittsylvania Co., Va. after retirement, they renewed their membership in Hollywood Baptist Church of which he was pastor when he was a young man. Soon after that he published a brief history of Hollywood Baptist Church. Then as author, he published the Pittsylvania Baptist Association History 1788-1963. He was a dependable, aggressive young person at all times. This was a joy and was appreciated by the entire family. Living on the farm, he was always a busy young boy. His father was also in the mercantile business and this gave him an opportunity for many small tasks. He attended the neighborhood public school and Chatham High School. He then enrolled at Virginia Military Institute and graduated in 1932 with a B.S. degree. At the same time he was commissioned 2nd Lt. Arty. at V.M.I. O.R.C. in 1932. He taught school at Whitmell, Va. the next year and was basketball coach. He also did graduate work in agronomy at Virginia Polytechnic Institute, Blacksburg, Va. in 1939-1940. He entered the service for active duty in the Army in July 1940 with the rank of 1st Lt. of Artillery 16th F.A. and was stationed at Fort Meyer, Va. In May 1942 he was promoted to Captain and commanded "A" Battery 16th F.A. Then he was promoted to Major S-3 16th F.A. Battalion. Later he was transferred to the 16th Armored Division in 1943. He organized and trained 396 Armored F.A. Bn.

He was in many places, and very dangerous places to serve. There were other rewards and pleasures. One of these was meeting and falling in love with Josephine Hindman.

Mont Hubbard Jr. married on April 7, 1942 in Tuscon, Arizona Josephine Anne Hindman, born June 5, 1913 at Tulsa, Oklahoma. She is the daughter of Clarence James Hindman, born March 5, 1876 at Olathæ, Kansas, who married on Oct. 7, 1908 at Tulsa, Okla. Odesta Fidelle Berry, born March 22, 1882 at Jefferson, Texas. Her father was President of Tulsa, Okla. Chapter of SAR.

After discharge from loyal service to his homeland, the United States of America, Mont Hubbard Jr. returned to his native state, Virginia, and settled at Altavista, Va. He started his own business in Altavista which was Altavista Concrete Products Company, of which he was president. In this field of business, he was prominent and most successful. He was active in various civic interests. He was a member of the local school board. Colo. and transferred to Colorado College of Medical Assistants. Then she was employed by the Rocky Mountain Foot Clinic in Denver, Colo.

HENRY BLAIR HUBBARD

Henry Blair Hubbard, born Sept. 5, 1954 in Lynchburg, Va., was attending school in Altavista, Va. and graduated from Altavista High School in June 1972. In Sept. 1972 he enrolled at University of Colorado, Boulder, Colo. In the spring of 1973 he was interested in other activities and returned to the University in June 1974 until Dec. 1975. He transferred in Jan. 1976 to Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University at Blacksburg, Va. He married June 16, 1979 at Leatherwood Farms, Leesville, Va. Janis Alda Burnette, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mahlon Admire Burnette.

HAZEL BLAIR HUBBARD (See also p. 331-D)

Hazel Blair Hubbard, born July 29, 1914, is the youngest child of Montezuma (Mont) and Emma Jones (Walker) Hubbard. She was only 7 years old when her father died.

She graduated at Chatham High School, Chatham, Va. She enrolled at Averette College, Danville, Va. and graduated in 1934. She entered the School of Nursing at the University of Virginia, Virginia Hospital at Charlottesville, Va. Upon her graduation, she was invited to remain at the Hospital as an aesistant to the Head Nurse. She did work 1943-44 at William and Mary Extension Service at Richmond, Va. Later she went to Warm Springs, Georgia where she was active in the care of polio victims and others as a physical therapist since 1944 until she retired. She resides in Nashville, Tenn.

WILLIAM BLAIR

William Blair, born in Moneymore Co., Derry, Ireland, came to Pennsylvania prior to the Revolutionary War. His date of birth is unknown, but is estimated ca. 1750. Date of arrival in Pennsylvania not known. He settled in York Co., Pa. He married in York Co., Pa. Sarah Sutter and the date is estimated to be in the 1770's. She was born ca. 1760. She died after 1807.

William Blair was a Revolutionary War soldier. He enlisted Feb. 28, 1776 in Pa. He had the rank of Captain in Captain Hay's Co., 6th Battalion of York Co., Pa. He also signed a petition showing his patriotism. Most of the members of Captain Hay's Co. were citizens of York Co., Pa.

William Blair was taken a prisoner on June 8, 1776 and was paroled on Aug. 9, 1776. (See Pa. Archives 6th Series Vol. II, p. 551) (See Pa. Arch. Sth Series, Vol. II, p. 206) He died ca. 1789. Their children:

The above is an exact copy of the Bible Record of Samuel Blair (1789-1870). This was in the possession of Martha(Blair) Settle. A Xerox copy was sent many years ago by her daughter, Shirley Settle.

From the above Bible record and many letters, the following summary is made for the entire family, as known today.

Samuel Blair, b. April 11, 1789 is the son of William Blair, b. in Ireland who married Sarah Sutter. Samuel Blair d. March 28, 1870. He married July 26, 1810 Mary Reynolds, b. March 18, 1789. Their Children were: See Bible Record.

Mary (Reynolds) Blair died after 1830. Samuel Blair married the second time on Feb. 22, 1834 Clarissa Fuller. Zachariah Fuller was their bondsman. He was her brother. She was the daughter of Brittain and Nancy (Jackson) Fuller. She was b. in Nov. 1802 and d. April 1890. Rev. R.B. Beck performed their wedding ceremony. Their marriage license is dated March 17, 1834. (See Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg. and Minister's Returns). Samuel Blair died March 22, 1870 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. The children of Samuel and Clarissa (Fuller) Blair were all born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. They were: See Bible Records for births. Death dates sent by those who knew.

JOHN MITCHELL HUBBARD

John Mitchell Hubbard, born April 9, 1849 near Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va., died June 5, 1914 at Meherrin, Prince Edward Co., Va. He was buried in the cemetery at his birthplace near Callands, Va. He was the son of John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard. A marriage license was issued on Feb. 19, 1872 to Jno. M. Hubbard and Mary E. Sours. (Mar. Reg. Pitts. Co., Va. No. 2 1861-1900) On Feb. 22, 1872 they were married at Chatham, Va. in the home of her parents, Jacob and Susan (Gray) Sours. Rev. William H. Matthews performed their wedding ceremony. The Bible record records witnesses as Jecob Sours and Mont Hubbard, but the family and friends were present. Her full maiden name was Mary Elizabeth Sours, but she was called "Mollie".

Mary Elizabeth (Sours) Hubbard preserved a beautiful Valentine John Mitchell Hubbard sent in Feb. 1872 to Miss M.E. Sours, Pittsylvania C.H. Va. It was "To the one I love".

"Forget me not
Time cannot change or alter me,
Whate'er may be my lot;
My heart will still be true to thee;
Then, O: forget me not."

He was sincere in this declaration so long as he lived. In 1976 this Valentine is still treasured as a token of his sincerity. See Plate No. XVI.

Mary Elizabeth Sours, born Dec. 28, 1852 at Big Lick, now Roanoke, Va., died May 10, 1928 in her home in Lunenburg Co., Va., several miles west of Keysville, Va. and was buried by her husband in the family cemetery near Callands, Va. Born at Big Lick, Va. in 1852, she lived there several years. She was a very precocious child. When she was around two years of age, she traveled by stage coach and boat from Big Lick, Va. to Adams Co., Pa. She recalled so long as she lived, the experiences of this journey. First, she grew tired of riding in the stage coach and they could not get out. She cried for water then. The driver promised her the water as soon as they arrived at a certain place. He stopped according to his promise, secured the water and offered a tin cup of water. She refused the water because she was really not thirsty, just tired of riding. When they insisted, she told the

man "No, the cup is too black". He laughed and agreed with her. It was the cup he used to make coffee when he grew too sleepy when he was driving the coach at night. He explained also the water trickled over leaves and he did not blame her. His kindness gripped her heart and his effort to save her from criticism, she never forgot.

Then on the boat she was invited to play with another little girl who was in the care of her "Black Mammy". Her parents did not believe in slavery so she did not possess a Black nurse-maid. They had a great time. At intervals they were interrupted by both men and women, who asked the old colored woman where she came from and where she was going. She finally grew tired of this rudeness, straightened herself up and standing tall, hands on her hips, replied "I come from no whar and I'se gwy'ing to nuthin". This was never forgotten by little "Mollie". She loved it as long as she lived.

When she was a teen-age girl she was telling these two things and there were doubts of her memory of this. She said she was sure she recalled one home on that visit in Pennsylvania. They were there and she was out on the porch playing. She recalled a man with a long beard came out of the hall door. He went over to a bucket of water at one side of the porch and drank some water. He then took a dipper of water and threw it in the spring that was near the porch. This was possible at one home built near a spring in troublesome Indian days. And the man of the house had a long, well kept beard that was almost to his waist line. When her mother heard this, she felt that "Mollie" did truly remember her trip to Pennsylvania.

She learned rapidly when she was in school, but all schools were private and often there wasn't a teacher to employ. So to a large extent she was a self educated person. She read everything that she could lay her hands on to read. She loved music and took piano lessons. In Chatham, Va. she was a student in Mr. Joe Jim Averett's private school. He was a brother of the Averett Brothers, the founders of Averett College, Danville, Va. The War Between the States and its aftermath meant that she never owned a piano. She did master vocal music and she had a very beautiful voice. When young, she sang all the beautiful songs of that era. Refer to p. 618.

In the section in which she lived, many people danced in their homes and at intervals they invited friends whom they knew to their homes to participate. These private occasions were on the highest social level. Mary Elizabeth Sours enjoyed dancing and excelled in it; therefore she was at all times one of the most desired guests and she did enjoy rhythm to music.

She was an excellent conversationalist. Young and older people enjoyed talking to her. Everyone delighted in her presence. She was popular with the young people. Her suitors were many, but she was not a girl who trifled She had an ideal to which she adhered when it came to the subject of marriage. This was to love a man of high ideals who did not smoke or chew tobacco and who was known never to drink alpoholic beverages. One old gentleman told her she would die an old maid. On the above date of her marriage, she married John Mitchell Hubbard, who was 100 per cent her ideal young man. He lived true to it so long as he lived. Together they lived worthy lives and were an asset to the places they lived. She was only nineteen years of age and he was almost twenty three years old. They went to his father's home to live. One of his sisters, when an old lady, recalled "Sister Mollie's" beauty when she came as "Brother John's" bride. All of his sisters and brothers loved her and so did his parents. After the first year, they lived for 7 years on his father's land, but over on the hill near his parent's home. They were together daily. During those years, John had the leadership in the farming daily. Then John Hubbard bought land twenty five miles away in the same county, nine miles west of Danville, Va. Bachelor's Hall, Va. was their

post office. They had a great part in developing the neighborhood, later known as Vandola community and they became the leading citizens there. They bought land in 1879 and moved there in 1880. They were strangers. No one offered John Hubbard a calendar. He made one and used it. To be exact about time of day, he used a Sun Dial (it is dated 1878) to regulate his watch or the clock. There was no train near. There was no church near. There was a log school house a mile away and a small country store. They paid cash for every purchase. They paid, on the date, full wages for all hired help. He was honest and upright in every transaction and thus he commanded the good will and respect of everyone and retained it forever. Tobacco was his money crop. He had only one barn and a small house on his land. He built a kitchen at once. Then he had his dwelling house built as soon as he obtained capable, dependable men to do the work. (See letter p. 618)

After her marriage, Mary Elizabeth Hubbard grew very serious about her soul salvation. She, however, did not unite with a church, because she loved to dance and the rules of the church forbade dancing. After they went to their new home, there were church services in the log school house. She gave up the dance and joined a group to be baptized in Sept. 1882. On that date, her only child, Conrad, was dying from diptheria. It was three years later in Sept. 1885 that the pastor of Cascade Baptist Church, Rev. Calvin G. Jones, came to baptize several candidates in Dan River and they were then on the membership roll of the nearest Baptist church, which was Cascade. This was 12 miles away. She did not attend because of the distance.

She loved to ride horseback, but she had gained weight and she abandoned that pleasure. In her era, women used only the sidesaddle and wore the long, wide riding skirt. As a rule, there were steps to climb when mounting one's horse. This became a problem, due to her weight. So she never went to her church, 12 miles from home.

They went to work, also, for a church of their own. There were a few others just as anxious for a Baptist church as they were, and all working together, the Vandola Baptist Church was built and completed in May 1889. The land was given by John Mitchell and Mary Elizabeth (Sours) Hubbard. This church is on the same side of the road near their home, built a few years earlier. John Hubbard also gave eighty dollars in cash and hauled, or had it hauled, every foot of the lumber to Danville, Va. to be planed for this building.

John Hubbard had never been baptized, because there was no minister near. In order to be ready, he rode horseback home to Hollywood Baptist Church, one Sunday in May 1889 and was baptized. He returned the same day. The distance of fifty miles was a long horseback ride in one day. Rev. M.W. Read baptized him in Bearskin Creek, whose waters were used for baptismal purposes for 54 years, by Hollywood Church.

There were 19 charter members when the new church was constituted on June 9, 1889. Dr. George 8. Eager of Danville was present and preached the dedication sermon. The church was named Vandola Baptist Church. The trustess of the church, who were appointed, were Miss. R. Fleetwood Powell, Miss Mary Will Harvey, W.R. Harvey and J.M. Hubbard.

After this was done, the deed for the land would be written and it was recorded in Vol. 95, Pittsylvania Co., Va., p. 209. This deed follows: "This deed made this the 26 day of Sept. in the year 1889 between John M. Hubbard and Mollie E. Hubbard, his wife of the first part and R. Fleetwood Powell, Mary Will Harvey, W.R. Harvey and J.M. Hubbard, Trustees of the second part and Vandola White Baptist Church of the third part: Witnesseth: That the said John M. Hubbard and his said wife, Mollie E. Hubbard do hereby give and grant and convey with general warranty of title to R. Fleetwood

Powell, Mary Will Harvey, W.R. Harvey and J.M. Hubbard, Trustees and their assigns forever of the said Vandola White Baptist Church all of that certain tract, lot or parcel of land situated in the County of Pittsylvania on the left side of the road as it leads from Danville, Virginia by the Upper Ferry to Bachelor's Hall and Martinsville, the said tract of land containing One and 42/100 acres and bounded as follows; Beginning at new cor. white oak on road to Hubbard thence his line S. 50 W 25 feet to Stone to Wilson, thence his line N 14 West 436 ft to road thence on it S. 50 E. 50 ft to beginning.

In trust nevertheless for the erection and building upon said land a church or house of worship for the use and benefit of the White Baptist congregation that may from time to time assemble and compose its membership and congregation and for any other building that may be connected with the said Church purposes. But it is understood and agreed between the parties to this deed that in the event the land is used for other purposes than as a White Baptist Church as aforesaid then the land herein conveyed and given, but not the buildings thereupon or the appurtenances thereto, shall revert to the grantors in this deed. Witness our hands and seals this day and year first above written.

I, E. Withers, a Justice of the Peace for the County aforesaid, in the State of Virginia, do certify that John M. Hubbard and Mollie E. Hubbard whose names are signed to the writing above, bearing date on the 26th day of June September 1889 have acknowledged the same before me in the County aforesaid. Given under my hand this the 26th day of September 1889.

John Mitchell Hubbard was one of the Trustees of this church as long as he lived. In 1908 R. Fleetwood Powell, Mary Will (Harvey) Harper, J.M. Hubbard, H. Edgar Allen and Pleasant Soyars were appointed trustees by the church in session according to section 1399 of the Code of Virginia for the benefit of this church. (See Vol. 14, p. 759, Pitts. Co., Va. Records).

William Henry Sledge, one of the 19 charter members, who was a ministerial student, was requested to serve as interim pastor until a pastor was secured. He did this. Rev. W.D. Barr was the first pastor and he served from 1890 to 1903.

John Mitchell Hubbard and Mary Elizabeth Hubbard assumed the cares of this church and never faltered on any occasion. Both were active in Sunday School, the prayer meeting, protracted meetings and regular business meetings and church services. Mary Elizabeth Hubbard lead the hymns. At the beginning they had no organ. She knew vocal music, so she learned new hymns and taught the neighbors to sing the new beautiful hymns. They were faithful every Sunday. She taught the smallest children, and they believed the Baptist doctrine. In her class the picture of the baptism of Jesus was on the card at intervals. She took time to explain this to each of the children. A reward came many years later when 45 were baptized at one time. Many were from Methodist families and joined Vandola because they believed in immersion as

they were told of it when in the Vandola "Card Class". The parents of one brother and sister told them they could not join any church except the Methodist. They requested immersion. The pastor consented. Then they requested him to baptize them at the same hour and place the Baptists were to baptize the other 43 candidates. He consented.

On the morning of this scheduled baptismal service, in an out-door stream of water, near the home of John M. Hubbard, the Baptist and Methodist ministers were guests in his home. There was perfect harmony. The banks of the stream were full of people. Forty three were baptized by the Baptist pastor. Then the brother and sister were immersed by the Methodist pastor. At the moment all were out of the water, everyone was sprinkled very lightly from a cloud above, but no one was wet. The Methodist pastor laughed and said he was sure all were baptized that day. He, however, believed in immersion and was himself immersed when he was a boy, and he rejoiced in this occasion.

The home of John and Mollie Hubbard was open to all ministers when they were in the neighborhood. It was home to the Vandola pastor and his assistants. In one series of services, this was three weeks long. Politicians on their campaigns knew also they would receive their hospitality. They came hoping for his vote and knowing he never promised any man his vote. The man he regarded best for the office would get his vote on election day. Mary Elizabeth Hubbard had no vote. She had a voice and she spoke her opinions very positively on politics. When women were granted the right of suffrage, she was the first woman in her precinct to register. Due to paralysis, she was never able to comply with the law in order to cast a vote.

John and Mollie Hubbard never drank alcoholic beverages. They observed the price many families paid when someone in their family used liquor. In their neighborhood, only John Hubbard and one other man were known to never take a drink. They united in an effort to eliminate the sale of liquor by the drink. This was accomplished by signed petitions that license for sale of drinks not be granted to anyone in their neighborhood. The result of this effort and the educational efforts they made, through church programs over many years, was most satisfactory. They saw many become non-drinkers and some renters became home owners. Among the children of all men known as drinkers, in one generation of children, only one grew up to be known to take a drink and he was never known to be drunk. It is sad to say that in later years, the eighteenth amendment revoked all of this work.

John Hubbard kept abreast of the times. He read his Bible, studied religious literature in preparation as a teacher and leader of his church. He was a farmer and this was efficiently accomplished. He gave diligence to the curing of tobacco. He worked out a plan for cutting and curing his tobacco on a schedule that eliminated all work on Sunday. "Remember the Sabbath Day to deep it Holy" was observed by him. Everyone employed by him had an opportunity to do the same. This meant no man was even watching fires at a barn on Sunday. This can be appreciated only by someone who understands all the details of raising tobacco. He succeeded and one year there were 42 barns of tobacco cut and cured by this plan.

In 1911 John and Mollie Hubbard moved to Brunswick Co., Va. Once more they had no Baptist church near them. They soon knew there were 11 Baptists in their new neighborhood and all anxious for a home church. They organized a Sunday School and very soon they were among the charter members of the new Baptist Church in Dolphin, Va. They gave of their time and money to this new church while there, as faithfully as they had served at Vandola.

Due to failing health and farming results, John Hubbard sold his farm. He moved to Meherrin, Va. temporarily. There he rented a house. He could travel by railroad north, south, east and west in search of the land he desired. The winter was long and snow covered the land and he had a veary winter. In all of his life he had never lived on rented property and he did not enjoy this. In the spring, he did find land he was willing to own as soon as the boundaries were established. Suddenly he became very ill and in a few days he passed away. He was interred in the cemetery near his own parents and grandparents near Callands, Va. Rev. W.D. Barr, his first pastor, conducted his funeral service on Sunday afternoon, June 7, 1914. Many people who learned in time of his death came many miles to his funeral. They had lost a valued friend. White and black people valued him. The old colored man who lived in his employment around 30 years before he moved from Pittsylvania Co., was told of his death a few days after the funeral. He was standing near the well. He was so overcome with grief that he sat down on the platform and wept like a child, saying "I have lost the best friend of my life". This was the attitude of all whom he had ever employed, white or colored.

John and Mollie Hubbard believed in educating children. They urged white and black to send their children to the public schools provided. Their own children were in school every day, or sick in bed. When the public school closed, a private school was provided to complete 9 months of school. In three years his children had covered the subjects taught in public school, and after that they had a private school at home for 5 years. During the public school days, one of the tenant farmers had a teen-age brother who had never attended school. He was an orphan and was never sent to school. John Hubbard recognized the intelligence of this young boy. He hired him to walk with his children through the woods to and from school, on the condition he would attend school those 5 months and he would buy for him the books he needed. He accepted and John Hubbard handed him a Primer. This teemage boy learned his letters, read his Primer and the teacher did her part; she let him advance to, as soon as he was ready, the first reader class. When the 5 months closed, this boy had read through his McGuffey's fifth reader. This is an outstanding example of John Hubbard's service to others.

John Hubbard tithed his income. He used what was needed by his church and the rest went to other causes. There were seven Causes in the church to which contributions were made and he gave to other needs. Two ministerial students from Vandola Baptist Church were enabled to get their college and Seminary education because of his aid to them in gifts of money. One told him later in life that he saved his life for the Cause of Christ. He said he was in Chatham, Va. to secure a force of colored men to work all the year on upkeep of a section of the railroad. His profit would pay for hie next year's expenses at Wake Forest College in North Carolina. John Hubbard knew nothing of his plans. He did know he wanted to attend Wake Forest College in N.C., and he was praying for him. He was in Chatham attending Court one morning. He saw this young man across the street and hurriedly crossed the street and said to him, "When you are ready to go to college, come by the house and I will assist you with what you may need." and he hurried on to the Court House. This minister, later in life, knew those plans he had were too difficult for one of his age and God protected him through John Hubbard's offer that morning. Briefly, it can be stated that both young men were able men in the pulpit and during their lives they led hundreds of people to accept Christ as their Saviour.

For his own children, he provided time and opportunity for school. Each one had at home the equivalent of the high school education. His daughter did accept the college opportunity. All three sons chose and took some

training in a business college. John and Mollie Hubbard were both believers in higher education for women. They were both great admirers of Celeste Parrish in her efforts to secure her education. They knew her personally and followed her efforts to be admitted to the University of Virginia. Cornell University accepted her and joyfully presented her the earned degree. John Hubbard felt the University of Virginia did wrong. He said "No woman would ever be admitted as a student of the University". His own daughter was then a small girl. He did not live to see the day she graduated at the University of Virginia, but Mollie Hubbard was living and had not forgotten their concern for the higher education of women, when their daughter was a small girl and Celeste Parrish was struggling to be accepted at U. Va.

After the death of John Mitchell Hubbard and his funeral, Mollie Hubbard was quite ill for many days, but responded to treatment and returned, after 10 days, to Meherrin, Va. She soon purchased a farm in Lunenburg Co., Va. when her sons, Carson and Travis, agreed to take charge of it. This was her home for the rest of her life. She did unite with the nearby Baptist Church.* In her own neighborhood, so many children did not live near a Sunday School. Through her encouragement and co-operation of others, they had a Sunday School in a school house near her. She taught the small children's class as she had done for so many years. She walked every Sunday afternoon 3/4 of a mile to do this. She was afraid to ride behind the horses that darted out of the road when an automobile passed. She was paralized in 1920 and had to give up her class. She was helpless and in bed the rest of her life. Those young Sunday School people loved her and many came to see her when she could no longer walk to be with them. On May 10, 1928, she died in her home in Lunenburg Co., Va. and was intermed on Mother's Day, May 12, by the side of her husband in the Mitchell-Hubbard cemetery near Rondo, Va. She blessed the lives of all who knew her. During her long illnees, her physician always came when she requested him to come, but very often he came just to call. He came one day when her daughter was visiting and told her "When I am in this neighborhood and have no emergency call, I come by here to see Mrs. Hubbard. She is so wonderful, her spirit is so excellent, she cheers me up so much, I can do my work better. She helps me more than I can help her".

They did not have an easy life. Yet they fought a good fight, they kept God's Commandments, they served the Lord. What they did for others, only the Lord knows. And their efforts have been not only rewarded in Heaven but on earth. One known reward is seen today on the Vandola land. The little church built in 1889 is not there today. Those 19 members are all in heaven but 385 others are there today and doing a greater work. In 1942, four Sunday School rooms were added. In 1950, four more, and six more in 1956. A central heating system and a baptistry were installed. In 1923 a home for the pastor was built and in 1960, a new pastorium was constructed, costing 30,000 dollars. Then in 1966, they dedicated a new brick educational building on this land worth 90,000 dollars. It was very significant to see in the publicity given at this occasion, that Ben Davis was president of that building committee. One person who read this recalled the time John Hubbard, standing to read scripture, took off his glasses, and looking down at the row of young boys in front of him, said to Ben Davis, the smallest boy, "Ben, will you come up here and read this for me?". "Yes, Sir." he replied, moving forward as he answered. He read that Scripture without a mistake. After that, others were willing to read when asked. John Hubbard planned this and selected scripture he knew Ben could read. It was known that his vision was giving him trouble. He started to read and removed his glasses for effect, and made his request of the youngest. If he consented, each boy present would know at once he could also do it. And everyone present would have gladly favored "Mr. Hubbard" in any other

request. Ben Davis was the one whom he requested years later, to act as Clerk when he moved away from Vandola, until the place was filled. Later, Ben was clerk and a substantial member so long as he lived, yes, more than 50 years longer. If all the facts were known in the lives of all those boys and girls in Vandola at the time when Ben was a small boy, it would be interesting, for many were faithful members in Vandola Baptist Church. Today, Vandola Baptist Church is a large brick building.

John Hubbard had high ideals. And he likewise requested of those employed, or renters living on his land, to live moral lives. No unmarried Negro couples could establish a home on his lands. They respected his ideal and got married. One couple with grown children who did not know their parents were unmarried, quietly slipped away from home one Sunday and were married. They requested their secret be kept for the sake of their children. This secret was kept. Likewise, all Negro children were expected to go to the school that was provided for them, but parents did not always send them.

He was an honest man and his motto was "To be and not to seem". On one occasion, he encouraged some of his neighbors to sow another kind of wheat, because of its better yield. He sold them some of his own wheat at a bargain price. The wheat was being measured in a bushel measure. The man measuring it leveled it off even with the top of the measure. John Hubbard said "No. Pour on the wheat until it runs off". The man obeyed and then the wheat was poured into a sack. One of his children, his son, Greer, was old enough to know the man was given more than a bushel of wheat and asked his mother "Why did Daddy do that?" "Oh, your father believes in giving good measure in all he does.", was her reply. His charity was well known because many were the recipients. He, however, never spoke of it. His policy was to never let the left hand know what the right hand gave. He never boasted. When his acts of kindness became known, someone else revealed it.

The large family Bible was on the table and she said "Brother Barr, write the baby's name in the Bible". So Rev. W.D. Barr inscribed for her Travis Hubbard born Oct. 24th 1891?



TWO LETTERS FROM CARSON HUBBARD

July 30, 1967

Dear Sarah:

Just a few lines to let you hear. I got your letter.

It is hard for me to write; I shake so much, so don't stop writing.

I like to hear from my folks. No news to write you from here that would be interesting to you. Tomatoes \$41.40 a bushel; Beef steak \$1.15 a pound; 2 pork chops .50 cents. Beef has been higher than it is now — when the cow jumped over the moon was the highest. Have you heard the story about the three eggs? Answer: 'Too bad.' Write often. Kit Hubbard, 460 Auburn Crescent, Princeton, 8.C., Canada.

One of the last letters Carson wrote:

April 15, 1968

Dear Noland and Sarah:

Just a few lines to let you know I am still living.

2 inches snow Good Friday, total eclipse of moon Friday night from

7:30 to 8:50. Natural gas coming to town some time this year.

Maybe September or August. May put it in maybe not.

Come over Radio when Negroes get the States like they want it they are coming to Canada and straight it up. The Canadians will learn but it will be too late. Send this to Sarah; No news to tell you.

Write when you cen. Kit Hubbard.

Greer Hubbard, born May 7, 1887 in his father's home at Vandola, Va., is the son of John Mitchell and Mary Elizabeth (Sours) Hubbard. He grew up on his father's farm and learned farming. His education was in the public school, 3 five month sessions and 4 months in private schools at home and 9 months each year at home in private school until he was 15 years of age. He played a piano very excellently and not only by reading music but also by ear. Visitors always requested him to play the piano. After the private school days, his father secured for him music lessons at Roanoke College, Danville, Va. He came from home to Danville for his lessons. One day his lesson hour was due when the photographer arrived to take the picture for the Annual of students of music. Since he was one of them, they sent him to stand at the top, above the girls, who were seated on the steps.

In Sept. 1902 he attended Piedmont Business College in Lynchburg, Va. and succeeded. He then found employment with the Express Company in Danville, Va. and did not return home to work on the farm.

On Feb. 22, 1915 Greer Hubbard married in Danville, Va. Sallie Etta Kallam, born Dec. 5, 1891 at Ayresville, N.C. She is the daughter of James Irvin and Sallie Franklin (Martin) Kallam. See Kallam data. They resided in Danville a short time. He was administrator of his father's estate. He bought a farm near Burkeville, Va. and moved to that place in 1915 and resided there as long as he lived. He did not follow farming as an occupation. Architecture was more interesting, so he was a carpenter. During the World War I era, he was married and was not drafted; however, he was employed as a carpenter at Camp Eustis, Newport News and Camp Lee, Petersburg, Va. This was needed service in that era.

He joined Vandola Baptist Church when he was a boy and never moved his membership. He, however, played the piano for the church they attended for many years.

On Sunday, Feb. 21, 1965, from 2 to 4 p.m. in Modern Woodmen of America Hall, Crew, Va., Greer and Sallie Etta (Kallam) Hubbard celebrated their Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary. After this joyous occasion, they were blessed to be together on their wedding anniversary nine more times. Their wedded life was 59 years, 7 months and 4 days. They were so faithful all of their lives. Only the Heavenly Father understands the beautiful devotion shown to Greer Hubbard by Sallie in his last years of life.

He was paralized in Feb. 1968 and bedridden the rest of his life. After 6 years and 7 months, he passed away on Sept. 26, 1974. He was mentally alert through those weary years. For several months he was paralized on the left side as he was on his right side from the beginning. He was anxious to die and therefore ready when the Call came. After the funeral service at Jennings and Son Funeral Home at Crewe, Va., he was interred on Sunday afternoon in the Sunset Hills Cemetery at Burkeville, Va. Rev. Clyde Shelton, pastor of Burkeville Baptist Church, was in charge of the service. Their children:

with a brand new nose.
That's baby!

Most of his early education was in private schools provided by his father. Later he attended the public high school at Bachelor's Hall, Va. His last days in school were at the Piedmont Business College in Lynchburg, Virginia.

He grew up on the farm and learned how to farm and the business details of that occupation and the intricate phases of successful tobacco growing.

In the spring of 1914, he was in school and his father did not have plans for farming, so Travis decided to look around that summer after college closed. All were well at home. It was a suitable time to go places. His father was taken ill very suddenly and died while he was on a trip west and it was three weeks before he knew of his father's death. He sent his mother a beautiful telegram and returned home at once.

His mother requested Travis Hubbard and Carson Hubbard, his brother, to settle on the farm at home with her and what they desired would be their own business. They gladly responded to her desire. She kept the home and they farmed.

After a few years, she was paralized and was a helpless invalid the remaining years of her life. No son was ever more thoughtful and kind to a mother than those two sons, yet Travis was out of his bed and at her bed-side at night, if she spoke at all. She said he never failed to hear her first call. In the daytime, she had a faithful, kind, trained colored woman to watch over her needs. An effort was made to secure a registered nurse, but no one was available.

On Feb. 22, 1922 Travis Hubbard married Mary Frances Clark, born Sept.

24, 1906, the daughter of Jasper Robert Clark who married Nannie Sterling Overton. Her ancestors, so far as known, will be recorded later.

Travis Hubbard had known Mary Frances Clark from a small girl and he had always loved her, and they were married in her parent's home before she was 16 years old. Mary Frances came to his home and she was a real daughter to the invalid mother. She wrote letters for her, as they were dictated to her, and she soon adopted her mother—in—law's style of letter writing and unto the present day, writes the most informative and newsy letters to every one.

Mary Frances selected as their wedding date the same date on which Travis Hubbard's parents were wed 50 years before. All was harmonious and precious. He was 15 years older, and his mother said "they are young and happy and can play together still". She only feared that Travis would grow old while Mary was still young. Through the years, however, that spirit of youth continued and never waned, so far as each could exercise it, unto the last day of his life.

Life on that farm was not easy for many reasons, but they remained there and it was home for Travis Hubbard for over 60 years. All their children grew up on that farm and they, with their children, returned to see their parents very frequently.

Travis and Mary Frances (Clark) Hubbard's family were all members of Union Grove Baptist Church near their home in Lunenburg Co., Va. Each of their daughters, after marriage, moved her membership to a church near their residence. Henry Hubbard and his mother, Mary Hubbard, are members there today. Travis Hubbard rests forever in the cemetery of Union Grove Baptist Church.

The home life of Travis and Mary Hubbard was a happy one. There was always happiness and laughter in their home. One occasion summarizes this statement. All of their children were married. One evening, after their busy day, their daughters, with their husbands, went home for the evening to return that night. Everyone was so happy. A stranger would never have known they were sons-in-law having so much pleasure with their father and mother-in-law. Everyone had pleasant things to say, jokes to tell and some way to tease each other. There was beautiful harmony. Another ideal was that each of those dear children-in-law knew that in mother Mary's refrigerator was a prepared delicacy especially for them if they opened its door. Later, grandchildren knew there was joy for them at their grandparent's home. One item was riding the gentle old horse, kept for many years for this reason.

Finally, multiple sclerosis overcame Travis Hubbard. He survived surgery several times. In each case, doctors and nurses gave their best, but his greatest joy was his return home. Home was the best place on earth.

He never gave up. He used a walker for several years. If ill in bed, he managed his walker as soon as he could sit once more in a chair. He did not stop trying until another step of some length was made. In the end he did walk to his destination.

Then one day, in some way, he fell and broke his hip. He was in the hospital and Mary or one of his beloved daughters was with him every minute. On Dec. 12, 1975, while asleep, he passed into Eternity. He was 84 years, 1 month and 18 days old. Of those years, he had spent with Mary 52 years, 9 months and 20 days of happy life. His final rites were held on Dec. 17, 1975 at Keysville, Virginia and interment was in Union Grove Baptist Church, Lunenburg Co., Va.

All of his 6 living children and 6 children-in-law; his 19 grandchildren and 6 grandchildren-in-law were present with Mary on this occasion. The minister, on this occasion, spoke of his visits in the home of Travis Hubbard. He

found it a Happy Home and Travis Hubbard a happy man full of wit, good humor and contentment at all times.

HENRY TATE HUBBARD

Henry Tate Hubbard, born June 19, 1924 in Lunenburg Co., Va. is the son of Travis and Mary Frances (Clark) Hubbard. He was born in his parents' home on a farm in south side Virginia, near the town of Keysville, Va. He grew up on that farm. When he was 6 years old, he entered the elementary school at Meherrin, Va. around 3 miles from home. He walked alone through the woods one mile to Mr. Noel Bruce's home. They took him and several others to Meherrin in a Model T Ford. They were very kind to Henry and when he is at home in Virginia, he goes to see the Bruce family, whom he has adored since the fall of 1930.

After this first year in 1931 a school bus was available and he met the bus each morning at his parents' mail box. He completed the 7th grade at the Meherrin Graded School in June 1937. In the fall of 1937 Henry Hubbard registered at Green Bay High School, Green Bay, Va. and did 2 years work there. In the fall of 1939 he enrolled at Worsham High School, Farmville, Va. and graduated in the spring of 1941 before his 17th birthday. Many of his friends, no doubt older than he was, had already graduated from high school and were at work. This was an inspiration to Henry Hubbard to seek work and get on his way to seek a living. He did not desire to stay on the farm and cope with its type of work.

Up to this time, he had never had any special thoughts about air planes. In Oct. 1941 he started to Airplane Mechanic's School at Farmville, Va. under the National Youth Advancement Program, since all the other classes were already full. On Dec. 7, 1941, he was at home for the weekend and that was the Pearl Harbor Day. There upon, the Farmville school was consolidated with the school at Virginia Polytechnic Institute Airport at Blacksburg, Va. and the facilities were much better. He was there until Nov. 1942. From there he went as a general mechanic's helper at Fairfield Air Depot, Dayton, Ohio.

Henry Tate Hubbard soon volunteered for Induction in the United States Service and was drafted into the Army, on April 6, 1943, by the Lunenburg Co., Va. Board. He was not 18 years old at that time, but is counted as one of the first 18 year old sons to be drafted. He entered the U.S. Army Air Corps because of his previous training.

His basic training was at Clearwater, Florida. From there he was sent to Citadel at Charleston, S.C. for work for which he had no background preparation. From there he went to Greensboro, N.C. for more basic training and was sent overseas. He left Norfolk, Va. on April 3, 1944 and arrived in Naples, Italy as a replacement in the 303rd Air Service Squadron and he served as a mechanic with the 47th Bomb Group in the 12th Air Force. This was short range aircraft and they moved many times. He arrived back in New York on July 17, 1945 after going from Naples to Grosetto, Rome, Cittivitcha, Pisa, Florence, Pisa, Corsica, Aiux in France, back to Pisa and then home. While in Service overseas, he earned 4 battle stars. He was honorably discharged from the U.S. Air Force on Nov. 13, 1945 at Richmond Air Force Base. This was a few months after he was 21 years of age.

Immediately he went to work at Dupont in Richmond making cellophane. Six months was sufficient for him.

In June 1946 Henry Tate Hubbard went back to working on airplanes at Byrd Airport, Richmond, Va. and he remained there until sometime in 1959. He has worked for E.J. Conklin Aviator, Flight Research, Aircraft Radio Service, Carter Aviator and Aero Industries. He has the reputation of being a good mechanic and has not been forgotten where ever he served.

In 1950 he spent 6 months in the Air Force as an Aviation Cadet and then returned to civilian life. In 1959 he had earned a Commercial Pilot's license. In 1946 he had an Engine Mechanic's license and an Aircraft Mechanic's license in 1947. In 1959 he went to Eastern Airlines and became a flight engineer. In 1961 he came to be flight engineer for Airlift International Airlines, and has lived in Miami, Florida since then. In the meantime he has been everywhere except to Australia, the Anterctic regions, China and Russia. He keeps busy when they have work to do. He gets a furlough when they have little work to do. He is happy with flying. When he secured his private license, he flew from Richmond, Va. to Selma, Ala. at Thanksgiving in 1950 to visit his Aunt and Uncle Robert and Noland (Hubbard) Bowling at Marion, Ala. His friend, Albert Ward Wood Jr. was with him.

Henry Tate Hubbard married on June 30, 1951 at the Presbyterian Parsonage, Keysville, Virginia, Betty Bertha Thompson. The Rev. Albert Ward Wood Sr., a well beloved minister, performed their ceremony. Their parents were present. Betty Bertha Thompson was born March 21, 1928 in Cumberland Co., Virginia. She is the daughter of Arthur James Thompson, born Nov. 8, 1898 at Beaver, Pa. He was the son of Jesse Raphel Thompson, born Aug. 16, 1869 at Conneant, Ohio. and died April 27, 1942. He married Nov. 7, 1895 Alice L. Shuart, born July 1874 in Sheffield, Ohio, the daughter of Squire Merritt Shuart. Arthur James Thompson is the grandson of James Thompson born in Mercer Co., Pa. who married a Miss Tanner. Arthur James Thompson married Bertha May Payne, daughter of Herbert R. Payne, born Sept. 17, 1883 in Delaware Co., Ohio who married Feb. 2, 1902 Delia Mary Hansen, born July 24, 1881, Kimball, Ill. and died in 1952, whose father was born in Denmark and came to America when he was 9 years old, and married Jessie Morgan.

They have been the first to remember us and shall not be forgotten while a soldier's heart can appreciate the labours of lovely women in this stern struggle for our country's independence.

CARSON HUBBARD

Carson Hubbard, born Jan. 16, 1889, was the son of John Mitchell and Mary Elizabeth (Sours) Hubbard. A letter written by his mother a few months after his birth, to one of her aunts, who lived in Pennsylvania, states he weighed 13 pounds when he was born and 16 pounds when he was 3 months old. He grew up to be the tallest and most muscular one of their children. He was always an active, well developed boy. Growing up on the farm, he learned to ride horses early. They were gentle horses, yet he experienced two serious

mishaps. Around eight years of age, an older boy in the community was present when the man in charge of his father's horses was watering those horses. This boy was afraid of horses and had never learned to ride. Carson and his brother, Greer, decided to ride the horses back to the stables. They climbed upon the bare-backed horses, in great glee, and Carson said "I can ride him backwards". Then he turned his back to the horse's head. The gentle old horse began to trot to catch up with the other horse. As they passed a building, plump young Carson was jostled off the back of the horse. His head struck the corner of the building. The man in charge took this unconscious child in his arms and carried him into his mother's home and placed him on the bed. The doctor arrived, as soon as he could be found by the man who went horseback to locate him. In the meantime, there was no sign of consciousness. His mother, who knew what was best to keep up his circulation, was very active.

His father was in the city that day on business, but returned before the doctor came. Normally this was a great moment for Carson, but he knew nothing of it. Both father and mother said "Only God can save him, we will pray for his life".

The man returned and said the doctor said he would come. Just then the doorbell rang. His father went to the door. "How is the boy?" the dr. asked. "Unconscious" was the father's reply. They went down the hall and entered the bedroom. The doctor went to the bedside and said "Carson, do you know who I am?" in his most pleasant voice. He opened his eyes and said "Dr. Emerson" and was instantly unconscious. He knew no one again until the next day. It was a long case, but tender care and prayer gave him a lease on life. For weeks after the doctor let him out of bed, one step was shorter, but he overcame it with some changes. Before this accident he was very lovable in his actions. He climbed on the lap of older folk to be loved. He hugged and kissed the family, especially his "Cousin Annie". This was omitted forever. He, however, was instead a deep, appreciative, helpful young boy who was undemonstrative of his feelings. When he returned to school, he was left to his own initiative and it was a normal one.

The other incident with a horse happened when he was a teenage boy. He was sent on an errand on another gentle horse. The horse came back, bare-backed and all were appalled. Something drastic had happened. Quickly, those present went to the highway to go and find Carson. He was coming down the road carrying the saddle. Joyfully they hastened to meet him and to take from him the saddle. The one who had saddled the horse had not tightened the girth sufficiently for that particular horse. At a distance of about one half mile from home, on the return trip, the saddle turned and he fell from the horse with one foot in a stirrup. Instead of the horse running, he eased on step by step a little way before the girth broke and the saddle fell to the ground. There upon the horse trotted toward home and left it up to him to bring the saddle home. And he did it.

Carson Hubbard was an unusual child in many ways. His parents were leaders in the Vandola Baptist Church. Their children were always at the various services. One old gentleman had an Irish accent. This intrigued Carson Hubbard. He loved to hear him read the Bible at a prayer meeting. Now and then he requested reading and discussing a portion of scripture at the next prayer service. Carson was always ready to hear him read and to the astonishment of the family, came home several times, repeating the passage as the man had pronounced the words, remembering it word for word.

He grew up on his father's farm and learned farming and all the details of farming. The culture and curing of Tobacco was the main crop on his father's farm. This was carried on in an accurate manner from saving the seed to the sale of it. Step by step, each part was done with precision.

The winter he was 14 years old, his father went away from home an a journey of several weeks. He arranged with Carson's teacher to excuse him from classes whenever any tenant needed to go to the market with their to-bacco. He knew it would not be too often and the care they needed he was sure Carson could give.

When Carson's father returned, the banker was quick to tell him about the business-like manner Carson had used in every step of his responsibility. The check for the sale of the tobacco and the man were brought to the bank, the business attended to, his father's part deposited and the other party happily taken care of in a truly business-like manner. The Tobacco Warehouse personnel were equally delighted with his manners and ability in the absence of his father.

Carson Hubbard was sent to public school at the age of 5 years. In the summer there were 4 months in a private school. After 3 years of education, he was in 9 months of private school at home. He was at all times a lovely child and a good boy in school and ready to play when the recess came. Occasionally there were extra recitations and he enjoyed those occasions, but he liked them most if there was something funny. Once he selected the following as his portion of a program and was given permission to recite it. His pleasure over this caused his mother to preserve his copy as follows:

In school perfect attendance and punctuality was exacted of him and the rest of the children by their parents. Only sickness permitted absence from school. His last years of school at home, he attended Bachelor's Hall High School which was three miles from home. He and his brother, Travis, walked to school and back home every day. One of his report cards is extant today. It is signed by the Principal Warren E. Frank and gives an idea of this young boy in high school and his grades in 7 subjects: Grammar 85; History 78; Penmanship 85; Arithmetic 90; Algebra 85; Latin 80; Spelling 90; Deportment 100; Neatness and Order 100. This was not an exceptional report and many of his were better.

When the time came to go away to college, his father gave him the privilege of choosing a field of work. He did not choose one. His father felt he should have more opportunity and sent him to Piedmont Business College, Lynchburg, Va. to learn the rudiments of business. A postal card sent to his mother and postmarked Nov. 4, 1910 told her "I room with Prof. Prince. He teaches the Commercial Department. Tell Snooks (sister's nickname) that her old schoolmate is here, Miss Blair. She is my math teacher".

When he had completed his work there, he was not interested in the type of work for which he was prepared. He was 21 years of age, so he went to Texas to see the real life of those who lived on a cattle ranch. He did not believe the stories of their wild life. He was employed for one year at Pitch Fork Ranch. He enjoyed it and its ruggedness. The horseback riding he did was thrilling, but after one year, he returned home, satisfied. He was assured also that the men who lived the demanding rugged life of the Texas cowboy, were, as a rule, dependable, honest, fine men so far as his contact with them revealed. Upon arriving at his father's new home in Brunswick Co., Va. he said this to inquiring strangers. They would not believe the truth. They desired a wild life

story. He had none.

upon his return, Carson Hubbard remained with his father so long as he lived. He was farming as a tobacco grower in Brunswick Co., Va. and Carson was satisfied and was a part of the family interest.

There was no Baptist Church near their home. His parents were interested in seeing one built in the small town of Dolphin, Va. They encouraged organizing a Sunday School and Carson Hubbard was Secretary. He and his brothers were all at the regular Sunday School and preaching services arranged prior to the building of this desired church. They co-operated in every detail in the pioneer days of that building to the great satisfaction of their parents. They had grown up in the Vandola Baptist Church and this was a way of life with them.

Carson Hubbard never joined any church in his life. He had the highest ideals for the life of one belonging to a church. One example of his respect for this is seen in the following. The rules of his parents' church required non attendance at a circus, a dance and other occasions regarded as worldly. This included their children as well. Carson Hubbard was 21 years old in January. The next summer the Barnum & Bailey Circus was in action near his home. One day he worked all day as usual on the farm. When everyone stopped for the day he went to the house and went to his room. He came down dressed to go out. He told his father and mother that since he was 21 years old and no one in the church could blame them for his going to see the circus, he was going to catch the evening train and attend the evening program. He excused himself from the evening meal in order to catch the train. It was only a few miles by railroad. He saw the circus and returned home the next morning in time for breakfast with his parents and was ready for the farm work with all the rest. No one ever reproached him and who could have ever showed more respect for his parents and their obligations than this son exercised. ed his parents.

Later in life, after his father's death, he continued his interest in his mother's church activities. He served again as Secretary of the Sunday School she was interested in for a neglected section. He was always a friend to the pastor of his father and mother. He often looked out for them in a season of their need. On one occasion, he called the attention of the men in her church to the pastor's wood pile. "Just a few sticks of wood out there" he said. Several said they would see about it. Instead, he suggested they meet him at the pastor's wood pile "tomorrow morning". Two of those men did meet him, each with a one horse scant load of unsawed big logs. Carson Hubbard's donation was a full "two horse load" of sawed, fireplace length, seasoned wood, ready to be burned. The surprised minister came out to meet them and he took the first armful of the sawed wood in his arms and carried it into the house at once. He explained the fire was very low and two of the children were sick in bed.

Telling his mother of this, Carson said to her, "Suppose my wood had needed to be cut!". Later he returned to the minister's wood pile and left another load of seasoned sawed firewood.

On another occasion, realizing the pastor's salary was in arrears, Carson Hubbard said to some of the members who were filling their smoke houses with pork, "Give the preacher a ham for Thanksgiving". He offered to pick them up when their committee set a date. When the day came, he placed a ham in the box, called for the committee and set out to collect those fine, home-cured, hickory-smoked hams. The people who promised the hams responded without any exception. Then they arrived at the pastor's smoke house and hung up the gifts in his smoke house, as was the custom. There was only one ham; the other gifts were all shoulders. When he went home he told his mother the results and said "The choicest had been kept and the second best was given to God".

Through all of his life he read the Bible and studied its meaning. He used a concordance to get the meaning. To do this he had to use a powerful magnifying glass, when he grew to be an old man.

In his early life he had the misfortune to buy some gun shells that were imperfect and out of the lot, two gave trouble and one rebounded and injured one of his eyes. Then later, a bit of metal struck him in that eye and it had to be removed. As a result of losing this eye he was exempted from service in W.W. I. He was an able man in every other way.

When his father died, his mother requested her sons, Carson and Travis Hubbard to remain with her and control the farm. At her death it would be their farm. They did this. She lived many years and the farm work went on as they planned it.

Carson Hubbard bought with his brother Greer a farm he desired to own. When his mother died, she willed to Carson and Travis her farm. Thus, he had half ownership in two farms in Virginia. It seems that when his mother was gone, he was ready to go away. In some way he learned of Canadian farmers' desire to learn more about growing tobacco. He went to Canada and engaged in training some farmers in growing and curing tobacco. He was in the state of Ontario a few years. It seems that he attempted to raise a crop himself and it turned out to be an off year for growing tobacco. As a result, he left Ontario. In 1934 he went to Princeton, British Columbia, Canada and lived there the rest of his life.

Throughout his life, Carson Hubbard was fond of children and every child who knew him loved him. He would talk to any child and they listened. In some way he had an unusual attraction for every child. He told them stories and they listened with wide-eyed wonder. They always begged for more and he had more to tell. The story came to him while he talked, and often upon the exclamation or question. No one could retell his story as he had told it, and an attempt to retell one. could not capture the same child's former appreciation. These stories that delighted children were quite innocent stories. Not one was ever written, so they were lost when their author passed away. It has been said that when he went down the street, the children followed him and many times he was seen sitting down surrounded by children listening to a story. His story always left the children satisfied.

Carson Hubbard never married. He loved a young girl enough, but he desired for her to be a few years older. She did not wish to do this and married another. She was too young and she soon passed away. His mother said this was a great sorrow to him. Later he had great admiration for another. They were never married. He had attacks of rheumatoid arthritis and this may have been the reason. His mother, if living, could, perhaps, state the reason.

After his mother's death in 1928, he went to Canada, as told above. He lived in that country the remainder of his life, or around 40 years; six years in Ontario and thirty-four in Princeton, British Columbia.

In the meantime, he wrote a note now and then to his two brothers and his sister. When one received a message, the other two were informed that he was living and alright.

In that section of Canada, he became interested in searching for metals and minerals. He had to secure permission to explore for this purpose. It is claimed that he was successful in this and staked a number of claims. He was required to register each claim in the local office in that township. He never developed any claim he staked in Canada. His joy was in discovery. He spent the summer months in this field of interest.

At some time he became a member of the International Order of Odd Fellows and belonged to Princeton Ledge No. 52 IOOF, Princeton, B tish Columbia, Canada. This seems to verify those who were his friends and neighbors in that

area. Mr. and Mrs. Brian Patrick Wright and family were his close friends during his years in Canada. They were very young when he went to Princeton and their friendship developed in their early life. Mr. Wright became a Rancher, but he also accompanied "Kit" Hubbard on prospecting tours. The children of Princeton knew him as "Virginia" and the citizens knew him as "Kit" Hubbard.

In the late years of his life, he became a sick man. Cancer developed. Surgery was eseential in a distant hospital. A strike was on in the Postal Service. His family in the U.S.A. could not be informed. The U.S.A. Postal Service could not send the letters his family had written to him. One letter the Post Master promised to send the day the strike was over, and they called for it. In the meantime, he was not recovering and had been transferred back to Princeton Hospital. His friends, the Wrights, went to see him several times each day. They took this letter to him and read it to him. They telegraphed at once. Messages were exchanged by telephone. Reservations were made to go by plane to see Carson Hubbard. A copy of a birth certificate for his sister was ordered and it was sent by air mail special delivery, arriving too late. The plane had left. The same hour, the funeral service was being held for Carson Hubbard in Princeton, British Columbia, Canada. He died at 4:15, Pacific time, August 26, 1968. He had made arrangements for his own funeral to be held in Princeton. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Howard C. Usher, pastor of Saint Paul's United Church. He was a newly arrived minister and based the service on the adoration of Carson Hubbard's friends. He opened his remarks "Gone from the realm of mortal flesh is this son of the Southern State of Virginia. Gone to that place where there shall be no more sorrow nor crying; neither shall there be any more pain. So it is with Carson Hubbard, familiarly known as 'Virginia'....His family, though, is far away and it is the friends close by who will miss this old familiar face the most"..."here was a man who took time to make friends with children. This says a lot in this day and age when so many seem to have so little time for the young. Here too, I am told, was a man who never intentionally tried to harm a fellow man. This too says quite a bit"..."You knew him far better than I."..."His familiar face is gone and the soft sound of his southern drawl only a memory but the remembrance of 'Virginia' will linger on for a long time in Princeton". On another occasion Rev. Usher's remark was that Carson Hubbard "died among friends, friends he had earned".

Among the floral offerings were two from children in Princeton who loved "Virginia", fourteen Princeton families and six from his southern relatives who heard the sad news in time. The service closed. His Fraternal Brother, John Milne P.G.M., the Recording Secretary, informed Carson Hubbard's loved ones, that he "was laid to rest in the Odd Fellows Plot in the Princeton Cemetery, Plot 6, Section D, Lot 57". He also said that Mr. and Mrs. Wright had placed an appropriate marker on his grave. Mrs. Wright had written about this marker.

"It is a bronze plaque In Memory Of Carson "Kit" Hubbard 1889 "Virginia" 1968"

Mrs. Wright said they put in "Kit" since he preferred to be called "Kit" by his adult friends. The children knew him as "Virginia", and since by them he was affectionately called "Virginia" this was included. These tokens of appreciation are appreciated by his relatives. Only one, his nephew and namesake, Greer Carson Hubbard, has seen his grave.

The following two articles are included since they may be a matter of

interest to many. Each was published after Carson Hubbard was 70 years of age. He was an old man living alone. One of his neighbors declared he was an independent man.

Old Virginia

No one around town but knows Old Virginia, yet he is the man whom nobody knows. That is, we all know him but nothing about him. A kindly scout, with an old black hat stuck sideways over a sunburnt face, and a twinkle in one eye that suggests deep humor ready to bubble up on all occasions. I wouldn't call his clothes shabby, but they have a shiny well-worn look about them, the result of constant wear. His jacket is never buttoned, as this might require some effort, and his pants are supported by the proverbial hitch all seamen learn.

I asked him the other day how he felt and he answered "Mighty feeble". That must have been a stock answer for halfway between the crown of his head and the soles of his feet he reminded me of a feather bed tied in the middle. Virginia said something about the neighbors not bringing in much lately, but that fades out in a smile and a ha-ha. He seemed in a communicative mood, so we sat down in a Club Cafe while he told me something about himself.

He told me his real name but that was not for the record. I assumed that because of his nickname he hailed from the State of Virginia, "That is correct. I was born 'way back in 1889, in Pittsylvania County in the good old U.S.A.".

Father and mother were farmers. Young Kit was brought up on the farm. His parents must have been kindly and understanding, for Kit stayed a long time on the farm. The events that led to his coming to Canada are no part of this story, so remain a closed chapter so far as printers ink is concerned. Virginia said he would tell me all about it later on.

"What about going to school?" I asked. "Well" he said "I went to the little red school house, but the woodpeckers ate it all up so that I could get out of the First Grade. I started fifteen times to go to school, and was expelled five times. That leaves ten terms of five months each."

Quite evidently, Kit was a normal, healthy boy, with his full share of mischief, just the kind of boy who is a headache to the teacher, but later on becomes a source of pride and joy in remembrance.

Kit stayed on the farm till 1928, when he crossed into Canada and worked on an Ontario farm. After a brief visit home he returned to Canada and started curing tobacco. "I grew a crop in 1931, and all I got for it was six cents a pound. I had to hire myself out for wages to pay for growing that crop in 1933. I made enough money to come west to British Columbia, and here I paid \$7.40 a lb. for the tobacco I sold in Ontario for six cents a pound." We do not vouch for the mathematics of this transaction. One thing is certain, he sold cheap and bought dear.

Virginia arrived in Princeton on May 15, 1934 and has been a familiar figure here ever since. He has done his share of work which, he admits, never killed him. Some years were spent in local coal mines, when wages were low, and working conditions hard. For the most part, he has enjoyed prospecting for gold, and any other elements that happened to be in fashion. He loves the outdoor life and never felt better than when seeking out the hidden treasures of earth. It mattered little whether he found them or not, the fun was in looking for them.

I asked Virginia if he had ever been married and he said "Well I was nearly

married once..." and that's as far as we got with that story.

Virginia is of a philosophic turn of mind ("Never buck Nature or the C.P.R."). He is not lacking in natural wisdom, and has a store of anecdotes ready to illustrate his point. He never hurt anyone, except, perhaps himself. He is always happy with children, and I have stood by while they sat on the sidewalk and listened gladly with goggle eyes to such yarns as only Virginia (and Bobby Stevenson) could spin. No doubt they were all true. Yes, a kindly soul is Ole Virginie, the only one of this kind. He toils not, neither does he spin, and yet......

NOLAND HUBBARD.

Noland Hubbard, born April 18, 1886 in the home of her parents, Vandola, Va., nine miles west of Danville, Va., is the third child and only daughter of John Mitchell and Mary Elizabeth (Sours) Hubbard. She grew up on her father's farm. At age 5, she was too young to walk alone the distance to school. Her mother was her first teacher. In Sept. 1893, she was stricken with diphtheria. The disease was not in the community. Some guest in their hospitable home was a carrier. Her brothers Greer and Carson also were victims, but were not so ill. As a result of the faithfulness of their dedicated physician, Dr. William Nelson, who drove 10 miles to and from their home for many, many days and the tender care of her parents, Noland survived. When her mother observed that she had no strength to move, she changed her position from one side to another position every half hour through those three weeks. After two months she could sit in a chair. The next spring, one pleasant day, she ran down a

slight incline for the first time, but was willing to walk back slowly. In oned health again, in the fall of 1894, Noland, Greer and Carson entered the public school. Noland was reading McGuffey's Third Reader when she entered school. She loved school and never missed a day. When it snowed, she rode horseback on a horse with her father. She, of course, had to sit sideways on the horse. Greer and Carson rode astride and were hilarious over it. Getting to school was a joy for her. If absent, when one returned, the foot of the class had to be taken. A head mark required standing three days as first in class. This was an inspiration to be present and be first in the class. When the head mark was gained, it was no disgrace to go foot. She then had the incentive to learn the lessons and turn down the one who could not answer the question. On one occasion, in the geography class, Noland was foot after 3 days as first. It looked very dismal, all were so interested, every one was answering his question. Then came the question "Which state is called the Gold State?". This was the question for the one next to the head of the class to answer. He could not say. One by one, it came down the class. Noland's knees were shaking. At last it was her turn and she said "California", and started walking to the second place in the class. The many head marks that were obtained by her, of course, was due to her mother's helpfulness in the evenings in home preparation. Three years they had five months of public school work and four months of private school.

Then nine months of private school came, and piano lessons were provided. Their private teacher was a member of the family through the next five years. Noland and Greer took piano lessons and also the daughter of a neighbor, who was Noland's best friend, Maude Reagan. If she practiced one hour each day, Noland and Greer must co-operate to let her practice from 7 to 8 o'clock each morning. One went to the piano at S a.m. for a week, the other followed at While they were at breakfast, Maude practiced. The next week Noland and Greer reversed their hours in the morning. In the afternoon, each had another assigned hour. After they were advanced enough to play sacred music, they could play sacred music on Sunday. Since practice was work, no one practiced on Sunday. Waltzes, polkas and secular music were not played on Sunday, in the home of their parents. Noland's music was learned by notes. Greer had a natural ear for music. He did not enjoy reading music. He learned to get his teacher to play it for him and he was then master. This meant that very soon the guests in the home requested Greer to play for them. Then their mother would send Noland to play a piece of music she had memorized. This was wisdom in their mother. After time passed, she was the organist at the church, because she could read the notes of the new hymns requested.

Their parents took them to Sunday School and church services. While they had a private school in the home, on Sunday morning there were Bible lessons in their home when the Sunday School was closed for winter months. In the summer of 190I, Noland Hubbard accepted Christ as her Saviour and joined the Vandola Baptist Church, of which her parents were Charter Members. She was baptized in a stream of water near her home in Aug. 1901. Rev. R.E.L. Aylor, a visiting minister, baptized Minnie Stroud, Fleetwood Royall, Noland Hubbard and Daks Soyars that morning. All but one has been in Heaven many years. The young man entered the ministry and lead many to Christ before his death.

The next Sunday after her baptism, when she arrived at Sunday School, her father told her that her Sunday School teacher was unable to be present, and told her to teach her class. He did not wait for a refusal. He told her that having accepted Christ, she must serve Him. She said "Why Papa, I cannot teach". "Have you studied your lesson?" he asked. "Well, you know the answers, you can ask the questions." In days that followed, in unexpected demands, this was a real help to try to do as well as is possible. Later,

many programs, working with younger ones, were successful. These programs were usually done during summer vacations.

In 1902 it was necessary to go away to college. Noland entered the sophomore class her first year in college. Her parents selected Virginia College at Roanoke, Va., a non-sectarian school. She must grow up broadminded. Students attended the Church of their choice. A chaperone, however, was required. The result was that church attendance after Sunday School classes at the college was not frequent. After her successful year at Virginia College, plans were made immediately for her return in Sept. 1903. and she was accepted. Three weeks later, her parents had realized the subtle effect that non-attendance at church had implanted in Noland. She, however, was totally unconscious of it. Her father wrote to the President stating Noland could not return in September and requested that he be released from his promise. He assured the president that if this was not permissable, he would mail his check at once for the tuition and board for year 1903-1904, but his daughter would attend the college near home. He was released from his contract. Her father then said "Daughter, I know at Roanoke College you will go to Sunday School with the student body and remain for the sermon every Sunday". Danville, Va. was just nine miles from home. Even at night, the students attended as a body, since they preferred this to staying in their rooms while everyone was at church. All of the remainder of her life, Noland has thanked the Heavenly Father for the wisdom given to her father in making this transfer to that Baptist College with its Christian influences.

While a student there, she was President of the Young Woman's Auxiliary and the work was worthwhile. She served as Secretary of her class, was Editor-in-chief of Echoes, the college annual, and was chosen Valedictorian of her class in 1905.

During these years, Miss Annie Armstrong was a guest speaker one morning at chapel exercises. Her address was a great challenge for service on the foreign mission field. Noland resolved in her heart to spend her life in foreign mission work and to direct her education toward this goal. This was not a public declaration but her parents were told of this decision.

In June 1905 Noland Hubbard graduated with an A.B. degree from this 4 year college at Danville, Va. It was named Roanoke College and was the Baptist College of Roanoke Association. Later it has been named Averett College for its founder before the War Between the States. Her parents believed in higher education for women. In Sept. 1905, they let her enroll as one of 30 co-eds at Richmond College, Richmond, Va. These were the pioneer days, prior to West Hampton and University of Richmond of today. There was no dormitory for girls. Dr. Boatwright, the president, secured a boarding place for her in the home of Rev. J.W. Mitchell, assistant editor of the Religious Herald. She was there for two years.

The next experience was teaching at Liberty College, a Baptist College at Glasgow, Kentucky, for one year. She returned to Richmond College to finish requirements for a degree there. A few months before graduation, her physician said "Go home". Noland said "No". He then said, very kindly, but positively, "Go home, or if you are dead in June, I wash my hands of all responsibility". Her reply was "I'll go". The trouble was pernicious anemia. B-12 was unknown. The degree was forgotten. She recovered. She taught school another year.

During the years at Richmond, the co-eds were day students. They had no activities outside the classes except the Chi Epsilon Literary Society. The men were members of Mu Sigma Rho or the Philologian Literary Societies. They were very aggressive in their work, but no co-ed was invited to accept membership. These two groups published the student magazine "The Messenger of

Richmond College". They accepted the Chi Epsilon Society as a co-worker in this project. Under Co-Ed Chronicles, publicity was given, such as listing "Miss Noland Hubbard a member of Chi Epsilon Literary Society".

Later, that first year in April 1906 issue, is found listed as Associate Editors of "The Messengers" two Chi Epsilon members, viz: Miss Helen E. Baker and Miss Noland Hubbard. Twice the Editor-in-chief requested Noland Hubbard to write a story for "The Messenger". Each was published. In 1906 she was a graduate of English Course at Richmond College and was eligible for a diploma.

During the school years at Roanoke and Richmond Colleges, she made 3 most important decisions. First, membership in the Young Women's Christian Temperance Association was accepted. This involved signing a pledge for life to never drink intoxicating beverages. This was not hard to do. It, however, became a safeguard all through life. Later in life it was also a forerunner of work in the Senior Women's Christian Temperance Union in those places wherever a working group was found. Another decision was to sign the pledge of the Student Volunteer Movement to go to the Foreign Mission field "if it is God's Will". For that purpose, all study had been done for several years. The pledge had never been taken until joining the Volunteer Band at Richmond College.

The third decision culminated on June 15, 1911 when Noland Hubbard and Robert Bowling were married in Vandola Baptist Church in Virginia at 8 a.m., due to the schedule and necessary connections in railroad travel. Robert Bowling, born Sept. 12, 1884 at Massies Mill, Va., was the son of Robert Perkins and Sarah Cornelia (Fulks) Bowling. He was a teacher preparing for a life's work on a Foreign Mission field in educational work. His story is in the Bowling section.

They went to reside in Hamilton, New York, where he enrolled in the Theological Seminary at Colgate University. The Baptist Church was home church, but membership remained at Jonesboro Baptist Church, Nelson Co., Va., because students were not accepted as members.

While there, Noland was a member of "The Onersipheri", the student wives organization. This was sponsered by certain wives of the faculty. Noland (Hubbard) Bowling served as president of this organization while there.

In the spring of 1912 Noland returned to the home of her parents, who had moved to a home near Dolphin, Brunswick Co., Va. On April 16, Robert Bowling joined her there, to be with her on April 18, her birthday. Their first born, Sarah Elizabeth Bowling, made her advent April 17, 1912. So the three spent April 18, 1912 together in the home of Noland's parents, John Mitchell and Mary Elizabeth (Sours) Hubbard, and the birthplace of Sarah Elizabeth Bowling. Their four children are recorded in the Bowling section.

While in Hamilton, N.Y., Mary Garnet Sours, a cousin, spent a winter with them to attend high school. She joined the Baptist Church and was baptized in the baptistry of Hamilton Baptist Church, N.Y.

Many changes came. Plans for foreign service came to be high school work in Virginia, and church duties, as members. Ouring those years, their children accepted Christ as their Saviour and were baptized at the same hour in the Baptist Church of Chase City, Va. After all children were enrolled in school, Noland accepted a position on the high school faculty to teach Chemistry, Biology and General Science. She also taught senior high school English during those years. Summers were spent in Charlottesville, Va. at the University of Virginia where she enrolled and graduated with a B.S. degree in Education in August 1927.

In the summer of 1926, Robert Bowling and family went to Marion, Alabama where he became a member of the faculty and the Administrative Staff of Judson

College, the oldest Baptist College for women in America and a 4 year college. Arriving in Marion, Ala. on Aug. 9, 1926, the public schools were in session. The next morning the three children were enrolled, Sarah in the junior classin Mary in seventh grade and Robert in fourth grade. On the following Sunday morning, with their three children, they united with Siloam Bap-Through the next years, Noland had the role of mother, wife and homekeeper. Activities were centered around children's education and husband's duties at Judeon College. There were many programs for culture and pleasure and journeys back to Virginia that varied the general routins. the Baptist Church, there were constructive programs for everyone in Sunday School, in Training Union and in Mission studies. In this work Noland and family attended these activities as a member or in charge. She accepted the Beginner S.S. work. At first it covered new born infants and all children to to age of 7 years. The only division was a separate roll for each group. degrees, they were separated as she led dedicated workers to realize they could serve the needs of a special age group. On the first day there were 97 on the roll. Today there are 6 groups in separate rooms. Thus the Beginner work changed during the 38 years she served. The final years as Superintendent of Beginner II group of children, age 6, before entering public school, emphasis was placed first on the Bible, second on preparing attitudes for mingling with others, upon their enrollment in school. These children were also in 3 classes, according to ages, since it was possible for one to be 6 years old on Oct. 2 this year and one to be 6 years old on next Oct. 1st., the last date the law required for entering school. This one department had six assistants when she resigned.

The Woman's Missionary Union work was a part of her interest, not only in Siloam as a member and president one term, but also in the Cahaba Associational W.M.U. and Sunday School work.

In Marion, the first interest of a secular nature, was the work of the Parent Teacher Association. They were endeavoring to have a school cafeteria. This was secured. The Depression days came. She served as president and with the co-operation of a few undaunted helpers, a carnival by the children was a success. The financial gain went to the school library. The cafeteria made it possible to give a lunch to every child who could not buy a lunch. The 12 children and 2 adults in direful need of removal of adenoids and tonsils in the Depression days, were given this care in a clinic sponsored one weekend by the P.T.A. The services of a young surgeon were secured. Adequate and sanitary equipment and nursing care was no easy task. All was accomplished with success, at no cost to the patient. One patient was black and received equal care.

All those borrowed sheets, pillow cases, towels, blankets etc. were at the cleaners and ready to be returned the next day. The tornado came that night and 21 colored people and one white man were brought in injured and put to bed in a closed hotel. Early the next a.m. Noland received a call to borrow the bedding. Every owner was called and everyone said "yes" and the cleaners delivered to them those cleaned materials for 14 of those patients.

When Robert Bowling was Academic Dean of Judson College, serving from 1937 to June 30, 1957, the date of his retirement, he keenly felt the need of more social activities involving students. Noland entered into his desires and not only executed "Open House" for every student, every faculty member and family, when College opened each September, but on many other occasions various smaller groups were entertained each year. The graduating class, at some date prior to Commencement, were entertained in his home as his tribute to them. His admiration and appreciation of youth was great and when the occasion was over, he always said "Noland, this was the best we have ever had".

To her, this remark was her reward.

The invitation to join the Andrew Barry Moore Chapter No. 650 of the United Daughters of the Confederacy was accepted. Her certificate is dated in 1931. Their work was very stimulating. Her interest was greatest as historian and sponsoring essay work among students on subjects of southern historical interest. Prizes were given by the Chapter for 3 best essays and honorable mention for the fourth. Then every best paper on a subject sponsored by the Alabama State Division U.D.C. was entered also in their state historical contest. In this contest, they competed with students all over the state. Through the years, many who were sponsored by No. 650 Chapter won the first prize. These documented essays prepared a student for freshman requirements in College English.

During those years, the question of the Designer of the first Confederate Flag was opened once more. The Andrew Barry Moore Chapter No. 650 challenged the Alabama Division to sponsor an endeavor to have the General Assembly acknowledge Nicola Marschall as the true designer of the first adopted flag of the Confederate States of America. This was accomplished through the efforts of this Chapter by the data prepared by Noland H. Bowling, who was sustained by the loyal members of that Chapter. Nicola Marschall was declared the designer at the General Assembly of U.D.C. meeting in Richmond, Virginia in 1964. (Minutes 71st Annual Convention U. D. C., pp. 178, 179). This data was filed in the Alabama Archives, Montgomery, Alabama in 1974.

Noland (Hubbard) Bowling is a charter member of the Margaret Lea Houston Chapter of N.S.D.A.R., organized in 1951 at Marion, Alabama. In this chapter she has served officially as chaplain, registrar, second vice regent and Regent. She is also a member of the Alabama Officer's Club of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

She is also a charter member of the Major John Stith Chapter of the Colonial Dames of the XVIIth Century. She has served as chaplain and librarian in this chapter while residing in Marion, Ala.

FULLER FAMILY

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A FOREWARD

In America there are many Fuller families. Relationship of the Colonial settlers named Fuller has, as yet, never been learned. It is true that in the New England area and in the Southern Colonies, the same given names are often found, which may indicate relationship in their English background.

Ezekiel Fuller, the ancestor in the following study, was in Isle of Wight Co., Va. in 1711 and died there in 1723. He had a son, Ezekiel, and a son Benjamin. In 1706, in Massachusetts, Robert Fuller had a son named Benjamin, who named his son Ezekiel. Dates show that Robert and Ezekiel Fuller Sr. were Colonial contemporary inhabitants. If they were brothers, or near relatives, has not been learned. It is thought provoking, also, that Elizabeth Clement arrived in Virginia in the early 1600's with a son named Ezekiel Clement. Elizabeth Clement's maiden name was Elizabeth Fuller. Her brother was Sir Nicholas Fuller. His father was Sir Cuthbert Fuller, the son of Sir Nicholas Fuller of England. (See Tyler's Quarterly Vol. 17. p. 125 and Clement section this study.) It will be of interest to learn if there was anyone named Ezekiel Fuller before 1600 and one later who came to Virginia.

This study deals briefly with Ezekiel Fuller's life in Virginia in the years 1711-1723. The compiler made no effort to trace the descendants of each of his children. Finding no facts recorded for Arthur Fuller, his son, all the time was spent searching for Arthur's descendants. A partial record follows. Many were never found. Others were not interested. Therefore, the compiler regrets that many of Arthur and Sarah Fuller's descendants are not recorded here.

Arthur Fuller was born in Isle of Wight Co., Va. He was a landowner in Granville Co., N.C., a resident of Halifax Co., Va. until the eastern county line cut him off into Pittsylvania Co., Va. in 1767. He resided there from 1767 to 1797. Originally his descendants were in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Today they are in many places.

EZEKIEL FULLER 16 -1723

Ezekiel Fuller, born around 1650, it is assumed, in England, came to the Virginia Colony at an unknown date. The earliest recorded evidence has been in the year 1711. On June 11, 1711 in the Isle of Wight County, Virginia, the following men, viz: John Hillyard, Richard Reynolds Jr., Thomas Calcote, James Bragg and Ezekiel Fuller, witnessed the Will of Henry Wiggs. This Will is recorded in the Isle of Wight Wills, page 75.

Witnessing this Will with so many others indicates that he was not a stranger in that county. James Bragg, one of these witnesses, was the owner of 400 acres of land at that time, and had lived there since 1703. In 1717, James Bragg sold this same land to Ezekiel Fuller. The deed of William Boddie to James Bragg gives details regarding the location of this tract of land which were omitted in James Bragg's deed to Ezekiel Fuller and for that reason William Boddie's Deed to James Bragg is recorded first. This may help an interested descendant to find the land their first Fuller ancestor in Virginia owned. It can be assumed that Ezekiel Fuller and his wife, Deborah, were interred there. There may be another item of interest on that forgotten 400 acres, owned by Ezekiel Fuller. That is beautiful small rocks. It is said that someone possesses some of these that an unknown Fuller ancestor collected at the old home place in Isle of Wight. The compiler can only give the following record. All can learn if they are interested.

Deed of William Boddie to James Bragg. Isle of Wight Co. Deed Book I (1688-1704) Virginia.

Know all men by these presents that I, William Boddie of ye Isle of Wight County in Virginia, hereby cause of good will and reasons of my now wife Mary Boddie bargained, sould & delivered unto James Bragq a cerdain parcell of Land situated lying and being in ye foresd County and it lyeth by ye side of Western Branch Meadow and it is bounded thus. It beginneth att a marked white oak standing by ye side of ye sd Meadow, and at a Corner Tract of Wim Barons ground and from that Corner Tree alon by that lyne of marked trees to ys ____ and there of to another white oak a Corner Tree and from thence __ to another cornertree and as is agreed on a pine tree & that pine tree is a Corner Tree of Thomas Robert's parcell of ground and from thence along a parcell of marked trees to a great pine marked C standing In a pond and from thence along a parcell of marked trees to a little white cak, a Corner Tree that standeth by a path side that goeth toward ye Western Branch Meadow and on side from ____ down along a parcell of marked trees along by ye right hand of ye sd path going toward ye Western Branch Meadow and then along that path of marked trees by it through the ____ and then along ye path and marked trees by it beyond ye and thence along ye path & marked trees by it___ beyond it ____ so far as ___ head of a Branch that rusheth out of ye ___ Branch Meadow and then down ye side of ye head of ye Branch a little way & across to ye other side of ye Branch to a Redd oak, a marked tree & a Corner Tree of that parcell of Land that I formerly sould to George Williams and down by ye side of the sd Branch & Cross ye mouth of another Branch to another marked Red Oak and it standeth by ye side of ye Foresd Western Branch Meadow and from straight entry to ye ____ of ye Foresaid Western Branch Meadow Runns and then up afsd Runns to the station or first mentioned marked white oak & Corner tree of Wm Barrons parcell of ground. Now how many acres of land there ___ Bound tree before mentioned hee doo not sertainly know, but wooder support by four hundred acres of Land, now if it

contains ye four hundred acres of Land I will take none from it and if it go less than four hundred acres of land I will add none to it. Now James Bragg hath bought this parcell of Land of me for four hundred acres of Land Going more or less and I have sould it to him for four hundred acres be it more or less and soo ye bargain is to Hand - between us for four hundred acres of land whether it be more or whether it be less.

Now I, ye so Wm Boddie doo in ye behalfe of my selfe, my Heirs Exrs Admrs warr^t ye sale of the forsd land to be good & lawfull to him ye Forsd James Bragg, his Heirs Exrs Admrs forever. They are so James Bragg his heirs and successors yeilding & paying yearly & every year, forever, ye Quit Rent of this forsd four hundred acres of Land and I ye aforsd Wm Boddie and my forsd wife Mary Boddie doo acknowledge that this Deed of _____ as Witness our Hands & Seals this eight Day of May 1703.

This is as it was deciphered and one sees it was not easy to buy land and how it was measured when sold. James Bragg lived on this land around 14 years and the deed indicates that improvements were made in the meantime before it was sold to Ezekiel Fuller.

In the above deed all responsibility regarding the situation of this land is shifted to the deed written by William and Mary Boddie in 1703.

Ezekiel Fuller bought this land in 1717 and they lived there when he wrote his Will in 1722, only 5 years later. This Will is included because it reveals a few details about this Fuller family. This land Ezekiel Fuller bought from James Bragg has been seen to be the land William Boddie and his wife Mary Boddie sold to James Bragg in 1703. Evidently they were elderly people at that time. William Boddie had a land grant of 550 acres of land in the Isle of Wight Co., Va. upon Cypresse Swamp that is dated Oct. 20, 1661 and on July 12, 1665 he was granted 3,350 acres at the head of Cyprus and Western branches of Beaver Dam to the Meadow which meets head of the Western Branch. (See Cavaliers and Pioneers by N.M. Nugent, pp. 393 & 475).

The compiler's deductions from these two wills and the 2 patents are that the ancestor Ezekiel Fuller's farm was situated near Western Branch and Beaver Dam, Isle of Wight County, Va. It will be seen that while he lived there only 5 years, it was the home of the family until it was sold on May 23, 1744.

At some unknown date, Ezekiel Fuller married Deborah, whose maiden surname is unknown.

EZEKIEL FULLER'S WILL

Item. I Give to my Loving wife the use of all my Estate whatsoever during her widowhood or Natural Life and ye day of marriage or death my will is that This in Item I Give and Bequeath to my Son Ezekiell and Sollomon all my lands to be Equally Divided Between Them and their Heirs forever.

Item. I give ye remainder of my Estate to my wife marriage or death to my Loving Children. To my daughter Ann, my son Ezekiell my daughter Mary my Sone Sollomon Benjamen, John Joseph Arthur & Timothy to be equally divided Between them. Item I give to my son Henry Twenty five Shillings to be paid by Executx. Item I give to my daughter Martha Whitley and my daughter Onner Allen a calf apeace and I do make my Loving wife Deborah my whole and Sole Executrix of this my Last will & Testamt in Witness my hand and Seale this 19th day of Novembr 1722.

The above Will verifies Ezekiel Fuller's wife was living, named Deborah and was Executrix of his last will and Testament. It shows also that he had 3 children old enough to be out of their father's household. Two were daughters who were married and a son whom it is assumed was mature, perhaps married. To each of these he had previously granted material blessings of unknown value.

This Will proves in their home were 2 daughters and 7 sons. The unusual naming of them in this Will indicates that they were named in order of their birth. Since there is no known family record, and since later information found to date does not refute this idea, the following family record is based on this Will.

Ezekiell Fuller, b. in 1600's, d. before June 24, 1723.

No attempt has been made to trace the twelve lines of this family. Many contacts prove there is interest alive that needs the co-operation of collateral kindred that can enable those willing to work to assemble the essential facts for each child named in that Will. In the records found, there are no evidences found that Ezekiel Fuller married twice. Deborah Fuller, if born as late as 1680, was only 64 years old when she passed away around 1744, since Ezekiel willed his lands to her in 1722, and at her death his sons, Ezekiel and Solomon were heirs to his 400 acres of land in Isle of Wight Co., Va. This land was the home of their mother and her children as long as she lived. She was the mother of 12 children and, by estimate, around 42 years of age in 1722. Three children, already independent, were out of the home. The rest of the children were minors, yet/the oldest sons, he gave the land upon the death of their mother. As the sons became of age, they did leave home. Ezekiel bought land in N.C. 8 years later in 1830. His mother still had at home 6 sons ten years old or older. Four years later in 1834, Solomon bought land in N.C., yet his mother had at home 5 sons 14 years old or older. Five years later, Benjamin bought land in N.C. and 4 sons were there to take care of their mother's affairs, of whom the youngest was around 19 years old. It seems they remained as long as she lived. After the land was sold, they are all found in North Carolina. Each of these 12 are mentioned briefly as found before the settling of Ezekiel Fuller's Estate in 1744. This date indicates that Deborah Fuller, his Loving Wife, never remarried. She remained in Isle of Wight County and reared her family. It will be seen the sons grew up and went away, but the land was not sold by Ezekiell and Solomon. There is only one reason to consider and that is, the land was the land of Deborah Fuller for her "Natural Life" unless she remarried. It is normal to assume the old lady, Deborah Fuller, passed away around 1744. It is also normal to assume that Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller were interred on that farm.

No efforts, in research on the sons of Ezekiel Fuller, have found any of them in the State of Virginia before the 1760's. All who were found were in the State of North Carolina when they were discoverd. They all seem to have remained in North Carolina except "Arther", who is traced as Arthur. At this point it should be said no one has learned the date of the arrival of Ezekiel Fuller in the Isle of Wight County. He was not a young man when he died, since he had 3 grown children.

He was, without a doubt, an industrious man to maintain a family of 12 children. He was also prosperous enough to have 5,000 pounds of tobacco ahead to pay for his farm. Tobacco was used for currency in those days and also until after the Colonies gained their independence. He evidently was a carpenter since he gave his carpenter tools to his oldest son in the home when he made his Will. A carpenter in those days was not an ordinary man who could use a saw and hammer as the designation is used in modern times. A carpenter, in those times, has been declared to be a man whose ability was equivalent to that of architects of this era. If he was a carpenter, that was good. If, with this, he was also a planter, that was a desirable goal for every settler in Virginia. There were in his home young sons to be kept busy and tobacco was a money crop. It is normal to regard their life on the farm was that of the farmer and his family. They also had cattle, since his executrix would give away two calves when his Will was administered. Today, 250 years later, our great nation had its foundation made by men like

Ezekiel Fuller and his sons. If he was a carpenter, he was among the desirable group of citizens in the 1600s. On the Statute Books of Virginia, carpenters were among those to be urged to come to the Virginia Colony. His will was written by Arther Smith, a Justice of the Peace, and one of his neighbors. Note that he spelled his own name Arther. Ezekiell signed with his mark the will after it was written. Evidently he was quite ill at the time, since he signed his name in 1711, according to information. The will indicates that Ezekiell Fuller was a Christian man, since he was leaning upon the "blessed Saviour" to pardon all his sins. The names of most of his children are Biblical names, is also observed.

MARRIAGES OF DESCENDANTS OF EZEKIEL AND DEBORAH FULLER

MARTHA FULLER

Martha Fuller, a daughter, married a Mr. Whitley prior to Nov. 19, 1722. Exact date unknown and no other facts learned.

ONNER FULLER HONOUR FULLER

Onner is perhaps an incorrect spelling for Honour, the name many girls were given years ago. She had married a Mr. Allen prior to Nov. 19, 1722 and she was called Onner Allen. Evidence of this marriage is found in Chapman's Marriages, Isle of Wight Co., Va. Proof is in Great Book 2 Isle of Wight Co., Va., p. 113, and in Will Book 4 Isle of Wight Co., Va., p. 333, unless there is error in copying. No effort to trace this line was made.

ANN FULLER

She seems to be the fourth child of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller. Nothing more was learned.

MARY FULLER

She seems to be the sixth child of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller. Nothing more was learned.

JOHN FULLER

John Fuller was the ninth child named in his father's will. If he grew up, the evidence was not found. There was a John Fuller in Pittsylvania Co., Va. in 1775 as one of 8 for the rank of Ensign for the Militia. (Deed Book 4, p. 293, Pittsylvania Co., Va. Reel # 2 Va. State Archives, Richmond, Va.). No effort has been made to trace John Fuller. If he was John Fuller, son of Ezekiel Fuller I, his brother, Arthur, was a resident of that county at that time. No other facts for this John found in that county.

EZEKIEL FULLER OR.

Ezekiel Fuller Jr., the son of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller, was the oldest son in their home when his father dated his will on Nov. 19, 1722. His exact age in not known but he was a minor. He was given his father's carpenter tools and one half of his father's lands when his mother married or passed away. Another evidence that he was under age is that his mother served as Executrix of his father's will. It is assumed that Ezekiel remained at home in Isle of Wight County until he was well past age 21 years. If he did leave home at age 21, he was quite a young boy when his father died.

In 1730, he was in North Carolina. On May 11, 1730, Ezekiel Fuller bought 250 acres of land from Joseph Lane. This acreage was part of a tract granted to Joseph Lane on March 1, 1719. This land Ezekiel Fuller acquired was on the north side of Morattock River. It was bounded by Holly Bush Swamp in Yourah Woods. His neighbors, Benjamin Lane and Thomas Lane's lands were adjacent to his. Witnesses to this deed were Barnabee Thomas and Thomas Lane. This deed was recorded at August Court 1730. Thomas Handsford D.C/C. This land of Ezekiel Fuller is recorded in Book C. Bertie County, North Carolina, p. 255. See also Colonial Bertie County, N.C. Vol. II, Deed Book B.C. (1725-1963). It will be of interest to observe where his brothers buy land.

Ezekiel Fuller married Sarah Vinson, the daughter of Thomas and Isabel Vinson of Northampton Co., N.C., according to the will of Thomas Vinson, dated Jan. 15, 1762. This will was recorded in Feb. 1764 in Will Book I, p. 86, Northampton Co., N.C. They are evidently the Thomas and Isabel Vincent who sold to William Vincent in Bertie Co., N.C. one hundred acres of his patent for 30D acres granted to Thomas Vincent in 1717. (Deed Book A, p. 67.) This land was on the west side of Meherrin Creek. (See Vol. I Colonial Bertie Co., N.C., M.B. Bell, p. 4). They evidently went to Northampton County much later, since their daughter married Ezekiel Fuller at a date not known at this writing. There is on record that Ezekiel Fuller was granted 3DO acres in Northampton Co., N.C. at a council held at Edenton on July 25, 1743. (Vol. 4, p. 635 & p. 522, State Records of N.C. by Sanders). Ezekiel Fuller, however, seems to have spent his life after 1730 in Bertie Co., N.C. In 1735 he paid 4 L, 7 sh, 6 d Quit Rent on his 250 acres in Bertie Co., N.C. (Vol. 22, p. 241 N.C. Archives). He was there when Solomon Fuller, his brother, came in 1734. The same was true when Benjamin Fuller came. The deed in Virginia in 1744 proves they were residents of Bertie Co., N.C.

Ezekiel Fuller died around the year 1763. Sarah Fuller was his Executrix. (North Carolina Wills and Administrations Archives File No. SS883, Raleigh, N.C.). See Journal of N.C. Genealogy Dec. 1962, p. 1065. No attempt has been made to trace the family of Ezekiel and Sarah (Vinson) Fuller. The above will may reveal their children's names.

SOLOMON FULLER

Solomon Fuller, the son of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller of Isle of Wight Co.. Va., grew up in that county and then went to North Carolina, but the time is not known. He may have been residing there before he purchased land, since he purchased 100 acres of the land patent of Joseph Lane Jun. William Warr sold this land to Solomon Fuller. The deed was dated May 13, 1734 and it was recorded at the May Court. Witnesses were John Thomas and Ezekiel Fuller.

B John Wynns D.C/C

This deed is recorded in D. Book D, p. 52. See Colonial Bertie County, N.C., Vol. III, p. 139, M.B. Bell.

Solomon bought land near the home of his brother, Ezekiel Fuller. He paid for this land 1600 pounds of pork. This indicates at least an interest in raising hogs. He entered into the interest of the County it is seen by a list ordered to be recorded Feb. 25, 1739, of men that included his name for Jury duty in Bertie and Edgecombe Counties, N.C.

Solomon Fuller married Mary, but her surname is not known, nor the date of their marriage. This marriage was prior to 1744, according to the deed below, when Ezekiel and Solomon Fuller sold their inheritance in Isle of Wight Co., Va. Solomon Fuller and family resided in Bertie Co., N.C. No effort has been made to trace their line of the Fuller descendants. Sanders, Vol. 4, State Records of N.C., p. 635, states Solomon Fuller at Council at Edenton on July 25, 1743 was granted 300 acres of Land in Northampton Co.

Since the compiler found the above data for Solomon Fuller, born by estimate around 1710 or earlier in the Isle of Wight Co., Va., who was the son of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller, the following data has been contributed as one line of Solomon Fuller. This means that others' descendants, with dedication to an effort to do the same, may succeed. This line was compiled by Donald George Brown of Toledo, Ohio. It is recorded here es it was sent to the compiler.

BENJAMIN FULLER

Benjamin Fuller was the eighth child of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller of Isle of Wight Co., Va. It is assumed he grew up in that county and went to North Carolina after he became a mature man. He, like Solomon, went to his brother Ezekiel's home and purchased land on the north side of Moratock River. This deed was dated April 25, 1739. Inside of 9 years, these three brothers settled in Bertie Co., N.C. The witnesses to Benjamin's deed from Edward Earpe were Samuel Peete, John Swenny and Ezekiel Fuller. He bought 250 acres and paid 12 Ls, 10 shillings for it. This deed was recorded at the May Court 1739 in D. Book E, p. 464. (See Vol. III, p. 204 Colonial Bertie Co., N.C., M.B. Bell). This Benjamin Fuller has not been traced by this compiler. It is interesting that these three brothers who bought land in Bertie Co., N.C. did it in the order they were named in their father's will, viz: year 1730-1734, and 1739 or 8, 12 and 17 years later. There is no question, therefore, about their relationship. No other facts are known.

HENRY FULLER

Henry Fuller was the oldest son of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller of Isle of Wight Co., Va. Due to his father leaving him only 25 shillings when he made his will on Nov. 19, 1722, it is assumed that this son was perhaps married and settled already in North Carolina. In that case, his parents had provided for him. He likewise could not serve as Executor for his father unless he was near home. Weighing the various ideas, it is assumed that before the death of his father, he was no longer in Isle of Wight. His home came to be in Granville Co., N.C. He was perhaps a citizen of Edgecombe when he first settled in North Carolina prior to 1722 and may have been located in the area later called Granville Co. after 1746. Much has been written on this son of Ezekiel Fuller and no research is included here.

It has been seen that Ezekiel Fuller Jr. and his brother, Solomon Fuller, the heirs of their father's farm of 400 acres of land, more or less, upon the

decease of the mother, settled in Bertie County, North Carolina during the early 1730's. At least four of these brothers had left Isle of Wight Co., Va. before 1744. It can be assumed the younger sons, all very small children, remained with their mother so long as she lived. All were grown men before 1744 when this deed was written. Even so, they had a home with the aging mother and they took care of her.

At a Court held for Isle of Wight County April 23, 1744 Ezekiel Fuller & Solomon Fuller came into Court & Acknowledged their Deedsof Bargain and Sale to James Turner which is Ordered to be Recorded.

It is seen in these three deeds that James Bragg received an estimated 400 acres of land in its natural condition. Fourteen years later Ezekiel Fuller Sr. received the same with a house and other improvements. He died 5 years later and for 22 more years it was the Fuller home. His widow and nine children lived there and changes were enumerated. The term messuage was used in those days to state improvements; this included the dwelling house, all the essential adjacent houses and the term even included the fact that there was a lawn surrounded by a fence. This deed also shows there was some uncertainty in regard to safety of the grantee, due to the land being devised. This may be the reason for the sale price being 12 Ls.

On April 23, 1744 James Turner had this deed recorded. And the Fullers left the Isle of Wight Co., Va. The following is what is known of the three youngest Fuller sons, Joseph, Arther and Timothy. Their older brothers were in North Carolina and it is found that they went to North Carolina and all seem to be citizens of Granville Co., N.C., part of their lives.

JOSEPH FULLER

Joseph Fuller seems to have been the tenth child of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller of Isle of Wight Co., Va. He may have remained in that county until his older brothers sold the home of his childhood.

It is known that he was a citizen of Granville Co., N.C. Joseph Fuller and his two younger brothers were in the Company of Militia in that county, reported on Oct. 8, 1754 by Captain Osborn Jeffreys. (Vol. 22, p. 371, North Carolina State Record). When the Oath of Allegiance was administered by Thos Banks in Beaver Dam District of Granville Co., N.C., Joseph Fuller was among the subscribers who took this Oath. He signed his name by his mark. (Vol. 22, PP. 161, 174, ibid). This may tell he had no school advantages after his father's death. He was a loved brother since he has namesakes among his kindred. No effort was made to learn more facts.

TIMOTHY FULLER

Timothy Fuller seems to be the youngest child of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller of Isle of Wight County, Virginia. He did not remain in that county after the old home place was sold. It is known that he settled in Granville Co., N.C. and was loyal to the demands of the citizens to belong to the Militia. Captain Osborn Jeffreys, on Oct. 8, 1754, reported him as a private in his Company. This Company was in Col. William Eaton's Regiment. His Virginia nephews loved Uncle Timothy enough to give him a namesake.

Brittain Fuller (1750s-1812) had a son Timothy (cal780-dl864).

ARTHUR FULLER

Arthur Fuller, the eleventh child and seventh son of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller of Isle of Wight County of Virginia, is their descendant whose descendants are recorded in this study. Many were not found and some found had lost their records, but many co-operated and some of ten generations of Fuller descendants from Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller are recorded here.

It is impossible to start with exact dates. Taking the statement that Arthur Fuller passed away when he was around eighty years of age and that he died in 1797, the year his estate was settled in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, it can be estimated that he was born around the year 1717 on the land his father bought in May, 1717 in Isle of Wight Co., Va. In one family of his descendants who lived in Georgia, there was found written on a paper "Arthur Fuller resided in Pittsylvania and Halifax died in Pitts. about Oct. 4, 1797". Later information makes this date reasonable. It is assumed that Arthur and Timothy were born in that Isle of Wight home and lived there until Ezekiel and Solomon sold the old home in 1744. By this reckoning, he was around 27 years of age when he went to North Carolina. Since no record of him is found elsewhere, it can be assumed that he settled eventually near his brother, Henry Fuller, if not as soon as he moved to N.C. Four of his brothers were citizens of that state. Henry had gone to that state when Arthur was a small child. He seems to have settled in that part of Bertie County that came to be Edgecombe around 1741 and Granville Co. in 1746. The Fuller brothers were in Granville much earlier. Therefore it can be seen that a historian of Granville could name Fuller in the "Rare list of the earliest families in Granville Co., N.C. II

With no opportunity to search the original court records in the several counties page by page, only the following is known. Eight years after the sale of the old home in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, there is found recorded in Granville Co. records for Arthur, the following record, regarding land. Deed No. 74, p. 277.

"Arthur Fuller One hundred and fifty acres of land in Granville County on Cedar Creek Beginning at a poplar running thence East 150 poles to a white Oak thence South 160 poles to a hickory thence wt 150 poles to a red oak thence No 160 poles to the first Station Dated 28th day of October 1752."

(Book 11, p. 364, File 277)

Another assumption is in order, since there are no Bible or family records

to guide. Arthur Fuller married Sarah, whose surname is not known, nor the date of their marriage. For several reasons it is normal to think he was married before or around the time he acquired his land on Cedar Creek in 1752, and that he resided on this farm 10 or more years. Some of their children were born in North Carolina. The reasoning on this point will be stated later. There is positive evidence he was a citizen in good faith in Granville County in 1754 when Arthur Fuller, Joseph Fuller and Timothy Fuller, 3 brothers, were on the roster, dated Oct. 8, 1754 of Capt. Osborn Jeffreys' Company under Col. William Eaton's Regiment. (See Vol. 22, p. 371). One of the demands in that county was maintenance of a standing army. The colonists were required to be affiliated with a Company of soldiers who were conforming to the requirements during the period of 1734-1765.

Another positive evidence that Arthur Fuller was a citizen in Granville Co. in 1760 is found recorded in the records unto this day. Land grant No. 92 and No. 104 are recorded in his name as follows:
No. 92, p. 279.

"Arthur Fuller Four hundred and forty acres of land in Granville County On both sides of Brandy Creek Beginning on the south side of said Creek at a white Oak thence running Wt 320 poles to a pine thence No 320 Poles cross the Creek to a white Oak thence East 320 pole to the center of a red Oak and a white Oak thence South 220 pole by Morgans line to the Beginning. Dated 11th day of March 1760."

Book 11, p. 364, File No. 279. Grant 104 is also on the records as follows: No. 104, p. 259. "Arthur Fuller Six hundred and seventy seven acres of land in Granville County On both sides of Cedar Creek beginning on the north side of the said Creek at Fuller's corner a poplar thence run by his line So 160 pole crossing said Creek at a red Oak thence by his other line Et 30 pole to a red Oak thence by Bradfords line South 20 pole to a hickory thence Wt 150 pole to a red Oak thence No 160 pole to a red Oak thence Wt 260 pole to a pine thence Wt 200 pole by Marshalls line to the center of two white Oaks thence Et 340 pole to a white Oak thence No 40 pole to a pine thence East 90 pole to a pine thence South 220 pole to a small hickory in Fullers line thence by him to the Beginning. Dated 11th day of March 1760 -"
(Book 11, page 360, File No. 259)

In this is seen the positive statement that Arthur Fuller was in North Carolina on March 11, 1760 and this still the owner of his land on Cedar Creek which was granted to him on Oct. 28, 1752. Thus on March 11, 1760 he was granted 677 acres adjacent to his 150 acres making 827 acres in his home plantation. This with the 440 acres on Brandy Creek made him the owner of 1,267 acres of land in Granville Co., N.C. in the year 1760. There is evidence also that Arthur Fuller was a Planter. This term Planter, in the colonial days, classified one, as one who cultivated the tobacco plant. It was added to his name as a mark of real progress and was a coveted mark of distinction among the plantation owners of colonial days. Tobacco was used as money and the man who had tobacco was the aggressive citizen. We also find out his wife was a spinner and outstanding in her art to the point that she was called a spinster. This can mean they had also a spinning business of which she was the manager. Herein lies evidence of their success.

Why did they leave their large plantation in North Carolina and move to Halifax Co., Va.? People who do this have a reason or else there was a cause. Search for a cause can be seen in the recorded facts in the history of Granville County, N.C. This will be related later.

One feels that on March 11, 1760 that Arthur Fuller had some satisfaction in acquiring 1,117 acres of land. Yet he left the state on some unknown date, was residing in Halifax Co., Va. and had sold 226 acres of his

original plantation on Oct. 6, 1763. Within less time than 3 years, he washed his hands of the former years and moved to Virginia. In these same years, it is significant that his nephew Brittain Fuller, said to be the son of Henry Fuller, sold his land. Quoting: "On 19 Feb. 1762 Britain Fuller of Granville Co. conveyed to Robert Cade of same for 26 pounds 50 acres on Horse Creek being the land where one Brittain Fuller settled". D.B. 2, p. 236. (See Harlee Kinfolks, p. 1078).

The evidence of Arthur Fuller's sale is briefly abstracted here as follows. Arthur Fuller and his wife, Sarah Fuller of Halifax Co., Province of N.C. 226 acres on Cedar Creek. This deed was dated Oct. 6, 1763. (Deed Book G, pp. 252, 253, Granville Co., N.C.

Arthur Fuller and family were positively in the county of Halifax, Va. in October, 1763, when this deed was executed. There are no other deeds recorded in Granville Co., N.C. for sale of land by Arthur Fuller, according to information given. The same has been said true of Arthur Fuller's purchase of land in Halifax Co., Va. His name declared not to be on the Grantee or Grantor Index. That may be due to the loss of records. He did own land in Virginia and that will be referred to later.

Why did he leave North Carolina? History may answer. This must be stated here as briefly as possible. In 1729 the King of England bought out all the Lord Proprietors in the North Carolina Colony except Lord Granville, who owned the upper half of the present North Carolina. This was the Granville District. At that time, two thirds of the early settlers were in that section of the Colony. (See p. 36, American Guide Series, W.P.A.)

Around 5 years later, a change came. During the years 1734 to 1765, Lord Granville, who was an absentee Land Lord, had agents take care of the Colony. Quoting: "The people were grievously oppressed by Lord Granville's agents, childs and Corbin". (See "Some Neglected History of North Carolina" by William Richard Fitch M.D. Pub. by The Meal Pub. Co., Inc., N.Y. 1905. pp. 28, 29). On page 177 (ibid) the author states the following grievances were sufferd by the colonists, viz: illegal taxation; demand of exhorbitant fees by all officers; the maintenance of a standing army; colonists who had bought and paid for their lands had to take out new patents for which they were charged double fees, then to get their title recorded there was a fee of 5 pounds sterling. This fraud was accomplished by one agent as attorney, pretending he had found a man's title to his lands was faulty. To save his land he had to submit. The historian adds this statement, quoting: "For a country still in swaddling bands of infancy, with limited resources and a constricted currency and furthermore a people struggling for existence, these taxes were unbearable".

Arthur Fuller certainly moved out of North Carolina during that period of oppressive circumstances and confusion. The date was some time between March 11, 1760 and Oct. 6, 1763. To what extent the above influenced his departure is anyone's guess. It can be seen a cause, especially if a man thinks of the future welfare of his children.

In Virginia, Halifax had been a new county since 1752 and it included a vast territory on the west side. As yet, the exact location of Arthur Fuller's home in Halifax is not known. Therefore, it is necessary to study the historical records more.

Less than 3 years after selling his home plantation in Granville Co., N.C., Arthur Fuller and family were a part of a new change. Pittsylvania Co., by an Act of the General Assembly of Virginia for October, 1766, was ordered to be cut off from Halifax Co., Va. (See Vol. 8 Henning's Statutes). The date set for this was "from and after the first day of June next, the said county of Halifax be divided into two counties by a line run from the mouth

of County Line Creek on Dan River———and known as Pittsylvania County."
It was "further enacted that after the first day of June a Court for the said County of Pittsylvania be constantly held by the Justices thereof upon the fourth Friday in each month."

When Pittsylvania Co., Va. was born on June 1, 1767, it is a known fact that Arthur Fuller and his family were no longer in Halifax Co., Va., but within the boundaries of the new county, because the following facts include Arthur Fuller's name.

Peytonsburg, formerly the County seat of Halifax Co., was within the boundaries of Pittsylvania after June 1, 1767. Gov. Fauquier lost no time in appointing Justices and judges to preside over the new county. The first Court was held June 29, 1767. (History of Pittsylvania Co., Va. M.C. Clement, D. 94). The Justices took a list of all tithables and these lists have been preserved. On Justice Peter Perkins' list is found the name of Arthur Fuller. There were less than 1,000 people in the county in June 1767. Two months later, the name of Arthur Fuller is found twice in the records as a result of that Court. On page 46, Deed Book 1, Joseph Austin sold Arthur Fuller 370 acres of land on Buffalo Fork of Sandy River in Pittsylvania Co., Va. The second item is recorded in Deed Book 1, p. 47. Arthur Fuller made a deed to John Warring for two hundred acres of land. This man was John Warren, the son-in-law of Arthur Fuller. He was settling their daughter, Christian (Fuller) Warren and her husband, John Warren, near to them. A record of this daughter's marriage has not been found recorded. The above proves that Arthur and Sarah Fuller's children were old enough to be born in North Carolina before they came to Virginia.

It is not amiss to think of Sarah Fuller and the 6 young people in this family in 1767. Sarah had shared Arthur's life through the cares and fortunes of pioneer life in Granville, N.C. and the change to a home in Halifax Co., Va., then in June 1767 they were the inhabitants of a new county. Traveling today over the modern highways and improved roads in that area, it is difficult to truly visualize Sarah Fuller's first journey from Granville, N.C. upon the abandonment of hundreds of acres of land and the home plantation around Cedar Creek, N.C., to settle in a new place in the hills of Wendree Forest to conquer new acres on Buffalo Fork of Stanton River and Turkey Cock Creek. When Pittsylvania became the new county, Sarah was in an area of 1,012 square miles with less than 1,000 inhabitants, not even one person per square mile. It must have been wonderful to have eight in the family. And one sees the wisdom in settling John and Christina Warren very near to them, when they married.

Very little is known of their life in the years that followed, outside of the glimpses of the history of the county which they shared from day to day. The most important interest that came to the Fuller family was the advent of their youngest child, a son, whom they named Joseph Fuller. He was born on Jan. 19, 1768 on the land on Buffalo Fork of Sandy River. It is still more interesting that he lived on the same land all the days of his life, and it is still owned by his own descendants. He was named for his Uncle Joseph Fuller of North Carolina. Joseph was their youngest child.

The tradition of this family is that Arthur Fuller, besides his life on the farm. was active in other ways. His chief interest was in a large wagon train that transported tobacco to the markets and on the return journey, conveyed merchandise. Primitive steps in the manufacture of tobacco were begun and this product was thus distributed. This business took them into North Carolina and to the principal tobacco market cities in Virginia. Through this type of business it is claimed that Arthur Fuller and his brothers in North Carolina did not lose their family contact.

Some years later, Arthur Fuller paid 110 t to George Jefferson of Lunenburg Co., Va. for 305 acres on Turkey Cocke Creek. Their deed was dated on Oct. 28, 1775, but was not recorded until July 24, 1777. See D.B. 4, p. 386, Pitts. Co., Va. The Witnesses to this deed were Ignatius Simmons, John Warren, Zachariah Fuller, Britt Fuller and Leon C. Deloshers.

On the day before this deed was recorded, Arthur Fuller deeded to his son, Zachariah Fuller, 200 acres of this land on Turkey Cocke Creek and this deed was recorded also on July 24, 1777. (See D.B. 4, p. 380). Since that day in 1777, Turkey Cocke Creek has been close to the lives of many Fullers.

Arthur Fuller made another deed on July 24, 1777. He deeded to Jacob Coolly of Amherst Co., Va. 270 acres of land at the "Head branches of Sandy River". See O.B. 4, p. 389. In O.B. 5 (1767-1780), p. 94, there is recorded that Sarah Fuller, the wife of Arthur Fuller, relinquished her Right of Dower to 220 acres of land that Arthur Fuller sold to Jacob Cooley. This is dated Jan. 27, 1779. This is the last information regarding Sarah Fuller. The date of her decease is unknown.

No record was found of the purchase of the land at the Head of Sandy River by Arthur Fuller. He had to own the land before he could deed or sell it to Jacob Cooley. This information is coveted.

The Revolutionary War was in progress. In 1777 all male citizens had to take the Oath of Allegiance. Arthur Fuller and his two older sons, Zachariah and Brittain Fuller, signed the Oath of Allegiance on the same day, Oct. 20, 1777. They were on Capt. Hankins list. This list was signed by Daniel Hankins on June 10, 1778, when he turned in his report. (Pitts. Co., Va. Muster Roll, p. 286)

Twenty years later, the records of Pittsylvania Co., Va. Deed Book 11 (1796-1799), p. 166, it is found that Arthur Fuller died intestate prior to October 14, 1797. Since no reference is made regarding Sarah Fuller, his wife, it is known her death preceded his decease.

In settling his estate, the following deed is recorded and it gives an authentic list of his heirs and it is assumed, in the order of their births.

"This Indenture made the 14th day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety seven Between Zachariah Fuller, Briton Fuller, John Warren Sr. who intermarried with Christian Fuller, William Lawrence who intermarried with Rachel Fuller, Henry Lawrence who intermarried with Sally Fuller, and John Smith who intermarried with Tamar Fuller, the heirs and Legatees of Arthur Fuller deceased for and in consideration of the sum of three hundred dollars to them in hand paid by the said Joseph Fuller, the receipt where of is hereby acknowledged before the sealing and delivery of these presents hath granted, bargained and sold and by these presents doth grant bargain sell and confirm unto the said Joseph Fuller his Heirs and assigns forever one certain tract or parcell of Land containing one hundred and five acres lying in the County of Pittsylvania on the West side of Turkey Cock Creek it being part of the Land the said Arthur Fuller dec'd purchased of George Jefferson, be it some more or Less where of the said Arthur Fuller died seized. To Have and to hold the said Land and premises unto the said Joseph Fuller his Heirs and assignes forever, with all kinds of improvements and their appurtenances unto the said Joseph Fuller his Heirs and assigns forever to the only proper use of and behoof of him the said Jos. Fuller His Heirs and Assigns forever and Lastly the said Heirs and Legatees doth for themselves their Heirs &c all and singular the premises here in granted release with its appurtenances unto said Joseph Fuller his Heirs and assigns forever against the said Heirs and Legatees of the said Arthur Fuller deceased and all and every other person or persons whatsoever Lawfully claiming by from or under them the said Heirs and Legatees. In Witness where of the said

Heirs and Legatees hath hereunto set their hands and Seals the day and date first above written.

Sarah Fuller had no part in the above deed and no record of release of Dower Rights was found, is evidence of her death before this date. On the facts recorded in the deed dated Oct. 14, 1797, the family of Arthur and Sarah Fuller can now be recorded as follows:

Arthur Fuller b. around 1717 in Isle of Wight Co., Va. married date unknown Sarah _____. She died before Oct. 14, 1797. Sarah, surname unknown, born and died on dates unknown. Both died in Pittsylvania Co., Va. They are interred on the land sold to their son, Joseph Fuller. Their five older children were born in North Carolina:

facts for the children of Arthur and Sarah Fuller have been contributed by many families and through research. Each will be recognized, as follows.

THE FOUR DAUGHTERS

CHRISTIAN FULLER

Christian Fuller was born in Granville County, North Carolina. The date of her birth is unknown, but can be estimated as early in the 1750's, since she married around 1767, John Warren. Her father deeded 200 acres of land to John Warren in August, 1767 and this indicates that their marriage was near that time. This deed is recorded in Deed Book 1, p. 47, Pitts. Co., Va., by order of the Court on Aug. 28, 1767. It is known that they resided on this land, since the heirs of John and Christian (Fuller) Warren, on Jan. 10, 1806, sold this same land to William Walker. (D.B. 15, p. 188, Pitts. Co., Va.) A few days later, on Jan. 14, 1806, Mr. William Walker sold to Joseph Fuller, Christian's brother, a part of this land. This deed was recorded Oct. 20,

1806. (D.B. 15, p. 198). Their descendants have not been traced.

RACHEL FULLER

Rachel Fuller, the daughter of Arthur and Sarah Fuller was 15 or more years old in 1685. She was born in Granville Co., N.C. On page 6 of the Marriage Register of Pittsylvania Co., there is proof that on May 5, 1785, William Lawrence and Rachel Fuller were married by Rev. Samuel Harris. Samuel Calland was Surety. See p. 50, Marriages of Pitts. Co., Va. by C.L. Knorr. This verifies that she married after the tax list of her father was made in 1785. No effort was made to trace their descendants.

SARAH FULLER

Sarah Fuller, called Salley, was the daughter of Arthur and Sarah Fuller. She married Henry Lawrence of Pittsylvania Co., Va. She was born before 1767. No effort was made to trace their descendants.

TAMAR FULLER

Tamar Fuller was the daughter of Arthur and Sarah Fuller. She has been written into other records as Lamar Fuller. This is due to the "T" being considered as "L". Tamar is an unusual given name, but it has been found as a given name in other families. In fact, it may be a clue to the family surname of one of the Fuller foremothers. The effort made was not successful, but that met with too few records for solving the problem.

Tamar Fuller married John Smith. No effort was made to trace the descendants of John and Tamar (Fuller) Smith. The descendants of these four daughters, who are interested, can use their family records, census records, and Court Records and connect their line to their Fuller ancestors, if they are interested.

At this point it may be in order to say that Arthur Fuller's tax report in Pittsylvania Co., Va. in 1785 stated there were 6 in his family and he owned 2 dwellings. This means that 4 of their children were in their home. They were Rachel, Sarah, Tamar and Joseph. Daughter Christian was Mrs. John Warren. In the same tax list their sons, Zachariah and Britain were reported head of their individual households, as will be seen in their section of this record. According to information recently secured, Arthur Fuller built a log house on the land he bought in Pittsylvania Co., Va. in 1767. The logs were hand hewn. There was a brick chimney and the present owner claims there was a corner stone with a date in the 1700's on it when he bought the land. A promise was made to search for it but was not kept. The early Fullers who lived there, were interred there. After 200 years, this area was under cultivation. The log house was the type of house built by the earliest settlers. The brick chimney was the unusual part. The usual thing used was rock and mud. The brick was perhaps secured when on a tour with their wagon train, when tobacco was taken to the market. This wagon train was something unusual at that time. When Pittsylvania County was formed, everyone took his tobacco to market in his own wagon or it was packed in casks and rolled to market by hitching a horse or an ox to the cask. (See History of Pitts. Co., Va. by M.C. Clement, pp. 111, 112).

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ZACHARIAH FULLER

Zachariah Fuller, the son of Arthur and Sarah Fuller, was born in Granville Co., North Carolina, by estimate, in the early years of the decade between 1750 to 1760. He died in Pittsylvania Co., Va. near Callands around Jan. 1834. He dated his will on Dec. 19, 1833 and it was presented in Court on Jan. 20, 1834. The 1830 census proves that he was living alone and between 80 and 90 years of age. If he was 80 years old in 1830, he was born around 1750 and was around 83 years of age when he died. His dates are 1750-1833, by estimate. This census proves, also that his wife, Letitia Fuller, passed away prior to the time the 1830 census was taken.

The Muster Roll, Pittsylvania Co., Va., at the Court House in Chatham, Va., p. 288, reveals that Zachariah Fuller took the Oath of Allegiance on Oct. 20, 1777. This is recorded also at Henry Co., Court House. His name was on the list of Capt. Hawkins, which was signed by Daniel Hawkins and dated June 10, 1778. This proves he was a loyal patriot to the Revolutionary War Cause.

It has already been recorded that on July 23, 1777 (D.B. 4, p. 386, Pitts. Co., Va.) a tract of land on Turkey Cocke Creek, consisting of 200 acres, was deeded to Zachariah Fuller by his father, Arthur Fuller. It is assumed that Zachariah Fuller was married, perhaps around that time. No record of his marriage has been found. He married Laticia, called Letty. Her surname is unknown.

Another reason for estimating Zachariah Fuller married around the year 1777 is based on the 1785 tax report for Pittsylvania Co., Va. This proves that there were 5 in his household and he owned a dwelling house. This shows he was married and they had 3 children in 1785.

Zachariah and Letty Fuller lived all of their lives together on the land mentioned above. Very little is known of their activities. Not even a Bible Record has been found with the birth dates of their children. Ten were living when he made his will, and there were no heirs of deceased sons or daughters. If there were other children, they died before Dec. 19, 1833 and left no heirs. In order to name their children, the will of Zachariah Fuller is recorded here.

ZACHARIAH FULLER'S WILL

D.8. 1, p. 260, Pitts. Co., Va.

I, Zachariah Fuller, of Pittsylvania County and State of Virginia do hereby make my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all other or former Wills by me heretofore made.

1st. My will and desire is that my Just debts be paid.

2nd. I give to Solomon Fuller and Isreal O. Fuller in trust the two following slaves, Simon a man and Rachel a woman for the benefit of my daughter Elizabeth Aron, which two negroes I wish to be hired out and the proceeds thereof to be annually paid over to her. It may be at the decression (?) of the above named Trustees either to hire out Rachel or deliver her to my Said Daughter Elizabeth as they may think most advisable, in the event that my Daughter aforesaid should outlive her present Husband in that case I wish the above named negroes to be delivered. (?) her in order that she might do with them as She thought proper, but in the event that her husband Isaac Arnn should outlive her, in that case immediately after her decease it is my Will and desire that the said Solomon Fuller and Israel Fuller do Sell the

above named negroes Simon and Rachel and divide equally the proceeds thereof among the children of the Said Elizabeth Aron.

3rd. I give to my son Brittain Fuller Two Hundred acres of land which $\bar{\mathbf{I}}$ conveyed to him by deed.

4th. I give to my daughter Polly Brooks one negro girl named Silvay which I formerly delivered to her.

5th. I give to my Daughter Sally Wells one negro woman named Lucy and her two youngest children To wit Amelia and Fanny.

6th. I give to my son Jesse Fuller one Tract of land Containing one Hundred and forty acres which I have conveyed to him by Deed.

7th. I give to my Daughter Susanna Hubbard one negro man named Edmund.

8th. I give to my son Solomon Fuller One Tract of Land containing One hundred and thirty nine acres which I have conveyed to him by deed.

9th. I give to my Daughter Anna Dunn one negro girl named Nutty.

10th. I give to my Son Jonathan Fuller one negro man named Peter.

11th. I give to my Son Absolom Fuller one Hundred and forty nine acres of Land which I have conveyed to him by Deed.

12th. It is my will and desire that after my decease the residue or balance of my Estate Shall be Sold and the proceeds thereof equally divided among my following Sons and Daughters to wit: Brittain Fuller, Polly Brooks, Jesse Fuller, Anna Dunn, Jonathan Fuller & Absalom Fuller.

13th. I hereby constitute and appoint my Son Solomon Fuller Executor of this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all other or former Wills by me heretofore made. In witness whereof I have hereunto Set my hand and Seal this 19th day of December 1833.

At a Court held for Pittsylvania County by the 20th day of January 1834 this last Will and Testament of Zachariah Fuller Decsd was presented in Court and proved by the oaths of Jabez Smith, Zachariah Fuller and Kensey Marlow three subscribing witnesses and ordered to be Recorded and on motion of Solomon Fuller the executor therein named who made oath thereto according to Law & together with Timothy Fuller and Jabez Smith his Securities entered into and acknowledged Bond in the penalty of Ten Thousand dollars Conditioned as the Law decides Certificate was granted him for obtaining probat of Said Will in due form.

See Will Book 1 (1814-1846) Pitts. Co., Va., p. 260. There are only 31 days between the date and probate of this will. Zachariah Fuller made his mark in signing his will. This indicates he was a sick man. Through the years he signed his name to other documents. He signed his name when others had to make their mark. This is said here to let those who see this know that he could read and write. It will be seen elsewhere later that Zachariah Fuller Jr. and Israel Fuller, who witnessed his deed, were the sons of Zachariah Fuller's brother, Brittain Fuller. These brothers did not name a son for themselves, but each named a son for his brother. Another matter observed is that his wife was deceased when he made his will and this has been observed as true in other ways. The will shows he had five living sons and five daughters. To four of his sons, he willed 628 acres of land and to the fifth son, he gave a slave. This slave may have been even more valuable than

either tract of land he gave the other sons. He named 9 slaves and gave all but 1 to his 5 daughters. It is also seen that he did not separate the children from their mother, and the daughter, Mrs. Joseph Wells, received a more valuable gift than the 3 sisters who were given one servant. Same was true of Mrs. Isaac Aron's gift of two servants. But these two daughters do not share in the proceeds of the sale of the residue after Just Debts are paid. It may be of interest that the trustees designated to manage Elizabeth's 2 slaves were Solomon, her brother, and Israel Fuller, her cousin, who had married Elizabeth Aron's daughter and both were in a position to hire out the 2 slaves for the welfare of Elizabeth (Fuller) Aron.

It may be of interest to some to know of the land transactions of Zachariah Fuller. His first land, a deed from his father of 200 acres on July 23, 1777, has been mentioned (D.B. 4, p. 380, Pitts. Co., Va.). Zachariah and Lettice Fuller deeded son Jesse 150 acres on westside of Turkey Cocke Creeke on April 9, 1817. Recorded April 21, 1817. (D.B. 20, p. 431). On the same date, Zachariah and Lettice Fuller, also Briton and Nancy Fuller, deeded Solomon Fuller 139 acres on the east-side of Turkey Cocke Creek. This was also recorded on the same date as the above deed. (D.B. 20, p. 433) A third deed was dated April 9, 1817 by Zachariah and Lettice Fuller to Brittain Fuller Sr. for 51 acres, signed and recorded on April 21, 1817. (D.B. 20, p. 435). Explanation of this third deed is that 51 acres was exchanged for land in the third deed above.

There is a deed for 250 acres of land on Turkey Cock Creek sold on Aug. 21, 1810 by John Cook of Montgomery County to Zachariah Fuller of Pittsylvania Co., Va. and recorded on Oct. 15, 1810. (D.B. 17, Pitts. Co., Va., p. 170).

Then on Aug. 16, 1830, Zachariah Fuller deeded to his son, Absalom Fuller, 149 acres. (D.B. 32, p. 27, Pitts. Co., Va.). This deed was made after the death of his wife, Lettice Fuller.

Zachariah Fuller received a deed dated April 3, 1815 for 200 acres of land in Franklin Co., Va. from Robert Innes of that same county. Land was on Good Creek. Recorded D.B. 7, Franklin Co., Va., p. 345. Five years later. Zachariah Fuller and Letty Fuller, on July 10, 1820, sold this land to Thomas Dunn Sr. of Franklin Co., Va. This deed was signed by Zachariah Fuller and Letty Fuller made her mark. The deed was recorded Jan. 1, 1821. (D.B. 9, Franklin Co., Va., p.223). Thomas Dunn Sr. was their son-in-law, the husband of Anna Fuller Dunn. This may not be everything, but it shows he was an aggressive man and interested in the welfare of his children in a constructive, substantial way. In this there is evidence of desire to settle their children on lands near to them.

The dates for Zachariah Fuller are estimated 8. ca. 1752 in N.C., D. ca. Jan. 1834. Letty Fuller 8. ?, D. ca. 1830. The children of Zachariah and Letty Fuller were all born on their father's land on Turkey Cocke Creek near Callands, Va. Since there is no Bible Record to guide, they are listed in the order they were named in their father's will.

MARRIAGES

ELIZABETH FULLER

Elizabeth Fuller, the daughter of Zachariah and Letty Fuller, seems to be the oldest child. She was the first to be married. On Dec. 24, 1802, a marriage license was issued to Isaac Aaron (Arnn) to marry Elizabeth Fuller, the daughter of Zachariah Fuller. (Pitts. Co., Va. Marriage Reg., p. 32). Joseph Fuller, the husband of Isaac Arnn's sister, Susanna (Arnn) Fuller, was his surety. He was also the Uncle of Elizabeth Fuller. Isaac Aron was the son of Abraham Arnn. Their children: (See full record pp. 217, 428.)

- i. Mary Ann Arnn (called Polly), mar. Israel Fuller, son of Brittain Fuller. (See Brittain Fuller's section).
- ii. Isaac Arnn Jr., He mar. Mary Clay Fuller, the daughter of Timothy Fuller, the son of Brittain Fuller. They had 1 child, Isaac Clay Arnn, b. Dec. 3, 1844. Isaac Arnn died soon after his marriage. This son grew up in his grandfather, Timothy Fuller's home. He mar. Mary Ann Hubbard, the daughter of John Fuller Hubbard. Their descendants are recorded in that section.

BRITTAIN FULLER

Brittain Fuller, the son of Zachariah and Letty Fuller, was named for Zachariah's brother, Brittain Fuller. He was issued on Oct. 14, 1816 a license to marry Sarah Clark. Rev. James Beck performed their wedding ceremony on Oct. 15, 1816, according to the Minister's Returns, p. 60. John M. Hank was surety and Sally signed her consent. Almost no details of their lives are known. From the following transactions found in Court Records, some, if not all of their children, may be determined. First, a deed of gift bears the date Sept. 20, 1838, recorded on Oct. 1, 1838, in which Brittain Fuller named three sons, viz: (1) William Brittain Fuller; (2) John Thomas Fuller; (3) James Richeson Fuller. (See D.B. 42, Pitts. Co., Va., p. 2).

Then in Franklin Co., Va., a deed from Adam Law and his wife, Elizabeth, to Britain Fuller for 146 acres in Franklin Co., Va., is dated Feb. 21, 1839 and recorded July 1, 1839. (See D.B. 16, Franklin Co., Va., p. 82). From the following will, it is learned that Brittain and Sarah (Clark) Fuller moved to Franklin Co., Va. The following abstract of James Richeson Fuller's will, dated May 2, 1862, was recorded Nov. 3, 1862 in W.B. 12, Franklin Co.. Va., p. 316, proves he was killed in the War Between the States, soon after he entered the Service. This will left everything he owned to his brother, John T. Fuller. If his brother was killed also, he disposed of his estate as follows: 1/3 he bequeathed to Samuel B. Young, the son of Joseph Young; 1/3 to two sons of Silas W. Eanes by his sister, Nancy L. Eanes, deceased; 1/3 to Ferracy (?) A. Fuller, daughter of sister Patsy Fuller. This indicates that Brittain and Sarah (Clark) Fuller had the following 3 daughters:

- Fuller who married Joseph R. Young and had a son named Samuel B. Young.
- ii. Nancy L. Fuller, who married Silas W. Eanes and they had two sons.
- iii. Patsy Fuller, who married a Fuller and had a daughter, Ferracy A. Fuller.

Herein is evidence of at least three sons and three daughters who were children of Brittain and Sarah (Clark) Fuller. They were:

- i. William Brittain Fuller
- ii. John Thomas Fuller

- iii. James Richeson Fuller, killed in the Civil War.
- iv. ____ Fuller, who mar. Joseph R. Young.
- v. Nancy L. Fuller, who mar. Silas W. Eanes.
- vi. Patsy Fuller, who mar. a Mr. Fuller.

MARY (POLLY) FULLER

On Dec. 4, 1806 a marriage license was issued to Leonard Brooks and Polly Fuller. Zachariah Fuller gave consent for himself and for Letty, for this marriage.

Polly Fuller was the daughter of Zachariah and Letty Fuller. In the Pittsylvania Marriage Register, under Minister's Returns, p. 40, Rev. William Blair reported the marriage of Leonard Brooks and Polly Fuller, the daughter of Zachariah Fuller. Her brother, Brittain Fuller, was surety. They were married on Dec. 11, 1806. No other data was found.

JESSE FULLER

Jesse Fuller was the son of Zachariah and Letty Fuller. He was born and reared on his father's estate on Turkey Cock Creek near Callands, Va. His birthdate is unknown. The deed his parents dated April 9, 1817 for their son, Jesse Fuller, indicates he was 21 or more years old at that time. He was born around or prior to 1795, can be assumed. Furthermore, he was mature enough to serve in the War of 1812. He was a soldier under Captain Calland. (See History of Pittsylvania Co., Va. by M.C. Clement, p. 214).

The War of 1812 was over and there was issued a marriage license on Jan. 10, 1818 to Jesse Fuller and Polly Hundley. On page 66, Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage Returns, Rev. James Beck reports the marriage on Jan. 13, 1818 of Jesse Fuller and Polly Hundley. William Hundley was bondsman. Polly Hundley was named Mary Hundley and her name is found as Mary on other records. Her father, Caleb Hundley, married Sarah Walker, the daughter of Joseph Walker.

Jesse Fuller did not live to be an old man. His will is recorded in Will Book 1, Pitts. Co., Va. (1767-1948), p. 286. It is dated June 15, 1828, but was not recorded until 1835. He named his wife, Polly Fuller. His children named were:

- i. Louisa W. Fuller
- ii. Solomon Fuller, age 30 (1850 census), b. 1820.
- iii. Camilla J. Fuller

MARRIAGES

The Pittsylvania Marriage Register and Minister's Returns gives the following facts and all were married after the dacease of their father, Jesse Fuller.

LOUISA W. FULLER

On Jan. 6, 1836, Louisa W. Fuller and Richard P. Breedlove were married. Charles Hundley was bondsman and Mary Fuller was her mother. Rev. Nathan Anderson performed their wedding ceremony. No other facts are known.

CAMILLA J. FULLER

On Oct. 16, 1837, Camilla J. Fuller and Josiah C. Butcher were married. Rev. Nathan Anderson married them. Charles Hundley was bondsman and her mother was recorded as Mary Fuller.

SOLOMON FULLER

(Son of Jesse and Polly (Hundley) Fuller)

In the same Marriage Register, page 127, Rev. Samuel I. Spotts reports the marriage ceremony on Dec. 10, 1842 of Solomon Fuller and Nancy Hines. Henry D. Hines was bondsman.

Turning to the 1850 census for Pittsylvania Co., Va., Solomon Fuller is recorded as a farmer, owning real estate valued at \$1,200. His family is recorded as follows:

Solomon Fuller, age 30, therefore b. 1820, farmer worth \$1200.

Walter L. Fuller was recalled in 1974 as a brother of Mary Fuller Inman. His name may have been the above illegible name in the 1870 census. According to the three census records, Solomon Fuller was 50 years old and Nancy, his wife, was 45 in 1870. They were the parents of eleven known children, according to three census records. Solomon was around 22 years of age when he married and Nancy Hines was a girl around 16 years of age. Her father,

Hines, was deceased. Her mother, Nancy Hines, gave consent to her marriage, as recorded above.

The compiler could not do the research on the marriages of Solomon and Nancy (Hines) Fuller's children that follow. They are included, based on memory and if correct, may be checked for accurate details:

ANNA FULLER

Anna Fuller, the daughter of Zachariah and Letty Fuller. A marriage license was issued on Dec. 15, 1815 to Thomas Dunn to marry Anna Fuller, the daughter of Zachariah Fuller. James Pearson was surety. (p. 58, Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg.) No other data secured, except her parent's deed, mentioned above to Thomas Dunn.

SUSANNA FULLER

1792-1876

Susanna Fuller, born in 1792, was the daughter of Zacharia and Letty Fuller. The marriage Register of Pittsylvania Co., Va. shows a license issued to Hezekiah Hubbard and Susannah on Dec. 5, 1817 and that Rev. James Beck married Hezekiah Hubbard and Susanna Fuller on Dec. 16, 1817, p. 63. Her brother, Jesse Fuller, was surety. She was around 25 years of age and in less than 5 years she was a widow with 3 small sons. Their children were:

- i. John Fuller Hubbard, b. Aug. 18, 1818, d. Aug. 12, 1888.
- ii. Franklin Clement Hubbard, b. Sept. 1819, d. Sept. 18, 1897.
- iii. Augustin Fuller Hubbard, b. July 3, 1821, d. Aug. 4, 1858.

Susanna (Fuller) Hubbard was a widow 54 years. She lived on her husband's plantation and reared her 3 sons to be worthy men. They were given an education that enabled them to carry on their own business and the youngest son taught school, will be mentioned elsewhere. Susanna Fuller, herself, may have been one of their real teachers. She was recalled as a writer of excellent letters. The compiler was informed of this and that her Georgia relatives treasured her unusual letters and had preserved some of them. Beautiful letters, and never a misspelled word. The great granddaughter, who owned these letters, was delighted at the idea of including some of them in this record. Unfortunately, when she went to send them, they were gone. In some way, they were accidentally lost. These letters were written between 1850 and 1876 to her son Augustine, and to his wife, Julia, who was a daughter of her brother, Solomon Fuller. Some were to her brothers, Solomon and Jonathan Fuller and families. These letters would not only be of interest today, if they had been included, but of unusual value as an example of the education she acquired in a time when the educational advantages for girls and boys were meager.

Two of her sons married first cousins, daughters of one of her brothers, it will be seen later.

The Death Register, Pittsylvania Co., Va. records the death of Susanna (Fuller) Hubbard as on April 1, 1876. It states she was the daughter of Zachariah and Letty Fuller and consort of Hezekiah Hubbard. She was loved by all her people.

The marriage data and the descendants of their three sons are recorded in the Hubbard section of this record, pp. 130-153 ff.

ABSALOM FULLER

Absalom Fuller, the son of Zachariah and Letty Fuller, according to the 1860 census, he was born in 1801 and his inventory was made in 1866. He went to sleep one evening and did not awaken the next morning. He was born on his father's lands and lived all of his life on the Fuller lands along the Turkey Cocke Creek near Callands. Pitts. Co., Va. He learned farming and

was a farmer all of his life.

Absalom Fuller was issued a license to marry Nancy Preston Robertson on Sept. 28, 1826. Israel Fuller, his cousin, was his surety. She was the daughter of Christopher Thomas Robertson Jr., who consented. (Mar. Reg. Pitts. Co., Va., p. 85). Her mother was Sally Petty, the daughter of Davis Petty. She was born Jan. 8, 1794 and died Oct. 29, 1853. For proof, see the will of Christopher Thomas Robertson, probated in 1849, Pitts. Co., Va. Absalom Fuller served as bondsman in the sum of \$6,000.00 for the executors of this will, who were his brothers-in-law, viz: John E. Robertson and Thompson R. Robertson. On a deed dated Dec. 3, 1859, Absalom Fuller and Nancy, his wife, signed as heirs of Christopher Robertson, deceased, of the first part and James L. Robertson, the second part. (D.B. 59, Pitts. Co., Va., p. 356) The deed was recorded Aug. 2, 1860.

That same year on Oct. 16, 1926, Absalom Fuller qualified as Constable and he served in this capacity for many years. (See D.8. 39, pp. 144, 145; D.8. 41, p. 205). Today there seems to be no Bible record for Absalom and Nancy Preston (Robertson) Fuller's family. Turning to the 1860 census, Absalom Fuller of Callands, Virginia and family are recorded as follows: Absalom Fuller, a farmer, owned real estate valued at 5,000 dollars and his personal estate at 2,000 dollars in 1860. He was 59 years old. therefore b. in 1801. His wife, Nanny P., was 57 years old and b. in 1803. Their children were:

- i. Sarah Letitia Fuller, age 27 and b. 1833, was not in the home in 1860. See later.
- ii. Martha Fuller, d. young, not on 1850 census.
- iii. Mary Fuller, d. young, not on 1850 census.

MARRIAGES AND A FEW FACTS

SARAH LETITIA FULLER

Sarah Letitia Fuller, born 1831, married her first cousin, Franklin Clement Hubbard. His marriage license was dated June 4, 1855. The Minister's Returns, p. 160, reported it and dated the report July 8, 1855. Their data is recorded in the Hubbard section.

WADDY T. FULLER

He was working on his father's farm in 1860 and was 19 years old. If T. was for Thomas, it was known that Thomas Fuller never married.

HENRY C. FULLER

Henry C. Fuller was killed in the War Between the States. According to the Pitts. Co., Va. Death Reg., he died Aug. 5, 1862. He never married.

LOUISA E. FULLER

Louisa's name has been said to be Louisa Eliza Fuller. If so, the following is her data. Louisa Eliza Fuller, born July 12, 1844, the daughter of Absalom and Nancy Preston (Robertson) Fuller, married on Sept. 20, 1866 James William Allen born Jan. 24, 1838, Pittsylvania Co., Va., died Jan. 20, 1913. Their children were:

- i. William Otey Allen, b. March 30, 1868. (See his data in the Hubbard section. He mar. Grace Arnn.
- ii. Elva Allen, mar. Bud Evans. Their children were: (1) Alma Evans;(2) Lois Evans.

- iv. Emie Allen, mar. George Farthing and had 4 children.
- v. Charles Allen (Charlie), mar. Mary Farthing. They had several children.

- vii. Mary Emma Allen, mar. Thomas R. Reynolds. They had 1 child, but name was not included.

WILLIAM L. FULLER

He was 24 years old and single in 1860. His family information is that he married Fannie Guerrant and their children were:

- i. Frank Fuller
- ii. Sarah Fuller (Sally), who mar. Thomas Overby.

MADISON MONROE FULLER

He served in Troop E. 6th Virginia Cavalry, Confederate States Army. (See Muster Roll (1861-1865) Pitts. Co., Va., p. 8). He married Sarah Robertson (Sallie). They had one son but the name was not given.

GEORGE C. FULLER

George C. Fuller, born 1849, was the son of Absalom and Nancy Preston (Robertson) Fuller. He married Agnes Crawford. They had three children.

The above data was given by relatives. It is not verified, but included as given.

SARAH FULLER

Sarah Fuller, called Sallie, was a daughter of Zachariah and Letty Fuller. According to the 1860 census, she was born in 1785 near Callands, Virginia on her father's farm near Turkey Cocke Creek. A marriage license was issued on Dec. 19, 1808 to Joseph Wells and Sally Fuller. The Marriage Register of Pittsylvania Co., Va., p. 45, shows that Rev. William Blair, on Dec. 22, 1808, performed the wedding ceremony for Joseph Wells and Sarah Fuller, the daughter of Zachariah Fuller and Letty Fuller, who gave consent. Leonard Brooks served as bondsman. He was a brother-in-law to Sarah Fuller. She was around 23 years old. He was a great deal older, if he was truly around 100 years of age when he passed away prior to 1860. No Bible or family record has been found. The 1860 census for Pittsylvania Co., taken July 21, 1860 at Swansonville, shows as follows and proves that Joseph died prior to 1860. Sally Wells, a farmer, was 75 years old and therefore born around 1785.

Her real estate was evaluated at 500 dollars, but her personal property was rated at 4,000 dollars. In her home was her son, John D. Wells, a farmer. He was 40 years old, therefore born in 1820. Mary E. Wells, his wife, age 33, was born in 1827 and their children were:

- a. Matilda B. Wells, age 10, b. in 1850.
- b. Sarah E. Wells, age 8, b. in 1852.
- c. Henry C. Wells, age 4, b. in 1856.
- d. Oliver W. Wells, age 10 months around July 21, 1860. He was bein Oct. 1859.

This enumeration was on July 21, 1860. Other known children of Joseph and Sarah (Fuller) Wells are:

- ii. Tabatha Wells, who never married.
- iii. Matthew Wells, who was called Matt. Data follows.
 - iv. Matilda C. Wells, data follows.
 - v. Sarah Wells, no facts given.

MATTHEW WELLS

The following data was sent by a relative, based on memory of names. No other facts. There was no opportunity to verify the following statements. Those interested can use court and census records to chack this family, if there are no family records to guide them. Matthew Wells, called Matt, was the son of Joseph and Sarah Fuller Wells. She was always called Sally. Matthew Wells married Mary Shorter and they had eleven children as follows:

- vi. Charles W. Wells. He lived at Callands, Va.

William Wells, Sarah (Wells) Mott and Minnie (Wells) Graveley were deceased prior to 1929.

MATILDA C. WELLS

Matilda C. Wells, the daughter of Joseph and Sarah (Fuller) Wells, was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and died there near Callands, Virginia, but the dates are unknown. On Dec. 30, 1830, Wilson Parrish was issued a license to marry Matilda C. Wells. He was born Oct. 7, 1809 near Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va. He was the son of Abraham Parrish, who married on Dec. 19, 1808 Susanna Riddle, the widow of John Riddle. See Parrish data. He was known as Capt. Wilson Parrish and certainly was active in the local militia. He served in the Mexican War, but was too young to be Captain at that time. The following letter was shared with the compiler many years ago by Mrs. E.L. Parrish of Newport News, Va. It was published in 1875 or 1877, but the newspaper was not named. Its publication had been requested because of its interest to many old Confederate soldiers living at that time. It is included here because it was written to Captain Wilson Parrish and John, of whom Capt. John R. Cabell speaks, is John Parrish, the son of Capt. Wilson Parrish. There is

another regret, and that is that the year was not included in the date of this letter. History, however, determines the date was in October, after the battle of Manassas on July 21, 1861.

Camp near Centreville Fairfax Ct. Oct. the 1st.

Capt. Wilson Parrish

Dear Sir:

I have been intending to write you a note giving you an account of myself and my better half (I mean my Company) from the time of our departure from Callands Town to the present time. You know the history up to the time of our departure from Danville and our tarry in Richmond, from the latter place we were ordered to Winchester to reinforce the Army of the Shenandoah then under the command of Gen'l Johnson and who was threatened with overwhelming forces under the command of Patterson, the Yankees approached Winchester to make the attack but ascertaining that reinforcements had reached Johnson he prudently declined and suddenly retreated to Charlestown and joined his forces to McDowell's who was then on his way to attack Beauregard at Manassas. Johnson ascertaining that Patterson had retreated and reinforced McDowell put his forces in motion for Manassas to reinforce Beauregard and by a forced march joined his forces or at least the largest portion of them to Beauregard's before the fight of the 21st of July and saved the day. Our Reg. unfortunately did not reach the ground until the fight was over, a rascally conductor upon the road having run the train that was to have carried us on, off the track and bursted up things generally. Since that time we have been stationed part of the time upon Bull Run and part upon Broad Run and now we are at Centreville; in the morning the Regiment leaves for picket duty with orders to go down from Fairfax Court House about four miles where the enemy is said to be in large force. We shall have an opportunity of seeing a live yankey and trying the range of our guns. The pickets have a fight daily and of course we shall have our turn. The boys are in high glee at the prospect for sport and I think we will be able to give a good account of ourselves. My Company has been heavily afflicted with sickness but thank God we are upon gaining ground and all of my men present will be able for duty in a short while except three or four. T. Dakes is rather the worst off and he is decidedly improving. David Herndon has been quite ill but he is beginning to walk about and so has Bill Gipson who is likewise walking about. Ralph Shelton has relapsed within a few days from over eating and I can't say how sick he will be. My men are all satisfied and well pleased with their Captain so far and he with his men. I am certain thay would not exchange me for any living man, and to show you that I do not want to leave them I have only to tell you that I have been offered promotion twice to the Rank of Major with high pay but would not accept and only because my Company was unwilling to give me up. John has been a first rate soldier - he has never flinched from duty, has enjoyed first rate health and is very popular among the men and with all is amongst the strongest men in camp.

Give my respects to all the neighbors and friends and to Mrs. Parrish and tell her that I have taken good care of John and shall continue to do so. In haste.

Your friend John R. Cabell

Wilson Parrish and family were certainly involved in the War Between the States in that two sons served as soldiers and others may have served, since the data that follows does not include all their children. Tradition says there were 9 children and all were born near Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va. No Bible record was found. The following is from a study of census records. This family record was sent by others.

WILSON PARRISH

Wilson Parrish, born Oct. 7, 1809 near Callands, Va., died there in 1883. He married on Dec. 30, 1830 Matilda C. Wells, born Aug. 23, 1812. (See Sarah Fuller Wells section for ancestors). She was born and died in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Their children, all born near Callands, Va., were:

- i. Joseph Madison Parrish, b. June 14, 1832, d. July 18, 1897. Data follows.
- ii. Susanna Parrish (Susan), married Jan. 6, 1853 Thomas Mays.
- iii. Perkins Parrish, married. He was killed during the War Between the States. The only fact recalled was that he was the grandfather of Mrs. Howard Dodson, who in 1952, resided on West Main Street, Danville, Va.
 - iv. Abraham P. Parrish, age 20, b. 1840, was at home working on the farm. (1860 census).
 - v. John Wilson Parrish, age 18, b. 1842, was at home working on the farm (1860 census). He was a soldier in the War Between the States. In the letter included, it is seen that he was in Capt. John R. Cabell's Company and a desirable soldier. His last residence was in Bakersfield, Calif. (Continued on p. 603.)
- vi. James Parrish, age 15, b. 1845 (1860 census). d. a young man.

JONATHAN FULLER

Jonathan Fuller, the son of Zachariah and Letty Fuller, grew up on his father's farm on Turkey Cocke Creek in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Tradition claimed he was older than his sister, Susanna Fuller, who was born in 1792. The 1850 census in Georgia will help determine his age. They moved to that state prior to that U.S. Census enumeration in Virginia. It is not included here, since it was not available to the compiler at the time of writing.

A marriage license was issued on Jan. 26, 1827 to Jonathan Fuller to marry Mourning Nuckols. (See Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 88). She is the daughter of Josiah Nuckols who married Milly Weatherford. Levi Nuckols was surety. They resided in the same county. Her father died ca. 1819, according to the probate of his will, recorded in Pittsylvania Court House, Chatham, Va. A recent book has been published for her ancestors and kindred. She grew up on her father's farm near Callands, Va. After their marriage, they lived in the Callands, Va. neighborhood for more than 20 years. When the seventeen families from that section of Pittsylvania County went from Virginia to Georgia, Jonathan Fuller's family was among them. They all settled near each other and were known as the "Little Virginia Colony" in Georgia. Jonathan Fuller was a farmer. They belonged to the Baptist denomination and tradition says they were devout Christians. Mourning, called "Monin", is said to have been sincere and very sure always of her religious belief. She had discussions with many on her religious ideas and they always ended with "Monin" declaring "Well, my son, my Bible don't read that way". She was always appreciated as

an alert, positive person. She was very fond of young people all of her life. She entertained them often with stories of unusual activities, yet ended each with something funny. She was loved by everyone who knew her. Jonathan left her a widow, and the last years of her life, she spent visiting, from time to time, in the homes of her children. It was never possible to secure the family record from the descendants of Jonathan and Mourning (Nuckols) Fuller. It is said that they had a large family, but those who tried to recall them, were not able to give any details with accuracy, so the following is written, hoping that not one of them has been omitted. Time passes and we forget. Lest all be forgotten, what was remembered is here recorded. Several of their children died. Some were born in Virginia and some in Georgia. They were:

- i. Benjamin Clay Fuller, He married and had children and grandchildren. Of his grandchildren, Dessa Fuller was one.
- ii. Thomas Oliver Fuller, He married and has descendants. One great, great granddaughter lived in Carrolton, Ga. Given name said to be Ollie.

One memory was that 5 children died. The above is based on the memory of others. Their parents were Primitive Baptist believers.

MAURICE SOLOMON FULLER B. ca. 1795 - D. 1858

Maurice Solomon Fuller, the son of Zachariah and Letty Fuller, was born around 1795 on his father's farm on Turkey Cocke Creek near Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va. and he was reared there. He was active in the militia in his vicinity with marked success. He was Lieutenant in a Company Dec. 21, 1818. (See O.B. Vol. 19, p. 218). On Sept. 20, 1819, he was qualified as Captain in the militia. (See O.B. 20, p. 182, Pitts. Co., Va.).

Around two years earlier, on April 21, 1819, his parents deeded to their son, Solomon Fuller, 139 acres of land on the east side of Turkey Cocke Creek (See D.B. 20, p. 433). On this plantation, Solomon Fuller established his home and lived there until sometime in the year 1849.

On Nov. 23, 1825, a marriage license was issued to Captain Solomon Fuller and Nancy O. Harris; her brother signed the marriage bond; refer p. 584. (See Mar. Reg. Pitts. Co., Va., p. 83). Her full name was Nancy Overton Harris. She was the daughter of Samuel Harris II who married on Dec. 1, 1791 Nancy Overton, the daughter of William Overton. (See Charlotte Co., Va. Mar. Reg.) Samuel Harris II was the son of Samuel Harris I. (See Rev. C.F. Leek's History Pitts. Baptist Association, p. 87). For more details, see Harris Family in this study. See pp. 581, 582.

After Solomon and Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller had resided on the above plantation for 24 years and were the parents of thirteen children, they decided to go to Georgia to live. In a deed dated Oct. 30, 1849, they sold their estate to Joseph Bernard of Franklin Co., Va. This deed was recorded May 20, 1850. (D.B. 52, p. 268). Prior to this, and by estimate, their second child, a little girl, died in Virginia and was interred in the Fuller graveyard. No Bible Record has been located for this family. They arrived in Georgia late in the fall of 1849 and the 1850 census of Cherokee Co., Ga. verifies that Solomon and Nancy Fuller and twelve children were natives of

Virginia. Each of these 14 were born in Pittaylvania Co., Ve. This census states that Solomon Fuller, age 55, and therefore born in 1795. Nancy Harris Fuller was 42 years old and born in 1808. The compiler observed that the ages on these children were 2 years apart except Samuel, born 1826, the oldest, and Mary, the third born in 1830, and so estimates that the little girl who died was born in 1828. The names of 2 children are not found in the 1850 U.S. Census for Cherokes County, Georgie. Solomon Fuller's Will is on p. . bld

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Mary Harris Fuller, born 1828, was married in Virginia before they moved to Georgie. See later. The deceased daughter was also not in the home. The compiler is indebted to Mise Kate Cooley, Atlanta, Georgie, for the information in that census. Through this, the deceased child can be placed, since there were 16 children in their family. Since then, correct dates of birth have been secured for 11 of the 14 who lived to be adults. Many have co-operated in this effort. John Franklin Fullar also contributed correct birth dates for his father's family and also for some of his grandfather, Solomon fuller's family. The results are recorded later.

It is normal to ask "Why did this family move to Georgia?". It is an interesting story and fortunately can be told in the words of a great grand-daughter of Solomon and Nancy (Harris) Fuller. She knew personally many of those who made the long journey from Pitteylvania Co., Va. to establish in Georgia "The Little Virginia" colony in the Salacoa Vallay, which was located in the north west corner of Cherokes County. She is Mrs. Ethel Hubberd Newman of Ringgold, Georgia, ege 82 in 1965, when she wrote the following account. At that time, three of Solomon and Nancy (Harris) Fuller's grand daughters were still living. They were Mrs. W.F. Dew of Calhoun, Georgia, age 97 years, Mrs. D.L.Dorrah of Feirmount, Georgia, 95 years ald and Mrs. Lula Mahan Adair of Cartersville, Georgia, age 92 years. These 4 have been very close, one to the other, and have known personally the original settlers of the Little Virginia Colony in Salacoa Valley, Georgia.

first it is in order to tell the pioneer story. In Virginia, an over production of Tobacco had come, in the 1840's. This encouraged a desire for change. Samuel Overton Fuller, the oldest son of Maurice Solomon and Nancy (Harris) Fuller, had pessed his 21st birthday around 1847. His first cousin, Augustin Fuller Hubbard, the son of his Uncle Hexekiah and Susemmah (Fuller) Hubbard, was around 26 years of age and a young neighbor, Chrispin Mitchell, the brother of Augustin Hubbard's sister-in-law, Mrs. John Fuller Hubbard, went together to Georgia around 1847 to test their success in growing tobacco there. These 3 young men went to Madison Co., Georgia, equiped to raise tobacco. Just what that equipment included cannot be stated, but perhaps the most important person for the make of their welfers and success was their old

slave woman and her family. She was an excellent old time cook who could cope with primitive methods in preparing meals. These young men, she had known all of their lives; they were her master's family folk. She saw to it that they had three well cooked meals every day, clean clothes to wear and other normal comforts. And they succeeded.

Every neighbor and all kindred in Pittsylvania Co., Va. showed their interest in their trial at tobacco growing in Georgia. Today it seems they returned in 1848 and made a second crop. Thomas Hutchinson, a slave dealer from Pittsylvania Co., Va., was in Georgia that summer on business. To satisfy his curiosity, he went by to see them. In fact, he was wondering just what those "young fellows" were accomplishing. He was so delighted with their results that he lost no time in acquiring land in Georgia. Returning to Pittsylvania County, he gave a glowing account of their fine crop of tobacco. This added enthusiasm to the desires of many who longed for "greener pastures". The pioneering spirit of their forefathers was awakened in the hearts of older men as well as in the younger ones.

It seems today that the successful crops these young men made convinced seventeen families in that vicinity of Virginia that it was desirable and wise to move to Georgia. These young men blazed the trail and in the fall of 1849, an exodus of 17 families in one caravan, after 6 weeks of travel, came to Salacoa Valley in Georgia, and there established "The Little Virginia Colony". Some were in Cherokee County and some were in Cass County, Georgia, but the County Line did not separate the families. They were a united colony. The historian claims that Col. Pritchett, Thomas Jefferson, The Hutchersons, George W. Jefferson, D.W. Furquson, The Templetons, David, Calvin and Joseph Mahan, settled across the Cherokee Line. Across the County Line in Cass Co., Bartow Co. today, the other families, Solomon Fuller, Jonathan Fuller, Obadiah Taylor Jr., James and Vaden Riddle, Augustine F. Hubbard, Capt. John Patton, Dr. Uren, Dr. Young, William Mahan and 4 sons, the Graveleys and the Presleys, settled. Mrs. Ethel Newman spoke of them as "Little Virginia" and they seem to be members of a community family. In her own words as follows: "The Virginia families who came to Ga. in the 1840's. George W. Jefferson whose wife was a Dent. Abner Jefferson, single married a Ga. girl, Roxanna Roberts. John Garland Jefferson's wife not recalled. Thomas Hutcheson's wife, Susie Dickerson. Captain Taylor's wife was a Riddle. Solomon Fuller's wife, Nancy Harris. John Fuller's wife, Mourning Nuckols, John Patton's wife, a Harris, the sister of Nancy (Harris) Fuller. Billie Mahan, a widower & 4 sons, two married, 2 single, Thompson Mahan, wife Nettie Reynolds and Rebecca Reynolds her twin sister was wife of Dave Mahan. Coleman Mahans's wife was Susan Fuller the great aunt of Mrs. Ethel Newman. Coleman died in Civil War. Joe Mahan's wife, Bettie Taylor. Jim Riddle, Bro. John & sister Frances Single. Bill B. Presley Single. Tom Presley Single. Berry Graveley, Sam Graveley brothers and single.

They had a great time on this journey. They would stop on the way and rest. They were six weeks coming and had so much fun. They brought their negroes and stock. Grandfather Fuller brought 6 negroes, a mother and 5 sons. Her husband belonged to another man, I believe Captain Pritchett. She was Liza and prided herself she had only one husband and all her children had the same father and she was a lady herself. She was called Black Liza. One of their girls was named Eliza Fuller Pritchett.

The men who came here single, most of them married in "The Little Virginia Colony". Their descendants still, down to the 5th generation, cling to each other." In the above narration, one truly perceives that there was a closeness through the years which she speaks of as still true unto the fifth generation. The compiler therefore feels that Ethel (Hubbard) Newman's memories

of these facts are valuable to record. The following is her account.

Those men after providing a log cabin for their immediate protection went to work to prepare for their own first tobacco crop. Only tobacco prowers and their families can have an idea how much effort was involved in preparation for this first crop. Salacoa is the Indian name for "Big Corn" and the inhabitants had produced corn. Suddenly in the year 1850 tobacco would be the money crop of those new people in the Salacoa Valley. Temporary homes built, tobacco cultivation planned and they were succeeding so these settlers built for themselves a house of worship. This church was to serve all denominations. Mrs. Newman says that the first money contributed was ten dollars by Maurice Solomon Fuller with the request that all denominations use it. He was a Baptist. It was planned not only as the place the pastor of each Church group was to preach, but also to be used temporarily as the school house. This church was also the first school house of the Virginia Colony and her grandfather, Augustin F. Hubbard, was their first teacher. As the years passed, other churches were built for each denomination, except the Methodist Episcopal Church. This congregation has continued to worship in the original church until they erected a new second building on the same site. This building is in use today.

These people were Christian people who lived by the Ten Commandments as closely as they could. Today, most of their descendants are God loving, Church attending people and leaders in their communities. None are rich, but many are prosperous, declared Ethel Hubbard Newman.

It has proved impossible to record all their descendants, but a few facts follow. The omissions are not serious, if their names are written in the Book Of Life.

This church, built for all at first, by 1854 had an organized Methodist Denomination and came to be the Church known as Fairview Methodist Church. Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller was a strong Methodist and all of her descendants were the same.

When the war was over, the Northern Methodists attempted to take this church. Nancy Fuller got on her horse and rode a whole day to express to all her objection, and she won and Fairview Methodist Episcopal of the South progressed. It was ironical to have the new Northern Methodist edifice named "Fuller's Chapple". Of course they named it for the prominent Bishop of that era. It should be recorded here than Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller was a conscientious Methodist and her home was opened for church services and prayer meetings. She was a leader in this Methodist Church so long as she lived. It is said that Solomon Fuller, her husband, was a Baptist. He was given only a few years to live in Goergia. He passed away in 1858 and the cause of his death is unknown. He was interred on his own land in Salacoa Valley in Cherokee Co., Georgia. He left his wife, Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller, a widow with many young children to rear. She was a brave woman. With the aid of her grown sons and her faithful, devoted servants, she met the problems that came through the years, bore the vicissitudes of the War Between the States, endured the sorrows of sons killed in that war, and met the hardships of Reconstruction days with bravery. Sometime in the 1870s she went to sleep during the Christmas season and awakened in Heaven. They were the parents of sixteen children. Thirteen were born in Pittsylvania Co., Va.

SAMUEL OVERTON FULLER

Samuel Overton Fuller, born 1826 in Virginia, was the oldest child of Maurice Solomon and Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller. According to the U.S. 1850 census, Cherokee County, Georgia, he was 24 years old and born in 1826. In the narration regarding the prelude to the migration of Fuller families to the State of Georgia, it was seen that Samuel Fuller was the aggressive spirit in that experiment of growing tobacco in Georgia. He certainly gained the confidence of his parents and 16 families of their neighbors in that they sold out their possessions and went to the Salacoa Valley and established the Little Virginia Colony. His parents expressed their confidence in their son's enthusiasm over Georgia. They sold their possessions in Virginia and moved their family of 13, also 6 slaves and all their equipment for sustaining, on their son's assurance of "Greener Fields" in Georgia.

Solomon Overton Fuller had always been an ideal child, whom they named Solomon for his father and Overton for his mother. His name is of quite an historical interest to every descendant of his parents. When surnames were adopted, Fuller arose as a surname, we are told, from the fact that their occupation required the use of Fuller's earth to whiten cloth. Therefore, the name Fuller means a brighter, happier people. It is true that in the first decade of 1700, the name Solomon was in Ezekiel Fuller's family in Isle of Wight Co., Va. In this case, four generations and over 100 years later, a father named Solomon, named his first born child Solomon. In this is observed adoration of those who were formerly named Solomon Fuller. Research proves that the name Overton came into the Fuller family when his father married his mother in 1825 and he was the first Fuller descendant to possess Overton as a given name.

Nancy Overton Harris was given the full maiden name of her mother, Nancy Overton, the daughter of William Overton of Charlotte Co., Va. See marriage record of her father, Samuel Harris II.

William Overton married Judith Brumfield. (Mar. Reg. No. 1, Charlotte Co., Va., p. 16). Date was not copied. In that area of Virginia, there were many Overtons. Research indicates that this William Overton was a descendant of William Overton, born Aug. 14, 1675, or of one of his brothers, all born in Virginia. Their father, William Overton, was born in England, Dec. 3, 1638 and married Mary Waters on Nov. 20, 1670 and emigrated to Virginia.

It may also be true that Nancy Overton and Samuel Harris II were relatives, since Temperance Overton, born March 2, 1679, the sister of William, married William Harris. They had a son, Robert.

married Lucy Camp and they were the parents of Samuel Harris II who married Nancy Overton. (See footnote on p. 382.)

After Solomon Overton Fuller and Eliza Bates were married on an unknown date in the 1850's, they resided in the area of "The Virginia Colony". Ouring the War Between the States, his life was lost. His widow, with her five children, moved to Texas. The Reconstruction Days were not an easy time to rear five fatherless children. School privileges were privately supported and their advantages were limited as was true of all children. They grew up in that state, but later resided in various western states and lost contact with relatives.

A few years ago, Mrs. Eva Sue (Fuller) Hunter informed your compiler that Bartow Fuller, son of Solomon Overton Fuller, grew up in Texas. After years of endeavor and maturity, he became president of a bank in California. He evidently inherited his father's youthful aggressive characteristics. She said his son, Lon L. Fuller, who was a member of the faculty in the Law School of Harvard University, had called to see her. He seemed delighted to finally meet a Fuller relative.

Upon learning of Mrs. Hunter's contact, your compiler's disappointment in not recording the descendants of Solomon Overton Fuller had the following reaction:

"If he could see his children and their descendants all standing in a row,
We know now, that for sure, there are some whom he would care to know."

Therefore, thank Miss Kate Cooley for the names of those children, quoting: "Solomon Overton Fuller married Eliza Bates and to this union were born these children:

Nannie, ? Phenie, Francis Bartow, and Gustavus (Gus).
Francis Bartow Fuller - Born 1862; wed Mary Salome Moore.
Samuel Overton Fuller, was killed while serving with the Confederate
Army in Tennessee - No more Data on this family."

The compiler hopes that any descendant from one of the above children may with pride trace his or her lineage back to Solomon Overton Fuller and their founding forefathers of this great nation. See later, p. 386.

MARY HARRIS FULLER

Mary Harris Fuller, the daughter of Maurice Solomon and Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller, was born April 19, 1828 on her father's plantation on East Side of Turkey Cocke Creek, (D.B. 20, p. 433) near Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va. She grew up on this farm near the home of her grandparents, Zachariah and Letty Fuller, who resided on the West Side of the said Creek. Likewise, she was reared within the vicinity of the home of her maternal grandparents, Samuel Harris II and his wife, Nancy (Overton) Harris.

It is thought provoking that her parents named their second child Mary Harri's and their fifth child James Harris. This expresses appreciation of the Harris kindred. At present, no accurately documented lineage has been published, although many have done serious research. Based on the efforts your compiler has seen, the following statements are made:

1st Mary Harris Fuller. She may have been named for a great aunt. See below. 2nd Her parents are recorded above.

3rd Samuel Harris II and Nancy Overton, daughter of William Overton, were

issued a marriage license on Nov. 16, 1791, Charlotte Co., Va. Thomas Moore was his Surety. On Dec. 1, 1791, they were married by Rev. Thomas Dobmon. (Court Records)

4th Samuel Harris I, b. Jan. 12, 1724, Hanover Co., Va., mar. Lucy Camp. He died in Pittsylvania Co., Va. in 1799. His will proved Oct. 21, 1799. reveals one daughter was named Mary Harris. Mary Harris Fuller may be her name sake. She was Mrs. Buckley in 1799.

biography has been published for Rev. Samuel Harris. Mr. So far, no Semple, his contemporary in Baptist History in Va. (1810); Mrs. Clement in History of Pittsylvania Co., Va. (1929) and Rev. C.F. Leek in the Pittsylvanis Baptist Association (1963) have each told of his great activities. Even a oranite stone silently declarse, quoting: See also pages 581-582

To appraciate the life of this great man, those who read the stone and the above authors, also need to know the historical cruelty that preceded Religious Liberty. The recent moving picture, "The Baptist Heritage", includes a bit of those facts. John Leland, during that great struggle, came from New England to work with Samuel Harris in Virginis when sesking to learn the attitudes on religious liberty of the American settlers. He learned his ideals were just as great as the ideals of Samuel Harris for separation of Church and State. Without a doubt, this was a sustaining inflyance upon John Leland that enhanced his inspiration and strangthened his endeavor that enabled him to convince President James Madison that the Constitution of the United States must provide separation of Church and State. In this way, freedom to worship God was secured. So, unto the present time. Samuel Harris, by sustaining John Leland on his mission for the President, helped to secure a blessing for every living citizen in the United States of America unto the present day. 5th Robert Harris has been declared the father of Rev. Samuel Harris. Robert Harris resided in Hanover Co., Va. He was a Burgees for that Co. 1735-1745. He was a veetryman of Fredericks Hall Parish in 1752. In 1744 Louisa Co., Va. employed Robert Harris as a Surveyor. He married Mourning Glann. He died in Albemarie Co., Va. in 1765. (Will Book No. 2, p. 185) The above etstements were found but they were not documented. Major Robert Harris was declared also to be the son of William Harris and Temperance Overton. The

compiler cannot verify the above statements.

6th William Harris and Temperance Overton born March 2, 1679 have been declared the parents of Robert Harris. By estimate, he was born in the 1660's in Henrico Co., Va. William Harris had a land grant on June 16, 1714. On that date 1714 it was in Henover Co., Va. When sold in 1752, it was in Louisa Co., Va. (p. 2250 Valentine Papera).

7th William Harris was declared the son of Thomas Harris when a patent for

land in Henrico Co., Va. was granted to him on Feb. 22, 1638. (p. 1381 Valentine Papers). On May 7, 1674, Henrietta was his wife when they sold land in Henrico Co., Va. (p. 1657 & 1659, Valentine Papers). It has been said that he was born in Virginia around 1629 or earlier and that he died in 1678. It has also been claimed his son, William Harris, born in 1669, died in Hanover Co., Va. No proof given. If a Burgess 1652-1653 and Major of Militia 1656-1658, proof can be found. Gov. Berkley in 1670, sent Major William Harris in command of a group on an exploration trip in the western area of the Colony. (p. 6, Pittsylvania Co., History by Clement; also John Lederer's Diary Translations in Va. State Library).

8th Thomas Harris arrived in Virginia aboard the Prosperous in May 1611. His wife was Adria who came to Va. on the Marmaduke in 1621. Thomas Harris was born in 1587. Gentleman and subscriber to the Second Charter issued in 1609. He is listed as an "Ancient Planter". His wife was also an "Ancient Planter". It is believed she was the daughter of Edward and Ann Gurgany. It is believed her passage in 1621 was a return trip rather than her first. She was most likely his second wife. They were on the list of living settlers in Virginia on Feb. 16, 1623 after the Jamestown massacre in 1622. (p. 38, Colonial Records of Virginia 1973). The compiler feels that someone should strive to secure evidence and record it for all the above statements.

On October 1, 1849, Richard H. Cousins was issued a license to marry Mary H. Fuller, the daughter of Solomon Fuller. John R. Royall was bondsman and Nathan Anderson performed their wedding ceremony. (Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg. & Min. Ret., p. 144). They went to Georgia with the Pittsylvania citizens, among whom were her father, Solomon Fuller and family. They were among the settlers of the "Little Virginia Colony" in Salacoa Valley of Ga. in the fall of 1849. They were married in her parent's home on the Virginia plantation thirty days before her father deeded this property to Joseph Bernard of Franklin Co., Va. (D.B. 52, p. 268, Pitts. Co., Va.). The date of this deed reveals the time of the year the settlers started in the caravan to Georgia. It is assumed that this occasion was also their wedding trip. Almost nothing has been told of their home life beyond the fact that they shared in the life of the settlers. He was a tobacco farmer and when the War Between the States came, he was among the Volunteers for service in the Confederate States Army from that section of Georgia. He gave his life for his homeland during this war. He was born Feb. 16, 1827 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. His full name was Richard Henry Cousins. She died in Waco, Texas on Aug. 18, 1914, age 84 years, 4 months, and was buried there in Stanford Cemetery. She was a widow for 50 years. Their children were all born in Georgia. Only six names were sent.

C. (perhaps at Duke University) and later it is known he became a Professor of Law at the Harvard University School of Law in Cambridge, Mass. He and his first wife were the parents of:

FURTHER INFORMATION

This information for the family of Solomon Overton Fuller should have been recorded on page 381. However, since the above information was prepared for final copy and already typed, the compiler adds this information which was sent years ago to a relative of Samuel Overton Fuller more than 100 years after his death.

This letter verifies there were 3 daughters and 2 sons. One sister married a Mr. Booker. They resided in Glen Rose, Texas. They had at least one daughter and two sons. Her husband was deceased before 1936. Her family was regarded as among the earliest residents of that area. If correct about year 1936, she was perhaps more than 75 years of age. Another sister lived in Texas. The third sister lived "farther east" which can be assumed to mean out of the state, but may have meant Eastern Texas.

The son called Gus was Gustavus Fuller. He migrated to Colorado. He did not live to be an old man. At the time of his decease, he was Superintendent of a canning factory. This business was operated by Empson Packing Company in Longmont, Colorado. He married and he and his wife were the parents of two sons.

FRANCIS BARTOW FULLER

The above data sent by Miss Cooley states that Francis Bartow Fuller was born around 1862. It has been said also that he was the youngest child of Solomon Overton and Eliza Bates Fuller. Tradition claims that he was named for a Confederate States Army General.

When he was a young boy, his mother moved to Texas. His only opportunity for education was in Georgia, and he had only an elementary education. Upon arrival in Texas, he became active as a cattle assistant. He served on the "Old Chisholm Trail" from the panhandle of Texas up to Montana and back. He progressed to foreman and served as supervisor for a large ranch, namely "The British American Ranching Company". At some time in his lifetime, he and another man gave time to capturing wolves. For this service the state paid a bounty for each scalp delivered. So long as he lived, he enjoyed telling exciting stories concerning this phase of his life.

At some time Francis Bartow Fuller was elected County Clerk of Deaf Smith County, Texas. Later he was cashier of the Hereford National Bank in Hereford, Deaf Smith Co., Texas.

Around 1901 he married. The date was not stated and the bride's name was not given. Some time after he was 40 years of age, they moved to El Centro, California. His earliest interest there was sponsoring the organization of the Dixieland Realty Company. This encouraged the people in Texas to settle in California. Quite soon after he settled there, he organized the El Centro National Bank and became the president of this first bank in El Centro, California. It is said also that before he arrived, all houses had a soft covered roof. His home was the first frame house with a wooden roof.

A fatherless infant had an elementary education and became an industrious youth. He advanced through self-education and aggressiveness and lived a successful life. They were the parents of two children:

- i. Lon L. Fuller, b. in Texas in 1902.
- ii. ____ Fuller, a daughter b. i a Fl Centro, Calif. in 1906.

It is known that Lon L. Fuller married. To family data was sent. He was a member of the faculty of the Law School of Harvard University. No more facts.

JULIANA LETITIA FULLER

Juliana Letitia Fuller, b. Dec. 11, 1832 in Pittsylvania Co., Va., was the daughter of Maurice Solomon and Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller. She married in Cass Co., Ga. on Feb. 6, 1851 her cousin, Augustus fuller Hubbard, the son of her father's sister. He died on Aug. 4, 1857. She died in Fairmount, Georgia on Oct. 30, 1914. The lives and descendants are recorded in the Hubbard section of this study. He was interred in Taylor Cemetery, Salacoa Valley, Cherokee Co., Ga. She was buried at Methodist Church Cemetery, Emerson, Ga. Miss Kate Cooley sent the following information for Julia Fuller.

A marriage license was issued in "Cass County, Georgia to any ordained minister of the gospel, Judge of the Superior Court or Justice of the Peace-you are hereby authorized to join in holy matrimony Augustus F. Hubbard and Julia L. Fuller agreeable to the constitution and Laws of the state of Georgia.

Given under my hand and seal this 30th Day of January 1851 J.D. Phillips — Cass County Ordinary"

V. JAMES HARRIS FULLER

James Harris Fuller, born in Virginia near Callands, Va. on his father's plantation on the East side of Turkey Cocke Creek, was the son of Maurice Solomon and Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller. According to family records that were in the file of his first cousin, John Franklin Hubbard, he was born Jan. 1, 1834. He moved with his parents to Georgia when he was 16 years old and he grew up in the Little Virginia Colony in Salacoa Valley. He died at Fairmount, Ga. on June 16, 1924, age 90 years and 15 days. He was interred in Ryo Cemetery, Gordon Co., Ga. His Harris ancestors are recorded above under Mary Harris Fuller's record.

Micajah Woods Fuller (Woody), born April 24, 1836, according to the family data of his nephew, John Franklin Hubbard. He was the son of Maurice Solomon and Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller. He was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and was around 15 years old when his parents went to Georgia. On Nov. 24, 1857 he married Mary C. Fuller. This marriage was recorded in Georgia as follows, quoting:

"Georgia, Cass County: To any ordained Minister of the Gospel - Judge of the Superior Court-Justice of the Peace - You are hereby authorized to join Micajah W. Fuller and Wife Mary C. Fuller in lawful bonds of matrimony -agreeable to the constitution and laws of the State of Georgia, Given under my hand and seal this 18th day of November 1857.

Micajah (Woody) Fuller was 25 years old when he volunteered for service in the Confederate States Army with the Volunteers from the Little Virginia Colony, according to a statement in Confederate Pension and Record Department 406 State Capitol Georgia.

Letter from Woody Fuller to his sister Julia.

Yorktown, Virginia Feb. 6, 1862

Dear Sister: I seat myself to drop you a few lines, not that I have nusa to write, but I know that you are anxious to hear from us. This leaves us all well and I hope and trust when these few lines come to hand they may find you and all enjoying the same blessing of kind providence. Sister, I received your kind letter a few days ago and was more than glad to hear from vou. I had got to believe that you had forgotten me. Sister you said in your letter that you wished that we had your ham meat and butter. I think a good bate of hog meat wold do me a heap of good, as I have not had a good bate of hog meat since I left Georgia. I think sometimes if I had a cup of your butter milk that hit wold do me a power of good. But if we can get a plenty of leather hoke cakes and old dick to pull at, I think we will come through safe. Our fare is some better than it was, we draw half rations of pees and a jar of malasses for six days. We have some men in our company that dont make good solders - they play off sick to keep from standing gard. And that makes hit hard on the men that is willing to do there duty. They wont cook until hunger forces them to-They then cook.

I cold name them but I recon that is not worth while. I don't think there is any chance for a fight here. The Yankees is in Nine miles of usbut they don't come any closer. They know that there is a Georgia Regiment here and ready to meet them anytime—what few of them that is left. There has bin a Company taken from our Regiment and put in battle, and leaves us only fore companys.

Sister, I cant think of any thing that will interest you. I want you to write to me or some of you. As I wold like to hear from home every day. Kiss Gus and Tee for me. I must come to a close. Give my love to all inquiring friends and keep some for your self.

In Cass Co., Ga. the following license was issued: "State of Georgia: To any ordained minister of the Gospel, Judge of Superior Court, Justice of The Peace - you are hereby authorized to join Stepp Roberts and Sara F. Fuller, in the lawful bonds of matrimony agreeable to the laws of the State of Georgia. Given under my hand and seal of office.

Signed: James W. Watts - Ordinary.

Georgia, Cass County: I hereby certify that the marriage of the persons named in the above license actually took place and was duly solemnized before me this 16th day of September 1858.

Stephen Roberts (Step) was a volunteer for the Confederate States Army from the "Little Virginia Colony" in Georgia. He was a member of the Co. I 23rd Georgia Regiment of the Infantry. While in the army, he wrote to his family often. The following letters have been preserved and are included here for a glimpse into that historical past.

January 17 1862 YORKTOWN, VIRGINIA

Sister Julia:

Dear friend and relative. I have been thinking of writing to you for some time and being at leisure tonight and thinking of friends at home, I avail myself of the present opportunity to do so. I have heard what was in all the letters that has been received by the boys and have not heard one word from you. since I left home and I account for it in this way that it is because none of us have been thoughful of you to write you even a few words. This leaves us all well and I hope when it reaches you it will find you and the children well. With the rest of my friends if any I have all enjoying good health. Sis Julia I have nothing that will interest you to write but such as I have give I unto thee. I feel very much fatigued tonight from having done a very hard days work on our cabin which is to be our place of residence in all probability during the war and that may out live us all. If we have good luck we boys will finish ours tomorrow and then we will be much more comfortable living in a fine house 12 feet square made of Pine pols and mud and if any of you should pop through this country you must give us a call and we will do the best we can under the circumstances but not that I want to dishearten any of you the fare we have is ruff. Indeed it is true none of us have ever been accustom having anything very fine though this is more than we bargained for when we left what we did have. It was not very fine and I hope we will get to see our own men again soon. Sis Julia, I know you want to hear something about the war that is reliable and that is the very thing that I know the least about. I can tell something about what I see with my own eyes and that is all that I would vouch for. We are here in Yorktown-about 23,000 of us fortifying the bank of York River and doing a little most anything you can think of except what we want to do and that is playing with the children and kissing the baby. But as to fighting I hardly think we will have to fight here not withstanding we can hear the booming of cannons every hour of the day till the earth fairly trimbles beneath the heavens. Sis Julia I will give you a few verses of poetry that will be very appropriate under present circumstances.

1st: Let no marches to battlefield our enimies to face and there teach vandals that the anglosaxon race Has not lost their courage but when the fire is near Will fight for his country as a brave volunteer.

2nd: Our neighbors came out and brought the women to
To hear what we might say and see what we might do;
Than rally boys rally— O come far and near,
Show the blood of your mamma and become a volunteer.

Our wives and sweethearts at home will remain, 3rds

And wait with woman's patience till we return again: And when we do come back they will shed a joyful tear

And fly to the arms of returning volunteers.

And now gentle friends we have to say to you 4th:

The time is close at hand when we shall bid adieu, Our wives, babes and loved ones we leave to your care

They will be safe in the faith of our own volunteers.

True parting a motion our bosoms may swell Sth:

And many friends may weep as they bid you fare well,

As we slowly reflect from the war you shall hear, Victory or death from the brave volunteers:

"STEPP ROBERTS"

Julia, I think this very appropriate at this time. Oh I have just received a letter from My Dear Sallie. I was delighted to hear from you all and particular her and the children - though I will write her a few lines in your letter. Sis Julia, Woods received a letter from Sam and he stated that Unitee had been guilty of some mighty mean tricks- I am truly sorry to hear of such things happening but really it did not Surprise me for I was satisfied that she would not do and I used to tell Sallie that the least anyone had to do with her the better off they would like her. I tell you when Grandsir gets suspicious of any person you had better let them alone. Sis Julia I have wrote all that I can at present and I will try to do better next time- If you could see me sitting here in this old tent flat of my on the ground you would not think strange of my writing such awkward lettersnot bragging of my intellect. So I will close by saying write me soon-give my love to all the gals and receive for yourself a portion-nothing more at present- but I remain your friend till death. And if it is Gods will that we never meet again in this world- may it be our happy lot to meet in Heaven where sickness sorrow and pain and death are felt no more.

Stepp Roberts to Mrs. Juliana Hubbard

Mrs. Hubbard and Sallie Fuller Roberts, Stepp's wife, were sisters, and daughters of Solomon and Nancy (Harris) Fuller.

P.S. Dear Sallie: I received your kind and affectionate letter tonight. Since I seated myself to write Sis Julia and was so glad to hear from you. and the rest of my folks. I am also glad to inform you that I have received several other letters- perhaps all you have wrote. Our mails are regular now and we are delighted that almost every mail which is three times a week brings something good and news from home for some of us. I received your kind letter of the 13th tonight which is the 17th. You said you had been to see Mr. Harbin and he told you that the mails was very uncertain. Sallie you think more of me than I thought you did. I know how much you was fatigued after riding over there it is some 12 miles to his home from mothers. Sallie you said something about a furlow for us soldiers. I am sorry to tell you that it is very uncertain when you see either of us at home again. Maybe never. But I for one will most certainly make good use of the first opportunity. Sallie you wrote that our precious little children were so pretty and fat. Oh how I wish i could see you and them and take them on my knee and kiss them. Tell Rufie that Pappy will come home sometime if he lives so I will close this. You must write often and long letters. Give my love to all

inquiring friends and receive for yourself. So farewell till we meet again. My dear and affectionate wife and remains your husband till death.

This letter was given to me by Ethel Newman- Granddaughter of Julia Hubbard: Kate Cooley

She included the above letters for this record.

During that time he wrote the following:

Camp 23rd Geo Regt Kinston, North Carolina June 7th 1863

Dear Cousins, Uncle & Aunt. I am again permitted the pleasure of writing to you again. I acknowledge neglecting writing to you all as I should have done but still hope there is nothing lost - as you have heard long before this that we was taken prisoners and troted around through Yankeedom a while. I know you have not thought the least hard of not getting letters from us. I am sorry to say that in my rambling I lost the letter I received from you a while back and have forgotten how you said to direct a letter to Bud and since we got back I hear that they have been into a fight and got cut up prety badly now I want you to write to me all that you know about it and tell me again how to write to A.G. and I will try an be a little faster next time I also hear that Little fields Battalion has been into it and like us all got taken I am sure I dont want any of them hurt but I think it is time they had done something. I saw some of our kinfolks here yesterday the hardin & putman boys but they are gone now to take our place in Virginia and let us rest a while I hope for our boys all look badly since our trip North I don't think the climate suited them and some of them are very sick but all the connections is tolerable well so far as I know except Bro John he is sick and has been ever since we left Fort Delaware but he is still able to knock about we sent him to hospital but he would not stay Asbery Parkes was very sick at Fort Del. and was brought on back with us to Petersburg, Va. and there left in the hospital and I have not heard a word from him since I fear he will never be well again. Monce F. was left at Richmond sick but mending at last account.

This is a low swampy country and bad water we may all get sick but we are satisfied with the swap yet for they will fight in Virginia and they fight to kill that is decidedly the worst part of the war according to my experience Dock & Jake didn't get hurt in the last fight but I havent heard a word from Tomy & Martin since the fight I dont know how they came out this time Tomy had been badly wounded at Sharpsburg but was well again. We dont draw much to eat from the government but you ought to see the boys grazing round in these swamps gathering huckleberies and anything else that they can find the same as a head of cattle. Vegetables are coming in now and for the highest kind of prices we can buy a little one dollar a gallon for milch \$1.50 per 1b for butter \$1.50 a doz for eggs and every thing else in proportion I recon we will perish after a while. We have an order to furlough one man from every 25 present for duty provided there are none absent from the company without leave that will take a long time to get any body home giving each one 20 days but it keeps a body in a little heart.

Lincy you must give my love to all our kinsfolk to Grandsir & Mary particular

tell all about what I have wrote I hope this may reach you in due time and find you all enjoying good health and in fine spirits I can't see any end to this war yet I recon it will out last us all yet but still I hope we all may meet again in this life but if not I hope we may all meet in heaven.

Eliza Ann Fuller Roberts, the daughter of Solomon and Nancy Overton Fuller, was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and was a wee little girl when she came to Georgia with her parents who were among the first Virginia settlers to migrate to North Georgia. They developed a splendid neighborhood with Salacoa Section, which is now a part of Cherokee and Bartow Counties.

Eliza Fuller, born Oct. 18, 1846 into their home of piety and righteous living, grew up in that atmosphere. Her family established the Fairview Methodist Church. She joined that church and through many years was true to her vows. When she was a charming, beautiful, blackeyed girl, she married William Martin Roberts, one of their neighbor's sons. They, likewise, made a similar home, into which it was a privilege to be born. God gave them 9 children. Together they planned and worked to give their children the best advantages. These sons and daughters grew up and had families of their own. They have also an appreciation of the godly lives of their father and mother.

On December 21, 1927, she passed to her Eternal reward. The Community, the church and her family can ill afford an unreasonable grief. She was ready and waiting for her call to come to Heaven for her reward. She was laid to rest by her husband, William Martin Roberts, at Pine Log Church in Bartow Co., Ga. Rev. N.A. Parsons conducted her funeral service.

Her great contribution to the church and to the State are her three sons and six daughters who, where ever they live, are substantial citizens, active in every good movement and loyal to their church.

ESTHER FULLER

Esther Fuller was born around 1848 in Virginia. She was two years old when she was recorded on the 1850 census in Georgia. A relative recalled that she died after her second birth date. Upon her retirement on Jan. 1, 1968 from business activity in the Retail Credit Bureau, there was an article of appreciation of Miss Cooley in their Club magazine. In this was the statement that she was Credit Manager for three firms for a total of 44 years. She planned to continue work part time and she has done this. At the same time she has secured some of the above family records for which all are grateful.

In January 1983 Mrs. Erna Carol (Shawkarter) Mallory (Mrs. Robert Mallory) sent several items of importance. Some had previously been included in this study and will not be repeated here:

- (1) Marriage license for Hezekiah Hubbard and Susannah Fuller.
- (2) Marriage license for Solomon Fuller and Nancy O. Harris. The following items have been included on pages 609-614, and your compiler wishes to express thanks to Mrs. Mallory for sharing them for this book:
 - (1) Letter written by John Franklin Hubbard (1851-1950). (Page 609)
 - (2) Will of Solomon Fuller (Maurice Solomon Fuller) written September 29, 1859, probated May 7, 1860. (Pages 610, 611)
 - (3) Data concerning the family of Benjamin Arthur Ponder, a son of Margaret Ray (Fuller) Ponder, continued from page 426 (above). This is being reproduced exactly from the pages sent by Mrs. Mallory. (Pages 613, 614) Mrs. Mallory's husband is a great grandson of Margaret Ray (Fuller) Ponder.

BRITTAIN FULLER 1750's ? -1818

Brittain Fuller, the son of Arthur and Sarah Fuller and grandson of Ezekiel and Deborah Fuller of Isle of Wight Co., Va., was born in Granville Co., N.C. on the plantation of his father, situated on Cedar Creek. This information has been given regarding this plantation. His date of birth has never been determined. He was a large sized lad when his parents went to Virginia. One source says he was born before 1759 and died in 1818. Therefore he was born in North Carolina. His wife, Nancy Jackson, was born before 1759. She died before 1808. The earliest court record found for him is the signing of the Oath of Allegiance at Henry County, Va. Court House in 1777. The list of signers taken by Capt. Hankins includes the names of Brittain, Zachariah and Arthur Fuller. This is dated October 20, 1777.

Brittain Fuller was issued for his first marriage, a license on Feb. 29, 1780 to marry Nancy Jackson. (See Henry Co., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 327). The next information found is in the tax list for 1785 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. He was head of his household. There were three in the family and he owned his own dwelling house. Today, the exact location of this home is unknown.

In the year 1790, Brittain Fuller bought 922 acres of land in Pittsylvania County as follows, according to Deed and Will Book No. 9 (1791-1794). First. on pages 77 & 78, an Indenture from Peter Jefferson of Lunenburg Co., Va. for 50 Ls. for 318 acres of land on Aron's Creek, is found. This deed was dated April 25, 1790. This deed shows that his neighbors to this land were Mathews family, Samuel Calland, William Walker, John Stockton, The Fuller kindred and Abraham Aaron (correct spelling was Arnn). The witnesses to this deed were Sam Calland, John x Whitesell and Sherwood Pearson. This deed was recorded Aug. 16, 1790. Page 78 ibid, there is recorded another deed from Peter Jefferson to Brittain Fuller, dated April 20, 1790, is for 604 acres for 300 Ls on the west Fork of Allens Creek. Witnesses were Abraham Arnn, L. (?) Tompkins and John Smith. (Reel 5, Pitts. Co., Va., D. & W. No. 9, State Archives, Richmond, Va.).

Nancy Jackson was the mother of Brittain Fuller's children. She died prior to 1808. Her exact dates are unknown.

Brittain Fuller married a second time. On March 29, 1808, a marriage license was issued to Brittain Fuller and Nancy Pearson, daughter of Richard Pearson who consents. John M. Pearson was Surety. On April 19, 1808, Rev. William Blair performed their ceremony. Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg. & Min. Returns, p. 44.

Around ten years later, Brittain Fuller died intestate. An appraisement of his estate is dated June 15, 1818 and Nancy (Pearson) Fuller was serving as Administratrix of the estate. (Pitts. Co., Va. Book 19, pp. 74, 175, 218).

The following abstract of a deed dated Aug. 18, 1818 gives the names of Brittain Fuller's children. Those named as part one are Timothy, Joseph, George, Peggy. Lucy, Patsy and Clary Fuller and those of the second part are Israel and Zachariah Fuller. This deed was too dim to read for accuracy, but the first 7 named Fuller children sell their interest in the real estate of Brittain Fuller, deceased, to Israel and Zachariah, his children. It was signed by the above 7 Fuller children. The witnesses were: Ralph Smith Jr., Joseph Fuller Sen., Jesse Lawrence, Henry Lawrence Jr., and recorded April 19, 1819. (See D.B. 22, Pitts. Co., Va. (1818-1819), pp. 233, 234). Other deeds recorded before the death of Brittain Fuller, state as follows:

(a) that Joseph Fuller is his son (D.B. 20 p. 367) and (b) Timothy Fuller is his son (D.B. 20, p. 452). Then an Indenture dated Jan. 19, 1830 names

several others as his heirs. (D.B. 31, p. 497, also one on p. 498 recorded Feb. 15, 1831)

In lieu of a Bible Record, a family record is compiled from these recorded deeds. This is an accurate record of his living children at the time of his death. If there were other children, they were deceased in 1818 and left no heirs. Furthermore, no tradition of any other children has been recalled. The children of Brittain and Nancy (Jackson) Fuller are listed as follows, with no knowledge of the order of their births. In the absence of this information, the order of names will follow the order as given in the first 3 deeds in order of the dates:

MARRIAGES

ISRAEL FULLER B. ca. 1800 - D. after 1880

Israel Fuller, the son of Brittain and Nancy (Jackson) Fuller, was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. prior to July 10, 1800. (See 1850 & 1860 censuses). He was a farmer. The Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage Register and pege 100, Minister's Returns, reveal that Rev. Orson Martin performed the marriage ceremony for Israel Fuller and Mary Aaron on Jan. 28, 1832. Asa Aaron was bondsman. She was called Polly and was the daughter of Isaac Arnn, the son of Abraham Arnn Sr. Isaac Arnn, her father, married Elizabeth Fuller, the daughter of Zachariah Fuller. Israel Fuller and Elizabeth (Fuller) Arnn were first cousins and when Israel married her daughter, Mary Arnn, he married his second cousin, whom he had known and loved all of his life. The 1850 census showed her age as 43, therefore, she was born in 1807. He was around 32 and she was 29 years of age in 1832, when they married. Their children:

- ii. Brittain Fuller, b. 1835
- iii. M Fuller, b. 1837.

In 1850, all of these children were at home except Susannah, who was already married. In 1860, when the census was taken, Brittain, Berry and Daniel were still in their parent's home, assisting their father on the farm. His real estate was evaluated at \$1,000 and personal property at \$700. The War Between the States was at hand and these three sons volunteered for service and never returned. His son George had been killed by a run away horse prior to the war. He carried the grief of losing all of his sons and died when he was around 70 years of age. Neither the dates of his or his wife's death were recorded. He lived all the days of his life on the

Fuller lands on Turkey Cocke Creek near Callands, Virginia.

GEORGE FULLER

George Fuller, the son of Israel and Mary (Arnn) Fuller, born 1846, and died April 24, 1855. (See Death Reg., Pitts. Co., Va., p. 22). He was killed by a run away horse at the age of 9 years.

DANIEL FULLER

Daniel Fuller, son of Israel and Mary (Arnn) Fuller, born 1839, volunteered for service in the Confederate States Army. He died while in the service from fever on July 10, 1862, age 23. (See Death Reg., Pitts. Co., Va., p. 89). He never married.

BRITTAIN FILLER

Brittain Fuller, the son of Israel and Mary (Arnn) Fuller, born 1835, was a volunteer for service in the Confederate States Army. He was killed while in service. Details unknown. He never married.

BENJAMIN FULLER

Benjamin Fuller, called Berry, the son of Israel and Mary (Arnn) Fuller, was born around 1839 (by 1850 census). He volunteered to serve in the Confederate States Army. He was killed while in service. He never married.

ELIZABETH FULLER

Elizabeth Fuller, the daughter of Israel and Mary (Arnn) Fuller, never married.

NANCY FULLER

Nancy Fuller, the daughter of Israel and Mary (Arnn) Fuller, born 1838 (1850 census), married some time after 1860 Reuben Griggs. They had no descendants. (Courtesy of Mrs. Ida Fuller Arnn).

MARY FULLER

Mary Fuller, the daughter of Israel and Mary (Arnn) Fuller, born 1837, married first Samuel Swanson. No children. She married the second time Peter Lee Dent. No children. She married the third time Samuel Garrett. They never had any children.

SUSANNAH FULLER

Susannah Fuller, the daughter of Israel and Mary (Arnn) Fuller, married on May 7, 1854 Darling Lawrence. (See Mar. Reg., Pitts. Co., Va., p. 191). They had descendants and they were the only living posterity of Israel and Mary (Arnn) Fuller in 1929. No one with accurate data could be contacted to send it for this record.

Information given by Mabel Claire Fuller and Mrs. B.P. Gilbert.

JOSEPH FULLER

Joseph Fuller, the son of Brittain and Nancy (Jackson) Fuller, was 76 years old in 1860, therefore, born in 1784. This is one reason for being sure he is the true Joseph, son of Brittain Fuller, who had a son born before 1785, according to the tax list that year. In 1860 he was living in Swansonville section of Pittsylvania Co., Va. He was living alone with a claim of 100 dollars worth of personal property. When he was a young man, he was associated with the Pittsylvania Co., Va. militia. On Oct. 22, 1805, Joseph Fuller "Qualified as Lieutenant in the Militia in Pittsylvania County, Va." (See Book 11, p. 484). His father deeded him 165 acres of land on Turkey Cock Creek on Feb. 1, 1817. (D.B. No. 20, p. 367, Pitts. Co., Va.) No sale of this land was found. Likewise, a Joseph Fuller and Polly Hanks were issued a marriage license on Nov. 3, 1828. They were married by Rev. Richard B. Peck on Nov. 7, 1828. Langley B. Chrowder was his surety. Thomas Hanks Sr. gave his consent. (p. 91, Pitts. Co., Mar. Reg.) No evidence was found to prove this Joseph was Brittain Fuller's son or that he had any descendants. Marriage was recorded under Minister's Returns, Pitts. Co., Va. If there are descendants, they have these records to use or eliminate.

PATSY FULLER

Patsy Fuller, the daughter of Brittain and Nancy (Jackson) Fuller, married. She had descendants, was positively known by her relatives. To the present, the compiler has no accurate data. If the following data, said to be true, is accurate, those interested may be assisted in making a correct family record. It was said that Patsy Fuller married Joseph Dunn, called Jos. They had at least two sons, Samuel and Joseph Dunn Sr. who married and they had four daughters, by name:

- i. Queen Dunn, who never mar.
- ii. Betty Dunn
- iii. Anna Dunn
- iv. Martha Dunn, who mar. Thomas Rogers (Tom). Data follows.

SAMUEL DUNN

Samuel Dunn, the son of Joseph and Patsy (Fuller) Dunn, married Kate Martin. They had three children:

- i. Bertie Dunn, who mar. 1st Mollie Reynolds. He mar. 2nd a Mrs. Mitchell. He had no children.
- ii. Timothy Dunn, mar. Julia Finney. They had no children.
- iii. Lena Dunn, mar. 1st Edward Mahan. They have several children. Names and other facts were not sent. Mrs. Lena (Dunn) Mahan mar. the 2nd time Clyde Gauldin. They have no children.

The above information was sent in 1929 by Miss Mabel Fuller.

ZACHARIAH FULLER 1805-1889

Zachariah Fuller, born 1805 (1850 census), was the son of Brittain and Nancy (Jackson) Fuller. He died March 6, 1889. (Mrs. J.W. Amos' records) Zachariah Fuller and Betsy Nuckols were issued a marriage license on Dec. 4, 1829. Levi Nuckols, her brother, was surety and Rev. Richard M. Beck performed their ceremony on Dec. 17, 1829. (Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 93). She was Elizabeth Nuckols, called Betsy, the daughter of Josiah Nuckols who married

Milly Weatherford on Dec. 12, 1792. Her father was deceased. His will was probated in Pitts. Co., Va. in 1819. See Mar. Reg. Pitts. Co., Va., p. 93. The 1850 census gives evidence that Elizabeth Nuckols was born around 1803.

In 1860 Zachariah Fuller was a farmer and residing on his farm, evaluated at \$800, and personal property the same value. No Bible record for the family of Zachariah and Elizabeth (Nuckols) Fuller has been found.

The 1850 census records:

Sarah Fuller, age 15, recorded in 1860 census.

Through other sources, the following has been learned about them.

- i. Edward Fuller has been regarded as their son, yet he was not in the home when the 1850 census and the 1860 census were taken. His dates were not recalled. He was killed while in service in the War Between the States. He never married.
- ii. Clary was named Clarissa Ann Elizabeth Fuller, b. 1830 (1850 census) and died in 1925, age 94 years. Her data follows.
- iii. Henry's full name was Henry Brittain Fuller, born June 17, 1833, died Dec. 6, 1918. Family records.
- iv. James E. Fuller was called Josiah, born 1839.
- v. Mary Jane Fuller (Puss), born July 11, 1844, married Peter Law-rence. No other data.
- vi. Fanny, in the census record, was really named Sarah Frances Fuller and was called "Tump". She was a twin sister to Mary Jane Fuller, called "Puss". She was born July 11, 1844. Her data follows.

Elizabeth Nuckols Fuller was living in 1860. No record of her death was given. In the same census record, it is learned that Lucy Fuller, the sister of Zachariah Fuller, was residing in his home and was recorded as 60 yeers of age in 1850. This means that Lucy Fuller never married and was born in 1790. In 1880 Kate Nuckols, his sister-in-law, age 80, lived in their home.

HENRY BRITTAIN FULLER

Henry Brittain (Britton) Fuller, the son of Zachariah and Elizabeth (Betsy) (Nuckols) Fuller, born June 17, 1833 in Pittsylvania Co., Va., died Dec. 6, 1918 in Pitts. Co., Va. He was issued a marriage license to marry Irena Fuller on Dec. 17, 1860. (Mar. Reg. Pitts. Co., Va., p. 177). The Minister's Returns proves that Rev. William McDowell, on Dec. 20, 1860, performed the marriage ceremony for Henry B. Fuller and Irena Fuller. Her full name is Irena Jane Fuller, born March 7, 1830, died May 8, 1920, the daughter of Iimothy Fuller, the brother of Zachariar Fuller. They were first cousins. Henry Britton Fuller served in the Confederate States Army during the War Between the States. The accurate details for this service were not given. Their children:

Lucy Fuller, the daughter of Henry Brittain Fuller and his wife, Irena Jane Fuller, married Monroe Hundley. No data sent.

Fanny Fuller, daughter of Henry Brittain and Irena Jane (Fuller) Fuller, married James Allen. A daughter. Hallie Allen, married Tobe Dodd. No other data sent.

RALEIGH FULLER

Raleigh Fuller, the son of Henry Brittain and Irena Jane (Fuller) Fuller, married Sarah Adams (Sallie). No other facts were sent.

SARAH FULLER

Sarah Fuller, daughter of Henry Brittain and Irena Jane (Fuller) Fuller, married Thomas Rogers.

MARY ANN FULLER

Mary Ann Fuller, born May 24, 1867, died Oct. 5, 1898, the daughter of Henry Brittain and Irena Jane (Fuller) Fuller, married on Oct. 20, 1889 Joseph Pinkney Hubbard, born Aug. 14, 1859, died May 27, 1924. Their known descendants are recorded in the Franklin Clement Hubbard section. (See pp. 147-150.)

JEFFERSON DAVIS FULLER

Jefferson Davis Fuller, the son of Henry Brittain and Irena Jane (Fuller) Fuller, was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. near Callands on Nov. 4, 1861. He died in 1944 in Lynchburg, Va. On Oct. 26, 1884, he married Emma Belle Hubbard. She was the daughter of Franklin Clement Hubbard, who married Sarah Letitia Fuller. She was born Dec. 29, 1863 and died July 26, 1944. See Hubbard section for her Hubbard ancestors and this section for the Fuller descendants. They resided in Pittsylvania Co., Va. many years and in Lynchburg, Va. in late life. They and their family were members of County Line Christian Church. They died in Lynchburg and are interred in Fort Hill Burial Park, Lynchburg, Va. Their children: (Refer to pp. 142-150.)

MAGGIE MAY FULLER

Maggie May Fuller, the daughter of Jefferson Davis and Emma Belle (Hubbard) Fuller. was born Dec. 25, 1888. She married on Sept. 8, 1917 Maurice L. Dickinson. Their only child was:

i. Margaret Fuller Dickinson, b. June 28, 1923. She was Mrs. McCluny of Williamsburg, Va. in 1968 when her mother died.

Maggie May(Fuller) Dickinson was a graduate of Virginia Christian College, Lynchburg, Va. She entered the field of Education and gave 33 years of service, and retired in 1960. She served as teacher and as principal. For 18 years she was principal of Malatoni Pumumku Indian School in King William Co., Va. During that time, in 1956, she was awarded the District Alumni Award of Lynchburg Christian College.

She was a member of Jerusalem Christian Church, Williamsburg, Va. She held membership also in Skipwith Farms Garden Club and Virginia Education Association.

Mr. and Mrs. Dickinson, at the time of her death, were residents of Williamsburg, Va. Besides her husband and her daughter, she was survived by a grandson, the son of Mrs. McCluny. This grandson was living in Boston, Mass. in 1968. No facts have been sent for this record, so his name cannot be recorded.

Maggie May Fuller Dickinson was interred in Fort Hill Burial Park, Lynchburg, Va. where her parents are interred.

MABEL CLAIRE FULLER 1887-1949

Mabel Claire Fuller, born Feb. 5, 1887, near Callands, Pittsylvania County, Virginia. was the daughter of Jefferson Davis and Emma Belle (Hubbard) Fuller. Her early education was in the public schools near her home. She registered, when she was quite young, at Lynchburg College. graduated and taught six years at Lynchburg College, after graduating from that college.

She taught school in Pittsylvania Co., Va. for 20 or more years. She was Principal of Callands High School for seven years. This was her native community. Her achievement and the appreciation the patrons gave her, was outstanding. She then enrolled at Columbia University, N.Y. to study Library Science. Returning to Virginia, she became the Librarian of Virginia Christian College in 1926 and served for 22 years.

She became ill and after some time, died in Memorial Hospital, Danville, Virginia on Sept. 13, 1949. Her funeral services were held at Scott's Funeral Home, Chatham, Va. Interment was in Fort Hill Burial Park, Lynchburg, Va. This final illness closed a long life of interest and service in the field of education, the evaluation of which will never be told. She was a member of the Christian denomination. Her last membership was with the First Christian Church of Lynchburg, Va. Mabel Claire Fuller never married. She was interested and secured facts for this family record.

FRANK BRITTON FULLER

Frank Britton Fuller, born Nov. 26, 1895 at Grady, Pittsylvania Co., Va., was the son of Jefferson Davis and Emma Belle (Hubbard) Fuller. He lived most of his life in the same place.

On June 6, 1931 in Lynchburg, Campbell Co., Va., Frank Britton Fuller married Nancy Easley Barksdale, born Jan. 19, 1896 at Saxe, Charlotte Co., Va., the daughter of Stith Dudley and Frances Mills (Haynie) Barksdale of Halifax Co., Va. Her grandparents were Beverly and Nancy Easley Barksdale and Dr. Thomas and Frances (Mills) Haynie. Her education was at Radford College and summer sessions at William & Mary College and University of Virginia. Before her marriage, she taught in Charlotte and in Chesterfield counties and after marriage, in Pittsylvania County. She has been interested and active in many phases of Women's work. She has served as President of Pitts. Co. Home Demonstration Advisory Board; of Calland's Woman's Club; and of Home Demonstration Club. She officiated in the various drives for health projects. In her church she was active in the choir and Supt. of Primary S.S. Department. She is a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, also.

Frank Britton Fuller grew up on the farm near Callands, Va. He was educated at a Lynchburg College. He served in World War I. Mr. and Mrs. Fuller were members of Hollywood Baptist Church. He served also as S.S. Superintendant. Until his retirement, he was a U.S. postal carrier for the Callands' rural route, for over 30 years. After his retirement, they resided in Raleigh, N.C.

On Friday night, May 29, 1976, Frank Britton Fuller died at his residence in Raleigh, N.C. His funeral was held on May 31, 1976 at Scott's Funeral Home Chapel, and interment was in Hillcrest Burial Park. He is survived by his wife, Nancy Easley (Barksdale) Fuller, his son, Frank Britton Fuller 3r. and two grandchildren. They are the parents of one son:

Frank Briton Fuller Jr., born Feb. 21, 1932 in Lynchburg, Campbell Co., Va., the son of Frank Britton and Nancy Easley (Barksdale) Fuller, grew up in Pittsylvania Co., Va. He attended the public schools in the Callands District. He graduated at Hargrave Military Academy, Chatham, Va. and Virginia Polytechnic

The compiler has been asked about spelling of the name Brittain in the Fuller Family. The name in Granville Co., N.C. days was Brittain. Research proves this was a surname of a family in Isle of Wight Co., Va. in the days of our Fuller family in that county. No intermarriage found, yet Deborah's surname is unknown. One of her grandsons in Granville was named Brittain. And our ancestor, Arthur Fuller, also named a son Brittain Fuller (ca. 1750's-1818). Through the years, others have changed the spelling of Brittain. Why?

CLARISSA ANN ELIZABETH FULLER 1830-1925

Clarissa Ann Elizabeth Fuller, born Nov. 9, 1830, the daughter of Zachariah and Elizabeth Nuckols Fuller. On Nov. 11, 1855 a marriage license was issued to Meredith C. Lawrence to marry Clary A. Fuller. They were married on Nov. 21, 1855. The record shows he was the son of Henry Lawrence and Gilly Lawrence and she was the daughter of Zachariah Fuller and Elizabeth (Nuckols) Fuller. (See Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 161). She died in 1924 in her 94th year of life. The family records show her full name was Clarissa Ann Elizabeth Fuller and his full name was Meredith Carroll Lawrence. Clara Ann (Fuller) Lawrence died Feb. 22, 1924. Meredith Carroll Lawrence was born March 17, 1830 and died Feb. 7, 1900. His father, Henry Lawrence, owned land in Henry Co., Va. and Pittsylvania Co., Va. The County Line Christian Church is built on the land he gave for that purpose. His large apple orchard with countless trees, with many trees grafted to bear two kinds of apples, has never been forgotten. They were both born and died near Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va. James Mitchell was their bondsman. (See Pittsylvania Co., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 70). William Hundley was listed also as a bondsman for Timothy Fuller. Elizabeth (Hundley) Fuller was born in 1799 (1850 census). She died Sept. 21, 1855 from dropsy. age 56. The 1860 census proves also that Timothy Fuller had lost Elizabeth. His sister, Mrs. Mary Clay (Fuller) Arnn, who was a widow, also lived in her father's home.

Isaac Arnn was the son of Isaac Arnn Sr. Isaac Arnn lived less than 3 years after their marriage and died before his son was born on Dec. 3, 1844 and died April 3, 1924. The record for this son's descendants is found in the John Fuller Hubbard section. The son was Isaac Clay Arnn. pp. 217-239 and Index.

He grew up in the home of his grandfather, Timothy Fuller. The War Between the States was opening in Dec. 1860 when he was 16 years old on Dec. 3, 1860. Isaac Clay Arnn volunteered and served 1 year as a private. He was wounded. As soon as the wound was healed, he returned for 3 years in the Cavalry. He served under Stonewall Jackson and J.E.B. Stuart and was at Appomatox when General Lee surrendered. In the records he is recorded as I.C. Arnn. In December 1865, after the Surrender on April 9th, Isaac Clay Arnn was 21 years old. For his service record see page 599.

His grandfather's surname was spelled Arnn. His father, Isaac Arnn, requested his wife, Mary Clay (Fuller) Arnn to be sure their surname was always correctly spelled Arnn, because their neighbors mispronounced their name Aaron and so spelled it. She gave him this promise while he was on his death bed, also along with her promise to never remarry. She kept both promises and lived a widow almost 64 years. To the present day, Isaac Arnn's descendants spell their surname Arnn. All other descendants of his grandfather, Abraham Arnn, spell their name Aaron or Aron. Refer to p. 53, Vol. 9 of Manuscript Confederate Records in Archives Division of Virginia State Library.

Benjamin Franklin Sours is the son of Charles Gray and Mary Nannie (Davis) Sours of Chatham, Va. He was around six years of age when his father passed away. He grew up under his mother's guidance. He attended the public schools of Chatham, Va. He operated his father's grocery store for a number of years. Later, with his brother Jesse, he operated the Sours' Garage and shared care of the Sours' Milling Company, of Chatham, Va. LUCY WOODSON'S ANCESTORS

Joseph Rogers, born 1790, died Jan. 8, 1858, married Lucy Woodson, born 1795, died after 1872. Minister's Returns, Pitts. Eo., Va., p. 53 states that Rev. David Nowlin performed the ceremony of Joseph Rogers and Lucy Woodson on Oct. 31, 1812. She was the daughter of Allen Woodson who gave his consent. He was also Surety.

Lucy Woodson was the daughter of Allen Woodson, born ca. 1770's who married Ann Taylor. After their marriage, they settled in Pitts. Co_{\circ} , Va. and reared their family there.

Allen Woodson was the son of Jesse Woodson, born ca. 1715 in Henrico Co., Va. He married Mary Ann whose surname is unknown. They resided later on land in Cumberland Co., Va. His tax list there in 1782 shows he had 10 in his family and 5 slaves. He named his son Allen for his mother's maiden surname.

Jesse Woodson was the son of:

William Woodson born ca. 1690, Henrico Co., Va., married ca. 1712 Sarah Allen. He settled on land that came to be in Goochland Co., Va. and that land was later in Cumberland Co., Va. (W. & M. Q. Vol. 8).

William Woodson was son of:

Benjamin Woodson born 1666, Henrico Co., Va., died in that county in 1723. The marriage on May 12, 1700 of Benjamin Woodson, son of Robert Woodson and of Sarah Porter, daughter of Wm. Porter Jr., all of Henrico Co., Va., is recorded in Monthly Meeting of Friends, Henrico Co., Va. 1699~1751. All the witnesses are named. See p. 2044, Valentine Papers. His will was recorded Aug. Court 1723, Henrico Co., Va. The land he patented in 1722 was in Goochland Co., Va. in 1727.

Benjamin Woodson was the son of:

Robert Woodson, born 1634, died after 1707. He was a Colonel of the militia and a member of the House of Burgesses. He lived in Henrico Co., Va. He married ca. 1656 Elizabeth Ferris, daughter of Richard Ferris, a descendant of the Norman French family de Ferries, who came over with William the Conqueror.

Robert Woodson was the son of:

Dr. John Woodson, born ca. 1586 Dorsetshire, England. He married in Devonshire, England Sarah Winston. They came to Virginia on Ship George in 1619, bringing 6 Negroes. They settled in Fleure de Hundred. They were on the 1625 census. Or. Woodson was killed by the Indians in Massacre 1644. She died years later. Their sons, John and Robert, in 1679 in Henrico Co., Va., were on list of tithables in Curles.

JOSEPH FULLER 1768-1838

Joseph Fuller, born Jan. 19, 1768 in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, was the son of Arthur Fuller (1722 (?)-1797). He was born on the farm Arthur Fuller purchased from Joseph Austin on Aug. 19, 1767. (D.B. 1, pp. 46-47, Pitts. Co., Va.). This was a farm of 370 acres. This new baby was destined to live all of his life on this land. Even today, 1976, part of this same land is in the possession of Joseph Fuller's descendants, Mrs. Calvert Thomas Fuller and Joseph Harold Fuller.

This new baby, Joseph Fuller, grew up on his father's farm and was a farmer. His experiences are unknown today, but without a doubt, were most interesting. First of all, they were pioneer settlers in a newly formed county. Second, besides the farm life, his father's Wagon Train offered him an opportunity to accompany them on many tours, not only to the places of business in Virginia, but also to places in North Carolina. Tobacco was the important crop on every farm in those days and to get it transferred to market was a difficult task. Joseph Fuller's father's Wagon Train was without a doubt a welcome and popular business for that section, and Joseph grew up in this atmosphere. He saw also the large casks packed with tobacco rolled to market by a horse or an ox hitched to it, as was the custom, before his father introduced the Wagon Train.

Joseph Fuller did not marry until he was almost thirty years of age. In the Marriage Register of Pittsylvania Co., Va. is recorded on Dec. 19, 1796, a marriage license was issued to Joseph Fuller and Susanna Aaron. was the daughter of Abraham Arnn. Isaac Aaron was the Security. brother, Isaac Arnn. The surname was Arnn, but the name was mis-spelled Aaron. According to the record in the Minister's Returns, same county, Rev. James Thompson married Joseph Fuller and Susanna Arnn on Dec. 22, 1796. In the copy of their Bible Record that has been found, they recorded in the Bible that they were married on Dec. 22, 1796. The one who was interested in this Bible Record copied it on Jan. 25, 1894 and it has been preserved. Bible was burned when the home was burned down several years later in 1898 or 1899. There is also an assurance of the accuracy in that the 1850 census ages conform to the Bible record. Their son Isaac's family preserved it. The compiler did not secure the name of the one who copied this Bible Record. One of the granddaughters of Isaac Fuller, born Dec. 28, 1799, the oldest son of Joseph and Susannah (Aron) Fuller, adopted a daughter. This adopted great granddaughter of Isaac Fuller became interested in Joseph Fuller's old Bible and copied the following data. Today it is an invaluable record.

For the sake of those who may prize this data in the years to come, this Bible Record is included here as it exists today in that copy made 82 years ago, on Jan. 25, 1894. Quoting:

"Joseph Fuller and his Wife Susannah Aran Was married th 22 day of December 1796.

Then Daughter Nansy Fuller was born th 23 of January 1798.

Then Son Isac Fuller Was born th 28 of December 1799.

Then Daughter Kissiah Fuller Was born th 3 day of June 1801,

Then Son Arthur Fuller Was born th 26 of December 18D3.

Then Son Dannild Fuller Was born th 12 of June 1806.

Then Son Henry P. Fuller Was born the 14 of August 1809. See also p. 589.

Then Son Hartwell A Fuller Was born th 19 of June 1812. Died 1888.

Then Son Jese Fuller Was born th 19 of September 1815.

Then Son Ralph S Fuller Was born th 9 of April 1817.

Joseph Fuller Was born th 19 of January 1768.

Susannah Arnn Was born the 28 of March 1779.

Mary C. Fuller was born th 25 of November 1839.

Today it is assumed that Mary C. Fuller was a grandchild. The few facts that are known about these children, their marriages and descendants, are included later, so far as known.

In Pittsylvania Co., Va. Deed Book 51, p. 513, there are recorded details that were presented to the Court in Chancery sitting, and dated Oct. 31, 1839 which proves that Nancy, Isaac, Kesiah, Hartwell, Jesse, Ralph, Henry and Arthur Fuller, children of Joseph Fuller deceased, and also his wife, their mother, Susan Fuller, were living. Only the name of Daniel Fuller, found in the above Bible Record, was not included.

The above verifies that 1839 can be estimated as the year of Joseph Fuller's death. His wife, Susannah (Arnn) Fuller, born March 28, 1779, was living in 1839. The date of her death, the compiler cannot state, but estimates it was prior to Oct. 15, 1858, when her son Henry Fuller and wife sold 90 acres of land which was 1/6 of his mother, Susan Fuller's dower. (D.8. 58, p. 166) See details later under Henry P. Fuller.

First the father of Susannah Aaron was Abraham Arnn, but this surname is spelled Aron and Aaron in the Court records of Pittsylvania Co., Va., excepting his descendants through his grandson, Isaac Arnn. See details elsewhere. Susannah Arnn Fuller's father, Abraham Arnn Sr., was a citizen of Lancaster Co., Pa. The details have not been learned. His son, Abraham (Arnn) Aron Jr., was born in Lancaster Co., Pa. on March 17, 1759. He was around 12 years of age when his father moved to Pittsylvania Co., Va. One of Mr. Arnn's daughters married in 1780 in Virginia. These two statements indicate that they came to Virginia in the 1770's. He was a patriotic citizen. He served the Continental Army of the Rev. War by repairing the Continental Army rifles. He also furnished beef for the Continental Army. The record of this service is recorded in Archives Dept. of Virginia State Library, Richmond, Va.* Her brother, Abraham Aron Jr., as a Rev. War soldier, was pensioned in his late years in Kentucky.

Her father. Abraham Arnn Sr., acquired lands in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and deeded many acres to his various sons. A brief statement can be stated about his family from a record found of his children in the NSDAR files as follows. The compiler was sent the following names of the children of Abraham Arnn, but the name of his wife was not included if it was known.

- ii. Abraham Arnn Jr., m. Chloe Pearson Aug. 29, 1795. Father was John Pearson.

NANCY FULLER

Nancy Fuller, born Jan. 23, 1798 on the farm of her father Joseph and mother * For full record see page 587.

Susannah (Arnn) Fuller, never married. She was still living in 1880 and the date of her death is unknown. Tradition claims that Nancy was a loving, faithful daughter and sister in the home of her parents and brothers. The 1850 census proves that she was residing in the home of her brother, Ralph Fuller. One of her great nieces knew she was in the home of her brother, Arthur Fuller, when his wife, Serena Fuller, died when their son, Joseph Fuller, was 2 weeks of age in 1853. She remained in the home of her brother Arthur Fuller and assisted Malissa, the oldest sister of his children and guided these nephews and nieces so long as she lived. In other words, Nancy Fuller helped all of her life where her loved ones needed her the most. The spirit of helpfulness blesses everyone and unto this day her life has not been forgotten.

KESSIAH FULLER

Kessiah Fuller, born June 3, 1801, was the second daughter and the third child of Joseph and Susannah (Arnn) Fuller. She never married. In 1850 she lived also in her brother Ralph Fuller's home. Her life no doubt, was very similar to the life of her sister, Nancy Fuller, that is, a life of service to her loved family.

HARTWELL ALLEN FULLER

Hartwell Allen Fuller, born June 19, 1812, was the son of Joseph and Susannah (Arnn) Fuller. He never married. His nickname was "Cap". In 1850 the census data shows that he was living in the home of his brother, Arthur Fuller and perhaps was employed by him. He was interested in the manufacturing of tobacco. He was perhaps also engaged in raising tobacco. In 1860 he owned 2,000 dollars worth of real estate. His sister, Kessiah, was residing in his home. Hartwell Allen Fuller died April 14, 1888.

DANIEL FULLER

Daniel Fuller was the fifth child of Joseph and Susannah (Arnn) Fuller. He, was born on June 12, 1806. No other information.

RALPH S. FULLER

Ralph S. Fuller was the ninth and the youngest child of Joseph and Susannah (Arnn) Fuller. He was born April 9, 1817. Rev. Arthur Eanes, on Feb. 16, 1846, performed the wedding ceremony for Ralph S. Fuller and Nancy J. Dunn. Joseph Dunn was bondsman. The 1850 census, Pittsylvania Co., Va. proves that Ralph S. Fuller was a farmer. His wife, Nancy (Dunn) Fuller, was born in 1824. They were the parents of two children:

- i. Matilda Fuller, b. 1847.
- ii. William Fuller, b. 1848.

It was at this time that his sisters Nancy and Kėssiah were residing in his home.

The 1860 census, Cassville, Georgia, proves that he went to Georgia later than the others. He was residing near the Solomon Fuller family and the Augustin Hubbard family, according to numbers of each household. In 1860 he was farming and his real estate was valued at 750 dollars and personal property at 445 dollars. This census shows he and his wife Nancy were born in Virginia and all of his children were born in Virginia except for the

youngest.

Matilda Fuller b. 1847, perhaps deceased.

William Fuller, b. 1848, was listed William G., age 12.

Maceda F. Fuller, age 11, b. Va.

George F.C. Fuller, age 7, b. Va.

Viteans (?) D. Fuller, age 4, b. Va.

Eliza J. Fuller, 5/12 age, born in Georgia. in Feb., 1860, since this enumeration was dated July 1860.

This proves that Ralph S. Fuller moved to Georgia after 1856.

HENRY P. FULLER

Henry P. Fuller (Hal), born Aug. 14, 1809, was the sixth child of Joseph and Susannah (Arnn) Fuller. The 1850 census proves the following is his data and shows he was 32 years old when he was married. Rev. Arthur W. Eanes performed the wedding ceremony on Dec. 11, 1841 for Henry P. Fuller and Lavinia Hutcheson. Nathan Hutcheson was bondsman. (See Min. Ret., Pitts. Co., Va.).

The following also proves Henry P. Fuller is the son of Joseph and Susannah Fuller. On Oct. 23, 1858 Henry P. Fuller and Lavinia (formerly Hutcheson), his wife, sell to Absolem Fuller for 1,950 dollars, 90 acres of land on Turkey Cock Creek, adjacent to Absolem Fuller, Dr. George Clements, Susan Fuller and Mary Mitchell. The deed explains this land is 1/6 of a tract in the possession of Susan Fuller as her dower in the first conveyed tract formerly belonging to her husband, Joseph Fuller, deceased.

Susan Fuller, age 72, was also in Henry P. Fuller's home at this time.

ISAAC FULLER

Isaac fuller, the son of Joseph and Susannah (Arnn) fuller, was born Dec. 28, 1799 in the Pittsylvania Co., Va. On Jan. 15, 1828 a marriage license was issued Isaac Fuller and Martha Nuckols (Patsy). She was the daughter of Josiah and Milly (Weatherford) Nuckols. Her father was deceased; his will was probated in 1919. Her brother, Levi Nuckols, was bondsman. (See Pitts. Cc., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 91). The 1860 census gave her age as 56 years, so she was born around 1804. They resided at Callands and he was a farmer. According to the 1860 census, their children were:

name was not on the 1860 census. She was mar. or deceased before that date. The compiler did not find a mar. license with her name.

ALMIRA THOMPSON FULLER

Almira Thompson Fuller, born Feb. 14, 1838, died May 24, 1921, was the daughter of Isaac and Martha (Nuckols) Fuller. She married on Feb. 19, 1867 Moses Allen Hubbard. Rev. R.B. Beck performed their wedding ceremony. (See Min. Ret. Pitts. Co., Va.). He was born Aug. 16, 1816 and died March 24, 1881. He was a farmer, whose real estate was evaluated at 5,800 dollars and his personal property at 1,243 dollars in the 1860 census. She was a widow 40 years. Their family data is recorded in Daniel Campbell Hubbard's chapter. See Vol. III, MEET YOUR ANCESTORS: Philpott, Hubbard, etc.

ARTHUR FULLER

Arthur Fuller, the son of Joseph and Susannah (Arnn) Fuller, was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on Dec. 26, 1803. He was born on the farm that was his father's birthplace. He grew up on that estate and lived there his entire life. He married Serena Elizabeth Reynolds, who was born near Callands, Va. in 1818. She was the daughter of Hugh and Elizabeth (Mitchell) Reynolds. A marriage license was issued on Oct. 17, 1836 to Arthur Fuller and Syrena Reynolds. Hugh Reynolds was bondsman. (See Mar. Reg., Pitts. Co., Va., p. 112). The 1850 census shows she was born in 1818. She died March 26, 1853 when their son, Joseph Fuller, was only two weeks old. Arthur died around 1883. His son's full name was Joseph Hugh Fuller. See p. 454.

Arthur Fuller was a farmer. The 1850 census listed him a tobacconist. This indicates he did have the business of manufacturing tobacco for chewing and smoking purposes. This accounts for a Mr. Ballington, age 24, being in Mr. Fuller's employment and a member of his household in 1850.

Arthur Fuller owned 304 acres of land valued at 2,000 dollars. Three hundred dollars was the value of his personal property and indicates he was not a slave holder.

The census shows his brothers, Hartwell Fuller, age 37, and John Fuller, age 17, were in his employment and no doubt involved in the manufacture of tobacco. Some years ago, the compiler was told that an old tobacco factory, so called, was still on those lands and used for storage.

Arthur Fuller was among the pioneers in what is today the great tobacco industry of the South. It is also significant that Serena (Reynolds) Fuller, his wife, was among the kindred of the founders of the great Reynolds Tobacco Company in North Carolina of today.

Elizabeth S.A. Fuller, (called Susan)born in 1842. Deed 8ook 125, p. 278, Pitts. Co., Va. includes S.E. Oakes and John K. Oakes among Arthur Fuller's heirs. So Elizabeth S.A. Fuller married John K. Oakes. No other facts known.

JULIA C. FULLER

Julia C. Fuller, one of the twin sisters, born in 1847, is also included among the heirs of Arthur Fuller in Deed Book 125, p. 278, as Julia C. Warren and J.P. Warren. Therefore, Julia C. Fuller married J.P. Warren. No more is known.

ARTISSE FULLER

Artisse Fuller, the twin sister of Julia C. (Fuller) Warren, is also listed in Deed 8ook 125, p. 278, as Mrs. Artesis Hairfield, an heir of Arthur Fuller. She was a widow at that recording, so the full name of Mr. Hairfield is not known. Those interested may find the details in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage Register.

TAYLOR LEE FULLER

Taylor Lee Fuller, born 1850, was the son of Arthur and Serena Elizabeth (Reynolds) Fuller. He was around 3 years of age when his mother died. He grew up on the old ancestral Fuller farm in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and had a part in all the interests of that family.

JESSE FULLER

Jesse Fuller, born Sept. 19, 1815, was the son of Joseph and Susannah (Arnn) Fuller. On Sept. 26, 1853 he married Sarah M. Galloway. It is said that

they had a son, viz:

THE SURNAME OF LETITIA FULLER

Letitia Fuller, born 17__, died before 1833, was the wife of Zachariah Fuller, born ca. 1750's, died ca. 1834. The following study has been made. Letty Fuller's name was evidently Letitia, since so many of her descendants were named Letitia. Her surname, so far, has no positive proof. Since their marriage license has not been found, the following may be the clue.

Zachariah Fuller signed a deed dated May 21, 1810 (D.B. 17 (1810-1812), Pitts. Co., Va., p. 861). Richard Pearson was buying land, those who signed deed were: first, Zachariah Fuller who married Letty __?_, second, Joseph Clift whose marriage license to marry Sarah Pearson was dated Aug. 28, 1791 (Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 14), third, John Pearson, fourth, Letty Arnn, who did not sign. It is said that she is recorded as acknowledging her agreement by signing later. She is regarded the daughter of Abraham Arnn, whose marriage license to marry Chloe Pearson was dated Aug. 28, 1795. (Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 20). If she was their daughter, she was too young to sign a deed in 1810.

The above proves the family connection of all except Zachariah Fuller. A lawyer has declared, quoting: "Zachariah Fuller would not have signed the document if he had not been an heir". Since he personally had no Pearson ancestors, his status, as heir, seems to be the same as that of Joseph Clift, who married Sarah Pearson, and also of Letty Arnn, whose father married Chloe Pearson. A John Pearson was also surety for the marriage of each Pearson girl. Evidence indicates that Letty, who married Zachariah Fuller, was a Pearson. If so, she was the eldest and married around 1777, by estimate. The compiler has had no opportunity to do essential research on the Pearson Family, whose children were Richard, John, Sarah, Chloe and, perhaps"Letty".

The compiler thanks the many Fuller descendants who contributed their data and interest in this Fuller family record.

RALEIGH THOMPSON HUBBARD (1845-1916)

This family was recorded on page 63, according to information received many years ago. In 1981 Mrs. Edmund Fitzgerald Hubbard (now residing close to Danville, Va.) sent the following facts, and the compiler is pleased to be able to include them. Mrs. Hubbard is the widow of Capt. Edmund Fitzgerald Hubbard, the second child of Raleigh Thompson and Emily Witt (Stone) Hubbard. She is not only their daughter-in-law but also a niece of Mrs. Emily Witt (Stone) Hubbard. Whereas formerly we knew only the initials E. F., now we know Edmund Fitzgerald Hubbard's full name, and that he was named for an ancestor. Mrs. Edmund Fitzgerald Hubbard's contribution follows:

RALEIGH THOMPSON HUBBARD (See also p. 63 & continuing)

Formerly spelled Rawley, Raleigh Thompson Hubbard, born April 28, 1845 in Pittsylvania County, Va., died there July 18, 1916. He was the son of Samuel and Elizabeth F. (Thompson) Hubbard. Raleigh Thompson Hubbard married first Emily Whitehead, the daughter of Richard Whitehead who married Eliza Caroline Brown. She died. They had no children.

Raleigh Thompson Hubbard married second on Dec. 1, 1885 Emily Witt Stone, born Dec. 10, 1857, died May 2, 1935. She was the daughter of John Thurston Stone who married Elizabeth Margaret Fitzgerald. They were the parents of five children:

Mrs. Edmond Fitzgerald Hubbard recalls the following: Mr. Raleigh Thompson Hubbard was a tall, straight standing man, riding his fine horse wherever he went. He was a large land owner who had cattle, sheep, hogs, horses, and hired help (not only on the farm but in the home). This meant there was on that farm everything essential for the welfare of all. Raleigh T. Hubbard also had an excellent ice house on the farm, and ice was harvested from his own ponds. This was true on very few farms because ponds required special care if ice was to be harvested for household use. There was an abundance of gardens and livestock.

During the War Between the States he was in the Cavalry under J. E. B. Stuart. As a father he was interested in giving his children educational advantages in spite of obstacles. For a number of years he employed a governess several months each year to instruct his children before they reached the age for higher education. Details of higher education are stated in the summaries following for individual children. He was a faithful, busy man during the War, Reconstruction, and many further years.

EDMUND FITZGERALD HUBBARD

Edmund Fitzgerald Hubbard, born Aug. 7, 1889, Pittsylvania Co., Va., died June 9, 1962 at Santa Rosa, Calif. He was the son of Raleigh Thompson Hubbard of Pittsylvania Co., Va., (born April 28, 1845, died July 18, 1916 in Pittsylvania Co., Va.) and his second wife, Emily Witt Stone (born Dec. 10, 1857, died May 2, 1935) the daughter of John Thurston Stone who married Elizabeth Margaret Fitzgerald, and the grand daughter of Edmund Fitzgerald, Sr. who was a Lieutenant in the Pittsylvania County, Va. Militia.

Edmund Fitagerald Hubbard married first around 1922 Mary Ann Ridgely Kemp from Baltimore, Maryland. As a youth he took advantage of his father's efforts to educate his children, and entered Fork Union Military Academy, and graduated, then entered the University of Virginia where he received a Law degree in 1916. He served in the Pittsylvania Co. Militia and later was inducted into the U.S. Army during World War I. He trained at Camp Lee, Hopewell, Virginia, but other details of his service in World War I have not been made available for inclusion here. He made a career of the Army, and for several years was serving in

the Phillippines. While there he became a diabetic, and resigned from the Armed Forces because of his health. He was honorably discharged with the rank of Captain, and was given a pension. He was a patient in a military hospital at San Francisco, California. While there he and his wife Mae discovered an outstanding physician who took a very special interest in his case. This doctor's care saved Edmund's life, and about that time insulin was recommended. Thereafter Edmund was able to continue a worthwhile life many years longer.

Captain and Mrs. Edmund Fitzgerald Hubbard made their home in Santa Rosa, Calif. where he soon became successful in the real estate business. He conducted an office with several employees for more than 30 years, before retirement. During that time he was elected President of the Santa Rosa Realtors Association. They were enjoying fair health and a successful business when his wife of 34 years, Mrs. Mary Ann Hubbard, developed cancer and died in May 1956 at Santa Rosa, Dalif. She was interred in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Capt. Edmund Hubbard continued his business interest in Santa Rosa.

Edmund Fitzgerald Hubbard married the second time on April 18, 1958 at Łouisa, Va., his cousin, Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes (Stone) Carter (called Homie), the widow of Mr. Edward R. Carter. She was born Sept. 28, 1894, the daughter of Samuel Rollens Stone, born Feb. 13, 1852, died March 9, 1934, who married Ella Reese Smith, born Nov. 7, 1865, died Nov. 28, 1907. The ceremony was performed by her brother, Rev. Samuel Rollens Stone, Jr. They went to Santa Rosa, Calif. where he continued his business until he retired in 1961. Relieved of the heavy care of the real estate business, he still was not idle because he conducted a loan company in Santa Rosa until his death on June 9, 1962. He was interred at Golden Gate Cemetery, San Francisco near other soldiers.

In 1980, 18 years after his death, his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes (Stone) Hubbard's memories are of four years of happiness in Santa Rosa, California. She returned to Virginia and lives near Danville. She is sincerely interested in this study of Capt. Hubbard's ancestors. They were loyal, patriotic, worthy American citizens:

MRS. SARAH WARREN (PHILPOTT) HUBBARD

Mrs. Sarah Warren (Philpott) Hubbard of Pittsylvania Co., Va., in 1779 was the widow of Daniel Campbell Hobart of Md., and the daughter of John and Mary (Glover) Philpott. She was born on the Philpott encestral lands in Charles Co., Md. The date of her birth was Jan. 5, 1756. (See One Thousand years Hubbard History.) She died after 1840 at her home at Callands, Va., known through the years as the James Mitchell estate. (See 1840 census.) She married March 28, 1779 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. James Mitchell, who by estimate was born in the 1740s. Parents not verified. He died July 20, 1795 at his home near Callands and was interred there.

James Mitchell's marriage bond, in a delapidated condition, has been recently found in the files of Pittsylvania County Court House. It is herein included as follows:

"Know all men by these Presents that wee: James Mitchell & Jos. Akin.... of Pittsylvania County are held and firmly bound unto the Commonwealth of Virginia in the sum of Fifty Pounds Virginia Currency. To which payment well and truly to be made we find ourselves our Heirs, Exors and Admrs. Jointly by these presents Sealed with our Seals and Dated the 28th Day of Anno Domo 1779

Whereas there is a marriage depending by God's permission suddenly intended between the above Bound James Mitchell and Sarah Waron Hubbard and

Now the Condision of the above Obligation is such that if there is no Lawful Cause to Obstruct the said Marriage then the Above Obligation to be Void or Else to Remain in full force and Power & Virtue.

Sealed and delivered in the presence of

The above copies were the courtesy of Mrs. M.V. Fitzgerald.

The compiler regards this letter of consent an interesting document. It proves the girl, an orphan when 10 years old, did learn to read and write. The education of girls over 200 years ago was limited in many ways. She spelled her words according to pronunciation.

Warren Philpott was her first cousin and Mary Ann Philpott was the wife of Sarah's half-brother, David Philpott. They had recently arrived in Virginia. It can be assumed they, her brothers John and Samuel and David Philpott and the family of her brother-in-law, Harrison Hubbard, were present when Sarah Warren Hubbard married James Mitchell.

Today the Marriage Register of Pittsylvania County of Virginia records this marriage on page 2: "James Mitchell ____28, 1779 and Sarah Waren

Hubbard with Jos. Akin as bondsman. The same record is on page 56 of the publication by C.L. Knorr (1957). Several publications give the same record and some add the names of Warren Philpott and Mary Ann Philpott as witnesses to Sarah Warren Hubbard's letter of consent. (Vol. 20 W (1), p. 144).

It should be recorded here that the first known publication of Pitt-sylvania County marriage bonds was by Edward W. James in 1897. He made abstracts of the early marriage bonds in this county and published part in Vol. VI William and Mary Quarterly, October, 1897 No. 2, p. 86. Mr. James continued this service in Vol. VII (series 1) W. & M. June 1898 No. 1, p. 55. Under year 1779 Mr. James recorded month by month sixteen marriages in Pittsylvania County, Va. Beginning with February he continued through December, recording for each license the month and day it was issued. James Mitchell was as follows.

1779

" March 28 James Mitchell and Sarah Waron Hubbard James Mitchell Jas. Akin "

Evidently Mr. James found those bonds filed not only under the year 1779, but also filed month by month, or he would never have recorded this marriage in the month of March. In the years that have intervened, this bond may have been filed out of order and later all compilers have omitted the month. Based on this first publication, this marriage date in this study is recorded as around March 28, 1779. Since there are no known family or Bible records the information for the James Mitchell family must be based on historical facts and Court records so far as they are known and fit together.

It is known that James Mitchell was in Pittsylvania Co., Va. when the boundary line separated Pittsylvania from Halifax Co. in 1767. He was living at Peytonsburg, the former County Seat of Halifax Co., Va. It seems he was an employee of Mr. John Wimbish, since "John Wimbish, James Mitchell" are listed together on Archibald Gordon's list of Tithables taken in 1767. (History of Pittsylvania County, Va. by M.C. Clement, p. 281) This means he was around 16 years old but not a mature man. If data is found it will be included later.

The records of Camden Parish prove he was an Episcopalian and a member of the first church in the Parish. The evidence that he was a communicant is that he was paid 400 pounds of tobacco for his services as Sexton in 1771. Benjamin Potter recieved this remuneration after that year. James Mitchell with others, served in 1776 in processioning the patented lands. These facts verify his status as a dependable member of the Episcopal Church (Vestry Book) at that time.

When Pittsylvania Co., Va. was formed from Halifax Co. in 1767, history claims the settlers had to be on the alert for molestation from the Indians. Unity was essential because the population was small. Many new settlers were coming into the new county. All of the Colonies were nearing the Revolutionary War. For all these "Reasons" Unity was essential and history records that Pittsylvania County appointed military officers for its county militia at once to serve during the years 1767 to 1770. Seventeen captains were appointed. (Page 90, History of Pittsylvania Co., M.C. Clement)

When the Revolutionary War era was approaching, two evidences of loyalty

to the Cause of the Colonies and of his true patriotism, were exacted of every male citizen 16 years old and older that he must sign the Oath of Allegiance. Every male citizen also between the ages of 18 and 50 years were required by the Virginia law to train for military duty. Each man belonged to a Company and equipped himself for service with a good rifle and three charges of powder and ball. The companies drilled every two weeks with a general county muster in April and October. (Page 143 Ibid)

James Mitchell was a member of Capt. Daniel Hawkins Company. The verification is found when Daniel Hawkins Company signed the Oath of Allegiance on Oct. 20, 1777. James Mitchell's name is on that list. This list was to be sent to the Clerk of the County Court. Capt. Hawkins signed this list on June 10, 1778 and turned the information over to the proper officer. (See Pittsylvania Co., Va. Muster Roll, p. 296) (See pp. 163-164 Pitts. Co. History, M.C. Clements)

The following facts are found in Pittsylvania Court Records.

A.

At the June Court 1777 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Quoting: "James Mitchell is recommended to his Excellency the Governor, as a fit person to serve as Ensign in Captain Daniel Hawkins Company of Militia in this County" (Reel 48 (1778-1783) Pittsylvania Co., Va. Virginia State Archives, Richmond, Va., P. 12)

"Daniel Hawkins Esquire, came into Court and resigned his Commission as Captain of the Militia in this County and James Brewer is appointed in his stead and James Mitchell is appointed his First, Robert Orr his Second Lieut and Caleb Brewer his Ensign."

November Court 1778 Court Order Book No. 4, p. 181, Pitts. Co., Va.

C.

On the motion of James Mitchell, a certificate was granted him to be the administrator of the estate of Daniel Campbell Hubbard, deceased. He took the oath according to Law and William Devin and Robert Orr were his security. It was ordered also that Robert Orr, William Devin, James Brewer and David or any three of them, being first sworn as the Law directs, be directed to appraise the estate and return an Inventory to the Court in Oct. 1781. See Order Book 4, p. 381, Pittsylvania Co., Va. Court Sept. 18, 1781.

The Inventory of Daniel Campbell Hubbard's estate is recorded in Pitt-sylvania Co., Va. Court Records as follows:

The above data identifies James Mitchell as the James Mitchell who married the widow of Daniel Campbell Hubbard. It also proves he was the neighbor and friend of Captain James Brewer and Second Lieutenant Robert Orr, his comrades in the same Virginia Company of Militia. Furthermore Mr. Devin was William Devin Sr., who was a near neighbor of First Lieutenant James Mitchell. This survey for the Devin homestead was made on Banister River and was the home of James Mitchell when this Inventory was taken. James Mitchell's land was at the Head of Banister and Wet Sleeve.

D.

This Inventory provokes the question, "Was this "Smooth Board Gun" the one furnished the Continental Army by James Mitchell?". In the Public Service Claims Commission Book 5, page 19 is found, quoting: "Jas. Mitchell for a gun furd ydo the Continental Army at the cost allowed by the Court Pittsylvania 1 L 17 sh 6 d." If it was the gun in the above Inventory of Daniel Campbell Hubbard, his descendants can be happy and James Mitchell's descendants can rejoice their ancestor secured this gun for Rev. War needs. History reveals there was a scarcity of guns. Mr. Hubbard's gun was available and the compiler thinks this was his gun.

Page 20 of the same book records that James Mitchell also furnished corn for the Continental Army.

The fact that James Mitchell was appointed First Lieutenant of James Brewer's Company of Militia proves he had been active in the militia a long enough time to assure the officers he was capable of assuming the responsibilities of that service.

History claims the Militia of Pittsylvania County saw activity in suppressing Tories, guarding the lead mines at Wytheville; they fought at the Battle of Cowpens. So far, however, no record has been found that determines the service of each group of the militia of Pittsylvania County. It has been learned. however, that Captain James Brewer's Company, under the command of Col. Peter Perkins, was at the Battle of Guilford. This statement was made under oath by two soldiers, viz; John Neal and David Wray when giving details when seeking a pension. See Pension Papers on file in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Court House, and p. 185 History of Pittsylvania Co., Va. by M.C. Clement. If James Brewer's militia was there then his First Lieutenant was also on duty. Mrs. Clement, the historian, was a native of that county. She said, quoting: "History has preserved for us the names of but few of the Pittsylvanians who made so noble a stand on that day of battle, though we may well know that every able bodied man in the county who could possess himself of a gun was present". (p. 185 ibid) The compiler agrees with Mrs. Clement. Looking at the map by its scale of miles, Callands, the home of James Mitchell, was 15 miles from the N.C. state line and Guilford was 30 miles south of the state line. Therefore, a "Bee Line" from Callands to Guilford was around 45 miles and the enemy was quite nearer in

time of battle. Distance meant nothing to our forefathers in those days. Many traveled great distances as did Paul Revere. Others were as loyal as were those noble men at Valley Forge. Therefore, the men in Pittsylvania who were able to go were without a doubt at Guilford or on a duty of some nature to sustain the Cause.

It is valuable to have a record that James Brewer's Company was there at the Battle of Guilford on March 13, 1781 and also to know that James Mitchell was his First Lieutenant. This means James served with the Continental Line on at least one occasion. If more recorded facts are found, they will be included later.

* * *

James Mitchell secured the land known today by his descendants as their ancestor's home. The compiler has not learned the early history of this land. The history may be in the Court Records of Halifax Co., Va. which was formed in 1752 from Lunenburg Co., Va. The Pittsylvania Co. Land records prove Richard Yates sold this same land in 1775 to Drury Oliver. Deed Book 4, p. 155. Drury Oliver sold it on June 26, 1777 to Daniel Baugh of Halifax Co., Va. Deed Book #4, p. 372. Then in Deed Book 6, p. 73, Daniel Baugh of Mecklenburg Co. sold it to James Mitchell. Deed dated Aug. 17, 1780 was recorded Nov. 24, 1780. This deed states James Mitchell is a citizen of Pittsylvania Co., Va. Today, 195 years later, this land is owned by his descendants. See also p. 493-N and 617

James Mitchell's children were born and reared there. When his estate in 1819 was settled as directed in his Will, his youngest son, James Allen Mitchell, bought the interest of his brothers and sisters. Their mother was living and retained her Right of Dower. So long as she lived this was her home. In 1859 James Allen Mitchell willed this homestead to his children, viz: John Allen, William T. and their sister, Caroline Mitchell. Through the years William Thomas Mitchell came to be the owner. He had only one heir, Charles Raymond Mitchell. This great grandson of James Mitchell, around 1900, sold this part of his estate to John Isaac Arnn, another great great grandson of James and Sarah (Philpott) Mitchell through their son John Mitchell, the oldest brother of James Allen Mitchell. After his death, his son, John Isaac Arnn Jr., owned it and today it is the home of his widow, Barbara Arnn. Their son, John Isaac Arnn, III, is the future heir to this property. The grave of James Mitchell who died July 20, 1795 is in the graveyard his son, James Allen Mitchell, reserved in his Will dated on Feb. 28, 1859.

Today it is not possible to record the family life of James Mitchell and his family. It is assumed his death occured suddenly and early in life since his Will was dated July 18th and his grave stone shows July 20, 1795 was the date of his death.

Sarah Warren Mitchell assumed her responsibilities and their farm life was successful. She paid taxes, bought more land, it will be seen, reared a worthy family and according to tradition, lived to be more than 90 years of age. The 1840 census proves she was living then.

On this land acquired by James Mitchell at the Head of Banister and Wet Sleeve, they had a substantial brick home. It is not positively known when this house was built, but if not already on the land it was constructed around 1780 by James Mitchell. Tradition claimed there were in the long ago beautiful trees and a flower garden around this early home. This home was torn down around 1900 when John Isaac Arnn purchased this property from Charles Raymond Mitchell. He desired to build for his home a modern frame house. In a conversation with his uncle John Mitchell Hubbard he explained

the condition of the old brick house and knew the brick walls were no longer safe. On one side the wall not only had cracked all the way to the eaves but a portion had caved into the cellar. He therefore had the entire building taken down. He used the brick he needed in the new home, The mantels, doors and some of the wainscoting were used in the new home so far as needed. The rest was sold to neighbors who desired it.

Knowing his bride knew all about that old home better than anyone else, the compiler requested in 1962 of Ida Fuller Arnn a description of this old house as it was when she knew it in 1900. Sixty two years later she gave the following description. There was a large two room basement under the entire brick house. The first floor above the basement was entered from a porch. One room was a very large room at least 20 by 20 feet square and was called the ball-room. A door opened into a smaller room. From this room there was a stairway to the cellar and another to the third floor. She did not state how else this room was utilized, but it was perhaps a sitting room. On the third floor there were three large bedrooms. This part of the home was heated by fireplaces built into one large central chimney. Then on one side of this brick house there was a frame building built on a wall 8 feet high, which was used for the kitchen and dining room. The shrubs and flowers were gone in 1900. She said there was one Arborvita tree still living in 1900 and one pink rose was there. She had preserved the pink rose and 62 years later it bloomed in 1962. She lived there until 1967 and passed away at age 93 years.

After the old home was removed, the brick all used or sold, that large basement was filled in and there is no evidence one was ever there. Another interesting thing about this old home was that it came to be known as "The Haunted House". The compiler inquired if Ida Fuller Arnn knew the Ghost stories. She replied she did and they were all exploded when John Arnn and his employees tore out all those brick and never found a skeleton. "No, not even a bone was found." declared his wife. There were at least two different stories and both proved untrue. So there was no reason to secure them.

When Ida Fuller Arnn was a bride she went to live there and lived there the rest of her long, beautiful life. So many of John Arnn's relatives had lived there. Many died there or moved away. Capt. William T. Mitchell, his second wife Mahala Owen Mitchell and his young son by his first marriage resided there awhile but finally made their home in Halifax Co., Va. Tradition claims Mahala was a lover of birds and less interested in flower gardens. When John and Ida Arnn became the owners they found only "Left" Mitchell and his family there. He was the slave baby left by his mother on the porch of the Mitchell store one night when slave traders marched their newly purchased slaves through that area. He was given to a "wet nurse", cared for tenderly, called "Left" but named Leftrich. He grew up there. He was cared for and loved by the family all of his life and he loved them. He learned to be a blacksmith and was given a shop on the place and a home to live in. They were kind and helpful to Left and family and they were the same to the bridegroom and his bride who came as owners of this old home place in 1900. "Left#became old and infirm and lived with a daughter. They were all deceased finally and interred at the Callands Baptist Church for Colored people. in Pittsylvania Co., Va.

It will be seen that the children of James and Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hubbard) Mitchell who were living in 1819 were, viz:

- I. Samuel Mitchell
- II. Elizabeth Mitchell
- III. John Mitchell
- iv. Jame Mitchell

- V. Cassey Mitchell
- VI. Patsy Mitchell
- VII. James Allen Mitchell

The information regarding the above children is recorded later. If there were other children born they were deceased in 1819 and left no heirs. The Will of James Mitchell did not name his children but secured his wife until all were mature, and until life was over for his beloved wife.

"THE WILL OF JAMES MITCHELL

In the name of God Amen. I James Mitchell of the County of Pittsylvania being very sick and weak in body but of sound mind and memory, thanks be to God and calling to mind the mortality of my body that it is appointed for Man once to die do make, ordain and constitute this my last Will and Testament and first of all I give and recommend my Soul to Almighty God that gave it and my body to be buried at the discretion of, Executors Imprimis my first Debts to be honestly paid.

Item I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Sarah W. Mitchell all my Estate both Rael and personal in during her natural life or until my youngest Child do arrive at Lawfull age and then the Estate to be sold and Money arising therefrom to be equally divided between all my children Except her Lawful part & that for her to give and dispose of as she thinks fit and proper. I do further constitute and appoint my beloved wife Sarah W. Mitchell my hole and sole Exct of this my last Will and Testament Ratifying Confirming this and no other Will to be my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have here unto set my hand and Seal this the eighteenth day of July one Thousand Seven hundred and ninety five.

At a Court held for Pittsylvania County the 19th day of October 1795 the within written last Will and Testament of James Mitchell deceased was Established into Court and Proved by the Oaths of two of the Witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded." (See Pitts. Co., Va. Deed & Will Book 10 (1794-1795), p. 249-250).

One of the Witnesses to this Will was Moses Hubbard his stepson. He was 21 years old in 1795 and James Mitchell had been his stepfather over 15 years. (See his data in the Hobart section).

Time passed and it will be seen that Sarah W. Mitchell reared a fine family. The settlement of the Estate of her husband was essential and the proof of James Mitchell's living heirs was found in the following deed so it is included as it is found recorded in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Deed Book 22 (1818-1819), pp. 152, 153, quoting:

"This Indenture made the 15th Day January in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and Nineteen Between John Mitchell, Samuel Mitchell, Hugh Reynolds, Elizabeth Reynolds his wife, Richard Parrish and Jane Parrish his wife, Patsy Mitchell and Cassey Mitchell of the one part and James A. Mitchell of the County of Pittsylvania of the other part. Witnesseth that the said John Mitchell, Samuel Mitchell, Hugh Reynolds and Elizabeth Reynolds his

wife, Richard Parrish and Jane Parrish his wife, Patsey Mitchell and Cassey Mitchell for and in consideration of the sum of three hundred Dollars lawful money of Virginia to them in hand paid by the said James A. Mitchell the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, Hath bargained sold and by these presents doth give, grant, bargain and sell and convey unto the said Jas. A. Mitchell one certain tract of Land lying and being in the County of Pittsylvania on the head branches of Banister and Wet Sleeve containing two hundred acres be the same more or less and bounded as followeth to wit: Beginning at a red oak thence running S 160 poles crossing a branch to pointers, thence East 200 poles crossing a branch to a white oak Corner thence W 200 poles crossing a branch to the beginning. This deed proves James Allen Mitchell was the youngest living child of James and Sarah Warren Mitchell, who was living at home with his mother and sisters. Patsey and Cassey Mitchell, also their half sister, Mary Glover Hubbard, bought from his father's heirs their interest in his father's estate.

In later years researchers observed this and assumed she was not living since nothing was said regarding her right of Dower. Reading her husband's Will, he had said "Except her Lawful part & that for her to give and dispose of as she thinks fit and proper". She did not sign away her "Lawful part". She was at home and lived there with the above children for years. It has been a grave mistake to say she died around 1819. Tradition said she lived to be around 90 years of age. So the search continued. Census records were searched. The 1830 census showed four elderly ladies in the household of her son, James A. Mitchell, but more than 100 years later their names were not known. Then the 1840 census for James A. Mitchell gave his own family. There, right under his data, was Sarah Mitchell as head of her household. She was the woman between 80 and 90 years of age on this census record. She was 84 years old on Jan. 5, 1840. Just how much longer she lived has not been learned. She was not on the 1850 census. In her home in 1840 were two of her old unmarried daughters. One of the three living in 1830 had passed away. This was Mary Glover Hubbard, her oldest daughter, whose father was Daniel Campbell Hubbard. Sarah Mitchell listed 5 female slaves as her property.

It was recalled that she was an active person all of her life until her late years after perhaps a slight stroke. Then she was cared for by her Mitchell daughters. In the morning they dressed her and took her in for breakfast. They suggested she sit at the table and she did this. They served her plate. She always just sat there and she would make no effort to eat. One would ask "Why don't you eat Mammy?". Always her reply was "Oh pshaw, I will now". She had tender loving care through that last sad season of unnatural health. Years later she was spoken of by her many grandchildren, who knew her, in loving terms and called "Granny Mitchell" by her Hubbard and Mitchell grandchildren. She was remembered as a wonderful woman.

A brief survey of her life shows her father died when she was 5 years old, her mother when she was ten. In whose care she was after that is not known positively. She married Daniel Campbell Hobert in Maryland when very young, and by estimate, around 1773. She was around 2D years old when they moved to Virginia in 1776. Tradition says she became a widow soon after their arrival in Va. She had a son and a daughter. After her second marriage in 1779 at least 7 children were born who grew to be adults and there may have been others who died. She however was a widow the second time when only 39 years old. Her oldest son was 21 years old, his sister was younger, but no dates are known. Her 3 oldest Mitchell children were 15, 14 and 13 years old. She took up her task and the result was worthy. Her 4 sons accomplished much it will be seen in each chapter and the 5 daughters were fine women.

Sarah Warren Mitchell had 200 acres of land. A reference was made to a purchase from her son Moses Hubbard, of 78 acres of land. This land had one boundary line that touched her own 200 acres. The deed is dated Dec. 17, 1803, signed by Moses Hubbard, witnessed by Hartwell Allen, Wm. Calland, Jacob Arnn and John Mitchell. It was recorded at a Court held for Pittsylvania Co., Va. on Dec. 19, 1803. Teste: Will Tunstall Cl of C. (See D.B. 13, p. 505, Pitts. Co., Va.). The above land was listed on her tax account and she paid taxes after that date on 200 acres and 78 acres of land until 1819. She sold to her son James A. Mitchell her own individual acres in the following deed.

"This Indenture made the 26th day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighteen. Between Sarah W. Mitchell of the one part and James A. Mitchell of the County of Pittsylvania of the other part Witnesseth that the said Sarah W. Mitchell for and in consideration of the sum of one hundred and seventeen dollars lawful money of Virginia to her in hand paid by the said James A. Mitchell, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged Hath bargained sold and by these presents doth give grant bargain sell and convey unto said James A. Mitchell one certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in the County of Pittsylvania, on the head branch of Banister Containing 78 acres by the same more or less and bounded as followeth to wit: Beginning at pointers in Mitchell's line thence N. 126 poles to a white oak in James Hart's line, thence his line S. 87 W 44 poles to pointers thence running 5. 50 W. 45 poles to a Chestnut tree N. 44 W. 12 poles Hunley's Corner white oak thence new line S. 55 W. 34 poles to a red oak thence S. 5 E. 69 poles to pinters in Mitchell's aforesaid and thence N. 87 E. 112 poles crossing a branch to the Beginning. To Have and To Hold the aforesaid tract of Land unto the said James A. Mitchell him and his heirs &c forever. In Witness where of the said Sarah W. Mitchell has hereunto set her hand and affixed her Seal the day and year first written.

Notice the date of the above deed was Oct. 26, 1818 and the date of the deed for the 200 acres was Jan. 15, 1819. These dates assisted some to feel

she signed the Oct. deed and passed away before the year 1819 and the children settled their father's estate. The Court proceedings were not read which clearly show she was living and at that time only 62 years old. See 1840 census which proved she was still living.

It is interesting to observe the success of her children. Each of her 4 sons began their young adult lives without any aid from their deceased father. Their records prove each succeeded in a marvelous way. Each acquired lands, built up an estate, and all four reared worthy families. It is claimed the 3 Mitchell brothers owned all the land on both sides of Banister River for a distance of four miles. This tradition, if true, can be verified by Pittsylvania Co., Va. Deed Books.

Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hobart) Mitchell lived a long life. She had many sorrows. She was an orphan in 1766; a widow twice before 1796; each of her brothers and their wives were deceased before 1840. She, however, lived a successful life and had the joy of seeing her children achieve success and an opportunity to be their beloved "Granny Mitchell" to all her grandchildren. A worthy life.

The Marriages and Family Data of the children of James and Sarah Warren Mitchell:

SAMUEL MITCHELL

Samuel Mitchell was the oldest son of James and Sarah Warren Mitchell. There is no family record but the Pittsylvania Death Register records, page 51, line 25. In year 1859 the following is recorded: "Samuel Mitchell, white male Died Feb. 15, 1859, Banister, age 78. Son of Jas. and Sally Mitchell. Born in Pittsylvania County, Va. A farmer. Consort of Susan Mitchell. Informer was James M. Reynolds". This means that sometime after February 15, 1780 Samuel Mitchell was born, and died before his 79th birthday. His dates can safely be written: born 1780 died Feb. 15, 1859, in Pittsylvania Co., Va. age 78 years.

For the sake of his descendants it perhaps is true that he was not only named for his mother's beloved brother Samuel Philpott but given his full name, since his name has been found in two court records as Samuel P. Mitchell.

Samuel Mitchell was issued a license on Jan. 2, 1815 to marry Elizabeth Cox, the daughter of James and Betty (?) Cox. Hugh Reynolds was his security. They were married on Jan. 5, 1815 by Rev. Thomas Boaz. (See Marriage Register Pitts. Co., Va. and Ministers Returns). Samuel Mitchell served in the War of 1812 and was due western land for this service. He was in Capt. Callands Company and on his list of men due land. (See History of Pitts. Co., Va. Clement, p. 214).

When Samuel was of age, he was a farmer and followed this work all of his life. He without a doubt resided in his mother's home until his marriage.

He began to buy land. On Dec. 14, 1812 he bought 173 acres on the head branches of Banister River. Witnesses were John Mitchell, John Mahan, Hugh Reynolds and Richard Parrish. This deed was recorded Dec. 24, 1812. (Deed Book 18 (1812-1814) Pitts. Co., Va., p. 139. On Sept. 16, 1816 Samuel Mitchell bought 70 acres of land from his brother-in-law, Hugh Reynolds and his sister Elizabeth Reynolds. This land was also on the waters of Banister. This deed was recorded the same day. Teste, Will Tunstall Cl P.C. (See 0.8. 20 Pitts. Co., Va., p. 180. Recorded 9-16-1816). On 3rd of March, 1837, when Frederick Oberthier, Moses Hubbard and Gilbert Combs Jr.

were Commissioners to sell 212 acres, a tract of land for Michael Ebart deceased, it was deeded to Samuel Mitchell. This deed signed by these Commissioners was recorded March 20, 1837. (See D.B. 41. p. 52). On Dec. 13, 1837 Samuel Mitchell bought 115 acres of land on head waters of Banister. This deed was recorded on Jan. 15, 1838. (D.8. 41 (1837-1838) Pitts. Co., Va., p. 115, Reel 19, Va. State Archives, Richmond, Va.). There may be other lands but 570 acres of land acquired by a young man's own endeavor proves he was a man of business ability, industrious and aggressive. The story of his life activities has been lost but it was a worthwhile life. The children of Samuel and Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell were born at Callands, Va. and are:

- i. James Mitchell, b. ca. 1817 by estimate.
- ii. Patsy Mitchell, b. 1820 (1860 census).
- iii. Jame Mitchell, b. 1821 (1860 census).
 - iv. Samuel Mitchell Jr., b. 1825 (1860 census).
 - v. Moses Mitchell, b. 1828, (1860 census).
 - vi. Elizabeth Mitchell (Bettie), b. 1831 (1860 census).

Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell, the mother of these children, died prior to 1832 and according to the 1850 census, her daughter (Bettie) was a very young infant.

Samuel Mitchell married the second time the sister of Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell. She was Miss Susan Cox. Rev. R.B. Beck performed the ceremony of the marriage of Samuel Mitchell to Susan Cox on July 2, 1832. She signed her own consent and Samuel Blair was Security for Samuel Mitchell. See Minister's Returns, Pitts. Co., Va. They have no children but she was a mother to her sister's children for many years. She remained in the home and was a mother to all of them throughout her life. Susan (Cox) Mitchell was born in 1800 and died on an unknown date.

Marriages and some data regarding Samuel and Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell's children:

JAMES MITCHELL

James Mitchell is regarded the oldest child of Samuel and Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell. When the 1850 census was taken he was not living in his father's household. It was learned that when the estate of his father, Samuel Mitchell, was settled that James and Louisa J. Mitchell of Sumner Co., Tenn. sold to William T. Mitchell and William V. Reynolds for \$1,000.00 Lot No. 2 drawn by the said James Mitchell from the Estate of his father, Samuel Mitchell deceased. This sale was recorded Aug. 24, 1860 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. Deed Book No. 59, p. 348. Years later in 1975 the compiler found the 1850 census for Sumner County, Tennessee. Transcribed by Deane Porch (1972) on page 179 in District No. 19 the following was recorded:

According to the above Va. record they were in the same Co. in August 1860.

According to some of their Virginia relatives, they later went to Texas to live and they had at least one son, Madison Mitchell, of Texas. No one a hundred years later could assist in an effort that was made to contact this family.

PATSY MITCHELL

Patsy Mitchell, the daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell, was born around 1820 at Callands, Va. and died there. She never married.

SAMUEL MITCHELL JR.

Samuel Mitchell Jr., the son of Samuel and Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell, was born around 1825 and at age 35 in the 1860 census was a farmer. At that time he had already received his legacy from his father's estate and his estate was evaluated at \$1,270.00. He may never have married. No one knew and no record was found.

ELIZABETH MITCHELL

Elizabeth Mitchell, called Bettie, was the youngest child of Samuel and Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell. She was born at Callands, Va. in 1831 (1850 census) and was recorded in the household of her stepmother, Susan (Cox) Mitchell, in the 1860 census. A marriage license was issued on Jan. 12, 1846 (Mar. Reg. p. 138) . On Jan. 15, 1846 Vaden G. Mahan and Elizabeth Mitchell were united in marriage by Rev. A. Hodnett. (See Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Req. for Minister Returns). He was born Feb. 19, 1824 and died in Aug. 1851. The marriage license shows that her brother Samuel Mitchell Jr. was bondsman. They had 2 children according to the 1860 census:

- i. James M. Mahan, b. 1849 was 11 years old.
- Samuel D. Mahan, b. 1851 was 9 years old.

Their father was deceased in 1860. Mrs. Elizabeth Mitchell Mahan married on October 30, 1862 James Reynolds (Jimmie). They had no descendants. James Reynolds was the son of Hugh and Elizabeth Mitchell Reynolds. They were first cousins. (See Reynold's Family by Frederick Tilman).

JANE MITCHELL

Jane Mitchell was a daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell. She was born 1821 (1860 census). On Nov. 19, 1838 Horatio Arnn and Jane Mitchell were married by Rev. Arthur W. Eanes. (See Pitts. Co., Va. Minister's Returns in Marriage Register). In the 1850 census the surname Arnn is spelled Aron. This census shows Horatio Aron was born in 1811. He was listed as a master carpenter. The following children were given in the 1850 and 1860 censuses:

- Valney Aron, born 1841 age 9 years. 1850 census
- born 1845 age 5 years. 2. John Aron, 1850 census
- Faulkner Aron, born 1846 age 4 years. 1850 census
- 4. Elizabeth Aron, born 1850 age 3 months. 1850 census

- born 1840 age 10 years 1850 census Albert T. Aron, born 1852 age 8 yrs. 6.
- 1860 census 7. Ballard P. Aron, born 1849 age 11 yrs 1860 census
- born 1859 age 1 year 8. Telitha Aron, 1860 census

Marriages and other data so far as known:

VOLNEY ARON

Volney Aron, son of Horatio and Jane (Mitchell) Arnn, married Dec. 24, 1860 Malissa Fuller. Rev. William B. McDowell performed their ceremony. (See Minister's Returns Pitts. Co., Va., p. 160). The Death Register Pitts. Co., Va., p. 78 shows she died from diphtheria in April, 1861, age 22. This has been declared an error. He died from diphtheria but she was left totally deaf for life. She was the daughter of Arthur Fuller. (See Fuller section). Their children: Only one child, a son named Volney Beauregard Aron, was born after his father's death from diphtheria and after his mother's illness and deafness from the same disease. He grew up in his grandfather Fuller's home. He married Marg Ann Wells who died after many years, leaving him with many children. Their names are unknown to the compiler. Volney Beauregard Aron's mother lived in his home after his marriage. She lived to be a very old lady and it has been said she practically reared her son's children. Those interested can follow their family data, court records and the census records and may easily connect with their above ancestors. See Arnn data and remember the name Aaron, Aron has been for many generations the incorrect spelling to the descendants of Abreham Arnn who was an early settler in Pittsylvania Co., Va. (The above facts were recalled by Mrs. Ellen Fuller Young). Volney B. Aaron left a Will. (See Pitts. Co., Va. Will Book 5, p. 200. Not seen by compiler).

ALBERT T. A RON

Albert T. Aaron, born 1852, died from diphtheria, age 9 years in 1861.

JOHN ARON

John Aron, son of Horatio and Jane (Mitchell) Arnn, died at age 15 from dightheria in 1861.

MACBETH AARON

Macbeth Aaron, daughter of Horatio and Jane (Mitchell) Aaron, married Luther Rice Blair, the son of Samuel and Clarissa (Fuller) Blair, on March 28, 1869. Their data is recorded in the Fuller section under the Britain and Nancy Jackson Fuller family. This record proves her name was Macebeth Harriet Aaron born Nov. 19, 1838 and d. June 7, 1885.

MOSES MITCHELL

Moses Mitchell was a son of Samuel Mitchell and his first wife Elizabeth (Cox) Mitchell. According to the 1860 census he was born in 1828. His father died on Feb. 15, 1859 and the 1860 census shows Susan (Cox) Mitchell was the head of Samuel Mitchell's household and Moses Mitchell and family were in the home. It is seen that Moses was in charge of affeirs. Samuel Mitchell's estate had been settled. Susan Mitchell's real estate was evaluated at 1800 dollars and personal property at 5 hundred dollars. Moses' personal property was estimated 225 dollars and real estate at 750 dollars. Moses was a farmer in 1860.

Moses Mitchell was a young man of stability and excellent character. There is every evidence that he was a private in one of the local Companies of Militia in Pittsylvania Co. as early as a teenage boy was permitted to

enlist. They served as a private and then as Ensign. The year he was only 20 years old he was given the following honor:

'The Commonwealth of Virginia To Moses Mitchell...Greeting: Know you, That from the special trust and confidence reposed in your fidelity, courage, activity and good conduct, our Lieutenant General, acting as Governor, pursuant to the Constitution, by the authority vested in him for that purpose doth commission you the said Moses Mitchell...as Second Lieutenant... in the Hundred & first Regiment of Infantry of the Line, in the 11th Brigade and 1st Division of the Virginia Militia, to rank as such from the 23rd day of July 1848. In testimony where of, These our Letters are sealed with the Lesser Seal of the Commonwealth, and made patent.

Witness John F. Wiley our Lieutenant Governor, at Richmond this 16th day of October 1848 Jno F. Wiley."

Four years later he had never wavered or fallen short of the trust his officers had in him.

"The Commonwealth of Virginia To Moses Mitchell...Greeting: Know you, that from the special trust and confidence reposed in your fidelity, courage, activity and good conduct, our Governor, pursuant to authority vested in the Executive by law, doth commission you the said Moses Mitchell as Captain in the 101st Regiment of the Line in the 11th Brigade and 1st Division of the Virginia Militia, to rank as such from the 7th day of May 1852. In Testimony whereof, These our Letters are sealed with the Lesser Seal of the Commonwealth and made patent.

Witness Joseph Johnson, our Governor at Richmond, this 19th day of May 1852.

These two certificates were in possession of Dr. H.L. Mitchell and he supplied them for this study.

This enviable military record was earned by Moses Mitchell years before the War Between the States occured. When this time came Moses Mitchell arose to the occasion and his duty. The details are unknown. In loyalty to his homeland he gave his life. He was killed in battle at Cedar Creek, Va. on Aug. 9, 1862. He was interred on the Cedar Creek Battle Field. Moses Mitchell laid lown his life for States Rights at the age of 34 years. His Will was probated at a Pittsylvania Court on Sept. 15, 1862.

A marriage license was issued to Moses Mitchell and Elizabeth F. Mahan on May 10, 1856. (See Pitts. Co. Mar. Reg.). She was the daughter of Abner Mahan who married Ann Giles. Elizabeth (Mahan) Mitchell was born Nov. 24, 1837 and died March 5, 1882, Callands, Va. (See Mahan family record below). The children of Moses and Elizabeth F. (Mahan) Mitchell were:

- i. John Randolph Mitchell, b. April 11, 1858.
- ii. Elizabeth Ann Moses Mitchell, b. Oct. 5, 1862.

MARRIAGES

ELIZABETH ANN MOSES MITCHELL

Elizabeth Ann Moses Mitchell was born at Callands, Va. on Oct. 5, 1862 after her father died in the battlefield at Cedar Run on Aug. 9, 1862. When she was 16 years old she was married. Samuel Daniel Mattox married Elizabeth Ann

Moses Mitchell on Nov. 28, 1878. She died Aug. 25, 1903. He was born June 24, 1856 and died May 12, 1933. They resided at Callands, Va. No other details were given.

JOHN RANDOLPH MITCHELL

John Randolph Mitchell, born April 11, 1858 at Callands, Va., was the son of Moses and Elizabeth F. (Mahan) Mitchell. He married first on Nov. 25, 1891 Mary Frances Walker, the daughter of Robert Armistead Walker who married Julia Fuller Blair of Whitmell, Va. Mary Frances Walker was born April 5, 1869 and died Feb. 17, 1910. Her marriage was near Oregan, Rockingham Co., N.C. They had one son:

i. Howard Lyle Mitchell, b. Jan. 13, 1893 at Callands, Va. and was reared there.

John Randolph Mitchell married the second time on April 20, 1911 Anna Belle Mitchell, born April 11, 1869, died Feb. 9, 1947, the daughter of James Wilson and Martha Thompson (McDearman) Mitchell. They had no children. They resided at Callands, Va.

HOWARD LYLE MITCHELL

Howard Lyle Mitchell was the only son of John Randolph and Mary Frances (Walker) Mitchell. They resided at Callands, Va. and are laid to rest there forever. Their educational opportunities were private schools and Mary Frances Walker's father was an outstanding teacher in the private schools in that section of Virginia.

Howard Lyle Mitchell attended the public schools of the Callands, Va. community and Chatham High School when older. He then entered William and Mary College at Williamsburg, Va. After graduation he entered the Medical College of Virginia at Richmond, Va. and graduated in 1920. Returning to Callands he was a practitioner of medicine for three and one half years. He then studied more, specializing in the field of the eye, ear, nose and throat. This work was completed at the Episcopal Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital in Washington, D.C.

Or. Mitchell then went to Lexington, Va. and began his work there in 1926. In this city he did an able work in his field. A special interest was his work with Lexington's Children's Clinic. Due to declining health he had to give up his service there a few years before his death. The officials at that time in a report on his work there over a period of more than 30 years said he had performed between 2 and 3 thousand tonsillectomies for children in this Clinic free of charge. This was his known service for some in need, and the rest will never be known. He had membership in the American Medical Association and American Academy of Opthalmology and Otolaryngology which were professional organizations. In 1944 he was elected a fellow of the International Academy of Medicine. He was also a Diplomate member of the Pan American Medical Association.

Or. Mitchell was interested in the world as a whole. He salvaged time from his profession and satisfied his fondness for travel. He visited Mexico, South America and Europe. He also made a trip around the world.

Howard Lyle Mitchell, born Jan. 13, 1893 at Callands, Va., died Oct. 22, 1964 at Lexington, Va. He married at Lexington, Va. on March 12, 1931 Dora Wimbourne Witt, born Sept. 8, 1895 at Buena Vista, Va. She is a daughter of Robert R. Witt who married Margaret Newman Williams. She was a student at Hollins College, Roanoke, Va. Dr. and Mrs. Mitchell were members of

the Presbyterian Church in Lexington, Va. Dr. Mitchell was active in various ways. He was a charter member of the Lexington Kiwanis Club. He served also as president of the same and was awarded a "Legion of Honor" for his 30 years of active membership in this chapter. He was also a member of the Masonic order and he took a prominent part in the activities of the Lexington-Rockridge Chamber of Commerce and served at one time as president. He gave of his energy in so many ways for the welfare of others. His health began to fail but he continued as active in his profession as it was possible to be. He was in his office as usual when a heart attack came on and he died at once at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. He was only 71 years of age. Dr. Howard Lyle Mitchell was interred in Stonewall Jackson Cemetery, Lexington, Virginia on Saturday, October 24, 1964. Rev. Douglas C. Chase conducted the funeral service. Dr. Mitchell's survivors were his wife, Dora Mitchell, and their only child, Howard Winston Mitchell. (See the News Gazette, Lexington, Va.).

HOWARD WINSTON MITCHELL

Howard Winston Mitchell, the son of Howard Lyle and Dora Winbourne (Witt) Mitchell, was born Feb. 22, 1932 in Lexington, Va. He attended Public Schools in Lexington, Va. He attended Woodberry Forest Preparatory School and then enrolled at Cornell University and graduated in Electrical Engineering in 1955. Two years of service were given the United States Navy. After this he was teaching at Hawthorne School in Washington, D.C.

ELIZABETH MITCHELL

Elizabeth Mitchell (Betty), was the oldest daughter of James and Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hubbard) Mitchell. She was born in 1781 and died age 78 on Feb. 5, 1859. It is assumed she had recently had her 78th birthday since her oldest brother, Samuel Mitchell, born in 1780, died on Feb. 15, 1859, had not attained his 79th birthdate and was reported 78 when he was recorded in the death register. (See Death Register Pitts. Co., Va. 1859). She died at Tomahawk, Va. Elizabeth Mitchell and Hugh Reynolds were issued a marriage license on Sept. 21, 1801. Sarah Mitchell, her mother, gave consent. Robert Devin was his security. (See Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg. p. 32). They resided at Callands, Va. His dates are unknown. He died prior to 1859. He signed the Oath of Allegiance. (See Pitts. Joseph Fuller, their youngest child, was born March 12, 1853 and died Dec. 29, 1919. He married on Oct. 12, 1872 Laura Elizabeth Wood, who was born May 12, 1854 and died July 21, 1936, and they had six children. The complete record is in the Fuller Section. Their youngest child, Ellen Clare (Fuller) Young, (Mrs. John Henry) has cooperated in securing the information for Sarena Elizabeth (Reynolds) Fuller's family.

JANE MITCHELL

Jane Mitchell, called Jennie, was a daughter of James and Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hubbard) Mitchell. She was born at Callands, Va. in the 1780s and, by estimate, died prior to 1850. She married Richard Parrish, called Dick, a citizen of Pittsylvania Co., Va. Richard Parrish age 26 married on Feb. 26, 1805 Jane Mitchell, the daughter of Sarah Mitchell who gave her consent. Edward Carter was Richard Parrish's bondsman. Rev. Richard Elliot performed the ceremony. (See Minister's Returns, Pitts. Co., Va. Marriage Reg., p. 39). Richard Parrish and family went to the state of Mississippi and some may have died there. Later their children went to Texas. Those recalled by a relative, Mrs. B.P. Gilbert, were:

The 1850 census proves that Richard Parrish was living in Pittsylvania Co., Va. His real estate was evaluated at 586 dollars. He was 71 years old and his three sons, Milton, Nicholas and William H. Parrish, were not in his home and Jane (Mitchell) Parrish, his wife, had passed away. Years ago a discussion of this census record was answered with the statement "the sons were already in Mississippi before 1850".

Mrs. W.H. Parrish, Box 146, Silsbee, Texas, in a letter dated Nov. 3D, 1930, stated that Mr. Wm. H. Parrish was a brother of her father, but she did not say who her father was, Milton, Nicholas or Robert Parrish. It is claimed that Mrs. G.B. Engledon of Nacogdoches, Texas and Mrs. W.H. Harris of Silsbee, Texas, who were both living in 1930, were granddaughters of Richard and Jane (Mitchell) Parrish. Another idea was that members of this Parrish family may have lived in Angelina Co., Texas at one time, and this is true. These items are included if anyone desires to trace their ancestors herein included.

Richard Parrish, the husband of Jane Mitchell, age 26 in 1805, was born in 1779 in Va. and the 1850 census proves the same. Richard Parrish has been declared to be a son of Abraham Parrish who married Sarah Clark and who resided in Pittsylvania Co., Va. in late life. Abraham Parrish was the son of William Parrish who, it is said, married Elizabeth Perkins. No proof.

See Parrish section for the information, so far as it has been found.

PATSY MITCHELL

Patsy Mitchell was a daughter of James and Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hubbard) Mitchell. She signed the deed when her father's estate was closed. She lived in the old home, it is assumed, all her life. She never married. She assisted her sister with the care of her mother in her old age. Her true name may have been Patricia. She was living in 1840. Her birth and death dates are unknown.

CASSEY MITCHELL

Cassey Mitchell was the daughter of James and Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hubbard) Mitchell. When her father's estate was settled in 1819, she signed the deed. She was at home with her mother in 1840 and cared for her in her old age. She never married. It is assumed that her name was Cassandra. This given name is found in the family of her mother's relatives, and one of his nieces was named Cassandra Reynolds. No birth and death dates were found.

The compiler did not find Patsy and Cassey Mitchell on the 1850 census. Their brother, James Allen Mitchell, did not refer to them in his will in 1859. It is normal to think they were deceased.

JOHN MITCHELL 1782-1844

John Mitchell, born May 6, 1782 at Callands, Virginia, died at Callands, Va. on Sept. 2, 1844, and was interred near his dwelling house. He was the son of James and Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hubbard) Mitchell and was born in their home at Callands, Va. He grew up on that farm. He was only 13 years old when his father, James Mitchell, passed away. He remained at home under the guidance of his mother until he was 22 years of age. He married then. A marriage license was issued to John Mitchell and Anna Atkins on Oct. 5, 1804. She was the daughter of Edward Atkins, who was also surety. (Pitts. Co. Mar. Reg.) See her ancestors later. She was born Sept. 14, 1786. She died very suddenly April 3, 1865 in her own home and was interred beside her husband. Their family Bible was burned when the home of Mrs. Christina Virginia (Hubbard) Gilbert's home was burned. It so happened that her sister, Mrs. Miriam Dianne (Hubbard) Giles, another granddaughter of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell, had copied the family record of her grandparents. No one knew of this copy because Mrs. Giles died in 1895. In 1928 the compiler was in Virginia and called to see the Giles cousins. Thomas Leslie Giles, her son, left the room and returned with the copy of the Mitchell Bible record. He had found it among his mother's papers a few days before we came and he thought I would like a copy of it. This is quite interesting since he had no idea of this intended work on the Mitchell family record. The following is as their granddaughter copied it.

Facts as found will be included for each one in an individual section.

First, John Mitchell reached the age of 21 years knowing how to farm. He had no inheritance from his deceased father beyond his native intelligence. At the age of 22 he married and with his beloved and faithful companion he started upon their life's journey. Their first days are unknown, but it will be seen that they were residing on their own land in a short time. From the following records it can be seen that John Mitchell had plans to be an owner of land and to be a planter.

Looking back, it is seen that Robert Devin and William Devin Jr., two sons of their neighbor, William Devin Sr., were at the bedside of James Mitchell and witnessed his last Will and Testament two days before he died. The Devin family were the very near and friendly neighbors of the James Mitchell family.

Mr. William Devin Sr., the father of this family had a survey of 316 acres on Banister River very near the James Mitchell home. The date of this survey was April 19, 1770. It was bounded as follows:

This survey was made April 19, 1770 for William Devin. Later, John Mitchell (1782-1844) purchased the property from William Devin's heirs.

Pittsylvania County, Va. was not 3 years old when this survey was made. Only one man had land near this survey. The Red Oak, White Oak and Hickory trees were corner markers. This is interesting from a historical point of view as well as information for those whose ancestors have resided there.

Thirty years later William Devin, Sr. dated his Will on November 20, 1800. His Will was probated April 19, 1802. His wife was deceased and it is evident from the following transactions that some of the heirs were willing to sell land they inherited from their father.

John Mitchell became 20 years of age on May 6, 1803, and was married 17 months later. This land was available, near his childhood home where his mother still lived and not far from his wife's parents and her childhood home. These facts are based upon the business transactions described later which followed the marriage of John Mitchell and Anna Atkins.

In 1981, as this book is being completed, the property John Mitchell acquired has been the home of some descendants through six generations. Also, the house built by John Mitchell's father, First Lieut. James Mitchell, has been owned by descendants through seven generations. Therefore, the deeds cited here in brief form are recorded for the information of descendants living and for future generations.

First Deed, dated Dec. 6, 1805. Robert Devin, Executor for his father, William Devin, Sr., deceased, sold to John Mitchell 95 acres on both sides of the Bannister River for the sum of 56 Pounds 2 shillings 9 pence. Recorded July 19, 1806. (D.B. 15 Pittsylvania Co., Va. page 120).

Second Deed, dated Oct. 24, 1808. Robert Devin, Executor for William Devin, Sr., deceased, sold to John Mitchell 100 acres and 4 poles on both sides of Bannister River and adjacent to Joseph Devin for 300 dollars. Recorded Jan. 16, 1809. (D.B. 16 Pittsylvania Co., Va. page 224).

Third Deed, dated Oct. 16, 1816 after the death of William Devin, Jr. Two of his sons and 4 of his daughters and two sons-in-law sold to John Mitchell for 340 dollars the 100 acres and 120 poles on Bannister River that Robert Devin, Executor for William Devin, Sr., deceased, conveyed to William Devin, Jr. in the year 1809. John Devin, another son of William, Jr., was not living in Virginia at the time this deed was made and it was necessary to make a Fourth Deed. (See later). Fourth Deed, dated Dec. 10, 1817. John Devin of Tennessee, also an heir of William Devin, Jr., sold his interest in the same 100 acres mentioned in the third deed, above, to John Mitchell. His price was 100 dollars.

The land in this fifth deed was adjacent to the land in the first deed, Dec. 6, 1805.

Sixth Deed, dated May 26, 1827. Lucy Beck and Margaret Murtain heirs of Joseph Devin, deceased, relinquished to John Mitchell for 5D dollars their claims to land called 80 acres on both sides of Bannister River that Joseph Devin, deceased, received from the estate of William Devin, Sr., deceased. Lucy Beck signed on July 23, 1837 and Margaret Murtain signed on Oct. 6, 1837. Recorded June 1838. (D. B. 3D Pittsylvania Co., Va. page ?)

Seventh Deed dated Aug. 24, 1838. Emily Gross and Elizabeth Gross sold to John Mitchell 70 acres of land on the Bannister River for 3D0 dollars.

According to the deeds mentioned above, John Mitchell bought the William Devin, Sr. estate beginning 1805 through 1838 and lived on that property until his death in 1844. That place was the home of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell in 1819 at the time their seventh child, Stella Clement Mitchell was born.

That same property has continued to be owned by his descendants. John and Anna Mitchell lived in the large two story home many years. Six of their daughters and their first son, John Coleman Mitchell, were born before John Mitchell built the home that is there today. Both houses were in constant use prior to the 1890s when the two story house was taken down. The present house has been there about 155 years. All of John and Anna Mitchell's descendants who visit their graves in 1981 and later can know they are there and still resting on their own land. Designated a Bi-centennial farm-see 493-N

Of what significance is all this for his descendants?

First: John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell are buried in the family cemetery on the property.

Second: The descendants of John Fuller Hubbard (1818-1888) who married their daughter, Stella Clement Mitchell, can know that John Fuller Hubbard bought from the heirs the property, and that John Fuller Hubbard and his wife, Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard are buried in the family cemetery.

Third: The descendants of Christina Virginia Hubbard who married Beverly Preston Gilbert can know that they bought the property and they also are buried here.

Fourth: One son of Christine (Hubbard) and Beverly P. Gilbert, Charles Read Gilbert and his wife Katharine (Eppler) Gilbert, are interred in that cemetery.

Fifth: The two sons of Charles Read and Katharine (Eppler) Gilbert, Jesse Eppler Gilbert and John Beverly Gilbert, inherited the property.

Sixth: In 1981 part of the property is owned by Mrs. Florienne (Towler) Gilbert, widow of Jesse Eppler Gilbert and part by his nephew John Charles Gilbert. son of John Beverly Gilbert, deceased.

To many living in 1981 two ancestors are buried there.

To the John Fuller Hubbard descendants four ancestors are buried there.

For Beverly P. Gilbert's descendants six ancestors are buried there.

For Charles Read Gilbert's descendants eight ancestors are buried there.

For the descendants of John Mitchell Hubbard six ancestors are buried there.

The next two graves are those of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. This grave stone was placed between their graves in recent years. By accident the names engraved on the stone are in reverse order. John's name is over Anna's grave and Anna's name is over John's grave.

A single marker engraved on a slab of field stone, placed there in 1844, the year in which he died, was left in place for sentimental reasons. It was made by one of John Mitchell's neighbor friends.

Anna Mitchell died a few days before Lee surrendered in 1865. Due to many circumstances her grave had not been marked until about a hundred years later. The stone noted as nos. 8 & 9 below was financed by some of their great grand children, and one of their great, great, great grand sons, John Beverly Gilbert (1910-1976) made arrangements for its placement.

Dear Bro! and Sis!

I will try to pen you a short letter this evening for I think of you and those sweet, precious, darling little ones, and wish many many times to see & kiss them, but it seems as though I cannot have time to visit much.

These few lines leaves us well as usual and hope when you receive this it will find you and all enjoying the same good blessing. Well I have done but little farm work yet. I have been building a stable since 18th. December, have about completed it. One job off, another presents its self, so I loose no time.

I saw from Chatham Tribune that you have bought Mr. Graves' farm adjoining cousin Joe, also saw what you paid, which were good figures, but you get a good bargain, besides getting good land, you get good houses, barns and all out houses, which, if you had built your self would have cost you more than you gave.

How are you getting along with your work: have you burnt plant land yet? I have commenced twice but have not succeeded in burning any yet.

Cousin Sue's daughter Sallie was married Christmas; married a Mr. Brown, a very nice young man. They have moved to Bob Wilson's. He is going to Boss for Wilson this year.

How did you succeed in curing your tobacco? Hope you have a nice crop. The market is very dull now but the warehouse men seem to think it will sell well and I hope it will.

I received a letter from Bro. James just before Xmas. I answered it and sent a sample of tobacco for him to show to Professor Hopwood; Hopwood never saw any fine tobacco and scorns the very idea of any one using it.

I have not been to Chatham in over 2 years. I think I will go over there March Court Day if the Lord permit. I will have to buy a horse as I am so situated with my hands () 2 horses will not do the work.

Well, I will close this; for I fear I will intrude upon your good Patience. Mollie sends you one of my Photos and says she will send you one of hers when she gets another supply. Mollie is a great big fat gal, weighs 179 lbs.

I will close. Kiss all the children for me & reserve a large share of our love for your self. As ever, your Bro. J. M. Hubbard.



The letter quoted above was preserved more than 36 years by Mont Hubbard. His son, Robert, said, "He saved it, it was such a nice letter." After Mont's death, the letter was kept an additional 60 years, then Robert John Hubbard gave the letter to the compiler, daughter of his Uncle John Mitchell Hubbard.

This letter has been included because it is an example of the devotion of all the children of John and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard (read page 155). The envelope also is a reminder to all descendants to appreciate the Postal Service of today.

In 1885 at the time this letter was written, mail had to be carried to the Post Office, and if you were expecting to receive mail you had to go to the Post Office and ask for it. John Mitchell Hubbard lived three miles from Bachelors Hall P.O. The hand stamped post mark shows the letter was dispatched January 26, 1885 or 8 days after it was written. Evidently John was too busy to go or to send someone on horseback to carry the letter to the P.O., or if the mail carrier did not pick up mail often, the letter stayed at the P.O. until a regular mail day.

The two cents stamp was hand cancelled by the Post Master by making an X with pen and ink. The letter was sent in care of Mr. J. M. Parrish who was Mont's father-in law, whose farm joined Mont's newly purchased Farm. This would permit the Post Master to give the letter to Mr. Parrish in case he should come to the Post Office before Mont Hubbard called for his mail.

Note: John mentioned having sent a sample of tobacco to his brother, James. At that time James was a student at Milligan College, near Elizabethton, Tern.

Mary Elizabeth (Sours) sometimes wrote articles about the Vandola Community for the DANVILLE REGISTER. Two of her reports are on page 618. They were found too lage to be placed on this page.





THE JAMES MITCHELL FAMILY GRAVEYARD



Marker at the grave of Louisa Mitchell (1814–1833) daughter of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell.

James Mitchell, husband of Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hubbard) Mitchell, died in 1795 and is buried in this graveyard. The marker was found in 1968 but the inscription was so faint that it did not show up in a picture. Very few markers were found. In 1859 James Allen Mitchell, son of James Mitchell, 'reserved' the graveyard thus prohibiting it from being sold.

The description of the old dwelling that was given to the compiler, who never saw it, may not be complete. The huge fireplace and its part in the lives of those who once lived there had excited great interest in it. When the opportunity came to go to see it, there was no house there and no chimney left. It had been torn down because the house was in need of repair and the old chimney was cracking up and harboring snakes. For sake of young children it was safest to remove it around the early 1890 s. "Well, tell more about the old house?" is often asked. It was built of hand hewn logs. First, one large room was built with the huge firsplace on one side. There was a door on two other sides of this room. They faced each other, for exit either way. The ceiling was high above the floor and the second floor had bedrooms and was a full story in height. This was completed and later another section just as large was added to this house. One of those side doors opened into the downstairs room. The sleepers under this room, however, were placed at right angles to those in the room first built, This proved to be a wonderful thing. It is assumed that this house was built as soon as this was possible after the survey of William Devin's property in 1770. Eighty or more years later, during an electric storm in 1851, the lightning struck a tree in the yard. The current left the tree and followed a sleeper under the middle of the entrance door and split it open. Coming to the sleeper at the door across that room, the current followed the grain of that sleeper to the outside. Sitting in the door on the other side of that adjoining room was a little Mitchell grandson, 2 years old, playing with a chain. He was not injured; the sleeper placed correctly saved his life. He lived to be an excellent citizen. He was the father of the compiler.

"What about that fireplace? Why did they make it like that?" was often asked. The fireplace was used for cooking. It had a crane and spit. It had a wide hearth that came out into the room so bread could be baked and meat roasted. All of the details of cooking by a fireplace were told minutely to children who had never seen this done. Then it was told that a man could stand up in this fireplace, just walk right into it. There was also the story of the colored children slipping in to that kitchen early in the morning before breakfast to walk into the fireplace to warm their hands by the fire. No, they were not allowed to do it, but if they did, the cook saw to it that they did nothing wrong. She managed this favor for them and sent them back to their own fires, if they were really cold.

"Tell about the Christmas fire." Well, on Christmas Eve morning, John Mitchell had all of his male slaves assemble. He asked them to select the three among them whom they desired to carry out the Christmas plans for the holiday. They chose the three who were strongest and most well. Then he told them what to do. They were to go to the woods on his farm and find a large tree to cut down. They were to choose one that would be a log long enough to be the back log to the big fireplace. They were to be able to take it from the wagon, carry it into the house and lay it on the andirons for a backlog. When the log was sawed off it was to be taken to the stream of water where last year's log was under the water. They were to remove that log from the water and put it on the wagon. Then the new green log was submerged in that stream to soak for the following year. The soaked log was taken to the house and placed on the back side of the fireplace. This done, all the servants came together for further instructions. John Mitchell then declared Christmas holiday for every one until that wet log burned up. When every part of it was ashes, they would go back to work. This meant they were not at work for one week or more. This was a custom in his home so long as he lived. This was his adaptation of the English Yule Log of his ancestors.

But no one preserved the information about those ancestors.

John Mitchell had plans for a new house for his large family. This meant great labor. The trees were there and they had, at the time the house was built, seven children. A family of nine means that no one is idle if they are sustained. Tobacco was the money crop in those days. Along with tobacco, wheat, corn, fruit, vegetables were grown. Care for sheep, poultry and cattle and livestock of all types was given. They also had the sheep to shear and flax to grow and shoes to be made. They were busy people. To build that new house, the trees were felled. The logs were hewn for heavy needs, the weather boarding sawed by hand and planed by hand. The nails, hinges, etc. were hand made in the farm black smith's shop. So it stands today, over 150 years later, as a tribute to "where there is a Will, there is a way".

In 1824 Stella Clement Mitchell, his eighth child, was born in the new home. Someone among his descendants for six generations have lived there. Someone for five generations were born there and four generations of John and Jesse Gilbert's ancestors are interred there. They are namely:

(1) John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell; (2) John Fuller and Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard; (3) Beverley Preston and Christina Virginia (Hubbard) Gilbert; (4) Charles Read and Kathrina (Eppler) Gilbert.

John Mitchell, born in 1782 and died in 1844, was only 62 years of age. He left Anna a widow, age 58 years. She took her burden and was a widow for 21 long years. Six years later, the 1850 census enumeration on Aug. 10, 1850, lists her as a farmer with real estate evaluated at 1,200 dollars and her personal property at 4,000 dollars. She had only one son living at home. He was James Raymond Mitchell, 30 years old. We get a glimpse into her life by the experiences that have come down through a few who knew her while on earth and have told the compiler a few interesting facts.

John Mitchell and Anna Mitchell belonged to the Primitive Baptist faith. They had family worship in their home. In a letter from Mrs. William Harvey of Georgia, who was Virginia Caroline Mitchell. the daughter of Thomas Chrispin Mitchell, there is a reference to their custom of family worship in their home in Virginia. In this letter in 1929, she was 68 years old and recalled that she was 4 years old when her grandmother, Anna Mitchell, died in far away Virginia on April 3, 1865. Her grandmother was sitting in her rocking chair dictating a letter to her son, Caroline's father. Anna's daughter, turning to her mother, asked what to write next. Her mother fell from her chair and was dead. The shock of this brought forth many sessions of reminiscing on the part of Thomas Chrispin Mitchell. In the years that followed, Mrs. Harvey recalled the many times, while a small girl, she sat on her father's lap and he told her about Virginia, the old home and his mother. He said he would never forget the daily hour she called her family in to her "sacred family alter". She read the Bible and prayed with her children, every day as was their custom. He was around 11 years of age when his father died. Another memory he had of his early childhood days, when he was a small bare footed boy. It had rained on the previous day and there were many puddles of water on the red clay. He had a great time wading through them. Then he saw his mother's white counterpanes spread upon the green grass near the garden fence. It was May, and all good or well informed house keepers knew that sunshine in May bleaches white cloth that is wet with dew, when it was spread upon the grass. To small Chrispin came the thought "It will feel soft to run over them." and he ran over them. Looking back, he was delighted with the improvement. For every step across those three white counterpanes, there were little red footprints. As he stood there pleased with the result, his satisfaction suddenly changed, when his mother, upon seeing this, became so distressed. His only punishment was her distress. This reached his childish

heart so deeply that he remembered it as long as he lived. To him she was always a wonderful woman and his children thought the same.

Not only the far away grandchildren loved her but those who saw her every day. Her grandson, John Mitchell Hubbard, went to see her every day when they lived over on the next hill from her home. He had to cross the pasture. The gander and the geese were in that pasture. John would sit on the gate post and wait for the geese to wander far enough away for him to get to Grandmother's gate before the gander could catch up with him to pinch him. Sometimes he succeeded, but he said "That old gander usually got there in time to pinch me". Two things happened; John developed a hatred for geese that lasted through life and he never allowed geese on his farm. This was excelled by the greater love he developed for that grandmother he adored all through his life and never forgot.

Sixty five years after Anna Mitchell's death; one of her granddaughters, Mary Hubbard Arnn, in a letter of condolence, wrote "My Grandmother Mitchell used to tell us 'Death is the Gate to endless joy.'". She too adored this dear grandmother.

John and Anna Mitchell's home was on the main highway from Chatham to Callands for many years. The road was changed and the road came to the house and this meant the approach was reversed. In the early days, at the front of the house, there were Walnut trees. One was topped by Chrispin Mitchell while he was a teenage boy, perhaps around 1850. It has been a magnificent tree. Today it is not so beautiful. Another Walnut tree in the side yard was near the front gate. A horse shoe was nailed to it for horseback riders to hang the bridle while calling. It is deeply embedded in that old tree today. The third Walnut tree was planted by Ida May Hubbard when she was a girl. Date unknown. She died in 1889. Two other trees of interest were planted in 1863 when Tina Hubbard was 4 years old. They are pear trees and were called "the sugar pear". Her father, John Fuller Hubbard, planted them one on each side of the garden gate. He was at home on a furlough during the War Between the States. She went with him to plant the two small trees. He said to her "Water the pear trees when it does not rain, while Pa is gone to War". She took it seriously and every day it did not rain she went to the spring to get a small bucket she could carry full of water for the little trees. She said, when she was quite an old lady, that she carried that water "to keep Pa's pear trees living while he was in the War". God blessed that little child's love for her father then. He came home to find them living. They are still living today. Loving care and kind words never die.

Following the rest of this record shows that John and Anna Mitchell suffered many sorrows together, and later she bore more alone, as is seen in the marriages and other data regarding the children of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell.

ELIZABETH MITCHELL

Elizabeth Mitchell, born at Callands, Va. on June 7, 1805, was the oldest child of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. She seems to have grown up to be a fine young person. There has been no tradition to the contrary. She was perhaps the first of the Mitchell girls who came down the stairway alone, dressed as a bride, to be married in the living room of the home built by her father, John Mitchell, in 1823. In the Marriage Register of Pittsylvania Co., Va., p. B3, is recorded a marriage license issued to Boaz Frizzell and Elizabeth Mitchell on Feb. 28, 1825. John Mitchell, father and bondsman. They moved to Tessessee and he died in Tenn. They had several children, but the names of

only a daughter, Virginia Frizzell, and a son, Boaz Frizzell, were recalled. This son was a doctor. It was known also that Elizabeth (Mitchell) Frizzell died in Arkansas in the home of a daughter. Research in Pittsylvania Co., Va. proved that Boaz Frizzell was a son of Isaac Frizzell of that County and the rest seemed not to be in that County.

Later, the compiler contacted Mr. Bonner Frizzell of Palestine, Texas, who graciously contributed the following information many years ago. Today his mark on the Frizzell line may be completed. Here will be included descendants of Boaz and Elizabeth (Mitchell) Frizzell, which he graciously contributed.

The 1840 Census shows on page 296 for Weakley County, Tennessee the household of Boze Frizzell. He was between 30 and 40 years of age and his wife was of similar age. They had a son under 5 years, a son and daughter between 10 and 15 years of age and a daughter between 5 and 10 years of age. In 1840 they had 4 children. The 1850 census, page 459 for Weakley Co., Tenn. shows B ____ Frizzell as head of the household. He was 50 years old, born in Va. His wife was Elizabeth Frizzell, age 45, born in Virginia. In their home were Louisa Frizzell, 16 years old, Born 1834; Charles Frizzell 14 years old, Born 1836. The two older children in the 1840 census were not in the home of their parents in 1850.

Further data Mr. Bonner Frizzell had secured from Dr. John Chrispin Frizzell of Bradford, Arkansas on July 16, 1948, who is now deceased. This data is said to be from Court records, Dresden, Weakley Co., Tenn., and U.S. Census for Boaz Frizzell was as follows:

ANNA ATKINS! ANCESTORS

Anna Atkins married John Mitchell Oct. 5, 1804 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. According to the following data she was the daughter of Edward Atkins and his wife, Mary (Sullivant) Atkins. Mary Sullivant was the daughter of John Sullivant of Lunenburg Co., Va., who in 1750 made his will. His lands, however, in 1764/5 were in Charlotte Co., Va. and his heirs were residents of Charlotte Co., Va. Edward Atkins was the son of John Atkins of Lunenburg Co., Va. who made his Will dated April 10, 1762. This land was also in Charlotte Co., Va. and his heirs were citizens of that County. Edward Atkins' mother was Mary but her maiden surname is not known. The following Wills and deeds prove important facts and give interesting details.

In the name of God amen. I Edward Adkins of the County of Pittsylvania being of a sound and disposing mind and memory do make, ordain, constitute and appoint this my last will and Testament in manner and form following: Imprimis I give and bequeath unto my wife Mary Adkins all the estate both real and personal which I am possessed of to be held and enjoyed by her for and during her natural life and at her death, It is my will and desire that it be divided as follows

Item, at the death of my wife I give unto my daughter Mary Adkins all that part of the Tract of land on which I now live that lies on the South side of Piggs road and Including the dwelling house and other imporvements Containing by estimation one hundred acres be the same more or less, Joining The land of Thomas Parrish, John Adkins, Edmond Tompkins, Mrs. Callans and the balance of my land on the north side of the said road to said Parrish's line. give unto my daughter Mary Adkins two feather beds and furniture likewise one good horse and saddle all which I give and bequeath unto her and heirs forever. Item. At a court of Quarterly session held for Pittsylvania County the 19th day of June 1826 The Last Will and Testament of Edward Adkins dec'd was exhibited in Court and proven by the oaths of three subscribing witnesses and ordered to be recorded and on the motion of John Adkins, Jesse Carter and John Mitchell the Executors therein named who made oath thereto according to law and together with Thomas Carter Captain Richard Omohundro, James A.

Mitchell and Hugh Reynolds their Securities entered into and acknowledge their bond in the penalty of \$3,000 conditioned as the law, Certificate is granted them for obtaining a probate of the said Will in due form.

The above Will shows the original surname Atkins has the "t" changed to "d". Note the name was originally Atkins in the following court records. This will proves the following facts. In 1824 Mary (Sullivant) Atkins was living. Their daughter, Mary Atkins, was living. Their daughter Ailsey was Mrs. William Oakes. Their daughter Susanna, was Mrs. Jesse Carter. Their daughter Anna (Ann) was Mrs. John Mitchell. They had a son John Atkins. They had a son Drury Atkins.

No attempt has been made to secure the data that can be found in Pitt-sylvania Co., Va. court records for descendants of the above children of Edward and Mary (Sullivant) Atkins. Only Anna (Atkins) Mitchell has been attempted. The Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage records prove the following:

- William Dakes and Alcey Adkins daughter of Edward, were granted a marriage license on Dec. 10, 1797.
- 2. John Mitchell and Anne Adkins daughter of Edward, were granted a marriage license on Oct. 5, 1804.
- 3. Jesse Carter and Susanna Adkins, daughter of Edward were granted a marriage licence on Feb. 6, 1797. Tradition verified they were Presbyterian. Susanna Atkins Carter was sincerely loved by her niece, Stella Clement (Mitchell) Hubbard.
- 4. Drury Adkins and Susanna Price daughter of William Price Sen, with John Price as bondsman, were granted a marriage license May 5, 1805.
- 5. Mary Atkins, single in 1824.
- 6. John Atkins married Sarah Owen (Sallie) date unknown. She was the daughter of William and Eady (Edith or Edy) (Pigg) Owen. She died Jan. 22, 1853, 80 yrs. old, therefore born in 1773. He died before 1853. (See p. 1, line 10, year 1853 Death Register Pitts. Co., Va.) and her ancestor in Pigg Chapter.

Edward Atkins, deceased,of Pittsylvania Co., Va. in 1826, was born in Lunenburg Co., Va. before his father's will was dated April 10, 1752. Exact date is not known. He, however, was of age and married before the year 1770. His father's land was in Charlotte Co., Va. after 1764/5. In order to follow Edward Atkins' movements, the will of his father is included here.

Imprimis, it is my Will and I do order that in the first place all my just Debts and funeral charges be paid and satisfied. Item, I do order and appoint she, Mary my dearly beloved Wife shall have the place whereon I now live during her natural life and the third part of all my Stock Cattle, Horses and Hoggs and also my household goods forever. Item, I give and Bequeath to my two daughters namely Agnes and Rachel Atkins two thirds of all my Stock and household Goods to be equally Divided between them to them and their Heirs and Assigns forever.

Item, I give to my son William Atkins one shilling Starling

Item, I give to my daughter Mary Creighter one shilling Starling

Item, I give to my son Benjamin Atkins one shilling Starling

Edward Atkins, in the above will recorded in Lunenburg Court House, at the death of his mother, Mary Atkins, was heir to "one hundred Acres of Land"---"after his Mother's Decease". It is normal to think the Indenture dated June 2, 1777 between Edward Atkins of Charlotte Co., Va. of the first part and William Thorp of the 2nd part for 100 Pounds sells 102 acres was Edward Atkins of the above Will. This deed was recorded June 2, 1777, and Mary Atkins released her Right of Dower. (This proves Mary was his wife). Teste: Thomas Read Clk.

No effort has been made to follow the lives of the above sons and daughters

(See Deed Book 4, p. 16 Charlotte Co., Va.) (Reel 2 Va. State Arch.). This same month Edward Atkins purchased land in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on June 30, 1777. Briefly abstracted it states: This Indenture dated June 30, 1777 between Josias Randle of Brunswick Co., Va. first part and Edward Atkins of

Charlotte Co., Va. of the other part. Edward Atkins paid L 20 Lawful money

of Virginia for 340 acres more or less lying on each side of Stawberry Creek in Pittsylvania Co., Va. This deed was recorded Aug. 20, 1777. (See D.B. 4 Pitts. Co., Va. (1774–1778), p. 394).

Prior to the sale of the 102 acres more or less in Charlotte Co., Va., the following deed leads to several bits of significant information. They are: (1) the age of Edward; (2) his wife Mary's surname and (3) her father's name. This Indenture made the fifth Day of February one thousand seven hundred and seventy, Between Edward Atkins and Mary his wife and James Sullivant of the County of Charlotte of the one part and Thomas Bedford of the Same County of the other part. Witnesseth that the said Edward Atkins and Mary Atkins and James Sullivant for and in Consideration of the just & full sum of Fifty pounds Currant money to them in hand paid by the said Thomas Bedford the Receipt whereof they the said Edward & Mary Atkins and James Sullivant doth hereby Acknowledge & themselves fully satisfied Contented & Paid hath Given, Granted Bargained and Sold & by these Presents doth give, orant Barqain & Sell, Alien, Release & Confirm unto the said Thomas Bedford his Heirs & Assigns forever one Certain Tract or parcel of Land Containing two hundred Acres be the same more or Less Situate Lying and being in the County aforesaid on Twittys Creek and bounded as followeth to wit: Beginning at John Petty's Corner Red oak on the said Creek thence along the said Petty's Line North Six Degrees West Two hundred and Seventy six poles to a white oak in Charles Sullivant's Line thence along the same South forty Degrees West Sixty poles to a pine, thence South Sixty Degrees one hundred & Twenty poles to Bedford's own Corner White oak. Thence along his line south forteen Degrees East Two hundred and Twenty two poles to a poplar on a branch thence down the same South Sixty two degrees East twenty poles to an Oak in the same. Thence South Sixty seven Degrees East Twenty two poles to a pine on the said creek thence up the same as it Meanders to the first Station with all & singular Privileges and appurtenances there unto belonging or in anywise appurtaining To Have and To Hold the above said Land and premises with all the appurtenances to him the said Thomas Bedford his Heirs and Assignes forever. Edward Adkins was of age before this date since he could legally enter into this transaction. He was also married and in those days men were mature when married. It can be estimated that prior to 1770 Edward Atkins was 21 years of age and born before 1749. He was a boy when his father's will was made, perhaps in his early teens, if his age may be thus estimated. The above verifies Mary was Edward's wife and the following will gives the evidence she was the daughter of John Sullivant and had a brother James Sullivant.

Therefore calling unto mind the mortality of my Body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make ordain this my last Will and Testament that is to say Principally and first of all I Give and Recommend into the Hands of God that gave it and for my Body I recommend it to the Earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my Executors nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection I shall recieve the same again by the mighty power of God and as touching such worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I Give, Devise and Dispose of the same in the following manner and form.

Item I Give and Bequeath unto my daughter Sarah Melone, Elizabeth Sullivant, Hannah Sullivant and Mary Sullivant eight hundred acres of land lying on the North side of Twitty's Creek beginning at the mouth of the Hay Fork Branch or Bedford's line thence along his line to my own Corner thence joining to David Gwin, Charles Sullivant and Thomas Bouldin being the Land between Twitty's Creek and Randolph's Road to be equally divided among the four daughters.

Item, I give and Bequeath to my Brother Charles Sullivant two hundred and four acres of land on the other side Randolph's Road joining the said eight hundred acres near as the Road goes and back to Clement Read's and Thomas Bouldins line Bounded by new lines I have already ${\tt made}$.

Item, I Give and Bequeath to my three sons, James Sullivant, Manoah Sullivant and John Sullivant the remaining part of my Land being two thousand four hundred acres or there abouts to be equally divided among them. My youngest son John to have the plantation where I now live and my eldest son James to have his third of his part of the rest All the rest of my Estate be it of what nature or quality so ever I desire to be toward the suport and maintenance of my children and my wife till they come of Age or are married

I desire the same to be equally divided between them by my Executors I do appoint my Brother Charles Sullivant & Orsen Sullivant Executors of this my last Will and Testament and do Disanul and make void all other Wills in Witness whereof I have here unto set my Hand and Seal the day and year above written.

The within written last Will and Testament of John Sullivant Deceased was exhibited in Court by Charles Suillivant and Orsen Suillivant Executors therein named who respectively made Dath thereto according to Law and the same was proved by the oaths of Thomas Bouldin and John Gwin Witnesses there to and ordered to be Recorded and on the Motion of the said Executors who having first entered into Bond with Thomas Bouldin their Security and acknowledged the same Certificate was granted them for obtaining a Probate of the said Will in due form.

 - iv. Mary Sullivant
 - v. James Sullivant, the oldest son.
- vi. Manoah Sullivant
- vii. John Sullivant, the youngest son.

This will records Charles Sullivant as his brother and may mean the same for Orsen Sullivant. Orsen was evidently a kinsman of some degree.

The above will of John Sullivant and Deed from Edward and Mary Atkins and her brother James Sullivant are included to show the following facts. First, the court records prove Edward and Mary Atkins were husband and wife. Second, the description in John Sullivant's will in 1750 of land bequeathed to Mary Sullivant and sisters shows significant similarity to the description of land in the Deed in 1770 made by Edward Atkins, Mary Atkins and James Sullivant is seen as follows:

- 1. In the Will the Land is on North side Twitty's Creek. In the Deed the Land is on Twitty's Creek.
- 2. In the Will the Land touched Charles Sullivant's. In the Deed the Land touched Charles Sullivant's.
- In the Will the Land touched Bedford'd land. In the Deed the Land touched Bedford's land.

The land or 200 acres Mary Sullivant received seems to be this same land. Mary Sullivant had a brother James is asserted in her father's will. On the basis of this the compiler states Mary Sullivant the daughter of John Sullivant of Lunenburg Co., Va. married prior to Feb. 5, 1770 in Charlotte Co., Va. Edward Atkins, the son of John and Mary Atkins of Lunenburg Co., Va. The wills of their fathers were recorded in Lunenburg Court House. Their lands were later cut off into Charlotte Co., Va. in 1764/5.

It was seen above that Edward Atkins bought 340 acres of land on Strawberry Creek in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and the deed was recorded Aug 20, 1777. It is assumed he moved his family to this farm that year since he had sold in

1777 his own inheritance in Charlotte Co., Va. and on May 5, 1770 the inheritance of his wife. Nothing regarding their activities is known beyond the knowlege they lived on this farm and reared their children on this farm. They grew up and married daughters and sons of Pittsylvania Co. citizens.

There is proof that Edward Atkins was a patriotic citizen and contributed to the Cause of the Revolutionary War. At a Court of Claims held at Pittsylvania County Court House Oct. 15, 1782 for purpose of adjusting Claims for property taken or impressed for public service there is found in "Pittsylvania Co., Va. Court Booklet" the following statements:

This evidence enables his male descendants of one right to S.A.R. membership and the same to his female descendants in the N.S.D.A.R.

Edward Atkins bought land in the county again. This deed is recorded D.B. 8 Pitts. Co., Va. (1787-179D), p. 129. John Gorman of S.C. sold Edward Atkins of Pittsylvania Co., Va. for L 100 179 acres on both sides of Barskin Creek - Dated John } Gorman /L.S/ Recorded Jan. 21, 1788. The witnesses were:

JOHN COLEMAN MITCHELL

John Coleman Mitchell, born Dec. 15, 1819 near Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va., was the seventh child and first son of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. He brought great joy to their hearts and was always a comfort to his father. Before John Coleman Mitchell was twenty years old his father purchased 77 acres of land on Banister River near the Lynchburg Road. This was near his own land. The deed was dated Aug. 20, 1738 and recorded Sept. 17, 1838. (D.B. 41, p. 400, Pitts. Co., Va.). When John Coleman Mitchell married, this land was deeded to him and it was recorded Feb. 20, 1843. (D.B. 47, p. 158, Pitts. Co., Va.). After his father's death he sold this land to his vacce first cousin, James Allen Mitchell, who had the deed recorded Oct. 21, 1850. (D.B. 50, p. 399, Pitts. Co., Va.). He then emigrated to Tennessee and died there on Feb. 19, 1870, age 50 years, 2 months and 4 days. He was interred in the cemetery at the home of John Robertson who married Clarissa Muse, the sister of Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell, his wife.

John Coleman Mitchell was issued a license to marry Angelina H. Muse on Dec. 8, 1843. Thomas C. Muse, her brother, was security and Ann Muse, her mother, gave her consent. Rev. Nathan Anderson performed their ceremony. (Reel 67 Pitts. Co., Va. Marriage Bonds (1767-1862) Va. State Archives, Richmond, Va.). She was born 1823 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and was the daughter of Thomas and Mary Ann Wren Muse. She died March 15, 1903 in Tennessee. John Coleman and Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell settled on the above land in Virginia and resided there eight years. They were in Virginia when the 1850 census was enumerated. When no family or Bible record could be found for their family the compiler studied the census records to learn facts for John Coleman Mitchell's family. These records reveal the following details. First, when the 1850 census was taken, no personal property was included and that indicates he had already disposed of this in preparation for his removal to Tennessee. John C. Mitchell, age 31, Farmer, owned 350 dollars in real estate and was born in Va., therefore born 1819. Angelina Mitchell. age 26, was born in Va., therefore born around 1823 or 1824 and was around 18 years of age when she was married in 1843. Their children were listed as follows:

- i. Thomas Mitchell, age 6, b. in Va., in the year 1844.
- ii. Lindsey Mitchell, age 5, b. in Va. in the year 1845.
- iii. James Mitchell, age 3, b. in Va., in the year 1847.
- iv. William Mitchell, age 5 months, b. in Va. around the year 1850.

Second, 1860 census Civil District No 5 Tennessee near Jock's Creek, 426-447. shows J. C. Mitchell, age 41, Farmer, real estate 850 dollars, personal estate 4,000 dollars, b. in Va. in 1819.

A.H. Mitchell, age 37, b. in Va. in 1823. Thomas Mitchell, age 17, b. in Va. L.H. Mitchell, age 15, b. in Va. Jas. R. Mitchell, age 13, b. in Va. Wm A. Mitchell, age 11, b. in Va.

- v. D. S. Mitchell, age 7 b. in Tenn. in 1853.
- vi. Henry Mitchell, age 5 b. in Tenn. in 1855.
- vii. Lafayette Mitchell, age 2 b. in Tenn. in 1857.

This 1860 census proves they had seven living sons.

Third, The 1870 census for the 5th District, Henderson Co., Tennessee listed on Aug. 17, 1870 John C. Mitchell, age 51, a farmer, real estate 1600 dollars, personal estate 858 dollars, b. in Va.

Angelina Mitchell, age 47, his wife, b. in Va. Daniel Mitchell, age 17, working on the farm, b. in Tenn. Henry Mitchell, age 14, b. in Tenn.

- viii. Anna E. Mitchell, age 6, b. in Tenn., year 1864.
 - ix. Louisa Mitchell, age 4, b. in Tenn., year 1866. Family tradition also claims as their son:
 - x. Marcus Mitchell, b. in Tenn. year 1862. If on the 1870 census, the reader did not copy it.

Tradition also claims there were 10 sons. If true, they died as infants and were not living at the time the above 3 census records were made. Since no one recalled their names, they were unnamed infants. More details follow for each one so far as they are known. See this later.

Someone had in their possession a small page of black paper with the names that follow written in gold letters. This list was copied by James Ovid Mitchell (1906-1965) some time before his death. He was deeply interested in the Mitchell lineage. This copy that follows was made by Billy Frank Mitchell, his nephew, shortly before his Uncle Ovid died. Today that piece of black paper with information written in gold letters has been lost and no one knows where it is. The compiler's opinion is that Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell was the owner of that record since her name and date of death are not included. She died March 15, 1903, three years before her great grand son, James Ovid Mitchell was born. This list has only 8 names, therefore it is not complete since No. 9 passed away prior to the death of Angelina H. Muse. It is normal to assume that once upon a time birth dates may have been a part of this record.

Since the length of lives were given the dates of birth have been found and are recorded later.

These dates assembled in 1975 after 156 years of time reveal the life span of around 84 years for the family of John Coleman and Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell. He died leaving her a widow with young children. She survived him

over 33 years and before she died, her husband and all of her children except her daughter, Mrs. Lou Eliza (Mitchell) Malone, had passed away.

Since the Compiler has the date of John Coleman Mitchell's birth, as recorded in the family Bible of his parents, John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell, as Dec. 15, 1819, the trouble was taken to see if his death date was 50 years, 2 months and 4 days later. It proved true. Since it was correct, the following record has been made and the traditional nicknames are included in parenthesee.

The father, John Coleman Mitchell, d. Feb. 19, 1870, age 50 years, 2, 4 days, b. Dec. 15, 1819. Bible Record. The mother, Angelina H. Mitchell, d. March 15, 1903, age 80 years, b. 1807.

- Lafayette F. Mitchell, d. Oct. 11, 1881, age 4 yrs., 5 mos., 10 vii. days, was b. May 1, 1858 (1860 census).
- Marcus E. Mitchell, d. Jan. 30, 1879, age 16 yrs., 6 mos., 23 days, viii. was born July 7, 1862.
 - ix. Anna E. Mitchell, age 6 on 1870 census, age 17 yrs. when she died. She was b. 1864 and d. 1881.
 - Lou Eliza Mitchell, b. Sept. 21, 1866, d. March 13, 1860, age 93 ×. yrs., 5 mos., 20 days.

A number of people moved from Pittsylvania Co., Va. to Tennessee around 1850. The family records of the Muse family state that a brother and two of the sisters of Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell emigrated to Tennessee, but date of their journey was not given. They were, viz:

- 1. Daniel Chattin Muse who married Elizabeth Stone in Pittsylvania Co., Va.
- 2. Louisa Muse who married a Mr. Chesher.
- 3. LClarissa Muse who married John Robertson.

All of these seem to have resided in Henderson Co., Tenn. John Coleman and Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell are interred in the John and Clarissa (Muse) Robertson cemetery 150 yards in fromt of the old John Robertson home 2 miles north of McNairy Co. line in Chester Co., Tenn. and 2 miles west of the original Mitchell home. Relatives claimed that John Coleman Mitchell and John Robertson traveled in covered wagons with relatives from Pittsylvania Co., Va. to Tessessee.

The land records of John Coleman Mitchell cannot be followed in Tennessee. It is assumed they were destroyed during the War and by a fire in 1881.

Tradition states that John Coleman Mitchell bought land at once when he settled in the vicinity near Finger, Tenn. and some claim that descendants living today may own this land. Due to lost records no one has verified this statement. He built at once a two story log house which was the custom for

pioneer settlers in those days. He lived in Tennessee around 20 years and died there on Dec. 19, 1870. Some idea of his success can be gathered from the census records. The Civil War occured during those years and his sons were active and at least one gave his life to the Cause.

When John Coleman Mitchell died he was only 50 years old and his wife Angelina H. Mitchell was at that time only 47 years old and left a widow with young children to rear. Her oldest son was living when his father passed away but he passed away in less than 3 months after his father's death. She survived her husband 33 years and lived to see all of her children pass away except her youngest daughter, Mrs. Lou Eliza (Mitchell) Malone.

She was a member of the Sweet Lips Baptist Church. Her grandsons, Shelbin and Daniel Malone, remembered walking with her to her church when they were young boys. These children, so long as they lived, called her "the greatest grand mother that ever lived". She attended often the Oak Grove Cumberland Presbyterian Church with her son Henry Mitchell who was a member of that church. He was regular in his attendance there and it was easier for her to worship at her son's church.

Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell was loved by all of her descendants and all of the Muse family. Evidences of this was the preservation of the letter that follows, dated in 1851, and the will of her brother, Thomas Chattin Muse. He died a few years after his sister Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell moved to Tenn. His wife was Susan Mitchell who was John Coleman Mitchell's first cousin and was deceased. He left his entire estate to their little son, 7 years old, to be delivered when he was 21 years of age. In case of death of his son, Angelina H. Mitchell was to recieve one half of his estate. The letter was written by her mother, who was Nancy Ann Muse. Today it is assumed that "biga" was a nickname for Elijah, one of her former neighbors who went to Tenn. with the caravan of settlers from Pittsylvania Co., Va. His surname has been stated as Robertson, but there is no proof. Since her son Daniel Chattin Muse also went to Tennessee and settled in Henderson Co., Tenn. It is assumed the final message was to "daniel" and his children, and the present to her was from her son, Daniel Muse.

THE LETTER OF ANN WRENN MUSE TO ANGELINA H. (MUSE) MITCHELL

October 27, 1851

My dear Child i am busied this morning in roling up the stockings that i send you by biga and oh angelina you may guess at my feeling but my prayers to my maker is that you may never experience what i now feel my most ardent wish for you is that you will strive to meet me in heaven where lofty mountains now lowering waves will never part us no more when i think that i am bereaved of my last Child it almost breaks my heart i have only one Comfort and that is believing that you have a kind and tender husband to protect you while you have to encounter with conflicts of this unfriendly World give my love to Mr. Mitchell and remember me often to your little children farewell farewell to my Child, Angelina H. Mitchell. ann muse Write soon.

Please to remember me affectionately to daniel and to his children and tell him i thank him for his present. Them small socks is for Tommy.

THE FAMILY OF JOHN COLEMAN AND ANGELINA H. (MUSE) MITCHELL

This information has been given in very brief statements that have been recalled in recent years.

J. THOMAS MITCHELL

If named, as early custom was, for father of his parents, his name may have

been John Thomas Mitchell. Not verified except to say his grandfather Mitchell was John Mitchell (1782–1844) and his grandfather Muse was Thomas Muse (1757–1832).

Thomas Mitchell was born 1844 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. (1850 census). He was only 6 years old when his parents, John Coleman and Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell, went to Tennessee. He grew up in that state. He became interested in becoming a physician. How he acquired his education is not known, but it has been said he attended a medical school one year in Kentucky. It is said also that he served in the War Between the States. He was known as Dr. Tom Mitchell at Jack's Creek, Tenn. In those days this meant he rode horseback over rural roads and trails through the forests. He carried the medicine in saddle bags. The distance, the weather, the hour of the day or night was never considered by the doctor. This means Tom Mitchell's life was dedicated to the welfare of others and it was a worthy one. Three months after his father's death he passed away on May 10, 1870 and was interred near his father. He never married.

LINDSEY MITCHELL

Lindsey Mitchell, the second son of John Coleman and Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell, was born in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on Aug. 31, 1845. (1845 on 1850 Census). He was five years old when he was taken to Tenn. and would have been 20 years old in the year 1865. As a teenage boy he entered the Confederate States Army and was killed in battle and was buried at Holly Springs, Mississippi. He gave his life for his homeland before he was a mature man. A greater sacrifice cannot be made. He was single. The date of his death was Aug. 9, 1863, age 17 yrs., 11 mos., 9 days.

JAMES R. MITCHELL

James R. Mitchell, the third son of John Coleman and Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell, was born in 1847 in Va. (1850 census). He grew up in Tennessee. No details regarding his short life. It has been said that he served in the War Between the States. He died age 17 years, 5 mos., 29 days in June 1864. He never married.

WILLIAM A. MITCHELL

William A. Mitchell, the fourth son of John Coleman and Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell, was born Dec. 29, 1847 in Va. He was only five months old when the census in 1850 was taken. He went to Tenn. that year with his parents and grew up in that state and died on Feb. 19, 1866 when only 16 years , 1 month and 21 days old. No other facts are known. He was single.

HENRY MITCHELL

Henry Mitchell, born Nov. 14, 1856 in Tenn., the sixth son of John Coleman and Angelina H. (Muse) Mitchell, married Emma Jane Johnson, born near Pinson, Tenn. and died in Holly Springs, Tenn. and interred in New Friendship Cemetery. He belonged to Oak Grove Cumberland Presbyterian Church. He died Jan. 17, 1895, age 38 years, 2 mos., and 3 days. He was buried in Sweet Lips Cemetery on the right side of Daniel Mitchell. Henry and Emma Jane (Johnson) Mitchell resided in the Mitchell home. Their children:

THOMAS CHRISPIN MITCHELL 1833-1907

Thomas Chrispin Mitchell, born at Callands, Va. June 13, 1933, died in Georgia on March 18, 1907. He was the youngest child of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. He was 11 years old when his father died. He grew up on the farm and learned how to farm and was especially interested in raising tobacco. Around 1848 he went to Georgia with Samuel Fuller and Augustin F. Hubbard when Samuel Fuller, the son of Solomon Fuller, went to test tobacco cultivation in that state. He was only 18 years old when they went the first time. He was impressed with the results. When the caravan went from Pittsylvania Co., Va. to Georgia he seems to have been among them.

He married in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on August 5, 1850 Miriam Diana Smith. She was born Dec. 1, 1831 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. and died in Georgia April 10, 1908. They resided at Danielsville, Madison Co., Ga. part of the time. While there they made a journey back to see everyone in 1853 or '54 and at least one time after Stella was an active little girl and this last visit was before the War Between the States. When they made the visit in 1854, his mother, Anna Mitchell, gave them 3 hand knitted coverlets which were treasured through the years. Seventy five years later one of his daughters, Virginia Caroline, said they were the prettiest she ever saw. Anna Atkins Mitchell and all the family loved Miriam Diana (Smith) Mitchell. One verification of this is that his sister, Stella (Mitchell) Hubbard, named one of her daughters Miriam Diana for this sister—in—law.

Thomas Chrispin Mitchell served in the Confederate States Army. He came home twice on a furlough. The last time it had rained. After he was gone the children found a print of his shoe in the garden. They covered it and it was there for a long time. He returned from the war safely. His beloved mother died a few days before Lee surrendered. He never went back to Va. He continued farming and reared a fine family. One of his daughters-in-law said of him many years after his death, "A man who walked with God" and added "The most saintly man I ever knew". Census of Pittsylvania Co., Va. shows Sarah Arnn as head of her household. She was listed as a widow and farmer 38 years old. Her real estate was evaluated at 500. The 1860 census showed progress. She had \$1,500 in real estate and \$250 in personal property, and she had sustained their 2 sons and their daughter. Their children were:

MARY MITCHELL

Mary Mitchell (Polly), b. Feb. 14, 1807, was the daughter of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. On Jan. 16, 1826 a marriage license was issued to Frederick N. Payne and Mary Mitchell (Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 86). They resided on the farm of her father and were quite happy. They made a pet of her youngest brother, Thomas Chrispin Mitchell. He loved her all of his life. She died March 19, 1852 and was interred in the Mitchell-Hubbard-Gilbert burial ground beside her mother, Anna Mitchell. Mary and Frederick Payne had no children. Frederick N. Payne married the second time Ritta Nuckols, a daughter of John Nuckols. END OF MARY MITCHELL'S RECORD.

PARTHENIA MITCHELL

Parthenia Mitchell, known as "Theenie", was the daughter of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. She was born April 7, 1809 at Callands, Va. A marriage license was issued on April 4, 1829 to Reuben Payne and Parthenia Mitchell. Frederick Payne was security. Rev. Orson Martin performed the wedding ceremony. (Pitts. Co., Va. Mar. Reg., p. 94.) She died April 15. 1930, according to her gravestone. She was interred near the tomb of her grandfather James Mitchell. END OF PARTHENIA MITCHELL'S RECORD.

LOUISA MITCHELL

Louisa Mitchell was the fifth child of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. She was born at Callands. Va. on April 14, 1814. She was a young girl 18 years of age and industrious. She was not too well, but "Old Memmy Lou" was busy with the laundry and Louisa assisted her, and no one realized she was ill. She died before sunrise. Para-typhoid fever was diagnosed as the cause. The date on the sandstone grave marker shows she died Jan. 9, 1833. She was interred in the graveyard of her grandfather James Mitchell. See p. 493-L

SUSAN MITCHELL, ALICE ANN MITCHELL, ARABELLA MITCHELL

These three died in early life from diphtheria within 9 days in the month of April 1832.

Susan Mitchell was the sixth daughter of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell, who was b. July 3, 1816 and died April 11, 1832. Buried near James Mitchell's grave.

Alice Ann Mitchell's date of birth unknown (est. 1826); died April 8, 1832 according to gravestone in James Mitchell's cemetery.

Arabella Mitchell, the tenth child of John and Anna (Atkins)
Mitchell, was born by estimate around 1828, and died April 1832 (exact date
unknown). She was buried near her home in Mitchell-Hubbard-Gilbert graveyard.

JAMES RAYMOND MITCHELL

James Raymond Mitchell, second son and eleventh child of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell, b. 1830 (1860 census); died as a result of complications from measles contracted while serving in the Confederate States Army. Buried at Richmond, Va. He was unmarried.

JAMES ALLEN MITCHELL

James Allen Mitchell is regarded the youngest child of James and Sarah Warren (Philpott) (Hubbard) Mitchell. He was positively the youngest to reach maturity. No Bible record has been found but the following has been compiled from family information, court records and census records and his will and is regarded as correct for the family of James Allen Mitchell.

He was born at Callands, Va. Jan. 31, 1792 and lived there all of his life in the same home and died May 15, 1860. He was interred in the cemetery which he reserved in his will. He was 3½ years old when his father died. He grew up under his mother's guidance and without a doubt, the influence of his half brother, Moses Hubbard, and his mother's brother, John Philpott. His uncles, Samuel Zachariah and Charles Thomas Philpott, were also in the vicinity of Callands. He was reared on the farm and took part in the activities expected of the young people of that time. He secured an education that enabled him to attend to business of his personal interest and to settle the Estates of many people. This assures his descendants that he had the confidence of his neighbors. He was one of the administrators of his Uncle John Philpot's estate. He was also the administrator of the Estate of the compiler's great grandmother, who wrote her will at the age of 90, and it was probated 3 years later. He had the confidence and respect of the old as well as the young.

The Court records prove he took an active part in the County militia. One honor was to be elected a qualified "Cornetist" in the Militia on Sept. 17, 1821. (See Pitts. Co., Va. Order Book 22, p. 276). This tells us briefly that he loved music and played at least this instrument. From the same records it is learned he was qualified as Lieutenant in the Militia on July 18, 1824. (See O. B. 24, p. 321). From his youngest days this promotion exacted a dedication to worthwhile activities to merit such recognitions in the Militia. His reputation among his neighbors was such that he became a very wealthy man. His home was enjoyed by everyone and his fine horses, the young people could ride every Sunday, if they came.

James Allen Mitchell was issued a marriage license on Dec. 20, 1824 to marry Sarah H. Vaden. Wilson Vaden was his security. The family information states she was the daughter of Wilson and Rebecca Vaden and she died at Banister of Typhoid fever on Aug. 24, 1854, age 50 years. In one family record, Jan. 31, 1804 was her birthdate. The Register states also that her husband was James A. Mitchell. (See D. Register, p. 10). The following family record for James Allen and Sarah Hill (Vaden) Mitchell is based on James Allen Mitchell's Will. The ages of children on the U.S. Census and a grandson's Bible Record are supplied by G. C. Mitchell. The will is included. Sarah Hill Vaden has been declared her full maiden name, by her own family, and is so included here. All their children were born and reared on the farm at Callands, Va. They were (see will):

THE WILL OF JAMES ALLEN MITCHELL WILL BOOK 2, pages 318 and 319 PITTSYLVANIA CO., VA. (1845-1880)

I James A. Mitchell of Pittsylvania and State of Virginia do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and form as follows that is to say 1st. I desire all my just debts paid. 2d. I give to my son James W. Mitchell the land on which he lives the small peice bought of John F. Hubbard, the Chepel tract and all the Carter tract of land lying on both sides of the creek to the Chepel line at the head of the Mill pond thence running on the east side of sd pond at high water mark to the butment of the mill dam thence a straight line to a corner in the F. W. Payne's line on the mill road and the following negro slaves to wit: Leonard, John Harriett and her increase, Jane and Susan, all of which I give to him, the said James W. Mitchell and his heirs forever. 3rd. I give to my son John A. Mitchell the following negro slaves to wit: one boy Sam, Hopes and Suk a girl. And to William T. Mitchell, Leftrich, a blacksmith and Louisa, and to my daughter Caroline V. Mitchell a girl Caroline and George and Tarlton also I give to my son John A. Mitchell and Wm. T. Mitchell and my daughter Caroline V. Mitchell my dwelling house and all the furniture that are there in together with all the land around on which it stands except two acres around the grave yard running from the road and the mill tract that I purchased from Still and Pierce, all the rest joining together I give to them and their heirs forever. 4th. I give and confer to my daughter Rebecca G. Simmons the following slaves to wit: Liza, Peyton, and Armstead to her and her heirs forever. I now leave in the hands of my Exors here after named, for the use and benefit of my daughter Rebecca G. Simmons the tract of land containing near 400 acres more or less amount on which Adkins old shop stands it being all of the land purchased of ? Adkins, deed and the following negro slaves to wit: one girl Hannah and all her future increase and one boy named Scott, all of which is for the use and benefit of my daughter and to be managed as my Exors. may think proper by sale or otherwise during her natural life, then I give as the proceeds thereof to the heirs of her body forever. 5th, I give to my grandson James A. Muse the tract of land purchased of Still and Pierce and the balance of the Carter tract lying on the west of Banister except 50 acres around on which my mill stands, which fifty acres I leave for the use and benefit of said mill to be laid off any way my Exors may think proper also the following negro slaves to wit: Judy and her child and all her future increase and a negro boy Henry on the condition that he live with and is controled by some one or more of my children until he becomes of age or married, then I give it to him and his beirs forever. 6th. My Mill and Coleman a negro miller, together with fifty acres of land around on which it stands I give one sixth part to James W. Mitchell, one sixth part to John A. Mitchell, one sixth part to Wm T. Mitchell one sixth part to Caroline Mitchell and one sixth part to James A. Muse when he is twenty one and no part until then. All of which I give to them and their heirs forever and one sixth part I leave in the hands of my Exors for the use and benefit of my daughter Rebecca G. Simmons during her natural life or to be disposed of as she and my Exors may think proper and the proceeds to be kept for her use and benefit during life or if she should become a bride I then give it to her and to the heirs of her body forever, and if she should die without being a wido I then give it to the heirs of her body forever. 7th, All the remaining part of my Estate not willed away after paying all of my just debts shall be equally divided by my Exors or sold by them and the

proceeds equally divided or any part thereof sold to divide as they may all agree on or a majority of them shall rule and all sales shall be made by my Exors whether land or negroes and one sixth part I give to my son James W. Mitchell, one sixth part to John A. Mitchell, one sixth part to Wm. T. Mitchell, one sixth part to Caroline V. Mitchell, and one sixth part to my grandson James A. Muse on the condition that he remain with some one of my children and under their controll until he is twenty one, all of which I give to them and their heirs forever.

8th. I leave one sixth part in the hands of my Exors. for the use and benefit of my daughter Rebecca G. Simmons during her life if she is not again a wido, if so I then give it to her and the heirs of her body forever, but if she should die with out being a wido I give it to the heirs of her body forever.

9th and lastly I hereby constitute and appoint John A. Mitchell, Wm. T. Mitchell Exors of this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all former Wills by me heretofore made and having the utmost confidence in my sons hereby appointed Exors I desire that they shall not give any Security in the administration of this my last Will and Testament but to receive a 3 percent Commission. Witness my hand and Seal this the 28th day of Feby 1859 Witness

Jas. V. Reynolds A. P. Parrish, Sen. James A. Mitchell /S/

At a Court held for the County of Pittsylvania on the 1st day of May 1860 the last Will and Testament of James A. Mitchell deceased was proved by the two subscribing witnesses there to and it is ordered that the said Will be recorded and on the motion of Wm. T. Mitchell and John A. Mitchell the Executors in the said Will named who made oath and entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of two hundred thousand dollars conditioned according to law Certificate is granted them for obtaining probate of Said Will in due form. The testator requesting the Court not to require security of the said Executors.

The above Will shows that James Allen Mitchell was a successful business man. He at 21 years of age began his life's work without an inheritance and soon purchased his mother's 78 acres of land. This was followed by buying the interest his brothers and sisters had in his father's estate which was due to be settled according to James Mitchell's will dated July 18, 1795 which is recorded earlier in this record to prove the living heirs of James and Sarah Warren Mitchell. James Allen did inherit one fifth of his Uncle John Philpot's estate and one seventh of this, his father's estate, but this came after he began his career. He was 68 years old when he passed away and his Executors had to acknowledge a bond, with penalty of two hundred thousand dollars, to secure a Certificate to settle his estate. His inheritance was at the most, a small amount and the increase in wealth was the outcome of the capable business ability which he possessed.

In 1820 James Allen Mitchell was at home with his mother. In her home at that time she had her son James and 3 daughters, Cassey Mitchell, (perhaps named Cassandra) and Patsey Mitchell, (perhaps named Patricia) and her eldest daughter, Mary Glover Hubbard. James Allen Mitchell was Head of the Household when he took over the ownership of land, the taxes, the care of the mother and his sisters. Then in 1824 he married Miss Sarah Hill Vaden. The 1830 census shows James Allen Mitchell's household consisted of not only his young family but four were older ladies, one of whom was his mother. In 1840 the older ladies were not under the same roof but lived nearby.

He was still responsible for everyone. At that time there were also 22 servants but 5 of the women were under the direction of his mother's household. The older half sister, Mary Glover Hubbard, passed away at some date unknown before 1840.

The 1850 census proves he was in the mercantile business. This storehouse was near the home and it was at this store one night a slave trader forced the woman to leave her baby, or else she chose to abandon the child there. The baby was found after that trader marched by with his company of slaves he had for sale. This child, found on the store porch the next morning, was given a wet nurse, taken care of and grew up to be a very fine, dependable man. He married and lived at the Mitchell farm all of his life. The Will of James Allen Mitchell shows Leftrich was in 1859 a grown man and a blacksmith by trade. They named him Leftrich because at first he was called the "Left" baby or just "Left". "Left" was tenderly cared for and loved by everyone. He loved and did for others all of his life as others did for him. Mrs. John I. Armm said Left and Aunt Fanny were old when they went there to live in 1900 and said they were very thoughtful and kind old people. The place was always a home to "Left". In 1859 Leftrich was assigned to Wm. T. Mitchell who lived in his father's home. This enabled Leftrich to remain with those at the old home place. This shows the Mitchell family had their own blacksmith shop on their lands and that Left was in charge of its activities. The census record proves also that in 1850 two of James Allen Mitche ell's sons were employed in the store of their father as clerks. Wilson Mitchell, around 25 years of age, and John Allen, age 23, were mature young men. Their oldest daughter, Susan Ann Mitchell, was not in the home. She had married.

Marvelous strides were made in the next 10 years. The Mill was a very great joy to James Allen Mitchell can be seen by his will. He was anticipating great things from it and he desired each child to share one sixth of its profit each year. Here we see Coleman was the dependable miller and he was to remain with the mill where he was contented to be.

This was the situation at the beginning of the War Setween the States. It has been stated that the heirs of the older three Mitchell brothers in 1860 owned the lands along the Sanister River on both sides for 4 miles and all was well and flourishing. When the war was over they only had lands. Money and all else was gone. It cannot be stated how long the Mill was active, but there was no wheat planted in the fall of 1864 because there were no horses or men on most of the farms. Also in that section a drought in summer of 1865 left nubbins instead of good ears of corn, according to old letters. This was a dismal situation for millers in those difficult times. James Allen Mitchell did not live to see all of these changes. He and his two brothers were deceased before the war started. James Allen Mitchell and his wife, Sarah Hill (Vaden) Mitchell, were interred in the graveyard that he reserved, for all time, in his Will.

SUSAN ANN MITCHELL

Susan Ann Mitchell, born May 23, 1829, was the daughter of James Allen and Sarah Hill (Vaden) Mitchell. The Marriage Register of Pittsylvania Co., Va. records on page 145 that on Sept. 15, 1849, a marriage license was issued to Thomas C. Muse to marry Susan Ann Mitchell. James W. Mitchell, her brother, was his security. Rev. Abner Anthony performed their wedding ceremony according to the Pitts. Co., Va. Minister's Returns. His full name was Thomas Chattin Muse. The next year the U.S Census for 1850 states Thomas C. Muse was age 52, but he was born in 1799. Susan Muse was 21 years old and was born in the year 1829. See Above.

Susan AMn (Mitchell) Muse lived a very few years after her marriage. The exact date of her death, ca. 1856, is unknown. She died before her husband dated his will Feb. 28, 1857, and it was probated April 20, 1857. He left his entire estate to their son James Archer Muse if he lived to age 21 years. He appointed his brother James S. Muse of Fayette Co., Mo. guardian of his son, James Archer Muse. This will of Thomas Chattin Muse verifies Angelina H. Mitchell, wife of John Coleman Mitchell, was his own sister and that Winifred H. Carter, the daughter of his sister, Susanna Wrenn Muse, who married Jesse Carter, is his niece. These two were to be the heirs of his estate if his son, James Archer Muse, died before he was 21 years of age. His wife, Susan Ann Mitchell, was a first cousin of John Coleman Mitchell, the husband of his sister, Angelina H. Muse. Thomas Chattin and Susan Ann (Mitchell) Muse were the parents of only one son:

i. James Archer Muse, b. Aug. 24, 1850 at Callands, Pitts. Co., Va.

James Archer Muse inherited his father's entire estate before he was 7 years of age in 1857. He was evidently in the home of his grandfather James Allen Mitchell when his grandfather died. The 1860 U.S. Census did not record his name due to his death prior to the enumeration. John Allen Mitchell, his son, was listed head of that household. James Archer Muse was included, age 9 years, because his 10th birthday, Aug. 24, 1860, had not arrived. This little grandson had received a part of the one sixth share of his grandfather James Allen Mitchell's estate, the share of his deceased mother, Susan Ann (Mitchell) Muse. The executors, his uncles John Allen and William Thomas Mitchell, had already alloted to him 7,425 dollars of real estate and 16,324 dollars in personal property. His grandfather's will stipulated he must live until 21 years of age with his Mitchell relatives. The War Between the States was upon them and when it was over the land was all that was left and that was of small monetary value. The value of his father's estate in 1857 or in 1860 is not known, but this was not to be delivered until he was 21 years of age on Aug. 24, 1871. This estate was perhaps of small value in 1871 due to the results of the War Between the States.

Just what the educational advantages were for James Archer Muse cannot be stated. They were the best available before the war. He was 15 years old the year the war closed. Home instruction was certainly a part of his opportunity. There were a few able teachers in that section after the war. Mr. J.J. Averett at Chatham, Va. was one. The least that can be said, is that James Archer Muse was an intelligent boy and reached manhood well enough educated to teach school and in later life hold responsible employment for the

government and elsewhere. On Jan. 20, 1874, his Uncle John Allen Mitchell and his wife Mary Frances Mitchell, expressed their sincere confidence in the education and ability of James Archer Muse when they appointed him their lawful attorney to sell for them lands they owned in Pittsylvania Co., Va. They were at that time residents of Halifax Co., Va. This official duty was certified on Jan. 24, 1874 by James D. Clay, Clerk of Halifax Co., Va. Court. This act not only recognized his ability, but expressed their confidence in this young man and their appreciation of him in every way. At this time he was around 24 years of age.

When James Archer Muse was 26 years old, he was married on his birthday, Aug. 24, 1876, to Mentora Jane Parrish, born Dec. 6, 1854. She was in her 22nd year of age. She had struggled through the Reconstruction days to secure an education. Her mother died in 1863 and William Perkins Parrish, her father, died while in service of the War. She was the sister of Celestiae Parrish who was a student on a scholarship at the Roanoke Female Institute, now Averette College, Danville, Va. She requested Mr. Averett to grant Mentora Parrish a scholarship when she was 11 years of age. So in 1865 she entered the same school and graduated at the age of 15 years. She no doubt taught school before her marriage. After marriage, James Archer and Mentora Jane (Parrish) Muse taught school together for several years until he entered United States Government Service. Around 1893 James Archer Muse accepted government work at the Indian Reservation at Vernal, Utah. While he was there, for 7 years in government service, Mentora Muse supervised their farm in Pitts. Co., Va. and kept all their little sons busy in the summer. Tobacco was the money crop and for boys there was a lot of fun and things of interest, as well as work. For instance one of those little boys had not forgotten work in tobacco when he was at age of 4 years. How awful! No, it is fun to find a worm and put him in a can. Every one removed was one less worm and not real work after all. Then the fun of roasting chestnuts on the flues during the curing of a barn of tobacco was along with many other memories of fun. All of this was over in 1900. James Archer Muse moved his family from the farm at Callands, Va. to Bristol, Tenn. He had accepted work in the General Office of the V. & S.W. Railway. For a few years they were all living together in Bristol, Tenn.

During these earlier years of the lives of their children, their education was of paramount importance to these two former school teachers and to a very important aunt, who was Celestiae Susan Parrish, their mother's sister. Everyone who knew her knew how her heart was filled with the highest ambitions for the success of her sister's children. This was based, no doubt, upon her evaluation of their intellectual ability.

JAMES ARCHER MUSE

James Archer Muse, the only child of Thomas Chattin and Susan Ann (Mitchell) Muse, was born at Callands, Va. on Aug. 24, 1850. He died Jan. 31, 1921. He married on Aug. 24, 1876 Mentora Perkins Parrish, born Dec. 6, 1854, the daughter of William Perkins Parrish who married Lucinda Jane Walker. James Archer Muse and Mentora Perkins Jane Parrish were first cousins. Thomas Chattin Muse was the brother of Susan Mariah Muse who married Joseph Walker, who were the parents of Lucinda Jane Walker, the mother of Mentora Perkins Jane Parrish. The children of James Archer and Mentora Perkins Jane (Parrish) Muse were:

WILLIAM T. W. MUSE

William T. W. Muse, born June 11, 1877 at Callands, Va. on his father's farm. He attended the schools at home and had the guidance of both parents. It is said he graduated at William and Mary. He was 16 years old when he went with his father to Utah. He taught at an Indian School at the Indian Reservation at Vernal, Utah. He did this for several years. He also made the first census of that Indian Reservation. In 1904 he went home to Bristol, Tenn. and was one of the civil engineers who built the C.C. & O. Railway through South West, Va.

On Jan. 22, 1907 William T.W. Muse married Mary Alverda Greear. She was born April 11, 1882. They were at home in British Columbia Canada for a while. There he built the City Docks. All of their children were born in Canada which means he resided in Canada 15 or more years. He returned to Tenn. and was for many years the sanitary engineer for Eastern Tenn. Bristol Tenn. was his last known residence. The children of William T.W. and Mary Alverda (Greear) Muse, all born in Canada, are:

John Alfred Muse was the son of James Archer and Mentora Jane (Parrish) Muse. His early education was in the schools of that section under the guidance of his parents. He had graduated at a Business School in Richmond, Va. before he went with his father and brother William to Utah around 1893. John was a bookkeeper for a Mr. Calvert for two years. His employer decided to add liquor to his business. John resigned and returned home to Bristol. He found employment with the U. & S.W. Railway Co. Later he was Comptroler of the C.C. & O. Railway Co. The next summer she enrolled at the University of Michigan and she completed there the requirements for the Ph. D. degree. She met there Dr. Bradshaw. He taught Mathematics at this University and retired around 1964. They have no descendants.

SUE MITCHELL MUSE

Sue Mitchell Muse, born Sept. 16, 1884 at Callands, Va., died May 23, 1907, was a daughter of John Archer and Mentora Jane (Parrish) Muse. She prepared her self for college at Farmville, now Longwood College, at Farmville, Va. Her Aunt Celestiae Parrish was a member of that Faculty for a number of years. Sue Mitchell Muse died at age 22. She never married.

JOSEPH CHARLES MUSE

REBECCA G. MITCHELL

Rebecca G. Mitchell was a daughter of James Allen and Sarah Hill (Vaden) Mitchell. She was born around 1835. (U.S. Census 1850). A marriage licence was issued William T. Wright on Jan. 6, 1851 to marry Rebecca G. Mitchell. Minister's Returns Pitts. Co., Va. shows Rev. E. L. Cochran performed their wedding ceremony. (Pitts. Co., Va. Min. Ret.) He died soon after their marriage. They had no children.

Mrs. Rebecca G. (Mitchell) Wright married the second time Mr. Chap J. Simmons. The date and details are unknown. This second marriage was very early since in 1859 she was a widow for the second time and had two small sons. This is revealed in her father's will. He provided generously for her, and in detail, in his will. Within 8 years she had been a widow twice and was around 29 years of age. Chap and Rebecca Simmons' children:

No other details given for Rebecca (Mitchell) Simmons' family.

CAROLINE VIRGINIA MITCHELL

Caroline Virginia Mitchell (Callie), was the youngest daughter of James Allen and Sarah Hill (Vaden) Mitchell. She was born in 1839, according to the 1850 census. She was single when her father made his will on Feb. 28, 1859 and left her one sixth of his estate. After her father's death her older brother, John Allan Mitchell was listed Head of the household in the 1860 census and she is listed as unmarried, the owner of 7,425 dollars in real estate and personal property with an evaluation of 16,324 dollars.

A marriage license, however, was issued on July 10, 1860 to Raleigh W. White to marry Caroline V. Mitchell. (See Mar. Reg. Pitts. Co., Va.). The date of their marriage is not known by the compiler. They had one child, a daughter:

i. Cordelia White, called Cordie.

Rawleigh W. White died after a few years. Mrs. Caroline Virginia (Mitchell) White married the second time Milton H. Heron. (Spelling may be incorrect). Mr. and Mrs. Heron lived in Tennessee and had several children according to the information given.

JAMES WILSON MITCHELL

James Wilson Mitchell was the first child and oldest son of James Allen and Sarah Hill (Vaden) Mitchell. He was born on Nov. 17, 1825 at Callands, Va. and died there on Nov. 6, 1907 and was interred near his dwelling house. He married on June 18, 1850 Martha Thompkins McDearman, the daughter of Hart McDearman. She was born in 1828 near Bookneal, Campbell Co., Va. She died in her home at Callands, Va. on March 27, 1909. She was buried by her husband at their home place. Martha McDearman joined the church in her early youth. Her obituary declared her silent influence in her daily life and her conversation set a standard that would suppress evil and draw forth the good in those who came under her influence. Her home was an abode of warm and graceful hospitality and she was loved by all.

James Allen Mitchell employed James Wilson, his son, as a clerk in their store in 1850 and his will in 1859 shows that he settled James Wilson,

perhaps when he was married, on the lands he bequeathed him in his will. In 1860 the census shows James Wilson Mitchell was a farmer, and real estate and personal property was evaluated at 21,300 dollars. At that time they had 5 children.

James Wilson Mitchell's life and plans were completly changed when the War Between the States came, and this was true of everyone in those days. It is not known what his duty as a Virginia citizen came to be, but he was no doubt a member of a company of the County militia as was true of men. He was around 35 years of age. It is known that he served in Wright's Battery. He was 40 years old when the Surrender came. He returned home and lived the remainder of his life on the farm. The land was all that was left. Life was not easy but he clung to the land and this land belongs today to his descendants. In Oct. 1900 he applied for a pension and it was granted. He was 75 years old. (See Pitts. Co., Va. Muster Roll (1861-1865) Reel 71, Va. State Archives). He used this pension around 7 years and passed away a few days before his 82nd birthday on Nov. 6, 1907.

The following record from a leaf in an old Bible was secured for the compiler by Dr. Howard L. Mitchell.

James Wilson Mitchell, b. Nov. 17, 1825, d. Nov. 6, 1907 married Martha McDearman, b. 1835, d. 1909 on March 27.

All of these children were born on their father's farm near Callands, Va. They all attended school and obtained at least the instruction given in 8th grade. The extra education was self instruction and it will be seen at least three were employed as school teachers. Other data given below has been sent and is as follows:

MARRIAGES

JAMES VADEN MITCHELL

James Vaden Mitchell, born Dec. 13, 1852, the oldest child of James Wilson and Martha (McDearman) Mitchell, was called Vaden. He was a farmer all of his life. He never married. He died in his father's old home on March 8, 1926 and was interred there.

MATILDA T. MITCHELL

Matilda T. Mitchell, called Mattie, was the daughter of James Wilson and Martha (McDearman) Mitchell. She was born Dec. 13, 1854 and died June 1, 1920. She was a school teacher. She lived her entire life in her father's old home and is interred there. She never married.

WILLIAM HENRY MITCHELL

William Henry Mitchell, born Aug. 9, 1856, was the son of James Wilson and Martha (McDearman) Mitchell. He married Martha Hastings, called Patty. The date is unknown. He was a farmer. He died Dec. 5, 1943. He was called Henry. They have no children.

CAROLINA EMMA MITCHELL

Carolina Emma Mitchell was the daughter of James Wilson and Martha (McDearman) Mitchell. She was born Oct. 24, 1857 and died July 29, 1931 and lived her entire life in the old home and is buried there. She never married.

SALLIE STERLING MITCHELL

Sallie Sterling Mitchell, the daughter of James Wilson and Martha (McDearman) Mitchell, was born April 29, 1861. She married, as his second wife, Joseph Madison Parrish. After his death she returned to her old home and died there very suddenly on Jan. 9, 1935. They had no children.

ELIZABETH (BETTY) MCDEARMAN MITCHELL

Betty McDearman Mitchell was a daughter of James Wilson and Martha (McDearman) Mitchell. She was born April 8, 1862 and died April 28, 1944. She lived all of her life in her parents' home. She was a school teacher and never married. Her will was probated May 8, 1844. (W.B. 10, Pitts. Co., Va., p. 10).

MARTHA WILSON MITCHELL

Martha Wilson Mitchell, called Pat, was a daughter of James Wilson and Martha (McDearman) Mitchell. She was named for both mother and father. She was also called "Wilsie". If one's nickname indicates one is loved, she was indeed a loved one. She was born June 25, 1864 and died Feb. 15, 1940. She married, date unknown, Ballard Prentis Arnn. She was buried at their home. Their children were recalled as follows by a relative, 4 sons and 1 daughter.

- i. Claude Bennett Arnn.
- ii. Douglas Lynn Arnn who married Elinor Martin. They had 4 boys and 2 girls.
- iii. Glifford Holt Arnn who mar. Ruth Adkins. Their children were: (a) Glifford Neal Arnn and (b) William Arnn.
 - iv. William Clinton Arnn who mar. Dasie Reynolds. (a) Hazel Louise Arnn was their dau.
 - v. Verna Lillian Arnn who mar. Oakley Gregory.

This surname, Arnn, has been spelled in the court records Aron and Arn. Those who care will find facts and dates in the Pitts. Co., Va. Marriage and court records.

JOHN THOMAS MITCHELL

John Thomas Mitchell was a son of James Wilson and Martha (McDearman) Mitchell. He was called Tom. He was born on Sept. 28, 1866. He grew up on the farm and learned farming. He, however, followed the Carpenter's type of employment and also had as his vocation the service of policeman. He died on April 20, 1930. He never married. He is interred at home.

ANNA BELLE MITCHELL

Anna Belle Mitchell, the daughter of James Wilson and Martha Thompkins (McDearman) Mitchell, was born April 11, 1869 and died Feb. 9, 1947. She was a school teacher many years. On April 20, 1911 she married one of her cousins, John Randolph Mitchell, the son of Moses Mitchell, the son of Samuell Mitchell. She was his second wife and she was second mother to his son, Howard Lyle Mitchell. She had no children. She was buried at her husband's home. Refer to p. 487.

FLÖYD HURT MITCHELL

Floyd Hurt Mitchell, the youngest child of James Wilson and Martha Thompkins (McDearman) Mitchell, was born on July 24, 1871. He died March 25, 1925. He lived all of his life on the Mitchell lands of his father. He was a farmer and a merchant. He married Mary Lou Meadow. Their children were:

- i. Robert Hurt Mitchell, b. Jan. 29, 1911.
- ii. James Sanford Mitchell, b. Jan. 29, 1913.
- iii. Mary Juanita Mitchell, b. May 17, 1915.
- iv. Morton Lucinda Mitchell, b. Nov. 26, 1919.
- v. John Roy Mitchell, b. Jan. 13, 1922.

James Sanford Mitchell married and was an M.D. but no other facts were sent.

The old James Wilson Mitchell home was built prior to 1850 according to the tradition. In the original part, the logs were hand hewn and put together with wooden pegs. All nails were made in their blacksmith shop. As time passed it was enlarged. Today it is in ruins, but still standing in 1975. Everyone has passed away and most of their children are buried there. Her husband owned a very beautifully toned violin and he played it skillfully and one old man, relating this to the compiler, told how his lovely music inspired him when he was a child, to learn to play the violin. He learned to play and played one all of his life.

JOHN ALLAN MITCHELL

1827-1905

John Allan Mitchell, son of James Allen and Sarah Hill (Vaden) Mitchell, was born at Callands, Pitts. Co., Va. on Nov. 9, 1827. He died Jan. 23, 1905 at Alchie, Halifax Co., Va. and was interred there.

The 1850 census proves that John Allan Mitchell was a clerk in his father's store. Before 1860 this mercantile business was the property of John Allan and his brother William Thomas Mitchell. The 1860 census, after their father's will was settled, proves John Allan Mitchell had 15,425 dollars in real estate and 20,624 dollars in personal property in Pitts. Co., Va. He married on Thursday, May 15, 1856 Mary Frances Pringle (Fanny). Rev. John H. Lacy performed their wedding ceremony. She was born Sept. 5, 1832 in Halifax Co., Va. and died at Alchie on July 5, 1904 and was interred there. She was the daughter of William Pringle who married Alice Goode Baskerville on June 1, 1814. Her grandmother, Martha Goode, married Richard Baskerville of Cumberland Co., Va. on Oct. 9, 1770. (Vol. XXWC, p. 28). They settled in Halifax Co., Va. and reared their family. The ancestors of Mary Frances Pringle are recorded in "Descendants of Richard Baskerville" by Patrick Hamilton Baskerville. She was a student at Hollins Institute 2 years.

John Allan Mitchell and his bride were in the home of his father, James Allen Mitchell when he passed away and the U.S. census of 1860 lists John A.

Mitchell as Head of the Household. His father's will reveals that he did not desire to upset his family, so he gave the dwelling house to the two sons and their single sister. That year was filled with many changes as will be seen by those who read the chapter for those enumerated in this household in 1860, after their father died. John A. Mitchell and his brother, William T. Mitchell, were Exors. of his will regarding an estate that exacted by law a two hundred thousand dollar bond. John A. Mitchell, in 1860 was a member of the Virginia State Guard. Their sister, Caroline Virginia Mitchell, had wedding plans which were observed in 1860. Charles Raymond Mitchell made his advent and was only a few months old when the census enumerator came to call on them. James William Mitchell was the 2 year old son of John A. and Mary Frances Mitchell and was born at Callands, Va. Charles Raymond Mitchell was the son of William T. and Nancy Swanson Mitchell, and was recorded also on this census in 1860. This 1860 census record shows he was a merchant and from his father's estate he had received \$15,425 in real estate and \$20,624 in personal property before the enumeration was taken. Capt. John Allan Mitchell was head of the household soon after his father's death, according to the census record as seen above. Business about the settlement of his father's estate, the marriage of their single sister, their own private mercantile business and the war activities that demanded the time of a Captain, made life very strenuous for him and his brother, the other Executor of their father's will.

His second son, John Richard Mitchell, was born Jan. 31, 1861 and he regarded his birthplace as near Republican Grove, Halifax Co., Va. This was normal for this young mother to be at home at this time especially when their plans were to live in Halifax Co., Va. They bought 500 acres of her father's estate and settled there permanently. The date of this deed and the book and pages of its recording can be found in the court records of Halifax Co., Va. His mercantile business came to be primarily in Halifax Co., Va. There seems to be no record of his service in the C.S. Army in Pitts. Co., Va. and would not be if his residence in Jan. 1861 was already Halifax Co., Va.

Before the war was over he began to sell his interest in Pitts. Co., Va. lands and his business to his brother, William Thomas Mitchell. A deed dated Jan. 27, 1863 is in the possession of the family from Capt. John A. Mitchell and his wife Mary F. Mitchell that states they reside in Halifax Co., Va. They were conveying to his brother, William Thomas Mitchell, the one third interest in one thousand acres of land, more or less, that was conveyed to Three of them in their father's will. This deed is recorded in Pitts. Co., Va. The date of the order for its recording was March 16, 1863. These two brothers were close in their youth. They learned the mercantile business in their father's store at Callands, Va., near their childhood home. They had their own business in this field. After the war they continued their partnership, but in different locations.

Capt. John Allan Mitchell owned many acres of land in Pitts. Co. besides his one third interest in the above one thousand acres of land in 1863, he appointed his nephew, James Archer Muse, his attorney on Jan. 20, 1874, to sell 3 tracts of land in this county. Exact number of acres is not known. Several years later he settled another matter of business with his brother and released his ownership of 650 acres in Pitts..Co., Va. This last deal was May 14, 1880. Furthermore, in 1860 the War Between the States was upon them. Just how soon John A. Mitchell moved to Halifax Co., Va. is not known since he had to close a prosperous mercantile business. They did leave Pitts. Co. and resided the remainder of their lives at Republican Grove, Halifax Co., Va., called Alchie, near Nathalie today, where he bought 500 acres of her father's estate.

Regarding the service of John Allan Mitchell in the Confederate States Army, Judge Gus Edward Mitchell has supplied the following as his experience as was stated by his brother Gus Edward Mitchell, the father of Judge Mitchell This information regards his service as a citizen of Halifax Co., Va.

John Allan Mitchell went to the War of Secession in the fall of 1863. He was mustered into service at Richmond and assigned to Staturary Artillery at Yorktown guarding boats coming up the river, and remained there six months. The enemy guns would outdistance theirs, so Captain Pierson was ordered by the Commander General to load the guns heavier to reach the enemy. The Capt. told their General that one gun would blow up. The order was obeyed, a gun burst and three men were killed. The Brigade was then ordered to fall back to Richmond. By this time John Allan Mitchell had a nervous trouble, so he employed a substitute and returned home. In the summer of 1864 he returned to arms and was sent to Chester in the Infantry as a member of Stuart's Brigade, Pickett's Division, under Colonel Griggs and Captain Poindexter. He was in two or three fights in the Battle of Five Forks and was on a scouting trip when he was taken prisoner April 1, 1865 and taken to Hart Island, N.Y. and was released June 20, 1865. He took the railroad to Clover, Va. and walked from there home.

The children of John Allen and Mary Frances (Pringle) Mitchell were:

- i. James William Mitchell (Willie), b. June 22, 1858 Pitts. Co., Va. He died with typhoid fever when around 17 years of age. The date was Nov. 7, 1874.
- ii. John Richard Mitchell, b. Jan. 31, 1861.
- iii. Joseph Henry Mitchell, b. Oct. 30, 1863.
- iv. Sarah Alice Mitchell, b. June 9, 1866.
 - v. Gus Edward Mitchell, b. Oct. 15, 1868.
- vi. Mary Jeanie Mitchell, b. July 3, 1873.

All of the last 5 were born near Republican Grove, Halifax Co., Va. which is known today as Alchie, Va. The above data was recorded in an old family Bible at the home of Mr. Gus Mitchell, the father of Judge Gus Mitchell.

John Allan Mitchell was an industrious progressive merchant in Pittsylvania Co., Va. When the war came on he was already active in the militia. Tradition claims he was a member of the Virginia State Guard. It is said he was active in the formation of a Company and perhaps the same Company his brother, William Thomas Mitchell was active in as Captain. John Allan Mitchell did serve and he was wounded. The family traditions include his need of clothing for his return to service. His wife attempted to supply his needs. The trouble was a shortage of suitable cloth. Having succeeded to a certain point no more was available. Loving hearts and willing hands obeyed wise thinking, the new patch work quilt lining was removed and used in a suitable way. Then "Mammy Sallie", the life long nurse of his wife, donated her new unused petticoat and sufficient clothes were completed.

His life and activity is unknown except in results. They reared a family of 3 sons and 2 daughters who were men and women of excellent character and usefulness in their chosen places of residence, as can be seen in the accounts recorded here.

MARRIAGES

JOHN RICHARD MITCHELL

John Richard Mitchell was the son of John Allan and Mary Frances (Pringle) Mitchell. He was born Jan. 31, 1861 near Republican Grove, called Alchie, Halifax Co., Va. He died in Olympia, Thurston Co., Washington on March 24,

1930 and was interred there. He married on April 22, 1891 Hallie Price, in the Episcopal Church at Olympia, Thurston Co., Wash. She was the daughter of Daniel B. Price who married Lavina Sharp Hoy. She was born March 26, 1872 at Russelville, Ky. and died Sept. 13, 1945 at Olympia, Wash. and was interred in the Masonic Cemetery. He was a Mason, Knights of Pythias and a member of the Woodmen of the World.

When he was 27 years of age he went from Virginia to the state of Washington. It was around the year 1888. A year later he was admitted to the practice of law in that state. He was slected for 2 years in Thurston Co. as prosecutor. After this he practiced law with Thomas Vance in that state. He served also as Superior Court Judge for the counties of Thurston and Mason for 10 years in Washington state. In 1918, Governor Lister of the state of Washington appointed him to the Supreme Court. He served this position with honor and dignity until his retirement in 1936. As judge he was known as a liberal and wrote some of the Court's most famous opinions. When he retired, Chief Justice William J. Millard of Washington State Court, has been quoted as saying, "Justice Mitchell's retirement will be a severe loss to the bench. He has served the State ably and has written some memorable decisions". (See Halifacts, p. 218, 1936). They belonged to the Baptist denomination. They had only one child, a son, Richard Sharp Mitchell.

RICHARD SHARP MITCHELL

Richard Sharp Mitchell, the only child of John Richard and Hallie (Price) Mitchell, was born May 15, 1894 in Olympia, Thurston Co., Wash. He passed away very quickly on Dec. 25, 1964 in Seattle, Wash. Memorial services were in the Chapel at Jones and Jones Funeral Directors in Wenatchee, Wash. on Tuesday, Dec. 29, 1964. The Rev. Charles Fox officiated. Interment was in that city.

Richard Sharp Mitchell married on Oct. 1, 1924 in Calgary, Alberta, Canada, Pearl Olson, born Aug. 22, 1900 in Medina, Stutsman Co., North Dak. She was the daughter of Edwin Paul Olson, born Jan. 10, 1858 in Sand Creek Wisconsin who married Belle Lappegard, born Jan. 3, 1868 in Hollingdahl, Norway. She came to America in 1885 at the age of 17 years and was married in 1897 in South Dakota. Pearl Olson Mitchell died in Nov. 18, 1965 in Seattle, Wash. Her memorial service was conducted in St. Lukes Episcopal Church on Nov. 20, 1965. She was interred in Wenatchee, Wash.

Richard Sharp Mitchell settled in Wenatchee, Wash. and as a physician did his life's work there. He was a member of the Wenatchee Valley Clinic of that city. This Clinic staffed 18 doctors who practiced in 8 fields of medicine. Dr. R.S. Mitchell specialized in the field of Gynecology and Obstetrics. He retired from active service in 1959 after his third coronary attack. Dr. R.S. Mitchell was a Baptist but the family were Episcopalians. Dr. Richard Sharp and Pearl (Olson) Mitchell had 3 children. They were all born in Wenatchee, Wash. They were:

- ii. John Edward Mitchell, b. Jan. 14, 1928.
- iii. Marilyn Louise Mitchell, b. Feb. 25, 1931.

MARILYN LOUISE MITCHELL

Marilyn Louise Mitchell, born Feb. 25, 1931, was the daughter of Richard Sharp and Pearl (Olson) Mitchell. She graduated from Mills College, Oakland

California in 1952 with A.B. degree. She did Post Graduate work at Oberlin College, Ohio and the University of Washington in Seattle. She taught the third grade in a public school in Seattle, Wash.

Marilyn Louise Mitchell, on June 23, 1963, married Christopher Ogden Duffy in the First Presbyterian Church in Wenatchee, Wash. Mr. and Mrs. Christopher O. Duffy reside at Route 3, 8ox 3572, Bainbridge Island, Wash. They are the parents of:

i. Suzanne Duffy.

JOHN EDWARD MITCHELL

John Edward Mitchell, born Jan. 14, 1928, is the only son of Richard Sharp and Pearl (Olson) Mitchell. He served as a Paratrooper in the Army of Occupation in the 11th Airbourne Division in Sendia, Japan in 1946. He received his honorable discharge in 1947. He is a graduate from University of Southern California in the class of 1952 with a Civil Engineering degree. In 1960 he received his M.A. degree in Engineering from the University of Ill. He was a Civil Engineer in Tacoma, Wash. and in 1966 he was employed in this field in the city of Seattle, Wash. At that time he had never married.

THE ANCESTORS OF HALLIE (PRICE) MITCHELL

Hallie (Price) Mitchell was the daughter of Daniel B. Price who married Lavinia Sharp Hoy whose sister was Fidelia Maxwell Hoy. The sisters were the daughters of Thomas Jefferson Hoy, born Sept. 9, 1803. He died in 1862. He married in 1834 Elvira Louisa McCurdy, born Oct. 13, 1812, died 1863, who was a daughter of James Darwin McCurdy (b. 1776, d. 1856) who married Lavinia Sharp (b. 1782, d. 1838). Lavinia Sharp was the daughter of Capt. Sir Thomas Sharp, born 1746 in England and died 1800 in Logan Co., Ky. who married in England Jean Maxwell, known as Lady Jean Maxwell of Edinburgh, Scotland.

THE ANCESTORS OF MARY FRANCES (PRINGLE) MITCHELL

Mary Frances Pringle married John Allen Mitchell May 15, 1856. She was the daughter of Alice Goode Baskerville who married William Pringle and they settled in Halifax Co., Va. Alice Goode Baskerville was a daughter of Richard Baskerville who married on Oct. 9, 1770 Martha Goode, the daughter of Bennett Goode. (See p. 28, Vol. XX W. & M. Quarterly Editor Lyon G. Tyler, Pres. of William & Mary College.

For Baskerville ancestors and kindred see the publications by P. Hamilton Baskerville, A.M., University of Virginia. There are several volumes of the Baskerville Genealogy. Additional Baskerville Genealogy by P. Hamilton Baskerville, Pub. by Willis Ellis Jones' Sons Inc., Richmond, Va. (1917) has a table between pp. 116 & 117 with pertinent information for those interested.

JOSEPH HENRY MITCHELL

Joseph Henry Mitchell, born Oct. 30, 1863, Halifax Co., Va., was the third son of John Allan and Mary Frances (Pringle) Mitchell. His youth was spent on a farm. He and a younger brother also owned a store when quite young.

In his early years he accepted Christ and united with the Baptist church. His earliest education was in private and public schools. When he became interested in medicine as his life's work, he sold his interest in the store to his brother, Gus Edward Mitchell. He entered Dale Academy, Chatham, Va. and completed the course. He enrolled at Baltimore Medical College, Baltimore, Md. and received the M.D. degree on April 19, 1895. He served his internship at John Hopkins University. On June 25, 1896 he received a license to practice medicine and surgery in the state of Virginia. He then in 1898-1899 took a post-graduate course at Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, Pa., specializing in obstetrics and children's diseases.

Returning to Halifax Co., Va. he practiced at Stebbins. In 1900 he moved to Dillwyn, Va. and opened his office. The roads were poor so he rode horseback and used saddle bags. In 1924 he received his diploma from the University of Maryland. After 48 years of service he became ill on Feb. 2, 1948 and died in Johnston-Willis Hospital on Feb. 11, 1948. He was buried at Dillwyn, Va. He proved himself to be an able, faithful physician, completely dedicated to giving his best to his profession. He was lovingly called "Dr. Joe" by the people, which was his reward.

On May 31, 1911 Dr. Joseph Henry Mitchell, at Bethel M.E. Julia Elizabeth Payne Mitchell was a devoted wife who appreciated the life's work of her husband, Joseph Henry Mitchell. She, with reluctance, moved to Richmond to be with and nearer to her loved ones who lived in that city. She was a very active person in her lifetime until her very last years. She was most interested in genealogy. Her family is recorded because she was so loyal and secured the data herein included. Her last days she suffered from Arthritis and had a cataract operation and had to endure blindness. Yet she was courageous through her misfortunes. She passed away on Feb. 1, 1975 and was intered in Bethel Church Cemetery, Dillwyn, Va. by her husband, Dr. Joseph H. Mitchell. Their survivors in 1975 were three daughters, one son, six grandchildren and ten great grandchildren. All of these great grandchildren have not been recorded, due without a doubt to health in her later years. The last item she sent in recent years was the following.

A SKETCH OF THE LIFE OF J. H. MITCHELL, M. D.

Joseph Henry Mitchell was born in Halifax County, Virginia October 30, 1863. He was the third son of the late John Allen Mitchell and Mary Frances Pringle. His boyhood days were spent on a farm in Halifax County where he and a younger brother farmed and owned and operated a country store. In early life he accepted Christ and was united with the Baptist Church. After growing up and securing all the education available in the county schools, he suddenly became interested in medicine and decided to make it his life's work. To prepare himself for this work he sold his interest in the store to a younger brother Gus, who at the age of 93 years still owns and operates the farm and store. He then entered Locust Dale Academy in Chatham, Virginia. After completing the course there he enrolled at Baltimore Medical College in the state of Maryland and on April 19, 1895 a degree of M.D. in surgery was conferred upon him by this college. He served his internship at JohnsHopkins University, spending most of his time in surgery and administering anesthetics.

On June 25, 1896 he was issued license to practice medicine and surgery in the State of Virginia. For better preparation he entered Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia for a postgraduate course in 1898-1899. He specialized in obstetrics and children's diseases. He then returned to Halifax and did some practice at Stebbins, but decided to settle elsewhere. In 1900 he came to Dillwyn in Buckingham County and opened up his office for practice. Roads were very poor and most of his trips were made on horseback.

In 1911 he was married to a Buckingham girl, Julia Elizabeth Payne, and his home was established in Dillwyn, Virginia. He was the father of five children, four girls and one boy. In 1913 Baltimore Medical College united with the University of Maryland and went by that name and on November 17, 1924 he received his diploma from the University of Maryland. Dr. Mitchell practiced in Dillwyn for 48 years. He was a devoted husband and father and took an active part in the civic life of the community and helped in various ways to promote it. On February 2, 1948 he was taken ill and rushed to Johnston-Willis Hospital in Richmond, Virginia where he died on February 11, 1948 at the age of 84 years 3 months and 12 days.

SARAH ALICE MITCHELL

Sarah Alice Mitchell, born June 9, 1866 in Halifax Co., Va. near Nathalie, Va. of today, was the daughter of John Allan and Mary Frances (Pringle) Mitchell. She married, date unknown, Samuel L. Gus Edward Mitchell, born Oct. 15, 1868, was the son of John Allan and Mary Frances (Pringle) Mitchell. He was born at Republican Grove, near Nathalie, Halifax Co., Va. He lived in that county all of his life. He died there on July 19, 1963, almost 95 years old. In his late years he was not well but he had lived an active, vigorous and useful life until then. He attended Millstone Elementary School, studying with Mrs. Mary Lacy, Miss Betty Lacy, Mr. Joe Thaxton and Susan Snydor through those years. He then was a student at Sunnyside Academy in Bedford Co., Va. Rev. Alex Eubank was the Principal. There he learned Latin. An amusing story has come down through the years because this young man used his knowledge of Latin. Gus Edward Mitchell and his brother, Joseph Mitchell, erected a storehouse at a cross road two miles east of Republican Grove and it is said that Joseph Henry operated this store for several years. The people requested a post office there. The Post Office Department required a new name be submitted. Gus Edward, out of his Latin language exclaimed, "Volens Nolens", meaning "Willy-nilly" or "Wishywashy". This was too long and Nolens was dropped and today the place is known as Volens, Va. In this is felt his youthful spirit for fun. (See Halifacts, p. 105).

Gus Edward Mitchell continued his zeal for knowledge by attending at the University of Virginia summer courses in business law. He began his own mercantile business on Nov. 17, 1887 and this place of business was still open when he passed away July 19, 1963, seventy six years later.

On Aug. 18, 1925 he was made School Trustee for Meadville District of Halifax Co., Va. From 1935 to 1962 he was Chairman of Halifax County School Board. From Jan. 1905 to 1959 he was the Superintendant of Millstone Baptist Church Sunday School. He was also Clerk of this church from Jan. 9, 1959. He was also a Deacon in this church from his election Feb. 11, 1905 until his death in 1963. For the Deacon board he was chairman around 30 years. Gus Edward Mitchell served also the Dan River Baptist Association as a member of the Executive Committee from 1920 to 1950 as Treasurer of the Association from 1931 to 1949 and as Vice-Moderator of the Association 1950 to 1951. The ordination service when he was ordained a Deacon on Feb. 1905 was conducted by Rev. J.H. Bass and Rev. W.T. Creath.

Gus Edward Mitchell married at Oak Level Presbyterian Church Annie Baker Young on Tuesday, April 9, 1901. The Rev. T.S. Nelson performed their marriage ceremony. Annie Baker Young, born Jan. 14, 1879 in Halifax Co., Va., died in South Boston Hospital, Halifax Co., Va. May 22, 1972, age 93 years. She was the daughter of Dr. Edward R. Young who married Emily Lovelace. She was a member of Millstone Baptist Church. Their children:

WILLIAM THOMAS MITCHELL

William Thomas Mitchell was the son of James Allen and 5arah Hill (Vaden) Mitchell. He was born at Callands, Va. on Feb. 20, 1835. James A. Mitchell as head of his household in the 1850 census, stated his son William was 14 years old. In the 1860 census, after their father, James Allen Mitchell's death, his brother, John Allan Mitchell, was head of the Household and in the enumeration, his brother William T. is listed 25 years old and a merchant whose real estate was evaluated at 7,525 dollars and personal estate at 4,000 dollars. Comparing this with his sister's estate he had not received at that time his full share of his father's estate. He was one of the Executors and the estate was perhaps not fully settled.

William Thomas Mitchell was born Feb. 20, 1835. The Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage Register, page 198, records that a marriage license was issued on Aug. 5, 1858 to William Thomas Mitchell to marry Nancy E. Swanson. Nannie E. Swanson was 16 years old and the third child of Samuel Allen Swanson, born June 8, 1809 who married Elizabeth Witcher. Her grandfather 5wanson was Col. William Graves Swanson, born May 11, 1777 in Franklin Co., Va. He died June 13, 1840 in Lowndes Co., Ala. He married Elizabeth Muse on June 15, 1801. She was the daughter of John Muse IV. (M.L.B. Pitts. Co., Va.). Elizabeth Muse, born May 21, 1779, died July 16, 1836. See his obituary Aug. 2, 1830, Richmond Whig. Nannie Swanson's great grandfather was William Swanson Jr., born ca. 1750 and died May 25, 1827, who married Ann (?) ca. 1776. She died July 25, 1830. Their death dates are recorded in a Bible record signed by William Swanson, their son.

Her great great grandfather was William Swanson Sr., born ca. 1720. He married Mary McGuire before 1747. (See Douglas Register) The year of his birth is estimated since William Swanson Sr. took the Oath of Allegiance in Henry Co., Va., age 57, on Sept. 13, 1777. (See Chapter VII The Swanson Family, p. 172-179 (1931) Hopkins of Va. & Related Families by W.L. Hopkins).

William Thomas and Nannie (Swanson) Mitchell were residing in the home of his father after they were married and were in the same home when the 1860 census was taken. He with his older brother, John Allen and sister Caroline Virginia, inherited the old home by his father's Will. They were at home there.

Their son and only child, Charles Raymond Mitchell, was born in this home at Callands, Va. on Nov. 19, 1859. His mother, Nannie Swanson Mitchell, was a frail young mother. Her full name was Nancy Elizabeth Swanson. William Thomas Mitchell's father died in May 1860. He was one of the Executors of his will and served. The War Between the States was upon the South. He and his brothers were members of the County Militia. Just how soon William Thomas Mitchell was called to duty is not known, but perhaps at once. He was a member of Troup E. 6th Regt. Cavalry. Capt. Cabell E. Flournoy was Capt. and William T. Mitchell was Sergt. (Pitts. Co., Va. Muster Roll, 1861-1865, Reel 71, Va. State Arch.). He was captured and exchanged G.O. 118 Aug. 27, 1862. This proves he was in service early and his frail, sick beloved Nannie and son Charles Raymond, were in the home of her parents. This was the time when he returned home from Hart Island, according to family tradition. He was a very sick man and his wife Nannie was more ill than he was. Page 91 of Pittsylvania Co. Death Register records the cold facts thus: Nancy E. Mitchell died Oct. 10, 1862 of consumption, at 20 years of age. Her parents were Sam & E. Swanson, her consort Wm. T. Mitchell. Sam A. Swanson, her father, reported her death. Today one hopes that William was at home before she died, 6 weeks after he was released. He did get home and qet well. The details of this illness are forever lost. Without any doubt the little son was left in the home of Nancy Elizabeth Mitchell's parents.

William Thomas Mitchell, having regained his strength, returned to the Army. At some time he organized a local company of cavalry and it may have been at this time. The records show that Capt. William T. Mitchell was in Co. E. 6th Regiment Cavalry Brigade, Pitts. Co., Va. and was captured at Yellow Tavern May 11, 1864. (Reel 71 ibid). No further details are known except Cabell E. Flournoy and Wm. T. Mitchell, Captains in Troop E, 6th Regiment "Pittsylvania Dragoons" (Pen. Halifax Co.) were referred to in Hopkins of Virginia and Related Families. (See p. 274).

Capt. William Thomas Mitchell married the second time Mahala Elbert Owen of Halifax Co., Va. The Halifax Co., Va. Marriage Reg. No. 3, p. 53 shows W.T. Mitchell, widower, age 28, married Sept. 16, 1863 Mahaly Owen, single, age 24 years. The correct spelling of her name is Mahala Owen.

William Thomas Mitchell and his brother John Allan Mitchell, grew up at the old ancestral home of the Mitchells at Callands, Va. They were companions in all they did in the home and in school while they were young boys. In their father's store, built near the dwelling house, they learned the details of the mercantile business. They were clerks in their father's place of business in 1850. (See census). Before 1860 they were in the mercantile business for themselves. Their father does not refer to the mercantile business in his will. Father and sons had settled this among themselves at an earlier date. These two sons were married and living in their father's residence. Each had a son in that home in 1860. (See census). These brothers were members of the militia and each was Captain because there are extant records in which the rank Capt. is before the name of each. Their father had complete confidence in these two sons. He designated them as Executors of his will and requested they not be required by the Court to give security. They acknowledged a bond in the penalty of two hundred thousand dollars conditioned according to law and were granted a Certificate for obtaining probate of their father's will without security as he had requested.

They went through the vicissitudes of the War Between the States as loyal Virginia citizens. Their services so far as known are stated elsewhere. The war over, they returned home and took life as it came. Their former business relationship seems to have continued in the mercantile business, John Allen residing in Halifax and William Thomas in Pittsylvania, at the old home near Callands, Va.

John Allen Mitchell's family were in Halifax Co., Va. during the War between the States and his mercantile business was near Republican Grove. The family possesses a deed dated Jan. 27, 1863 that proves John Allen and Mary F. Mitchell were living in Halifax Co., Va. when they sold to Wm. T. Mitchell their one third interest in the old Mitchell home, willed to John Allen, William Thomas and Caroline Virginia Mitchell by their father. This gave William Thomas two thirds ownership. Since he eventually owned the entire home place, it is known that at some time he bought his sister's one third interest. He resided there many years, yet at intervals he may have lived at New Erection, Pitts. Co., and also in Halifax Co., Va. where he died in 1895. There is extant a business agreement dated Jan. 10, 1872 that verifies the partnership of these two brothers in this mercantile business. Wm. T. Mitchell was to be in charge of their business at New Erection, Pitts. Co. How long this business continued is not known. He was positively residing at the old home at Callands, Va. on May 14, 1880 when his brother, John A. of Halifax Co., Va., quoting; "sold to Wm. T. Mitchell of Pittsylvania Co., Va. a tract of land containing 650 acres more or less adjoining the lands of John H. Fuller, Wm. Cousins, John R. Cabell, Green B. Adkins, W. Thomas Reynolds and Joseph C. Hubbard, it being the land on which the said Wm. T. Mitchel now resides near Callands Va.". On Aug. 18, 1870 Wm. T. Mitchell qualified as Deputy Sheriff. Book 47, p. 279 (Pitts. Co., Va.). Later they were residing in Halifax Co , Va. As citizens of that County Wm. T. and M.E. Mitchell, his wife, deeded 90 acres to his son, Charles Raymond Mitchell on Dec. 13, 1890. His nephew, John A. Muse, Notary Public for Pitts. Co., Va., took their ac⊷ knowledgement of this deed on Dec. 15, 1890. (Deed Book No. 8., p. 110 Halifax Co., Va.). On July 9, 1894 they deeded two tracts of land on Terrible Creek in Halifax Co., Va. to Charles Raymond Mitchell. This deed was acknowledged on the same date before Wm. A.J. Finney, J.P. and was not recorded until Feb. 15, 1897. (D.B. 89, p. 227, Halifax Co., Va.). Charles Raymond Mitchell inherited also his father's lands at Callands, Pitts. Co., Va. Around 1900 he sold the ancestral acres to John Isaac Arnn of Callands, Va. Mr. Arnn was a descendant of James and Sarah Warren Mitchell so those acres are owned by their descendants unto the present day.

William Thomas Mitchell died on Oct. 25, 1895 in Halifax Co., Va. He is interred at Alchie, Halifax Co., Va. His widow, Mrs. Mahala Elbert (Owen) Mitchell, at a later date, was at home in the Home for Widows of Confederate Soldiers in Richmond, Va. for several years. She passed away in Richmond, Va. on May 7, 1921. Recorded in Millstone Church, Minute Book, p. 245, age around 82 years. Her age at marriage and death agree that she was born in 1839. William Thomas Mitchell was called "Uncle Billy" by his brother John Allen's children. He was interred in his brother's family cemetery in Oct. 1895 at Alchie, Halifax Co., Va. In May 1921 his wife, Mahala Elbert Mitchell was laid to rest by his side. They have no descendants. Mahala Elbert Owen was the daughter of Mahala Jefferson Pringle who married Charles Owen and the granddaughter of William and Alice (Goode) Pringle. This means she was a neice of Mrs. John Allen Mitchell.

CHARLES RAYMOND MITCHELL

Charles Raymond Mitchell (Charlie), was the only child of William Thomas and Nancy Elizabeth (Swanson) Mitchell. He was born at Callands, Va. on Nov. 19, 1859. When a boy, he was a student at V.P.I., Blacksburg, Va.. He died on March 3, 1938 and was interred in the family cemetery at home on March 6, 1938. He married on Jan. 22, 1882 Mary Jane Muse, born Nov. 25, 1861, died Feb. 16, 1934 at Climax, Va. She was the only child of James Muse, born on

Aug. 14, 1837, died Sept. 7, 1861, who married Betty Wright who inherited her parent's estate. After their marriage Charles Raymond and Mary Jane Mitchell lived there. One who knew Mary Jane (Muse) Mitchell spoke of her as a wonderful person and of Charles Raymond Mitchell as a fine, good, kind man. Their children were all born at their home at Climax, Pitts. Co., Va. as follows:

IRVIN WRIGHT MITCHELL

Trvin Wright Mitchell is a son of Charles Raymond and Mary Jane (Muse) Mitchell. He was born at Climax, Va. on July 20, 1898 and has owned for his entire life a part of the ancestral lands of his mother. In all these years all return home to his home. In recent years he has lived in Gretna but kept his farm lands. He loves the farm but has worked with the Highway Department.

On Dec. 27, 1922 he married the first time at Chatham, Va. Ethel Shelhorse, the daughter of John Shelhorse who married a Miss Pearson. Ethel Shelhorse was born on June 4, 1896. She died at Climax, Va. on Nov. 17, 1924 and was interred at their home. They had one child:

The will of William Clement proves that his daughter Anne Clement prior to February 18, 1760 was Mrs. Anne Pigg. It has been recorded previously that she was the wife of John Pigg.

The parents of Anne Clement were William and Anne Clement, citizens of Amelia County, Virginia in the years 1735-1760.

The Will of William Clement

In the Name of God Amen, the eighteenth Day of February in the year of Our Lord Christ One thousand seven hundred and sixty, in the County of Amelia, Planter, being sick & weak in body but in Perfect Memory of mind. Thanks be given unto Almighty God therefore. Calling to mind the Mortality of my body & knowing that it is appointed for all Men once to Die, I do make and Ordain this to be my last Will and Testament, that is to say,

----Principly & first I give and Recommend my Soul into the Hands of Almighty God that gave it & my body I recommend to the Earth to be buried at the direction of my Exrs not Doubting but at the general Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Almighty Power of God, and as touching my Worldly Estate.

-----Wherewith it hath Pleased Almighty God to bless me within this life, I Give and Devise & Dispose of the same in the following manner and Form:

Item. I give to my son Benjamin Clement two negroes to wit York and Bess, all which I give to him and his heirs Forever.

Item. I give to my son Wm. Clement Caesar & Philis all----which I give to him & his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my son John Clement Two negroes to wit Ned & Judy paying twenty pounds back to the Estate all of which I give to him & his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my son Francis Clement Two negroes to wit Jemboy & Hannah, also the Land and Plantation & Mill where I now Do live containing 300 acres by Estimation to him and his heirs forever. I also give to my son Francis Clement & his Heirs forever one hundred and fifty Acres of Land which I bought of George Evins whereon the said George Evins Now does live, the said land being not yet conveyed to me, for which my Will is that my Estate Pay the Remainder of the Purchase Money & Desire the said Evins Convey the same Deeds to my son Francis Clement. And that my son Francis shall pay thirty pounds to the Estate at the death of my wife.

Item. I lend to my Daughter Elizabeth Ellyson Two negroes to wit During her Natural Life, Gin & Davy & after her Decease I give Gin to Anne Ford, Daughter of Hezekiah Ford Deceased & Davy to Hezekiah Ford, son of the said Hezekiah Ford, Deceased.

Item. I lend to my Daughter Barsheba Major during her Natural Life Two Negroes to wit Peter & Sarah & Five Pounds Current Money & at the decease of Bathsheba I give the said Negroes & money to be Equally Divided Amongst all her children.

Item. I give to my Daughter Ann Pigg Two Negroes to wit Ben & Lucy all which I give to her and her Heirs forever.

Item. I lend to my loving Wife Ann Clement During her Natural Life all my whole Estate as well as the Part before Disposed of and the Part not already Disposed of & at her Decease, My Will is that the Land I bought of Wm. Ross and all my Estate not Given in Legacys be sold to the highest Bidders & be equally Divided amongst my seven children.

Item. My Will & Desire is that there be no appraisement nor no inventory Returned to the Court.

Item. I constitute & Appoint my son John Clement and my son Francis Clement my hole & sole Exrs of this my last Will & Testament & I hereby Disamul and Revoke & make void all other Former Wills and Testaments, Legacys and Bequeffs by me any Ways before named, Ratifying and Confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have set my Hand and Seal the Day and Year above Ritten; further my Will is that no account of mine stand against any of my children.

At a Court held in Amelia County the 20 Day of Feb^T 1760 This Will was proved by the Oaths of Thomas Tabb, Benjamin Parker & Isaac Clements, Witnesses thereto sworn to by John & Francis Clements, Executors therein named & ordered to be recorded and on Motion of the said Executors who entered into and acknowledged Bond as the Law directs with Edmond Booker their Security Certificate was granted them for obtaining a Probat in due form.

William Clement's wife Ann Clement was living on Feb. 18, 1760. Their living children were:

- i Benjamin Clement
- ii William Clement
- iii John Clement
 - iv Francis Clement
 - v Elizabeth (Clement) Ellyson (see later)
- vi Barsheba (Clement) Major
- vii Ann (Clement) Pigg (see later)

There were the following grandchildren:

- i A granddaughter, Anne Ford (see later)
- ii A grandson, Hezekiah Ford (see later)

This will shows also that his daughter Bathsheba Clement Major had children.

The following facts are known regarding William and Anne Clement. In the Archives of the State of Virginia, Patent Book 17, page 164 has recorded a patent of Land for William Clement of King William County of Virginia that granted to him 1227 acres in Amelia County, Virginia in 1736 on Appomatox River and Bent Run. This positively proves William Clement and family were citizens residing in King William County before going to Amelia County.

The mutilated records of King William Co., Va. have not revealed the ancestors of William Clement nor any evidence of Anne Clement's maiden surname. The fragments of the King William County's mutilated records do prove there was a Clement family in the county. The Quit Rent Roll for King William County in 1704 shows Benjamin Clement owned 600 acres. (Va. Mag. of Hist. & Biog., Vol. 32, p 75) Benjamin Clement of Gloucester Co., Va. in 1694 inherited land situated in King William Co., Va. (Va. Mag. Hist. & Biog., Vol. 19, p 290) In those partially obliterated records has been found a deed dated Nov. 7, 1721 from George Clement and his wife Susannah who sold a part of his father's (Benjamin Clement's) land to William Aylett. This badly damaged record states that this land touched, quoting: "a Redoak, corner of George Clement's brother ----- Clements". So far, the given name of this brother has not been verified. The question is, "Was this William Clement?"

In a deed dated July 21, 1722 Thomas Clement and wife Christian sold land to George Clement in King William Co., Va. (Record Books I & II, Reel 1)

Due to destruction of the county records, no record has been found of William Clement selling land when he moved from King William Co. to Amalia Co., Va. The above facts prove Benjamin owned land there in 1694 and 1704, and George inherited part of it. There is no proof for Thomas and William. William, however, named his oldest son, born in 1700, Benjamin. It is also true that one Benjamin Clement was the son of Francis Clement, the grandson of Jeremiah Clement, but he has been documented as the one who resided in Surry Co., Va. and had no son William.

WILLIAM CLEMENT Ca 1680 - 1760

The name of the father of William Clement (b. ca 1680, d. 1760) has never been determined by family records nor by court documents. Evidence points toward Benjamin Clement who owned lands in Gloucester and King William Counties. First, it is pertinent to state that due to the absence of family record and the destruction of the records of James City, the original shire, and also of Gloucester and King William counties, the researcher who follows the Clement family for positive facts ends often with that which seems true.

In the study of the first three Clement families in the Virginia Colony one finds certain given names. It is significant that six of these are also given names of the children of William Clement, and a seventh, the name of one of his granddaughters. These given names, as seen above, are: Benjamin, William, John, Francis, Elizabeth, Bathsheba and Anne. With the exception of Bathsheba, all are the given names of early members of the Clement family. The name Edey is found among William Clement's granddaughters.

Due to the above observed similarity of these given names, and with no court record found to prove error, in this study the following facts are recorded here, ending with what seems true.

The early records show that Geoffry Clement, called Jeffry, who died in England in 1609, was born in Oxford, England, date unknown. He was a member of and a shareholder in The London Virginia Company which sustained the Jamestown Colony in Virginia beginning in 1607. Sir Geoffrey Clement married Elizabeth Fuller. Her brother was Sir Nicholas Fuller, and her sister was Lady Elizabeth Laughton. Their father was Sir Cuthbert Fuller, the son of Sir Nicholas Fuller of England. (Tyler's Quar. Vol. 17, p 125)

The children of Geoffry and Elizabeth (Fuller) Clement were:

- i. Jeremiah Clements
- ii. Nicholas Clements
- iii. Ezechiall Clements
 - iv. Elizabeth Clements (Tyler's Quar. Vol. 17, p 124)

It is claimed that Mrs. Elizabeth Clements, with the above named four children and her two servants Jeffry Hill and Dorothy Greene, came to Virginia on the ship George in 1611. (Tyler's Quar. Vol. 17, p 125) This adventure secured for Mrs. Clements 350 acres of land on Upper Chippoakes Creek in James City Shire. (Tyler's Quar. Vol. 17, p 125) This is declared recorded in Land Patents, Vol. 1, p 118. (Cavaliers & Pioneers, by Nugent, p 16) This land in 1652 was in Surry Co., Va. when this county was formed.

At some time Mrs. Clements and family went back to England, after the year 1611, since the patent to "Jeremiah Clements, sonn and heire to Elizabeth Clements, dec'd., 350 acres" located upon the Upper Chippoackes Creek, etc., on the 26th of August, 1633 (Pat. Book No. 1, Part 1, p 124) states that this patent is "One in right of his mother for adv. of 7 persons" who were named as above, and there was added "who came over in the George 1617". (Adventurers, Purse & Person, p 138)

At some time before 1623 Mrs. Clements married Capt. Ralph Hamor. (Adventurers, Purse & Person, p 138) In 1611 he was a member of the Council and Secretary to the London Virginia Colony. He came to Virginia in 1609. He wrote "An Account of Virginia 1611-1614". (Va. Hist. & Biog. Vol. 29, p 297, note 6) He returned to England in 1615 to publish this. In 1617 he returned to Virginia as Vice-Admiral to Argall, and in 1621 he was appointed to the Council. (Adventurers, Purse & Person, p 48)

They experienced the Indian Massacre in 1622. The muster of Ralph Hamor proves that Capt. and Mrs. Hamor, and Jeremiah Clements and Elizabeth Clements her children, were living and recorded in the census of 1624-1625 in James City, and among the 7 servants of Capt. Hamor is the name of Jeffery Hull who came in the ship George. Capt. Hamor died in 1626. (Adventurers, Purse and Person, pp 138 & 139) (Also Tyler's Quar. Vol. 17, pp 254 & 255)

Mrs. Elizabeth Hamor married the third time prior to Feb. 8, 1627 Capt. Tobias Fellgate, a mariner, since at the court on that date at James City Mrs. Fellgate requested relief from her duty as administratrix of Capt. Ralph Hamor's estate, because she was planning to return to England. It is assumed she died around 1633, according to the above patent in 1633 to Jeremiah Clements, her son.

JEREMIAH CLEMENTS (Son of Elizabeth (Fuller) and Ca 1600 - Ca 1657 Geoffry Clements)

Jeremiah Clements was born perhaps in Oxford, England around or prior to 1600 and died in Virginia before 1657. His records were in James City County, if he left any will. It has been seen that he came to Virginia in 1611 and again in 1617. He evidently married in England Edey whose surname is unknown. He returned to Virginia before he was given the patent to his mother's estate on August 26, 1633. (Adv., Purse & Person, p 139) By the following information it can be estimated that Jeremiah and Edey were married around 1630. On June 11, 1635 he received a patent for 500 acres, near the land he possessed already on Upper Chippoakes Creek, due him for the transportation of 10 persons. Among them was Edey his wife, and also John Clements his son. (Va. Mag. Hist. & Biog. Vol. 29, p 19) John's deposition, later in life, states he was born in 1631. On Jan. 12, 1641 Jeremiah Clements was present as Burgess for James City. (Va. Mag. Hist. & Biog. Vol. 29, p 28) Since there

seems to be no will extant for Jeremiah Clements, the following are regarded to be his children: (If there were others, names, dates and facts are elusive.

- i. John Clements, b 1631, d after 1704
- ii. Anna Clements, b ? , living 1664 (Adv., Purse & Person, p 139)

ANNA CLEMENTS

Anna Clements, the daughter of Jeremiah and Edey Clements, was evidently born in the 1630s after her mother came to Virginia. She was married, date unknown, to Captain Henry Perry, perhaps before the death of her father Jeremiah Clements. He was, however, deceased before 1657, since on March 17, 1657 Captain Henry Perry deeded to someone else 250 acres on Upper Chippoakes Creek to which he claimed the title because of his marriage to the "Heretrix" of Jeremiah Clements. This word "heretrix", obsolete today, was used for female heir. Today it proves Anna Perry was the daughter of Jeremiah Clements. She was a widow in 1663 and Mrs. Anna Perry had a survey made of Capt. Henry Perry's lands in 1664. (Va. Mag. Hist. & Biog. Vol. 29, p 20)

JOHN Clements

1631 - Living 1704

John Clements, born in England 1631, was claimed by his father Jeremiah Clements as one of his head rights in 1635. He lived all of his life on the lands of his father, first in James City Shire and after 1652 in Surry Co., Va., and was on the Quit Rent Roll there in 1704 for 387 acres. (Tyler's Quar. Vol. 17, p) (Also, Adv. Purse & Person, p 139)

He was a sympathizer in Bacon's rebellion. It has been said he was Captain, that is, Commander-in-Chief. (Adv. Purse & Person, p 139) His wife's name is unknown. Their children's names may be as follows, but this has not been proven. Three were found in records of Surry Co. and one in Gloucester.

- i. John Clements, b. ca 1655 ? Will 1710
- ii. Batholomew Clements, b. ? Will 1713
- iii. Francis Clements, b. ca 1657 ? Will 1717
- iv. Benjamin Clements, b.? Living 1704, d. prior to 1721
 They were all contemporaries and all were on the 1704 Quit Rent Rolls in Virginia. (Will Book, Surry County, Va. No. 6, p. 9) (Va. Mag. Hist. & Biog., Vol. 32, p. 293) (Seventh Cen. Isle of Wight Co., Va., by J. B. Boddie, p 214)

John Clements, Jr.

Ca 1655(?) - 1710

John Clements, son of John Clements, seems to have lived his entire life in Surry Co., Va. He made his will and dated it 12 May, 1704. It was probated on 2 May, 1710. (Will Book, Surry Co., Va. No. 6, p 9) His wife Mary was living. In his will he named:

- i. John Clements, a son
- ii. Samuel Clements, a son
- iii. Anne Clements, a daughter
 - iv. Mary Clements, a daughter
 - v. Elizabeth Warren, a daughter, wife of Allen Warren

BATHOLOMEW CLEMENTS

Batholomew Clements paid taxes in Surry Co., Va. on 1150 acres. He was living in England. He named no wife or children in his will in 1713. He bequeathed "my divident of land on Upper Chippoacks" to his friend Wm. Rookings. The

term "divident", now obsolete, was used to mean a portion of land inherited. It was Jeremiah Clements' descendants who owned land on the said creek so it seems he was the son of John Clements, Sr.

FRANCIS CLEMENTS

Francis Clements, b ca 1651, d 1717 was the son of John Clements, in face of the following court records. In 1704 he was paying taxes on 600 acres of land in Surry County, Va. Francis Clements has been declared not a descendant of John Clements, son of Jeremiah, because Land Patent Book No. 7, p 703, State Archives Richmond, Va. proves Francis Clements in the year 1689 received 450 acres of land due to him for the transportation of 9 persons, and his own name heads the list. This indicates he was an immigrant.

Francis Clements, however, married first Elizabeth Merriwether and second Lydia, the widow of George Blayton. In another study, it is said he married Ann Merriwether, the daughter of Nicholas Merriwether who died in 1687, and Francis Clements was appointed administrator of his estate. If Francis Clements was the administrator of the said estate in 1678, he was not an immigrant in 1689.

According to the will of Francis Clements dated Nov. 20, 1717 (W & D Bk., Vol. 2, p 632, Isle of Wight Co., Va.) and also the will of his son Francis Clements, Jr. dated in 1721 and recorded in Surry Co., Va., it is seen that the children of Francis Clements, Sr. were:

- i. Francis Clements
- ii. Thomas Clements
- iii. Benjamin Clements b? d 1778. Will probated Oct. 8, 1778.
 - iv. Mary Clements
 - v. Elizabeth Clements

The descendants of this Benjamin Clements, as well as ancestors outlined above, are amply recorded in Tyler's Quarterly Magazine Vol. 17, pp 125-128 and 250-257; also in Vol. 18, pp 111-119. The above proves this Benjamin too young to be the father of William Clements who died in 1760. Was he named for his Uncle Benjamin of Gloucester Co., Va?

BENJAMIN CLEMENTS

b 16? d before 1721

Through the years Benjamin Clements has not been covered in the magazines in the way the above members of the Clement family have been documented.

He was a contemporary citizen and believed to be the brother of the above named brothers, and all sons of John Clements, b 1631. The 1704 Quit Rent Roll has the following:

- a) Benjamin Clements, 400 acres Petsworth Parish roll, Gloucester Co., Va. in 1704.
- b) Benjamin Clements, 500 acres Ware Parish roll, Gloucester Co., Va. In 1694 Benjamin Clements of Gloucester Co., Va. inherited from Edward Crefield of London the real and personal estate Mr. Crefield owned in Virginia. This was bequeathed to Benjamin Clements of Ware Parish.
- c) Benjamin Clements, 500 acres in Abbingdon Parish, Gloucester Co., Va. in 1704.
- d) King William Co., Va. was once a part of James City, one of the eight early shires of Virginia. It was formed into a county in 1701/2. A patent dated Oct. 23, 1703 was given John Baker. In 1704 John Baker was on the Quit Rent Roll for 250 acres of land. This came to be the land of Benjamin Clements by a deed acknowledged June 20, 1704 by John Baker.

The King William County records have been destroyed. Found on a microfilm of some mutilated records of that county was the evidence that Benjamin Clements, living in 1704, was deceased in 1721. On this microfilm reel (1702-1727) King William Co., Va., in the Virginia State Archives, Richmond, Va., Book 2, p 94 was found this imperfect record:

"7 Nov. 1 This Indenture between George Clements of St. Margaret's Parish in King William Co., planter, and William Aylett Gent. of the Parish of St. John in the same Co. 25 acres Miry Branch part of a tract granted by patent to John Baker Oct. 23, 1703 to Benjamin Clements, father of the sd George Clements, by a deed acknowledged June 1704 now by inheritance come to the sd George Nov. 16, 1721.

18 May, 1721 part of a tract of 500 acres granted by patent to . . . Baker conveyed to Benjamin Clement father of George Clement of King William Co. 20 day of June 1704 George Clements corner between said George Clements and his brother Susannah Clements, wife of George, relinquished her right of Dower"

On page 257: "The said Thos Clements at ye time of ye Ensealing & Bel . . ry of these presents is perfect and absolute Estate in fee semple of all egular ye before granted premise thereof shall be fully vested and settled in & upon (?) ye said George Clements, his heirs.

Thomas Clemen . . .

At a Court for King William County on July 21, 1722 Thomas Clements acknowledged this deed unto George Clem & Christian wife of said Thomas Clements relinquished her Right of Dower It was recorded Teste Wm Aylett"

The above proves that Benjamin Clements had a son George Clements who by inheritance owned the land conveyed to Benjamin Clements on June 20, 1704. It also intimates the land he was selling to William Aylett touched the land of his brother ______. Who was this brother? Did he have a brother William Clements?

This transaction was in the year 1721. The next year on July 21, 1722 Thomas Clements sold George Clements land, and his wife Christian Clements released her Right of Dower. It is reasonable to think these two men were brothers. Since William Clements in his patent is declared a citizen of King William County it is reasonable also to ask whether William, George and Thomas were brothers.

Land Patent Book No. 17 p 104, Richmond, Virginia shows William Clement received his patent for 1227 acres of land in Amelia Co., Va. around 1736. He moved to Amelia Co., Va. with his entire family. They had lived in King William County until his children were mature young people. His son Benjamin Clement, born 1700, had married around 1725 Susannah Hill of King and Queen County. Therefore the marriage of Benjamin Clement is another clue to indicate a long time residence of his father's family in King William Co., Va. This family consisted of father, mother, four sons and three daughters. The given names, as expressed above, are the same given names found in the Clement families of the Virginia colonial days. In the face of this it is logical to regard William Clement a son of Benjamin Clement of Gloucester County and the grandson of John Clements of Surry Co., Va., and a nephew of Francis Clements. In that case, William Clement named his children as follows for his own kindred:

- i. Benjamin for his father Benjamin Clement
- ii. William, his own namesake
- iii. John for his grandfather John Clement

- iv. Francis for his uncle Francis Clement
- v. Elizabeth for his great great grandmother Elizabeth Clement, the pioneer to Virginia, or for Elizabeth (Merriweather) Clements, his aunt
- vi. Bathsheba has no known family connection
- vii. Anne, for her mother and great aunt Anna Perry

This may be regarded as guessing. To say the least, it is most unusual, if it can ever be learned this is not true. Further, in the next generation, his daughter Anne Clement named a daughter Edey, which was the name of Edey Clements, the wife of Jeremiah Clements. Tradition furthermore claims that Jeremiah Clements' ancestor William Clement came from France to England with William the Conqueror. If William Clement was named for this ancestor, he may have been inspired to give his children family names. (Tyler's Quar. Vol. 17, p?)

William Clement entered Amelia County and settled on 1227 acres of land in 1735. William Clement served Amelia County as Justice of the Peace and as Sheriff in the years that followed. He brought his entire family with him to Amelia County, as proved by the land records in Amelia County, Va. His son Benjamin Clement also had a patent for 400 acres in Amelia Co., Va. and Amelia County was his home.

What did William Clement do with his land? He settled his children on this land as follows: (Recorded in Deed Sook I Amelia Co., Va.)

William Clement deeded to Hezekiah Ford 200 acres of land for 20 pounds on Sept. 18, 1739. Witnesses: John Clement, Mary Clement and Bathsheba Clement. William Clement signed. This deed was to his son-in-law who had married his daughter Elizabeth Clement. Mary Clement may have been the wife of John Clement. So far, no proof has been found. All these witnesses were 21 or more years old. (Deed Book I p 207)

On the same day, Sept. 17, 1739, William Clement sold to William Clement, Jr. 275 acres of land for 20 pounds. Witnesses were Hezekiah Ford, John Clement, and Bathsheba Clement. William Clement signed. (Deed Book I p 209)

On the same day, Sept. 17, 1739, William Clement sold to John Clement 300 acres for 30 pounds. Names of witnesses were not copied, but members of the family and William Clement signed. This was 775 acres of the original grant.

Then on June 14, 1743 William Clement sold to Samuel Majors 200 acres for 10 pounds. Again, names of witnesses were not copied. This deed was signed by William Clement. (All are recorded in Deed Book I, Amelia Co., Va.) Samuel Majors married Bathsheba Clement, the daughter of William Clement.

Anne Clement, daughter of William Clement, married John Pigg. On September 17, 1742 Paul Pigg sold to John Pigg 100 acres of land, part of his patent, for 10 pounds. This land had a boundary line that touched the land of William Clement. The witnesses were William Coleman, William Clement and William Fugerson. This deed was signed by Paul (P) Pigg. The initial P was his mark. It was recorded in Deed Book I, p 420, Amelia Co., Va.

So it is seen that within a few years the five children of William and Ann Clement were settled near them. Their son Benjamin's land in Amelia Co., Va. was also not far away. Only Francis was left.

From the will of his father dated Feb. 18, 1760, Francis Clement evidently remained all those years with his father, since his father bequeathed to his son Francis Clement the Plantation and the mill on which he, that is, William Clement lived "containing 300 acres by estimation". Besides this he gave him another 150 acres of land. There is no information regarding this son's marriage, if he was married.

John and Francis Clement were made executors of their father's will.

They served, and therefore it is assumed that they complied with their father's request that his estate "whole", as well as the part disposed of, remain for his wife Ann Clement, during her natural life. If they did this, Ann Clement their mother passed away very soon after the death of their father. The inventory signed by John and Francis Clement is dated March 27, 1760. It was presented in court and recorded June 25, 1761.

The Amelia County court records further prove that Francis Clement sold the plantation and the water grist mill very quickly. The deed was dated May 22, 1760. (Deed Book 7, p 32) He sold this land to his brother William Clement, whose lands were part of the original patent. William Clement on July 20, 1761 sold the same land to Henry Cox. His deed gives full details of the inheritance of Francis Clement. (D. B. 7, p 491) The conclusion is that their mother had died before these transactions (which might have upset any one of her age) took place. The record shows that her eldest son was sixty years old the year his father died. She had also married grandchildren and was an old lady. No attempt has been made to follow the life and descendants of Francis, son of William and Anne Clement of King William and Amelia Counties.

There has been no attempt to follow each of these seven children, through their descendants, into the present time. However, the following has been learned:

BENJAMIN CLEMENT (Son of William and AnneClement, p. 561)

Benjamin Clement, born around 1700, married Susannah Hill around 1725. He made his will which is filed in Pittsylvania Co., Va., dated 1780. Facts regarding his interesting life and family are recorded in the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, Vol. 32, pp 292 - 298, compiled by his descendant Maude Carter Clement (Mrs. N. E. Clement) of Chatham, Virginia, as well as in her History of Pittsylvania County, Virginia, pp 145 & 146, and note at the bottom of p 145.

ELIZABETH CLEMENT (Daughter of William & Anne Clement, p. 561)

Elizabeth Clement married Hezekiah Ford. There is no record of this marriage, but according to the above mentioned deed dated Sept. 18, 1739, it can be assumed that they were married prior to that date. They lived on the farm in Amelia Co., Va. Hezekiah Ford did not live a great many years. His will is recorded in Will Book I, p 81, Amelia Co., Va. It is dated feb. 11, 1752. A codicil is dated June 6, 1752, and it was presented in court on July 23, 1752. He mentioned his loving wife Elizabeth. He made the following gifts to heirs:

To son John Ford, the 500 acres bought from David Crawford.

To son William Ford, 300 acres and 4 negroes.

To his unborn child, if a son, 300 acres of land. If the child was born a girl, the land was to be sold and the proceeds divided equally with Sarah and Ann Ford, his daughters, and this girl. He made gifts to Brother John Beale and to his nephew John Ford. The estate was to be delivered when they were 21 years of age.

He signed: Hezekiah Ford

The will of William Clement, his father-in-law, dated Feb. 18, 1760 proves that this unborn child was a son and was named Hezekiah Ford for his father. Quoting from that will, "Item, I lend to my Daughter Elizabeth Ellyson two Negroes During her Natural Life, To wit: Gin and Davy, and after her decease I give Gin to Anne Ford Daughter of Hezekiah Ford Deceased and Davy to Hezekiah Ford Son of the said Hezekiah Ford Deceased." Mrs. Elizabeth Ford married the second time on March 8, 1756 Gerard Ellyson. (See Amelia Co., Va. Mar. Reg. - 1735-1815 - p 38) (Reel 54 Va. State Archives)

One study has claimed that Hezekiah Ford who married Elizabeth Clements

was living in Fairfield Co., S.C. in 1794. Quoting, "where were other family connections". The above two wills prove Hezekiah Ford, the husband of Elizabeth Clements, died in 1752, and their son Hezekiah Ford was born in 1752. This is stated here for the sake of clearing this confusion, in case he has descendants.

It has been said that William Clement, Sr. was a great admirer of Hezekiah Ford, Sr. His grandson Hezekiah Ford was only 8 years of age the year his grandfather William Clement passed away. The compiler has no information to record concerning Elizabeth after her second marriage to Gerard Ellyson.

BATHSHEBA CLEMENT

Bathsheba Clement was at least 21 years of age in 1739 when she signed as the witness of deeds, so she was born around or prior to 1711, and married around 1743 when her father sold Samuel Majors 200 acres of land from his patent of land. In William Clement's will is found, quoting, "I lend to my Daughter Barsheba Major During her Natural Life Two Negroes to wit: Peter & Sarah and Five Pounds Current Money and at the decease of the Barsheba I give the said Negroes & Money to be equally Oivided amongst all her children". This proves that Bathsheba Major was living in 1760 and that Bathsheba and Samuel Major were the parents of several children. At present their names are unknown.

ANNE CLEMENT

Anne Clement, the daughter of William and Anne Clement, married John Pigg before her father dated his will on Feb. 18, 1760. See p 118, above. The known activities of John and Anne Clement Pigg are recorded on pages 118-123. Their children's marriages: Edy p 123; Elizabeth p 124; Hezekiah pp 124-127; and Keziah Pigg who married John Hubbard pages 84 to 112 in the above Hubbard history.

WILLIAM CLEMENT, JR'.

William Clement, Jr., the son of William and Anne Clement, married Anne Walker the daughter of Edmund and Judith Walker of the Parish of Raleigh of Amelia Co. Virginia. This marriage is verified by her father's will dated Nov. 8, 1766. This was his second marriage. A record of this marriage was found in Vol. 16 W. & M. Quar. Series, p 89, as follows, "April 8, 1758 Clement, Wm., Jr. and Ann Walker".

William Clement, Jr. patented 400 acres in Amelia Co., Va. on Aug. 7, 1735, which proves he was more than 21 years of age, and born prior to 1714. Details of the life of this family cannot be recorded. His will reveals some facts. It is recorded in $\mathbb W$. B. ZX Amelia Co., Va. (1761-1764) p 150.

The will of William Clement, Jr. follows:

In the name of God, Amen. The Seventeenth day of June one thousand seven hundred and sixty four, I, William Clement of the parish of Raleigh in the County of Amelia being of perfect health thanks to the Almighty God, therefore calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament, that is to say, first I give & recommend my soul unto the hands of Almighty God that gives it and my body do I recommend to the earth to be buried at the discretion of my children, not doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Mighty power of God, and as touching my worldly estate herewith it hath pleased the Almighty God to help me dispose of the same in the following manner and form: To wit:

Item: I give to my son Isham Clement two negroes to wit: Ned and old

Phillis and the land I formerly lived at containing 275 acres and all my "Smith" tools and my part of the mill with ten acres of land joining the mill house, and I desire my son Isham may keep my hole estate together and not divide till TASBS debt paid by the mill and by the negroes work, working the negroes as they stand, not interupting my wife of her house wench nor her affairs.

Item: I give to my daughter Mary Clement one negro, to wit Jean, the young sorrel mare and side saddle and bridle and the bed in the little room and all the furniture belonging to her.

Item: I give to my daughter Martha Clement one negroe to wit: Carter, and the best bed upstairs with all the furniture belonging thereto and the Roan horse.

Item: I give to my son William Clement two negroes to wit: James and Hannah and the land I had of George Evans containing 150 acres and the bed by the chimney up stairs which he lies on and all the furniture belonging thereto and the horse colt and my saddle and bridle and six head of cattle and my gun.

Item: I give to my daughter Rebekah Clement one negroe to wit: Young PHILLISANDA, a good bed, or ten pounds cash.

Item: I give to my son Edmund Walker Clement two hagroes to wit: Sam and Ben.

Item: I give to my son John Clement two negroes to wit: Lucy and young Caesar.

I give to my daughter Ann Clement one negroe to wit: Sarah.

Item: I lend to my loving wife Ann Clement three negroes to wit: Daniel and old Caesar and Temp and the land and plantation where I now live with all the rest of my estate not mentioned, all which I lend to her during her natural life or widowhood, and after death or marriage my will and desire is that the part of estate which I lent to my loving wife may be equally divided between my four children, Rebeckah, Edmund, John and Ann, except my land that I give to sons Edmund and John, the land where I now live and the other part of this legacy to be divided between the four mentioned, and I do appoint my loving wife Ann Clement executrix for Edmund Walker Clement and John Clement and for ANN Clement and I do appoint my son Isham Clement executor for the rest of my children, Mary, Martha, and William and Rebeckah of this last Will and testament.

Signed and Sealed in presence of:

Probated at a court held for Amelia County, Va. on the 26th day of June 1765

The above will proves Isham Clement was a mature man since he is named an executor. The date of the marriage license proves that only eight years had passed when this will was probated. Without correct dates, it is reasonable to consider that the children left in his wife's care are her own children, and the other five are the children of his first wife, whose name is unknown.

The children of William Clement, Jr. are listed here in the order in which they are named in his will:

- i. Isham Clement
- ii. Mary Clement

- iii. Martha Clement
 - iv. William Clement
 - v. Rebeckah Clement
- vi. Edmund Walker Clement
- vii. John Clement
- viii. Ann Clement

FRANCIS CLEMENT

No further information has been found regarding Francis Clement after he sold his interest in his father's estate to his brother William Clement, Ir.

SARAH MITCHELL'S FAMILY (Continued from p. 528)

On page 528 the compiler recorded the facts that were recalled by relatives in the 1930s regarding Asa and Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn's family. The compiler continued research at intervals through the years, and was so fortunate as to contact Mrs. Eleanor Marie (Harris) Douglas, whose research and interest have made it possible to record the following information for seven generations of Asa and Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn's descendants as well as her Harris ancestors. This data is valuable to many others, among whom are the descendants of Maurice Solomon Fuller (1795-1858) and his wife Nancy Overton Harris (see pages 376-426 of this study). Mrs. Douglas is a descendant of Asa and Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn's daughter Clotilda Diadem Arnn, and readers of this compilation owe deep gratitude to her.

GENERATION I

ASA ARNN (ca 1812, - d. before 1850)

Asa Arnn was the son of Isaac Arnn and his second wife. Elizabeth Fuller (see page 364) and grandson of Abraham Arnn (1732-cal818) (see pp. 240, 241, 507-592) (see Index for further references). Asa married in Pittsylvania Co., Va. on Nov. 10, 1832 Sarah Mitchell (called Sallie), the daughter of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. She was b. Dec. 28, 1812 and d. in March 1895. Rev. Orson Martin performed the wedding ceremony for Asa Arnn and Sarah Mitchell (Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage Register (1767-1862), also Ministers Returns p. 100). Sarah's ancestors are compiled so far as known for 7 generations (refer to p.492 and following). Asa and Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn resided in the area of Callands, Pittsylvania Co., Va.

Asa Arnn owned land near to land of John Mitchell, the father of his wife, Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn. The compiler has not had the opportunity to see the deeds, but in 1981 Mrs. Eleanor Marie (Harris) Douglas sent abstracts from two deeds proving Asa Arnn's ownership of 2504 acres.

The first deed is dated April 8, 1875 and was written by William T. Aaron regarding "... my real estate left by my father, Asa Aaron, dec'd to wit: 250½ acres land bearskin Creek in Possession of my Mother, Sallie Aaron for her life 99 acres including machine shop, sawmill fixtures \$1,260.00 value on all (See D. B. 68 Pitts. Co., Va., p. 131). This deed was evidently William Thomas Aaron's effort to protect his Mother's dower rights and her personal right so long as she lived.

Then December 5, 1875 a second deed was written between Sally Aron, Wm. T. Aron & Clotilda D. Adkins. Clotilda was the daughter of Asa and Sally (Mitchell) Arnn. This deed also refers to the same $250\frac{1}{4}$ acres of land and specifies that it was the land of Asa Aron adjoining lands of the late John Mitchell and others. 99 ac Sallie's share; 76 acs Clotilda's share; 93 ac Wm. T. Aron's share (See D. B. 68 Pitts. Co., Va. p. 177). This Second deed is of value because it declares Asa Arnn owned the land and that it adjoined land of John Mitchell.

In the early 1930s, elderly relatives who were contacted did not recall details of the family life of Asa and Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn. One person reading the 1840 census found Asa Arnn in the age group of (30 - 40) therefore he was less than 40 years old and born in the early 1800's. Sarah was in the (20 - 30) age group and this is correct since she was 27 years old on Dec. 28, 1839. According to the 1840 census Asa and Sarah were the parents of:

- i. A son under five years of age (William Thomas Arnn)
- ii. A daughter under five years of age (Clotilda Diadem Arnn) b. Oct. 15, 1837 and around 3 years old when the census was taken).

No more facts were learned by the compiler until the 1850 census record was read. As a Arnn was not found in the 1850 census; therefore he had died before 1850 but the date of his death has not been established.

In the 1850 census, page 247 of Pittsylvania Co., Va., Northern District, line 29, Sally Arnn is recorded as head of the household. She was 38 years of age, a widow and a farmer. Her real estate was valued at \$500.00. Her children were:

- i. William, age 15 (His name was William Thomas Arnn, b. Aug. 14. 1835.)
- ii. Clotilda, age 13 (Her name was Clotilda Diadem Arnn, b. Oct. 15, 1837).
- iii. John, age 8 (The Bible Record said born Jan. 9, 1841)--His name was John Sydney Arnn).

The 1860 census for Pittsylvania Co., Va. Northern District, Callands Post Office, Household no. 574 shows Sally Aron farmer with real estate valued at...continued on p. 574...

\$1200.00 and personal estate \$250.00. In her household were:
William T., Personal estate \$250.00
Bartlett Atkins, age 22, farmer
Clotilda D. Atkins, age 22

During those years 1840 to 1860 Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn had seen many changes in her family. She was a widow and had reared three children to adulthood. Her father passed away in 1844. Her two young sons were facing service in the Confederate States Army. In 1860 she was facing the possibility of her son-in-law and her young unmarried brother serving as soldiers. She was maintaining a farm. This means she had to share corn, wheat and meat with the Army during that war. After that she endured the Reconstruction era and lived to be 82 years old on Dec. 28, 1894 and died two months and some days later in March 1895. By those who recalled her in the 1930s, she was spoken of in endearing terms and as "Dear Aunt Sallie". No more has been discovered about Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn. The following is known about her children:

GENERATION I.

JOHN SYDNEY ARNN (1841-1860)

John Sydney Arnn, b. Jan. 9, 1841, was the youngest whild of Asa and Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn. He died on Sept. 28, 1860 at age 18 yr, 6 mo. & 17 days (See Death Register, Pittsylvania Co., Va). He was interred in the grave yard at the home of John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell, his grand parents. He was declared an excellent young man and loved by all who knew him. Unmarried.

CLOTILDA DIADEM ARNN

Clotilda Diadem Arnn, b. Oct. 15, 1837 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. the daughter of Asa and Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn, married on Oct. 25, 1859 Bartlett Adkins, b. March 5. 1837. Their birth dates are recorded in the family Bible (see p. 531). The Court records prove the surname Arnn sometimes was being misspelled as Aron for this family. The census for 1860 mentioned above proves that Clotilda and her husband, Bartlet Adkins, were residing in her mother's home at that time. The compiler has not attempted to determine the parents of Bartlet Adkins. He may have been a relative of the Atkins family of Charlotte Co., Va. from which Sarah (Mitchell) Arnn's mother, Anna (Atkins) Mitchell, descended. Details of his life have not been learned. The compiler has been told by a cousin of his daughter Henrietta, that he died early in life as a result of some disability connected with his service in the Confederate States Army. The date of his death was not known by that relative (then an elderly lady). She had been particularly fond of that daughter of Bartlett, Henrietta J. Harris (Mrs. John Fletcher Harris). They were small children at the time of Bartlett Adkins' death. A Bible record of John Fletcher and Henrietta J. Harris proves the youngest child Beverly Lee Adkins (Atkins) was born March 18, 1866. This verifies Bartlett E. Adkins, his father, died after the close of the War Between the States. Clotilda and Bartlett may have decided to remain in her mother's home because of the threat of war; this would leave the two women together. No one recalled the date on which Clotilda Diadem (Arnn) Adkins (Atkins) died. She is buried in the grave yard at the home of her grand parents, John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell: her grave is unmarked, but Mrs. Christina (Hubbard) Gilbert recalled that Henrietta Jimpse Adkins (Atkins) was buried beside her mother, Clotilda. Refer to page 493-D for a sketch of this grave yard.

BEVERLY LEE ADKINS

Beverly Lee Adkins, the son of Bartlett E. and Clotilda Diadem (Arnn) Adkins was born March 18, 1866 in Pittsylvania Co., Va. (see page 4 of Pittsylvania Co., Va. Birth Register 1866-1896). His birth is also recorded in the Bible Record of his sister Henrietta J. (Adkins) Harris (Mrs. John Fletcher Harris). Beverly Lee Adkins married on Jan. 23, 1889, Annie Lisla Cook the daughter of James D. and Susan Cook. She was 17 years of age, therefore born ca 1872. Their wedding ceremony was performed by Rev. William H. Mathews (see Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage Register for that year.) He was Chief of Police in Draper, N. C. during the early 1900s. No further facts have been learned.

HENRIETTA JIMPSE ADKINS (1861-1906) and JOHN FLETCHER HARRIS (1857-1940)

John Fletcher Harris, b. June 14, 1857 at Strawberry, Pittsylvania Co., Va. d. Feb. 21, 1940 and was buried Feb. 23, 1940 in Franklinton, N. C. cemetery. He was the son of Samuel Harris III and his second wife, Sarah C. S. Elliott.

John Fletcher Harris' first wife was Henrietta Jimpse Adkins, b. Sept. 18, 1861 in Pittsylvania Co., Va., the daughter of Bartlett E. Adkins who married Clotild. Diadem Arnn. Henrietta died Feb. 6, 1906 and was buried beside her mother, Clotilda Diadem (Arnn) Adkins in the graveyard of her great grand parents John and Anna (Atkins) Mitchell. See chart on page 493-D.

The Bible Record as recorded by John Fletcher and Henrietta Jimpse (Adkins) Harris was preserved by their son Opal Bernice Harris. He gave the Bible to his daughter, Mrs. Eleanor Marie (Harris) Douglas. She sent a photo copy to the compiler for use here.

He served during World War II. returned home safely and was married (see above). He was employed as an insurance agent but soon re-enlisted in the U. S. Army and served an additional 22 years. Most of the time they were at Fort Devens, Worcester, Mass. While there he was sent to Japan. They were stationed at Camp Sandai for a year then returned to Massachusetts. THE ANCESTORS OF JOHN FLETCHER HARRIS AND HIS DESCENDANTS
HIS CRANDFATHER, SAMUEL HARRIS II (ca 1770-ca1814)

Samuel Harris II by estimate was born ca 1770 at Strawberry, Pittsylvania Co., Va. He was the son of Samuel Harris I who married Lucy Camp of Prince Edward Co., Va. In 1791 he was engaged to marry Nancy Ann Overton, the daughter of William Overton who married Judith Brumfield. They resided in Charlotte Co., Va. According to the following document William Overton, her father, was deceased and her mother who had married again was Mrs. Judith Traynum.

The following is recorded in Charlotte Co., Va. Marriage Register I page 161: "I hereby do certify my daughter Nancy Overton is of the age of twenty-one years and is willing to be joined in matrimony with Mr. Samuel Harris in consequence of which I am willing that you should issue license as witness my hand.

Test: Rubin Traynum Cleighban Harris James Moore Nov. 16, 1791 Judith Traynum

Sirs: As there is a purpose of marriage agreed to by Samuel Harris and Nancy Overton, daughter of William Overton, dinst. both of Charlotte Co. and each partie of age, pleaset therefore, to grant them a marriage license as witness our hands, this 15th. day of November 1791. Wit: Thos More

Kit Ervin James More Rubin Tranum Nancy Overton

Rubin Tranum was the step father of Nancy Overton.

In the Marriage Bond Reg. I. of Charlotte Co., Va. page 13, dated Nov. 16, 1791. the following bond is recorded.

"Know all men by these presents that we, Samuel Harris and Thomas Moore, are held and firmly bound unto Beverly Randolph Esquire, Gov. of Commonwealth of Virginia in the sum of fifty pounds current money to which payment well and truly to be made to our said Governor and his successors for the use of the Commonwealth we bind ourselves heirs to family by these presents, sealed with our seals and dated this 16th. day of November 1791.

The condition of this obligation is such that whereas, that there is a marriage to suddenly be solemnized between the above bound Samuel Harris and Nancy Overton, if therefore, there should be lawful cause to obstruct the same then this obligation to be void also to remain in full face and value. Sealed and solemnized in the presence of:

Jno. Hannah

Sam Harris Thos. Moore

The marriage took place in Charlotte Co., Va. on Dec. 1, 1791. They resided in Pittsylvania Co., Va. No facts regarding their lives have been secured. It has been learned that Samuel Harris II died around 1811. His heirs have been listed as:

The compiler has secured no facts regarding the first four heirs named above. Evidence of the three youngest children is verified by documents which follow:

Eight years after the death of Samuel Harris II his widow, Mrs. Nancy (Overton) Harris and Mr. John Inge Sr., a widower, were engaged to be married. John Inge secured his marriage bond on Jan. 18, 1819 (Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage Bonds (1767-1862) p. 182)

Then they made a special agreement before the marriage was solemnized:

AGREEMENT BETWEEN JOHN INGE AND NANCY HARRIS:

This agreement made this twenty-fifth day of January in this year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and nineteen between John Inge of Pittsylvania County of the first part and Nancy Harris, widow of Samuel Harris, also of the county aforesaid of the second part. Whereas a marriage is shortly intended to be had and solemnized by the permission of God, by and between the said John Inge and Nancy Harris, widow, and which as aforesaid of (cont'd p. 583)

Samuel Harris, deceased. Now it is hereby agreed to and acknowledged by the said parties that the said John Inge will not either directly or indirectly hold, cause or meddle in any respect whatsoever with any part either real or personal of the estate of which the said Nancy Harris, widow, as aforesaid is now possessed of, only at the discretion, or request of the said Nancy Harris either before or after our intermarriage, but that the whole of the estate whether real or personal with the right and title thereto shall remain in and to the said Nancy Harris as it now is, to dispose of in any manner that she may think proper as well after as before our marriage and further the said John Inge doth agree to keep Nancy Harris, daughter infant of the said Nancy Harris, widow as aforesaid during his life or until she may marry without charging any board and Micajah Harris, son and infant of said Nancy aforesaid for the term of five years without charging him board and it is further agreed to and by the said John Inge and Nancy Harris, the now intended wife of the said John Inge, that if it should be the will of God that they should intermarry agreeable to their expectations, and the said Nancy Harris should survive the said John Inge then said John Inge doth by these presents bind himself and heirs and assigns to leave the said Nancy Harris, his intended wife as aforesaid, in possession of 200 acres of land to be laid off from the tract on which he now lives by commissioners appointed for that purpose so as to include any houses and orchards near there as may be thought just and equitable by the said commissioners between the said Nancy Harris, my intended wife and my children during her life, but at her death, the whole to return to my estate again and the said Nancy Harris doth covenant and agree to and with the said John Inge her intended husband, that should she be the longest liver, she shall not directly or indirectly cause by way or dower or in any other respect whatsoever any part real or personal of the estate of the said John Inge more than is herein made except under the last will and testament of the said John Inge and further if after the marriage it should be agreed on by us -- the said Nancy Harris and John Inge should the said Nancy Harris be the longest liver -- for him the said John Inge to leave me in possession of some other tenament equivalent to the one herein proposed it shall be binding and satisfactorily.

In testimony whereof we have hereto set our hands and seals this day and date above written. Signed, Sealed and delivered in presents of:

William Pritchett William Payne William Murphy James Trotter John Inge Nancy Harris

The actual date of their marriage has not been found. The above agreement is proof that Nancy and Micajah Harris are the children of Nancy (Overton) Harris and Samuel Harris II. They were still young. The 1850 census lists Nancy as 42 years old, therefore born in 1808—therefore 11 years old in 1819 when the above agreement was made. Micajah was assured care for 5 years; this means he was probably 12 years old because in that era a son at age 17 was placed on his father's tax list and considered old enough, if desired, to be apprenticed to learn a trade and become self supporting.

Son Samuel was not mentioned in the 1850 census; therefore it is assumed he was self supporting in 1819 and today it is stated, born around 1802. Then in 1825 when his sister Nancy Overton Harris was around 17 years of age, Samuel Harris, her brother, signed with her mother, Nancy lnge (Nancy (Overton) (Harris) Inge) a permission for her marriage license as follows:

"This is to certify that you have leave from me to grant Captain Solomon Fuller license to marrying daughter Nancy Overton Harris. Given under my hand this 23rd. day of November 1825"

Nancy Inge Samuel Harris See Pittsylvania Co., Va. Marriage Register (1767-1862) p. 127.

Nancy Inge is her mother and Samuel Harris III is her brother and not her deceased father, Samuel Harris II. Another evidence that Samuel "Harris III was of age is verified by his cooperation in the Marriage Bond recorded for Solomon Fuller as follows:

"Know all men by these presents, That we Solomon Fuller and Sam'l Harrisare held firmly bound unto James Pleasants, Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia, and his successors in the sum of <u>One Hundred and Fifty Dollars</u>, to which payment, well and truly to be made, we bind ourselves, our heirs, executors and administrators, jointly and severally, firmly by these presents. Sealed with our seals and dated this 23rd. day of November 1825.

The condition of the above obligation is such as that whereas a marriage is intended to be solemnized between the above bound Solomon Fuller and Nancy O. Harris of Pittsylvania Co.: Now if there be no lawful cause to obstruct the said marriage, then the above obligation to be void: otherwise to remain in full force and virtue.

Solomon and Nancy Overton (Harris) Fuller and their descendants are recorded in the Fuller section beginning page 376.

MACAJAH HARRIS b. ca 1806

No information has been collected for Micajah Harris. Interested persons need to search the Pittsylvania County Court Records and Census Records.

SAMUEL HARRIS I

Samuel Harris was born January 12, 1724 in Hanover Co., Va. He married Lucy Camp of Prince George Co., Va., the daughter of James Camp, who married Elizabeth Clements. Samuel Harris died Oct. 2, 1799 in Pittsylvania Co., Va.

When around 24 years of age Samuel Harris patented land on Sandy River in the Southwest part of Lunenburg Co., Va. in the year 1748. The result of this patent was that Samuel and Lucy (Camp) Harris lived all their lives on this same land, yet in the meantime were citizens of three counties: Lunenburg, Halifax and Pittsylvania. In 1777 Samuel Harris paid taxes on 4,000 acres and ten slaves in Pittsylvania Co., Va.

As an American Citizen he was an appreciated man who served as deputy Sheriff; Justice of the Peace; Surveyor of Poads; Postal Rider for the mail; Church Warden and member of the Vestry of Antrim Parish of the Established Episcopal Church; as one of the two first representatives in the House of Burgesses of Halifax County; Colonel of the Militia and Commandant of Fort Mayo situated west of Martinsville, Va.; also as commissary for the Fort and the British Army. All of these valuable services he gave to the people before he was 35 years of age.

In the meantime as an active official in the Antrim Parish of Virginia's Established Church Samuel Harris was concerned about efforts of the Baptist Denomination. He decided to know the truth. In May 1758 the opportunity came. Colonel Harris riding by Allen's Creek saw a crowd entering a home. Upon inquiring, he learned that the Baptist Murphy Boys were to preach. He went into the house, heard the sermon and accepted Christ as his Savior. Colonel Samuel Harris resigned his commission at Fort Mayo and returned home. He was baptized by Elder David Marshall. There was no ordained minister for Dan River Church and Elder Samuel Harris was active there in expounding the scripture and exhorting the people there and later all over the State of Va. and elsewhere. The date of his ordination was not found, but he was the first minister to receive the Ministers' Bond in the year 1785 (See Early Ministers Bonds) and page 290 of History of Pittsylvania Co. by M. C. Clements. He was appreciated because the Strawberry Association when organized was named for his home "Strawberry". He gave 41 years of his life to the establishment of the Baptist Denomination. He truly helped to lay a firm foundation for the present Pittsylvania Co., Association (Baptist) of today.

Samuel Harris died Oct. 2, 1799 at the age of 75 years 8 months and 20 days. Over 40 years of that time in the service of the Lord meant he rode horse back many miles no matter what the weather—in Winter or Summer. Samuel Harris has been declared "The foremost man of Virginia in establishing the Baptist Faith in Virginia" (p. 126 History of Pittsylvania Co., Va. by M. C. Clements). During the Revolutionary War Samuel Harris also handled military stores from Peytonsburg to Charlotte Town (p. 171, ibid).

Samuel Harris requested for his funeral sermon Timothy Chapter 4 verses 7 & 8 (p. 129, ibid). He freed 5 of his slaves for their faithfulness to him. (See Will Book II Pittsylvania Co., Va, p. 222). His Will was probated Oct. 21, 1799. He left his estate to three sons and two daughters. They were:

- i. Nathaniel Harris (no facts secured by compiler)
- ii. Samuel Harris (See p. 581, 582 Samuel Harris II, also see Index)
- iii. Benjamin Harris (in 1794 he married Lucy Conway)
 - iv. Mary (She married John Buckley in 1786)
 - v. Elizabeth Harris (She married John Pryor Payne in 1798) See note 9 page 58 of History of Pittsylvania Co., Va. by M. C. Clements.

Samuel Harris (1724-1799) was called to his reward after his life of service to the people of Virginia. He was gone but not forgotten.

One evidence in remembrance of Samuel Harris was recorded many years ago (see page 382 of this study). The compiler has been told that another inscription is engraved on the back side of that marker, and it is given below for the information of those who are interested in it:

THIS CHURCH IS NAMED IN MEMORY OF

REV. SAMUEL HARRIS

FATHER AND ORGANIZER OF THE BAPTIST FAITH

IN VIRGINIA

1759-1799

Another memorial is at County Line Baptist Church on State Road 832 off U. S. 360 in Virginia. This is a tall impressive monument and bears the following inscription:

Laura Sue Douglas, b. Oct. 17, 1956, the daughter of Hilton Thomas and Eleanor (Harris) Douglas of Keeling, Va., became the bride of William Keesee Gardner, b. May 4, 1952, the son of Charles Harold and Evelyn (Keesee) Gardner. The marriage ceremony was performed on June 26, 1982 in Oak Grove Baptist Church, Keeling, Virginia. Laura and William both are graduates of Averett College, Danville, Va.

ABRAHAM ARNN (ca 1732-1818)

The compiler calls attention to facts on pages 240-241. After those facts were received and recorded, the following information was sent # in support of Abraham Arnn's recognition as a Revolutionary War Patriot:

- I. *Abraham Arnn subscribed to the Oath of Allegiance before Captain Daniel Hamkins in Pittsylvania County, Va. Sept. 6, 1777."
- II. "Abraham Arnn was a member of the Grand Jury several terms during the Revolutionary War. He furnished beef for the Pittsylvania Militia."

It was stated also "The Virginia State Law required members of the Grand Jury to take the Oath of Allegiance, to be loyal, intelligent freeholders."

The compiler has found the name Arnn too often in Court records spelled "Aron" or Aaron". Upon reading the following remember that Abraham Arnn, Sr. was a gunsmith. His name in the following record is spelled both Aron and Aaron.

Years ago (mid 1900s) all the facts then available to this compiler about the descendants of Isaac Clay Arnn have been recorded on pages 217-240 of this study. In 1981, through the generosity of Mr. John Wesley Arnn, Sr. of Lubbock, Texas, the information on the next five or six pages is included. John Wesley Arnn is one of the fourth great grandsons of Abraham Arnn (1732-1818).

Joanna Amanda Blair, b. Feb. 28, 1813, Pitts. Co., Va., d. cal854 in Tennessee. She was the daughter of Samuel Blair and his first wife, Mary Reynolds. Berryman Arnn resided in Va., Tenn., and Ark. He was a blacksmith. His church affiliation was with the Cumberland Presbyterians. Their children were:

In his own words, "I have always enjoyed some form of art, but the most satisfying has been my current interest, which came simultaneously with my eye problem: painting wildlife (birds and animals) on cabinet door panels made from ash wood. The grain is beautiful and I use it as a background."

HARRY ROBERTSON PARRISH (Cont'd. from 266-67)

Harry Robertson Parrish, b. Sept. 16, 1932, the youngest child of Thomas Allen and Eva Winston (Hubbard) Parrish, married in Germany on Nov. 3, 1960 Nina Elizabeth (Foster) Harrison, a divorced widow who had two children. She was born July 4, 1929. Harry Robertson Parrish adopted Sandra Kay Harrison and Earl Robert Harrison. On Oct. 1, 1967 Nina and Harry were divorced. After 20 years in service, Harry retired and joined his brother, Thomas Allen Parrish, Jr. in farming at the old home place near Callands, Va. Here follow accounts of the two adopted children.

EARL ROBERT PARRISH

JOHN BEVERLY GILBERT'S PROPERTY -- BI-CENTENNIAL FARM

In 1976 John Beverly Gilbert's farm was recognized as a Bi-Centennial Farm at a ceremony sponsored by the Virginia Farm Bureau Federation at their meeting in Roanoke, Virginia. See p. 493-N for a copy of the Certificate.

John Beverly Gilbert collected the documents necessary to support the claim that the land had been recorded officially in deeds in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, beginning in 1770. Unfortunately, John died November 17, 1976 before the award was to be presented. John Charles Gilbert, son of John Beverly Gilbert, accepted the certificate on behalf of his father.

A copy of the survey made in 1770 together with abstracts of deeds tracing the ownership of the land can be found on pages 493, 493-A and 493-B of this book.

JOHN PIGG (cal620) Immigrant and wife JANE PIGG

Quoting from The Trail Blazers by Mrs. Alice Turndige Hamot, page 390: "The next account I found is of John Pigg I and his wife Jane Pigg of King and Queen County, Virginia. They came there in 1644 from England." Note: Elsewhere in that book she said they came in 1654.

MARY ELIZABETH (SOURS) HUBBARD

Mary Elizabeth (Sours) Hubbard served as a community reporter for the DANVILLE REGISTER, giving news items for the VANDOLA community. Here are two of her reports made in 1901. Sometimes she signed with her initials, "M.E.H." At other times she signed "Elizabeth".

VANOULA. Rev. W. H. Sledge and charming wife and little Alma came on a visit to the old home. He was our first pastor, and while here he assisted our pastor, Rev. W. D. Barr, in a meeting. W. H. Sledge did the preaching. He gave us strong Gospel sermons, a perfect feast for the soul. The interest manifested was great. There were five additions to the church. Miss Annie James Harvey by letter from the First Baptist Church of Danville, two ladies and one gentleman by Baptism and one restored. With a heavy heart we bade Bro. Sledge and family goodbye and they returned to their home in Milan, Tenenessee. May they come again is the wish of their many friends.

VANDOLA. Our Sunday School gave its picnic last Friday. The dinner was superb and could have supplied twice the number present. After dinner the treat was candy. There was a barrel of lemonade. Our invited speaker failed us, but we had — to our surprise and delight — an orator among our scholars: Mr. Jimmie Green. His subject was 'Regret'. A visitor, Miss Lottie Pain, recited a piece, the subject 'It's Nothing to Me', after which Mr. J. A. Thomas made a short and appropriate talk. We think the Sunday School had a pleasant day long to be remembered. (Signed, Elizabeth)

JOHN MITCHELL HUBBARD AND MARY ELIZABETH (SOURS) HUBBARD'S HOMES

Prior to building the house at Vandola (1884/1885) they had three dwelling places: (1) For the first year of their married life they lived in the home with his parents. (2) For seven years they lived in a house that had been on the Mitchell property for many years (origin not known). See references to that house on pp. 154 and 155 -- referred to as the house on the hill. Also see a reference to that house on page 287. (3) There was a house on the property that they bought at Vandola and they lived in it until the new home was built.

Excerpts from a letter written by Mary Elizabeth (Sours) Hubbard to her uncle in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania:

September 23, 1884

My dear Uncle: I have had letters from home, as I still call Pa's home mine, and all was well.John has cured 9 curings of tobacco and thinks he has 8 more to cure. We have small barns here because it takes longer to heat a large barn and the green plants of tobacco are crowded too much in a large barn. John has been hauling brick from Danville to build chimneys for his house. He thought to have the foundation of brick, but as it is so far and would take so long to haul the brick, he has concluded to build it of rock and it will be cheaper.It will not be a fine house but a comfortable one. It will be a frame 2-story house with two rooms on the first floor and hall and same above; then the kitchen and dining room added and also two porches. I have been making dye from shumake berries. I liked it so much I bottled some for ink. To make a black ink take maple bark and chinquapin bark and boil it down until it is strong then add a little coperas. John doesn't like it but I do as it is blacker than any I can buy. Your devoted niece,
